# HISTORICAL SKETCH 

AND

## PROSPECTUS.

St. Mary's College was founded about fifty years ago to provide for the higher education of Catholic Boys in the diocese of Halifax. As now, so at that time, the authorities recognized the necessity of such an institution for the proper training of youth, to fit them for the manifold duties of life, and especially to enable them to make the best of the talents with which they had been blessed by Providence.

Like all such institutions, it has had its trials and reverses. For nearly thirty years, a struggle for existence was maintained. Finally in the early eighties, owing principally to the withdrawal of provincial grants, the college was obliged to suspend.

During a long interval of more than twenty years, efforts were unavailing, either to establish a new institution or continue the old. Hence, for a whole generation, were we deprived of all the fruits that such ant institution bears for the community in which it exists. The spirit of loyalty on the part of the people became sensibly less and less, until at the end of this long lapse of time the conviction of the usefulness or necessity of a collége was, to all appearances, killed.

Nevertheless, the authorities were convinced that existing colleges did not solve the problem of the higher education of our Catholic boys. During the period which elapsed from the suspension of the old St. Mary's College until its re-establishment, a space of twenty years, there were but three students for the priesthood from the City of Halifax, which boasts a Catholic population of nearly twenty thousand. In all the other higher walks of life, Catholic boys were an unknown quantity.

The only reason which could explain this state of affairs was that the means of the higher education of our Catholic boys were not to be had without incurring an expenditure deemed out of question by even willing parents.

Under most trying and heart-breaking circumstances was the resurrection of St. Mary's College attempted by Archbishop O'Brien in 1903. The usual difficulties of such an undertaking were augmented by unforseen obstacles, to deal with which here would serve no good purpose. Suffice it to say, that having surmonnted these with indomitable courage, His Grace formally opened the institution in September of that year. Step by step it has advanced towards the goal the Archbishop had in view.

It is to be hoped that the people of this city and diocese will come to view with one mind this sacred enterprise, sacred because it is fraught with greatest importance to the people of our province and to the future well-being of our growing generation.

As for the character of the institution, let it be said that that will be such as the supporters desire it to be. No effort will be spared to place it in a high rank and to entitle its graduates to that esteem accorded by men of intellect to those of real worth. In times gone by, there have gone forth from the halls of St. Mary's College, mell who have forged to the front and who have honoured their native province.

Such results can be obtained now also. Already nine students of the new college have finished their classical education and have entered the Seminary to prosecute their studies for the priesthood. One of these has gone to the famous Propaganda College at Rome. Others of our students have taken honorable positions in the banking and commercial life of our city, and we hope to see them reflect honour upon their Alma Mater, and by the probity of their lives bear out the teachings which make the Catholic Church such a power for good in the world of to-day.

The work of the last six years has shown a steady growth in character. A full collegiate course of studies is being gradually provided. All the best features of modern systems are being adopted, and the course of studies, whilst giving ample scope for the attainment of literary and classic scholarship, will be so shaped as to fit young men for commercial life and for positions in the industrial world of to-day. The management of
the College is not bound by traditional methods, nor by hard and unbending rules. It is alive to the needs of the hour, and if generously encouraged and supported, it will meet those needs as the Catholic Church alone can meet them.

The household arrangements of the boarding college are in charge of the Sisters of St. Martha. The supervision exercised over boarding students will enable them to prepare their classwork more thoroughly than would be the case if drawn away by the distractions which usually attend the day scholar's career. Their comfort and bodily well-being will be as carefully looked after as their spiritual training. In short, the adage of " a short mind in a sound body " will be lived up to, as far as it is possible so to do.

A change is being made this year in the commercial department. Heretofore students taking this course, have taken up book-keeping, typewriting and shorthand during the first two years of the course and have followed at the same time the regular general courses in English, French and Mathematics of the first two years. As a result of their anxiety to obtain commercial positions they have left the college without touching even third year work in English or French. In addition to that, experience proves that the study of Shorthand is ruinous to the spelling and composition of those who have not advanced to at least, the third year work. Hence it has been determined to give Shorthand to those only who are qualified to take up third year work, and Typewriting to those who are qualified for second year work. Book-keeping, as heretofore w:ll be taken up in first and second years.

In this way students who graduate in Shorthand, will graduate at the same ti ne in English, French and, generally speaking, the subjects of fourth year. To those who pass. the fourth year business examinations a diploma will be granted.*

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## BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

Solicitous as we may be about the educatioual standing of our college, it must not be forgotten that the financial responsibility is a very serious one. It may be truly said that there is no university or college in Canada today which is not handicapped because of lack of means. In Halifax this has more than once been the cause of failure.

The present college building is a brick and granite structure, three stories with basement, about $60 \times 45 \mathrm{ft}$., erected in 1903 at a cost of something over $\$ 20,000$. This sum was obtained by subscription from the people of the diocese of Halifax. The building is really a north rear wing of the college as it was proposed.

When the boarding institution was opened the property at corner of Quinpool Road and Windsor Street was purchased and remodelled, the total outlay being in the neighborhood of $\$ 7000$.

In this building sleeping accommodation was made for sixteen boarding students.

Two years ago this was found insufficient and a large dormitory was finished in the brick building capable of accommodating about thirty persons. This improvement was made possible by the generosity of the late Miss Genevieve Walsh. The cost was about $\$ 1600$. The number of boarding students increased to twenty-six during the past year and now we see ourselves once more compelled to enlarge. A herculean effort is necessary to erect the main building which, as planned, will be $160 \times 45$. Already a magnificent bequest from the late Hon. Wm. Chisholm encourages the hope that this vast undertaking will be accomplished. The Catholics of Halifax have indeed, in the beautiful institutions of ths city, proved their willingness to make heroic sacrifices for the cause of religion.

We trust to be in a position to make an announcement of a suitable and perpetual remembrance of the benefactors of the college, so that succeeding generations of students will know to whom they are indebted for the privileges enjoyed by them in the great institution of the future.

The physical development of the college students has not been neglected. A•large skating rink, costing about $\$ 1300$, has been built and paid for. The need of good, healthful sport for the students is recognized by all persons of sane judgment. The effort of the authorities will always be to make this sport a means towards good work and not an end of college life.

A large amount of money is always required for the necessary equipment of an institution such as ours.

During the past year an expenditure of about $\$ 300$ was made on the typewriting department. Four new machines were purchased and the students now have the opportunity of becoming skilled in the use of the most modern instruments.

Equipment of dormitory, alterations in class rooms, rendered necessary by the increase in the number of students, entailed a further outlay of nearly three hundred dollars,

An initial expense of $\$ 100$ is being incurred for the laboratories of physics and chemistry.

These fees are in all cases exacted in advance of the term. No reduction will be made for students who enter late or leave before the end of the term. Boarders must supply their own towels and toilet articles ; also 11apkins, napkin rings.

The College is not responsible for any money not deposited with the Rector.
(1) Each student should have two suits of clothing and two or three suits of underwear, as well as a supply of handkerchiefs and collars. All there should be distinctly marked. Good boots and rubbers form a continual necessity.
(2) Students are not allowed to exchange articles of dress or to wear those belonging to others.

To be permitted to enter as a first year student, one must pass a matriculation examination covering the following matter :

Arithmetic. As in the three parts of K . and $\mathrm{O}^{\prime} \mathrm{H}$.
Algebra. As in Hall \& Knight, to end of chapter on brackets.

Geometry. A knowledge of the definition, Postulates and Axioms.

Latin. As in Collar and Daniel's First Latin Book, to page 35.
French. As in Longman's, Pt. I, to page 35 or equivalent.
English Grammar. Easy exercises in Parsing and Simple Analysis.

French may be taken instead of Latin. Both are not required. This examination will be taken about the first of November, up until which time students will prepare at the college.

## PREPARATORY SCHOOL.

For such boys as are not sufficiently advanced to enter the first year of college work, there is a preparatory school of two departments in the college building. These boys are with the other students at all times except for class work, when they are placed in special departments for work of their own grades.

Academic Department.
The boys in this department are taking the subjects corresponding generally to Grade VIII of the Common School Curriculum. They study also the elements of French and Latin. These studies lead up to Matriculation.

Minim Department.
This department is intended particularly for boarding students who are not advanced enough to do the work of Academic Department. Their subjects of class work are: Reading, Spelling, Penmanship, Essays and Letter Writing, Arithmetic, Elementary French, Geography, History and Catechism.
