

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ABAALL-STAR GAME **COMES TO HALIFAX**

Former SMU Star Brings Big Game Back to Community

Halifax and hoops go hand in hand. Our city has an impressive record when it comes to showcasing basketball - playing host to the CIAU Men's National Championship (for over twenty years); the Halifax Windjammers (a former CBA franchise); NBA preseason basketball; U.S division 1 men's basketball exhibition; Canadian much courtside attention, Halifax has been dubbed "the basketball capital of Canada," and has now added another attraction - the ABA (American Basketball Association). The ABA all-star game weekend will be held in Halifax this year from Jan 26-28 at the Halifax Metro Centre, and a new ABA franchise, the Halifax Rainmen, is scheduled to debut next year -- thanks to former Saint Mary's Basketball star Jad Cronogorac.

What exactly is the ABA? The ABA (American Baketball Association) was originated in 1967, because at the time, the NBA had only 10 teams; expansion was needed. Because of financial difficulties, the NBA wasn't able to field enough teams for prospective NBA cities. A new league was formed. The ABA wanted to differentiate itself from the NBA. The ball used was blue and red. It's also interesting to note that the ABA developed the

3-point shot before the NBA did. The league had an up-tempo style, emphasizing fast breaks and high scores. Some of its players would go on to the NBA: Julius Erving (Dr. J), Moses Malone, George Gervin, and Rick Barry to name a few. After nine seasons the ABA wasn't able to keep up with the NBA, so the ABA had no choice but to merge with the NBA in 1976. Four of the ABA's most successful teams-San men's national team exhibition Antonio Spurs, New York Nets, matches; and Under 21 World Denver Nuggets and Indiana Pac-Junior Championships. With so ers joined the NBA. The ABA was no more.

The ABA came back in 2000 when the league tried an experimental eight team season. The ABA's second year saw the same number of teams and in 2002 there wasn't a season because the league took a year off to reorganize. The ABA came back strong in 2003, attracting not only more attention but also famous players: Dennis Rodman and Master P. The league jumped to an impressive 30 teams spread out across the United States and as of this season, the ABA has 51 teams including a few Canadian ones. In 2007 there will be seven including Halifax.

Jad Cronogorac, former Saint Mary's womens basketball star and 1998 AUS MVP, is part-time owner and Vice President of the team. After graduating from Saint Mary's, Jad went overseas to play basketball in Austria. That didn't work out so she went back to school and ended up in the communications business, with stops in Toronto and Atlanta. It's always been a dream of Jad's to be involved with a professional franchise. While in Toronto, Jad met with some business people who were interested in bringing ABA franchises to the surrounding Toronto area. Jad suggested to Andre Levingstone the prospect of Halifax as a potential location for a franchise. Jad explains, "I told him (Levingstone) you need to go to Halifax, speak to the Mayor, you need to speak to the public, and see what they think about it. He went a couple of times to gauge the idea and was overwhelmed with the excitement and the support of the city."

The ground-work was being put in place for Halifax to have its first professional franchise since the Halifax Windjammers. But how exactly did Halifax land the 2007 ABA all-star game, considering that it realistically could be held in any of the major cities? Jad breaks it down: "They had an owner's meeting back in September, an ABA owners meeting in Indianapolis, and they were discussing the all-star game. In 2007 seven teams will be across Canada. What a great way to introduce an expansion into Canada with all-star game. A bid was put in for Halifax and it was won."

The ABA All-Star game is on its way. It's important to explain a few of the rules so hoopsters can familiarize themselves with the

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN **UNION AND SMU**

But have students lost faith in their **University Leaders?**

A pall has lifted over Saint Mary's University as students return to winter classes, no longer worried about the prospect of a strike. Saint Mary's Faculty Union announced on Sunday, December 17th, that they have come to a tentative agreement with the SMU Administration. SMUFU is primarily concerned with issues of salary increase, flexible retirement, increased benefits and post-tenure reviews, all of which have been addressed by the administration.

In their press release, SMUFU stated that, "This round of bargaining was far more difficult and challenging than any we have seen in past years. Thanks also to the many volunteers working on the strike committees - without all of you, progress wouldn't have been possible.

Then on Thursday, January 11th, negotiators brought forth the agreement for ratification, where 86.6% of the voting members ruled in favor of a new Collective Agreement. The participation rate was very high, with 82.4% of members voting. Now, the Board of Governors at Saint Mary's will seek to finalize the agreement, which will run from September 2006 through August 2009.

The three-year agreement includes significant change with regards to compensation, which will increase in increments of 3.68%, 3.48, and 3.75%, an early retirement plan, the option to continue employment to age 68, and a union benefit plan. As well, salary scales for Lecturer, Assistant, Full Professor, and Librarians have gone up. The age of retirement has undergone significant change as well, where any faculty member may apply for re-appointment for up to three years following the age of retirement. A SMUFU summary identified new language in the agreement discussing retirement, which states that, "Such reappointments shall not unreasonably be denied." The union pointed to this key wording as a means to protecting its members, should their attempts be turned down unfairly.

Though largely Saint Mary's students are relieved to hear the looming threat of a strike is over, the strike represents a failure to communicate for many students. Several students questioned admitted they considered themselves left behind by all parties involved. Many cited the amount of time it took for the Union and the Ad-

ministration to inform students of the negotiations and strike vote as evidence of this. Many felt neither the Union nor the Administration made any worthwhile effort to inform students of the failed negotiations, instead having to learn the news through rumors.

Others pointed to SMUSA as another source of failure, whose "Don't Forget About Us" pin campaign was considered a flop by many students. The campaign, which sought to keep both the Administration and the Union reminded of the high stakes students faced as a result of the strike, was hailed by Churchill and SMUSA as a success. In a notice posted across campus, Churchill was quoted as saying, "This just shows how students can make a real difference [...] And I am proud to be a member of a university where the students' voices can be heard and are acted upon. In this case it's clear that we weren't forgotten, and this makes me proud to be a student at Saint Mary's.

Students, however, were not impressed by the campaign, calling it 'futile' and 'useless'. When asked about SMUSA's performance during the strike, one student said that the association took credit that it didn't deserve. "By the time they handed out the pins, it was the end of November and made little to no difference. Everything that SMUSA did was simply in reaction to the Journal breaking the news. They weren't planning on telling anyone. All that happened was the teacher's got what they want, and we got nothing.

Though tensions that flared between the two parties throughout the month of November seem to have calmed and an amicable relationship has resumed, some students can't help but wonder how much of the argument was legitimate. One student stated, "I think that it was a kind of scare tactic, where Haiven was just trying to shake things up and make the Administration see the Union as really riled up and serious. But he also really worried parents and students with what he said." She also asked not to be identified

It seems many students are disillusioned with their school leaders. However, there are still plenty of students that are indifferent to the issues.

"I was really looking forward to that strike," says second year Business student, Kurtis Burke, "I wanted a double vacation, damn





CASA National Director

Discusses the Student Movement

Phillippe Ouellette, the National Director of the Canadian Alliance of Student Associations (CASA) is in Halifax this week, visiting university campuses. The Saint Mary's University Students' Association (SMUSA) is a member of the national post secondary education lobby group, making all students members as well.

Ouellette is touring campuses in an effort to have a head office representative visit each member association at least once every year. "We want to engage students on what's going on in Ottawa," says Ouellette. He views this as an opportunity to tell students where CASA stands with its projects and to see how student councils feel about the lobby group's progress. Ouellette noted the importance of speaking to individual students and their councils, in order to "have an ear to the ground."

As National Director, Ouellette determines the effectiveness of lobby groups by looking at key indicators.

The first is holding true to the organization's principles. For example, CASA has an easy in, easy out policy with member schools. This allows student associations who do not wish to continue as members of the lobby group to leave quite easily. Unions who wish to join can enter without the fear of long-term commitment.

Zach Churchill, President of SMUSA, supports this principle. "This easy in, easy out reflects the philosophy of an organization that is driven by its membership. My voice matters at the CASA table. SMUSA can influence and have a lot of power within the organization."

This policy was in part a response to inadequacies of the student movement in the 1980s, which was overrun with corruption and mismanagement. Ouellette believes that the aggressive recruiting of lobby groups at the time was part of that vacuum.

Ouellette says this is why lobby groups including CASA and the Association of Nova Scotia Student Associations (ANSSA) emerged. This new brand of lobbyists has relaxed membership restrictions and has worked together on various initiatives.

"We've been working closely with our partners. [...] This alliance of different organizations has been very effective," says Ouellette. Ouellette thinks the emergence of these student groups willing to work together have made the student movement stronger.

Ouellette believes CASA has effectively engaged the media, the public and students as well, with media stunts on Parliament Hill themed around student debt. Ouellette believes that these efforts have successfully relayed the concerns of students who cannot afford to take their message to Ottawa.

Although Ouellette recognizes strength in numbers, he is against the assimilation of the student movement into one national post-secondary education lobby group. "That would mean that you would have to disregard the current cleavages," says Ouellette. He likened the different lobby groups to a system of government, whereby parties championing different interests can unite and promote issues concerning the student movement forward. "Our goal is to produce change," says Ouellette.

While there have been successful relationships between regional and national lobby groups, the clashes between CASA and the Canadian Federation of Students, the other major national post-secondary education lobby group in the country, continue as they attempt to attract the same demographic to their memberships. For Ouellette, "It's unfortunate that the student movement does not work together all the time. There isn't as much cordiality in the student movement as I'd like, and I think that needs to be improved.

CASA AND THE GOVERNMENT

Ouellette believes that ensuring access to officials and policy makers coupled with effective pressure is paramount to successful lobbying. For example, when the federal finance committee consulted stakeholders across the country for pre-budget consultation, CASA jumped at the chance to influence the committee's report. CASA is the most quoted educational organization in the document. Among the recommendations it drew from CASA, the committee endorsed the renewal of the Canadian Millennium Scholarship Foundation, and agreed to review student financial aid in Canada.

Although politicians have opened their ears to CASA's policies, implementation has not been so easy. "The Conservatives haven't implemented positive change for

students in the past eight months," says Ouellette. He is disappointed that while the Conservatives during their campaign made education a top priority, it appeared to drop off their platform once they were elected. Ouellette believes the Conservatives' textbook tax credit has done little to increase accessibility to post-secondary education. He explained, "Low income families aren't necessarily attracted by the idea of a tax credit." Ouellette also criticized the government for cutting 25,000 student jobs when it axed the Summer Career Placement Program from its budget. "In terms of action, it's been little to none," says Ouellette.

Ouellette doesn't place all of the blame on the Conservatives. Ouellette attributes the lack of overall governmental vision in the area of post-secondary education in the last few years to the formation of minority governments, which tend to focus on winning the next election. "There's been a lot of lip service," says Ouellette. He noted opposition parties are just as much to blame in a minority government. According to Ouellette, the NDP, the Liberals and the Bloc have not been pressing the issue of post-secondary education either.

He pointed out that in the end, tuition continues to increase, debt is overwhelming and many students with excellent marks coming from low-income families have tremendous difficulty accessing post-secondary education, while the government continues to say it's doing as much as it can. "It's an inadequate system," says Ouellette.

AN ATLANTIC CANADIAN SOLUTION

Ouellette thinks that the vision needed to change this trend is going to come from Atlantic Canada. In Canada, the cost of education varies across the provinces. "What can a province do with more money? You get better faculty, smaller classrooms and greater technology," says Ouellette. "The quality is going to differ according to provinces. The provinces with economic difficulty are going to be the first to feel this brunt."

Ouellette is worried that the stratification of universities will continue to increase to the point where "employers in Ontario are going to get resumes from Nova Scotia and say they won't hire you." Nova Scotia currently has the highest average tuition in the country. Ouellette believes that comparable quality among Canadian universities is at risk, which is a huge threat to the country's education system. Atlantic Premiers see this and know it's going to happen," says Ouellette. Ouellette says, "This argument comes from students, from the grassroots. Hopefully students will be involved in that dialogues all the way through."

Ouellette is optimistic that provincial governments have also been interested in CASA's policies, which include the implementation of a dedicated federal transfer of moneys to the provinces for post-secondary education and a pan-Canadian vision on education. "Everyone's buying into this," says Ouellette



A Quick Way to Earn \$500

How to delay taking the poverty train

It is January and many students are debating the pros and cons of not paying their tuition.

Cons: according to the Saint Mary's website, "Students who do not pay their fees by the Due Date are subject to late payment charges and may be deregistered."

Pros: delaying payment can in turn delay steady diets of Sidekicks and Kool-Aid sugar crystals.

With students paying \$558 per course along with additional fees and books, this semester will cost \$3000 for school alone to students taking full course loads. That amount can be expected to double for international students. Notorious Nova Scotia has the highest average tuition rate in Canada.

The tuition payment deadline just passed, but many students still haven't received their student loans. Since student loans are doled out on a provincial basis, some students have already received their loans, while others are still waiting, using up their lines of credit in the meantime and finding lumps of molten plastic in their trousers.


Regardless of whether or not you have taken out a student loan, if you think your expenses will outweigh your assets in the coming semester, I strongly suggest you get into the business of regularly applying for financial aid.

Financial Needs-Based Bursaries of \$500 are awarded to successful applicants in need of financial help. To be eligible, students must have received a GPA of at least 1.70 in the last semester.

The two-page application requires information on your estimated expenses and resources for the year and a one-page written statement. Unfortunately, most students don't apply. However, this makes the decision of sacrificing a couple of hours to complete the application quite appealing.

Filling out this application will take less time than scanning your textbooks and returning them to the bookstore. It will also be much more acceptable than getting drunk off the remnants of abandoned beer bottles at parties.

The submission deadline for the bursary is January 31st. Applications are available at the Financial Aid & Awards Office on the 4th floor of the Student Centre or online at



Are We Ready for the Real World?

Can graduation really be just around the corner? Is it possible that the life I've carved for myself over the past five years as an undergrad is coming to an end? Gazing down at my decidedly well-deserved '07 B.Comm graduation ring, a number of emotions ran over me all at once - pride, accomplishment, excitement... sadness, reminiscence, and even a little fear. I've always spoke fondly of my time here at Saint Mary's University to everyone I know. In retrospect, I loathed high school and yearned to associate myself with people who shared similar ambitions and interests as myself, and Saint Mary's seemed like an environment to develop on a personal and professional level. When I eventually adjusted to University life, I involved myself in extra-curriculars that I believed would sail me into a dream career after all was said and done. While business plan competitions, business start-ups, The Journal, and countless other networking events and societies were important components of my life for the past few years, I couldn't help but wonder, as I sat there twisting my Latin Oval grad ring around my finger, if any of it really did help me in the end.

This article is really for a close friend of mine who just started her educational career at Saint Mary's this year. She asked me if all the effort that I've put into business projects and other such activities had given me a competitive edge, or at least some qualitative experience, that would help secure a "good" job after leaving "the bubble" that is Saint Mary's University. Even though in my mind, I felt that I had everything planned out, her concern grasped my core and shook me a little. What exactly have I learned in the past five years that would help me in the business

("real") world? Is there anything I would have changed if I could? Do I harbor any useful advice for new business students (like my friend) who desire that competitive edge when they graduate? How will I realistically start a career? After five long years of education, these are quite possibly the most complicated, and by far the most important, questions I have had to face. It's a challenge to answer these seemingly simple questions, but in order to know where I stand in the midst of upcoming business graduates - it is necessary to understand my qualifications and professional goals, so that the new journey I am (and we all eventually will) embark on will be a little more defined and understood.

I will say, that for any business student who wants to obtain credibility, real-world experience, or a working network, it is absolutely necessary to get involved in any type of business society, group, or event. Usually the group and event part is followed when joining a business society, meaning it is imperative to at least check out the different forms of societies on campus. It was through the Saint Mary's Commerce Society that I met real business partners, along with many good friends that will always share the same interest in entrepreneurship that I have. Through society events, such as the Annual Wine & Cheese or Annual Business Dinner, I have learned to socialize and interact with various business people - from managers to corporate CEO's. Even though it may seem trivial, these are skills that make a difference when applying and interviewing for big league jobs. All of the confidence in the world cannot supplement the experienced mind frame of having rubbed elbows with true business leaders. It is through these networking events that contacts are acquired as well; they create opportunistic situations

where students can transition from undergrad status to potential job candidate status.

Being involved in business competitions and other like activities are important as well, but for different reasons. Business competitions strip away any pre-conceived idea you may have had of yourself, and truly exposes a person for what they actually know, how well they know it, and how well they use those skills. Business competitions have been an important part in my development as a business student, and overall businessperson. The skills obtained from writing and presenting material created by a team is one of the greatest experiences any student (not just a business student) could undertake. Writing and formatting skills, presentation skills, teamwork and organization skills, and confidence skills are all exercised in a small, condensed amount of time. The only real thing I would change if I could go back, would be to get involved in extra-curriculars earlier in my University career. I concentrated heavily on school for my first two years, thus, neglected getting involved in much of anything. However, it was during these first two years that I began working for a marketing company in the summer and discovered a passion for the subject. This shaped my form of involvement in Saint Mary's in subsequent years, so taking my time getting involved was not completely detrimental. There are other ways in which I could have gotten involved on a

more social level, which would this actually translate into obtaining have been more fun than anything else, for example, becoming a frosh leader, volunteering for SMUSA events, etc. I realize that I am advocating more for involvement in business and career-driven activities, but recreationally socializing and making friends is important in and of itself.

For new business students wanting to become ferociously involved in business life on campus, there are several ways that can open many doors to achieving this. First, get involved in business societies - Commerce, Accounting, Marketing, AIESEC, ACE (Advancing Canadian Entrepreneurship), etc. The level of involvement is extremely important - just signing up is not beneficial to anyone involved. The same principle applies when getting involved in anything - just do it. Everybody starts somewhere.

iPhone, Innovative or Impractical?

The market knew this was coming for at least the past 14 months. Rumors and 'leaks' have been appearing across the internet from both professional analysts and amateur bloggers. But somehow Steve Jobs of Apple still managed to capture the attention of the entire technology world with the announcement of the

Apple has been riding a massive wave of success over the past several months. This winter the company's popular iPod line of digital music players swept the market with 8 of the top 10 best-selling products. Perhaps not wanting to lose this momentum was the reason Mr. Jobs made the decision to make the announcement before finishing the legal discussions with Cisco over who owns the trademark 'iPhone.' Cisco, a bit miffed at Apple for not waiting for the end of negotiations, has sued Apple for the name.

Regardless of what the device is called, it is shaping up to be a pretty impressive product. The concept was one device that did everything you could ever need. The iPhone is designed to replace your cell phone, music player, PDA, camera, watch, in fact - just about any digital device

you would carry these days.

Hardware-wise, the first thing you notice about the iPhone is that it has no dial buttons on the top surface. The entire face is monopolized by the 3.5 inch touch screen that makes up the iPhone's main interface. The resolution is 320x480, which is as good as, or worse than, recent PDAs. There are a few buttons on the side of the device including the power button. Its dimensions are 2.4 in x 0.7 in x 4.5 in, making it thinner than a Motorola Razr. It weighs a mere 4.8oz, about the same as a modern cell phone. Personally, I'd be worried about snapping this

For wireless connections, the iPhone not only has a standard quadmode cell phone connection, but it also can connect to local computer networks via Wi-Fi hotspots, and devices such as headsets and keyboards with a Bluetooth connection.

The iPhone has a built-in camera. But with only 2 megapixels and a sub-standard lens, it will is good for quick snapshots, but not anything you'd want to print.

On the software side, we find nothing overly revolutionary. It works as a basic PDA with a scheduler, To-Do list, and calculator. The Safari internet browser is a nice

design, but most pages still aren't screen? Problems will arise. designed to be looked at on a screen that small. Get ready to do a lot of scrolling.

The interface is visually impressive. All controls are done by either tapping your finger or dragging it along the screen. You can thumb through your address book and pick a contact, or scroll through your CD albums just by touching them.

Of course, it comes bundled with the infamous iPod software. All your music, videos, audiobooks, and TV shows available right there on your "beautiful 3.5-inch widescreen display"... as Apple calls it.

First of all, the two models have 4GB and 8GB of memory, respectively. That is not a massive amount of storage space for music and pictures by any means - even less impressive when talking about digital video.

The second issue is this: have you ever watched a show designed for a 20 inch TV screen on a 3.5 inch

My overall favorite feature is a built in sensor that can tell when you are answering your phone. The onboard proximity sensor detects when you lift the iPhone to your ear and it immediately turns off the display to save power.

I have to admit there is one thing the iPhone is excellent at: Looking pretty. The interface and graphics are clear and bright. Neat little features like showing the album art of a playing song are cool tricks. The menu set up and control interface are a bit revolutionary, but in the end they still lead to the same old functions that have been around

Only time will tell if the iPhone's gadgets, novelty and 'it' factor will overcome the fact that the iPhone isn't really that impressive at what it does. But hey, it worked for the

bums I buy. It hurts my heart.



Arrested Development

For sitcoms, the premise of a dysfunctional family is cliché almost even default for television, but just as The Wire revolutionized the cop show genre, the summit of familial sitcoms is Arrested Development. A mockumentary, it's a faux reality show about California's oncewealthy Bluth family. Using single cameras, no laugh track and cuts showing newspaper articles, file photos and evidence documents to fly in the face of conventional sitcoms structures and create a whole self-reflexive universe of recurring items, themes and characters.

Instead of the usual fat husband, out of his league attractive wife and 2.5 children; the Bluth clan is made up of 4 adult siblings, their parents and kids, who vaguely resemble the Corleone family in the Godfather saga. An anti-cinderella story, the opposite of the Beverly Hillbillies, the Bluth family goes from riches to rags when the authorities arrest George Bluth Sr. (delightfully droll Jeffrey Tambor) for using the home building, frozen banana selling Bluth Company as his own personal piggy bank and possibly some "light treason". He puts the company in control of his alcoholic, controlling, high-life accustomed wife Lucille (Jessica Walter), mistakenly believing a husband and wife can't be arrested for the same crime. Their son Michael (Jason Bateman), a straight-laced widower returns home to take charge of the company and valiantly try to keep it afloat legitimately. All the Bluth siblings and their children start living under one roof to cut costs, that roof happens to be a shoddy model home for the Bluth company, a glorified display model with few working parts. Michael and his equally hard working, honest but awkward son George Michael (Michael Cera) try to curb their families lying, spending and mistrust, but that is a difficult job for two people. Oldest brother George Oscar Bluth II (fantastic Will Arnett) or GOB pronounced like the biblical survivor Job wants to be a professional magician despite being not very talented at anything besides riding a segway and upstaging Michael. Michael's twin sister Lindsay (equally lovely and talented Portia de Rossi) will jump on the bandwagon of any again at midnight.

political cause of the week and dip into the company money for the latest fashions. Her husband Tobias (hilarious David Cross) was a bad psychiatrist and now aspires to be an actor with even less success. Their daughter Mae or "Maeby" is just the opposite of her cousin George Michael, lazy and will rebel against her parents' latest actions at the drop of a hat. George Michael also has a secret crush on Maeby, but is she really his cousin? And the baby of the family in more ways than one, Michael's youngest sibling Byron a.k.a. "Buster" is a professional grad student Momma's boy with zero social skills.

All the cast is absolutely perfect in their roles, one of the best ensemble comedic casts ever assembled. The guest stars range from Liza Minelli (as Lucille Bluth's best friend and chief social rival Lucille Austero) to Inside the Actor's Studio's James Lipton (as the Warden of George Sr.'s prison) to Ben Stiller (a magician rival of GOB's), Henry The Fonz" Winkler (as the Bluth's eccentric attorney Barry Zuckerkorn) and dozens of other surprising, hilarious cameos.

The jokes are sometimes the usual sitcom dirty jokes, double entendres and misunderstandings in addition to puns, whip fast oneliners that you'll probably miss the first time around and call backs (from the cornballer to "her?") that harken back episodes that die hard fans will appreciate like a personal shout out.

With a perfect cast, layered jokes and continuing storylines, hilarious but not gimmicky guest stars and smart topical humor (the Iraq war, low-carb diets and "the star wars kid") make Arrested Development possibly television comedy at it's best.

Perhaps it was the unusual humor, the storylines lasting longer than 22 minutes and the references to previous episodes, or perhaps Fox's questionable marketing and timeslot shuffling that caused Arrested to end up in the land of the brilliant but prematurely cancelled along with Futurama and Firefly. You'll always be in my heart AD.







game. The ABA combines FIBA and Pro rules. There is a rule called the "3D-Rule". It comes into play when the offensive team loses possession of the ball while in the backcourt. When the 3-D rule is on, an additional point is added to the point value of the field goal: Jad explains a scenario, "Even when you think a game is over, it still really isn't over. If we're down, say six, with a minute to go, and we're pressing full-court, if we steal the ball and score we get an extra point. 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
