Graduates, Beware...

After analysis, based on the findings of a team of experts, conducted on a cross section of the student population, consisting of a number not less than one thousand, and not more than three thousand, of both sexes, the following rule has been formulated.

The Education Area Rule states: "That the vertical distance measured from the feet to the topmost point of the head, times the horizontal distance measured on a line drawn between the ears, constitutes the working limitation in which the brain may function in the Twentieth Century man.

The above rule gives a somewhat limited answer to the problem encountered today in providing a suitable definition for the oft shifting concept of the word 'Education.'

The idea of education in the Twentieth Century has become a capacity, bounded by the words Altitude and Scope. A man may indeed become 'highly' educated in a formal sense, but the horizontal scope is limited in somewhat the same manner as a horse's vision is limited by blinkers.

The 'highly' educated man is the product of a series of numbers. He must, to graduate from university, have not less than twenty-one credits, which are divided into a 'major' and a 'minor.'

His major is in turn limited by numbers. He must have five credits times a sixty per cent average, which if he wishes to do 'honors,' shifts from sixty to seventy per cent in all subjects, with a further limitation in the number of electives, which he is free to choose as long as they are concurrent with the subjects in which he is doing 'honors.'

His 'minor,' which is strictly speaking incidental, comprises not less than four subjects times a sixty per cent average. This is designed to meet the requirements which provide him with the distinction of having breadth or scope — something he will find extremely necessary when job hunting.

Let us examine the 'highly educated man', as he

gathers together his twenty-one credits, giving him a Bachelor of BLANK degree with a 'major' or 'honors.'

He arrives at university, having completed the accepted requirements in high school, or some other private institution of learning. He chooses his 'category' from an impressive array of parchment pictures — deciding that a Bachelor of BLANK degree looks the most pretty, and the most easy.

He completes his first year of a time limit of four years in which he may take not less than four and not more than six credits. He continues his second or sophomore year gathering together a total of twelve credits, and has made the astounding discovery that he likes BLANK.

He continues, and by the process of elimination, finds he may now take the courses of his choice, leading to a 'major' or 'honors' in BLANK — subject of course to the approval of the Dean of Studies, and the Dean of the BLANK Department.

He is advised to take courses in Mediaeval Blank, Middle BLANK, the Renaissance in Blank — subdivided into dramatic and non-dramatic, BLANK analysis and construction, forms and composition, etc., etc., etc.

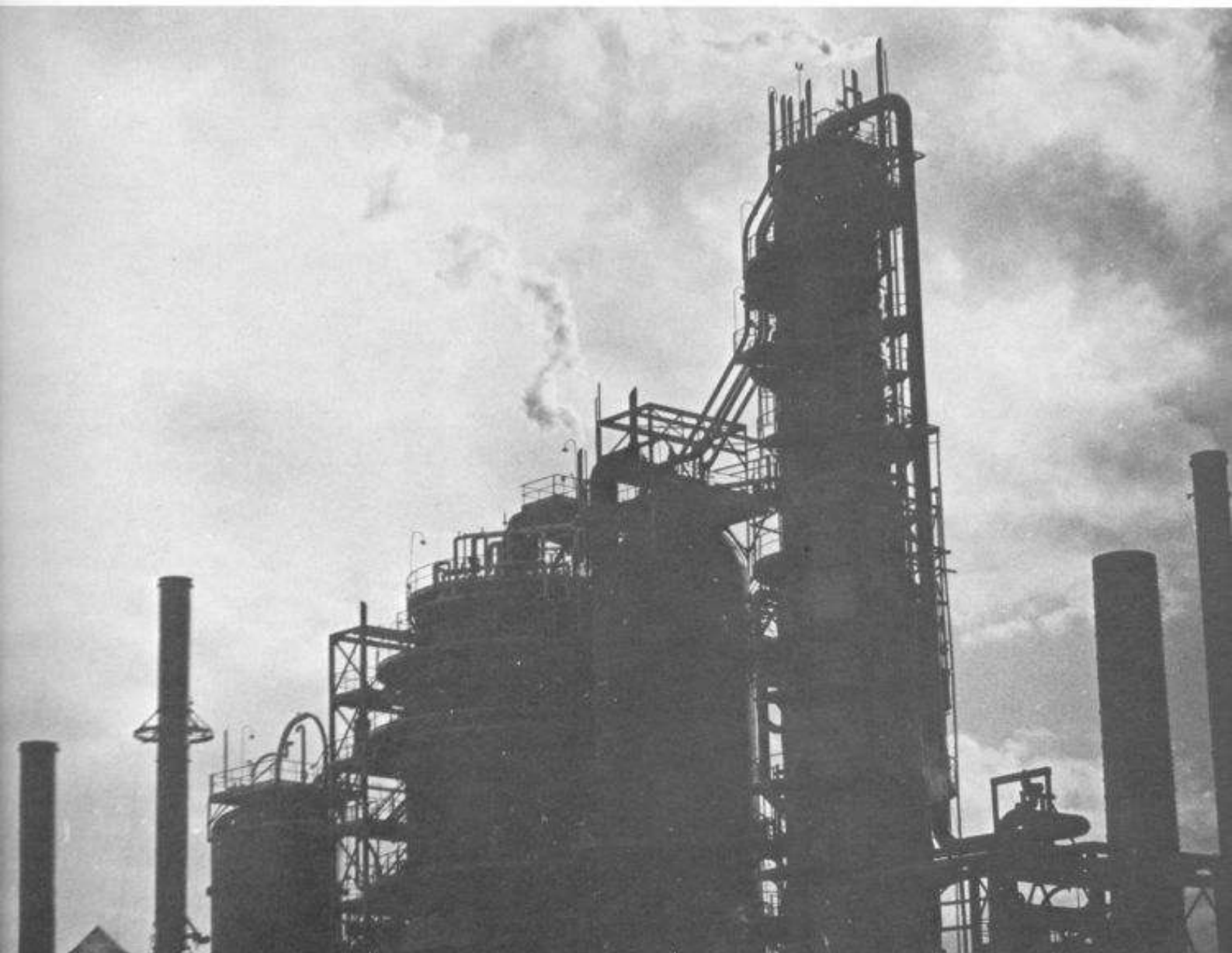
He may also find the time to indulge in philosophics — the history and the function thereof, Latin, French — two courses each by numbers (i.e. land 2, or land 3 or 1 and etc., etc., etc. History, one course — preferably European, in a precise survey volume containing not less than 2,500 pages. A course in any one of Political Science, Sociology, Religion, or Natural Science, which covers (in a limited scope) anything from the decline and fall of the Roman Empire, up to 1964 — and embracing all of the important aspects concurrent with present technology.

And so, he follows this course of action, until at the end of his fourth and final year he is adjudged an educated man, graduating with 'major' or 'honors' in his chosen field of BLANK.

He has arrived, laden with twenty-one credits, each of which in turn was designed to be taken with horse-like scope. He emerges to do battle with the world. He is a highly educated man — limited only in Time by four years, in Capacity by twenty-one credits — five of which are sixty or seventy per cent in average, cultured and polished by his surroundings, and capable of performing within an area — "Not less than the vertical distance measured from his feet to the topmost

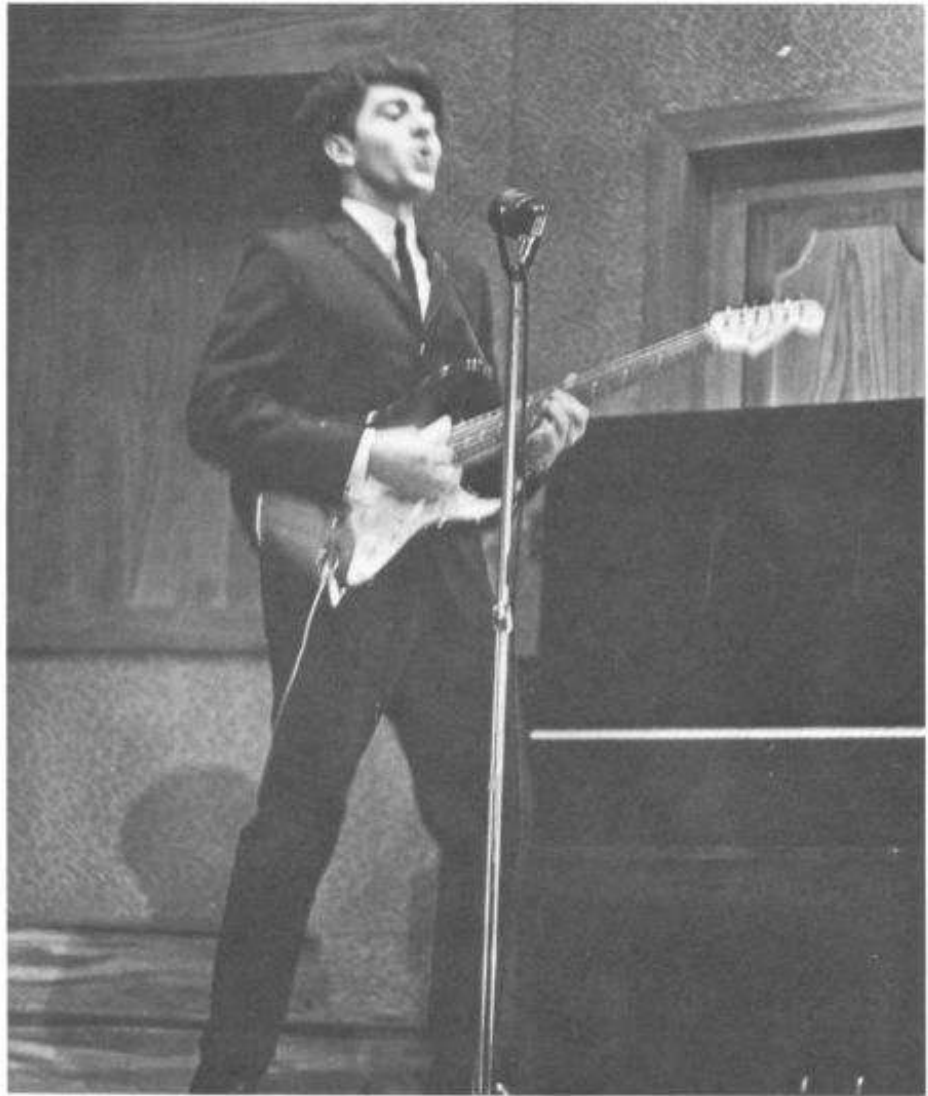

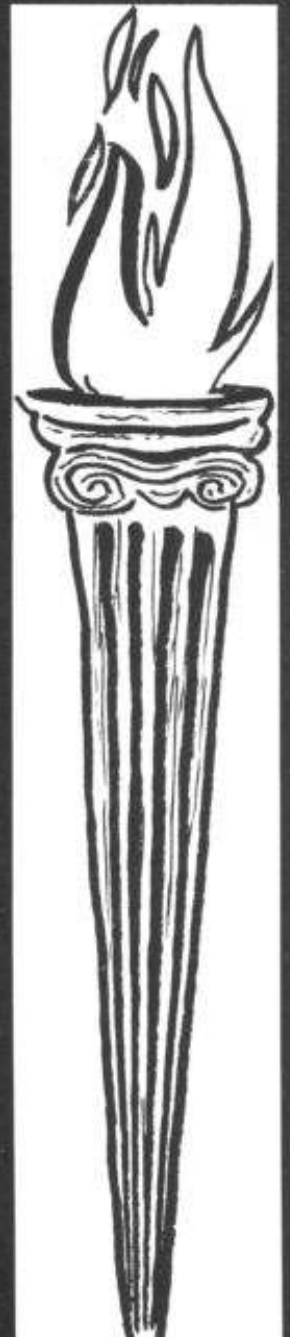
...Within a Sound Body

The St. Mary's Huskies, after losing two close opening games, staged an uphill unparalleled in A.F.C. history by blanking their opponents in the remaining six games.

Undermanned for the second straight season, the Huskies were a well disciplined and balanced team of veterans and rookies. Quarterback Dave Murphy commanded the backfield of Paul Puma, the Atlantic Football Conference's Rookie of the Year; Chuck White, Al Keith, and Leo Raftery, which produced an impressive ground game for the Maroon and White. Murphy, passing to ends Stu O'Brien and John Schneider, and Al Keith lead the league in touchdown passes.

Schneider ended the season as the Maritime's second highest scorer, with Raftery and Puma finishing third and fifth; Raftery and Puma also placed first and second in yardage gained in the league, and the team lead the league in pass completions and air yardage.

Bolstered by the young blood of Frank Archambault, Tom Foley, Pete Grant, Chuck Liebrock, John Murphy, Jerry Stanleigh, and Gerry Redmond, the veteran linemen were able to write in a new shut-out record for the A.F.C. Putting in another commendable season were the veterans Frank Arment, Co-capt., Bob Ruotolo, Mike D'Acci, Dan Skaling, Wayne O'Brien, Dick Giodano, Jim Crane, Co-capt., and John "Butch" Burke.

The offensive and defensive lines typified the all-out spirit of the '63 team by holding the opposition scoreless for six consecutive games, while amassing a total of 275 points, capitalizing on fumbles and intercepting numerous passes. Finishing second in the league, the returning varsity team is a strong contender to sweep the league in the coming season.

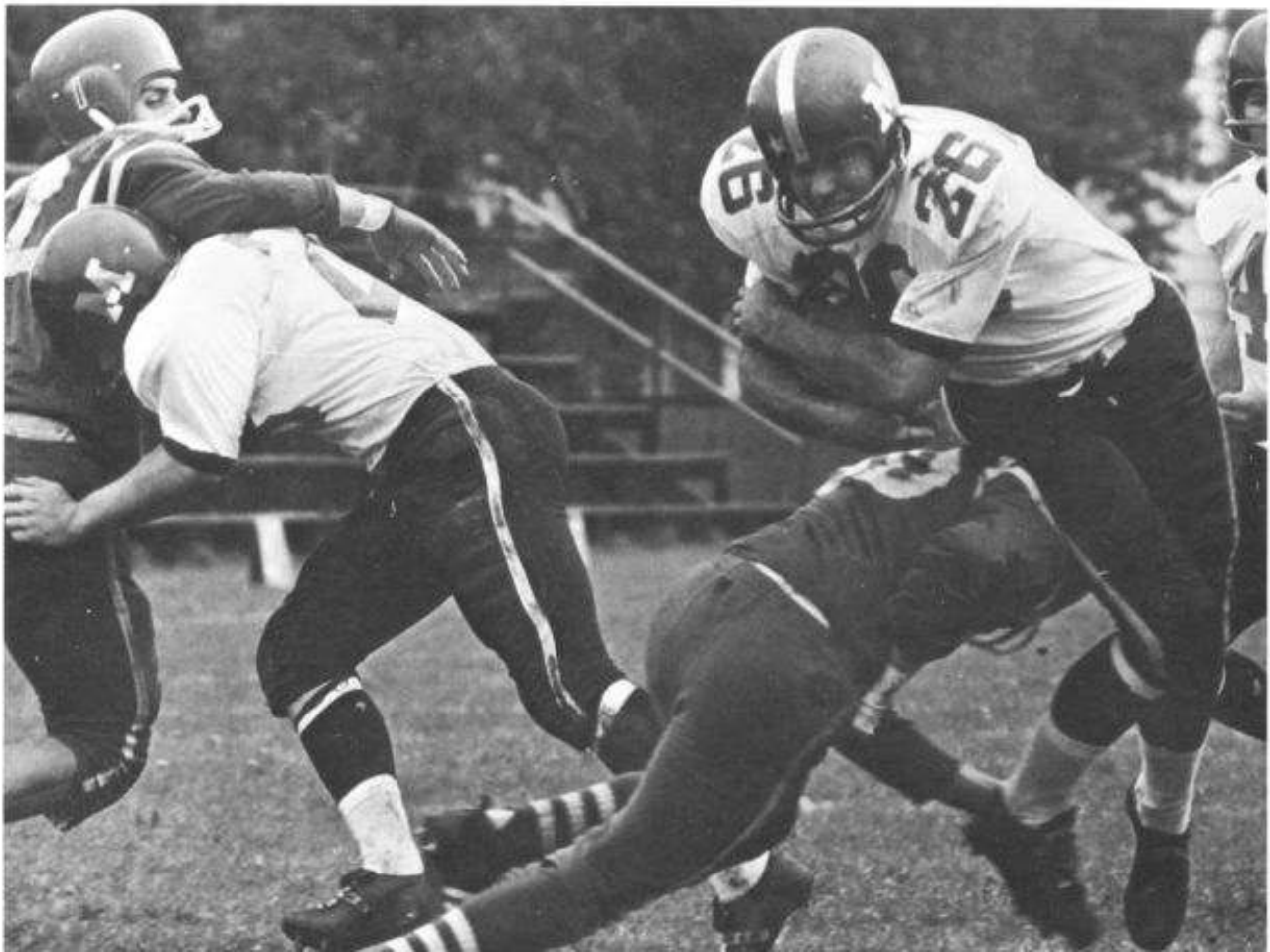
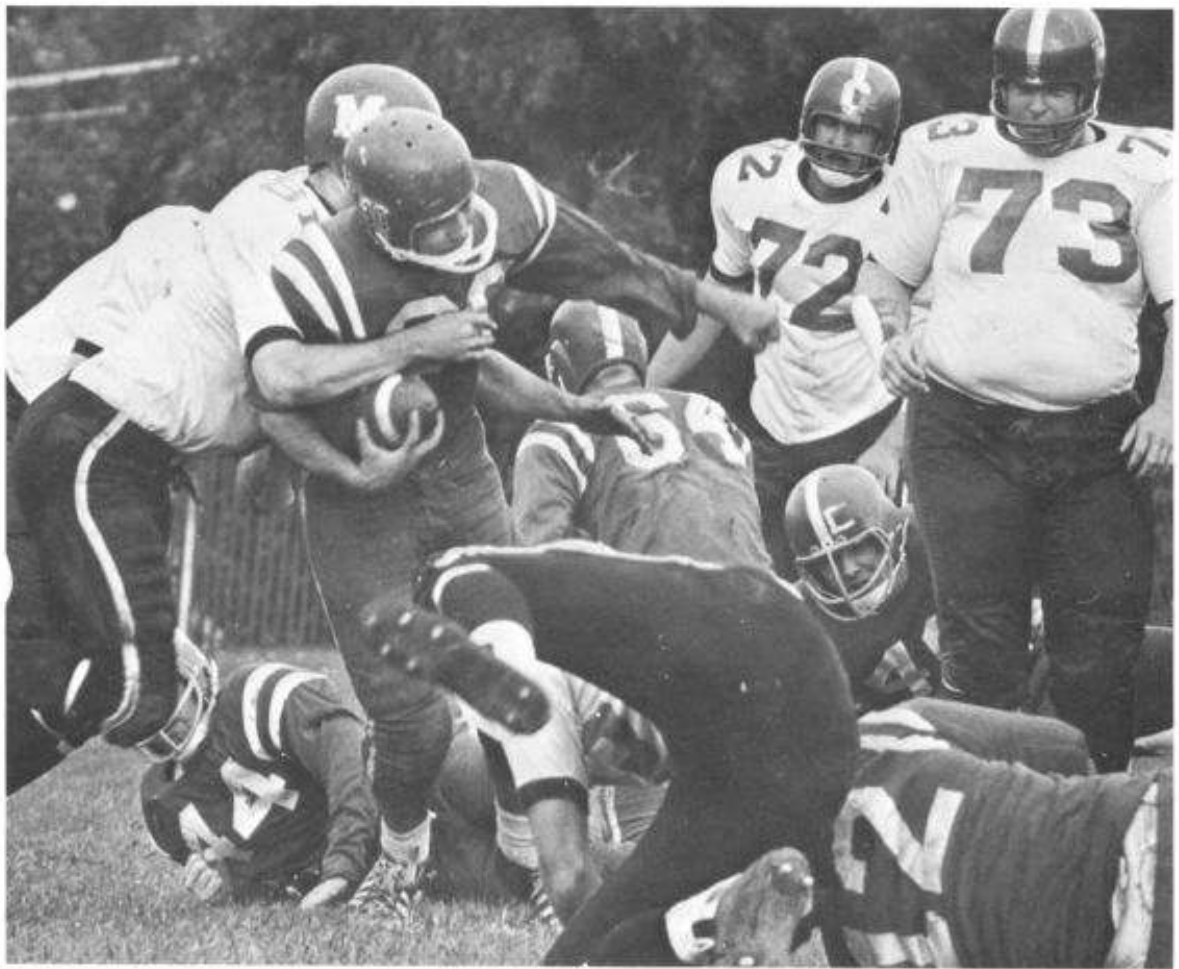

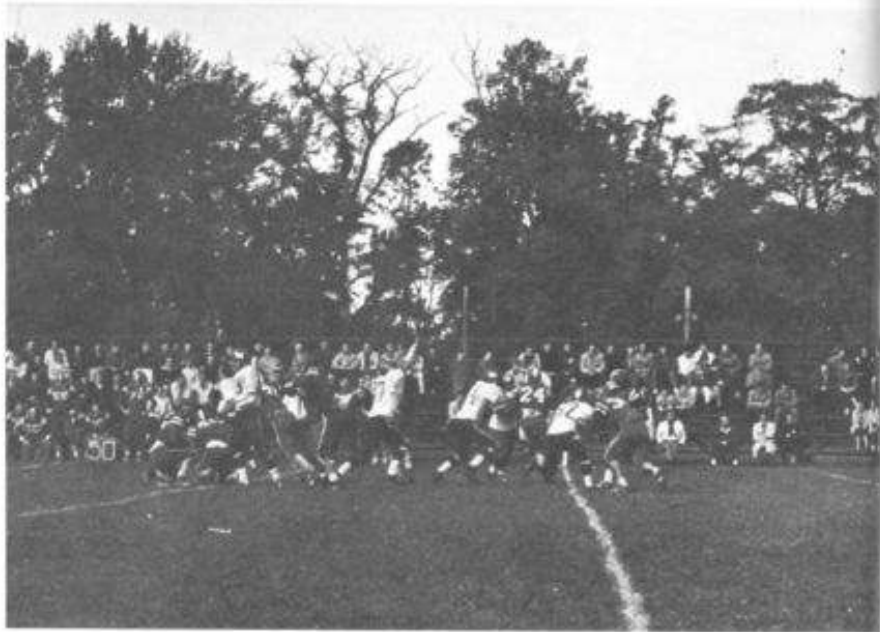

The 1963 version of the St. Mary's Junior Varsity football team met with reverse fortunes of their '62 championship season. With the return of only five veterans, the junior Huskies put forth their best. Coached by former Shearwater ace, Don Lilly, the team won two out of their five games.

In the backfield John Delaney called the signals for wingbacks Gary Doucette and Robert "Sam" Kelly, and halfbacks Jack Lyons, Jim Magee, and John Dougherty.
