









































































FROSH WEEK 1995










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HISTORY OF SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY

Since its founding in 1802, Saint Mary's University has developed into a modern, urban university with over 7,000 full and part time students. It is the oldest English -speaking Roman Catholic initiated university in Canada. With meagre resources, the Reverend Edmund Burke founded the institution and, on being named Bishop of Nova Scotia, insisted that support for the college be continued as essential in fostering the Catholic community.


In 1841 the Nova Scotia House of Assembly gave formal recognition to the college's academic role and, eleven years later, granted it legal status. Over the next few years, there was a great deal of uncertainty about the survival of the college. In 1913, however, the Christian Brothers of Ireland were asked by the Archdiocese of Halifax to direct the college and its academic programs. Its reputation as a liberal arts institution thrived in these years. Undergraduate programs were widely respected and new institutional programs were initiated, most notable being the Taculty of Commerce which, when established in 1934, was among the first of its kind in Canada. In 1940, the Upper Canada Province of the Society of Jesus, (the Jesuits) was invited to succeed the Christian Brothers as administrators and teachers. For more than thirty years, until the new Act of Incorporation in 1970, the college remained under Jesuit supervision. It established itself in teacher education; initiated the first courses in continuing education in Halifax! Dartmouth; purchased the first computer in Atlantic Canada; and became co-educational. Also, the long-standing emphasis on liberal arts and commerce was complemented by new programs in engineering and science. The Act of 1970 gave legal status to the Board of Sovernors and Senate. Subject to the powers of the Board, the Senate is responsible for the educational policy of the University. In 1974, faculty members formed the Taculty Union which has become an influential voice in the affairs of the University.

From the Jesuits and their predecessors, Saint Mary's has inherited a strong commitment to meeting community needs and an equally strong tradition of emphasising excellence in teaching and excellence in research. During the past two decades, Saint Mary's has evolved into a more complex urban university, with a sense of its tradition, the University also offers pre-professional programs in law, medicine, engineering, theology, dentistry, architecture, and selected graduate studies. Through the efforts of the Division of Continuing Education, the number of part - time students studying in these programs and in a variety of non-credit programs has rapidly expanded at several geographic locations.

Over the last twenty years, this commitment to academic and research excellence has seen the number of full - time faculty with doctoral degrees rise to 90 percent. Part - time faculty members are recruited on the strength of academic qualification in addition to the expertise and experience they can bring to the classroom. More dramatic evidence of faculty enrichment is demonstrated by their research activities. In the last ten years, sponsored contract and academic research has increased from \$250,000 to more than \$3,000,000. This large increase reflects the University's firm belief that excellence in both teaching and research are essential for professors and that research is an integral part of the contribution that universities must make to society.

A CHRONOLOGY OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1802 ST. MARY'S COLLEGE, A SCHOOL FOR BOYS, IS FOUNDED BY FATHER EDMUND BURKE, AND IS LOCATED AT THE CORNER OF GRAFTON STREET AND SPRING GARDEN. THE SCHOOL IS NOT PERMITTED TO OPEN, HOWEVER, BECAUSE OF GOVERNMENT REGULATIONS RESTRICTING DENOMINATIONAL SCHOOLS. THE BUILDING INTENED FOR THE COLLEGE IS USED AS THE ST. MARY'S BASILICA GLEBE HOUSE. THE YEAR 1802, HOWEVER, IS RECOGNIZED AS THE FOUNDING DATE OF SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY.

1802 FATHER BURKE PROVIDES AN INFORMAL CATHOLIC EDUCATION FOR A FEW YOUNG MEN IN HIS HOUSE.

1818 FATHER BURKE OPENS A SCHOOL FOR SMALL BOYS.

1839 THE GOVERNMENT RECOGNIZES DENOMINATIONAL SCHOOLS. ST. MARY'S COLLEGE MOVES TO GRAFTON STREET, OCCUPYING THE BUILDING THAT CURRENTLY HOUSES THE CATHOLIC PASTORAL CENTRE OF THE ARCHDIOCESE OF HALIFAX. ITS INTENDED PURPOSE IS TO SERVE AS A SEMINARY FOR THE EDUCATION OF YOUNG CATHOLIC MEN FOR THE PRIESTHOOD.

1841 ST. MARYS COLLEGE IS INCORPORATED AND GIVEN TEMPORARY DEGREE GRANTING POWERS, AND MOVES TO BELLE AIRE TERRACE (OFF AGRICOLA).

1852 ST. MARY'S COLLEGE IS GIVEN PERMANENT DEGREE-GRANTING POWER, AND THE COLLEGE AND HIGH SCHOOL BEGIN A SEPARATE EXISTENCE.

1868 TEACHING DUTIES AT ST. MARYS ARE TAKEN OVER BY THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST DE LA SALLE.

1876 THE UNIVERSITY ACT IS PASSED, WHICH STATES THAT DALHOUSIE, KINGS, MOUNT ALLISION, ST. FRANCIS XAVIER, AND ST. MARY'S WILL BE REGARDED AS COLLEGES OF THE NON-SECTARIAN UNIVERSITY OF HALIFAX, AND THAT EACH WILL CONFER THEIR DEGREES IN THE NAME UNIVERSITY OF HALIFAX. EACH COLLEGE WILL RECEIVE A YEARLY GOVERNMENT GRANT. AS A RESULT OF THIS ACT, THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS OF SAINT JOHN THE BAPTIST DE LA SALLE LEAVE HALIFAX. THE COLLEGE IS TAKEN OVER BY THE ARCHDIOCESE AND IS MOVED FROM BELLE AIRE TERRACE TO BARRINGTON STREET (NEAR TOBIN STREET).

1881 THE "UNIVERSITY OF HALIFAX" CEASES TO EXIST, AND GOVERNMENT GRANTS TO EACH OF THE COLLEGES ARE STOPPED. ST. MARY'S COLLEGE CLOSES DUE TO BOTH TO LACK OF FUNDING AND LACK OF A TEACHING FACULTY.

1881 PATRICK POWER, A PROMINENT BUSINESSMAN, DIES AND LEAVES A BEQUEST IN HIS WILL FOR A BOYS' COLLEGE, BUT STIPULATES THAT IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE BEQUEST, THE SCHOOL MUST BE RUN BY THE JESUITS. THE ARCHDIOCESE IS UNABLE TO FIND AN ORDER OF JESUITS TO RUN THE SCHOOL, AND ARE THUS UNABLE TO COMPLY WITH THE TERMS OF THE WILL.

1903 THE ARCHDIOCESE IS UNABLE TO FIND A CATHOLIC ORDER TO RUN ST. MARYS AND IS THUS INELIGIBLE TO USE THE POWER BEQUEST FUNDS. THE ARCHDIOCESE UNDERTAKES A SUCCESSFUL DRIVE FOR FUNDS, AND ST. MARYS COLLEGE REOPENS AT WINDSOR STREET AND QUINPOOL ROAD (CURRENTLY THE SITE OF THE ST. VINCENT GUEST HOUSE). LOCAL PRIESTS FULFIL TEACHING DUTIES.

1913 THE IRISH CHRISTIAN BROTHERS CAME TO TEACH AT ST. MARYS. THE EXECUTORS OF PATRICK POWERS WILL DECIDE TO GRANT THE MONEY OF HIS BEQUEST FOR THE OPENING OF THE COLLEGE UNDER THE BROTHERS' ADMINISTRATION.

1914 THE COLLEGE PUBLISHES AN ACA-DEMIC CALENDAR FOR THE FIRST TIME.

1916 ST. MARY'S BECOMES AFFILIATED WITH NOVA SCOTIA TECHNICAL COLLEGE: A THREE YEAR COURSE IN ENGINEERING IS SET UP AT ST. MARY'S.

1917 THE HALIFAX EXPLOSION OCCURS ON DECEMBER 6, 1917. THERE ARE NO SERIOUS INJURIES 1918 AT THE COLLEGE, BUT THE STUDENTS ARE SENT HOME AND THE FACILITY IS USED AS AN EMERGENCY HOSPITAL FOR TWO WEEKS, THE SCHOOL IS THEN REPAIRED AND REOPENED IN FEBRUARY 1918.

1921 THE YEARBOOK WAS PUBLISHED FOR THE FIRST TIME.

1921 ONE MILLION DOLLARS IS OF-FERED BY THE CARNEGIE FOUNDATION FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF HIGHER EDUCATION TO PROMOTE A FEDERA-TION OF ALL COLLEGES IN THE MARITIMES AND NEWFOUNDLAND WITH DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY 1922 POPE PIUS XI DECLARES, VIA THE LOCAL ARCHBISHOP, THAT NO CATHOLIC COLLEGES SHALL ENTER THE PROPOSED FEDERATION OF UNIVERSITIES. WITH THE WITHDRAWAL OF THE CATHOLIC INSTITUTIONS, THE IDEA OF A FEDERATION IS ABANDONED.

1923 A COMMERCE DEPARTMENT IS.

1936 THE STUDENT NEWSPAPER, ST. MARY'S JOURNAL, IS PUBLISHED FOR THE FIRST TIME.

1940 AS A RESULT OF A DISAGREE-MENT BETWEEN THE ARCHDIOCESE AND THE IRISH CHRISTIAN BROTHER OVER THE RUNNING OF ST. MARYS, THE UPPER CANADA PROVINCE OF THE SOCIETY OF JESUS (JESUITS) TAKE OVER THE INSTITUTION.

1943 THE LAND OF THE GORSEBROOK GOLF CLUB IS ACQUIRED BY THE ARCHDIOCESE ON WHICH THE NEW ST. MARY'S COLLEGE IS TO BUILT. THE LAND 'ORIGINALLY BELONGED TO A WEALTHY AND PROMINENT HALIFAX CITIZEN, ENOS COLLINS.


1945 THE HALIFAX SCHOOL OF JOUR-NALISM IS ESTABLISHED AS A JOINT VENTURE OF ST. MARYS, MOUNT SAINT VINCENT, AND KING'S COLLEGE.

1949 THE SOD IS TURNED ON THE GORSEBROOK GOLF CLUB LAND AND CONSTRUCTION OF THE MC NALLY BUILDING COMMENCES.

1951 ST. MARYS HIGH SCHOOL AND ST. MARYS COLLEGE MOVE TO THE MC NALLY BUILDING. THE BUILDING CONTAINS CLASSROOMS, STUDENT ROOMS, AND LIVING QUARTERS FOR THE JESUITS. THE HIGH SCHOOL OCCUPIES THREE ROOMS ON THE SECOND FLOOR.

1952 THE CANADIAN MARTYRS' PARISH IS ESTABLISHED TO SERVE THE NEEDS
OF THE SOUTH END HALIFAX RESIDENTS;
THE FOYER OF THE MC NALLY BUILDING
IS USED AS ITS CHAPEL. THE FIRST MASS
IS SAID ON SEPTEMBER 14. THIS MARKS
THE BEGINNING OF WHAT WILL BECOME
A LONG ASSOCIATION BETWEEN CANADIAN MARTYRS' PARISH AND ST. MARYS;

1953 THE COLLEGE CHAPEL IS OFFI-CIALLY OPENED ON NOVEMBER 28, AND WILL SERVE AS THE HOME OF CANADIAN MARTYRS' PARISH. THE CHAPEL IS AT-TACHED TO THE MCNALLY BUILDING.

A CHRONOLOGY OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- 1953 CREDIT AND NON-CREDIT EVENING COURSES ARE OFFERED FOR THE FIRST TIME TO PART-TIME STUDENTS, BOTH MEN AND WOMEN.
- 1954 A NON-CREDIT ADULT STUDIES PROGRAM BEGINS.
- 1957 THE STUDENT DIRECTORY IS PUBLISHED FOR THE FIRST TIME.
- 1957 ST. MARY'S BECOMES AFFILI-ATED WITH IGNATIUS COLLEGE IN GUELP AND REGIS COLLEGE IN WILLOWDALE.
- 1957 THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION IS ESTABLISHED.
- 1959 THE ST. MARY'S FOOTBALL TEAM IS GIVEN THE NAME "HUSKIES". THEY HAD PREVIOUSLY BEEN KNOWN AS THE "SAINTS".
- 1959 ST. MARY'S ACQUIRES THE ROYAL MC-BEE LGP-30° ELECTRONIC DIGITAL COMPUTER, THE FIRST ELECTRONIC DIGITAL COMPUTER IN THE REGION. THE COMPUTER IS AVAILABLE FOR BOTH EDUCATIONAL AND INDUSTRIAL USAGE.
- 1960 A FACULTY MANUAL IS DRAWN UP FOR THE FIRST TIME.
- 1962 SAINT MARYS LAUNCHES AN EXPANSION PROGRAM. COLLINS HOUSE, PART OF THE ORIGINAL ESTATE ON WHOSE LANDS THE CURRENT CAMPUS STANDS, IS TORN DOWN TO MAKE WAY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NEW STUDENTS CENTRE. THIS RESULTS IN THE BEGINNING OF AN HISTORICAL LANDMARK PRESERVATION MOVEMENT IN HALIFAX.
- 1963 THE BOARD OF STUDIES IS RENAMED THE UNIVERSITY SENATE: THE OLD SENATE IS GIVEN THE MORE APPROPRIATE TITLE BOARD OF GOVERNORS".
- 1963 THE CANADIAN MARTYRS PAR-ISH CENTRE IS OPENED IN FEBRUARY.
- 1963 SAINT MARYS HIGH SCHOOL CLOSES: THERE ARE APPROXIMATELY 25 STUDENTS IN THE LAST GRADUATING CLASS.

- 1964 SAINT MARYS WITHDRAWS FROM THE HALIFAX SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM.
- 1965 THE LIBRARY OPENS.
- 1965 THE HALIFAX SCHOOL OF JOUR-NALISM CLOSES:

THE UNIVERSITY CREST WAS DESIGNED IN THE 19405 BY THE REVEREND DAMIEL FOGARTY, S.J. EACH SYMBOL IN THE CREST REPRESENTS A SIGNIFFICANT EVENT IN THE PHASES AND


HISTORY OF SAINT MARYS.

ON THE OUTER PORTION OF THE CREST, THE NAME AND LOCATION OF THE UNIVERSITY ARE INSCRIBED IN LATIN. IN ROMAN NUMERALS IS THE DATE 1841 - THE YEAR THE UNIVERSITY RECEIVED A CHARTER ALLOWING IT TO GRANT DEGREES.

THE BOOK ABOVE THE SHIELD REPRESENTS LEARNING AND KNOWLEDGE. THE INSCRIPTION ON THE PAGE OF THE BOOK IS LATIN - AGE OUDD AGIS. THIS IS THE MOTTO OF THE UNIVERSITY WHICH EXHORTS ALL THOSE CONNECTED WITH SAINT MARYS TO DO THEIR BEST IN EVERYTHING THEY ATTEMPT, THE QUOTATION WAS BOR-ROWED FROM THE IRISH CHRISTIAN BROTHERS AND REPRESENTS THEIR CONTRIBUTION TO THE

DEVELOPMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

THE UPPER PART OF THE SHIELD HAS THE OFFCIAL SEAL OF THE JESUITS WITH 1.H.S. (THE LATIN INITIALS FOR CHRIST), BELOW THESE INITIALS ARE THREE NAILS REPRESENTING THE CRUCIFIXION AND SURROUNDING THESE IS THE CROWN OF THORNS. THE TWO CROWNS REPRESENT A DUAL LOYALTY - TO THE THEN DOMINION OF CANADA AND TO THE BRITISH COMMON WEALTH, BELOW THESE CROWNS IS THE THISTLE - A LIVING REMINDER OF NOVA SCOTIA'S SCOTTISH HERITAGE.



THE HUSKY MASCOT

IN 1960 SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY CHOSE HUSKIES AS THE NAME FOR THEIR SPORTS TEAMS. THE SIBERIAN HUSKY BECAME THE OFFICIAL MASCOT FOR QUALITIES WHICH PARALLELED THE TEAMS'MOTTO, IN PURSUIT OF EXCELCENCE

POUND FOR POUND, THE SIBERIAN HUSKY IS THE STRONGEST DRAFT DOG IN EXISTENCE. A VERSATILE AND GENTLE DOG, THE HUSKY IS THE PERFECT EXAMPLE OF TENACITY, DRIVE, AND LOYALTY.

LIKE THEIR NAMESAKE. THE SAINT MARYS HUSKIES STRIVE FOR GOLD. THEY ARE WILLING TO WORK HARD TO GET THERE AND ARE ALWAYS ATTEMPTING TO ACHIEVE THEIR FULL-EST POTENTIAL.

SAINT MARY'S IN THE PAST

THE "GOOD OLD DAYS"

B EING ONE OF THE OLDEST ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNIVERSITIES TO THE CANADA, AND THE ONE WITH THE LONGEST TIES TO THE CATHOLIC CHURCH MEANS SAINT MARYS HAS ACCUMULATED HUNDREDS OF STORIES ABOUT THE GOOD OLD

DAYS," ALL PAN OF ITS 190 YEAR HISTORY.

IN 1802 THE REVEREND EDMUND BURKE FOUNDED THE INSTITUTION AND INSISTED THAT SUPPORT FOR THE COLLEGE WAS ESSENTIAL IN FOSTERING THE CATHOLIC COMMUNITY. IN 1841 THE NOVA SCOTIA HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY FORMALLY RECOGNIZED THE COLLEGE'S ACADEMIC ROLE. FOR MANY YEARS THERE WAS UNCERTAINTY ABOUT THE SURVIVAL OF THE COLLEGE AND IN 1913 THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS OF IRELAND WERE ASKED TO OPERATE THE SCHOOL BY THE ARCHDIOCESE OF HALIFAX. THIRTY YEARS LATER ARCHBISHOP MCNALLY ASKED THE UPPER CANADA PROVINCE OF THE SOCIETY OF JESUS (THE JESUITS) TO TAKE OVER BOTH THE ADMINISTRATIVE AND ACADEMIC TASKS ASSOCIATED WITH THE COLLEGE.

THE JESUITS, HOWEVER, DID NOT WANT TO TAKE OVER THE MANAGEMENT OF THE COLLEGE, ONLY ONCE WORD CAME DOWN FROM ROME DID THEY AGREE TO TAKE OVER THE OPERATIONS OF THE ALL BOYS SCHOOL, ONE OF THE FOUNDING REASONS THEY REMAINED SKEPTICAL WAS THE FACT THAT THEY REALIZED FEWER YOUNG MEN WERE ENTERING THE PRIEST-

HOOD,

THERE WAS NO TENSION BETWEEN THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS AND THE JESUITS. I GUESS THE TROUBLE WAS WITH THE LAY PEOPLE. THEY THOUGHT WE MIGHT FORCE-THEM OUT AND IT TOOK SOME TIME BEFORE FRIENDSHIPS GREW," SAYS FATHER WILLIAM STEWART, WHO SERVED AS TEACHER AND ADMINISTRATOR FOR MANY YEARS.

FOR MORE THAN 30 YEARS THE JESUITS RAN THE COLLEGE, IN 1970, UNDER THE NEW ACT OF INCORPORATION A LAY BOARD OF GOVERNORS AND A SECULAR STAFF WERE

ESTABLISHED

WHEN FATHER STEWART ARRIVED ON CAMPUS IN 1950
THE COLLEGE WAS LOCATED AN WINDSOR STREET IN HALIFAX,
ONE YEAR LATER THE SCHOOL MOVED TO THE CORNER OF ROBIE
AND INGLIS STREETS WHICH PREVIOUSLY BELONGED TO THE
GORSEBROOK GOLF CLUB. THIS WAS ONE OF THE "BIG HOT
POTATO" ISSUES HE SAYS, A LOT OF PEOPLE IN THE DIOCESE
DROUGHT IT WAS CRAZY. I THOUGHT IT WAS A GOOD IDEA. IF
THE PEACE WAS GOING TO EXPAND YOU HAD TO HAVE NEW
QUARTERS.

FATHER STEWART RECENTLY CELEBRATED HIS 80 BIRTHDAY AND HAS BEEN AFFILIATED WITH THE UNIVERSITY FOR 45 YEARS. HE NOTES THAT AT ONE POINT DURING HIS TEACHING CAREER HE TAUGHT 210 STUDENTS IN ONE CLASS. WHEN HE STARTED TEACHING THE ENTIRE STUDENT BODY WAS ABOUT 165.

FOR MANY YEARS FATHER STEWART SERVED A MODERATOR, CARPENTER AND DIRECTOR FOR THE STUDENT DRAMA SOCIETY. THOSE WERE MEMORABLE DAYS, ONE OF THE OPENING EVENTS WAS WHEN JOHN DIEFENBAKER RECEIVED AN HONOURARY DEGREE. WHEN I WENT TO CHECK THE AUDITORIUM THERE WAS NO STAGE, A CARPENTER AND I WORKED ALL DAY AND NIGHT TO INSURE THAT WE WOULD HAVE A STAGE FOR DIEFENBAKER TO WALK ON," HE RECALLS.

WHEN FATHER LAWRENCE MURPHY, RELIGIOUS STUDIES

DEPARTMENT, CAME TO THE UNIVERSITY IN

1963. THERE WERE ABOUT 500 STUDENTS ON CAMPUS AND MOST OF THEM WERE YOUNG MEN. THE ONLY BUILDING WAS MCNALLY WITH ITS NORTH AND SOUTH WINGS, THAT SERVED BOTH AS A STUDENT RESIDENCE AND LEARNING FACILITY. BACK THEN UNIVERSITY RULES STIPULATED LIGHTS OUT BY 11 P.M. AND ANYONE CAUGHT SNEAKING OUR WOULD PROBABLY HAVE BUMPED INTO FATHER HENNESSEY. "HE WAS A NIGHT OWL AND HE GOT INTO THE HABIT OF WAKING AROUND IN THE NORTH WING AND CHECKING EVERY WINDOW ON EACH DOOR TO MAKE SURE NO ONE SNUCK OUT," SAYS FATHER MURPHY.

MANY OF THE JESUITS JOINED THE ORDER AFTER COMPLETING HIGH SCHOOL. WHILE FATHER MURPHY REALIZED THIS WAS THE LIFE HE WANTED TO LIVE AT THE AGE OF 16, FATHER STEWARD WAS 22 YEARS OLD WHEN HE REALIZED THIS


WAS THE CAREER FOR HIM.

IT TOOK SEVEN YEARS FOR FATHER MURPHY TO RECEIVE HIS ARTS DEGREE BECAUSE THE FIRST TWO YEARS WERE SPENT IN SPIRITUAL STUDIES, LEARNING TO PRAY AND UNDERSTAND THE JESUIT WAY OF LIFE. TRADITIONALLY, JESUIT STUDENTS SPENT FOUR YEARS AT THE JESUIT SCHOOL IN GUELPH, ONTARIO: THREE YEARS IN TORONTO STUDYING PHILOSOPHY, THREE YEARS TEACHING IN HIGH SCHOOL AND FOURS YEARS IN THEOLOGY, IN TOTAL, AFTER 13 TO 14 YEARS, A STUDENT BECAME AN ORDAINED PRIEST.

LIKE MANY OF THE JESUITS, FATHER MURPHY HAS A FEW GOOD STORIES TO TELL ABOUT HIS EARLY DAYS AT THE UNIVERSITY. WHEN HE CAME TO SAINT MARYS, THE IDEA WAS FLOATING AROUND THAT THE UNIVERSITY NEEDED ITS OWN RINK. AT THE TIME THEY WERE RENTING RINK SPACE FROM DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY, BUT THE SAINT MARYS HOCKEY TEAM HAD A HARD TIME GETTING RINK RIME TO PRACTICE. WITH A QUARTER OF A MILLION DOLLARS FROM ALUMNITHE RINK WAS BUILT, AND WHILE IT WAS A FINANCIAL SACRIFICE, THE STRUCTURAL STEEL WAS ON SALE, HE SAYS. THATS WHY OUR RINK IS SO SMALL, BUT WHAT A VALUE FOR 25 YEARS," HE SAYS.

FATHER MURPHY RECALLS WHEN THE MEN FROM SAIN'S MARY'S AND THE WOMEN FROM MOUNT SAINT VINCENT UNIVERSITIES USED TO GET TOGETHER TO TOBOGGAN AT THE MOUNT. HE ALSO REMEMBERS THE CONTROVERSY SURROUND ING THE ADMITTANCE OF THE FIRST FEMALE STUDENT AT THE UNIVERSITY. THE WAY FATHER MURPHY REMEMBERS THE STORY WAS WHEN JOSLYN GRASSBY APPLIED. THEY THOUGH SHE WAS A BOY AND THEY ACCEPTED HER AND HAD TO ALLOW HER TO ATTEND THE UNIVERSITY. ACCORDING TO FATHER STEWART HE ENCOURAGED GRASSBY TO APPLY THE UNIVERSITY. SHE WA INTERESTED IN COURSES THAT WERE NOT OFFERED ELSEWHERE AND FATHER STEWARD COULD SEE NO REASON WHY SHE SHOULD NOT BE ALLOWED TO ATTEND SAINT MARY'S AS AN UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT. IN THE END GRASSBY RECEIVED HER BACHELOR OF SCIENCES IN 1964 AND HER ARTS ONE YEAR LATER. "AFTER THAT THE ICE WAS BROKEN AND WE BECAME OFFICIALLY CO-EDUCATIONAL (1968)," SAYS FATHER STEWARD.

'THE ISSUE OF EQUITABLE FUNDING REMAINS PIVOTAL TO THE FUTURE OF SAINT MARYS,' SAYS DR. COLIN DODDS, VICE-PRESIDENT, ACADEMIC AND RESEARCH. "WE WOULD BE RANKED CLOSER TO THE NUMBER ONE SPOT IF SAINT MARY'S WERE TO BE FUNDED AT EVEN THE PROVINCIAL AVERAGE. REGARDLESS OF FUNDING THOUGH, WE ARE PLEASED THAT THE CALIBRE OF OUR PROGRAMS ARE BEING RECOGNIZED BY THIS NATIONAL BODY."

"IN SPITE OF OUR LOW FUND-ING, NOVA SCOTIAN UNIVERSITIES CAN BE PROUD OF HOW WELL THEY'RE RANKED," SAYS DR. OZMON.

IN THE VALUE ADDED CAT-EGORY, SAINT MARY'S RANKED 15TH OUT OF 15, AS ONE OF THE LEADING INSTITUTIONS THAT WENT THE DIS-TANCE FOR THEIR STUDENTS, THIS CATEGORY TOOK INTO CONSIDERA-TION THE AVERAGE ENTERING GRADE AND THE PERCENTAGE OF STUDENTS WITH AVERAGES OF 75 PER CENT OR HIGHER, AND THE PROPORTION WHO GRADUATED AND STUDENT AWARDS. THIS YEAR, 11 INSTITU-TIONS PULLED OUT OF THE MACLEAN'S RANKING, WHILE 15 SCHOOLS OPTED OUT OF THE SURVEY, LAST YEAR, THIS IS THE FIFTH YEAR OF THE SURVEY. CREATING A DYNAMIC COMMERCE FACULTY

OVER THE PAST YEAR, SAINT MARY'S FRANK H. SOBEY FACULTY OF COMMERCE HAS UNDERGONE MANY CHANGES TO KEEP STUDENTS PRIMED FOR TODAY'S BUSINESS WORLD.

"WE ARE FOCUSED ON THE PERSON AS OPPOSED TO THE PRO-GRAM," SAYS DR. SCOTT CARSON, DEAN OF COMMERCE, DR. CARSON HAS LEAD THE FACULTY THROUGH THE MANY CHANGES THAT HAVE

ALREADY TAKEN PLACE.

COMING FROM THE BUSINESS SECTOR WHERE HE SPENT ABOUT 12 YEARS, DR. CARSON HAS MANY AFFILIATIONS WITH THE NOVA SCOTIA BUSINESS COMMUNITY. WHAT HE HEARD FROM THAT COMMUNITY MADE HIM REALIZE THAT TO KEEP COMMERCE STUDENTS UP-TO-DATE, KEY COMPONENTS OF THE PROGRAM WOULD HAVE TO BE CHANGED:

"WE ARE ON THE LEADING EDGE FOR TAKING THE APPROACH OF THE LEARNER" SAYS DR. CARSON, ADDING THAT "EMPLOYERS OF BUSINESS STUDENTS WANT THE TEAM APPROACH AND COMMUNICATION

SKILLS."

THERE ARE THREE FACTORS
THAT CONVINCED DR. CARSON
THAT A REVOLUTIONARY NEW APPROACH WAS NEEDED: NEW TECHNOLOGIES, DEMANDS OF THE MARKET PLACE AND "OUR VIEW" OF
WHAT A BUSINESS CURRICULUM
SHOULD BE, HE SAYS.

IT'S NOT NEW FOR BUSINESS SCHOOLS TO UNDER GO MAJOR CHANGES. IN THE 1960'S GENERALIST APPROACH WAS TAKEN WHERE FACULTY TAUGHT BUSINESS COURSES, BUT STUDENTS RECEIVED VERY LITTLE ACADEMIC DEPTH. THEN IN THE 1980'S MANY OF THE BUSINESS SCHOOLS CHANGED THEIR CURRICULUM TO ACADEMICALLY RIGOROUS SUBJECT MATTER. NOW HOWEVER, THE PENDULUM IS SWING-ING BACK, STUDENTS WHO GRADU-ATE TODAY NEED TO HAVE A MORE GENERAL BASE IN ORDER TO THINK CREATIVELY, WORK IN CLAIMS, UTI-LIZE THE MOST CURRENT TECH-NOLOGIES AND HAVE THE CAPACITY

FOR COMMON SENSE BUSINESS JUDG-MENT. SO WHAT HAS SAINT MARY'S DONE?

FIRST THE COMMERCE FAC-ULTY IS WORKING ON A NEW CORE PROGRAM FOR THE BACHELOR OF COMMERCE, TO BETTER INTEGRATE THE BUSINESS DISCIPLINES SUCH AS ACCOUNTING, FINANCE AND MAR-KETING, THE OBJECTIVE IS TO PRO-VIDE STUDENTS WITH A BROADER UNDERSTANDING OF THE BUSINESS WORLD. BESIDES THE INTEGRATION OF COURSES, STUDENTS WILL HAVE THE FLEXIBILITY AND OPPORTUNITY TO TAKE A NUMBER OF NON-COMMERCE COURSES. ANOTHER KEY COMPONENT TO CHANGE IS THE TEAM LEARNER APPROACH. TYPI-CALLY EACH COURSE WAS TAUGHT BY ONE PROFESSOR, NOW, FACULTY MEMBERS WILL EXPLORE NEW WAYS OF CO-ORDINATING THE DELIVERY OF MATERIAL IF A FINANCE IN-STRUCTOR KNOWS A FEW CLASSES DEAL WITH ECONOMICS, THEN A PROFESSOR FROM THAT DEPART-MENT COULD TEACH THOSE SES-SIONS.

THE MULTI-DISCIPLINARY APPROACH IS GREAT. THE BUSINESS ENVIRONMENT IS BECOMING MORE AND MORE INTER-CONNECTED AND INTER-DEPENDENT, SAYS DR. CATHY DRISCOLL, MANAGEMENT DEPARTMENT. THE COMPETITIVE AREAS ARE CHANGING DUE TO GLOBALIZATION AND BUSINESS SCHOOLS HAVE TO CATCH UP."

DR. DRISCOLL WAS ONE OF A NUMBER OF COMMERE FACULTY MEMBERS WHO PARTICIPATED IN A ONE DAY RETREAT THIS PAST JUNE. "IT WAS A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO SEE WHAT PEOPLE ARE DOING AND TO FIND OUT WHERE THERE ARE COMMON GROUNDS," SHE SAYS.

BESIDES A ONE-DAY RETREAT,
DR. CARSON HAS CALLED FOR MORE
FACULTY MEETINGS TO ENSURE
THAT MEMBERS ARE ACTIVELY INVOLVED IN DEVELOPING THE
CHANGES. THIS YEAR HE PLANS TO
INTRODUCE A NUMBER OF FACULTY
SEMINARS ON "CURRICULUM
CHANGE" PRESENTED BY PEOPLE
FROM OTHER UNIVERSITIES WHO

HAVE GONE THROUGH MAJOR PRO GRAM REVISION.

CHANGES TO THE UNDER GRADUATE PROGRAM WILL ENABL STUDENTS TO, LEARN MORE ABOUT THE BUSINESS ENVIRONMENT OTHER CHANGES HAVE ALREAD TAKEN PLACE IN THE MASTER OBUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (MBA AND THE EXECUTIVE MASTER OBUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (EMBA PROGRAMS.

STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THI YEAR'S MBA PROGRAM WILL NOTIC A NEW TIMETABLE AND USE O PROFESSIONAL WORKSHOPS ANI SIMULATION GAMES. THE COURSE ARE NOW STRUCTURED AROUN WORKSHOPS AND WEEK LONG BUS NESS SEMINARS. THE FIRST WEEK I DEVOTED TO PRESENTATION SKILL TEAM BUILDING TECHNIQUES AN TECHNOLOGY, FIRST AND SECON TERM COURSES WILL BE COMPLETE OVER 10 WEEKS (INSTEAD OF 12 THEY ARE DIVIDED INTO FIVE WEE MODULES, SEPARATED BY A WEE BUSINES DEVOTED TO SIMULATIONS. THE FINAL WEEK C THE TERM INVOLVES A WEEK LON CASE COMPETITION, WHICH WIL ENABLE STUDENTS TO PUT INT PRACTICE WHAT THEY HAV LEARNED.

PREVIOUSLY, THERE WAS NO ENOUGH INTEGRATION. WE FOUN THAT WHEN STUDENTS WERE MAING PRESENTATIONS THERE WERE SOME SKILLS MISSING. BEFORE, THE LEARNED THESE TECHNIQUES O THEIR OWN. NOW WE ARE GOING TO TEACH THEM THESE SKILLS DURIN THE FIRST WEEK OF THE PROGRAM SAYS DR. RUSSEL SUMMERS DIRECTOR, MBA PROGRAM,

THE MBA PROGRAM IS STITUTED YEARS OF COURSE WORK, BUT FOR SOME STUDENTS THE DEGREE OF THE CAN BE COMPLETED IN ONE YEAR DEPENDING ON THEIR EDUCATION, BACKGROUND AND WORK EXPERENCE. THIS IS THE FIRST PHASE OF THE PROGRAM'S REDESIGN. THE

SECOND PHASE WILL BE TO EXAMINE EACH COURSE, WITH THE INTEL TION OF REWRITING COURSE MAT

RIAL.

DR. CARSON BELIEVES THAT THE MBA PROGRAM CAN EVEN BE STREAMLINED FOR SPECIFIC GROUPS OF INDIVIDUALS, SUCH AS ENGI-NEERS, ACCOUNTANTS AND HU-MAN RESOURCE SPECIALISTS. THIS APPROACH IS COMMON THROUGH-OUT EUROPE AND IT IS A WAY OF TAILORING A PROGRAM TO MEET THE FUTURE CAREER ASPIRATIONS OF STUDENTS.

THE EMBA PROGRAM WHICH IS IN ITS SIXTH YEAR, WAS EVALU-ATED BY AN OUTSIDE EMBA DIREC-TOR FOR THE FIRST TIME, "HE MADE A NUMBER OF RECOMMENDATIONS - MAKE IT MORE INTEGRATED, SO ALL THE PIECES FIT TOGETHER AS A WHOLE, AND FIND OUT WHAT KIND DE PROGRAM WE WANT AND THEN FIND PIECES TO DELIVER IT," SAYS DR.

THE PROGRAM IS TWO YEARS IN LENGTH AND AS BONNIE KIRBY MANAGER, EMBA SAYS, "THE MOST IMPORTANT PART OF THE COURSE ARE THE STUDENTS."

THIS YEAR STUDENTS HAVE BEEN ASSIGNED TO STUDY TEAMS, MADE UP OF ABOUT FOUR OR FIVE INDI-VIDUALS, WITH 22 PEOPLE ENROLLED IN THE PROGRAM, ALL OF WHOM HOLD DEMANDING JOBS AND MOST WITH FAMILIES TO DEAL WITH, THE COURSE WORK LOAD CAN BE DE-MANDING. THE TEAM APPROACH IS VALUABLE AND MAKES THE PRO-GRAM DOABLE, IT WORKS AS A SUPPORT BASE FOR THE STUDENTS," SAYS KIRBY

"IT'S A CLIMATE OF CHANGE AND WE ART REALLY REFINING WHAT IS ALREADY PRONOUNCED EXCELLENT. WE ARE CONSTANTLY MAKING CHANGES TO MAKE IT WORLD CLASS," SAYS DR. TOM MUSIAL, DIRECTOR EMBA.

INTEGRITY OF EACH INSTITUTION AND
RECOGNIZING THE RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS OF BOARDS OF GOVERNORS

THE CONSORTIUM HAS GROWN OUT OF THE PARTNERSHIP MODEL, PROPOSED INITIALLY BY FOUR METRO UNIVERSITIES. THERE ARE A NUMBER OF POSITIVE ELEMENTS IN THE PLAN THAT WILL ALLOW SAINT MARY'S TO CONTINUE ITS GROWTH AND DEVELOPMENT AS ONE OF THE COUNTRY'S LEADING UNIVERSITIES.

"CHANGE MUST COME," SAYS
DR. OZMON. "WITH THIS PLAN, WE
HAVE A GREATER MEASURE OF CONTROL OVER OUR FUTURE THAN IN THE
MERGER OR FEDERATION MODEL OR A
PLAN DEVELOPED BY THE GOVERNMENT."

SAINT MARYS HAS BEEN JOINED IN THE CONSORTIUM BY MOUNT SAINT VINCENT UNIVERSITY, THE NOVA SCOTIA COLLEGE OF ART AND DESIGN, THE ATLANTIC SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, THE TECHNICAL UNIVERSITY OF NOVA SCOTIA (TUNS), DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY AND THE UNIVERSITY OF KING'S COL-LEGE. THE SEVEN MEMBER PARTNER-SHIP MUST DEAL WITH THE INEVITABLE FUNDING REDUCTIONS FACED BY UNI-VERSITIES. ACROSS CANADA UNIVERSI-TIES ARE FACED WITH IMPENDING CUTS FROM THEIR RESPECTIVE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS BECAUSE OF CHANGES IN THE FEDERAL TRANSFER PAYMENTS. ALBERTA UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES ARE WORKING THROUGH AN 18 PER CENT BUDGET CUT, AND COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES IN ONTARIO JUST RE-CEIVED WORD OF MASSIVE CUTS TO PROVINCIAL GRANTS.

THE CONSORTIUM'S BUSINESS PLAN MUST DEAL WITH A REDUCTION IN PROVINCIAL GRANTS OF \$17 MILLION OVER THE NEXT THREE YEARS. THE PROPOSED SAVINGS IN METRO WILL BE ACHIEVED BY SHARING SYSTEMS AND SERVICES. THROUGH ACADEMIC PARTNERING INCLUDING ATTRITION AND EARLY RETIREMENTS, AND COORDINATION OF

SOME PROGRAMS AND DEPARTMENTS.

"WHILE THE BUSINESS PLAN IS SHORT
ON DETAIL, WE ARE SERIOUSLY COMMITTED TO FINDING THE TARGETED
SAVINGS, AND TO DOING THIS IN
PARTNERSHIP," SAYS DR. OZMON. "AS
PAINFUL AS THEY MAY BE FOR US, THE
CUTS WILL ALSO BE PAINFUL FOR
OTHERS WITHIN THE PARTNERSHIP."

THE WINNERS IN THIS WILL LIKELY BE STUDENTS WHO WILL ACHIEVE GREATER MOBILITY AMONG CAMPUSES, MARKS ACCEPTED AT FACE VALUE, MAXIMIZE GREATER CHOICES OF FACULTIES AND PROGRAMS, AND ENHANCED SERVICES.

ACADEMIC PARTNERSHIP

SAVINGS OF MORE THAN \$5
MILLION WILL BE REALIZED BY NONREPLACEMENT OF FACULTY THROUGH
NORMAL AND EARLY RETIREMENT.
ANOTHER \$5 MILLION WILL BE REALIZED
THROUGH A VARIETY OF EFFORTS.
THOSE EFFORTS COULD INCLUDED MORE
EXTENSIVE COLLABORATION AND PROGRAM CONSOLIDATION.

SAINT MARY'S STATURE AS ATLANTIC CANADA'S LEADING BUSINESS SCHOOL WILL BE FURTHER ENHANCED THROUGH CO-OPERATIVE EFFORTS WITH THE BUSINESS PROGRAMS AT MOUNT SAINT VINCENT AND DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITIES. THOSE TWO INSTITUTIONS WILL OFFER SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS WHILE SAINT MARY'S WILL CONTINUE TO 'GROW'. THE FRANK H. SOBEY FACULTY OF COMMERCE TO INCLUDE DEGREES AND PROGRAMS AT ALL LEVELS.

THE AGREEMENT ALSO RECOGNIZES SAINT MARY'S URGENT NEED FOR A COMMITMENT FROM GOVERNMENT TO FUND AN ADDITION TO THE LOYOLA ACADEMIC BUILDING TO HOUSE THE COMMERCE FACULTY. AN AGREEMENT HAS BEEN REACHED ON A MORE INTEGRATED AND CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM IN COMPUTING SCIENCE BETWEEN TUNS AND DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY.

ADMINISTRATIVE PARTNERSHIP

THE CONSORTIUM WILL REALIZE SAVINGS OF NEARLY \$7 MILLION ON THE NON-TEACHING SIDE THROUGH THE CREATION OF HALIFAX UNIVERSITIES SERVICES LIMITED (HUSL) AND ON SITE ADMINISTRATIVE SAVINGS. HUSL

WILL PROVIDE SERVICES FOR ALL MEM-BERS IN INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY: REGISTRAR AND ADMISSIONS; FINAN-CIAL SERVICES; HUMAN RESOURCES; PAYROLL; PHYSICAL PLANT AND; SOME LIBRARY SERVICES, WHILE EVERY EFFORT WILL BE MADE TO CENTRALIZE SERVICES, FURTHER ANALYSIS IS NEEDED TO DETERMINE WHAT SERVICES SHOULD REMAIN ON INDIVIDUAL CAMPUSES.

THERE WILL BE SOME LARGE UP FRONT EXPENSES INCLUDING A COMMON MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM, RETIREMENT AND BUY OUT PACKAGES. AND ENHANCED TRANSPORTATION AMONG MEMBER INSTITUTIONS. DISPUTES WILL BE HANDLED AT THE DEPARTMENTAL LEVEL, AS MUCH AS POSSIBLE, AND THE PRESIDENTS AND SEVERAL EXTERNAL MEMBERS WILL ATTEMPT TO SETTLE SERIOUS DISPUTES THAT ARISE.

FINALLY, THERE REMAINS A NEED TO REFOCUS THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN GOVERNMENT AND UNIVERSITIES AND TO DESIGN A NEW NOVA SCOTIA COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION, WHICH CAN SERVE AS AN EFFECTIVE BUFFER BODY BETWEEN THE UNIVERSITIES AND GOVERNMENT, THE RELATIONSHIP MUST BE BUILT ON GOVERNMENT IDENTIFYING AND DEVELOPING A LONG TERM PUBLIC POLICY AGENDA WHILE PROVIDING THE FUNDING AND SUPPORT TO REACH THOSE GOALS.

THE HONOURABLE JOHN MACEACHERN, NOVA SCOTIA'S MINIS TER OF EDUCATION, RECEIVED THE CONSORTIUM BUSINESS PLAN ON FRI-DAY, DECEMBER 1, 1995. HE WILL ANALYZE THE DOCUMENT AND ALSO LOOK OVER THE REPORT FROM JANET HALLIWELL, CHAIR, NOVA SCOTIA COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION. WHICH WAS GIVEN TO THE MINISTER YEAR. 
HIM AND WISHED HIM GOOD LUCK WITH HIS STUDIES.

THE KINGDOM OF THE NETHERLANDS.




THE CONFERENCE IS SETUP SIMILAR TO THE ACTUAL UNITED NATIONS IN THAT THERE ARE CERTAIN COMMITTEES THAT THE COUNTRIES SIT ON AND DISCUSS ISSUES RELEVANT TO THAT COMMITTEE. THE ISSUES TAKE ON A BROAD BASE OF TOPICS RANGING FROM NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT TO HUMAN RIGHTS. PRIOR TO GOING DOWN TO THE CONFERENCE THE STUDENTS WERE REQUIRED TO RESEARCH THE TOPICS TO BE DISCUSSED AS WELL AS PREPARE THEMSELVES BY WORKING ON NEGOTIATION SKILLS, SPEAKING SKILLS AND GROUP DYNAMICS. THE CONFERENCE WAS A VERY EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE BUT AT THE SAME TIME IT WAS A LOT OF FUN BECAUSE IT GAVE US AN OPPORTUNITY TO MEET WITH OVER 2000 STUDENTS FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD. 











































WELCOME TO The JOURNAL

OOKING BACK ON THE STORIES THAT FILLED OUR PAGES THIS YEAR, ILLUS TRATES THE EXCITEMENT THAT HAS OCCURRED ON CAMPUS. THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S PROPOSAL TO SLASH FUNDING FROM POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION, AND THE ISSUES FACING THE SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY STUDENTS ASSOCIATION (SMUSA), WERE PRIMARILY THE LEAD STORIES THAT GRABBED EVERYONES ATTENTION.

STUDENTS, FACULTY AND STAFF AT SAINT MARY'S WERE ALL WITNESSES TO HOW DILIGENTLY SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT, DR. KENNETH OZMON, ALONG WITH METRO'S SIX OTHER UNIVERSITY PRESIDENTS, WORKED TOWARDS FIND-ING AN ALTERNATIVE SOLUTION TO THE PROPOSED \$17-MILLION IN CUTS. IN ORDER TO AVOID ANY MASSIVE LAYOFFS OR OTHER DRASTIC CHANGES THAT WOULD SIGNIFICANTLY EFFECT THE STRUCTURE OF SAINT MARYS, AND THE STUDENT POPULATION, METRO'S UNIVERSITY PRESIDENTS DEVISED AN ALTER-NATIVE MECHANISM IN ORDER TO PRESERVE WHAT THE UNIVERSITIES IN THE CITY HAD TO OFFER, SHORTLY BEFORE THE 1996 NEW YEAR, THE PRESIDENT INTRODUCED THEIR CONSORTIUM PLAN TO THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT: IN THIS PLAN, THE PRESIDENT SUGGESTED THAT ALL INSTITUTIONS IN METRO SHARE PROGRAMS AND SERVICES IN ORDER TO MEET THE FORCASTED AMOUNT IN REDUCED FUNDING, THE REASON METRO'S PRESI-DENTS DECIDED TO INITIATE THIS PLAN STEMS FROM THE NOVA SCOTIA COUNCIL ON HIGHER EDUCATION'S CONTROVERSIAL PROPOSAL OF ALL METRO UNIVERSITIES MERGING INTO ONE ENTITY, HOWEVER, AT THE END OF THE 1995 ACADEMIC YEAR, THE WORD FROM THE PROVINCIAL

GOVERNMENT IN REGARDS TO THE CONSORTIUM PLAN HAS BEEN FAVOURABLE TO SAY THE LEAST.

THE MINSTER OF EDUCATION, JOHN MACEACHERN, PAID A VISIT TO THE JOURNAL (BELOW), I

POSED A SERIES OF QUESTIONS TO HIM CONCERNING THE IMPENDING REFORM OF SAINT MARY'S AND OTHER POST-SECONDARY EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS. HE INDICATED THAT HE AND HIS GOVERNMENT DESIRED A MORE VIBRANT AND PROSPEROUS UNIVERSITY SYSTEM THAT WOULD BENEFIT ALL THOSE CONSIDERING ENROLLMEN AT A UNIVERSITY IN THE PROVINCE.

THE ISSUE OF QUEBEC SEPARATION ALSO GARNERED ITS SHARE OF SPACE IN THE JOURNAL. MANY OF MY EDITORIALS WER DEVOTED TO THE FUTURE OF CANADA, AND THE ISSUE OF QUEBEC NATIONALISM. THE CLOSE MARGINAL WIN FOR THE NISSUE WAS AN INDICATION OF HOW CLOSE WE CAME TO ALMOST LOSING THE COUNTRY.

STUDENTS ON CAMPUS WERE INVOLVED IN THE POLITICAL PROCESS, THE SMUSA ELECTIONS RESULTED IN AN UNPRECEDENTED AMOUNT OF PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES SEEKING OFFICE. FOR AN ENTIRE WEEK ON CAMPUS, THE SEVEN CANDIDATES SEEKING OFFICE.


DATES, BATTLED TO GET THEIR POSITION ACROSS, MAKING STUDENTS AWARE OF THEIR PLATFORM ON A ARRAY OF ISSUES. ADDITIONALLY, A LARGE NUMBER OF STUDENTS VIED FOR THE POSITION OF VICE PRESIDENT OF ADMINISTRATION AND VICE PRESIDENT OF STUDENT AFFAIRS RESPECTIVELY. THEY TOO, WAGED A COMPETITIVE RACE.

THE VOTER TURN-OUT WAS HIGHER THAN IT HAD BEEN IN PREVIOUS YEARS, WHICH REFLECTED THE INCREASED INTEREST STUDENTS HAD IN MATTERS CONCERNING STUDENT GOVERNMENT.

THE YEAR CONCLUDED WITH A NUMBER OF ISSUES BEING ADDRESSED, CONCERNING THE REPRESENTATION OF SELECT MINORITIES ON CAMPUS, AS WELL AS A WOMEN'S REPRESENTATIVE, AN ISSUE WHICH SURFACED DURING THE AFOREMENTIONED ELECTION CAMPAIGN, THE FOUR REFERENDA QUESTIONS CONCERNING A WOMEN'S REPRESENTATIVE, A DISABLED REPRESENTATIVE, A VISIBLE MINORITY REPRESENTATIVE AND A GAY/LESBIAN AND BI-SEXUAL REPRESENTATIVE, WERE INCLUDED ON THE ELECTION BALLOT FOR THE ANNUAL SMUSA REPRESENTATIVE ELECTION, A SEPARATE ELECTION FROM THAT OF THE SMUSA PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS.
ALL IN ALL, THE YEAR WAS A POLITICAL ONE, A YEAR THAT SAW STUDENTS PURPOSING CHANGES AS WELL AS INTEREST THAT

HAD NOT EXISTED IN PREVIOUS YEARS.









ON OCTOBER 27TH, SAINT MARY'S AND UPEI'S WOMEN'S FIELD HOCKEY TEAMS WENT HEAD TO HEAD IN THE SEMI-FINAL GAME AT THE UNIVERSITY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

FOR THE MOST PART, THE HUSKIES OUT-PLAYED THE PANTHERS, THE MAJORITY OF THE GAME WAS PLAYED EITHER IN THE PANTHER END OR IN MIDFIELD. SAINT MARY'S GOALTENDING WAS SEC-OND TO NONE. 




BASEBALL AT SMU
