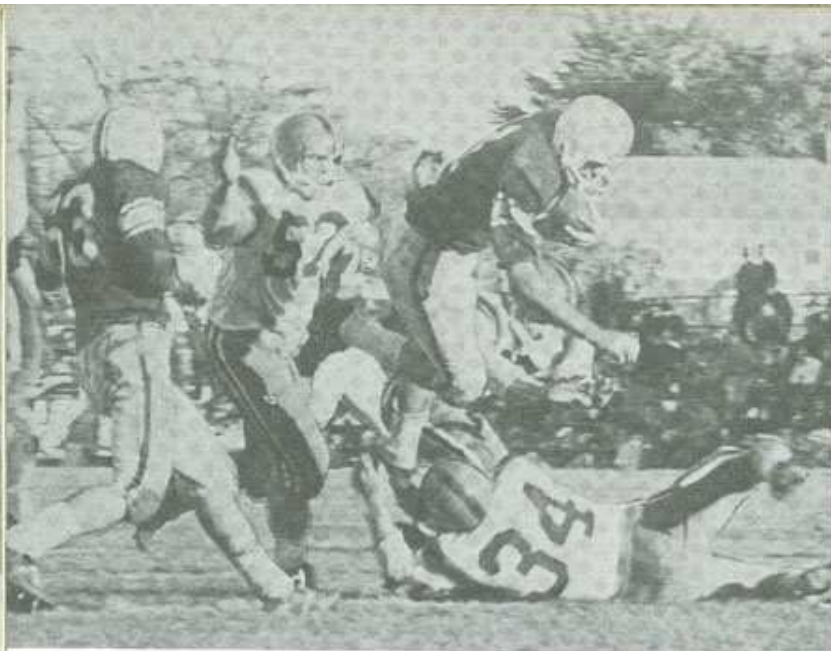
The Huskies looked like an early season powerhouse as they won their first three games. The season's opener under the lights at Wanderers Grounds saw the Bob Hayes coached crew smother Dalhousie 66-19. Greg McClare, playing his final year in an SMU uniform, and Ted Chandonnet provided the scoring punch with three touchdowns apiece, while Cloutier had two and Lancaster and Schneider one each. Records were broken and tied in this game with newcomer Dick Loiselle and Ray Roy passing for 308 yards and a record, and picking up 12 first downs via the air to equal a mark. SMU also gained 659 total net yards to eclipse all previous AFC outputs.

A week later on October 4, Saint Mary's continued undefeated as they clipped the Stadacona Sailors, 26-12, at Wanderers. Rookie Roger Cloutier contributed a pair of majors, with Chandonnet and Lancaster getting the other two. The Sailors had been rated as strong contenders and with the SMU win it looked as though "X" were in for a surprise.

The trend continued on a rain soaked Wanderers field the following Monday as the Shearwater Flyers were edged by the freshman packed Huskies, 18-12. Dick Loiselle, Stu O'Brien and Ted Chandonnet split the total evenly in this one, with O'Brien also being responsible for two key interceptions in the opening quarter.

Then, on Friday afternoon, throngs of supporters packed their beloved grid favorites onto the bus and gave them a royal sendoff. The next morning buses and cars crowded the highways as Santamarians present, past and future headed for Memorial Field in Antigonish.

The climax to such spirited preliminaries should not have been as it was. It didn't seem right. But at final count the powerful "Xmen" had halted the Huskies, 42-12. It wasn't until the final quarter that St. F.X. pulled out of reach, scoring 20 points to SMU's 6. At half time it read 15-0 and at the end of three quarters it was 22-6.

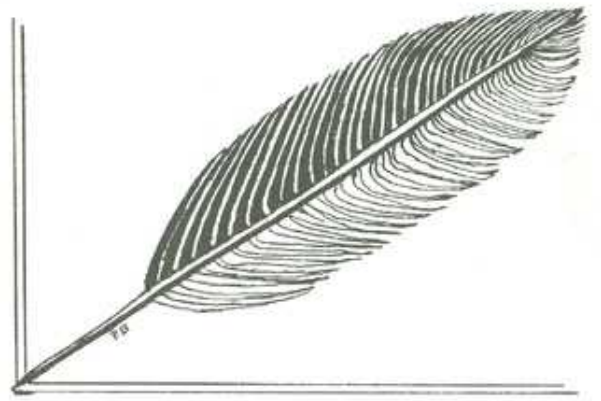
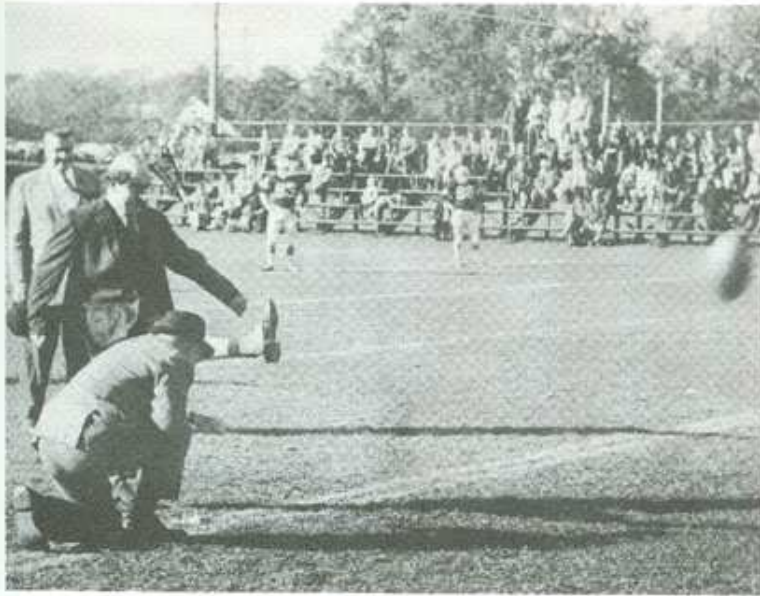

The skies opened and the rains came down along with the Mounties. The Sackville, N.B., team swamped the surprised and disorganized Huskies, 44-19.

This put Saint Mary's in a rather bleak situation. With two losses to the Mounties one, Saint Mary's had to win their two remaining games with UNB and Dal, and have Mt. 'A' lose to 'X'. Then it would fall on point spread, as it did, and the Mounties gained the berth.

The last two games on Saint Mary's schedule were "Name" games.

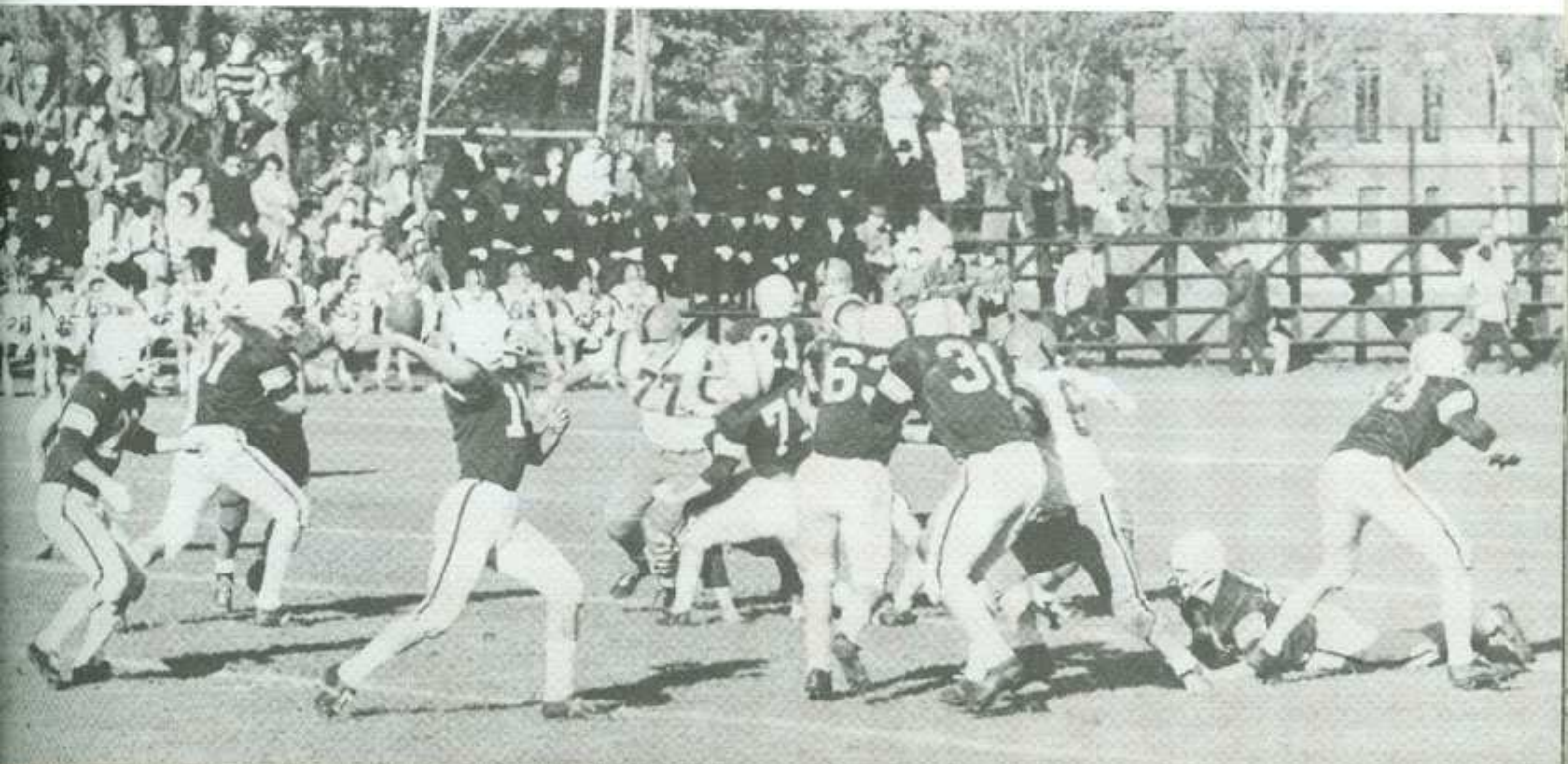

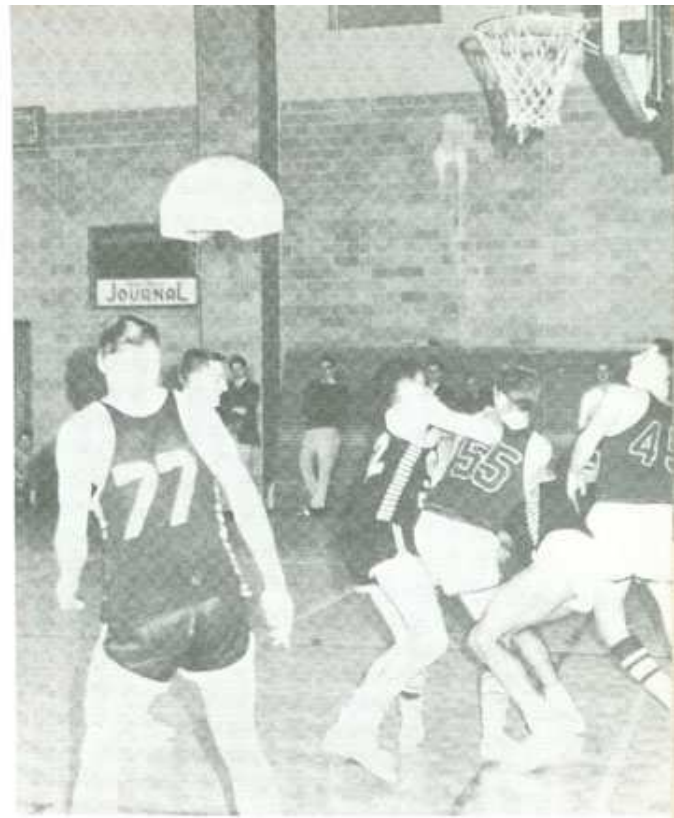

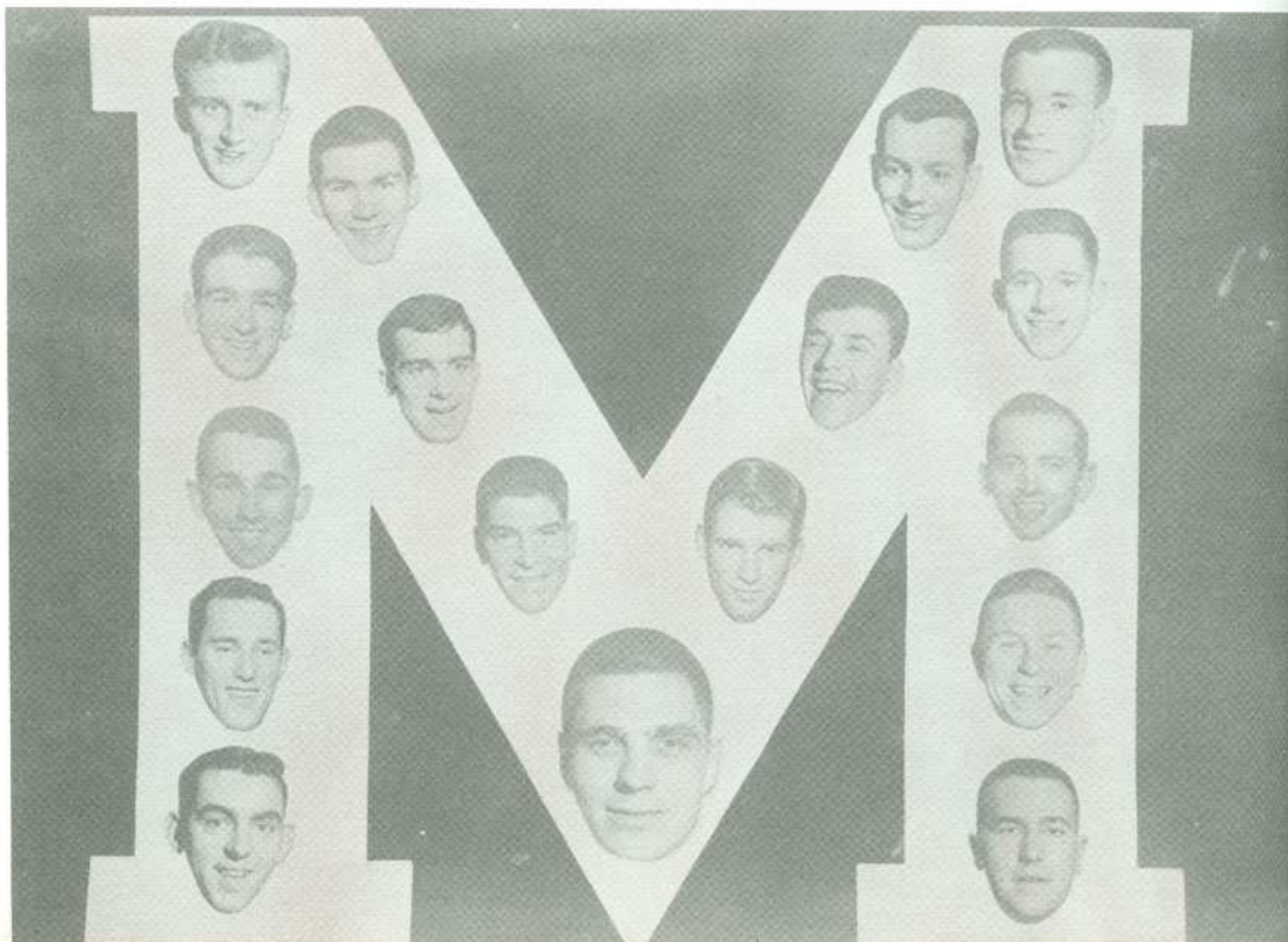
# The Atlantic Hockey Conference & Intercollegiate League

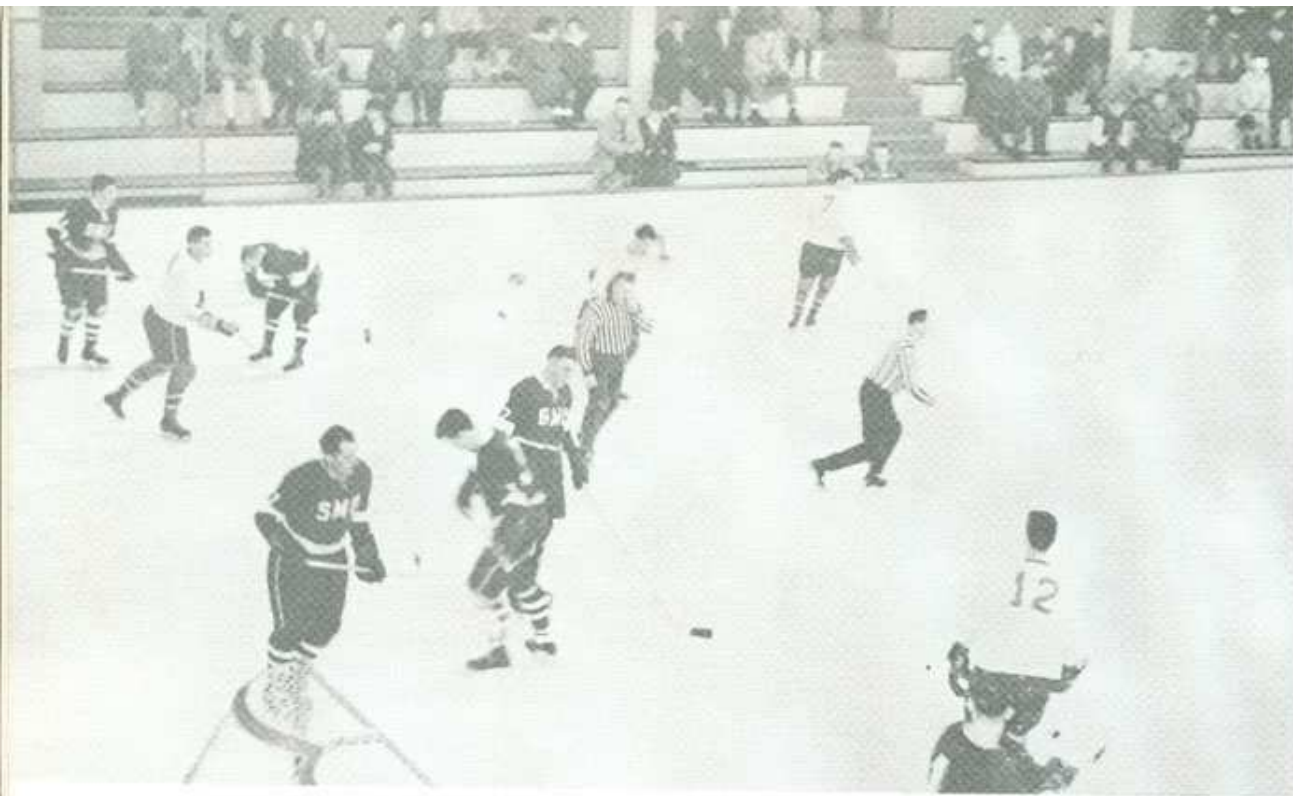

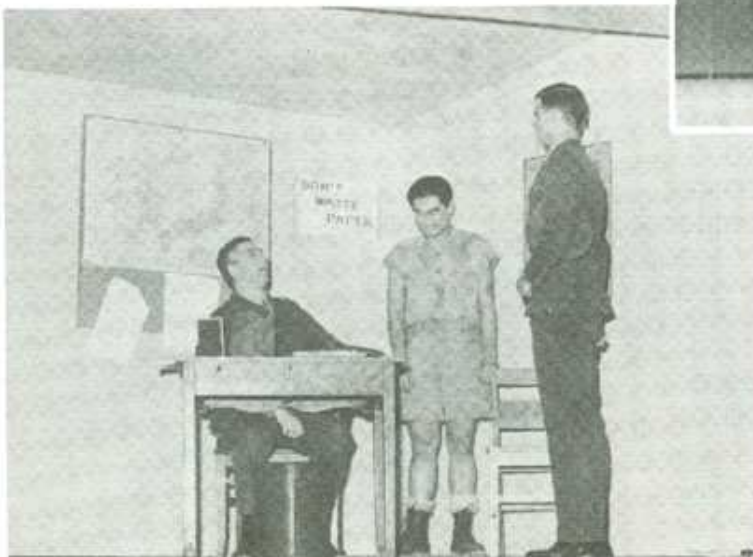

## Student Council Nominations Released

### NEW TYPE OF NOMINATION FOR UNIVERSITY STUDENT COUNCIL?

HALIFAX—Universities have their way, a new type of nomination that will be made to Canadian universities. Successful student enrolment rather than the traditional method would be no lower than \$36,000 a year. The federal government would normally receive more than the national average be given subsidies until such time as their grant and the national average are equal.

Concluding its proposal, the brief said "that when considering this grant, the federal government take into consideration the great differences in the costs of education in the fields of medicine, law, and engineering."

The widely recognized research projects (electron microscopy, cancer, hereditary diseases, etc.) are supported by a budget much in excess of a quarter of a million dollars annually. Graduate training for M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees in biochemistry and physiology is a specialty of the Faculty of Medicine. Financial support for students is available.

**DENTISTRY** — Dalhousie has the only Faculty of Dentistry in the Atlantic Provinces and gives preference to students from this region. The general shortage of dental personnel is most acute in the Atlantic Provinces. The faculty's new building was completed in 1958. Dentistry provides opportunity of a professional career for many more women than have sought admission in the past. A two-year diploma course in dental hygiene is also offered.

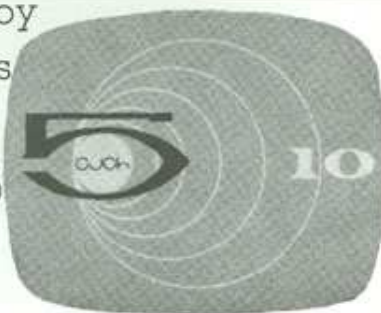

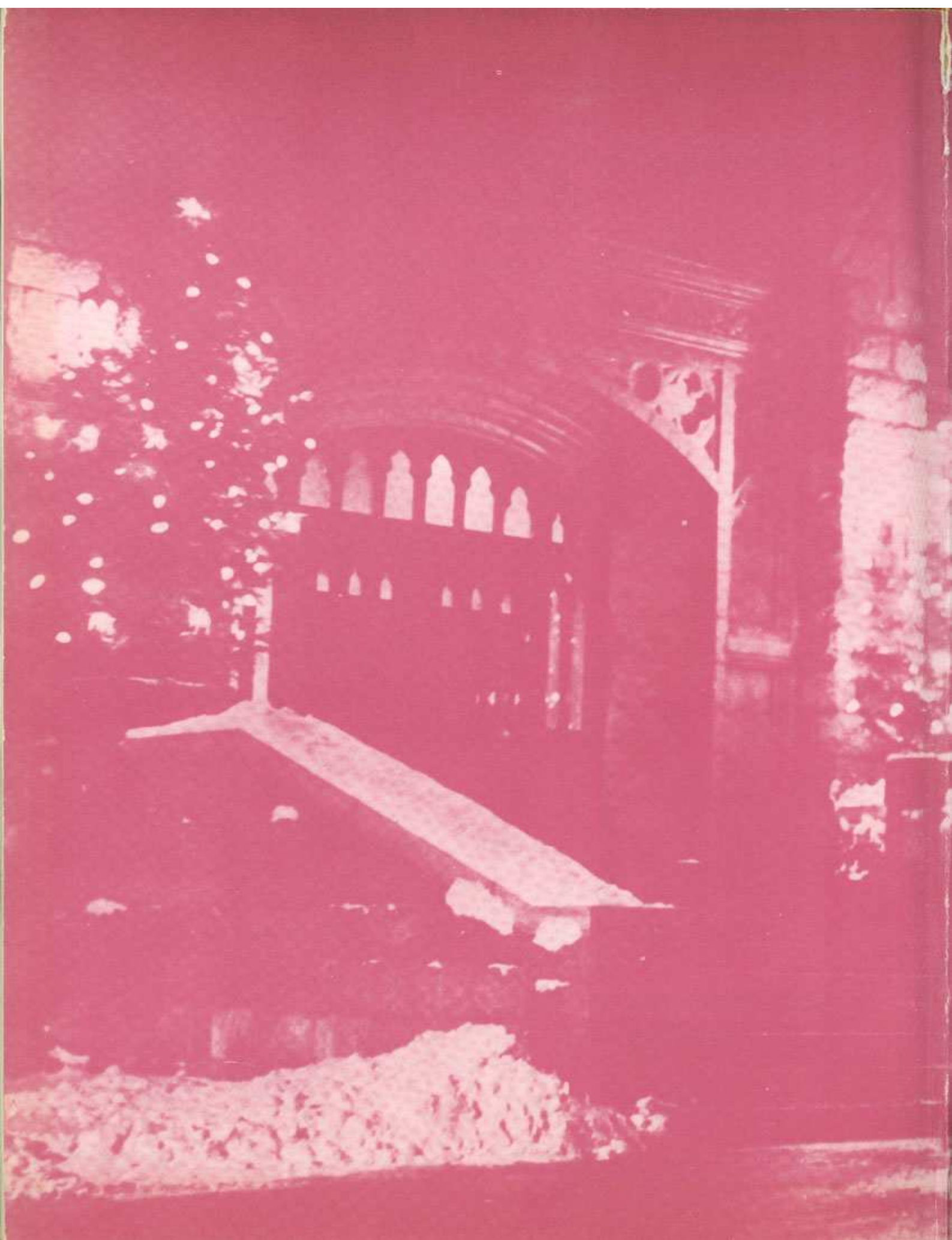
