



The World After Oil

Despite a recent push towards alternative energy, world oil demands continue to rise. Unfortunately, by all accounts world oil supply is dangerously close to collapse. At the risk of being accused of fear-mongering, I would like to suggest that the greatest crisis that we will face during our lifetimes will be survivng in the World After Oil.

The discovery of new oil fields has been essentially negligible since the 1980's. Even the mighty reserves of the Persian Gulf are believed to be dwindling. The North Sea field is running dry, Indonesia is out, and Texas's wells have been rusting for years

So desperate is the situation that oil corporations are turning their attentions to oil sands in Alberta and Venezuala. The

an arduous, slow task. Given the current level of technology and investment, as much as 10% of North American oil demands could be satisfied by Albertan sand oil by 2010.

Biodiesel is a promising candidate to replace oil, but questions remain about efficiency and supply. For example, farmland in North America would have to be increased by at least a factor of 10 to produce enough soy to meet current oil demands.

Hydrogen fuel cells are glorified batteries. While they would, once developped, be ideal as the power plant of an automobile, they would still need to be recharged. The electrolysis of water into hydrogen gas bears a significant energy requirement.

Deployment of hydrogen fuel cells would shift the burden from automobilies to the power grid. Unfortunately, electricity generating stations currently rely heavily on Middle East oil.

In the 1950's, a geologist named Marion King Hubbert predicted that oil extraction would follow a bell curve over time. His prediction was vindicated by the 1970's energy crisis in the United States, which occured as American oil production crested the peak of the bell curve. The American energy crisis was solved by increasing reliance on foreign oil.

Applying Hubbert's bell curve to world-wide oil production brings a sobering realization. Not only does the curve fit the data so far, it predicts a peak within the next few years, probably before 2010.

As we all know, economics sets rules to match supply and demand. As the supply diminishes - and it will - the demand will increase and so will the cost. The oil companies will invest these extra profits into schemes to find or make more fuel. Unfortunately, there isn't much more oil to be found; nor is there yet a viable alternative to our dependence on oil.

The question, then, is this: What happens to the world after oil? I cannot answer that, but I can assure you that it will be very different from the world we know today.

WHY DO THEY HAVE TO STICK IT TO US TWICE?

I hope you will get a chance to publish this. It is regarding a situation which I am personally offended to even have to write about. I have sent a CC to the manager of the bookstore, president of the university, as well as the president of SMUSA. I don't usually get involved with things like this at Saint Mary's, but I could not help myself this time. I hate it when I feel like we (students) are being ripped off more than we already know about. --- Justin O'Hearn

I know nobody likes spending massive amounts of money on their schoolbooks; unfortunately, it is a necessary evil if one wishes to pursue post-secondary education. One may think that our school has enough respect for its students to try and help them out any way they possibly can. This is, sadly, not the situation. Case in point: I go to the bookstore obtain a copy of the last book I need to buy this year (John Donne's Major Works, but the title is not the central issue here) and look on the shelf where it is located. I always first look at the tag to make sure that I have the right instructor and course number, as well as to see how much the materials cost. In the case of the Donne book, the price on the tag is \$28.95. Thinking this is a bit much for a soft cover Oxford edition I promptly look on the back cover to reveal that the MSRP (manufacturer's suggested retail price) is \$14.95 US. I step back a moment and do a bit of quick math in my head, "Hold on a second", I think to myself in the inner monologue type of way, "this just doesn't work out. If this book is only \$14.95 in the States, there's no way it can be nearly double that here". Thus ended my inner monologue. That would have resulted in an exchange rate of about \$1.94CAD for every \$1US. As of today, January 11, 2006 the exchange rate is at \$1.15919CAD (http://www. xe.com/ucc/convert.cgi). To make a long story short, I ordered the same book from Amazon.ca for \$18.81 CAD and, even though I had to pay shipping, still ended up saving money. (Chapters.ca had it as well for the same price, and I could have had them ship to Bayers Lake for no charge, but I needed it sooner rather than later).

I know what some of you may be thinking or saying to yourselves, "Boohoo, poor English student has to pay a couple bucks extra for something he can pick up at a used bookstore. Try buying \$200 Physics textbooks and then talk to me". I can pick up many books I require at used bookstores, but why should I have to? I should be able to go to my school's bookstore and find the materials I need at a reasonable price without the powers that be jacking prices up unnecessarily. I propose a question to all my fellow students studying whatever discipline: if the only bookseller at Saint Mary's is charging over \$10 more for something I can easily prove is selling for less somewhere else, how much more are we paying for those \$200 Physics texts? Or any textbook that is not available online or at regular bookstores? It is just luck that the Oxford edition I looked at had a MSRP on it; most books in that store do not.

I have had other problems with the bookstore at Saint Mary's in the past, but they are nothing compared with the arrogant price-gouging that is happening right under our noses. Fellow students, I urge you to check around on prices for your books. You may be surprised what you can find online or on a trip to one of those Starbucks with the bookstores attached. The same old story folks: tuition is already high enough, why do they have to stick it to us twice?

(Ottawa, ON) From Halifax, Nova Scotia to Vancouver, British Columbia, members of the Canadian Alliance of Student Associations are holding all-candidates debates on their respective campuses.

As part of the Canadian Alliance of Student Association's (CASA) federal election campaign, CASA members are holding the 'Great Canadian Election Debate' - a political debate on 18 different university and college campuses from across the country.

"Students have been disappointed by the lack of attention candidates have given youth issues. Students hold HOUSING, ELECTIONS AND YOU

Affordable housing in peninsular Halifax is a serious issue, and it is one that greatly affects students. "Halifax is unique wherein there are five major colleges and universities on the peninsula and a limited supply of affordable housing," says Dawn Butt, coordinator of Off Campus Housing at Saint Mary's University, "Even when students have a federal/provincial loan, they often have to pick up a part-time job to afford suitable housing. This can cause them to take longer to complete their degrees, incurring more debt."

Nick Wright, Green Party candidate for Halifax, says his party will work to solve this problem using a two-pronged approach. Firstly, the Greens propose to "fund a national housing program to build energy-efficient co-ops and affordable housing units." Noting that affordable housing is a particular problem for students of Saint Mary's and

Dalhousie because so many people are crammed into the South End, Mr. Wright says the Green Party will work with the municipal government to "significantly improve and subsidize public transit so that it is inexpensive, easy and convenient to live outside of the south end."

Alexa McDonough, NDP incumbent and Post-Secondary Education Critic in the last Parliament is quick to point out that the NDP have "been calling for more funding for co-op housing and a new affordable housing strategy since the Liberals tore down the program in the 1990s." The NDP will also work to revamp the student loans system and introduce a needs based grant system which "will take into account the full cost of a university or college education, including housing."



With the federal election just days away, students on campus finally have the time to take a serious look at the candidates of all federal parties running in the riding of Halifax.

Recently Prime Minister Paul Martin announced a series of measures to support

Canadians families facing the surmounting barriers in education, training and finding a good job.

will establish the
Pearson scholarships. Recognizing excellence in academic achievement and reflecting the values of Canada's only Nobel Peace Laureate, the Pearson Scholarships will send 25 young



Fetish Minus H Rearranged = FEIST

A sold out crowd packed the floor of the Marquee this Saturday for the long awaited arrival of Leslie Feist. Originally from Sackville. New Brunswick. the Canadian phenom built her reputation by lending her voice to an assorted throng of acts including Broken Social Scene, rapper Peaches, and Norway's Kings of Convenience. Feist's earlier demos and self-released debut CD Monarch showed incredible promise for her sophomore solo contribution Let It Die, released last year. The final product exceeded the most optimistic expectations, and created an international following.

Everything Feist is now gold. One year ago, she was actually a bigger name in France than in Canada, however, her record has quickly become one the nations most popular fetishes.

Feist apologized to her Halifax audience for not having

been able to play here sooner. She was quickly forgiven as she delivered a flawless and bonechilling performance. Rocking out on a red Guild hollow-bodied electric guitar that looked like it outweighed her, she easily managed to rock out much harder than boys. Her inspiring guitar playing was out-staged by none other than her voice. Patrons trying to sing along with her had a difficult time as she constantly mixed up her deliveries. Although the reverb on her vocal mics was a bit too much at times, her voice was just as pristine live as on the recordings.

The song "Secret Heart" was the standout number. Feist included this cover of one of Canada's greatest musicians Ron Sexsmith on Let It Die. I was enchanted by the light and pleasant CD version for many moons, but after hearing her play it on stage, I will have a hard time going back to the

record. The song grew wings live, and was unmistakably the hardest rocker of the night. The crowd favourite was Feist's breakout single "Mushaboom", about Nova Scotia's own sleepy town of the same name. The sultry and sincere "Intuition" just about melted the entire room. Throughout the show, Feist had a mastery over the entrancing voice loops that she used. Looping is often seen as treading on dangerous waters, often resulting in moldy cheese, but Feist made it count. Absolute gold. She sent the crowd on a rollercoaster of genres, and did each one justice; she brought rocking, folking, scatting, jazzing, jamming, and much more to the table. Let's just call it



Ehryn Torrell's Pink House

Unfortunately, art galleries are constantly changing, or Ehryn Torrell's MFA Exhibition 'The Pink House' would still be available to enjoy. The exhibition ran from November 28 to December 10, 2005. During the exhibition the walls of the Anna Leonowens Gallery were transformed, influenced by the transition from construction to destruction of a recently demolished pink house which was located on the corner of Creighton and Charles Street. Under a local bylaw the city declared the house a dangerous and unsightly hazard, leading to its eventual demolition. The house had been abandoned for two generations, an unpleasant reminder of the neglect shown to the community.

Through Ehryn's distant yet somehow personal relationship with a building that few wanted a part of, she began to construct ideas that would establish the basis for her MFA Thesis Exhibition at the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design. The pink house became a symbol of neglect and caused reflection on the human condition and the role of the individual in a forward-looking, yet anarchic world. Ehryn is not originally from Nova Scotia, but she quickly adapted and found herself comfortable exploring parts of the city often considered avoidable and even dangerous. I had the pleasure of speaking with Ehryn about her exhibition in the relaxing convenience of her studio.

Meeting Ehryn in the studio before the exhibition was very insightful. I had an opportunity to view some of her works in the stages prior to their completion. It was also a great experience to meet an artist like Ehryn who was more than willing to discuss the personal reasoning behind her exhibition, while remaining perfectly humble; she seemed to be enjoying the conversation more than I did. This opportunity allowed me to prepare for the impact of seeing her work in the gallery. The works, on paper and stretched canvas, are so large they forced me into their space. They compelled me to wrest with my feelings of both fear of their menacing sight and empathy towards the imaginative domestic space. She pushes the limits of what painting and drawing is and likes to challenge conventions by using acrylic paints, oil pastels, and other drawing tools. Although the exhibition is inspired by the pink house of Creighton and Charles, she prefers to avoid specific locations. Instead she addresses "how we sort through damage and chaos, and how that reveals our capacity to feel and willingness to negotiate with the power of place and memory."

The drawings and paintings themselves are composed of earthy, industrial colours. Faded creamy tones evoke recollections of dust, decaying walls, and paint. The expressive lines compliment blocks of organized colour, and contain the confusion and chaos of architectural sights. The exhibition was entirely successful, all the pieces uniting in their theme, colour, and appearance. The works that permit more open space within the compositions gave a glimpse of the relationship between the dismantled house and the area existing around it. Works such as 'And I Lowered Myself In' and 'Weight' provide the viewer with room to navigate the neighbourhood in which the house was located; in comparison with the chaotic, clustering compositions of the other pieces, these two stand out. The rest of the pieces direct the viewer into the heart of the debris, and include detailed renderings of the demolished building. These renderings contribute a sense of order within a seemingly disordered environment.

Having completed her graduate degree, Ehryn will be teaching an Intro to Drawing Class this winter semester at NSCAD. For those who may have missed the exhibition, there is excellent documentation on her website: http://www.ehryntorrell.com.

Well it's that time of year again when everybody remotely interested in films creates their top ten lists for last year's crop. Over the past couple of weeks every newspaper I open, website I visit, and every show on television features a top ten films of 2005 list. Instead of doing a typical top ten list I'm going to make this a little more interesting by picking my favourite movies in different categories. Since there are still about a dozen movies from 2005 I'm dying to see, it really is not appropriate that I call this article "The Best Films of 2005". Instead, I'll call it "My Favourite Movies of 2005 that I Have Seen So Far List."

BEST DRAMA BROKEBACK MOUNTAIN

Without a doubt my favourite drama of 2005 is Brokeback Mountain. If it was up to me Ang Lee's adaptation of Annie Proulx's short story would win most of this years Academy Awards. For those of you who haven't already heard, Brokeback Mountain, a.k.a. the gay cowboy movie, is a love story about two ranch hands who fall in love while spending the summer working together alone in the wilderness. It's a sad and beautiful story about two people who love each other but can't be together because of the time and place in which they live. If you only see one movie this year, make sure it's Brokeback Mountain.

BEST COMEDY THE 40-YEAR-OLD VIRGIN

I don't take in too many comedies at the theatre so The 40-Year-Old Virgin deserves an award for getting me to pay 10 bucks to see it. More than that, it deserves an award because it is hands down my favourite comedy of the year and one of my favourite films of 2005. I knew that I would laugh at Steve Carell's portraval of a 40-year-old virgin, but I didn't expect to actually care about the character. I think that's what makes this movie so special along with a lot of great funny moments. I'm tempted to quote a few of my favourite lines from the movie, but instead I'll leave it up to you to go out and watch it for yourself.

BEST DOCUMENTARY GRIZZLY MAN

This was probably the most difficult category for me to choose a winner because in 2005 there was a large crop of quality documentary films. It came down to three documentaries that have animals in key roles: Wild Parrots of

Telegraph Hill, March of the Penguins, and Grizzly Man. After much deliberation (about two minutes, but an intense two minutes) I have decided to choose Werner Herzog's Grizzly Man as my favourite. Herzog's film tells the amazing story of Timothy Treadwell, a man who spent 13 years of his life living in the Alaskan wilderness with grizzly bears before finally being eaten by one. The film is an interesting mixture of Herzog's interviews and Treadwell's own footage that he shot while living with the bears. It is out now on DVD so go check it out.

BEST CANADIAN FILM A HISTORY OF VIOLENCE

Water, Where the Truth Lies, The Life and Hard Times of Guy Terrifico, and C.R.A.Z.Y. are all Canadian films which garnered attention at film festivals around the world in 2005. However, my favourite Canadian film this year was David Cronenberg's A History of Violence. It stars Viggo Mortensen as Tom Stall, the father of two children and a husband to a beautiful wife, Edie (Maria Bello). The seemingly perfect family lives in the ideal little town of Millbrook. Everything is going along just fine until two psycho killers wander into Tom's Diner. The rest of the movie follows what happens to the family after this life changing event. AHOV has the violence and sex which you'd expect in a thriller, but the film is not typical. Instead, it's thought provoking, satirical, and allegorical. It's about society, identity, evolution, and man's history of violence.

BEST FOREIGN FILM MANDERLAY

Manderlay is the latest film from Danish director Lars von Trier (Breaking the Waves, Dancer in the Dark) and the sequel to his 2003 film Dogville. The film is both complex and provoking, and can lead to intense discussion. The cast which features Bryce Dallas Howard, William Dafoe, and Danny Glover among others is suburb. As for the editing, set design and camera work it's all unconventional, and that's fine because it works fabulously. If you have a fondness for foreign films, go see Manderlay.

BEST ANIMATED FEATURE CORPSE BRIDE

I've got to admit, I didn't love Corpse Bride when I first saw it but in hindsight it was a pretty good little film. Tim Burton's newest creation stars Johnny Depp and Emily Watson as two young lovers. They are separated after Victor (Depp), while practicing his wedding

vows, puts a ring on what he thinks is a tree branch but turns out to be a Corpse Bride (Helena Bonham Carter). She accepts his proposal and takes him unwillingly to the underground land of the dead. Victor spends the rest of the movie trying to get back to Victoria. Corpse Bride is a love story filled with catchy musical numbers and beautiful stop-motion animation. Even though the story itself is quite predictable, overall Corpse Bride has enough good points that most viewers should be satisfied.

BEST INDEPENDENT FILM MYSTERIOUS SKIN

Gregg Araki's Mysterious Skin is based on the novel by Scott Heim and deals with the taboo subject of pedophilia. The film is about two teenage boys from a small town in Kansas who both had traumatic experiences in their childhood. Neil (Joseph Gordon-Levitt) is a confident hustler who was molested by his baseball coach and Brian (Brady Corbet) is a nerd who believes he was abducted by aliens. The film begins with the following voice-over narration: "The summer I was eight years old, five hours disappeared from my life. Five hours, lost. Gone, without a trace." Trust me go rent Mysterious Skin, you won't regret it.

WORST FILM ON ROGER EBERT'S TOP TEN LIST KING KONG

I really enjoy reading Roger Ebert's film reviews, and I often agree with his opinions on films, but sometimes I vehemently disagree with him. as is the case with Peter Jackson's King Kong. FORMER SMU STUDENT TURNS IDEA INTO SPORTS MEDIA EMPIRE

Ten years ago, Paul Lavers gambled with his future, leaving Saint Mary's behind to pursue a big idea. The gamble has paid off, as the company he started with friend Joe MacDonald, SportsDirect, has become the world's largest provider of sports gaming content.


Lavers and MacDonald were childhood pals from Spryfield. In the mid-nineties, MacDonald attended TUNS while Lavers went to SMU. "I had a great time," Lavers says of his days at SMU. "I was in commerce, playing a lot of hockey for the local junior team and playing for Saint Mary's a bit. I worked in the Gorsebrook for two years, slinging draft and meeting a lot of great people. I made a lot of great friends I am still in contact with today. I learned a lot about life and school and business."

Both Lavers and MacDonald were avid sports fans who enjoyed betting on sports. Like many sports gamblers, they based their bets on in-depth statistics. But in 1995, these sports statistics were not available online. The students saw an opportunity.

While MacDonald had finished his degree, Lavers took a big risk, dropping out of school to focus entirely on their new business idea. They created SportsDirect Inc., a company which provides sports gamblers with information they can't find elsewhere. They offered the information on their website www.covers.com ("covers" referring to a team covering a point spread).

Lavers credits Dave Bateman, an accounting teacher at SMU, for making him aware of the potential of the Internet. "Listening to him talk during his lectures in class about the Internet and how it is going to change things, it really did pique my interest. It turned the lights on for a business opportunity. If it wasn't for Dave Bateman, I don't think I would have chosen the Internet as my business."

From 1995 to 2000, Lavers and MacDonald slowly grew their business, putting in 100 hour weeks while drawing minimal salaries. MacDonald handled the technical work while Lavers learned the ropes of running a business. Lavers said in those five years "he earned his real-world MBA." Asked how he stayed motivated in difficult days, he responds "I was serious about it. I knew it was the one shot I had. You get in a mindset



SportsDirect Inc co-founders Joe MacDonald & Paul Lavers


where there is no turning back."

SportsDirect's first two employees, both SMU graduates, were hired in 2000. Later that year, they landed their first big deal, a contract to provide USA Today with sports information. Since that deal, SportsDirect has grown into a sports media organization operating over a dozen sports and gambling related sites.

2005 was a big year for SportsDirect as they hired 50 new employees and generated \$15 million in sales. The company currently employs 127 people, with plans to add about 50 new employees this year. There are now Sports-Direct offices in Halifax, Las Vegas, and Ireland.

Even with all his success, Lavers has managed to stay grounded. "You take pleasures not in the money, but seeing employees come in the ground floor and get a promotion and another promotion. You see them buy a car and then a house. You see the growth in their lives and their careers. That is becoming more meaningful to me then watching the growth in the company."

THE ROCKERFELLER

1. I don't understand the whole craze about Google and why its stock price is so high?

Although many of finance students have spent more then a semester in class trying to answer that question (or similar ones to it) I will try to give as simple an answer as possible. To quote my notes verbatim: "Stock Prices are determined by the sum of the present value of future cash flows" in laymen terms it says that if you added up all the future income (mostly dividends) and buy them all in today's money you would find the stock price. While in theory that makes perfect sense (if it doesn't to you just trust me on it for the time being) in reality finding out what the future cash flows is not an exact science, nor is the rate at which we present value to this income. So this means we currently have many investors out in the market that think they will over time make more than \$466.25 (Google's Stock Price as of January 13th). Now taking into consideration Google happens to currently be the cool thing to own, basic economics has also helped to push the price higher then many investors (including myself) than it should be. Now if you are still curious about stock valuations I would recommend going to http:// en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Stock or taking the class "Investments" here at SMU.

2. I've always wondered how the numbers on the stock exchanges work. I saw that the TSX had a new high of 11,500 but how is that number calculated?

The number, also known as an index, looks at market capitalization (that's the number of shares times the share price) of the largest companies on the index and compares it to how big it was in the past. To keep things simple, how companies determine "the largest" is by seeing if they would have a weight of at least 0.05% and account for 0.025% of all trading on the index. Along with those two main constraints there are a bunch of restrictions that boil down to making sure the company is stable and has a share price of over \$1.00. Every three months the index is checked to see if it contains the proper balance of companies and will adjust accordingly, as of today there are 233 companies on the index such as Sobeys, Aliant, Bombardier and Nortel. If you are interested in finding out more specific details go to either www.tsx.com or www. csi.ca. Take note that not all indexes work in this manner (for example the NYSE uses a method called price weighted averaging) but using only the largest companies is used in almost all cases.

Jackie's Four Rules for Saving Money

Around this time of the year, money starts getting really tight for students. It's after the holidays, Boxing Day is over, and there really isn't that much to do except to spend money at random places (downtown, the mall, etc...). A couple of friends have mentioned this issue to me, saying that I should write a column on how to save money when you are a university student. Because I know so many of you can relate to this issue, I thought "Why Not?" Before I begin, let me say that there is really no secret to saving money, you just have to be disciplined, and like anything, you have to want to do it. It's your choice.

There are four main rules to saving money (according to me):

- 1. you need at least two bank accounts
- 2. you need a budget
- 3. you need to be frugal
- 4. you need to have some kind of purpose for doing it.

When saving money, you obviously need at least two bank accounts – one for normal use, and a savings account that money strictly goes into, not out of. This is a fairly easy process; I am assuming you all have a bank that you deal with regularly so opening up a savings account should not be anything new to you. Try and get a savings account that charges a very minimal fee per month, or even better, no fee. This may take some research to learn how to work this out, but if you talk with your banker, they will understand your needs and goals and most likely will provide you with a few options.

Second on the list: you need a budget. You can actually get around this rule by knowing exactly how much money is coming in, and how much you are going to withdraw every week/ second week/ month (whatever it is). If you do not have a job but are getting funds from another source (government, parents, relatives) you can apply the same rules, however, it may be more difficult because in most of these situations, you are only given enough money to pay for immediate expenses as they come up. As an aside, you have to be committed to depositing the selected amount of money into your savings account every nth day.

I know it's hard and even impossible for many of you, but in order to save money you have to not blow it here, there, and everywhere. Remember, you control your money, your money doesn't control you.

And last, you need to have a motivator for saving. Maybe it's saving to pay off that lump some of debt at the end of your university career, saving for a down payment on a house or condo, saving for a car, saving for graduate school, saving for that graduation trip, or even saving for retirement. It doesn't have to be one sole purpose. You can just save for the fun of saving and seeing the bottom line grow and grow. Whatever it is, get on it. And when it comes right down to it, think of your new savings account as a safety net – giving you piece of mind.

University Shootout?

During the final game of the Pete Kelly Cup, the St. Mary's Husky hockey team came out victorious after it was decided by both teams that a shootout would suffice to decide a victor. The shootout, a more climactic way to end a tied hockey game, is already used in the National Hockey League, American Hockey League, Quebec Major Junior Hockey League and Maritime Junior A Hockey League. Given its dramatic success at these levels of play and its use in a league tournament during the Christmas holiday, it now seems as though it could be making its way into actual AUH league action. Although the UNB Varsity Reds lost the holiday tournament they hosted, by means of the shootout, **UNB** head coach Gardiner MacDougall has emerged as an advocate of the exciting breakaway contest. He seems to think it would be a great way to continuously break ties in Atlantic University Sport hockey, and it doesn't look like he's alone.

The league currently, as the NHL did during its last season of play, uses five minutes of four-on-four overtime to decide a victor. The problem is if a winner is not decided during the allotted time, neither team gets to leave happy. "It's an exciting part of hockey" MacDougall says, "There are the negative connotations, but I think as far as from a fan's point, we're trying to sell the game. It's an exciting part."

There was quite a buzz at the Aitken Centre in Fredericton after the teams agreed to the shootout in the tournament final, with many East coast hockey fans not having seen the high intensity tie breaker in person yet. The league experimented with the shootout in 1999-2000, but scrapped it the following season. Back then however, the AUHC used a five-on-five overtime, which seems to break exponentially less ties than the 4 on 4 system used currently. By January 2000, 15 games had gone into overtime with only 2 being decided without the use of a shootout. Just last weekend, three of the eight games went into overtime and the 5 minute four-on-four extra frame settled two of them. So why turn to the shootout now?

Dalhousie Tigers head coach Fabian Joseph is open to a shootout for the regular season, but opposes it for post-season play. The former national team player has bad memories from the 1994 Ol-

ympics when Sweden beat Canada in shootout for the gold medal. While Joseph's feelings toward post-season shootout's are obviously warranted,

Saint Mary's coach Trevor Stienburg says he opposes them all together. He didn't think it was a justifiable way to settle a game when it was used 6 years ago and still doesn't now, saying that even a 3 on 3 unlimited sudden death shows more potential than a shootout.

Suggestions have been made to increase the overtime period to 10 minutes of four-on-four to decrease ties, or just go to the shootout after an extended overtime. Darren Burns, coach of the Acadia Axemen, said he's against the shootout as a hockey coach and purist, but he says he likes it as a fan.

That's truly what it comes

down to in the end. Most coaches in the NHL made it well known they were opposed to the shootout before the rule changes were decided upon. With a dwindling fan base and ridiculous amount of tie games, it was in the end conceded that something had to be done to increase interest in the game. It has done so accordingly, with revenue and fan interest up around the board. The die hard fans and coaches that have spent much of their lives watching hockey played a certain way will be forever against it, as voiced by many of the current AUHC coaches above. To them the shootout is a gimmick, cheapening how a victor should truly be decided because it differs from how the rest of the game was played. What they must ask themselves is during a competitive game, should there not be a winner? Ties don't exist in any of the other 3 major North American sports because people want to see a win or a loss. A never ending overtime would be great if it could work, but neither team wants to give up a win during sudden death. This would lead to more defensive oriented overtimes that could go on for hours and that is the exact style of hockey we are trying to move away from. Whatever is decided upon, it should be whatever seems best for the game. That being considered, every other major hockey league has adopted the shootout and have experienced success in doing so. It's definitely at least worth

considering.



Husky Hockey

In Men's hockey action this past weekend, top scorer Ryan Lauzon and the Saint Mary's Huskies played the St. Thomas Tommies. After skating to a draw with the Tommies last week, St. Mary's needed Lauzon to continue his stellar goal scoring prowess to cash in another win, or so they thought. Instead of the Huskies top line netting pucks as usually is the case, it was Mark Szott, Colin Power and Gordon Bell all scoring on the power play, allowing their team to come out of Fredericton on Friday with a much needed, 3-1 road victory. BASKETBALL

The top-ranked St. Francis Xavier X-Men took on the Husky's in Basketball action this past week, the outcome proving to be a blast not only to the Husky's playoff chances, but their dignity as well. The X-Men flew out of the gate with a 20-point lead built up midway through the opening half, the game ending in a slaughtersome 81-55 victory for St. FX. The win was the X-Mens fifth strait over the Huskies, their last loss coming during a close 67-64 decision in Antigonish on March 3, 2004.

Fifth-year forward Alex Stephen put up 24 points and seven rebounds for Xavier with Garry Gallimore adding 17. St. F.X progressed their record to a conference leading 8-0 and currently hold an eight-point lead over second-place Memorial. The surging X-men not only destroyed St. Mary's in every fashion during this game, but they did so without all-star centre Neil MacDonald, who is day-to-day with a pulled calf muscle.

Sole bright spots for the Huskies came in the form Saint Mary's forward Jerome Goodman pulling down a game-high 16 rebounds, while adding 14 points to the embarrassment. Saint Mary's did manage a

slight comeback after the half to get within nine, but a horrible transition defence combined with a great deal of offensive ineptitude, allowed the X-Men to respond with a devastating fast-break offence that never looked back

The Huskies then welcomed the Cape Breton Capers to the Tower hoping to improve on their then 4-4 record after the loss to St. FX. With the Huskies playing well in the first half, it looked like they were unrattled by the crushing defeat suffered before the weekend. Trailing SMU by 13 points in the first half, the 9th ranked Capers were able to score 9 strait, as the half ended with a 4 point Husky lead. The second half was an entirely different story however, with the Capers sinking another 9 strait point to attain the lead for good. Corey Hargrove led the way during the second half for CB, scoring 19 of his game-high 28 points to put away the Huskies by a final score of 71-60.

St. Mary's struggled all game in getting the ball to star Jerome Goodman, who scored only two points in the second half and only ended with 10 in total. Jonathan Thibault bucketed 18 points for the Huskies, all off three-pointers.

Husky V-Ball loses first game of season

The St. Mary's Husky volleyball team was handed their first loss this past week at the hands of the Dalhousie Tigers. With Tigers Left-side hitter Jilliane Goulet playing in her first game since last season, the powerhouse Saint Mary squad couldn't keep their unbeaten season alive. Goulet, a two time conference MVP, proved to be the difference as she led Dalhousie to a 25-22, 25-19, 25-23 victory in front of a pumped up crowd of about 400 at Dalplex last Friday night. The two teams now boast identical 8-1 records this season, this being the first head to head action they saw of each other. Goulet has played the past four years with Dalhousie, but didn't plan on being back this season. She was at home while the Tigers fought through the first half of the season, but decided to return for the second half in her final year of eligibility. Goulet recorded the match's first point with a tip at the net.

SMU defeated Dalhousie 3-0 at a McGill tournament in October but on this night, a Husky team that had only lost four sets in AUS action this year ended up on the losing side. The two rivals meet again on Feb. 8th at SMU in their only other regular season match up of the year.

Despite the loss, the Huskies looked to improve to 9-1 and jump right back into first place Saturday against St. Francis Xavier, and disappoint they did not. Left-side hitter Ashley Wicks of Truro had six kills, two aces, seven digs, and attained player of the match honors as Saint Mary's came away with a 3-1 win. After dropping the opening set 23-25, the pack managed to rebound for wins of 25-17, 25-20 and 25-22 to seal the victory. Danielle Shortall had 10 kills while Kristen McCulloch had nine as the Huskies authoritatively rebounded from the strait sets loss to their cross town rivals the previous day. Janesse Boudreau added three service aces during the game while Christena MacRae totaled 24 digs.
