

SRC MEETING SECRETS UNLOCKED

What had been originally considered a matter private only to members of the council has now become public knowledge. The in-camera meeting of the SRC was called to deal with what some have termed the unethical practices of Student Association President, Dave Hendsbee.

It was alleged by Cynthia Otto, Vice-President of Student Affairs, that he had, on several occasions, broken into offices on the fifth floor of the student centre. He has openly admitted to it and offers an explanation for it.

The first episode that council spoke of was during the New Year's weekend. Mr. Hendsbee says he was preparing for a meeting and needed some documents pertaining to CFS (Canadian Federation of Students) that were kept in the Administration Office. Since he didn't have his key to the office he used a plastic card to jimmy the latch. Once inside the room, Mr. Hendsbee said he had to force one of the desk drawers to get the file he needed.

When asked if he had done this before, Mr. Hendsbee said that most times he needed to get into the Administrator's office he used his

key. He said he got it when he was elected President for a term.

The second incident, the one that sparked Ms. Otto's resignation, occurred the night of the Boy's Brigade bash. Mr. Hendsbee says that he had phone SMUSA Business Administrator, Lisa Menchions, on the previous night. He asked her if she could come in the next day (Saturday) so that he could get the remaining bash tickets from the safe in her office and some files he had to work on. When she still had not shown up by late Saturday afternoon, he phoned SRC secretary, Rachel Jane Cluet and V.P. Administrator, Steve Murray, to get one of them to come in with their keys. He was unable to reach either of them so "After exhausting every avenue trying to find a key, it was my last resort." He removed some ceiling tiles and climbed through over the wall. Entertainment Director, Gordie Spencer, was with him at the time and Mr. Hendsbee claims to have taken only the bash tickets. Later in the evening, Lisa Menchions did come in but Mr. Hendsbee was not around council offices at that time.

Mr. Hendsbee informed Ms. Menchions of his actions on the following Monday.

Upon hearing of this latest incident, Ms. Otto, Mr. Murray, and SMUSA Treasurer Carol Skillen tried to suspend him from his position as President for two weeks. At this point, feeling that he was being unjustly treated, Mr. Hendsbee called an emergency meeting of Council. As it turned out, Council did not suspend him and decided that in the future the President should have a key to the Business Administration Office.

All councillors were present at the meeting with the exception of Off-Campus Representative Karen Neves, who was recovering from a tonsillectomy. The meeting consisted mostly of across-the-table discussion about who should and who should not have keys to various offices and the discussion came to a highlight when Stephen Munden, Grad Rep, proposed a motion "that all accusations against David Hendsbee, including suspension, be dropped." Ms. Otto cast the only No vote and Mr. Hendsbee and Ms. Skillen both abstained. I asked Ms. Skillen why she abstained on the vote and she had these comments:

She thought that the method of entry to the Business Office was unethical but admitted that she couldn't see what else he could have done. She is unsure of whether or not he should personally have a key to the Business Office but says that he "certainly needs things in there though". She said that she would like him to have a key to her office because "Dave leaves doors open" and she wouldn't want her bike or camera stolen.

I spoke with Steve Munden and asked him why he proposed this motion. He replied that, "the President should have the right to break into these (executive) offices". He feels that because the president is the Chief Executive Officer of the Association that he should have access to everything controlled by that organization. He does, however, say that liquor services and the media should be able to have their privacy. This is because of the fact that the liquor services manager couldn't be asked to be responsible for thousands of dollars worth of inventory if other people had access to it. Liquor Services Manager Doug MacIntosh says that at any one time there is at least \$15,000 worth of stock on hand, and that he wouldn't take responsibility for it if there were other keys to the store room floating around.

The media, on the other hand, is quite often in possession of information, whether of a political nature or not, that was obtained on trust and if it's offices were open then that trust might soon be lost.

Mr. Munden also feels that, "Dave is a scapegoat for a lousy system" and, "the fact that he (Hendsbee) doesn't have keys is

preposterous."

He suggests that a System Review be done of the executive and top employees to iron out those problems. He also feels that there is a communications problem between some of the executive and employees. As to Ms. Otto's resignation, he says that it is too bad she resigned, she could have stayed to help work things out. He thinks that her resignation may affect the schools relationship with SUNS (Student Union Of Nova Scotia).

V.P. Student Affairs, Steve Murray, who originally wanted to suspend Mr. Hendsbee, now says that, "I wouldn't condone his (Hendsbee's) breaking into offices without a valid reason." He used the recent flooding on the fifth floor as an example of a valid reason. He also stated that those offices in the council chambers don't need deadbolt locks on them. His own office has a deadbolt on it but was put on by a previous user.

Lisa Menchions had a deadbolt installed on her office door after the

first time Mr. Hendsbee went into her office without a key. She says that some important personal papers were taken at that time and have not yet been returned. She did inform the executive of the new lock, but not until after it had been installed, and she did not offer to give any of the executive a key to the lock. She says that when she took the job she was asked to run the office professionally and in her opinion the President should not personally hold a key to every office run by the Association. She feels that the President has no need to know the combination to the safe and that if the President ever needed to get into her office to get something there are proper channels to follow. There is a master key box, administered by the V.P. Administration, and the SRC Secretary has a set of keys. Ms. Menchions feels that she is responsible for the contents of her office and the safe in her office, and does not like to see too many keys floating around.

BURSARIES INCREASED

The January 16th deadline for 2nd semester tuition is long past. Students, however, can still be found lined up outside the business office waiting to pay their money plus the five dollar a day late fee. But what about students waiting for that elusive bursary cheque from the government?

The big question is why are the cheques late? In speaking with Janice Smith, the Financial Aid Councillor for Saint Mary's, several reasons came to light. It seems that the maximum amount a student can receive from the government has been increased by one thousand dollars from \$2400 to \$3400. This means that instead of receiving \$56.25 a week students will receive \$100.00 a week. Due to this change in policy, the government office had to review loan applications twice. This caused a backlog of processing for the cheques. To help alleviate the problem more people have been assigned to the task of processing applications.

There is also a study being done on the feasibility of computerizing the process, but automation can not be expected until 1985/86.

What are students who have not received their cheques doing in the meantime? These students were able to sign promissory notes for the Business Office. These students will not be charged the \$5 a day late fee. Those students who had not received cheques but needed money for such things as rent and food were able to get a small advance through the combined efforts of Maryln Gibbons in the Business Office and Janice Smith, provided they had verification that the money was on the way and would arrive soon.

The first batch of cheques arrived Tuesday or Wednesday of last week, but it is unknown when the rest will arrive. A list has been posted in the Financial Aid Office and the Business Office of those cheques which have arrived.

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David Hendsbee: A Chance to Respond

Last week, *The Journal* ran a front page story on Ms. Otto's resignation from her position of Vice President Student Affairs on the Students' Representative Council.

Due to the late breaking nature of this story — it occurred just hours before our final deadline — Mr. Hendsbee was unable to confer with the SRC Chair, Cat van Leeuwen as to the breaking of the confidentiality rule that goes with all in-camera meetings. Since publication, Mr. Hendsbee has been permitted to discuss the occurrences of the in-camera meeting.

The following is the result of an in-depth interview with Mr. Hendsbee in which he took the opportunity to explain his side of the story.

The facts have been checked and confirmed with council members Stephen Munden, Kim McDonald, Ruthe Burke, and Michelle Cox.

Stephen Munden has worked with Ms. Otto on a few committees, including Orientation. He had this to say: "She was more of a leader rather than a doer. She was free with advice and opinion, but didn't carry on with her work."

All the councillors mentioned agreed that without Ms. Otto, council meetings may go a bit smoother, and that council was getting petty.

David, can you tell us in your own words the events that led up to Ms. Otto's resignation?

Presidents in the past have always had access to Council offices. But that became a problem after past president Mike MacNeil had lost several office keys (including a master key to all offices). Since then, presidents have had problems with access to offices.

Past presidents Tim Hill, myself, Bruce Cooke, and at present myself had to deal with this situation by mastering the use of the "CFS Key" — a plastic credit-card type instrument. This type of access became well known, and rather than have an unauthorized person follow our example, top dead bolts were installed. But by wish of the executive, only the individual office holder and the Business Manager were given keys. Bruce was given a key to the Business Managers office, which I received when I took office.

Just recently, the key to the bolt lock had been changed to the Business Administrators office without proper authorization from either Stephen Mury (V.P. Administration) or myself. Hence I was restricted as to my access to that office.

Lisa Menchions believed someone had broken into her office during the Christmas break and removed files and personal papers from her desk drawers. I was in her office during the New Years Weekend, but the only thing I removed was the CFS correspondence file which I needed to provide crucial information to our lawyer in regards to a pending legal suit.

Because of this entry, I received a letter of discipline on Friday 13th, which was dated Thursday 12th of January. This letter was given to me by the Executive, and outlined some complaints with my actions including entering offices without permis-

sion. The letter also stated that it's contents would be discussed at the next meeting of the Executive. However, due to circumstances, this meeting never took place.

The weekend of the alleged break-in, I contacted Ms. Menchions on Friday evening requesting her to open up her office Saturday afternoon so that I could obtain the same CFS file I had taken earlier, past SMUSA financial statements, and the remainder of the bash tickets to be sold for the Boy's Brigade function.

I waited in the outside office from 1:00 pm onwards, and placed four calls to Ms. Menchions home, but there was no answer. After contacting others who might possibly have a key but did not, I decided at 5:00 it was time to find another means to get in to an office which the SRC president has always had access to.

Once in, I took only the Bash tickets, to which Gord Spensor, the Entertainment Director, was a witness.

Lisa eventually arrived at 7:00, and pulled out of her office the CFS file and financial statements, placing them in my mail box.

Late Monday morning, I received a letter of discipline from the other members of the Executive stating that I was to be suspended for a two week period, not one week as reported in the last edition of the Journal.

I refused the letter on the basis that they had no authority to force this upon me, and that I had done nothing constitutionally wrong. Thus I called an emergency council meeting in order that I could clear up this matter. I had had enough pettiness from a certain member of the Executive and wanted to have this matter resolved by the council.

At the In-Camera meeting, I stated my case, and said to the council that while it was an unethical method of gaining access to the office, it was used as a last resort when all other avenues became exhausted. The council agreed with my actions under the circumstances, and all councillors voted not to accept the executive's actions of attempting to suspend me. Only Ms. Otto supported my suspension, and Treasurer, Carol Skillen and myself abstained from the vote.

Council was grieved that this matter had to be brought to an emergency meeting, a matter they believed to be mostly a communications problem.

Since the In-Camera session, the Business Administrator has been directed to have additional keys cut for her office, and all her personal belongings removed to ensure their safety.

What are your comments as to Ms. Otto's dismay at the attitudes of the councillors in this matter?

Cynthia saying that council was being irresponsible was inappropriate. It was more like council realizing that she was being irresponsible, and being petty by harping on anything small that the president did.

She tried to act like Ms. Righteous, but she ended up being the Princess of Pettiness.

Do you feel that Ms. Otto's resignation will cause council to suffer in any way?

No.

I think council will probably benefit as I have found that a lot of students didn't hold her in high regard due to her personality and the way she conducted herself.

The honoraria for the position of V.P. Student Affairs is \$750.00 per semester, how much of this do you think she will be getting?

During the first semester honoraria review, I disagreed with council that she should get the full honoraria. She only did a few things. She would get her nose into things, and then let it slide.

She stated to the Journal that she has done a lot, but while she has been in office, I don't think she has done anything surmountable.

What will happen now that this position is open?

This Sunday's council meeting will address the situation and discuss appointing a person now or leaving it open until the end of the year.

Who on council would be good in this position?

A few people on council are capable, but they may not want to due to their responsibilities to their present positions. Also, it is late in the year, so the necessity for filling the position may not be strong. I have reviewed what is left to do for this term, and feel that the work left could be handled by myself and council.

There is a SUNS conference coming up, but Cynthia is still involved in that area. As for the various committees that are normally attended by the V.P.S.A., they will be reviewed by council and filled as necessary.

What are the usual duties of the V.P.S.A.?

Primarily it is the Dissemination of information on campus concerning changes in Senate regulations, informing students of SRC activities, the Health Plan, and university services available to them. This can all be done by working closely with Information Services, The Journal, the Life in Residence news letter, even the Promotions Director as they are all mediums that communicate to the students.

Communicating with off-campus organizations such as the Department of Education, other universities, various government departments, and outside organizations that are trying to establish relations with us are other duties.

Due to the nature of this office, the position requires the V.P.S.A. to attend conferences on behalf of the Student Council.

As a side, problems the individual students encounter just by going to university are also a concern of this office. This would include problems with registration, appeals of marks, de-registration, and misunderstandings with the business office.

U of C May Get Full Time Native Director

CALGARY (CUP) — The Native Students Services office at the University of Calgary is optimistic its push for a full-time director will get approval despite the university's funding squeeze.

The proposal for a full-time director is a scaled down version of a 1978 proposal for a \$1.5 million Native Centre. Funding for the centre never materialized.

The recent proposal would cost about \$200,000 over three years, says NSS coordinator Evelyn Moore-Eyman. Aside

from the university the Department of Indian Affairs and other groups have been approached for funding she says.

"I'm optimistic enough that our three part proposal for three years is a modest enough request that we will succeed in getting it established," says Moore-Eyman. "Despite the difficult economic times, there is a lot of goodwill toward such a project."

She says native representation at the academic level is important.

"When you're dealing with radically different cultures, it's important that the minority one have at least some representation at the academic level," she

STUDENTS LOSE REPRESENTATION

SYDNEY, N.S. — A careful minuet is taking place at the University College of Cape Breton over the institution's highest decision making body — the board of governors.

Faced with crowded conditions as a result of a 70 per cent increase in enrollment over the last years, the university-college needs to expand.

But around Nova Scotia's post-secondary educational institutions expansion is a dirty word these days.

At schools like Dalhousie University administrators eye their budgets in sacrificial terms like an army in guarded retreat.

Despite this, the university-college is bracing itself for a boom into the post-secondary education big leagues. To ensure this boom happens, the board of governors wants to fill its ranks with the right people, the people who matter when hard decisions have to be made in Halifax.

And this doesn't mean students.

At a recent meeting of UCCB's board, a motion was passed giving a mandate to administration president Dr. William Reid to negotiate with

students to relinquish two of the four seats they presently hold on the 36 member body. The board is also looking to retrieve seats from faculty and from St. Francis Xavier University, formerly affiliated with UCCB.

These seats would be redistributed to increase the number of "high profile" appointees on the board and also to give alumni representation.

"For the long term financial development (of UCCB) I'd like to see at least one bank president sitting on the board," says Reid. "Right now if we had someone lined-up we just wouldn't have the seat available."

Reid says he'd like to see an intensive campaign for endowment funding started for UCCB.

"We'd be ready to launch it if we had the personnel on the board," he says.

Out of the 36 member board only eight are presently allocated for distribution by the board itself for attracting so called "high profile" candidates.

"What is a rational student representation?" Reid asks. "It's not the volume that determines representation but the quality of that representation."

Therein lies the problem for student union president Bob Katzko.

Katzko doesn't want to give up student representation, but at the same time has trouble making a convincing argument for retaining the seats amid a student body more at home organizing winter carnivals than political movements.

"Students have been pretty mute this year," says Katzko. "The interest in the board is abysmal. I can't even get the four of them (student board

reps) to meet together."

Katzko blames much of this apathy on the closed door nature of the board itself.

"There's such a cloak of secrecy around the board everyone seems intimidated by it," he says.

Katzko's big fear is that should "negotiations" fail the board will simply take the seats.

If the students fail to budge the "board would likely press

on," confirms Reid, but adds, "it's not popular to so called 'steal' student representation on the board."

Presently alternatives are being examined and position papers are being drafted. Both Katzko and Reid seem eager to avoid confrontation.

The final decision will have to be ratified by the provincial legislature.

60's Radical Becomes First Black In Senate

MONTREAL (CUP) — The appointment of Anne Cools to the Canadian Senate Jan. 13 will come as a surprise to those who remember her part in the 1969 Sir George Williams 'computer riot'.

Cools, the first black to be appointed to the Senate, spent four months in prison after she and more than 90 other students staged a two-week occupation of a university building culminating in the destruction of the ninth floor computer centre and almost \$5 million damage on Feb. 11, 1969.

The occupation was the result of students' dissatisfaction with a university enquiry into

charges of racism levelled against Sir George biology professor Perry Anderson.

Five years after the riot, Cools established "Women in Transition", a United Way-funded shelter for battered women in Toronto. Long respected as a social activist, she has been leader in the feminist community for several years and has gained a reputation as a Liberal Party 'hack', twice contesting and losing a seat in the Rosedale riding.

The Canadian black community has heralded the appointment of Cools to the Senate — long a bastion of the White Establishment. According to Sam Hill of Canadians for

Social Justice, "It's about time Trudeau did something to recognise that black Canadians exist. He's been conveniently ignoring us and our concerns for years."

Although Cools was in Ottawa getting ready to be sworn in as a Senator and could not be reached for comment, her co-worker — Linda Barker — said the appointment came as a complete surprise to everybody.

"When Anne got a message to phone the Prime Minister," she said, "the entire office was buzzing. Once we got the news, as you can imagine, we were stunned."

No Hand Grenades at Rocky Horror

(RNR/CUP) — It's just no fun any more going to the Vista movie theatre in Hollywood, California.

Patrons who recently called up to find out what time the "Rocky Horror Picture Show"

was playing got a recorded announcement. "All patrons," it said, "will be searched. No drugs, alcoholic beverages, knives, guns or hand grenades will be allowed in the theatre."

Right Wing Paper Started at U of T

TORONTO (CUP) — A right-wing paper with connections to the Campus Conservatives and a similar publication at McGill University is being started at the University of Toronto.

The U.T. Magazine was conceived at a meeting of members of the campus political right, including David Frum, son of broadcaster Barbara Frum. Frum's sister Linda started the controversial McGill University Magazine last term and reportedly advised the creators of the U.T. Magazine.

Editor Nigel Wright, a student councillor, will say little about the paper, except that he wants it to be a "bit of a sur-

prize." Another contributor, Chair of the student council board Tony Clements is active in the Campus Conservative club. Clements was involved in the anti-CFS campaign at U of T last year, claiming the student organization to be "loud, boorish and radical."

No one involved would comment on where the funding for the paper would come from. The McGill University magazine was funded in part by the bank of Montreal and "private donors".

The first issue is expected in February.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Mr. MacDonald,

I would like to take this opportunity to express my displeasure with the journalism (a more appropriate term would be sensationalism) that appeared in the last issue of the Journal.

You blasted me for my "irresponsible behavior" as SRC President. My action of gaining access to the SRC Administrator office was unethical but necessary. I told the Council at the emergency in-camera meeting of January 16th of my actions and the circumstances and reasons for it. The Council did agree, with me, that my action was unethical but disciplinary action of suspension was out of the question. I had done nothing constitutionally wrong.

In regards to my numerous entries into the Journal office, I admit I have done so. But as a member of the Journal staff for the last two and one half years, my access should be permitted. Anything I do in the Journal is for the betterment of that paper and for the students. I have never done anything such as sabotage, espionage, alterations to the newspaper or any other questionable activity.

It is an insult to me that I can not be trusted with the confidence of the paper and its staff. Why don't you inform the students of the latest policy you implemented. A policy that restricts entrance of any SRC Executive member by barring them from the premises. I hope that you can work effectively with that policy.

My work on the paper has added to the quality of production of that publication. Without my assistance, your newspaper's quality will suffer. Do not think that your reasons or actions are rational. Your reasons of 'conflict of interest', 'political duress', or 'story/writer confidentiality or sensitivity' are unacceptable to me. The possibility of SRC pressure and/or office abuse is there but I do not operate that way. My motto has been one of cooperation; not confrontation.

May I bring to your attention, your questionable activities.

Allowing the Journal to write and print stories of sensationalism is absolutely unethical in regards to

proper journalism. Your paper has repetitively printed subjective, biased and distorted stories. Blatant contradictions to the principles of responsible journalism.

Why don't you tell the students of Saint Mary's as to why the paper was late coming out last week.

First of all, it was your delay in getting the layout sheets to the printer due to your latest story, thus missing your deadline.

Secondly and most important, are the alterations which your printers had to do to the lead story and your editorial. Last week's headline initially stated, "Hendsbee Admits Break In. VP Otto Resigns" and in the editorial you had "condoning Mr. Hendsbee's criminal actions," and; signed "outraged, Owen MacDonald, Editor".

It was a pleasant surprise to hear that your printers are responsible enough to not allow you to print material that is so "sensational" or even libel.

The Journal should be asking the student body their opinion towards the Journal. Not **your** Opinion! True, a campus needs a newspaper. However, they do not need one that is not responsible enough to do what is required of it. That is to enlighten the students of pertinent information and stories that should be made known to them. Informing them of facts that are relevant and affect them. Not garbage or CUP stories that litter the paper and make the publication a rag.

I don't believe that the student can trust the Journal to inform them by your ways or means that justify your own ends.

It should be you that should be dismissed or stripped from office because of your abuse. You call it editorial privilege or right. I call it irresponsible journalism.

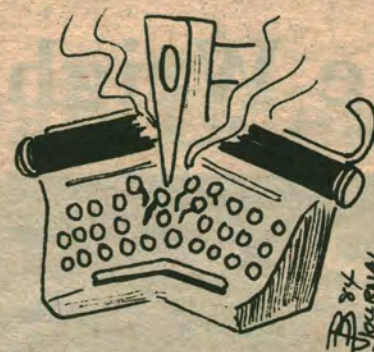
It is not a question of my credibility, but yours.

Fellow Students;

As chairperson of the SRC my job is to remain impartial and I will do so in this letter. However, I would like to bring to light to the students some important facts that were either misinterpreted or completely neglected. When last week's Journal came out, the credibility of the SRC was seriously damaged and I would like to restore some of that.

There was an emergency meeting the night of the 16 which under my suggestion went in camera (only council members may attend) because of the sensitivity of matters that were to be discussed. The members are advised that all information is confidential and not to be released to their friends, the press and others. This is to avoid having only one side of the story told; which I wanted to prevent. In this case, Ms. Otto felt that she had not breached the in camera meeting because the facts were discussed earlier that day out of Council. Nevertheless, students were not able to compare her story with Mr. Hendsbee's. While not condoning his actions in any way, I do respect the fact that he did not take the opportunity to present his case (because of the in-camera 'contract'), while aware of the pending story by Ms. Otto. Since one side has been told now I gave Mr. Hendsbee the permission, under my authority, to make his statement, using issues discussed in camera.

One thing that should be made clear is that Council did not 'O.K.' the actions of the president of the SRC, but only voted to 'take no disciplinary action'. There was a great deal of discussion on this matter and I feel that council members are very responsible and represent your interests very well. I am sure that they will do their best to keep on doing so for the 1984 year.

NOTE

Ordinance number 172, respecting smoking in the city of Halifax, does not specify any ban on smoking in classrooms; but section 2, paragraph 15 stays:

"Subject to Section 16, no person shall smoke in any enclosed indoor area being used as a place of public assembly."

Section 16 explains that the proprietor of a place of public assembly may designate up to 50 percent of the total floor area as a smoking area; but, it must be designated as such. Excluded are: lecture halls, concert halls, auditoriums, indoor sporting areas and libraries.

The decision on classrooms rests with the university but we hope that both students and their professors who smoke will show some small consideration for others in the classrooms, and especially examination rooms, who haven't given in to such a vile, disgusting habit.

Those of you who are tired of Top Forty cover bands, should have checked out The Flying Tigers at the Club Flamingo on Grafton Street, Saturday, January 21st. The Club is noted for providing a place for all ages to hear live bands, and Saturday's band was a gem!

The Flying Tigers have been together for about a year and hail from Wolfville, Nova Scotia. They've all played together previously and are familiar with each other's style. Their rockabilly tunes have made

them a favorite with the university students there and their performance in Halifax was equally enjoyed.

A lengthy three sets covered a wide variety of material. Most notably performed were selections from Eddie Cochran, Gene Vincent, The Ventures, Buddy Holly, The Stray Cats, Elvis Presley, Teenage Heads, The Clash, The Bop Cats, and The Kingbees. The crowd really began to bop after Eddie Cochran's "Summertime Blues" and even more so to the

more familiar Stray Cats' numbers.

Technically, things went off without a hitch. Three of the four band members had more than adequate voices, especially in terms of harmonizing. The Stray Cats covers deserve a special mention in this area. Much like Slim Jim Phantom (even in appearance, if you studied his face closely), the drummer used only a snare drum, bass drum, and cymbals. The bassist switched between basses, but for the most part slapped out some bopping lines on an acoustic bass. And as anyone who was there knows, both guitarists were very clean and precise and they worked quite well together.

After the second set, the audience was treated to some guest performers. Some of The Flying Tigers joined some of Willy Hop for two well performed numbers. In terms of energy, this combo was lacking, but technically there were few complaints. Following this, Registered Vote's guitarist and sometimes vocalist, Timmy Brennan, played two numbers with the band. Mr. Brennan seemed to possess more energy than usual and worked well with The Flying Tigers. I cannot comment on his vocals because they were too difficult to hear, but I will comment about the fact that it was mentioned numerous times that he more than resembles Brian Setzer.

The general concensus, and my opinion also, was that The Flying Tigers are a rockabilly band that possess all of the qualities of those original rockers from the early '50's. They play well, have a good stage presence, cover much material, and are a great dance band. What more could a person ask for? So, next time they're around they shouldn't be missed!

Food 101: Cheap and Easy Cooking

HOT STUFF - VIC'S CHILI

Everyone knows someone who makes a great chili and Vic was the fire-breathing dragon who taught me this version.

Preparation time: 20 minutes
Cooking time: 60 minutes
Serves five

Heat in a large pot over medium heat:
1 tbsp. (15 mL) oil

Add:
1/2 lb. (0.25 kg) hamburger
Fry until brown. Drain grease.

While the hamburger is cooking, chop up:
1 stalk celery
1/2 green pepper
2 small cooking onions
1 cup (250 mL) fresh mushrooms
Add vegetables to meat.

Helpful Hints:

- Spices can be temperamental. The chili powder is not given in an exact amount because you may like your chili mild or spicy. The longer the spices cook, the stronger they get. Cayenne is an especially tricky character.

Add:
1 can, 19 oz. (540 mL) kidney beans, undrained
1 can, 5 1/2 oz. (156 mL) tomato paste
1 can, 14 oz. (398 mL) tomatoes
2 fresh tomatoes, chopped
Cook for 30 minutes over low heat, covered.

Add:
1/2 to 2 tsp. (2 to 10 mL) chili powder
1/4 tsp. (1 mL) cayenne
1/2 tsp. (2 mL) pepper
Cook over low heat for another 30 minutes, covered.

- Many chili connoisseurs believe it isn't the real McCoy if it doesn't cook for literally hours. I don't agree with that theory. If you have the time, though, it doesn't hurt to let the chili cook longer.

Serving Ideas:

- Chili is best with fresh bread and liquid of your choice. Have lots to drink on hand, especially if you've been heavy on the spices.
- Although this recipe makes enough for five, you won't have trouble using it up. It keeps well in the fridge or freezer.

MULTILINGUAL DELIGHT: FRENCH TOAST

The French call this English Toast; the English call it French Toast - but French Toast by any other name tastes just as sweet.

Preparation time: 5 minutes
Cooking time: 10 minutes
Serves two

Combine in a large bowl:
2 eggs
1/4 tsp. (1 mL) salt
1/4 tsp. (1 mL) pepper
1/4 cup (60 mL) milk
1/2 tsp. (2 mL) vanilla extract (optional)
Beat vigorously with a fork or whisk.

Dip into mixture:
4 slices bread

Heat in a frying pan over medium heat:
1 tsp. (5 mL) butter or margarine

Place dipped bread in frying pan.

Fry until brown, then turn and fry until other side is brown.

Don't Start Without:

frying pan
large bowl
fork
measuring spoons
measuring cup

Helpful Hints:

- Always cook French Toast on medium to low heat, since the eggs will burn if fried too quickly.
- Don't leave bread sitting in the mixture, since it tends to get soggy and fall apart.

Serving Ideas:

- French Toast can be topped with jam, maple syrup or corn syrup.

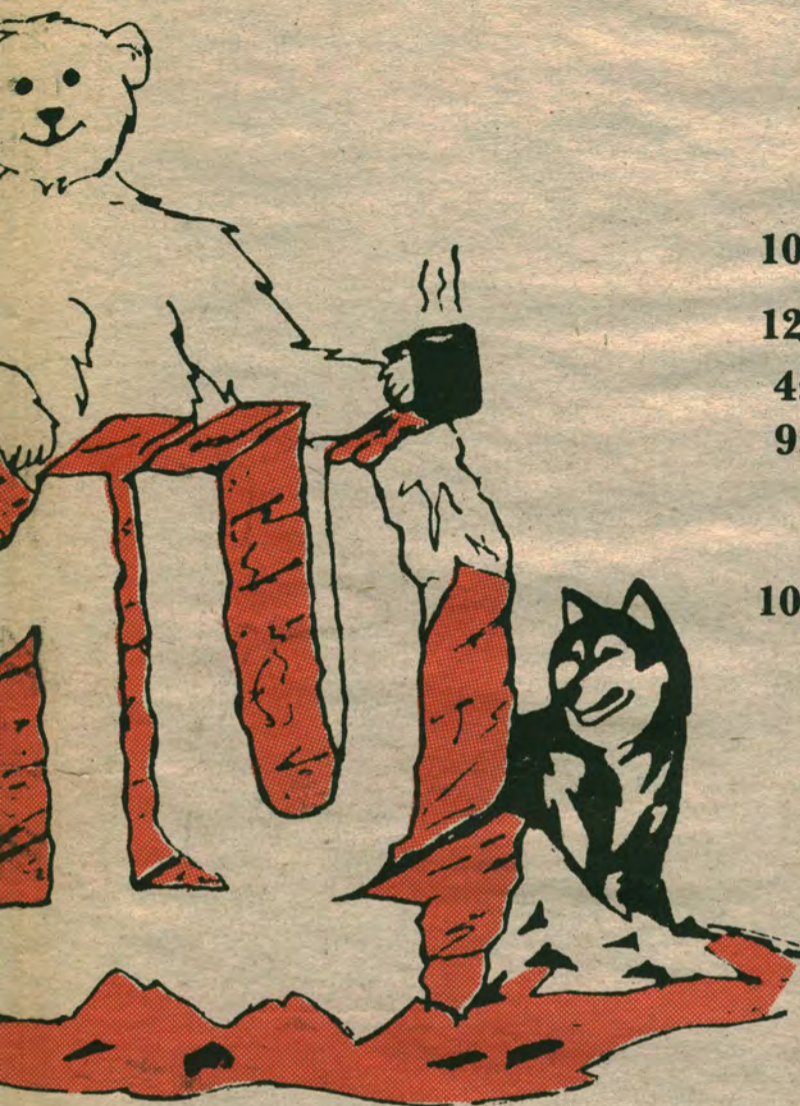

Huskies drop Key Games to Dal, UdeM

The St. Mary's Huskies 1984 winning streak came to an end last week as they lost key games to Dalhousie and Moncton. The losses left the Huskies with a 6-8 record and mired in a group of schools fighting for the playoffs. Six teams including Moncton, Acadia, Mr. Allison, Dalhousie, St. Mary's and St. FX are separated by only 4 points; two of those teams will make it to post season play, along with UNB and UPEI who have all but clinched play-off spots.

Dalhousie 8

Last Wednesday evening the Dalhousie Tigers rolled into the Huskies Alumni Area and crawled away with a 8-6 come-from-behind victory.

The Tigers completely dominated the 3rd period, scoring 4 unanswered goals, taking advantage of several St. Mary's penalties. The Huskies had led 6-4 after two periods, playing a good bump and grind game and exhibiting relentless forechecking. However, the 3rd period was a completely different game as St. Mary's lost their aggressiveness and ran into penalty trouble.

Mike Deliman had two goals for St. Mary's while singles went to Drew Gareau, Mike Kelly, Brian Foulton, and Darren Pickrem. John Cossar and Paul Herron had two goals for Dalhousie, with Thane Campbell, Mike Yzerman, and Michel Dagenais scoring singles.

The teams were tied 2-2 after the first period but the Huskies came alive midway through the second and scored 3 goals, 4 minutes apart. Deliman tied the game at 15:10, scored again to make it 5-4 at 18:30 and Pickrem upped that to 6-4 at 19:04. However, that ended the scoring for SMU as Dalhousie took their turn to come alive in the third period. Unanswered goals by Herron, Yzerman, and Cossar with two putting out of reach of a St. Mary's team that stopped hitting and skating.

The Huskies outshot Dalhousie 37-25 but that was due to a big second period. In the final frame the Huskies managed only 8 shots on Darren Cossar, none were even

close to going in. Bill Castonguay played two strong periods in the SMU net only to run into rebound trouble in the third.

Moncton 9
SMU 4

The Huskies continued to have difficulty in Moncton over the weekend as they were drubbed 9-4 by the Blue Eagles on Friday.

Moncton came out flying and got two goals from Allain Grenier and singles from Patrick Dodier, Claude Vilgrain, Roch Bois, Dixie Belliveau, John Sansfacon, Francois Boudreau, and Don Leblanc.

St. Mary's picked up goals from each player on the line of Jack Woods, Peter Kelly, and Darren Pickrem, and got another from Jeff Payne.

The win, coupled with a UPEI loss, put the Blue Eagles in 3rd place in division standings, 4 points behind the Panthers. St. Mary's dropped to 6-8, tied with St. FX for 7th place, but only 4 points behind the Blue Eagles. St. Mary's next game is Wednesday evening when they travel to Acadia to play the Axemen.

Basketball Huskies Split Road Trip

In one of the more arduous stretches of their basketball schedule, the St. Marys Huskies won one and lost one on the road last week. On Tuesday night (Jan. 17) they took to the courts against the Axemen of Acadia and dealt them a 73-68 defeat. Thursday (Jan. 19) the Huskies visited the undefeated St. F.X. X-men and were edged 71-69. At this point the Huskies are 4-3 for the regular season and ranked sixth in the nation.

SMU 73 Acadia 68

The hometown Axemen led for most of the evening and sported a 34-32 lead after the first half. They maintained the slight edge until the 5:25 mark and then the Huskies took command led by the outside shooting of Gary Bratty.

"It was a real struggle to win," remarked Coach Gary Heald. "But Gary Bratty came up big for us tonight. He's the ideal 'role man' and this evening he kept us going when we were floundering."

Rob Latter drove hard to the inside to be the Huskies big point getter with 27. He was 10/15 from the floor and 7/10 from the line. Gary Bratty picked up 18 points (7/11 in field-goal attempts and 4/5 in freethrows) which is his biggest offensive performance to date. Ron Lardge hooped 6 fieldgoals out of 13 attempts and was successful in his single trip to the foul line for a 13 point night. The Huskies, as a team, shot 50% from the floor and 70.4% from the line. They committed 23 turnovers and grabbed 28 rebounds; Rob Latter led in this department with 9.

The Axemen shot 43.5% from the floor and 63.4% from the line. They turned the ball over 18 times and won the battle of the boards with 33. Kevin Moore had a big individual night. He shot 7/10 from the floor and 4/6 from the line for 18 points and was the leading contributor to their rebounding with 9. Rodney Martin also had a good game. He was 7/15 in fieldgoals and 2/2 in freethrows for 16 points.

Huskies' fans won't see the Axeman again until they visit the Metro Center on Feb. 18.

On Thursday night St. Marys lost a heartbreaker to the St.F.X. X-men on a last second basket by Sellitri. The final score ended 71-69.

"We lost a tough one," said Coach Gary Heald. "But, quite honestly, we lost it with our bench."

Gary Heald has said time and time again that his team is made up of role players. The Huskies are a complete team with some individual stand-outs but it is not a one or two man team - everyone contributes. When the Huskies' bench strength doesn't play up to par then the results are like those of Thursday night. If the input from the bench would have been stronger, then the Huskies may well have overpowered the Antigonish squad.

Thursday, the X-men weren't that spectacular in the shooting department. They did, however, shoot the ball a great deal. They travelled 28 times to the foul line and netted 67.8% of them and scored a meagre 38.2% of their 68 field-goal attempts. They grabbed for 35 rebounds and only turned the ball over 10 times.

In the losing effort, the Huskies shot 50.9% from the floor and 57.9% from the line. They picked up 33 off the boards and turned the ball over 19 times.

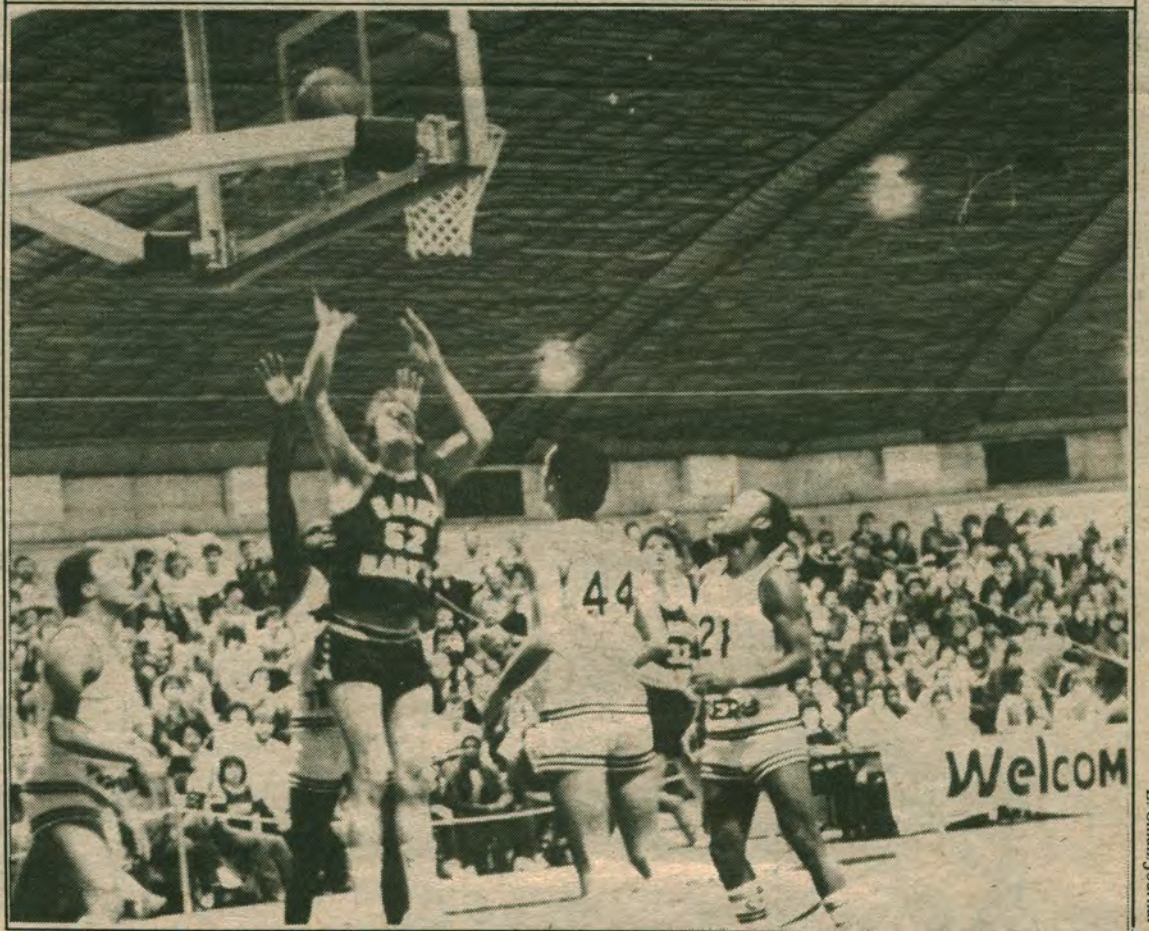
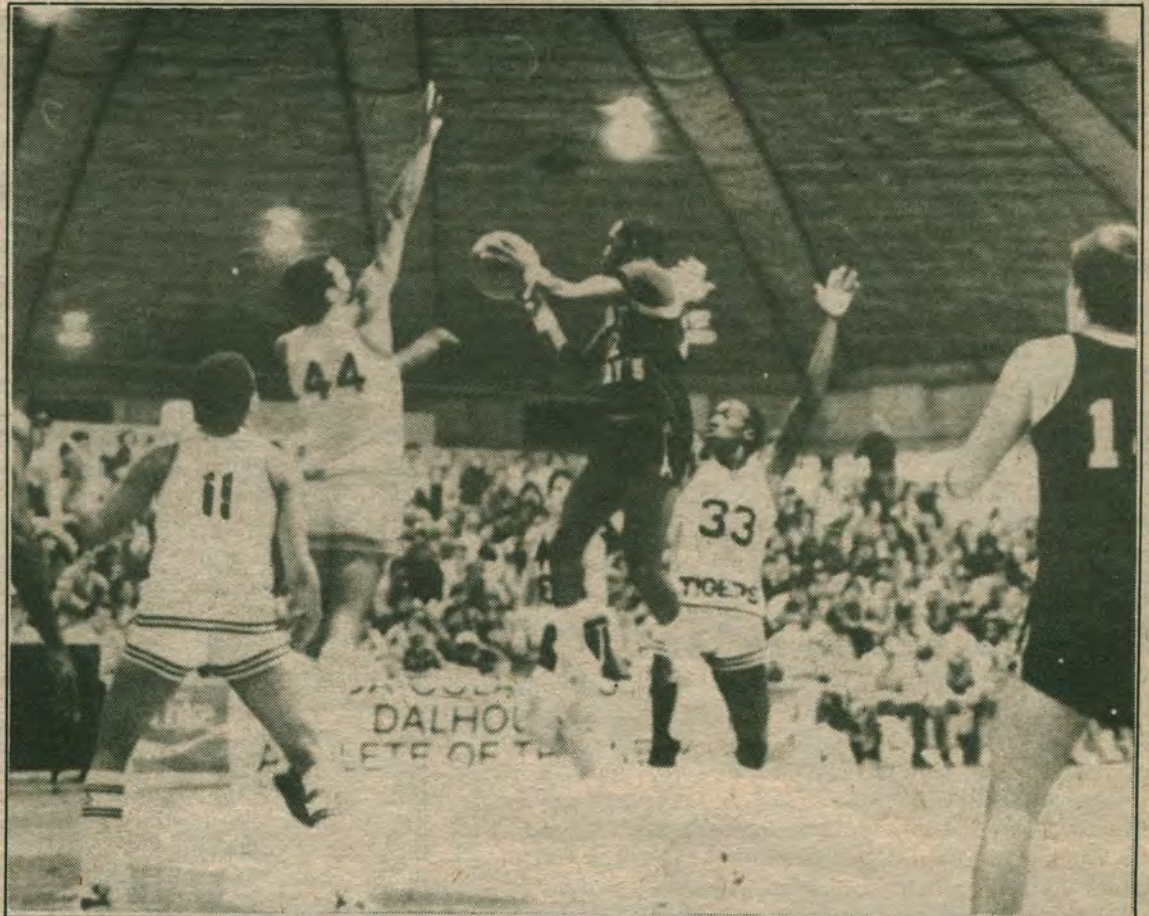
Sellitri and Hatch were the big men for St. F.X. Sellitri was 9/20 in fieldgoals and 5/8 in freethrow attempts for a 23 point night. He also led in rebounding with 11. Hatch had an 18 point performance shooting 5/15 from the floor and 8/9 from the line.

For the Huskies Rob Latter, Rod Buckland and Ron Lardge were the principal figures. Latter picked up 22 points (9/15 from the floor and 4/7 from the line) with the team high 19 rebounds, Buckland hooped for 17 points (6/7 from the floor and 5/6 from the line), and Ron Lardge added 16 (7/14 from the floor and 2/4 from the line).

The Huskies play back to back home games in the near future at the SMU Gym. They'll host Mt. A. and UNB on Jan. 27 and 28, respectively.

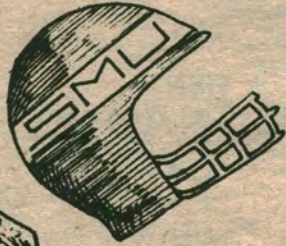
