Gorsebrook Gets Facelift

The SRC summer executive has decided to give the S.M.U. student pub, the Gorsebrook, a facelift.

Planning was broken down into two stages. Stage one con-

sisted of repainting and papering the lounge, stage two of replacing the lounge furnishings.

Painting and papering has been completed and the new colour scheme, chosen by Council with advice from Jenni-

fer Allen Interiors, is whipped plum and sandrift, a light grey. Vinyl wallpaper has been hung in the alcove behind the video screen in a soft striped pattern.

Lighting has been sophisticated, with the addition of three swag lamps above the stand-up bar area by the main door, as well as a lamp in the far corner, opposite the bar. Track lighting has also been added in the centre of the room. Plants have been ordered to fill the space between the lamps and add a fresh aspect to the room.

The new furniture will consist of new maple tabletops for the existing tables and matching maple chairs. Letters in the same wood will be hung on the

back wall of the pub, displaying the Gorsebrook name. New curtains have been ordered, but will not be in for several weeks. The design will be a subdued diamond pattern.

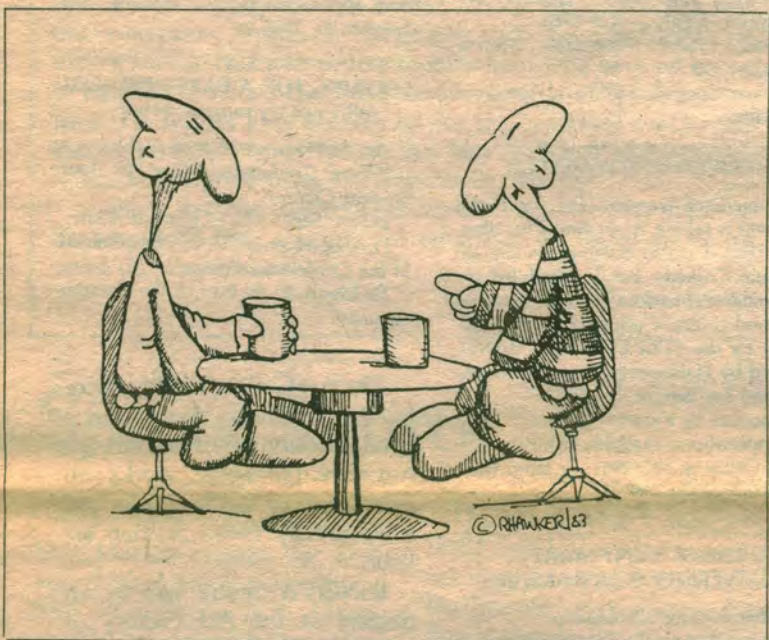
Although the red carpet presently in place is in need of replacement, the executive, because of the expense involved has decided to put off the purchase for another year.

There are as yet no plans for the establishment of an upkeep allowance, but Council has expressed interest in creating such a plan this fall.

The games room, previously on the third floor of the SUB has been moved to where the quiet lounge used to be, just outside

of the pub. The old games room area will be used to house a society for the disabled with plans for a council meeting room to be included. The new games room will be unlicensed until eight o'clock every evening. At that time the outside doors will be closed and it will become an extension of the pub. There will be a non-alcoholic lounge area in the Loyola colonnade for students who do not desire to visit the pub.

All labour involved in the refurbishing of the pub was provided free of charge by council members. The total cost of the project, funded by student funds, was in the range of \$15,000.



Athletics Department in Uproar

The Athletics Department at St. Mary's has been a busy place all summer. First with basketball Head Coach, Gary Heald, calling it quits and Athletic Director, Bob Hayes, being reassigned. Then after a short lull in the action, the appointment of Allan Wayne as new Basketball Coach. The most recent resignation came from Brian O'Byrne, the hockey coach, only two weeks before the season starts.

Ex-basketball coach, Gary Heald, gave up his command shortly after it was announced that St. Mary's would be allowed to compete in the 1985-86 season. He said that he had no real job lined up at the time, however, there had been offers. He decided to take a vacation in New England to think about what to do with his future.

Shortly after Heald's resignation, it was announced that Athletics and Recreation Director, Bob Hayes, would be moved from his present position to a post in planning and develop-

ment. Both Mr. Hayes and Mr. Ozmon have stated that they are pleased with the move.

Near the end of July, Mr. Allan Wayne was appointed the new Head Coach of the Basketball Team. Mr. Wayne has an extensive coaching background including the Head Coach of this year's Women's Canada Games Team.

The most recent blow dealt to the Athletics department was from Head Hockey Coach Brian O'Byrne. After a dismal 7-17 record in the 1984-85 season, O'Byrne decided to go on to bigger and possibly better things. With only two months left before the new season starts, the new coach will have his work cut out for him.

Announcements about the replacement for Mr. Hayes and Mr. O'Byrne are expected in the next few weeks. Although no names have been mentioned for the job of Athletics Director, the name of Bob Boucher, who used to coach the Huskies, has been brought up more than once.

Salary for this position is from \$18,000 to \$22,000.

The Help Line, a 24 hour a day, 365 days a year, counseling and information service is available to persons in emotional distress or with information queries on the nearest telephone at 422-7444.

The Help Line is manned by 75 to 100 volunteers specially trained in human relations services and screened for ability.

All calls are confidential, if so desired, and can deal with anything from information about government agencies, drugs, sexuality problems, or com-

munity services to marital and abuse crises and suicide calls. The service is provided free of charge and people requesting professional help will be referred to trained counsellors to help them deal with their particular problems.

The Help Line is also quick to help students who must contend with their first year at university and the problems associated with the change. Drug abuse, confusion and peer pressure will be dealt with in a professional, personal, and caring manner.

SMU Creates Peer Program

Everyone hopes to pass, but now there is a new and different kind of "pass" to get involved with: the Peer Adjustment Support Service.

P.A.S.S. is a new program at S.M.U., geared to help first-time students adjust as quickly and comfortably as possible to University life. Unlike many previous programs at universities in the area, this one uses senior students as resource people.

Early enthusiasm for the program came from Dr. John Young, whose daughter benefited from a similar program set up at the University of Victoria. Other universities have adopted similar programs, but this is the first of its kind in the area. Last year, 17 volunteers, most of whom were chemistry students, acted as peers. This year the number of volunteers is closer to 50 and the number of students able to participate in the program has increased propor-

tionately. More volunteers are needed, however, as there are still many students who will not have a peer this year.

The S.M.U. program, headed by Jane Reid of Student Services, is based on the premise that students who blend in more quickly will begin to gain enthusiasm for all aspects of university life that much sooner.

All volunteers will be under the auspices of Ms. Reid and will receive monitoring all year,

including training in listening skills and guidelines for contacting freshmen. Peers will be given the task of welcoming new students, familiarizing them with the campus, explaining academic regulations and requirements, offering basic tips for student survival, directing them to other information sources and extending a genuine show of care and support.

Because there are only about 50 volunteers, it is impossible to ensure that each freshman have

a peer advisor. Selection was first narrowed to off-campus students, on the assumption that residence dons play a similar role for residence students, then five students were randomly selected for each advisor.

Peer advising is not meant to replace the role of the professional counsellor. In fact, if this program is carried out correctly, it should increase rather than decrease the workload of counselling services.

Terry Fox Run

The fifth annual Terry Fox Run will take place at universities and colleges across Nova Scotia in September.

Last year, Nova Scotians helped to raise over \$294,000 for cancer research, a large proportion of this money was

raised by students all over the province. This year, we hope to double the numbers of participants by encouraging everyone

to "Bring a Friend" and walk, jog, run or stroll the 5 km course at their University or Community Run site.

Terry Fox symbolized the finest aspirations of Canadian youth and his memory will continue to inspire young people over the years to come. During 1985, International Youth Year, there can be no finer way to start the new school year than by involving everyone in the student community in this very worthy cause.

To date, over \$28 million dollars have been raised for cancer research by previous Terry Fox runs. Nova Scotians have raised over \$1.2 million of this amount. At the present time two major research projects in the Halifax area are being funded by monies from the Terry

Fox Run. The National Cancer Institute of Canada has awarded one million dollars to Dr. Chambers at Dalhousie University (Biochemistry Department) and the Victoria General Hospital has a \$537,733 grant to participate in the National Breast Screening Study.

In addition, three Terry Fox Cancer Research Clerkship Awards have been awarded to students in the Microbiology and Biochemistry departments at Dalhousie. In response to the specific wishes of Terry Fox, all funds being raised in his name are being directed to the National Cancer Institute of Canada. The primary consideration when making grants for the "Marathon of Hope" research programs is the emphasis on innovation and excellence on the part of the research team.

President's Aide Passes On

Laurie Smith who was special assistant to the President of SMU, passed away at his Halifax home on August 25 at the age of 64.

A graduate of St. Mary's, Dalhousie and Fordham University, he received a B.A., B.Ed. and a Masters in Science in educational psychology and guidance. While an undergraduate at SMU in 1942/43, Mr. Smith was Editor of THE JOURNAL. He taught for many years at St. Pats High and became director of guidance for

Halifax city schools in 1963. In 1966, Mr. Smith returned to St. Mary's.

From 1966 to his death, Mr. Smith was respected and befriended by many at SMU. His first position was director of student affairs and during the following years he was director of administration and scholarships, Dean of students, VP administration and director of alumni.

Dr. Ozmon expressed his grief at the loss of a friend.

"He was a great source of advice and assistance to me and other people at SMU. Mr.

Smith was a valuable contact person to alumni and others outside of SMU. Many people lost a good friend and he was considered a father figure for many, myself included. I know he was looking forward to assuming his new duties as special assistant and I was looking forward to taking advantage of his pre-retirement year."

A memorial service for Dr. Thomas and family, Laurie Smith, and two teachers, who recently died in a car accident, employed at a cultural center in China, has been tentatively set for September 25 or 26.

Journal Reports to Students

The first Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the Journal Publishing Society was held on July 29, 1985. All Saint Mary's students, as members of the Society, were welcome to attend. The four directors present were surprised and pleased by the turnout of members.

The chairman of the Publishing Society Board of directors (PUB Board), Professor Jeff Young, presented the annual report of the directors. It read:

"The Journal Publishing Society was registered on June 7, 1984 and has recently completed its first year of operations. As such, this is the Society's first annual general meeting and its first directors' report.

In general, the year has gone very well and the Journal Society has worked very hard to achieve its stated objectives. However, throughout the year a number of contentious issues such as funding, autonomy and editorial control have arisen. These issues will no doubt arise in the upcoming year and it is hoped that they can be dealt with to everyone's satisfaction, including the students and the S.R.C.

Two other issues worthy of note are advertising contracts and the typesetting fund. The advertising contract used by the Journal was found deficient in a number of ways, chiefly legal ones. With the help of Professor N. Kelleher, the Society was able to develop a more suitable and "legally tight" contract format which is now in use.

The notion of purchasing a typesetter was one which was approved of in principle by most board members. However, the Society lacked the financial wherewithal to purchase and set up one. As a result, a typesetting fund has been established and it is hoped the machine can be purchased within the next five years.

In conclusion, the year has been a success for the Society and it appears that 1985-86 should be every bit as successful."

Following this, the financial statements for the 1984-85 publishing year were presented. These statements were prepared by Faith Drinnan, Business Manager of the Journal and re-

viewed by Robert White, Treasurer of the Saint Mary's University Student Association.

The 1985-86 Board of Directors was proposed and passed by a majority vote of members

present. The Pub Board consists of a faculty member, three members of the SRC and three members of the Journal. These people are: Jeff Young (Faculty), Colin MacMillan, Jude Ronayne, Faith Drinnan (Journal), Kristine DeCoste, Robert White

and Mark Bower (SRC).

The Journal would like to thank Karen Neves, Kevin Biggs, Lisa Nicholson, Dave Peters and Professor Ned Kelleher for their input and advice to the Society over the last year.

Crash Claims Prof

Dr. Kurian Thomas, former chairperson of the SMU Biology department, died tragically with his wife and two children in the July Air India crash, off the coast of Ireland.

Educated at the University of Travancore in India and the University of Florida, Dr. Thomas specialized in insect endochronology. After he completed 3 years at Northwestern University as a research fellow, Dr. Thomas was employed by St. Mary's.

During his early years at SMU, Dr. Thomas received many research grants and led the biology faculty in this area.

His involvement also extended to university administration as a member on a variety of committees.

The Dean of Science and the acting chairperson of the biology department were unavailable to comment.

Dr. Thomas is remembered by Dr. Ozmon.

"His death was a tragic loss to the university and the suddenness of it made the loss even more of a shock. Dr. Thomas was a person who was respected by his colleagues and well liked by students for his attention to his work and his sensitivity to students' needs."

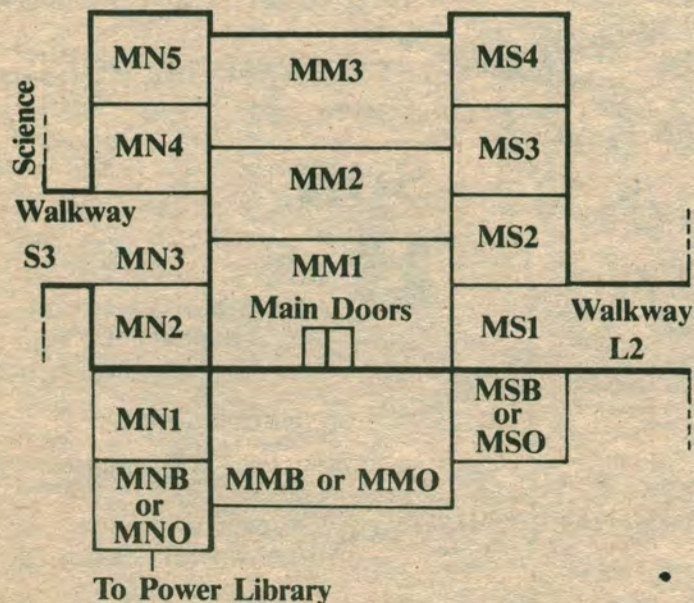

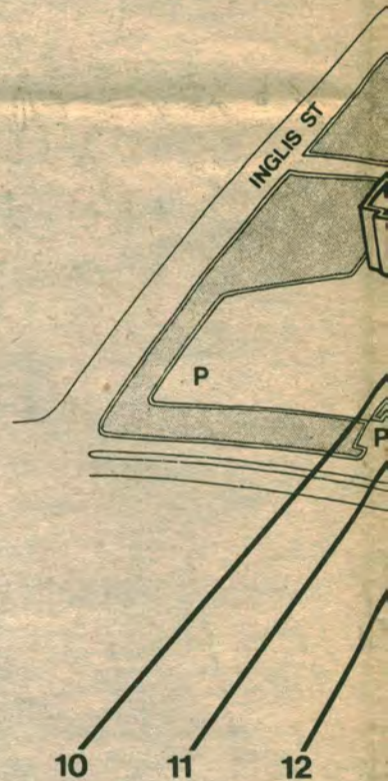

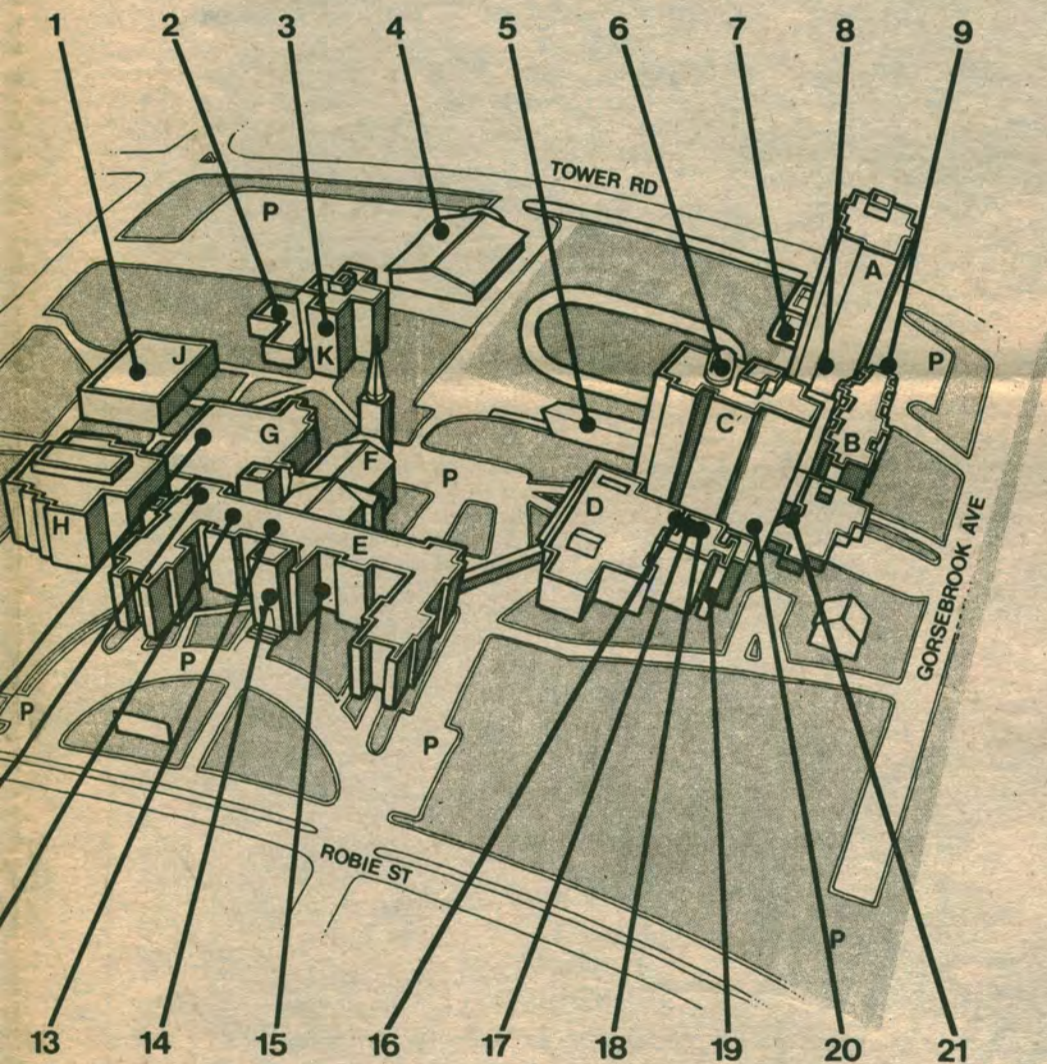

Robert Hayes — A Profile

Mr. Robert Hayes, Director of Athletics and Recreation, has been assigned a new job here at the University. President Kenneth Ozmon announced July 3rd that Mr. Hayes would assume a job in planning and development starting Sept. 1st.

Mr. Hayes began his employment at St. Mary's in 1958. Not only did he act as Athletics Director but he was also both the varsity football and hockey coach. He remained at the helm of the football team until 1970. During this time, his greatest accomplishment was ending the St. F.X. X-men's 47-game winning streak and going on to win the Atlantic Bowl.

In his 27 years of administration in Athletics, he has been a part of 30 Atlantic Intercollegiate Championships in the sports of men's football, hockey, golf, and basketball and women's field hockey and basketball. He also was a part of 4 Canadian Intercollegiate titles in football and hockey.

He was inducted into the Nova Scotia Sports Hall of Fame in 1980 as an athlete and also received a C.A.F.L.-C.F.L. Builders Award, in honor of his outstanding services to football in Canada, at the 1981 Grey Cup Dinner. Mr. Hayes is also responsible for the Camp of

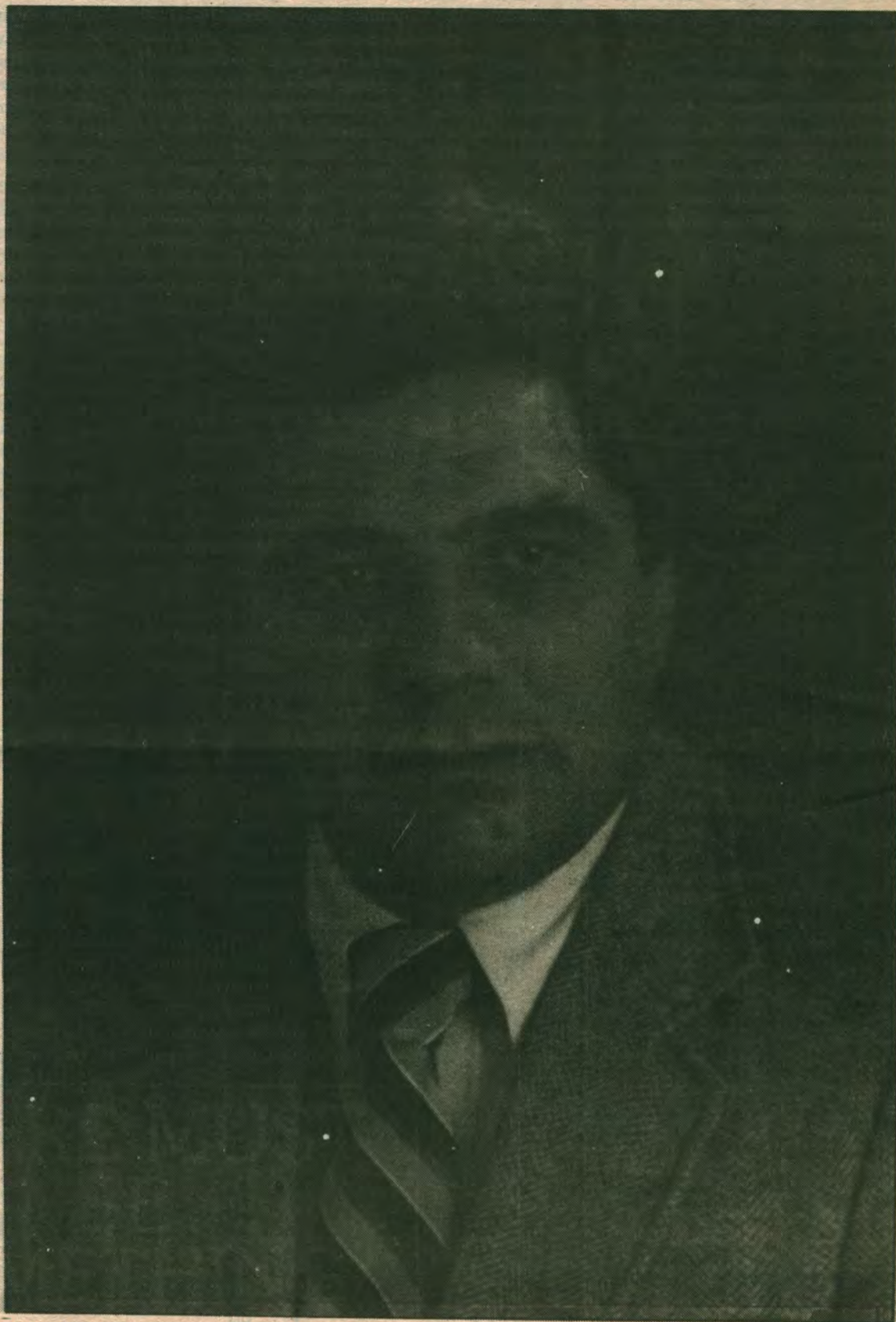
Champions which has involved over 12,000 young athletes during its existence.

Mr. Hayes also played a large part in the acquisition of the artificial track and field as well as the proposed Fitness and Recreation Center at the University.

His accomplishments outside the University are many. He worked toward getting the first Canada Summer Games in 1969 and in 1980 he worked under the Honorable Gerald Regan, Minister of Fitness and Amateur Sport, researching and developing regional sport training centers across Canada.

The new job for Mr. Hayes will include all aspects of fundraising and developing stronger relationships with the business community and government. Mr. Ozmon stated that maintaining and strengthening community support has become an extremely important function of university administration, "No member of our administration is better acquainted with a wide cross section of the community. I'm delighted that Bob has agreed to work with me in these important areas."

No replacement for Mr. Hayes has been found as yet, however, it is hoped that a successor will be found soon.



Waye New Basketball Coach

On July 26, Mr. Robert Hayes, Director of Athletics and Recreation, announced the appointment of Mr. Allan Waye to the position of Head Coach of the Men's Varsity Basketball Team. The appointment came only three weeks after the resignation of Gary Heald.

Mr. Waye will take over a team that has sat out a complete season because of ineligibility problems in the 1983-84 season. The President of the University, Kenneth Ozmon, suspended the team in order that an investigation of all athletics could be carried out. The A.U.A.A. voted in the spring to relax a rule that

would have forced the Huskies to sit out another year.

Waye is from Halifax and attended Queen Elizabeth High School, graduated from Dalhousie University with a Bachelor of Arts, received a Diploma of Public Administration from the University of Western Ontario and is presently working toward his Masters in Public Administration at Dalhousie. He has been involved with the Province of Nova Scotia as well as the City of Halifax. Since 1978, he has been an executive assistant to the Mayor of Halifax.

In the mid 70's, Allan Waye began his involvement with

basketball with Basketball Nova Scotia and soon moved on to work with Basketball Canada, Pan American Basketball Confederation and the In-

ternational Amateur Basketball Federation. The various awards and positions in both coaching and administration are too numerous to mention but in his years he has been very dedicated to the sport of basketball.

The appointment came into effect August 1st and is an eight month term. The tradition of St. Mary's is expected to be upheld under the capable direction of Allan Waye.

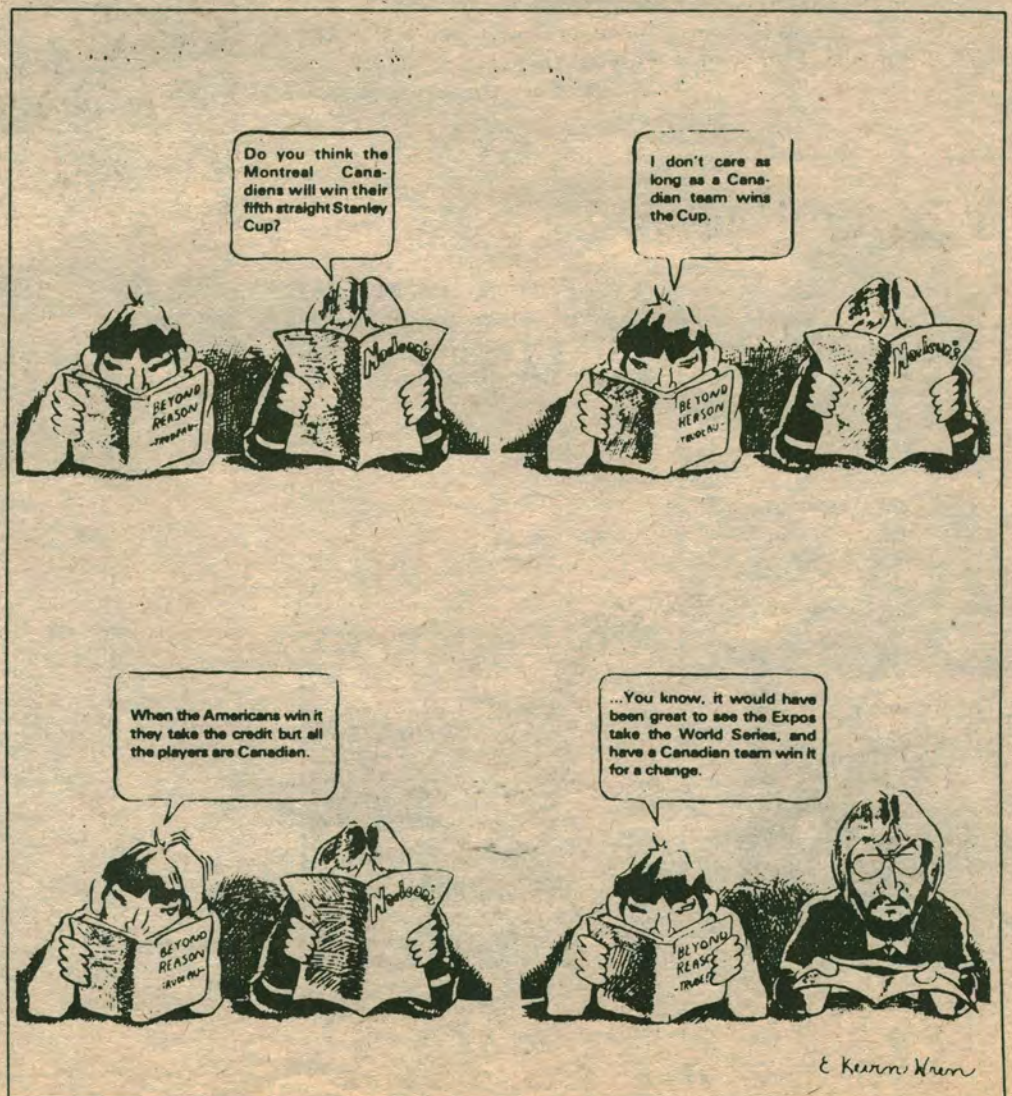
Sports Shorts
