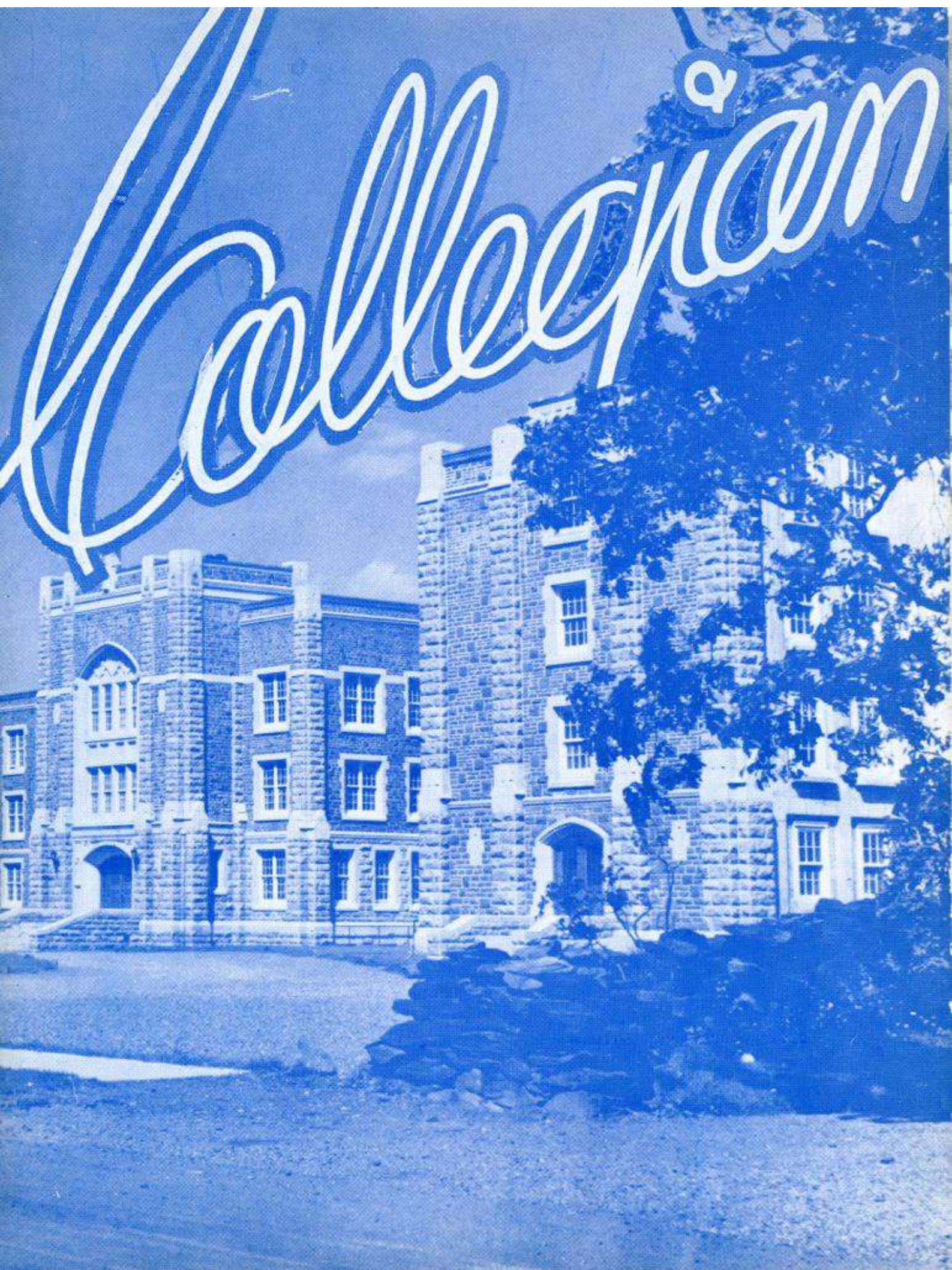

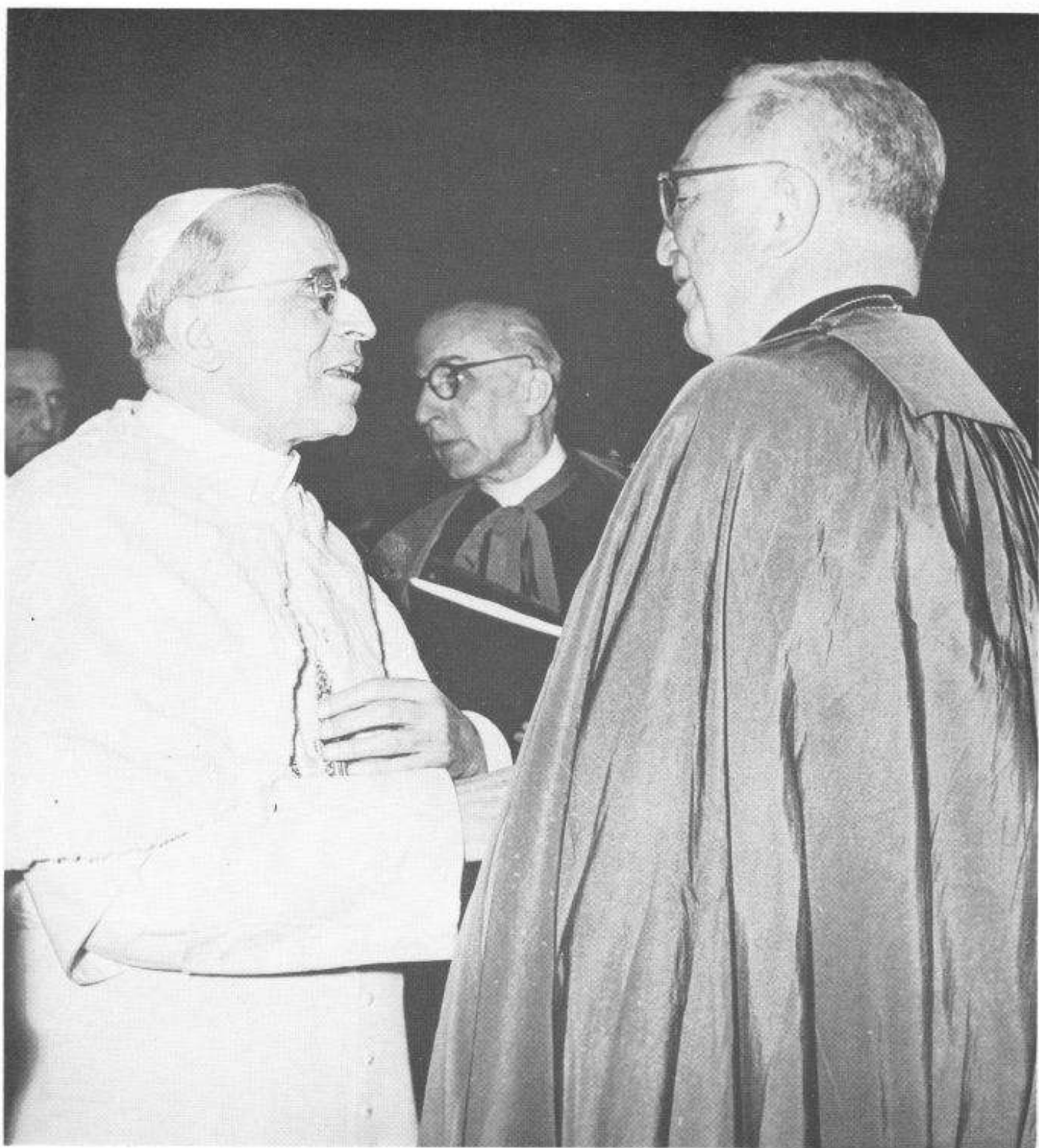

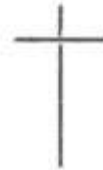

IN MEMORIAM

Early in August Saint Mary's was saddened by the loss of one of its best students. Sub/Lieut. John M. Glenister, attached to the Fleet Air Arm of the Canadian Navy, died at the controls of his Harvard training plane, near Moose Jaw, Sask. The son of Doctor and Mrs. E. J. Glenister, John was to enter his senior year at Saint Mary's in the faculty of Arts.



During his years at Saint Mary's John worked hard and conscientiously at anything which he thought would better his Church, College and Society. Although an honor student through high school and college, he always found time for extra-curricular activities. During the 1954-55 term he served as Secretary of the Debating Society, Chairman of the CFCCS and CCSMC, a member of the Sodality and Glee Club, and for his senior year had been elected to serve on the executive of the Arts Society.

His service life was much like his college life in that he showed the same keen interest in anything he took upon himself. His ratings during his three years were above average and this year he had led his class in his examinations. His officers and friends in the Navy spoke very highly of John, mentioning in particular his public devotion to the Church, even among non-Catholics. One thing in particular his friends noticed and admired him for was the fact that he would never go up in his plane without first making sure he had his rosary.

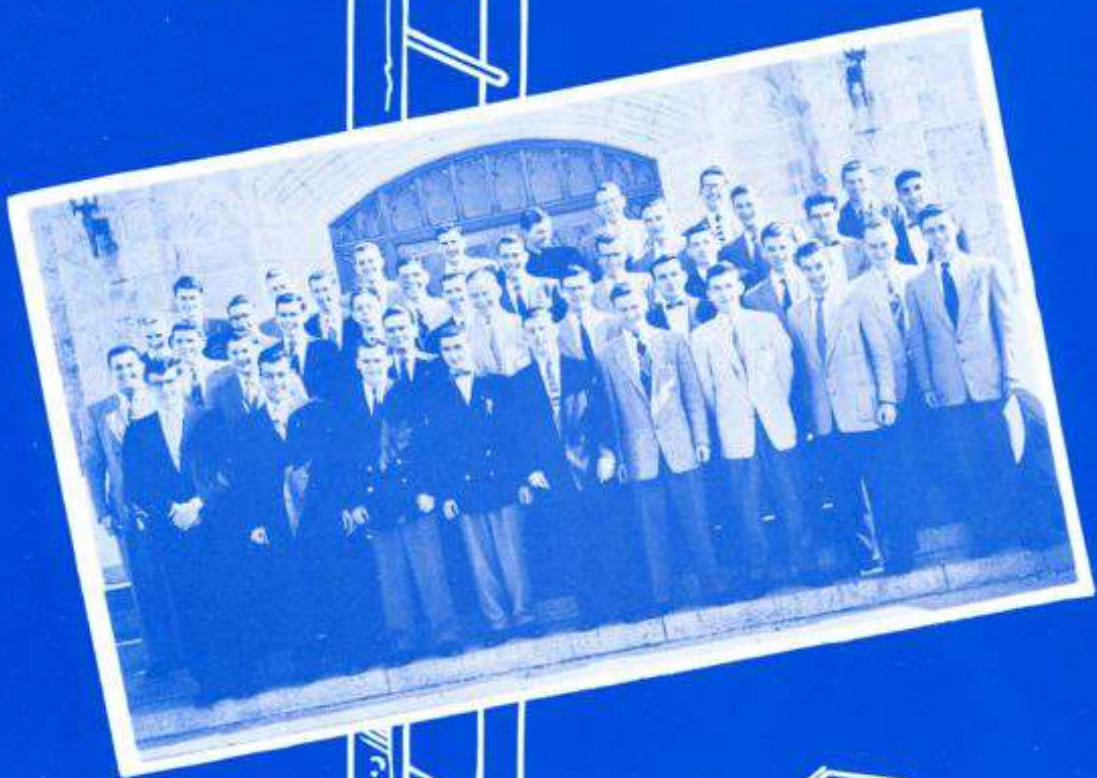
In private life as well as in his service and college life, John set an example for everyone who knew him. In working for the Church no task was too great for him to undertake. The Catholic Youth Adoration Hour, which he himself had built up from an idea to a reality, is a clear example of this. Few indeed were the mornings he missed Mass and Communion and always was he ready to stand up for the defense of his faith.

Always popular with his friends and fellow students, John was ever willing to help someone in need. His friendliness, generosity, broad-mindedness, and quick sense of humor, made him well-liked by all who knew him. Participation in sports, and attendance at almost all social functions made him known and admired by all as a young man who always kept a perfect balance between religious, scholastic and social activities.

The loss of John to Saint Mary's is indeed a great one. It will be felt greatly by all the students, but in particular by the organizations and societies for which he worked so hard.

To his family and friends, the senate, faculty and students of Saint Mary's express their heartfelt sorrow and deepest sympathy.

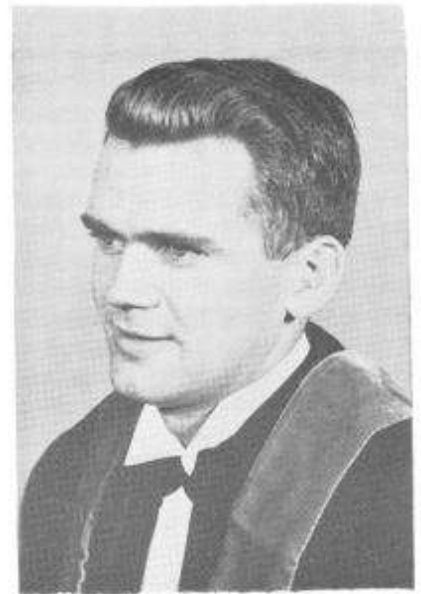

Plans are being made for Saint Mary's to have an entry in the Senior Football League next year. Father O'Donnell, Dean of Athletics at the University, announced last week that application may be made to the league because it is felt that this college has outgrown the Junior League.

Football Parade Planned For Final Game

At the football banquet last year, John Funton, president of the senior league, stated that the circuit would welcome Saint Mary's University, and again he stated, "The solution to your problem is to go senior... you should go forward, not backward."

With this encouraging news, groundwork is being laid for next year's squad.

One of the main reasons for the change is the number of players lost each year because of the limit in the junior league, and if the team turns senior there will be a greater number of men eligible to play.

Other O'Donnell felt that there is at least 10 members of the senior squad who could make senior teams.

The University has been losing money on the juniors and the better calibre of play would help that situation; also the college would gain more prestige by being in the "best" loop, and greater advertising advantages.

There is talk that the Nova Scotia League may unite with the Brunswick league, and therefore the age-limit system, which is present used in the Junior League, would have to be done away with. With the Seniors, however, there is no age-limit. Probably the most used argument for the switch, is because seniors feel we have outgrown Junior ranks, and the league would suffer by having us stay.

Whatever the outcome, there is certainly sufficient reason to make the change. We don't expect our representatives to walk off with Purdy Cup in the first year, but we're positive they will give the larger colleges a run for their money, and there will be a Senior Championship in the future.

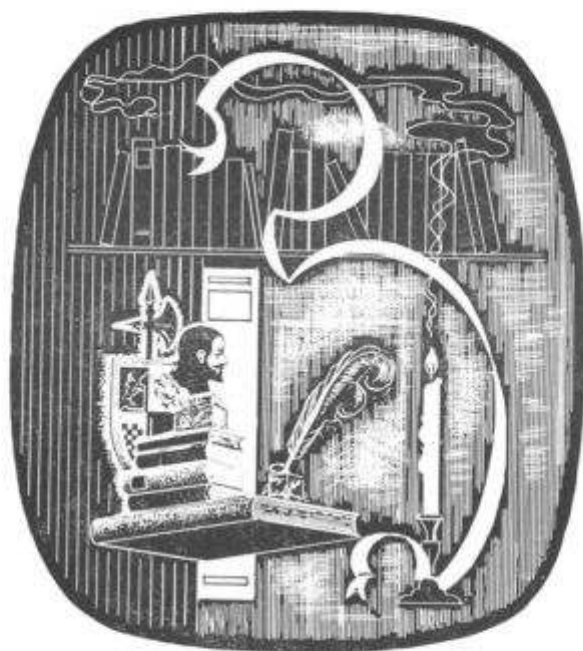

Variety and success were the keynotes of the sports program at Saint Mary's this year thanks to the untiring efforts of our athletic director, Father Michael O'Donnell, S.J. Under his guidance, we were well represented in all of the major intercollegiate competitions and could boast of the most successful year for a long time in our inter-faculty leagues.

It is surprisng to note that for a relatively small college there were no less than seven sports being run off during our athletic year. These included basketball, football, hockey, curling, badminton, track and field and bowling with additional facilities for baseball, swimming and pool at our disposal. It was rather surprising, too, when we discovered that of an enrollment of 289, approximately two-thirds of these took part in some form of sport. Few of the other Maritime universities, if any, could boast of such a program.

Yes, this was a banner year in sports and although we couldn't manage to bring home a championship, we did generally manage to wind up in second place. Looking back, we remember the close basketball games with St. Francis Xavier and the final hockey game at Acadia when two busses and almost every available car were used for a mass invasion on Wolfville one cold February night, only to see our "big red team" lose the total goal series by one goal. Going back further, we remember a cold November afternoon with snow on every corner of the campus and we recall how our football team dropped the grand final for the Junior Provincial Championship after finishing the regular schedule undefeated.

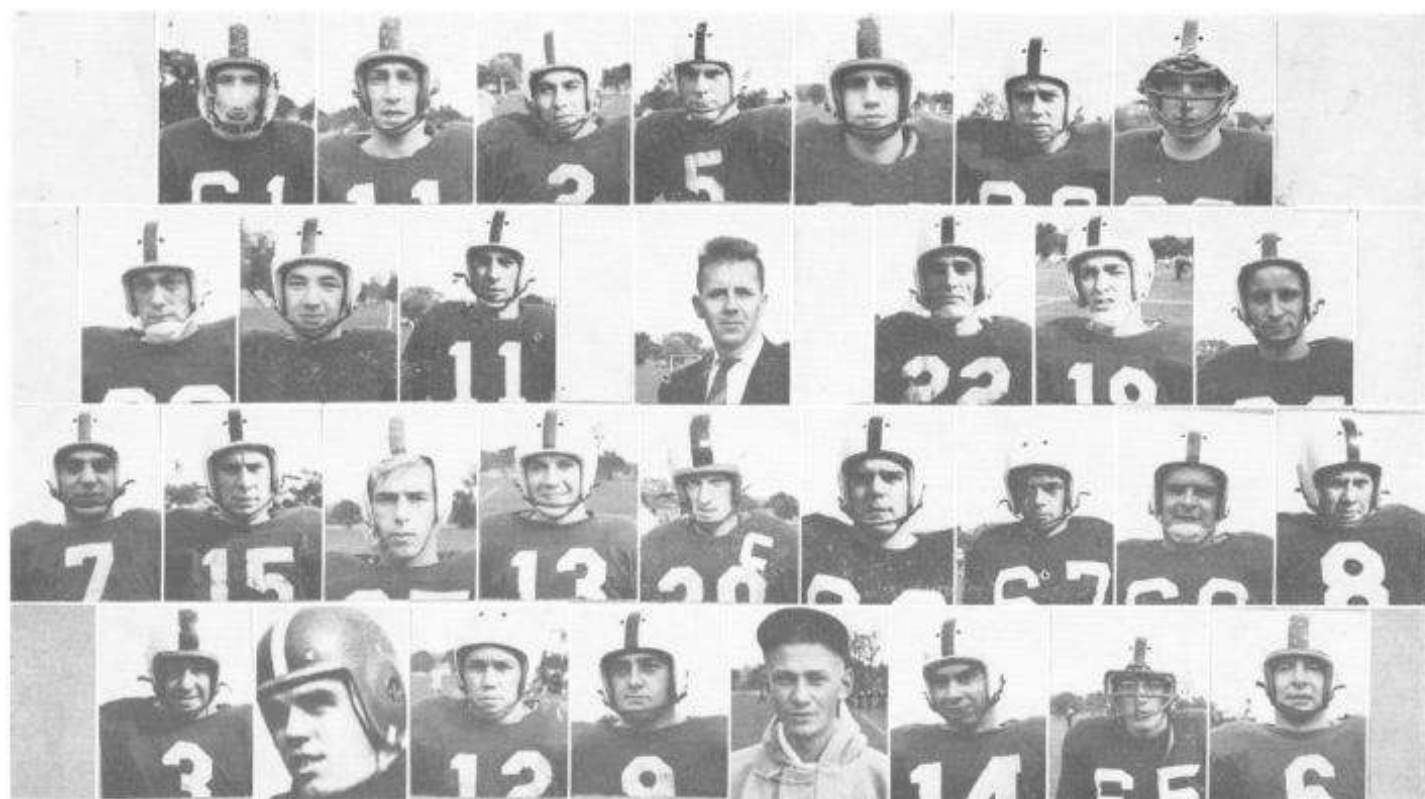

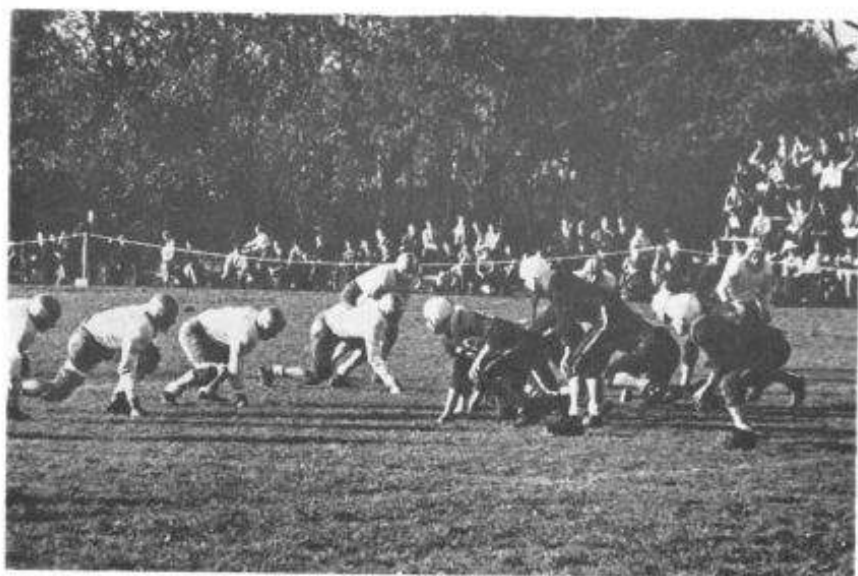

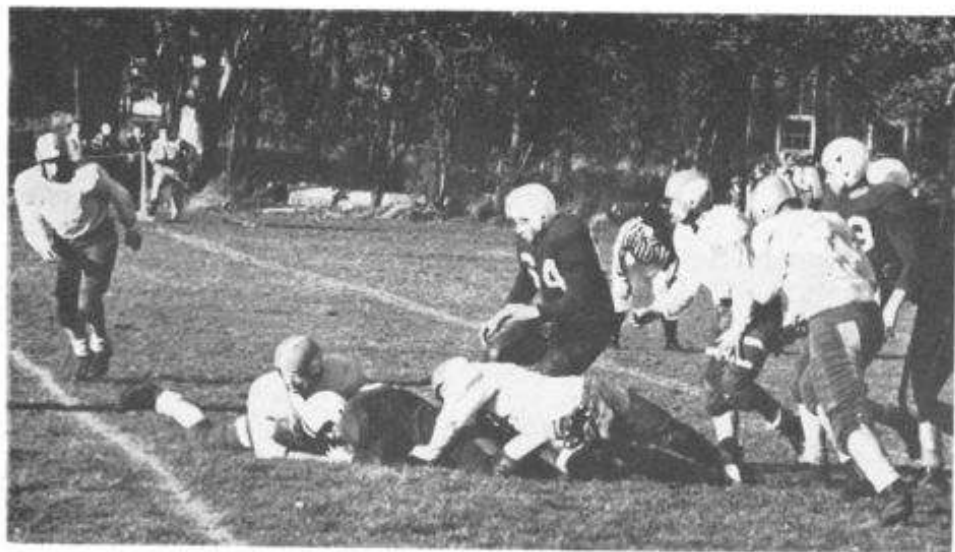

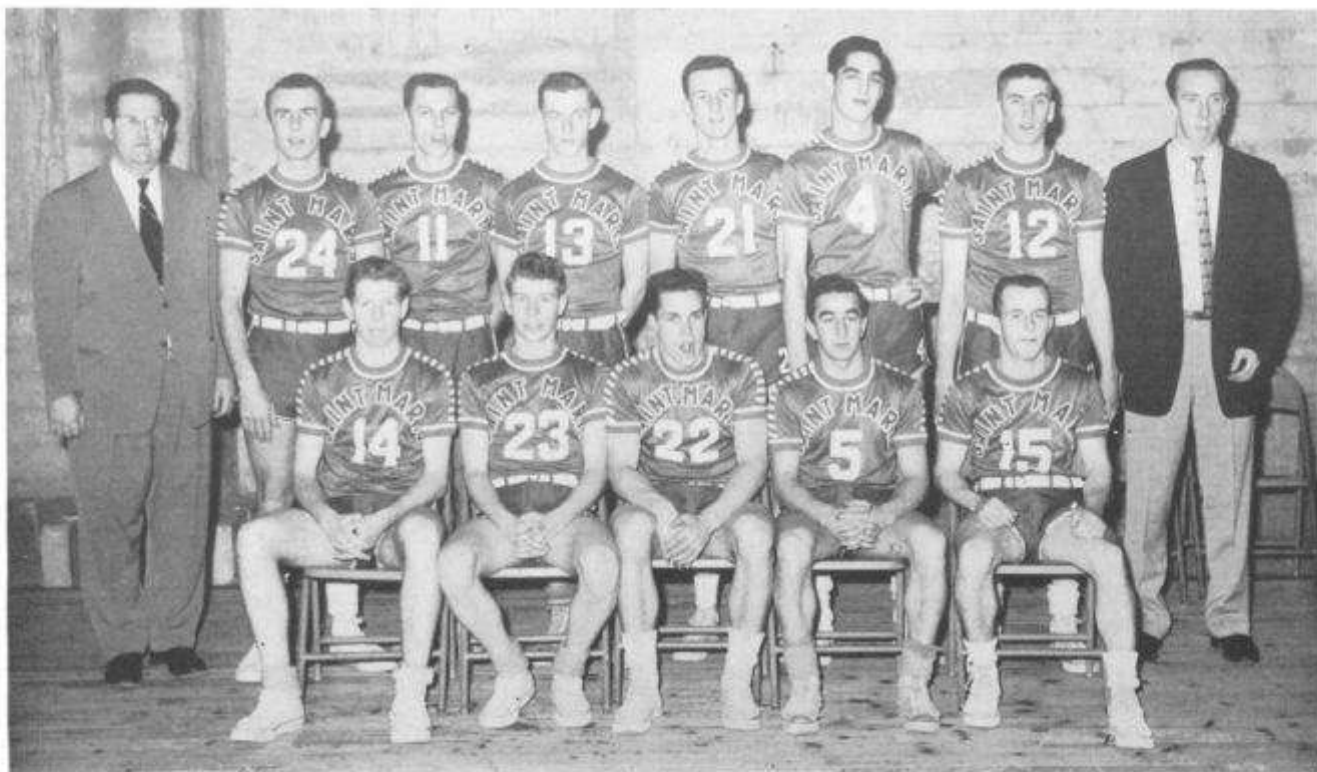

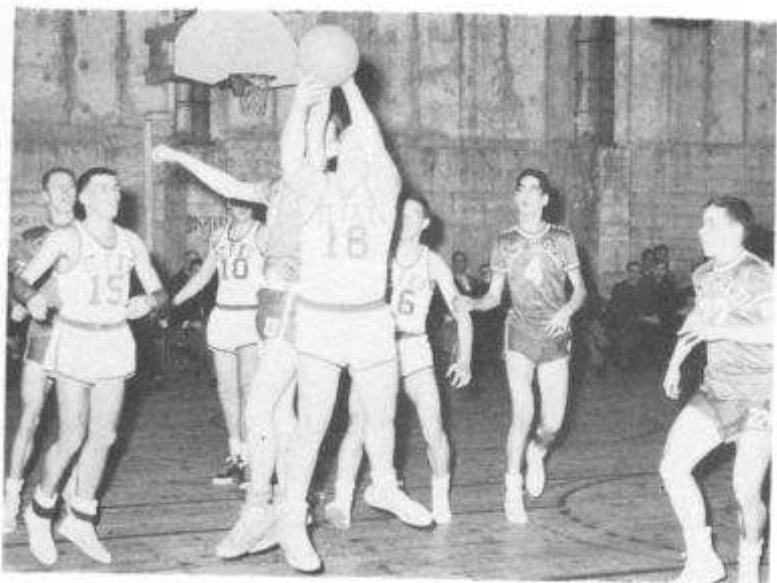

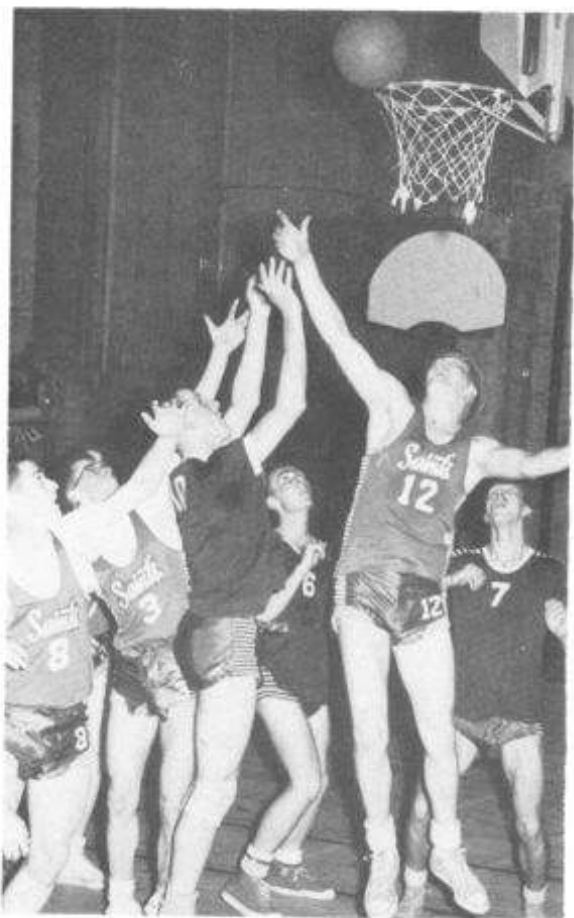

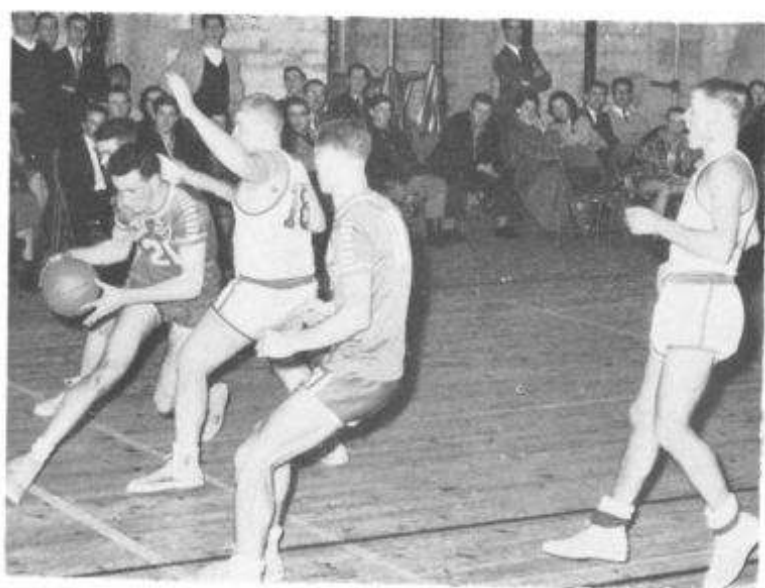

Valedictory — 1956

MURRAY NAPIER

Your Grace, Your Excellency, Right Reverend, Very Reverend, and Reverend Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Sitting here tonight—sitting in this auditorium—none of us fully realize what is happening. Sixty of us sit here in black gowns, and we find it hard to realize that this is the night we have so long awaited. Tonight we step from one world into another—tonight we graduate.

Perhaps what is most intriguing about this new world we are entering—this world that will begin for us the moment we leave this auditorium—is that we graduates—all of us—know nothing of what it will be like. We have been told it is a beautiful world; we have heard it is a cruel world; we have been assured that we'll love this world; and we have been warned to hate this world. At any event, we are sure it must be an interesting world.

And with an anticipation that makes us all a little giddy perhaps, we are preparing ourselves for this new adventure—this tremendous adventure.

Our feelings on this night must be somewhat like the feelings of an explorer or a missionary, who is about to set out for new and uncharted lands—like Columbus, or Cabot, or Jean de Brebeuf.

When Brebeuf stood on the dock—in the Old World—he must have experienced a joy and an eagerness to begin his adventure. He must have imagined many times and in many ways, just what the New World would be like. As he stood with his friends on that dock, he must have felt the same kind of emotional flutterings that we are now feeling—and he too must have been filled with a nervous impatience to be off.

But when the sails had been hoisted and his ship was ready to sail, he had to turn to his friends, and he had to give a Valedictory. Perhaps it was a very informal and almost incoherent Valedictory—just a word or two that told his friends he would miss them, that he would pray for them, that he would also like them to say a prayer for him—but it was a Valedictory, and like all Valedictories, it meant one thing: Good-bye.

And then perhaps, Jean de Brebeuf forgot his joy and his impatience—then perhaps, he felt the little knife-edges of sorrow. And perhaps—just as that moment—he wished he didn't have to go.

Tonight we look back on the years we've spent at Saint Mary's. We look back on the day we entered College—and we remember the fellows who made us wear signs and tin cans, and paraded us through the city to sing songs and make fools of ourselves. We look back on the first set of exams we wrote—and how surprised we were when we discovered that we'd have to study to get through College. We look back on our first encounter with a Jesuit—and how we couldn't understand that a man could use such big words and still handle a football. We look back on the first time we played on the University football or hockey or basketball team, on the first time we wrote something for the Journal or worked in a play, on the day we entered the Sodality. We look back on our slow and steady rise to power—and now, in our Senior Year we discovered that we were the leaders of the College—and we wondered if the Freshmen and Sophomores looked up to us the way we looked up to the Seniors before us. But most of all we look back on years of many friendships—new friendships and old friendships, friendships with fellow students and friendships with members of the

Faculty, friendships that taught us how to live with other people and helped us to develop physically, mentally and morally.

Now, as we stand on the dock, and as we look back on all the things that made us happy—we feel a sadness—the sadness of all good-byes. But we also feel a gratitude—for the happiness we've known and to the people who gave us that happiness.

And as we turn, first, to Saint Mary's—to the Jesuits and to the Lay-Professors—we search for the words that will tell them what we feel. But when someone gives us something so great and so important as an education, when someone gives us a whole new reason for living, shows us a course we never knew existed—how can we put into words what we feel? Can we condense it into two little words?

When we turn to our professors, perhaps we say nothing of what we feel. Perhaps we say with a handshake and a smile what our voices cannot say. But the greatest reward a professor may receive—the greatest return for his work—is the knowledge that the seeds he has sown have not fallen on barren soil—that they will flourish into things that are fine and good—and that they will bear fruit.

And tonight we shall give them that knowledge. We shall tell them that our years at Saint Mary's have made us stronger in our Faith and more firm in our convictions.

And all of us know that this is true.

For, no matter where we are, and whoever we may associate with, and whatever lack of ideals we may encounter, we shall always be, first of all, Catholics, and second of all—Santamarians.

The ship's bell rings and we must turn to our parents. Once again we feel the inadequacy of words, and it is even more overpowering than before.

As individuals, we shall probably never actually thank our parents. It's sad that we shall never do this, but our parents don't expect us to—and perhaps this is why we cannot do it. Perhaps we are not yet able to understand this love that our parents have for us—this love that is completely unselfish and asks for nothing in return—this love that seeks for us the best in everything—this love that has caused our parents to make sacrifices that we might know this night. Perhaps because nothing is asked in return, and perhaps because we are unable to understand—we, as individuals, shall never form into words our gratitude.

And so, tonight, we say together what we cannot say alone. We say to our parents: "Thank you," and we promise them with a pledge that is written in our hearts, that we shall always be grateful, that we shall always remember what they have done for us, and that all our actions—for the rest of our lives—will be a living "thank you." Our eloquence will be in the way we live, and we can be sure that our parents will hear the message.

The anchor is being raised on our ship, and we must bid farewell to one another—for though we are all going, we all go a different way. And perhaps we are all too brief with one another—for the good-byes of a friend are always brief. But all of us who are graduating tonight shall never forget the bond that has held us together—a bond that will necessarily be loosened, but never broken . . . and that is enough.

And so, now—on this night—we are all Valedictorians. Each of us must deliver a Valedictory. And if, for the moment, we forget our joy and our impatience to be off—if, for the moment, we forget that this is one of the happiest milestones in our careers—and if, for the moment, we forget that ahead lies the great adventure—it is because our ship is ready to sail, and we must turn to our friends. Tomorrow, perhaps, our eyes will once more be bright with the promise of things to come, but tonight, we shall forget . . . because, tonight we must say "good-bye."

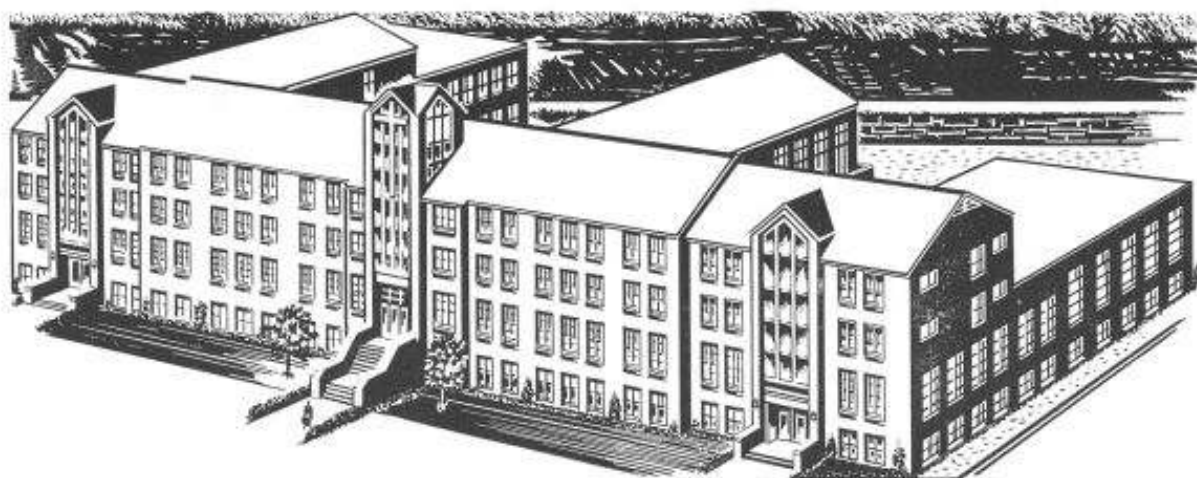

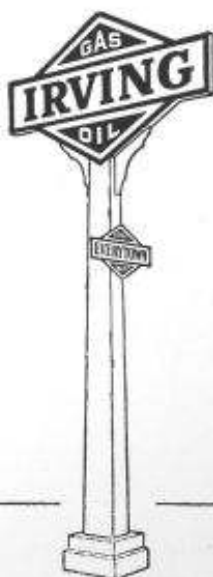
