The Huskies led the eastern conference of the A.U.A.A. throughout regular season play and finished with a 5-2-0 win, tie,

Gary Heald Men's Basketball Coach



Gary Heald took over a winning tradition when he stepped into the head coaching job in 1979. The Huskies had back to back Canadian championships to their credit, and had earned the respect of every other team in the country.

Heald retired in 1977 with a brilliant three year career at U.P.E.I. where he compiled a 71-29 won-lost record. He brought the U.P.E.I. Panthers into the national spotlight in 74-75 when his team were ranked 10th in the nation. The following season, 1975-76, the Panthers were ranked 6th in Canada and earned a berth in the Canadian semi-finals, losing to the eventual champions Saint Mary's. Heald was named Coach of the Year in the A.U.A.A. in 1973-74 at U.P.E.I., in 1979-80 and 1981-82 at Saint Mary's.

Heald graduated from the University of Maine in 1965 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education, then went on to receive his Master of Arts degree in Educational Administration in 1978.

From 1965 to 1967 Heald served as Athletic Director, Physical Education Instructor, Basketball, Baseball, and Track Coach at Potter Academy in Sebago, Maine. From 1967 to 1974 he taught Science and coached basketball and baseball at Camden-Rockport High School in Camden, Maine.

In 1977 Heald taught with the Regional Administrative School Unit 3 in Prince Edward Island.

He has been a clinician throughout New England and the Maritimes, and has published several articles including "Specifics of Free Throw Shooting" and "Motivating the Athlete".

At Saint Mary's, Heald has directed the Basketball Camp of Champions summer schools and fall clinics. His 79-80 Huskies finished first in the A.U.A.A. with a 15-3 record and went on to finish third in the nation, losing in the championships to the eventual champions. In 1980-81, the Huskies finished with an 11-7 A.U.A.A. record and a third place finish, and a ninth place finish in the C.I.A.U.

The 1981-82 Huskies stormed the nation with a season-long #1 C.I.A.U. ranking. An undefeated 32-0 record advanced the Maroon & White into the Canadian championship against #2

ranked Victoria. The Vikings dealt the Huskies their first blow of the season, and Gary Heald returned home with a disappointed ballclub and second place in Canada.

Heald lives in Halifax with his wife Robyn and son Seth.

Brian O'Byrne Head Hockey Coach



Brian O'Byrne took on the responsibility of coaching the Huskies in the 1980-81 season while Coach Bob Boucher was on a leave of absence. In May 1981 his appointment became a permanent one.

In 1980-81 O'Byrne led the Huskies to a third place A.U.A.A. finish with a 13-11 record.

In 1981-82 the Huskies finished the year with second place in the league on a 16-7-3 record. First round playoff action eliminated the Huskies chances of advancing to the finals.

O'Byrne graduated from Saint Mary's in 1971 with a Master of Arts Degree and is a former star defenseman with the Huskies from 1968 through 1973. He was captain the team four years and earned All-Canadian honours twice and All-Conference honours all four seasons. He has instructed at hockey and skating schools, and directed the Camp of

Champions hockey school in 1980 and again in 1981.

As Development Co-ordinator for Hockey in the Province from 1973 to 1981, O'Byrne was responsible for upgrading minor hockey coaching, assessing skill development in minor hockey players, and overseeing referees and coaching certification programs. He was involved in a pilot project for the C.A.H.A. in 1980-81 and was Chairman of the Special Projects for the Hockey Development Council of Canada.

O'Byrne was instrumental in bringing the Nova Scotia Arena Managers Seminar to Saint Mary's in June 1982. An ongoing program, the seminar is designed to upgrade the skills and qualifications of arena managers in the Atlantic area.

O'Byrne resides in Dartmouth with his wife, Sharon, and two children, Jeffrey and Sherry Lynn.

Helen Castonguay Women's Basketball Coach



A native of Sherbrooke, Quebec, Helen came to Saint Mary's in 1979 with an abundance of coaching and playing experience behind her. She graduated in 1977 from Dalhousie University with a Bachelor of Physical Education degree, then studied in the M.Sc. (Physical Education) program at Dal the following year.

Helen is an accomplished basketball, field hockey, badminton, softball, and racquetball player, winning awards in each of those sports. She was a member of Dal's varsity field hockey and basketball teams and was selected Athlete of the Year in 1976. As a basketball player at Dal, Helen landed a berth on the Atlantic and Canadian all-star squads in 1975 and was team captain in 75 and 76. She played for and coached the Nova Scotia entry in the Senior National Championships in 77-78 and 78-79 respectively, and was a member of the 1975 Canada Games team. Many camps in the province have benefited from Helen's instruction, and she has an I.A.A.B.O. "B" official's rating.

The list of achievements for field hockey are as impressive as for basketball—she has a National "A" Umpire's rating, has been a member of the Nova Scotia Senior team, has coached the A.U.A.A. Champion JV club from Dal, and has instructed at numerous clinics from Montreal to the Atlantic provinces.

At Bishop's University, Helen was voted Athlete of the Year from 1969 through 1973 and was the Basketball MVP in 1972. Administrative experience included several student positions while at Dalhousie, Interim President of the Lennoxville Softball Association, and Umpiring Co-ordinator for the N.S.W.F.H.A.

Helen was selected A.U.A.A. Basketball Coach of the Year in 1980-81, and in 1981 was chosen Coach for the Nova Scotia Junior Women's Provincial Basketball team.

Helen's 1979-80 basketball team at Saint Mary's finished with a 5-11 record, and in 1980-81, they finished with a 10-6 league record and 1-1 playoff record. In 1981-82, the team compiled a 6-8 record for a fourth place finish.

Helen takes over head coaching duties of the field hockey team this year and her extensive background in the sport will help her mold the team into a champion.
