### Report from the President

These issues will have to be faced in the near future to ensure that all students benefit from their university experience in as wide a way as possible.

The attitude and spirit of the Saint Mary's campus seems to be unusually upbeat this year and this I believe is a testament to the ever growing popularity of SMU.

I encourage you to get involved and stay involved in whatever area of the university experience excites you. As part of the SMUSA Lecture series, Nuclear Physicist - Lecturer Stanton T. Friedman will present an illustrated lecture: "Flying Saucers ARE Real".

Friedman, full-time lecturer on controversial scientific subjects. He has spoken at more than 500 colleges and dozens of professional groups in 48 states and 8 Canadian provinces. Overflow crowds, extended questions and answer sessions, and favorable, often front page, newspaper coverage have been the rule rather than the exception. He has appeared on hundreds of TV and Radio programs including Merv Griffin, Mike Douglas, Canada AM, PBS Later Night and many others. Since moving to Frederickton from California in 1980, he has done a weekly science commentary for CBC radio. He is well known for communicating in terms everyone can understand, with lots of humour.

### TYPING SERVICE

The Students' Association has started a centralized typing service. The service will operate out of the Information Desk.
