This we must strive to maintain, in the light of the past and in the hope of the future. We must strive to maintain the idea of a university.










# Varsity Football





The football team had their finest season since returning to the senior ranks by winning

six of their eight regular season contests and gaining a berth in the Purdy Cup.

The Huskies were undermanned most of the season, with twenty men in uniform for most of the season. The big asset was the best backfield in the Maritimes-Dick and Ray Loiselle, Rog. Cloutier, Dave Murphy, Steve Lancaster, Leo Raftery, and Ted Chandonnet. Dick Loiselle and Cloutier gained yardage on the ground for the Huskies, while Murphy and the younger Loiselle passed to Chandonnet and ends Wayne O'Brien, John Schneider, and Ted Moore. Cloutier ended the season as the second leading ground gainer in the Maritimes, and was tied for the lead in the number of interceptions. Dick Loiselle led the Huskies in scoring, and

was second in the league statistics.

On the line, the Huskies often found themselves plagued by injuries and a lack of depth. Quality and defense were the keynote, as the strong right side of Dan Skaling, Frank Arment, and Tim Mynihan held the opposition scoreless. Mike Fleming, Dick Giordano, Ken Bendelier, and Joe O'Sullivan contributed, often going both ways. Frosh aces Red O'Brien, and Bob Smith proved to be capable additions to the line.

The linebackers Ted Moore, Bob Ruotolo, and Tim Mynihan were consistently among the strongest in the league. Moore was additionally rewarded with a contract with the Ottawa

Rough Riders at the conclusion of the season.

The punting was done by Ted Chandonnet and another halfback Al Keith. The place kicking assignments were handled by John Schneider, who kicked field goals of thirty-five and fortythree yards as well as numerous points after touchdowns.







The Junior Varsity football team completed their first season with a Maritime Junior Football Championship.


