Dr. Ozmon receives Award for Excellence

In his last year as Saint Mary's University President, Dr. Kenneth L. Ozmon is still working hard at making this school the best it can be. At ceremonies held on Monday, November 22, in Ottawa, Dr. Ozmon received the Canadian Bureau for International Education (CBIE) Award for Excellence in Internationalization. These award ceremonies attracted international delegates from across the globe and various professionals from within the international education community. Representatives were present from colleges, universities and government agencies dealing with international study programs. Students, International Student Advisors, International Liason Officers, Education Abroad Officers, Presidents and Vice Presidents were all be in attendance. There was also a large contingent of representatives from Latin America and the Carribean communities from within Ottawa.


The CBIE is the only national organization that is dedicated to international education. This program encourages the free movement of ideas and students across national boundaries. CBIE is a Canadian leader in student issues relevant to international students, and is known for its excellent work in establishing scholarships for students from abroad. One of the main goals of this organization is to keep leaders in both the academic and political worlds abreast of the issues pertaining to international studies. CBIE consists of 110 colleges and universities, as well as corporate partners, government, and individuals. Forging strategic links between individuals, organizations, and academic institutions remains one of the founding functions of this pro-

Saint Mary's has been in-

volved in international education for a long time. Dr. Ozmon has helped bring this university into the top ten most "internationalized" universities in the country. Many students travel from other countries to attend Saint Mary's and every effort is made to ensure these students get the most out of there education. Projects in Asia, South America, Eastern Europe, and Africa have been major areas of focus for SMU's staff and faculty. This university also has the Extension Program in the Gambia. This offers university education to students of the Gambia, right at home.

In fact, one of the reasons that Dr. Ozmon received the Award of Excellence is due to the fact that international enrollment at Saint Mary's has more than doubled in the past four years. This is an amazing feat in itself, but is even more remarkable when looking at national trends. This growth rate of international enrolment at Saint Mary's comes during a time when it appears that Canada as a whole is losing ground as an option for international students. Recent studies have shown that while the number of students studying abroad has increased, Canada's number has decreased. Saint Mary's, however, has remained a strong torce in attracting students from other countries to study

Dr. Ozmon has a long record of international involvement. He is a member of the Association of Universities and Colleges in Canada's Standing Advisory Committee on International Relations, a member of the Executive Committee of the Canada-Sweden Business Association, and a member of the Board of Governors of the Pearson Peacekeeping Centre, to name a few. Since coming to Saint Mary's in 1979, Dr. Ozmon has also been presented with the Order of Canada.

Health Services: They've got what you need to feel better

This time of year, many students begin to feel a little under the weather. Be it exam burnout or that flu your roommate gave you, your body just isn't working the way it should. Don't worry; there's help. Saint Mary's University's Health Services offers a wide array of assistance, be it information, shots, or prescriptions.

Located on the fourth floor of the Student Union Building, Health Services is there for the well being of the entire university community. Students, faculty, and staff are all welcome to partake in what Health Services has to offer. But, "Students come first," says Jane Collins, RN. She knows that class schedules, part-time jobs, and homework are large parts of each students' day, so she does what she can to make sure that these scholars can see someone if they are not feeling 100 per cent.

The office is open Monday through Friday, from 8am to approximately 6pm. Doctors are present each day, with the exception of Monday and Wednesday mornings. Drs. Glazebrook, Lewington, Trager, MacDougall, Lee, and Humphrey alternate days to ensure there is someone there as much as possible.


There is a wide variety of services available. The doctors and nurse can administer Tylenol, the Emergency Contraceptive Pill, birth control, blood work, HIV and other sexually transmitted disease (STD) tests, cholesterol checks, allergy shots, take your blood

pressure, and pretty much anything else that concerns the average student. Condoms are available, if students request them. And there is also pre-natal care and information, as well as care after the baby is born. As some students are not completely comfortable with Western medicine, Health Services offers information on the best alternative medicines and where to find them.

As for accessibility, "I have an open door policy," maintains Collins. There is generally a day or two wait after making an appointment, but if a student needs the doctor or nurse right away, they will do their best to fit them in. Collins is also on call from 6pm to 7am, in case anyone can't make it to the office during regular hours. This is also true for weekends.

Information is one of the biggest parts of Health Services. "We want to educate the students on how to stay healthy, not to just come here when they're sick," says Collins.

Students can, for example, be put in touch with dieticians to help them map out a plan for healthy eating. And there is different literature available in the office on almost any health topic. After all, prevention is the best medicine.


International development seminar



It's beginning to look a lot like e-Christmas

Over the past few years more and more people are shopping on-line. This Christmas forecasters are expecting anywhere between 5 and 8 billion dollars, that's US dollars across North America. Highend predictions top the \$12 billion mark.

Figures for the week of November 15-21 were nearly \$300 million, which was up about 6 percent from the prior week, for North American sales. Not surprisingly, most of these sales were toys. It seems that consumers are slowly warming up to the idea of shopping on-line. Internet sales are up roughly 230 percent when compared to last year's figures.

This growth rate has many mall owners feeling very threatened. The more people that shop via the internet, the fewer who are traveling to the malls. Although store owners don't mind the increase in online sales, because they are still getting the sales whether they are in store or on-line. Mall owners are, however, feeling this directly. The rent that stores pay to have a store in a mall is usually directly proportionate to sales by the individual stores.

This means that fewer people are making the trip to the mall to shop, which means sales to brick and mortar stores are down, and thus mall owners don't receive as much for rent revenue.

Some mall owners have taken this fear to the extreme. One in particular, a mall in St. Louis has sent out notices that stores aren't permitted to advertise or display promoting e-commerce. This is, so far, the first mall company to introduce such a policy. Most retail-

ers within the mall are merely ignoring this new policy, but one is proceeding with legal action against the mall owner.

"This is such a dinosaur attitude. The mall owners have to deal with that in a more intelligent and rational way," said one retailer at the mall. "This (e-commerce) isn't going to go away."

Other malls across North America are responding to the threat in less hostile ways. The Christmas season is usually accented by malls creative ways to draw customers through their doors, but this year they are partly motivated by fear.

Some malls have created wish-lists, which closely mimic the wish-lists that originated on some online shopping sites. Shoppers can fill out lists provided by the mall by checking off item, size, col-

our and model number. Another mall is offering a very unique service this Christmas – an on site psychic, who can select gifts for especially hard to please people on your list.

Most mall owner's are reluctant to admit any such fears, but retail analysts say that the rush to put up Christmas decorations shows that they are feeling the pressure from online shoppers. Their fears are also shown by the earlier than ever mark-downs in the ground-based stores.

There are upsides to shopping online. For example, you can do it sitting at home in your underwear if you like. Other attributes of doing your Christmas shopping at home is being able to avoid all of the parking hassles and the customer service nightmares.

There are, however, several downsides. One of the main

problems that I foresee deals with returning items that you don't want. Another problem, for me anyway, is not being able to just browse around and hope that through some sort of inspiration a gift idea comes to me. Stocking stuffers also creates a problem when trying to avoid the mall by shopping using your mouse. As of yet, it is not economical to sell novelty items that only cost a few dollars.

Besides these pitfalls, the first and foremost problem with online shopping at Christmas time deals with the whole issue of Christmas spirit. While sitting in front of your keyboard you can't hear the instrumental Christmas music, battle the throngs of shoppers, see the festive decorations, or visit Santa. It just wouldn't be Christmas.



stepped in front of the crowd. Even the band winced in pain at the level at which the screams had escalated.

The band, which neither look, nor act fifteen while on stage, put on a good show. Guitarist Ryan Stever flew across the stage periodically, nodding to countless fans and even 'saluted' the Muchmusic camera, which filmed segments of the performance. The sound of the music was a little heavier than I had anticipated. They somewhat resembled Rage Against the Machine, minus ten years and the political lyrics. Their screaming guitar solos, impressive drum beats and clever bass riffs demonstrated that they know their stuff.

The Cohn is designed for concerts, not rock shows. The mosh pit posed a dilemma for fans, security and the band alike. This problem could have been avoided had the show been held at a more suitable venue, such as the McInnes Room at Dalhousie, where there is more room and no chairs to restrict the fans' movement close to the stage.

When the band finally played their big hit, "Mistake", the crowd erupted louder than ever before. They danced and sang along with the chorus, which saved the song, as Dennis' upper range seems to have been reduced due to his deepening voice. The show's highlight was when a masked dancer made his way to the stage. He did this twice - once during "Skid Row", where he proceeded to pump up the crowd, and secondly, when he danced around, playing with the bras and panties that were hurled at the band throughout the




