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Continued Conflict at SMUSA

While the arrangements for SMU's Winter Carnival have been made and all is running smoothly, there is still a ripple behind the scenes at SMUSA, according to executive members of the association.

The current Vice President of Student Affairs, Vanessa Tynes, has been relieved of the duties concerning Saint Mary's Winter Carnival, a student function the VPSA of SMUSA usually oversees. The responsibilities of the Winter Carnival have now been passed over by SMUSA President John Francis to the Vice President of Administration, Jean-Guy Chaisson, and the Director of External Affairs, Rose Tchwenko.

"Basically I thought this was going to be my Winter Carnival. They can do it if they want to do it. Right now, I feel like I am not wanted as part of SMUSA," commented Tynes in response to the action of the association.

A letter of warning informing Tynes of the concerns of the other executive was delivered last week by SMUSA President, John Francis. "I find it difficult as a student leader to sit down

at a table with five key individuals and one of the individuals at the table isn't motivated and they are spinning their wheels. As an individual, I think Vanessa is great and I respect her opinion. It just has to come down to the team effort and there is only so much help you can give someone who is spinning their wheels."

While many of the claims against Tynes were supported by a majority of the executive, Tynes has made it clear that she does not agree with the actions taken by certain members of SMUSA or the content of the letter of warning. She comments "I still have to respond to the letter. My lawyer advised me to. The letter was inaccurate. As far as I am concerned, I do not bring the fact that I am a single mother into the office."

When asked about what future action would be taken in dealing with this situation, Tynes expressed that, "I'm going to do my office hours and do my jobs with the societies. If any more of my duties are taken away, then I will just keep doing my office hours like I always have. People told me that there would be student politics

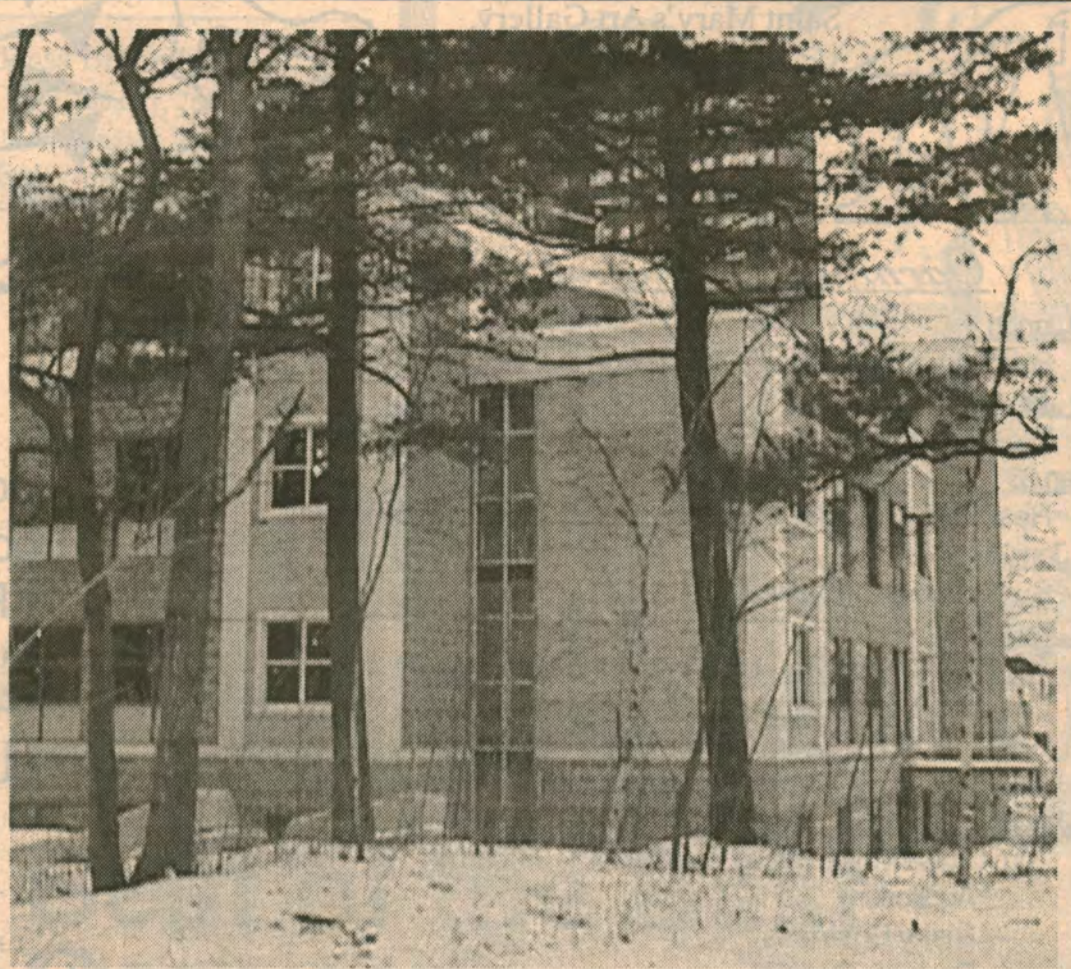

Mature/Part-Time Council Rep Dismissed

Last week Stacey Cashin, Mature/Part-Time Representative, was removed from Saint Mary's Student Representative Council. For the remainder of the school year the position of Mature/Part-Time Rep will be headed by Mike Decoutere, who finished second twice in previous elections and was interested in filling the position on council.

SMUSA President, John Francis, commented "she (Cashin) was missing office hours and did not attend 5 or 6 meetings, a large number of people went underrepresented for the first semester, so we asked for a letter of resignation

on December 1st." Although Cashin has not openly expressed reasons as to why she neglected to attend meetings, it is noted that personal situations were hampering her bid to be an active member on council.

A member of council is to be removed once he/she has missed 3 meetings without good reason. A letter was slated to be sent to Cashin and she was to be notified on the seriousness of her absence. John Francis commented that he "didn't have the opportunity to contact her."

When asked about the recent problems with Cashin's performance, Francis stated that the obvious lack of inter-

est is on the personal level of the individual and not the organization. "Nothing can be said about council as a group, we're not hitting a wall here, we're moving full steam ahead; doing things and trying to meet deadlines."

Francis concluded it was a problem with the individuals, and he also added council could help set the standards for an effective year. "First we must clearly outline what is expected of them and inform them (council) of what their duties are. They are leaders on campus and are expected to attend classes, go to meetings, and perform duties. In order to set examples, one must lead with example."

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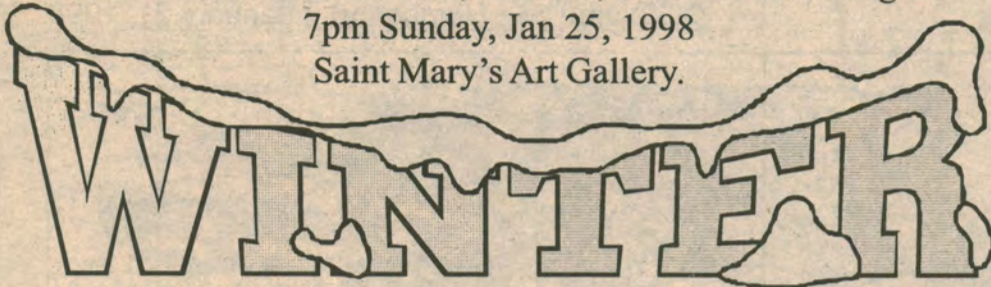

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SMU Smokers Welcome at Pub

On October 7th, 1997 the Halifax Regional Municipality Council passed a by-law known as the "Smoking By-law." This applies to, among other things, drinking establishments and places of public assembly including educational buildings. The by-law forbids smoking in any such place of public assembly, and restricts smoking in restaurants with a seating capacity of more than 30.

In an interview, Mark Bellefontaine, Gorsebrook Lounge Manager, stated that

such a by-law does not apply to the Gorsebrook Lounge, and that a non-smoking section in the pub is not in the works.

"The topic [of a smoking section] has never come up, the [Gorsebrook] just isn't that big. We do have a fan circulatory system so the smoke doesn't get too bad. I've never heard any complaints about smoke in the bar."

Bellefontaine said that the pub has already designated an underage section Mondays through Wednesdays during food hours and that sectioning up the Gorsebrook further would just be too difficult. "If

we broke [the Gorsebrook] up into smoking and non-smoking we'd be looking at sections of a couple tables each."

Saint Mary's does have its own smoking policy which states that smoking is not permitted anywhere on campus other than designated areas. These areas include a designated area of the Faculty Lounge and adjoining Staff Smoking Lounge, a designated area of the Student Union

Building cafeteria, the Gorsebrook Lounge and adjoining Games Room, and all residence buildings other than non-smoking areas designated by the Director of Residence. The smoking policy applies to all faculty, staff and students and depends on everybody to adhere to and enforce it.

The policy further offers that any student, staff or faculty member who currently smokes may acquire general in-

formation and assistance in quitting from the health professionals at the Dr. Henry Reardon Health Centre. Although there is much literature available for smokers, government cutbacks have eliminated patch and step programs once obtainable in the past. Physiotherapist Barbara Bialokoz offers acupuncture therapy for smokers who sign to quit in the Athletic Therapy Clinic in the Tower.

Forensic Entomologist Presents At SMU

Last Friday, January 16 Gail Anderson, Canada's only Forensic Entomologist gave a presentation to a crowded room at Saint Mary's University on the many ways in which insects can serve as clues to solving a crime. Throughout the past fifteen years, Forensic Entomology has become more and more common in police investigations in Canada and the United States.

Insects are vital evidence in many criminal cases involving fatality. This method of investigation known as forensic entomology is primarily used in cases in which the crime scene is seventy two or more hours old.

Anderson is an assistant professor at Simon Fraser University's School of Criminology. She has overseen numerous forensic cases throughout Canada and is often called upon to testify as an expert witness in both homicide and poaching cases.

According to Anderson, insects arrive on the crime scene within twenty four hours of the crime. After about three days the insects leave the corpse to pupate and develop. By deter-

mining what stage of development these insects have attained at a given time, one can derive an estimate of the age of the corpse. Investigators have to collect insect evidence from the surrounding area as well.

For older crime scenes it's more effective to examine evidence left behind by waves of insects. "Insects leave evidence of themselves behind."

Anderson presented examples of a number of cases in which Forensic Entomology has been able to solve cases that could not be solved through

conventional methods alone.

The geographical climate affects insect development. The warmer the temperature; the quicker the insects develop. Anderson has been conducting experiments throughout Canada to study the affects of different climates would have on an investigation involving Forensic Entomology. The test subjects are pigs because pig skin is similar to human skin. Anderson is currently working with the RCMP to train officers to collect insect evidence.

Classes On The Web

Starting September 1998, Saint Mary's will be joining the future. Along with five other Atlantic Canadian universities, including UNB, UPEI, Memorial, MSVU, and UCCB, SMU will be receiving funding from Industry Canada to develop and deliver credit courses online.

Linda MacDonald, Associate Director of Continuing Education at Saint Mary's, is "enthusiastic at the thought" and says that she "hopes to successfully expand SMU by providing more viable opportunities for people in various provinces."

Two courses will be offered at SMU including Astronomy 217.1(2) (Life in the Universe) taught by Dr. Micheal West, and Geology 204.0 - (The Earth from an Atlantic Canadian Perspective), taught by Dr. John Waldron.

These two course have been chosen particularly due to the Astronomy and Atlantic Canada Studies programs taught at SMU. Features to the classes include interactive discussion on-line, help groups, and question periods.

MacDonald is confident about the success of this upcoming technological adventure partly due to the two individuals instructing the courses. She comments "Both men are very creative and enthusiastic,

not to mention dedicated."

The courses will be listed in the 1998-99 Academic Calendar, and will be indicated by a u symbol that stands for distance education. Students wishing to register for these courses will have to go through regular admittance procedures.

Three youth workers have been hired to help write interactive programming and HTML coding, as well as performing test runs and focus groups.

Husky Van Woes

It's cheaper than a cab, safer than walking, but some students are asking how reliable SMU's Husky Patrol is? Husky Patrol is run by SMUSA and Saint Mary's University security. Its purpose is to provide a safe ride to and from a student's home and academic activities at the university.

With the number of students using the service increasing over the last year, complaints regarding the Husky Patrol are more plen-

tiful. Many students claim that they have not been informed when the Husky Van is out of service. "It's not fair that Husky shuts down when it's raining or cold out" said one user, "That's the most important time.. It's frustrating when they don't tell students."

Jeff Kelly, Security, remarked that because Husky is a service provided free to students, they must be flexible to the schedule it follows. Safety is the primary concern of Husky Patrol; a decision to cancel operations goes on the advice of drivers. Something as

simple as a freezing rain warning can shut down operations. "We try our best (to tell students). Sometimes we have to cancel if roads get bad and take the van off in the middle of a shift" said Kelly, "We must consider the overall safety of security, staff, and students involved."

SMUSA President John Francis expressed ideas like posting a sign informing students of Husky Van Service Status at common waiting areas, informing students of cancellations.

Recommendations For SMU Safety Presented

The Safety Committee Council at Saint Mary's is finalizing its list of recommendations to be presented to City Council in the next few weeks. The committee's recommendations, to be put together by Wednesday, are the result of the council's concern for student safety on and around the campus.

Several of the nine recommendations deal with the lack of lighting around SMU. The crosswalks on Inglis near the main bus stop, at Atlantic and Tower Road, and at Tower and South near the Victoria Gen-

eral, lack sufficient lighting and appropriate signs. Lighting is also needed in the area behind Vanier House on Gorsebrook Ave. Also, it is the city's responsibility to remove excess trees that may block streetlights.

The Safety Committee would also like the city to place a stop sign at the intersection of Tower and Gorsebrook Avenue and consider changing the speed limits on the streets that surround the university.

As well, the committee suggests investigating the response times of police to situations that arise on campus. It also recommends that the city council examine safety procedures at jun-

ior and high schools to see if some of those procedures are appropriate for SMU.

The Safety Committee Council, which consists of student membership, also works with the faculty staffed Health and Safety Board at Saint Mary's. According to Trevor O'Brien, Chair of the Safety Committee, the two groups will work together on an audit that will "focus on issues outside the campus, but that are important to students." O'Brien hopes that the recommendations of the committee can be implemented by the end of the school year.

Butt Out Please

The week of January 19 - 23 has been designated as National Non-Smoking Week. It is a lesser known week than say Sexual Awareness Week or National Access Awareness Week, but it is still equally important.

For smokers, this week is a chance to attempt to quit their habit, or at least cut down. For non-smokers, it is a week of hope that they can breathe a little easier.

With increases in smoke-free zones, such as workplaces and restaurants, smokers are complaining that they don't have rights anymore. Some argue that soon the only place where they will be able to smoke will be outdoors, and eventually even that will be threatened by environmental issues and government legislation.

So are smoker's rights being infringed upon in this day in age? Indeed they are. Do I care? Not at all. That may be harsh of me to say, but I strongly feel that we non-smokers have been suffering for smokers' habits too long.

According to Nancy Roberts, Director of Government Relations and Environmental Programs with the Lung Association of Nova Scotia, 90% of lung cancer, 80% of emphysema, 75% of bronchitis, and a large percentage of heart disease and asthma, are caused directly from smoking, or second hand smoke.

The government, along with groups such as Canada's Lung Associations and Cancer Societies, produce awareness campaigns, like National Non-Smoking Week, to discourage smokers from this unhealthy habit, and make the public conscious of the many health risks related to smoking. Still, smokers seem to be increasing in number and decreasing in age. But then again, why am I complaining?

After all, smokers contribute to the tax base in Nova Scotia. If smoking continues to get barred from public places, and people begin to quit their smoking habits, what will make up the government revenue lost when people discontinue buying cigarettes?

It's sad to say, but the more people smoke, the more taxes are paid off. Without taxes from tobacco, where will our government get revenue from? Increased sales tax? Increased income tax?

The answer is this: the government won't have to get taxes from somewhere else. For the millions of dollars that smokers cost our healthcare system, it would all balance out eventually. Smokers give the government money, but they also take that money away. Taxpayers have to pay out more to fix the smokers up. If there were less smokers, likely healthcare costs would go down because you wouldn't have as many sick people.

So, for the smokers who read this editorial, try to reduce your cigarette consumption in honor of National Non-Smoking Week. I guarantee you'll feel better. You never know you may like it and decrease it even more. For non-smokers, be patient. Our smoking friends will eventually quit, or be taken to an early death. I apologize for my morbidity, but if you haven't already guessed, I am a committed non-smoker, sick of tobacco's spurious output.

Once a powerhouse amongst societies, for years being the largest and most active, the Commerce Society has hit bottom under the leadership of Jeff Keizer, President, and Jennifer Perry, Vice-President. But last month, Jeff Keizer resigned as President after a fall semester of few events, including combination events mostly organized by members of other societies. Members of the executive have been dissatisfied with Keizer's performance since very early last semester. An attempt to have him impeached failed and the society continued operate in the same direction. "He was not available for the society" says Heidi Degg, one of the few working members of the executive left around the office, "and there

Keizer is also the director of communications at SMUSA and that job took him away from his duties as President of the society. Paramount to Development of Northern Canada...

SMU EMBA Moves North

Saint Mary's Executive Master of Business Administration program will play a key role in developing Northern Canada. Saint Mary's will train deputy ministers, entrepreneurs and business people for the new territory that will come into existence on April 1, 1999. The EMBA program, the only one in Atlantic Canada, will be offered in Nunavut - Canada's newest territory.

"Saint Mary's has a very good program and they met the needs we identified," says Ian Rose, Director of Policy and Program at Nunavut Arctic College. "We wanted a flexible program. While other univer-

sities were saying take what we have, Saint Mary's expressed a willingness to adapt their program." He explains that in a northern environment, situations and experiences are very different from those in southern Canada. Saint Mary's English as a Second Language program was an important element to students of the North.

There are many Inuit people working at regional and federal levels of government, who will need training to move into higher levels of government. "The Executive MBA program is designed to do just that," says Rose. "We looked at several universities' programs and Saint Mary's seemed to be a natural fit with us."

He says that a lot of Inuit students choose to attend universities in Eastern Canada. "Small towns and cities and small universities like Saint Mary's appeal to students from the North. They get lost in big cities," says Rose. So when they were looking for a program that would meet the needs of the North, Saint Mary's was a natural choice.

Nunavut Arctic College chose Saint Mary's University to prepare and train individuals for the new government of Nunavut. The North West Territories will be divided into two territories with eastern and western governments. The eastern region will be governed by the new Nunavut govern-

ment made up of an elected legislative assembly. Many government jobs will be created in each community as a result.

Professors from Saint Mary's will go to Nunavut to teach courses and work with the students starting in February. The first group of twenty students, who will be recruited from the existing government of the North West Territories and federal government organization, will graduate in September of 1999. The EMBA program is designed to allow students to continue their full-time employment while they earn their degree.

Nunavut Arctic College, established in 1986, is a network of learning centres in every

community in the eastern Arctic spanning three time zones. The EMBA program in Nunavut is being sponsored by the Nunavut Secretariat, Indian and Northern Affairs Canada, and approved under the Nunavut Unified Human Resources Strategy.

Saint Mary's is currently negotiating with the Chinese government to begin offering the EMBA program in Beijing also. The EMBA Program is offered by the Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce, Atlantic Canada's Leading Business School. The Saint Mary's MBA program is forging new directions for business and government leaders.

The Bi-Weekly Webster

For those of you who fell into coma while reading my last article, the tutorials are now on-line so if you missed the last one or blacked it out like that girl you dated in high school, don't worry: go to http://husky1.stmarys.ca/~G_MORE.

Today we learn a little more formatting to help you make basic lists because your resume is going to have lists of jobs, volunteer experience, and so on.

There are three basic types of lists that can be included in a web page. Unordered lists (), ordered lists (), and definition lists (<DL>). Inside each of these tags go the individual list items indicated by .

In we can include the attribute "TYPE=" and circle, square or disc to define the bullets shape. An unordered list is a bulleted list of any number of items:

Not seeing a square bullet? Not all browsers let you choose, but it doesn't hurt to put a TYPE in.

An (ordered list), numbers items automatically for those who have trouble counting. It also has TYPE attributes for numbering styles. Here is a chart of what they do: "1" is Arabic numbers (1, 2, 3), "a" is Lower alpha (a, b, c), "A"

is Upper alpha (A, B, C), "i" is Lower roman (i, ii, iii), "I" is Upper roman (I, II, III). Here is an example:

Finally <DL> (definition list) has no important attributes but you need a tag that tells the term you are defining. Put a <DT> (definition term) around the term being defined. On the next line you open the definition with <DD> and type away.

Now that you can make lists for everything from job contacts to things you found on the floor of the SUB, ready to see your list in a browser? The hell with the old way, let's put your site up on the server. On the PC's go to a program called WS_FTP. This program talks to the SMU server and lets you send files onto it. Go to the bottom where it says Connect. This will bring up a window asking for your computer information. The first one gives your connection a name to be saved under, something like SMU connection. The second one is the address of the computer, like an address on the Internet. In this space, type in 'husky1.stmarys.ca'. Leave the next box on Automatic then type in your login name (e.g. G_MORE) and your PC password in the next two. Leave the others blank. Press 'Connect' and wait awhile until the other screen returns. On the left hand of the screen you see the contents of your computer and on

the right you see the contents of your personal folder on the school's computer. In that directory there will be a file folder titled WWW, double click on it to open it. This folder is where your web page lives. Use the left side to navigate around your computer and find your 'index.html'. Highlight it and click on the arrow pointing to the right. When it appears on the right it's on the SMU computer. We need to change the name so the computer can find it. Highlight the 'index.html' on the right and click on Rename. Give your file the name "welcome.html". All done!

Go to your browsers address bar and enter:
http://husky1.stmarys.ca/~G_MORE (Only substitute in your login name).

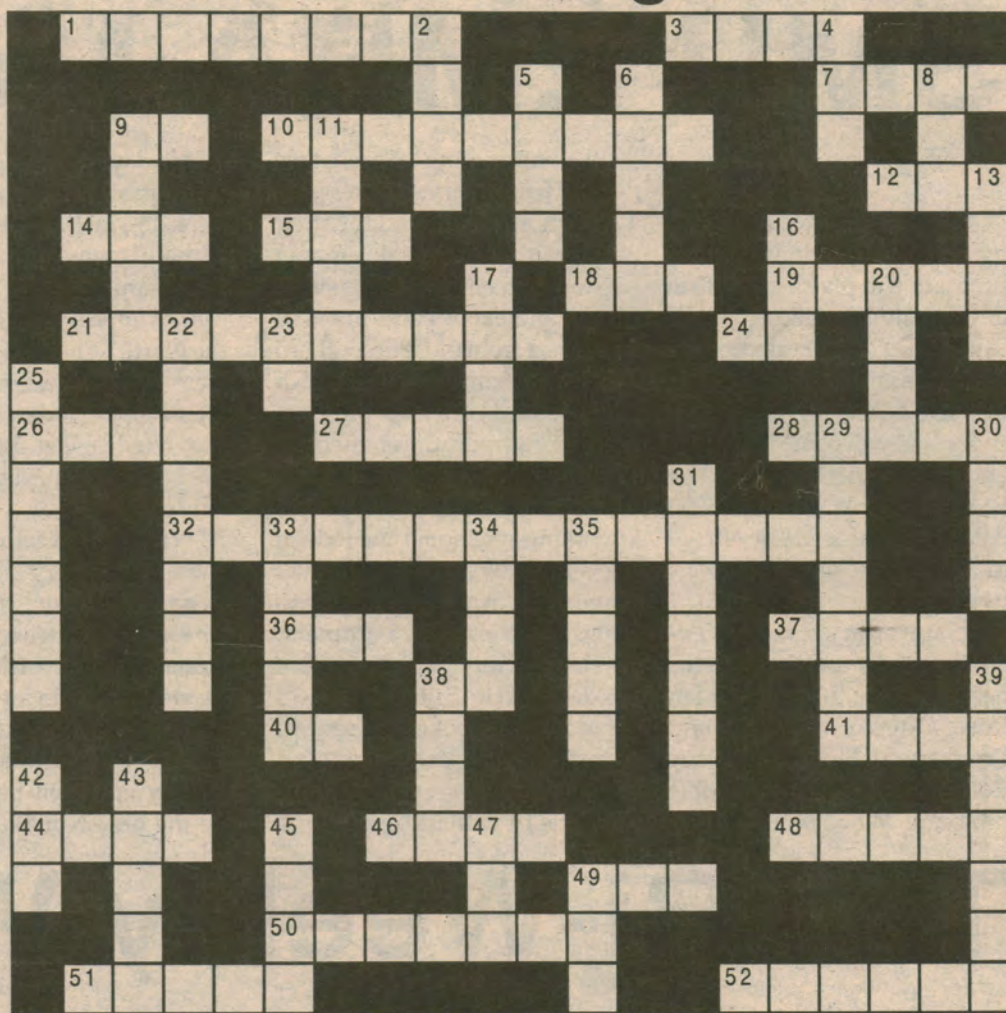

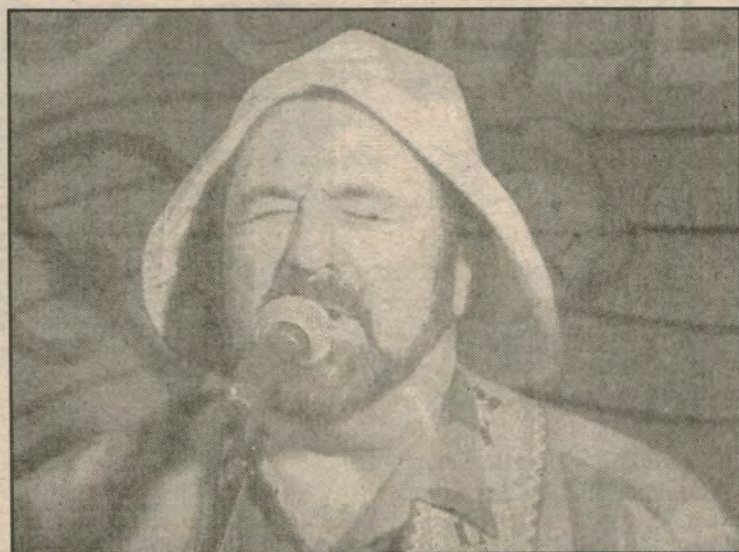


PAUL JACKSON OF THE PAUL JACKSON BLUES BAND

It is a more dancey album with a couple of live selections as well. "The Horrible People" is an intense remix of the first single from *Antichrist Superstar* (1996), "The Beautiful People." It's a good remix. The second track, "The Tourniquet Prosthetic Dance Mix" is not much of a dance song, but the beat is a bit faster and louder than the original, "Tourniquet." I like the original better. "Tourniquet" was remixed by Manson and Sean Beaven, who has worked with Nine Inch Nails in the past.

The live tracks follow with, "Dried Up, Tied and Dead to the World", which was recorded in Utica, NY. It sounds pretty good live. "Antichrist Superstar" is the other live track. The guitar in this song is thick yet smooth. It's a little different from the album version, whereas "Dried up..." was almost the same. The last song on the remix album has a title with meaning. "Man That You Fear (Acoustic Requiem for Antichrist Superstar)" is an acoustic, as it says, version of "The Man That You Fear." If you have ever listened to the album *Antichrist Superstar* and paid close attention to the lyrics, you would find that it is almost autobiographical. Marilyn Manson never dubbed himself the Antichrist - the media did.

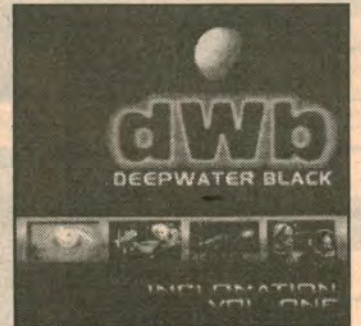
The Inbreds

The Inbreds are a boisterous duo who migrated East to Halifax from their original nesting ground, Kingston, Ont. Since their move, they have joined the ever popular Murderecords label. The first release since their inception into Haligonian is nothing as homicidal as the label insinuates. This release is the "Moustache" single. A clear red platter exactly 7 inches in diameter and 45 revolutions per minute.

The A side, "Moustache", is a prodigiously clever coupling of sweetness and sincerity undermined by easily empathized insecurity. The sweet tune and unblemished vocal timbre only makes one sigh a little louder. The real lump gets lodged profoundly in throat with the flip side's "Reason Why I'm Shy." This track can be found on the LP "It's Sydney or the Bush" in its full arrangement, but this 7" captures an acoustic version with the lovely lilt of a voice primed for demo action. 1997 also saw the release of another single on Summershine Records. This one featuring "Yelverton Hill," a song that falls into what one might call a patented O'Neill-ism: danceable sadness.

The reverence continues on side 2 with a cover of the Everly Brothers' "Cathy's Clown." The song is glorious in its own rights, and perhaps nobody will ever be able to meet the standards set by Phil and Don, but dang, do those Inbreds ever come close.

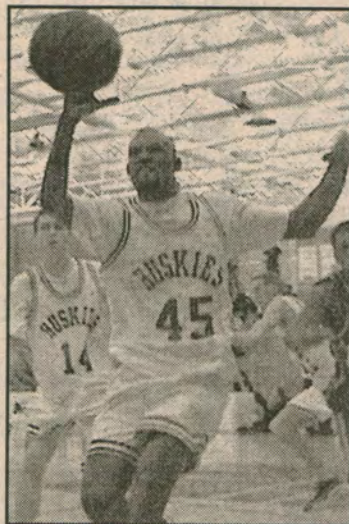
Thomas' offensive output, "he had a great game and did an incredible job shooting."

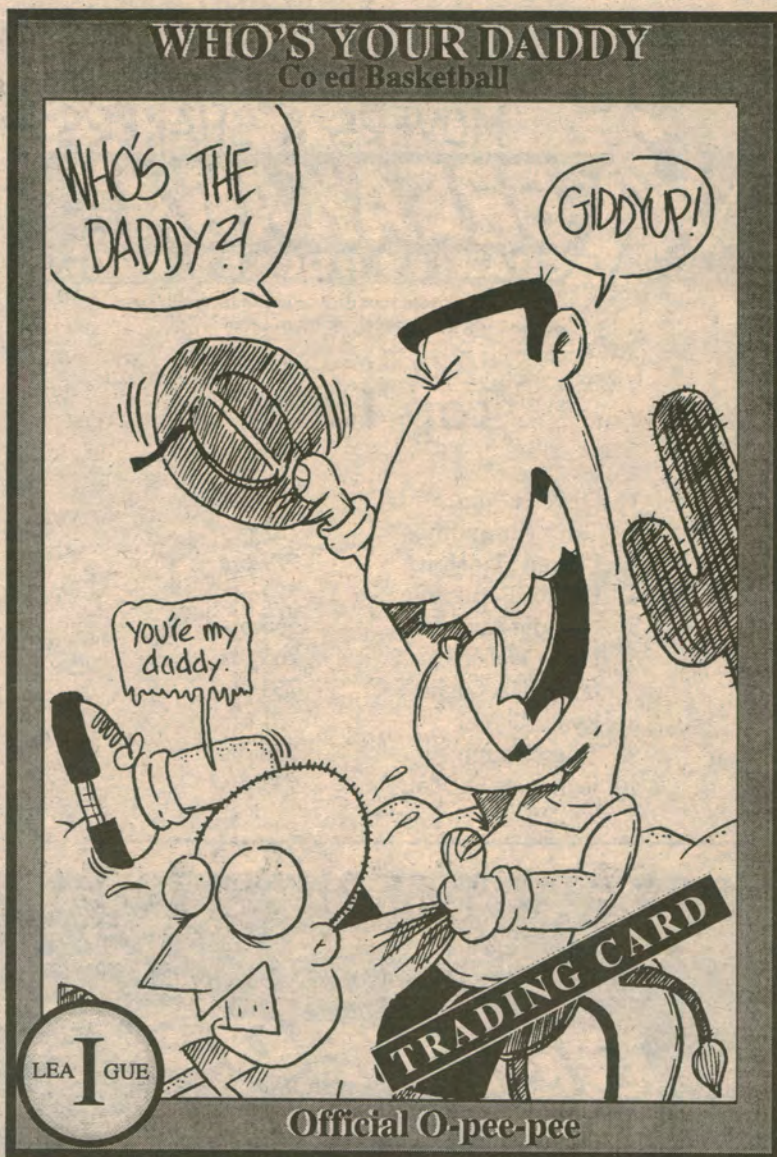
