ALUMNI PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



One of the favorite activities that accompanies any Saint Mary's gathering are the stories and anecdotes told by Alumni. I particularly enjoy the stories from the old Windsor Street campus such as the

beginnings of Saint Mary's Football on fields of mud. Other sports memories include the game when Bob Leahy scored 63 points in the Old Gymnasium. One of my earliest Huskies memories was 23 years ago watching the 1974 National Championship game against Guelph with Mickey Fox hitting 2 point (now 3 point) shots from remarkable distances. You probably share your own stories with your contemporaries from your time at the University. Everyone has their favorite memory. The sharing of reminisces is enjoyable whether it was the teaching of your favorite Professor, or Anthony William's catch of Chris Flynn's pass in 1989 to win the Atlantic Bowl. The theme of an attachment to Saint Mary's is strong among our Alumni. The small tight knit environment of Saint Mary's where Professor's knew you even after you graduated gave everyone a sense of ownership and participation in the Saint Mary's community. As enrollment has grown over the years Saint Mary's today bears little physical resemblance to its older campus', but retains the sensibilities of a small school.

The academic challenge faced by a Saint Mary's student today is little different from the past. The courses and the technology available may change but academia at Saint Mary's continue to call for intellectual rigor. The economic challenges facing a student today are notably different from the past. The overall cost of University education has increased. With Government funding being reduced, the burden falls on student tuition. Many people believe that 3/4 of University revenue comes from Government funding. At Saint Mary's less than half of the funding comes from Government. Saint Mary's receives a grant that approximates \$2,400 hundred per student while similar Institutions in Nova Scotia receive upwards of \$4,000 per student. Saint Mary's is grossly mistreated with respect to the equitable distribution of public funds. Saint Mary's alumni vote and pay taxes in similar manner to other citizens. The fair resolution of this long outstanding inequity is an issue of paramount impor-

Saint Mary's is a much larger organization today compared to years ago and continues to carry its role of providing high quality education. Enrollments have grown but funding has not kept pace. Saint Mary's has the dubious distinction of receiving the lowest level of government funding in the country. The University realizes economies and savings wherever possible; for example, the championship caliber Football program so many of us enjoy is largely run by unpaid volunteers. There are many examples of Santamarians who grab hold of an oar and help the University move ahead. The Saint Mary's student of today carries a weight that we did not have to bear. When we read the MacLean's survey of Post-Secondary Education we find that the Saint Mary's Alumni ranks 12th in the country in terms of percentage (15%) of Alumni that give to the University. There are many reasons to be proud of Saint Mary's; this is not one of them. We need alumni to exercise their sense of ownership and involvement in Saint Mary's. We can improve our Alumni giving by contributing, even modest amounts, to programs that will lighten the weight on the students such as scholarships, bursaries, and library acquisitions. I encourage you to grab hold of an oar and help in even a modest manner.

In terms of the Association, we have numerous projects and endeavors underway, run by volunteers. On May 24, the Alumni Annual Dinner will take place at the Westin Nova Scotian Hotel. On June 21, 1997, a volunteer committee coordinated by Athletics & Recreation will hold their Annual Ladies Hat & Jar Golf Tournament. On June 26, the Saint Mary's Seniors Alumni Golf Tournament takes place at the Chester Golf Club. Later in the season, on August 28, the 21st Annual Alumni Golf Tournament will be held at Oakfield. All of these events are non-fundraising events and are run by Alumni Volunteers. The Association Executive is trying to find as many ways as possible to involve the members in events. The Association exists to support your University and to involve its membership; namely you, the Alumni. We invite all 20,000 plus of you to take an active role in your Association.

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CHEMISTRY ALUMNUS DEVELOPS NEW SYNTHETIC DRUGS

Synthetics are part of our life. We dress in syn thetic fibers like polyester and nylon and take artificially-made drugs for colds and other illnesses. They have become so common that sometimes we take them for granted.

Long before synthetic products make it to the shelf, a lot of hard work begins in a laboratory. Using molecules, as building blocks, chemists start work using test tubes.

"I'm trying to find new ways to make new drugs," says Dr. Robert Singer, 32, Chemistry Department, Saint Mary's University. Dr. Singer graduated with a Bachelor of Science honors degree from Saint Mary's in 1986 and he completed his Chemistry PhD at Simon Fraser University, British Columbia. He also received a prestigious Alexander Von Humboldt fellowship for post-doctoral work at the University of Marburg, Germany and began teaching at Saint Mary's four years ago.

In the past two years Dr. Singer has realmost ceived \$100,000 from the petroleum industry and government agencies to research cheaper, faster and more selective molecules for the construction of synthetic compounds. Part of his funding comes from the Natural Science and Engineering Research Council of Canada in the amount of \$15,750 and the Petroleum Research Fund has provided him with \$34,000 for a two year grant. The funding has allowed him to hire six undergraduate students.

Dr. Singer is working on rwo different projects which complement each other. One project involves the development of organ-metallic meth-

odologies. Working with metal atoms, the smallest particles of matter that have characteristics of particular chemical elements, he is able to conduct reactions which are more selective while yielding higher returns of the end product. Specifically, Dr. Singer's research utilizes Zinc, an electron rich metal, to make new carbon-carbon bonds.

The process involves vacuuming the air and water from a specialized round glass bottom flask and replacing it using needles and syringes with inert gasses like argon and nitrogen. The reactions are then carried out at low temperatures ranging from -30 to -78 degree Celsius. The compounds are then purified and isolated at Saint Mary's, while the verification takes place at the Atlantic Regional Magnetic Resonance Centre, Dalhousie University.

Going against conventional methods is a trait of Dr. Singer's. Instead of using traditional sol-

vents like ether or water, he is working with ionic liquids, like a liquid salt, for his second project.

These compounds are chemically similar to table salt but, because they are low freezing liquids they can be used as solvents for reactions that can take place either at room temperature or as low as -90 C. Traditionally, chemists use solvents like ether or water as their reaction mediums. The use of ionic liquids means milder temperature conditions can be applied. The hope is that these compounds will be selective and yield more of a specific compound.

"We want to demonstrate our methods by making compounds in the lab that otherwise occur in nature," says Dr. Singer. As an example he cites a compound like ASA, which is found in many pain reliving drugs. ASA is a derivative of a compound that exists in willow leaves. Chemists can now synthesize ASA in the lab without the aid of mother nature.

"Everything I'm doing here, I hope will make a big difference," he says. It certainly seems to be a big deal to pharmaceutical companies, who are interested in cheaper, more selective methodologies that can create synthetic products with potential pharmaceutical activity.

REMEMBERING TONY LAW OCTOBER 15, 1916 — OCTOBER 15, 1996

Saint Mary's University lost a great friend and supporter when Anthony (Tony) Law died on October 15, 1996.


Tony came to Saint Mary's following a distinguished career in the Canadian Navy. During World War II he was the Commander of the 29th Canadian Motor Torpedo Boat Flotilla and was appointed an official Naval War Artist in 1943 and 1945/46 while his boat MTB 459 was up for refit. He has recounted many frightening accounts of his attacks on the powerful German armada in his book *White Plumes Astern*, published in 1989. He received the Distinguished Service Cross in 1944.

Prior to the out break of war he had just begun a most promising career as a landscape painter. He had studied painting with such prominent artists as Franklin Brownell and Fred Varley. Highly influenced by the Group of Seven he undertook painting expeditions with Henri Masson, Jackie Nichol and Tom Woods to the Gatineau Hills. In 1937 he had his first solo exhibition in Quebec City in which he "did very well for the depression" and promptly resigned his design job to work as a landscape artist. He was awarded the Jessie Dow prize in 1939 and 1951.

Following the war he continued his command in the Canadian Navy where he had opportunities to lead expeditions to the Arctic and to Easter Island. During this time he continued his art and was known as the "Painting Commander".

The Jesuits understood that exposure to the visual arts was an important part of a liberal arts education and Tony was invited to come to Saint Mary's as Artist in Residence. He maintained a studio in the McNally building where he painted and worked with students. He also set up a gallery in the foyer of the library and toured exhibitions throughout the Atlantic Provinces. Together with his wife, Jane, he created sets for the Saint Mary's Dramatic Society with Father William Stewart. One plywood wood stove was so realistic one gentleman offered to buy it after the production.

Tony worked hard to help build the infrastructure of public galleries we have in Halifax today. He secured the premises for the Centennial Gallery in 1967 and served on the board of the Art



Gallery of Nova Scotia. He worked with others on the design of the University's Art Gallery. When Robert Dietz became the first Director, Tony continued on as Artist in Residence and retired in 1980. He had major exhibitions of his work at Saint Mary's in 1972, 1975, 1980. In 1989, curator Bernard Riordon undertook a retrospective of Tony's painting at the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia.

Since his retirement Tony continued to support Saint Mary's with scholarships for students and many other activities including receptions in his home.

On a personal note, I will miss Tony as a close friend and fellow artist. We travelled together on painting trips to the Queen Charlottes, San Miguel, Cape Breton, Cross Island and many other destinations particularly on the South Shore. I will miss the fellowship and the "happy hours" following a strenuous day of painting in the outdoors. Even when he was ill he still had double the energy of anyone else and undertook painting trips to Mexico and Bermuda and renovated his house and built a Japanese Garden. He was a man of action that made things happen and his energy, creativity, generosity and gentility will be greatly missed by a wide circle of friends and colleagues.

Editors note:

Anthony Law donated about 135 art books, consisting mainly of Canadian art, to Saint Mary's University's Library just days before he died. The books are valued at \$5,000.



A GAELIC LEGEND DIES JOE NEIL MACNEIL (1908-1996)

In 1990 Saint Mary's University conferred an honorary doctoral of letters degree on Joe Neil MacNeil to honor his lifelong commitment to the culture of Gaeldom and to single out a truly remarkable man who lived humbly in our midst.

Joe Neil, known in the Gaelic community as 'Eos Nill Bhig,' died on October 14, 1996 at the age of 88. His passing is an enormous loss to Gaelic culture because Joe Neil was the last of the Gaelic seanachaidhean, those possessors of the store of cultural riches which have been passed on orally for hundreds of years.

Though the loss of this living link with the Gaelic tradition is irreparable in a culture which valued so highly the art of the seanachaidh, a lot of Joe Neil's stories are preserved by tape-recordings made by a number of Gaelic scholars, including his friend and close collaborator Dr. John Shaw, Department of Scottish Studies, University of Edinburgh. John ensured that some of Joe Neil's treasured hoard of lore was made available to a world-wide audience with the publication of Sgeul gu Latha/Tales until Dawn (1987). The book received praise world-wide for its scholarship in preserving Gaelic traditions of which Joe Neil was the unique possessor. It is typical of Joe Neil that despite his international standing, his own fierce loyalty to Cape Breton Gaeldom,

required that the book be launched in the firehall of the parish of Big Pond, where he had heard many of his tales.

Joe Neil grew up in a community settled by Gaels from the Outer Hebridean islands of Barra and South Uist. In the early years of this century, Gaelic was the preferred language of the community. Joe Neil told me once that his mother knew only a few words of English and that he himself acquired English at school around the age of seven. By conscious choice in his childhood, he sought out the respected storytellers in the community and absorbed from them a body of tradition, which even then the community elect regarded as passé. His command of the Gaelic language was extraordinary. John said to me one time that every time Joe Neil spoke a new phrase or word would issue from his lips.

Joe Neil was regarded by Gaelic speakers as having the highest standards in the language, described as "ringing Gaelic." He was sought out as a language teacher at the university level and when scholars began recording his repertoire, they discovered a range, quality and beauty far beyond anything they could have expected for its time and place. Along with this repertoire, some of it 2,000 years old, was discovered his formidable knowledge of songs, genealogies, instrumental

music and proverbs.

Joe Neil believed that Gaelic language and culture should have a constructive and vital part to play in Cape Breton. Little known by us here, he was a central fixture of the Toronto Storytelling Festival where he was recognized as a major Canadian storyteller. In 1989 the Folklore Association of Canada conferred on him the Marius Barbeau Award. His Gaelic expressions have been used extensively in university language courses in Scotland and *Tales until Dawn*, is required reading in folklore courses at Scottish universities.

I will leave the last word to the person who knew him and valued him the best, his close friend John: "As the leading Scottish Gaelic storyteller of his time he should be regarded on a level with gifted and dedicated Cape Breton Gaels such as composer Dan R. MacDonald, violin player Mairi Alasdair Raghnaill, Angus Chisholm, and singer Malcolm Angus MacLeod. He also had something else in common with such 'ordinary' Gaels: the understanding that their materials, art and skills are part of a larger community. As a Gaidheal gu chùl (a Gael to his backbone) Joe Neil's legacy as a storyteller and his gift to all of us is as much in his dedication to story-telling and the people around him, as in the stories themselves."

EMBA STUDENTS BUILD BUSINESS CONTACTS ABROAD

Close to 24 Executive Master of Business Students and alumni from Saint Mary's had the chance to learn first-hand the importance of dealing with foreign business executives, as part of the EMBA excursion to China in January, 1996.

The students and alumni took part in a trade mission to Zhuhai, China, Hong Kong and Macao, an independent city on the southern side of China. "It is interesting to note that something as natural as eating takes on a new significance when you travel. If you have not experienced eating peanuts with chop sticks, you do not know what challenges you are missing," says Willy Robinson, Halifax Main Branch Manager, CIBC, an EMBA '96 alumnus who participated in the trade mission.

All the participants in the Class of 1997's International Marketing trade mission were fascinated by the food. The tour guide who led the orientation on the first day of the 10 day trade mission stated that the Chinese eat everything that flies except planes. In Zhuhai, an economic zone in China, some adventurous participants had the pleasure of eating snake and sea worm soup. While the ingredients were a culture shock to the participants, the food was delicious.

"The trip was extremely worthwhile and interesting," says John Nowlan, Executive Producer, Children's and Youth Television, CBC, who is completing his EMBA. This was his third trip to China and Hong Kong and what amazed him this time was how much growth was taking place in Hong Kong. Nowlan used the trip to visit both public and private broadcasting systems to see if they would be interested in Canadian children shows. The trip opened his eyes to the cultural differences that play a vital role to his business. Children shows are quite violent in Hong Kong and they are not interested in the kind and gentle shows like Theodore Tugboat, a highly successful Halifax production. "There is also a big worry about the freedom of press under Chinese control, but it will still be public TV and they will still need a product," he says.

Having the mix of alumni and current EMBA students works to the advantage of the current class, enabling them to see how important business contacts are in Asia. Keeping up those contacts is also essential, and doing follow-up's is key to continued success.

THE INTERNATIONAL SAINT MARY'S WORLD PROFILE

Once a week Ken Ozmon sits down at his computer and taps in a few e-mail messages to Saint Mary's students who live not around the corner, but around the world.

"I do communicate with a lot of alumni and they're in many countries, England, Singapore, China, Mexico," says the university president. "I think people would be really surprised by just how

many countries are represented by our international students, and how active we are."

Saint Mary's campus and its students extend far beyond its south-end Halifax location to the south,

north, west, and Far East of the globe. There is a Saint Mary's link on every continent in the world.

It's becoming increasingly easier to bump into someone halfway around the world who might have sat next to you in a classroom at Saint Mary's.

There is no better example of the international influence of Saint Mary's University, than a story from the mid 1980s. A group of Canadian uni-

versity presidents where visiting China and during that trip, George Pederson of the University of Western Ontario got separated from his group in Beijing. Anxious and unable to speak the language, he was approached by a young Chinese man who asked in fluent English if he could help.

It turns out the young man was a Saint Mary's alumnus who, on finding out Pederson's identity,

Stories abound of graduates anxious to catch up on news from what was once home for a while. At a recent education fair in Bangkok, an attorney who studied in the English as a Second Language program in 1991 traveled several hours just to say hello. Several dozen alumni, including grads doing further study at the London School of Economics, Oxford and Cambridge, got

together for a function shortly before Christmas 1996, while about 14 "very active" Master of Business Adminstration alumni gather in Singapore.

M a u r e e n Woodhouse, Project manager, International

Activities Office recently attended several education fairs in Malaysia, Singapore and Bangkok. At every one "alumni came out and were really keen to sit in the booth and greet people," she says.

They talked to educators and potential students about Saint Mary's courses, Canadian winters and the comfort of walkways and tunnels, and the opportunities abounding from Saint Mary's attention to the world around it.

Education partnerships with facilities in China and Bermuda have existed for about 20 years, but an ever-increasing number of exchange programs, extension courses and research positions are opening doors and opportunities inmany countries inleuding Vietnam, Mexico, Scotland, The Gambia, Indonesia, Jamaica and Bolivia.

"We really are living in a global village today, and it is important for students to be able to act in a global economy," says Dr Ozmon

It's hard to say who is more proud of the fact Saint Mary's is becoming a leader in international education: Dr Ozmon or Denis Leclaire, Director of the university's five-year old International Activities Office.

"These are examples of what can be achieved," says Leclaire pointing to programs as diverse as student placements with five Canadian embassies around the world; an exchange program with the Universidad La Salle in Mexico where accounting students gain practical experience on the impact of NAFTA on accounting procedures; and

happily asked about Dr. Ozmon and the state of the Huskies football team.

How the Huskies are doing in the standings is a question Dr. Ozmon cheerfully answers on trips, including the most recent Team Canada trip to Asia. "Alumni are alike everywhere. They want to know how the teams are doing, they want to know how professors are doing."

a year-long English course for 10 Vietnamese diplomats.

It's networking on a truly global scale, providing an opportunity to forge friendships, partnerships and cultural understanding.

"Attracting international students internationalizes our campus, bringing different perspectives to our classrooms and our community," says Leclaire. "It ensures students have a chance to gain a better understanding of the world and that they also develop a cross-section of skills allowing them to function anywhere in the world."

Not only students and faculty benefit from expanded horizons but also business people. Blake Daley has first-hand experience. President and owner of family-owned Waldale Manufacturing Ltd., a decades-old Amherst, Nova Scotia company that produces licence plates. He was approached two years ago by MBA students looking for experience in investigating international business potential.

Daley, who hadn't been active outside of Atlantic Canada and Quebec, agreed. Not only did the company land license plate contracts worth about \$6 million for two American states but also got contracts to manufacture plates in Pakistan, the Phillipines and several small Pacific Islands.

It was on a trip to Thailand to investigate license plate potential that Daley became curious about the number of boilers in the country. Canadian Combustion Products, a company dealing in boiler products was born. A year later Daley has inked a deal worth \$10-\$12 million (U.S.) with the Electric Generation Agency of Thailand, which will be buying Canadian boiler products.

"I never would have had that perspective if the Saint Mary's MBA program hadn't taken me there," said Daley, just a week before a business trip to Costa Rica. "That we could be in the East Coast of Canada, shipping to 12 time zones away . . . it just would never have crossed my mind."

The world, says Dr Ozmon, is waiting to be explored. "I think when people leave here, they take with them the knowledge that they are not only citizens of Nova Scotia, or Canada, but citizens of the world."



show, BJ Wilson, Harv Stewart and Lisa Blackburn, donated a number of free movie preview tickets to the students. Wacky Wheatley's was instrumental in making this initiative possible.

"The decision to attend university can be somewhat daunting but now students can watch the recruiting tapes and get a better feel for the university of their choice. University is an experience as well as an education," says Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, President, Saint Mary's University.

"Having Q104 work with us has been excellent," says Greg Ferguson, Director, Admissions. "I have been really impressed by the quality of the advertisements and people are noticing them."

The number of students inquiring about Saint Mary's remains strong. This year the recruitment team is expanding their focus to include more schools in Newfoundland, New Brunswick and Ontario. Currently all the high schools in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island are visited at least once. With over 80 per cent of Saint Mary's

enrollment originating from the Maritimes, the recruitment team takes their job seriously.

A Saint Mary's recruitment team takes a number of people from different administrative departments including Alumni, Co-op Education, Student Services and Athletics and Recreation. Last year the team visited over 150 high schools in the Atlantic Provinces, and schools in Ontario, British Columbia, the Bahamas, Bermuda and Trinidad.

This semester, Saint Mary's University, Q104 and Wacky Wheatley's will donate TV/VCR units to three different Metro high schools.

From the laboratory to the great outdoors, a Saint Mary's University Chemistry professor receives international distinction his photography.

Dr. Keith Vaughan, Chemistry Department, was recently awarded the fellowship distinction from the Color Photographic Association of Canada (FCPAC) and the distinction of Excellence de la Federation Internationale de l'Art Photographique (EFIP) from the International Federation for Photographic Art. Only about a dozen people in Canada have an EFIP.


Twenty-four years ago when Dr. Vaughan decided to take up photography as a hobby he had no idea it would lead him to compete internationally. Today his work receives acclaim and recognition from both the public and his peers. His photography was displayed during the Faculty, Alumni, Staff and Student exhibition at the University Art Gallery, and recently he presented a multi-projection show for the Chemistry Department.



"To me photography becomes art when you start being creative," he says. Part of creativity involves manipulating and double exposing photos. Asked what makes his photography different he says, "I guess I've always pushed it." Working mostly with land and seascapes, his photography has a surreal aspect and almost dreamlike quality.

Dr. Vaughan plays an active role in the photography community. In January, 1997 he was named by the International Federation of Photographic Art as Liaison Officer and will work with the two major Canadian photographic organizations.
