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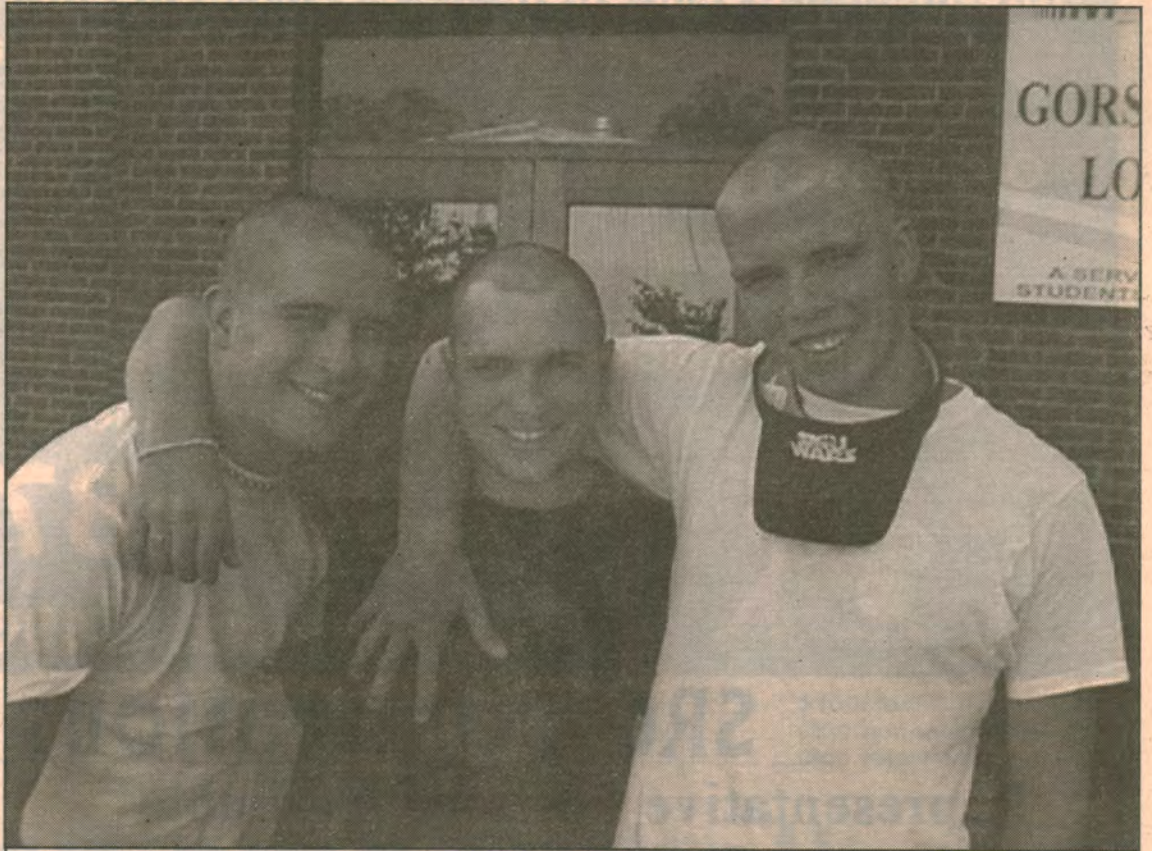

A new type of dousing rod

Where people used forked sticks, pennies on a string or some other type of dousing tool, scientists are now using rockets and satellites to look for water. More specifically, water in space. Using Russian rocketry and Canadian Ingenuity, Dr. George Mitchell and Dr. Nick Tothill of the Astronomy and Physics Department are conducting research on the outskirts of our atmosphere. They are not alone, working with astronomers from around the globe they have launched the first satellite that Canada has played a major role in designing, constructing and operating.

Helping the Canadian astronomers is the Canadian Space Agency (CSA), who has invested over \$15-million to help supply them with hardware and software for the satellite. Funding was also received in August from the Natural Science and Engineering Research Council (NSERC) that will assist the team by employing student researchers to study data from

the Odin Mission.

Quoting from a press release from the University, Dr. Mitchell said "Participation in this project means a real boost to the research taking place in the Department of Astronomy and Physics at Saint Mary's. The publications which will come from the Odin observations will enhance the standing of our Department in the national and international arenas." Continuing from Dr. Mitchell, Dr. Tothill stated, "Canada is part of the international consortium that owns and runs the James Clerk Maxwell Telescope in Hawaii, which is one of the leading observatories in the world in the study of interstellar gas. Canada will also be involved with the Atacama Large Millimeter Array, which will be built in the next decade, and will transform our understanding of this field of research. Odin is complementary to these facilities, and will keep Canada in the forefront of international research into one of the most fundamental questions we can ask - where

we come from, and how did we get here?"

Like most things in scientific research, Odin serves two purposes: one is examining the physics and chemistry of the upper atmosphere, paying particular attention to the ozone, the other half will be spent looking into space. Examining the clouds of gas and dust that accumulate in space will be it's main objective. Known as the Interstellar Medium, these clouds are the birthplace of stars and planets and could possibly lead to discoveries about our own solar system. Why not just examine space from the surface of the earth? Dr. Mitchell explains: "The signals we are looking for have sub millimeter wavelengths and cannot be detected from the surface of the earth."

Based on theoretical calculations, oxygen and water should make up a major part of the elemental oxygen in the clouds. Due to the Earth's atmosphere

Saint Mary's and the Atlantic School of Theology (AST) recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for a formal affiliation relationship.

While these neighbors will maintain their independence, the goal is to create an institute for applied ethics, human rights and public policy, and also theological and secular programs.

Dr. Colin Dodds, President of Saint Mary's was noted as saying "this is an exciting time for both Saint Mary's and AST. This is a far-reaching, innovative and exciting step in an affiliate relationship with AST and has come after more than two years of discussion between our two

universities".

"This is a wonderful arrangement in collaboration with Saint Mary's University", said Rev. Dr. William J. Close, programming for our students in the future, as well will solve a number of outstanding issues for AST at the same time".

This new relationship has been created to promote academic programs, accomplish operational efficiencies, and optimize usage of respective facilities.

Both will be pursuing possible joint co-operation and operational efficiencies in areas including library services, residences, food services, and the purchasing of goods and services. There will now also be a non-voting Saint Mary's member on the AST Board of Governors.

Gold medal winner new Vice- President

Dr. Terry Murphy graduated from Saint Mary's University in the spring of 1968. He always thought he would come back to us, and on July 1, 2001, he became the new Vice-President Academics and Research.

"It has always been a dream of mine to return to my

alma mater. As a graduate of Saint Mary's, I feel a deep attachment to the University and place a high premium on the things for which it stands: accessibility to all students with the ability and desire to succeed, responsiveness to both the local and global communities, and a humane and supportive environment for students, staff, and faculty", he says.

Dr. Murphy began his teaching career at Memorial University in St. John's, in 1975. He was the Chair of the Religious Studies Department from 1986 until 1993 and for most of the 1990s he was the Dean of Arts.

As quoted from a press release, Dr. Murphy graduated from Saint Mary's

University with a Bachelor of Arts and also received the Gold Medal in Arts and the Governor General's Medal for academic excellence.

He earned his Masters of Arts in Theology from Fordham University of Newcastle-Upon-Tyne.

"My goal is to lead the Saint Mary's community as it sharpens and articulates its academic vision for the future. The key things are to keep its core values alive in a changing environment and to expand and grow strategically. Saint Mary's has specific advantages and distinctive traits which sets it apart from other universities and it is well placed to capitalize on the strengths" he says.

External Affairs wins big

Chuck Bridges, the director of External Affairs at Saint Mary's University was presented one of the highest honors by the Canadian Council for the Advancement of Education (CCAЕ), Canada's leading national organization devoted to fostering university advancement.

The Distinguished Service Award was given to Mr. Bridges at the annual CCAЕ Conference, held in Montreal Quebec.

Serge Brasset, CCAЕ President, said that "Chuck is being recognized for dedicating his time and energy to furthering the goals of CCAЕ and for his

contribution to the many individuals who have benefited personally and professionally from his commitment to the organization".

Bridges says, "The award recognizes Saint Mary's University's efforts in helping higher education a top priority locally and nationally".

Chuck also says that "it is a pleasure to be recognized by my (his) colleagues and peers, those who also demonstrate their dedication and commitment to the national organization which is driven on increasing public awareness of the issues that face Canada's post-secondary institutions".

CCAЕ is volunteer-based organization with more than

1,000 members representing over 100 Canadian colleges, universities and CEGEPs.

Bridges received his Master of Business Administration (MBA) from Saint Mary's, and is currently the Chair of Saint Mary's University Bi-Centennial Celebration Committee (1802-2002). He is also the Secretary of the University's Policies and Priorities Committee, is a member of the Government and Corporate Affairs Committee of the Board, as well as Board of Directors of Neptune Theatre, Halifax, Nova Scotia.

Mr. Bridges has been the Director of External Affairs since 1989, and since 1996 has been a Lecturer for the Department of Management (The Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce).

Saint Mary's has a very large percentage of its' student body that are from outside of Canada. This being true, there are a few rules, guidelines and

a bit of advice for all of our international students wanting to stay and work in Canada after they graduate. While this may not be a complete list it will hopefully clear up a few misconceptions

and general misinformation floating around.

Starting at the beginning, many people do not know that tuition is very expensive for foreign students. Though it is very expensive, it does not include a work visa or a permanent resident status and does not guarantee one after

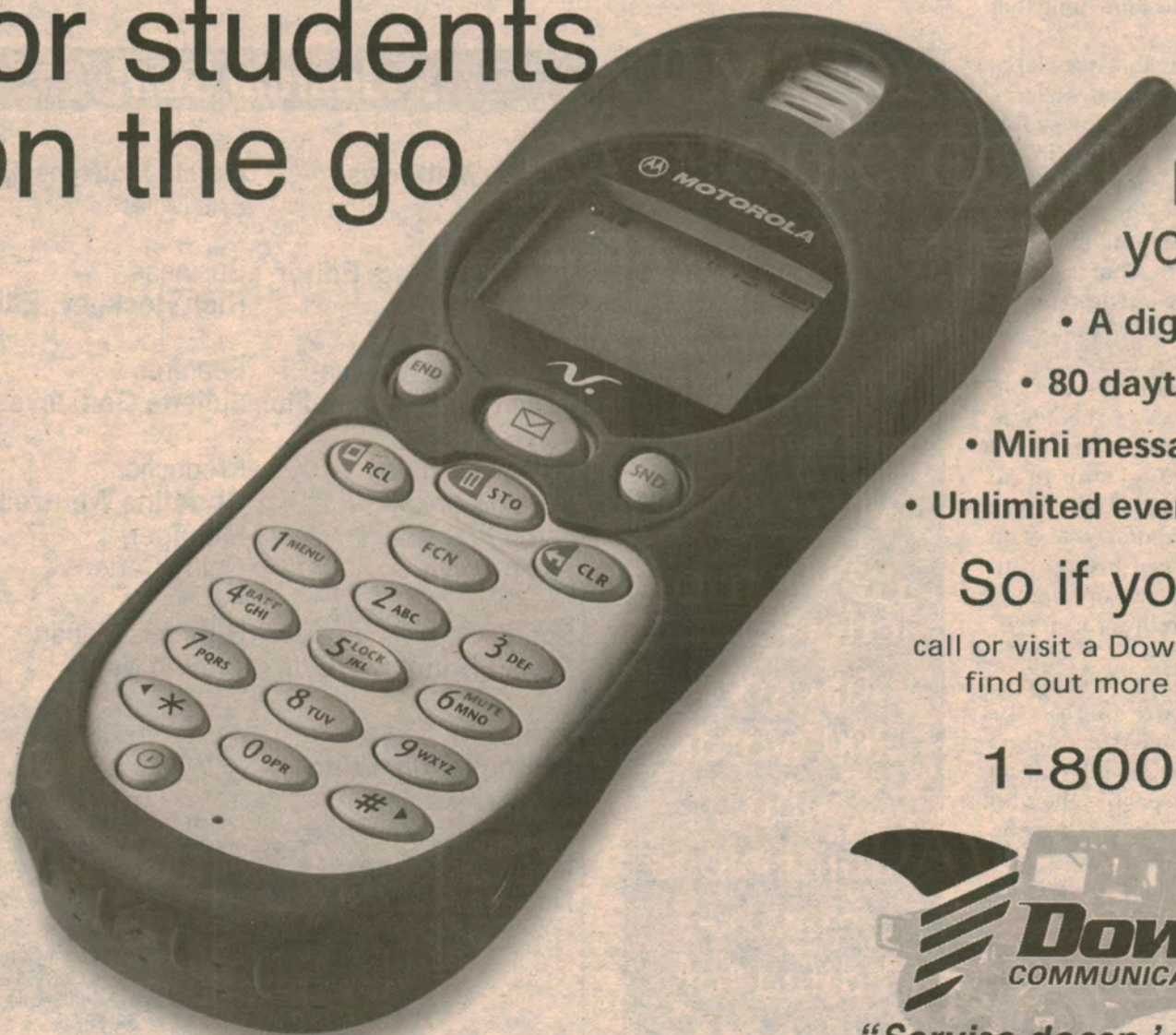
graduation. Citizenship and Immigration Canada are constantly changing and refining the immigration regulations and hopefully in the future, international students will be able to apply for residence while they are going to school.

After graduation many

international students apply for permanent residence, but to do that they must have one full year of work experience in their occupation of study or that they plan on continuing after granted residence. This

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SRC campaign to start on September 17th, 2001

It's that time of year again: students running for SRC (Students' Representative Council) positions. The following positions are available:

- representative for Engineering students
- representative for Freshman students
- representative for Graduate students
- representative for Part-time students
- representative for Science students
- representative for Residence students

The student who runs for each representative position must be enrolled in that faculty.

Nominations are presently open and will close at 5:00 p.m. on Friday, September 15th, and from September 17th - 21st the nominees will campaign vigorously in efforts to win a spot in the student government. Voting will take place on September 24th and 25th.

Members of the Students' Representative Council comprise the governing body of SMUSA, and agree on policies and regulations for the Association. They take

concerns from the students that they represent, to the SMUSA executive, and also take information from SMUSA to their students.

The various tasks that can be carried out by the SRC include, in accordance with the Students' Representative Council Handbook:

- approving the SMUSA budget and administering some of SMUSA Funds
- making appointments to SMUSA and SMU committees
- amending the SMUSA Bylaws to change the procedures used by Council, commissions, committees

- setting SMUSA policies on various issues like tuition fees, funding for education, and SMU and government policies, with the use of policy statements

- approving important SMUSA contracts, and passing motions regarding the management of SMUSA businesses

- approving the operations manuals of SMUSA Student Services and appointing their coordinators

The Council meets every three weeks in the SMUSA offices in the Student Centre. Special meetings are held by

the President if: it is considered necessary; if a majority of the SRC request one; or if a bona fide petition is submitted to the president requesting such a meeting. In the case of a bona fide petition, it must be signed by at least ten percent of the members of SMUSA.

Being a member of the Students' Representative Council is an opportunity to be a part of the decisions that positively affect the student body. It also gives experience in leadership and good communication skills.

It's the Student Centre, NOT the SUB

In 1962, Collins House, part of the original estate on whose land the current campus now stands, was torn down to make way for the construction of the new Student Centre.

In 1966 the Saint Mary's University Students' Association is incorporated.

In 1967 the Student Centre opened.

The Saint Mary's University Students' Association offices are located in the Student Centre (5th Floor), along with the Bookstore (2nd Floor), the International Student Centre

(3rd Floor), the Atlantic Centre (3rd Floor), Health Services (4th Floor), the Employment Centre (4th Floor), Travel Cuts (5th Floor) and the Gorsebrook Lounge (Ground Floor). There are many other valuable services offered to students on the floors of this building which was named after Rev. M.J. O'Donnell, S.J., and Rev. J.J. Hennessey, S.J., as the O'Donnell-Hennessey Student Centre.

In the rise of the student movement during the 1960s students formed student unions and lobbied for many of the issues that students lobby for today, including

more funding for education, reduced tuition, and equality in education regardless of an individual's class, race or gender, etc. The students at Saint Mary's, active in the student movement formed the Saint Mary's University Students' Association (SMUSA), incorporated as such in 1966 by a special act of the Nova Scotia House of Assembly.

SMUSA acts as the official representative voice of the students attending Saint Mary's University, whether you are a full-time student or a part-time student. Every registered student, paying

student fees is therefore considered a member of SMUSA. This gives you the right to vote in all SMUSA elections and referenda, to run for office, and to work for SMUSA.

Aside from the political side of SMUSA, the Students' Association offers a number of services to the students of Saint Mary's. These services include: The Information Desk located in the Student Centre, the Games Room and Gorsebrook Lounge, the Marketing Department, Functions, Student Health Plan (for full-time students), and Husky Patrol. Our

Marketing Department staff produces the Student Handbook (available at the Information Desk for \$2), the monthly Bulletin and the Yearbook, the

Santamarian. We also offer students an easy and free way to complete their taxes through the Quick Tax Freedom program. You can find out more about SMUSA by visiting our offices on the fifth-floor of the Student Centre, through our website at <http://www.smusa.ca>, or call 496-8700.

Dr. Janet Gregory voted Professor of the Year

First-rate professor Dr. Janet Gregory has been voted the University's top professor of the year by alumni, students and faculty. The Associate Professor of Finance and Management Science, Dr. Gregory has received the Reverend William A. Stewart, S.J., Medal for Excellence in Teaching. It is awarded annually to a Saint Mary's faculty member who has made an outstanding contribution to the education of SMU students.

"I was particularly pleased to receive this award as I have been nominated by my students", she said. She continued on to say: "There is nothing I enjoy seeing more than students become excited about what they're learning. I've always loved to learn new things myself. Teaching gives me the opportunity to share my enthusiasm for learning with my students in many different ways." One student said that Dr. Gregory is "a great role model as a woman in science who has made the choices to serve her students while treasuring her family". All are in agreement that she is a professor who is genuinely committed to each student's individual success. Her in depth understanding of broad science areas allows her to help students have a good understanding themselves of her course material. She has a strong sense of dedication and enthusiasm for her fast paced high technology subject area. Another student says: "Dr.

Gregory is the full package. She has a relentless desire to educate young minds. Similar to the elite athlete, she is able to use many ideas and techniques to achieve the desired goal. She is able to instill a sense of ownership in her teaching so that students want to be in her classes." A former colleague from Saint Mary's University who is now the president of a college in the United States, says "Now, there's a teacher. Her colleagues seek her out for counsel, her students flock to her for advice and mentoring and her graduates repeatedly return to regale her with stories from their classes with her and to make her proud hearing of their accomplishments which were in no small part due to her teaching and mentoring".

In 1970, Dr. Gregory graduated from the University of Waterloo with a Bachelor of Applied Science in Electrical Engineering. In 1972 she graduated from Dalhousie University with a Master of Science degree from the Department of Physiology and Biophysics, which was followed by a Bachelor of Education degree. In 1985, she was awarded a Ph.d. with distinction from the Department of Physiology and Biophysics at Dalhousie University, which is a rarity. Dr. Gregory was the Chairperson of the Department of Finance and Management Science, as well as the Associate Dean of Commerce. She has been a member of various University committees such as the Senate, Faculty, the

Presidential Computer Policy Committee, and the EMBA Council.

Credit for the development and continuing

success of the Novell Netware network laboratory belongs to Dr. Gregory. Windows NT 4.0 server and Linux have since been added

to the network.

means that they cannot apply if they have been working in a low-skilled or entry-level job. International students who have graduated can apply for Employment Authorization, allowing them to work for one year with no option for renewal. Student must involve eight to twelve month programs and they must obtain a job within 90 days of Notification of Graduation. This is a significant increase from 60 days. Furthermore it does not apply to positions held before graduation.

While the employment requirements are rather strict the residence is not. International students can apply for permanent status before the one-year is up.

Another important aspect of qualifying for working in Canada is picking the correct occupation. Currently those international students in the skilled-work/independent class category must choose an occupation in the Canadian General Occupation List. If the occupation is not on this list the applicant will not be considered for assessment. Programs in engineering, computer science, business,

accounting, finance and social work have an easier getting their status then those in arts degrees.

These are just a few guidelines and pieces of professional advice submitted to the Journal. Due to the fact that the General Occupations List dates back to 1993 and is horribly out of date, there is still talk of replacing it or getting rid of it all together but nothing has ever materialized. This would be a smart move on the part of the government as most people change occupations many times during their time in the workforce. This would immensely help many internationals receive their status.

When considering a move to a new country for an education it is a very good idea to consult a professional immigration lawyer before you start. These lawyers have a specialty in the laws and practices of the government where you will be studying. Too many great international students haven't been able to receive their status because of misconception and rumor. I hope that this will clear up some of those.

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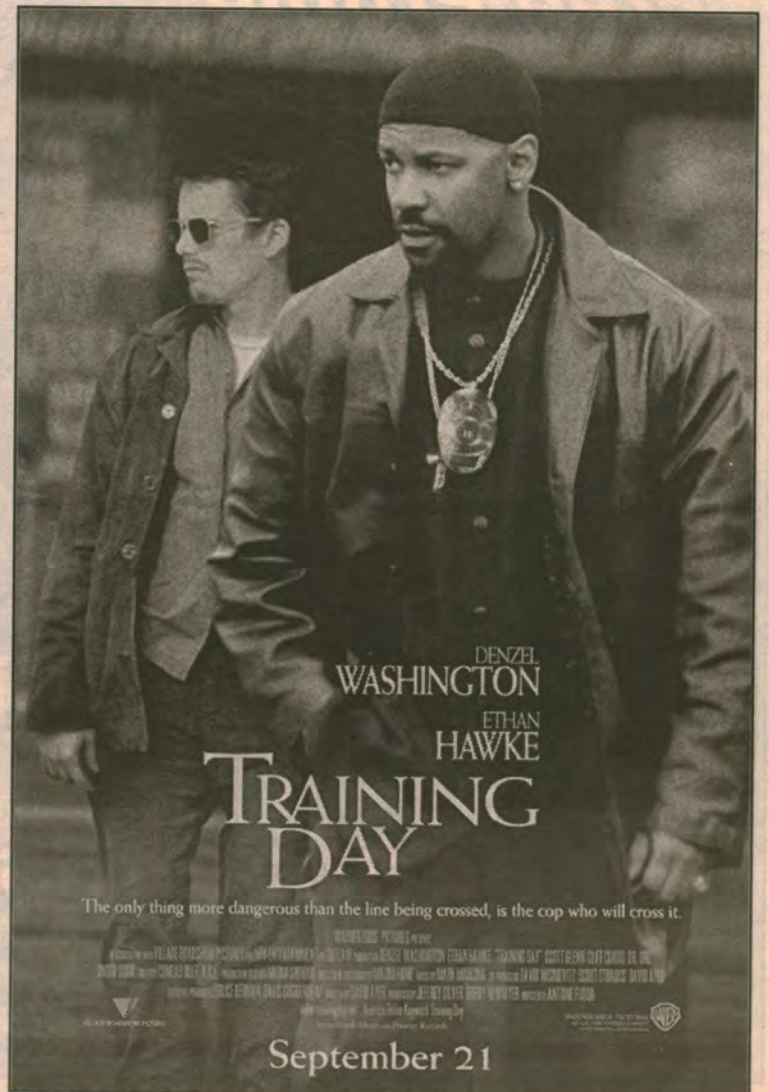

I am not saying that everyone you see on campus with a cold sore has herpes, but just try to keep that contact above the belt.



This summer I was fortunate to visit the cinemas frequently to see some really cool summer flicks. Amongst the *Rush Hours*, *Final Fantasies* and *Summer Catches*, (yes, this is a decent movie), there is *American Pie 2*. This is probably my favorite movie for this summer. Part of what made this movie so good is the up-beat soundtrack that drives it.

The opening credits of the movie are escorted by the fresh, flip and fast tunes of Blink 182 so it is only appropriate that Blink lead as the opening track on the album. They set the mood for the movie and the album, funny and in your face. Well, as in-your-face as pop-punk can be. The album itself picks up where Blink left off with Green Day throwing in their two cents and two chords. Come to think of it, a lot of the bands on this soundtrack are very up beat and rocking. This is great except for the fact that most of them sound the same. There are some exceptions though; Uncle Cracker contributes "Split This Room In Half" which is a nice change of pace. A hip-hop melody done like only the Kid Rock protégé can do.

The rest of the artists are band camp rejects who threw away their trumpets and flutes only to pick up their electric guitars and learned a

few chords. This is not true to the whole album as 3 Doors Down clearly shows. They replaced their original lyrics for "Be Like That" to fit the movie better. The new version has also been released as AP2's first single of the soundtrack. Looking at the liner notes I noticed a lot of good bands like American Hi-Fi, Canada's own Sum 41, Uncle Cracker, Blink 182 and Alien Ant Farm. To me the most disappointing aspect of the soundtrack is the Alien Ant Farm song, "Good". My only question is, "What the hell is it doing on the soundtrack"? In the movie, AAF contributed a rendition of Michael Jackson's "Smooth Criminal". It's a great song that belongs on the album yet it was axed off the soundtrack and replaced with "Good". A very disappointing move since that was probably the best song and "Good" wasn't even in the movie.

As an added bonus, the CD is an interactive disk which, upon inserting into your computer, will allow you to see the trailer, go to the web page and look at stills from the movie. It's not a big deal but it gives the CD a little extra worth. As a final note I recommend this album to anyone who is into a nice mix of modern music. From punk-pop to rock-pop, this album has it all.

Deep

Virtually unknown to the Canadian mass market, Thrust has been in the rap game for over ten years. For most of his career, Thrust has been highly respected among producers and hardcore hip-hop heads. Thrust was initially recognized, and is widely regarded, as having some of the best freestyle flows around. However, in the past few years Thrust's game has been elevated. Opening for such high profile acts as the Fugees, the Roots, and Goodie Mob, performing with Kardinal Offishall, Choclair and others from the Canadian rap elite (most prominently on the track "Northern Touch") has given Thrust the respect that he is due.

Easily the best track on the album, "Pen and a Pad feat. Frankenstein" drives me to pop this into my player again and again. The track has a dope static noise fade, with hyper repetitive emergency Morse code beeps as the main riff.

For tracks 4 ("This is For Sure feat. Divine Earth Essence"), 5 ("The Chosen are Few feat. Kardinal Offishall"), and 6 ("This N' That feat. Choclair"). One needs to be truly lifted to enjoy. Track 4 is



reminiscent of a Timbaland/Dre breakdown. Track 5 has a direct snoop coil sample slowed down, but this is where we can hear some of Thrust's freestyle abilities. Track 6 eases the listener into the rest of the album.

Thrust has a very Biggy Smalls sounding voice, but without the rhymes that give you an epiphany during your first listen. "The Chosen are Few" is a good solid album, with Thrust showcasing the overall rise of talent in the Canadian rap game delivering some very solid tracks. For the hip hop heads out there yearning for some Canadian, no Toronto flava, pick it up. For everyone else it's a "listen to your friend's and see if you like it deal".

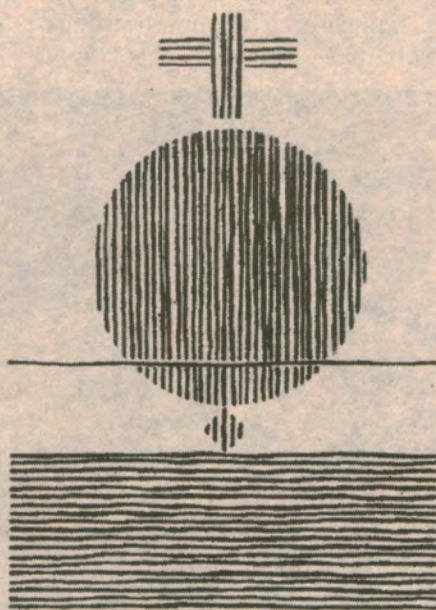
An evening with Choclair

expected with the Huskies aces in the game. In fact, the majority of the quarter had passed before SMU pivot, Ryan Jones, hooked up with favorite target Patrick Thibeault for a 12-yard

touchdown reception. In the second quarter, however, the floodgates opened and the Huskies showed what their potential really was. Jones - perhaps knowing that his time in this game was nearly up - concisely marched down the field and capped the drive with a 15-yard pass to Thibeault to put the SMU in front 14-0. The X-men offense sputtered after the ensuing kick off and in fact the Huskie defense forced a safety to put SMU up 16-0. After the safety punt, the Huskies again walked down the field and scored as Jones connected with Jason Currie for a 27-yard score. Then the defense went to work. Both Denis Arruda and Philippe Roberge returned interceptions in excess of 40-yards for touchdowns. Soon after, Jason Currie found pay dirt for the second time in the game as this time backup quarterback Steve Panella lead the receiver from 39-yards out to the score. Add into the mix a missed field goal single point and a

successful field goal, both by kicker Chris Breckenridge, and you have a total of 41 points in a time span of under ten minutes. Make the score at halftime SMU 48, St. F.X. 0.

The third quarter saw Huskie rookie running back Les Mullings break a 45-yard run just two minutes in to continue the route. The X-Men, however, had no intentions of being shut out and they found the end zone for the first time in the game soon after as St FX quarterback J.R. Gallant hooked up with Craig Fougere for a 35-yard major. Chris Breckenridge added three more as he nailed his second field goal of the game making the score after three quarters 58-7.

The game ended after a relatively quiet fourth quarter which saw each team score a touchdown courtesy of a quarterback sneak (St FX, however, missed their PAT conversion) to make the final 65-13 in favour of the 4th ranked Huskies.

This game had a little bit of everything in it from the Huskies perspective and as far as the big names were concerned they posted good numbers. 'Go-to' running back Louis Perez ran for 41 yards on 8 carries in a shortened game. Ryan Jones ended the day completing 8 of 11 passes for 106 yards with three touchdowns to just one interception. Those looking to show that they have skills to contribute include rookie running back Les Mullings who ran for 74 yards on six carries (including the aforementioned 45 yard touchdown run). Backup quarterback Steve Panella also showed himself to be capable of the load if needed, completing 6 of 11 passes for 95 yards and a touchdown. The defense also proved to be formidable as they forced four interceptions on way to holding the X-Men to under 250 yards of total

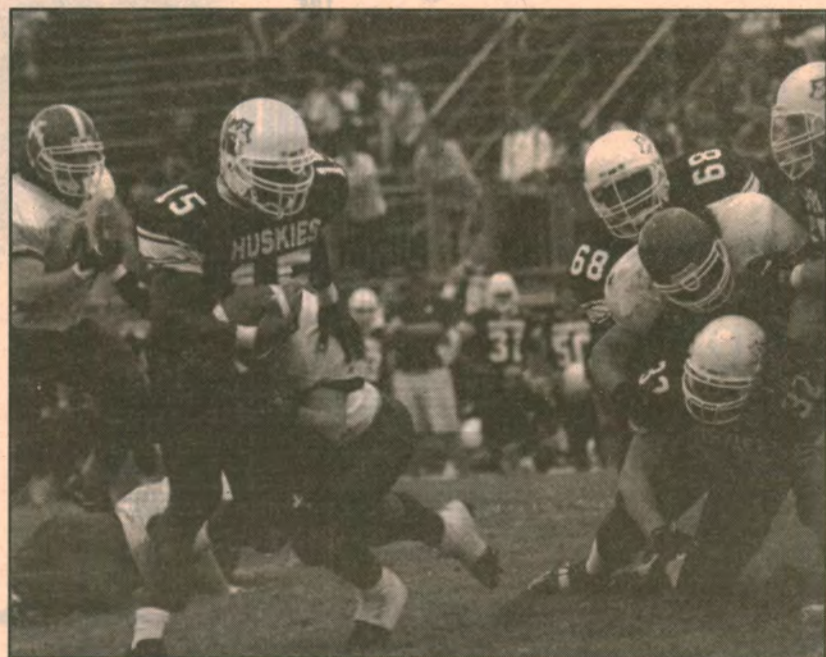
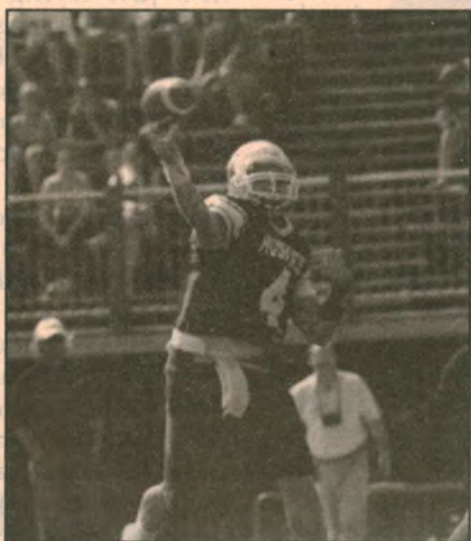
offense. In other action this week, the Acadia Axemen and the Mount Allison Mounties

Huskies itch for gold

With the men's soccer National Championships being held in Huskies Stadium this coming November, our Huskies are itching for the crown in front of the hometown crowd. This past weekend marked the start of the AUS season with SMU making their first road trip to Memorial. Prior to the games, I had the opportunity to sit down with assistant coach Jacques Boudreau and asked him a few questions about this upcoming season.

As we all know, the men's soccer team had a terrific season last year, keeping the regular season title away from the Dal Tigers and maintaining an outstanding record of 11 wins, 1 loss and 1 draw. SMU then went on to the National Championships where they dominated the first two games against McMaster and McGill. In the final game our Huskie's pride carried the men to a 1-1 draw against the Wilfrid Laurier Golden Hawks. The game went to penalties and the end result was a heartbreaking 6-5 loss.

Starting off this year the Huskies are more than ready to claim the national title in their hometown and they are working harder than ever to prepare. Assistant coach Jacques Boudreau is extremely confident in the team this year and he feels they will be very competitive. Apparently the entire team is returning with the exception of Jay Robinson, a 2000 all-star, and Ewan Lyttle, the team's starting midfielder. Although these players were important contributors and will be missed this year, the team is prepared to take on the nation without looking back.

I opened my interview with Jacques by asking if anymore pressure has been added to the team, knowing that they will be hosting Nationals and will have high expectation placed upon them. Jacques calmly replied "We wouldn't have requested the Nationals if we didn't think the team was ready for it. Yes, there will be pressure but we have a mature team who wants another chance at the title." With that in mind I asked how they have been training to prepare for this season compared to past years. Jacques assured me

that the team trains day in and day out working very hard on not only individual skills, but teamwork and mental skills as well. The team is excited to be hosting the nationals and hopes to have lots of support from SMU and the rest of Halifax.

One of the perks of hosting Nationals is that the hosting team automatically plays in the tournament. That factor alone relieves a lot of pressure from the team and helps them to focus on maintaining a healthy team. "One thing will be different this year. Players who get injured are given every advantage to recover as we don't need to peak until November. In the past we would often hurry someone's recovery in order to get them into the next possible game." Any athlete knows that an injury-free season in a team sport is rare and it is great advantage for the Huskies to be able to take good care of any injuries without worrying about their next games.

One of my last questions for Jacques concerned his thoughts on the competition our Huskies will face this season in the AUSC. He responded by informing me that UPEI has really shown improvement over the past year and that St. FX has a much more mature team. The Huskies have always had great games against Dal, and Jacques anticipates that this year will be no different.

So now the season has started and the team is committed one of their main goals for this fall, winning the title and showing the rest of Canada what the Huskies are made of. The quest for this goal began this past weekend when the men's soccer team traveled to Newfoundland to take on the Memorial Sea-Hawks. In the team's first

game of the weekend the team managed only a nil-nil draw with the Hawks on Saturday afternoon. Sunday the teams hooked up again with the second game of the series and this time it was the Huskies coming out on top with the final score SMU 4 MUN 0. It was also released earlier this week that Saint Mary's keeper Carlos Loureiro earned the nod as AUS male athlete of the week. Carlos recorded a pair of clean sheets during the road trip to Newfoundland and was a key component to the Huskies 4 point weekend. Carlos is in his final year of eligibility and this season is all about the unfinished business of last year for him.

The women's soccer team was also in action this weekend as they also traveled to the rock to play MUN. As in the men's first game, neither team was able to break through in game one and it ended as a nil-nil draw. Game two on Sunday afternoon saw our Huskies fall to the Sea-Hawks by a three-goal margin, make the final 3-0. This coming week proves to be a busy one for the Huskies as both the men and women play three times. First come the home opener for the soccer teams this Friday afternoon as Acadia rolls into town. The men take the field first at 3pm and the women follow immediately at 5pm. 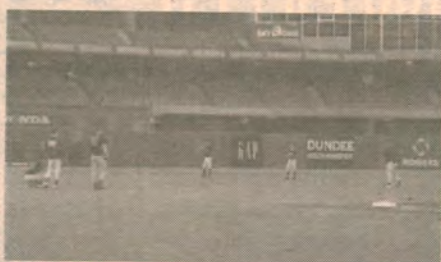

Famous Flynn among hall inductees

The Saint Mary's University Hall of Fame will induct three more players and another of our great teams into its hallowed halls this year. Three football standouts, Chris Flynn, Angelo Santucci and Elmer MacGillivray, along with the 1972-73 Hockey team are those who will be inducted later this year during a ceremony. This year's inductees will join an ever-growing list of members of the Saint Mary's University Hall of Fame that can be viewed at the second floor of the Tower.

Chris Flynn is arguably the single best-known football player in Saint Mary's history. No other player has a dynasty named after him, however, the "Flynn years" are the fondly remembered four year period from 1987-1990. During that period Flynn lead the Huskies to a regular season record of 27-2. Flynn re-wrote the CIAU record book in his time, setting records for passes in a season as well as in a career, along with the record for career rushing yards for a quarterback. During his tenure, Flynn was selected an All-Star four times as well as

being selected the All-Canadian quarterback three times. Flynn also won the Hec Creighton Trophy as the country's most valuable player three times. It often seems that the only award that escaped Flynn during his stay as a Huskie was the Vanier Cup, as despite playing for it on multiple occasions he was never able to win one.

Angelo Santucci was a running back for the Huskies during the successful period of the early 1970's. Santucci won the AUAA rookie of the year in his freshmen season in 1971, he was also elected a first team all star. The next year Santucci suffered a serious leg injury and missed the majority of the season. Angelo returned in 1973 to be a key component in the Huskies National Championship winning team of the same year. In fact in the AUAA championship game Santucci rushed for nearly 200 yards and in the CIAU championship game he scored what turned out to be a key touchdown against McGill to hand the Huskies the title.

Elmer MacGillivray was a


relatively small football player at 5'10", and only 170lbs. MacGillivray did however, more than made up for his lack of size with an abundance of heart. It was this heart and determination that made Elmer a force on the football field, where he lead Saint Mary's to a city championship as well as on the ice where he lead his team to the Maritime juvenile title.

1973 was perhaps the best year in Saint Mary's athletic history. That year saw the football and basketball teams win national championships. Meanwhile in the winter the hockey team went on an unprecedented run. Bob Boucher, the coach of the team led his Huskies to a perfect regular season record of 31-0. In the national championship game the Huskies took the ice against the University of Toronto Varsity Blues. In the end the perfect season was shattered by the margin of a single goal, as the Huskies lost 3-2, ending the chance of a three national championship year. Nonetheless, the team still achieved a great accomplishment by going undefeated for the entire

regular season, and for that the University is finally recognizing them. The team included Bill Doherty, Randy Crowell, Doug Abbass, Ernie Dooley, Gerard Gibbons, Tim Ripley, Bim McFall, Dwight Lewis, Steve Dmytruk, Richie Bayes, Dale Turner, Mike Quinn, Dave Nowlan, Chuck Goddard, D'Arcy Murphy,

Ray Monette and Bob Warner.

We here at the Journal Sports would like to congratulate all of this year's inductees into the Saint Mary's University Hall of Fame. One can only wonder what stars of today will soon find themselves gracing the very same hall.



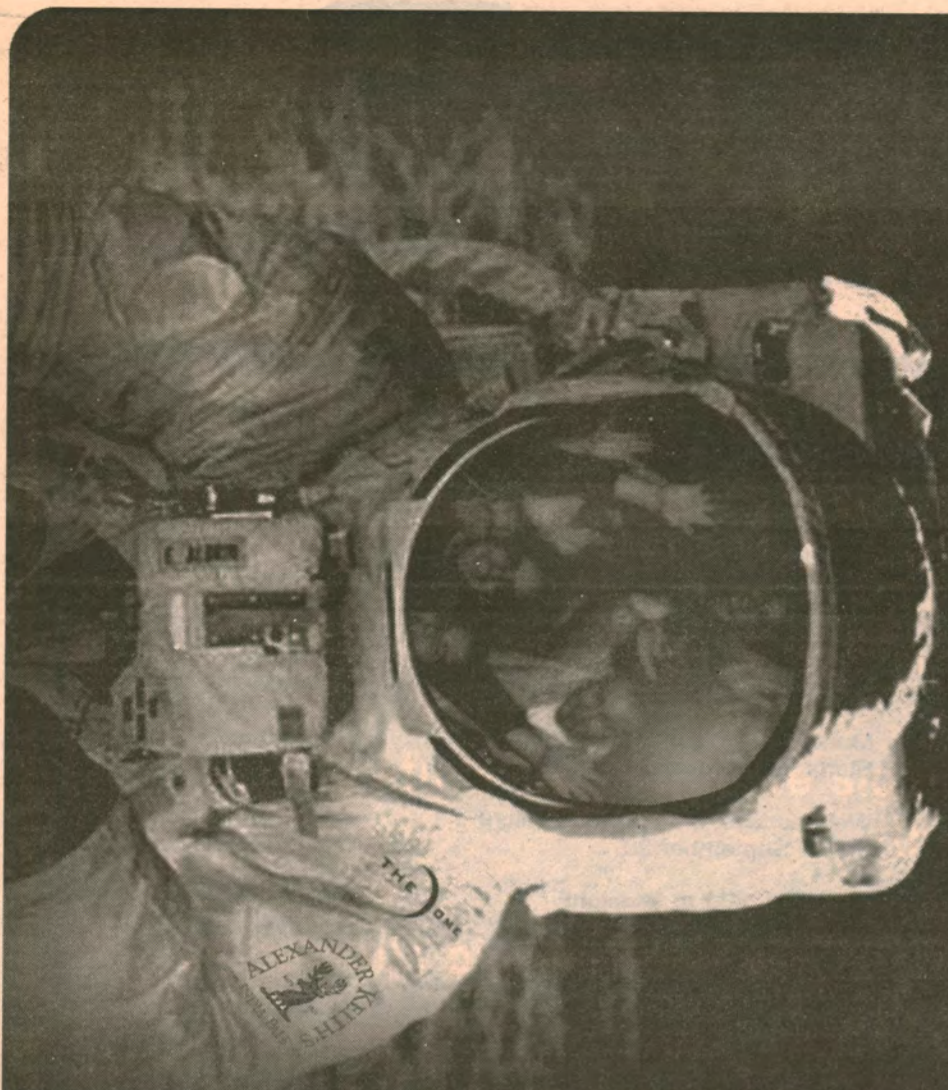

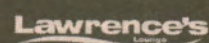
