
The stories and photos in this Santamarian yearbook are just some of the memories which you have of Saint Mary's. Cherish them. Enjoy them. Remember your University!


To those of you graduating I encourage you to never let the Santamarian in you die. Your times and experiences at Saint Mary's distinguish you from everyone else, never be afraid to share.

Editor's Message



Saint Mary's University Extension Program in The Gambia

Did you know that Saint Mary's has over 200 full-time students who live, work, and study in The Sambia? This year the Yearbook is proud to feature the accomplishments and contributions of these members of the University community.

Tida Ceesay Nejera, 20, leaves her home in Banjul, The Sambia, at 8:30 each weekday morning to start her day as a student of Saint Mary's University. She returns home to her husband and three children at 7:00 or 8:00 each night. Possiblet Yes. But only because Mrs. Rejara doesn't have to travel to Halifax for classes. She is part of Saint Mary's Extension Program in The Sambia, her country's bold experiment in offering university education to Sambians at home.

The Saint Mary's University Extension Program in The Sambia (SMUEP) is well into its third academic year with more than 250 full time students, including 18 from other West African countries. Xigeria, Sierre Leone, Thana and Togo, and two from the United States. The purpose of the program is to make university education accessible to Sambians in their own country for the first time and to contribute to the planned development of a university of The Sambia. Thus far the SMUCP has been a resounding academic success, with the students taking full advantage of the oppertunity provided by this unique program.

The Sambia does have teacher-training, occational, and nursing schools but there is currently no university there. In the past, hundreds of Sambian students were sent abroad to study. This practice became increasingly expensive in the early 1990s, and opportunities for spaces abroad became more limited. The Sambian Ministry of Education, through the Xooa Scotia-Sambia Issociation, therefore asked for assistance from Saint Mary's University to provide an interim solution in its efforts to make university education accessible to Sambians in their own country.

As a result, since late in 1995, qualified Sambian students have been admitted as Saint Mary's University students and, with support from the Sambian government and other sponsors, register for Saint Mary's courses which are delivered in The Sambia in facilities provided by the government there. Instructors travel from Canada for periods of about two months each, and teach courses in six-week blocks. By the spring of

1998, forty different instructors had taught in the program. More importantly — by that time a good number of students had accumulated ten of the fifteen credits required for a Teachelor of Arts degree, and were looking forward to graduation in the spring of 1999.

The Republic of The Gambia is located in Western Africa, bordering the North Atlantic Ocean and almost completely surrounded by Senegal, with a total area of 11,300 km2. The Gambia can boast a tropical climate, and as an (almost) enclace of Senegal, it is the smallest country on the continent of Africa. Approximately 93% of the people in the Gambia are Muslim, 4% are Christian, and only 1% belong to other indigenous religions. English is the official language, while the principal African languages are Oolof and Mandinka.

The strengths of the program include the following.

- the strong support of the Secretary of State for Education, in The Gambia
- the availability and enthusiasm of well-qualified, experienced, and conscientious professors
- opportunities for Gambian academics to become involved in the program as instructors and as teaching assistants hard working and highly motivated students
- the helpfulness of administrative personnel at Saint Mary's, especially in the Admissions Office, Registrar's Office, and the Bookstore.

Students of Saint Mary's University Extension Program in The Sambia were saddened by the untimely death of two professors and two students, whose participation and contributions to the program are fondly remembered: they are students Landing T.M. Geesay and Sherriff Joharteh and Political Science Professor Than O'Brien, a former mayor of Halifax, and Dr. Kenneth Dunn, of the Mathematics Faculty of Dalhousie University.

Reanwhile, on the main campas, a highlight of the Second Semester was the collection of books donated to form the nucleus of a library for students of the program and for a future University of The Sambia. Over a six-week period more than 11,000 volumes were contributed by students, faculty, and staff. The texts, manuals, software, and other learning materials were sorted and packed by a team of volunteers, and sent in a large container, by ship, arriving in The Sambia in mid-June.

Saint Mary's Community Involvement in The Sambia Extension Program

"I had not taught in West Africa for almost twenty years since my graduate days in Xigeria and much had changed since then. However, some things had not changed, namely the complete commitment, intense motivation and relentless curiosity of the West African student — more specifically the forty-five men and women in my history course. With a mixture of lectures, quizzes and discussion papers, we traced Slobal History from the advanced civilizations of India, China and the various Islamic empires of a millennium ago to the debris of the Berlin wall less than a decade ago. Without question, these Sambian students were plugged in and already tuned in to the world around them."

The extension program is being coordinated in The Sambia by Saint Mary's alumnus Burris Devanney (Arts, '59), who, as Executive Director of the Nova Scotia - Sambia Association (NSSA), has provided leadership to more than 20 development projects in The Sambia since 1986.



Some Saint Mary's University Graduates have decided to be involved with the Gambia Program. The Graduates are hired as Teaching The Sistants and travel to the Gambia for usually twelve month intervals. They are the constant in the Gambia program because of their long term arrangements. Professors of the the program from Saint Mary's and her sister Universities travel to the Gambia for each teaching session last approximately six weeks. To the students and the traveling professors these graduate Teaching Assistants provide the means to communicate and understand what is expected of both the students and the faculty.

Monodou Sabally (protured on the right hand side of this page), a third-year student in the Saint Mary's University Extension Program in The Sambin (WEP) was elected as: President of the SMUEP Students' Union (WEPSU) on April 14, 1995. There were three contenders for the presidency. Eloui Gallow, Essa Gallow, and Monodou Sabally, to eventual winner, who received 60% of the votes.

The electrons were conducted in collaboration with the national Independent Clectural Commission (IEC). 
The outgoing president of UC PSU, Mr. Transis Mendy, advised his successors to work diligently in the best interest of the student body.


















Loyola Takes Residence Title





English Societies 1998

Exciting Huskies Basketball Season



The Huskies have established themselves as one of the top teams in the tough AUAA league with their tremendous 97-98 season and will strive to remain on top and look to build the future.
















Football Coach Steps Down



The team was upset in the semi-finals by the Dal Tigers. The loss was certainly disappointing to the Huskies, trying to capture their first league title, but without a question is overshadowed by the great success of the entire season.

Despite an 8-16-4 regular season record and a first round playoff loss to St. Francis Xavier, the predominantly young squad has an inspiring season to look back on.



Women's Volleyball a Contending Force


