#### **Faculty**

The Reverend William A. Stewart, S.J., Medal for Excellence in Teaching (To be presented at the afternoon ceremony)

In 1983, the Alumni Association, with the co-operation of the Faculty Union and the Students' Representative Council, established the Reverend William A. Stewart, S.J., Medal for Excellence in Teaching. This award is open to faculty members who have made an extraordinary contribution to the education of Saint Mary's students through teaching in the University's tradition of quality undergraduate education. Nominations are invited from alumni, students, and faculty members. This medal is presented at Convocation together with a cheque for \$1,000. Previous winners of this prestigious award are:

This year's winner is **Dr. Robert D. Singer**, Associate Professor of Chemistry.

In 1982, he entered Saint Mary's University on an entrance scholarship having completed his secondary schooling at C.P. Allen High School, Bedford, Nova Scotia. He graduated four years later with a Bachelor of Science degree with First Class Honours in Chemistry. He then proceeded to Simon Fraser University in British Columbia and was awarded a Doctor of Philosophy in Organic Chemistry in November 1992.

In September 1993, Dr. Singer joined the faculty at Saint Mary's University, first, as an Assistant Professor and in September 1997, earned his Associate Professorship. In that relatively short period of time, since 1993, he has supervised eight honours students' thesis; and supervised and trained thirty undergraduate research assistants. In addition, he has been successful in attracting \$170,361.00 in research grants including four in 1998, namely Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council, New Organometallic Methodologies (\$55,000.00); Senate Research Grant from Saint Mary's University (\$2,380.00); NS Links, Nova Scotia Department of Education and Culture, New Reaction Media (3 Studentship Awards valued at \$7,488.00); and Student Experience Employment Program SEEP to the value of \$4,000.00.

In supporting Dr. Singer's nomination, the Acting Dean of Science, Dr. Doug Strongman, indicated that "Rob is clearly a dedicated teacher who has worked hard at developing his courses in the relatively short time he has been at Saint Mary's. His consistently high teaching evaluations are a good indication that the students regard him as an extremely effective teacher. However, his main achievement, from my point of view, is that he is able to convey a typically difficult subject (organic chemistry) in such a way that students are fascinated by it." The Dean concludes his recommendation by indicating that he "was not surprised to see that this nomination has come forward primarily from the student body." One of those students wrote that since Dr. Singer's arrival at Saint Mary's "he has devoted much of his own time to better the quality of education students receive in their Bachelor of Science degree. His enthusiasm for Chemistry is contagious and makes lectures more interesting." This same student continues that "Dr. Singer encourages students to ask questions and participate in lectures. He challenges students to do their best. He is always available for extra help even outside of office hours. Students feel comfortable going to him for advice on courses and careers. If he can't give you the information you are looking for, then he knows someone who will. He takes the comments on the Senate Teaching Evaluations to heart and is always looking for ways to improve the courses he teaches."

One of his colleagues, Professor Emeritus John C. O'C. Young, indicates that he "has the ideal temperament to be an excellent teacher... which he is. He is people-oriented, considerate, humorous and thorough with an excellent command of spoken and written English and of his subject areas... Rob is particularly generous in his contributions to the maintenance and development of the honours programme of the Department of Chemistry. In addition to providing scientific experience and financial support of honours students through their employment in his personal research work, he has been a prime mover in the organization of the student seminar and visiting speaker's programme. He has also encouraged students to give papers and make poster presentations at national and international scientific conferences... experiences which has stood a number of them in good stead when they applied to enter prestigious graduate schools."

In addition to his teaching responsibilities at Saint Mary's University, in September 1998 he was made an adjunct professor in the Department of Chemistry at Dalhousie University. His publications total eighteen and he lists twenty-five seminars to which he has been invited or abstracts which have been published. In addition, he has won a number of prestigious awards and honours both as an undergraduate and graduate student as well as a faculty member.

Several of his referees make reference to Dr. Singer's involvement in extracurricular activities. The Director of Admissions, Greg Ferguson, indicated that "Dr. Singer has demonstrated a high level of interest in getting to know his students on a first name basis and is extremely interested in their education and career goals. Dr. Singer has been a champion for the Admissions Office in that he has initiated several of his own strategies to attract new science students to Saint Mary's University. He has participated in the high school recruitment programme; invited local high school students on his own initiative to visit the Science Faculty and tour the campus."

In terms of other extracurricular activities, he has been a delegate to the People to People Ambassadors Program, Chemistry Delegation to the People's Republic of China (June 1998); has been the departmental representative, Atlantic Universities Chemistry Chairs (May 1998); has been a referee for journal articles published by the American Chemical Society and the Royal Society of Chemistry; has served as a member and also as the

Vice Chair of the Quality of Teaching Committee at Saint Mary's University; and has for the last four years been a member of the University's Student Participation Committee. In addition, he has been an active participant for the last five years in Saint Mary's University's phone-a-thon; has participated in the Labatt's 24 Hour Relay in support of physically challenged Nova Scotians; and has served as an assistant to the Rugby Youth Camp held the last four years at Saint Mary's University for over one hundred high school aged participants.

#### **Honorary Degree Recipients**

At this year's Spring Convocations, Saint Mary's University will award 4 honorary degrees: 1 at the afternoon ceremony and 3 at the evening ceremony.

#### **Afternoon Convocation**

#### **Scott Duncan Tremaine**

Born in Toronto, Dr. Tremaine is currently the Chairperson of the Department of Astrophysical Sciences at Princeton University in New Jersey.

Dr. Tremaine graduated from McMaster University, Hamilton, Ontario, with a Bachelor of Science degree (Physics), followed two years later, in 1973, with a Master of Arts in Physics from Princeton University and, in 1975, with a Ph.D. in Physics also from Princeton University. In 1996, one of his alma maters, McMaster University, conferred on him a Doctor of Science (honoris causa). Two years earlier, he was made a Fellow of both the Royal Society of Canada (FRSC) and the Royal Society of London (FRSL).

Immediately following graduation, he spent two years as a Research Fellow at the California Institute of Technology followed by a one-year stint as a Research Associate at the Institute of Astronomy, Cambridge, England. From 1978 to 1981, he was a long-term member of the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton, and from 1981 to 1985, Associate Professor, Department of Physics, Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In 1985, Dr. Tremaine was enticed back to Canada from MIT to head the Canadian Institute for Theoretical Astrophysics at the University of Toronto - a position which he held for a decade, along with a professorship in the Department of Physics, Department of Astronomy, and the Canadian Institute for Technical Astrophysics (1985 to 1995). In 1995, and for the next two years, he served as a professor at the University of Toronto, after which, in 1996, he became a Director of the Canadian Institute for Advanced Research Program in Cosmology and Gravity, a position which he still holds. In 1997, he returned to Princeton University as professor of Astrophysical Sciences and a year later, in 1998, assumed the chairmanship of that Department.

He has held a number of visiting positions, including being the Albert Einstein Professor at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton in the fall of 1983; in the winter of 1991, the Sherman Fairchild Distinguished Scholar, California Institute of Technology; and in the fall of 1994, the Raymond and Beverly Sackler Visiting Astronomer, Institute of Astronomy at Cambridge in England.

Included amongst his fellowships and awards are the Woodrow Wilson Fellowship (1971 to 1972); National Research Council (Canada), Postdoctoral Fellow (1975 to 1977); and in that same two-year period, the Richard Chace Tolman Fellow in Theoretical Physics; and the Alfred P. Sloan Research Fellow (1982 to 1986). In 1983, he won the Helen B. Warner Prize of the American Astronomical Society and from 1987 to 1998, held the Morris Loeb Lectureship at Harvard University, followed by the E. W. R. Steacie Memorial Fellowship for the next two years, as well as the Steacie Prize in 1989. In the year 1990, he won two prestigious awards, namely, the Carlyle S. Beals Award of the Canadian Astronomical Society, and the Rutherford Medal in Physics offered by the Royal Society of Canada. In 1992, he was made a Foreign Honorary Member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. In 1994, he served as the David H. Harris Lecturer at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and also held a Killam Research Fellowship offered by the Canada Council as well as being made an Associate of the Royal Astronomical Society. In that same year, he delivered the George H. Darwin Lecture for the Royal Astronomical Society and, as has been noted above, was made a

Fellow of both the Royal Society of Canada and of the Royal Society of London. In 1996, Asteroid 3806 was named after him and in 1997, he was awarded the Dannie Heinemann Prize for Astrophysics as well as the Dirk Brouwer Award.

He has also served on a significant number of major external committees - 23 in number in the last decade alone. These included the Advisory Board, Institute for Theoretical Physics at the University of California at Santa Barbara; being part of the Policy Panel, Astronomy and Astrophysics Survey Committee, National Research Council (USA); Director of the Search Committee, Department of Terrestrial Magnetism, Carnegie Institution of Washington. He has also served as the Associate Editor of *Icarus* as well as serving on the Editorial Committee preparing annual reviews of astronomy and astrophysics. He is the Receiving Editor of New Astronomy, a position which he assumed in 1996, the same year in which he became a member of the Space Interferometry Mission Science Working Group. Among the appointments he accepted in 1997, was a three-year stint on the Program Committee, Alfred P. Sloan Research Fellowship in Physics, in addition to the Sectional Committee, Geophysics and Astronomy, Royal Society of London as well as sitting on the Visiting Committee, Harvard-Smithsonian Center for Astrophysics. Currently, he is also a member of the Astronomy and Astrophysics Survey Committee.

He holds membership in the American Academy of Arts and Sciences as well as the Canadian and American Astronomical Societies; the International Astronomical Union and the Royal Societies of both Canada and London. He has published in excess of 90 invited reviews, refereed papers, as well as a book published in 1987 by Princeton University Press in cooperation with J. Binney entitled *Galactic Dynamics*. He has also been a major contributor at conferences which have resulted in a number of publications.

Dr. Tremaine has indicated that his "research is mostly directed toward understanding the dynamics of a broad range of astrophysical systems, including protoplanetary disks, planetary rings, planetary systems, comets, globular clusters, galaxies, and clusters of galaxies". In 1997, he indicated that some of the issues which he was investigating - Is the solar system stable? What is the origin of comets? Are there black holes in galactic nuclei? What is the nature and extent of dark matter in the Galaxy? Why are spiral galaxies warped? One of his outstanding research achievements was when the Voyager probe verified his prediction of the existence of ring-shepherding satellites on Uranus.

#### **Evening Convocation**

#### Charles William John Eliot, O.C.

Charles William John Eliot, known to friends and colleagues alike as "Willie", was born of Canadian parents in what is now Pakistan. After returning to Canada, he took his formal university degrees at the University of Toronto, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree, a Master of Arts degree, and then a Doctor of Philosophy in Classics in 1969. He also did graduate work in Athens at the American School of Classical Studies between 1952 and 1957.

As a Classics Scholar, Dr. Eliot has held positions in universities across this country. Beginning as an Instructor of Classics at the University of British Columbia in 1957, by 1970 he was a Full Professor there. From the University of British Columbia, he went back to Athens as Professor of Archaeology at the American School between 1971 and 1976 and continued to retain close ties with the American School in Athens in the years after he had ceased living in Greece. Returning to Canada in 1976, he went to Mount

Allison University as Professor of Classics and Head of the Department. In addition to his work in Classics, while at Mount Allison University, Dr. Eliot was elected Chair of the Faculty Council, Secretary of Senate, and appointed Dean of the Faculty and later Vice-President, Academic.

Dr. Eliot has had a prolific professional career as a Classicist, especially in the area of Greek History and Archaeology. He has published numerous books and articles on classical 5th century Athens, with *Coastal Demes of Attika: a Study of the Policy of Kleisthenes*, published by the University of Toronto, probably the best known of his writings among his colleagues. Growing out of his interest in ancient Greek History and his love for Greece, he later studied, lectured, and published articles on the 19th century English travellers to Greece. The poet Byron is one of his particular favorites as a fellow philhellene and traveller in Greece.

Willie Eliot's status among his professional colleagues is obvious from the positions he has held in the National Associations of Classicists. He has served as a member of council of the Classical Association of Canada, Vice-President, and then the President of the Association from 1990-92. As a Past President of the Classical Association of Canada, he remains active in Canadian Classical Association as one whose advice and counsel is of enormous value in the shifting sands of academic life.

In the world beyond classics, he is probably best known as the former, popular President of the University of Prince Edward Island to which he went in 1985 after his years at Mount Allison University. He quickly became a very involved member of the community there, serving on various local committees and boards. For example, he became the Chairman of the Government House Committee in Charlottetown in 1994 and still continues in that position. He is a former member of the Board of Governors for Holland College, past Chairman of the Board for the Prince Edward Island Council of the Arts, member and past Chair of the Prince Edward Island Ministerial Steering Committee on Culture, two time President of the Community Museums Association of Prince Edward Island, past Chair and current Deputy Treasurer of the Prince Edward Island Museum and Heritage Foundation.

In his years, both before and during his tenure as President of the University of Prince Edward Island, Willie Eliot also began moving in a variety of wider circles beyond Classics and beyond his lifelong tradition of strong community service. He served on the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council, Advisory Academic panel from 1979-1983. From 1989 to 1992, he held the position of Chair of the Association of Atlantic Universities, one of the most important posts in higher education in this area because it provides a forum for discussion and unified action by universities across Atlantic Canada. In 1988, Dr. Eliot was appointed to the Board of Directors of the Society for the Study of Architecture in Canada. Beautiful, well-constructed and elegant buildings, whether in Canada or in Greece, have been a lifelong passion with him.

Over the years, Dr. Eliot has had a strong public voice as one concerned about the state of Canadian education and the plight of Canadian students. In his University of British Columbia years, he made a formal proposal to the Faculty of Arts on the nature of Arts education there. In 1995, *Macleans*' magazine quoted him as saying "Who is going to accept a debt load of \$20,000.00 to \$40,000.00 to learn to appreciate poetry? About the only people who can afford that kind of debt are doctors, and maybe some lawyers, who will be jumping into high-earning positions".

Because of his involvement in so many aspects of Canadian life and his concern that we preserve our culture and history, in 1992 he was awarded the commemorative medal for the 135th Anniversary of the Confederation of Canada. The University of King's College had already granted him an Honorary Doctorate in 1988 and in 1994, he joined the prestigious ranks of the Order of Canada.

Willie Eliot is married to the former Mary Williamson and they have four children: Charles, Nicholas, Johanna, and Luke. Their daughter, Sophia, died in 1963.

In conclusion, it seems worthwhile to end with a quotation from Willie Eliot himself. This comes from one of his admonitions to SSHRC to maintain an abiding interest in and funding for the Arts and Sciences. In 1989, it was reported in *The Financial Post* "Is it not justification enough...that we contribute a sense of value and heritage to the world in which we live, that through human sciences above all, we learn and transmit what it is to be human, that through our criticism we may remember that the environment is worth saving...and that at the end, we may stand with Sophocles and repeat his timeless verses: "without numbers are the world's wonders, but none more wonderful than man". Sophocles could only be proud of one who has laboured so long to foster and develop that definition of what it means to be human.

#### The Honorable Mr. Justice James Doane Hallett

A native Haligonian, the Honorable Mr. Justice Doane Hallett attended Halifax public schools prior to entering Saint Mary's University, from whence he graduated in 1952 with a Bachelor of Commerce degree. At Convocation in 1952, he was the class valedictorian. Three years later, he was awarded a Bachelor of Laws degree from Dalhousie University.

In 1956, he was called to the Bar of Nova Scotia and commenced the practice of law with the firm of Wickwire, MacInnes & Wilson, later to become MacInnes, Wilson & Hallett. During his 21 years as a practicing lawyer, mainly in the area of Corporate and Commercial Law, he served as a member of Council of the Nova Scotia Barristers' Society, chairing several senior Committees, including Legal Aid, and participated as a panelist at numerous seminars relating to his area of law practice. He also served as a Director of the Law Reform Commission of Nova Scotia. In 1971, he was appointed a Oueen's Counsel.

His association with Saint Mary's University continued during his years as a practicing lawyer. In the early 1960's, he lectured at the University in Commercial Law. Later, he served a term as a member of the University's Board of Governors.

In the further service of his community, he was a member of the first Parish Council of Canadian Martyrs Parish. He was a Director and Legal Counsel for the Nova Scotia Division of the Canadian Cancer Society and twice served as Chair of its annual fundraising campaign. He is a former President of the Halifax Club. He is both an avid and proficient golfer and fisherman. In addition to playing golf, his talents were called upon to assist the game, generally. He served as a Director and President of Ashburn Golf Club, as well as the Nova Scotia Golf Association. For seven years, he was a Governor of the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

In 1977, he was appointed a judge of the Trial Division of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. In the thirteen years in which he served in that capacity, Mr. Justice Hallett was one of Nova Scotia's most highly respected trial judges. In 1990, he was elevated to the Nova Scotia Court of Appeal, where he now serves. During his judicial career, he was an

active member of various committees dealing with the administration of justice in Nova Scotia, most often chairing those committees. He represented Nova Scotia as a Director of the Canadian Judges Conference and in that capacity, served on various national committees, including a term as Chair of the Independence of the Judiciary Committee. He is a strong supporter of judicial education. He has lectured and participated at conferences and seminars of the National Judicial Institute and was active in the development and organization of an annual seminar specifically related to Appeal Court judges. He is, at the present time, Chair of the Advisory Committee, set up to make recommendations for the appointment of Queen's Counsel.

At a dinner in his honor in 1998, the former Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, the Honorable Lorne Clarke, said the following:

Both as a trial judge and as a judge of the Court of Appeal, Mr. Justice Hallett has been the author of many of our leading judgments. He is quoted with ever-increasing frequency. His work is respected by other judges. He is highly respected by the Bar. Lawyers in Nova Scotia regard Mr. Justice Hallett as intelligent, fair minded, dedicated to the law and, in general parlance, a class act.

He and his wife, Marjorie, have four children: Cynthia Jane, Joseph Edward Forbes, Helen Scriven, and Mary Elizabeth, all four of whom attended Saint Mary's University. Cynthia Jane and Helen Scriven both graduated with Bachelor of Commerce degrees in 1980 and 1993 respectively. His youngest brother, George "Burpee" Hallett was a faculty member in the Department of English at Saint Mary's University from 1960 to 1997.

#### Martha Louise Jodrey

Born and educated in Halifax, Martha Louise (Donahoe) Jodrey attended the Convent of the Sacred Heart prior to entering Dalhousie University in 1960. With an annual average of over 90 percent, she was awarded scholarships each of her five years at that institution. In 1964, she received her Bachelor of Arts degree (summa cum laude) with a major in Sociology and a minor in French. She won the Dr. Prince Prize in Sociology for the highest academic average in the graduating class.

After completing the qualifying year for a Master of Arts degree with a final average above 95 percent, she took advantage of the opportunity to own and operate her own business by purchasing, in 1965, Miss Murphy's Business College. After taking the full secretarial course herself and receiving her diploma in the fall of 1965, she began her teaching and administrative career working with students from ages 16 to 60. She introduced a new method of shorthand, exclusive to Miss Murphy's called *speedwriting shorthand*, which became very popular as well as numerous business subjects not taught in other secretarial schools, such as Business Psychology and a Personal Finishing program.

Mrs. Jodrey acted as Principal from 1965 to 1969 and Administrator and Owner of Miss Murphy's from 1965 until 1982, when she retired after selling the business.

In 1983, her cousin, Dr. C. Henry Reardon, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee of Saint Mary's University's Board of Governors, invited her to join that governing council. She has been serving Saint Mary's University ever since, first as Chair of the Finance Committee (1984 to 1988) and since 1988, as Chair of the Honorary Degrees Committee. She indicated that she has been "enjoying the challenges of each Committee".

Mrs. Jodrey has also been active in other organizations. She was voted Chair of the Board as well as Chair of the Capital Campaign at Bridgeway Academy, a private non-profit day school for learning disabled children. With the support of Mr. Don Keleher, Director of University Advancement at Saint Mary's University, and in particular, Dr. Kenneth L. Ozmon, President of the University, who accompanied her on all major calls, she successfully raised the \$120,000.00 needed to implement the High School Academic Program which was introduced at Bridgeway Academy in 1987. That program has been very successful and it continues to enable learning disabled students to graduate in increasing numbers, most of whom continue to pursue their academic goals at Saint Mary's University.

She noted that she "was delighted with the enthusiastic support from Dr. Ozmon, Dr. Joe Jabbra [former Vice President (Academic)] and Mr. Guy Noel [recently retired Vice President (Administration)] for her recommendation that the Atlantic Centre for Support for Disabled Students at Saint Mary's University incorporate a special program to assist qualified learning disabled students through their academic studies". From 1986 to 1990, with the assistance of Dr. Kenneth L. Ozmon and his senior administrators, there followed intense lobbying of all 21 provincial cabinet ministers to provide start-up funding for the program. The Provincial Government finally, formally, committed the funding in the fall of 1990 and the program, which started with only seven students, now assist upwards of 60 students annually. The first learning disabled student to graduate under the support program received her degree in 1994 and is now continuing with graduate studies. Mrs. Jodrey continues to be actively involved in fundraising for the Atlantic Centre.

She is also a member of the Saint Mary's University's Capital Campaign Executive Committee and has, once again, been very active in campaign calls.

In 1992, Mrs. Jodrey was invited to join the Board of the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia and has just completed two three year terms; is currently serving on the Acquisitions Committee; and is a member of the Special Government and Corporate Relations Committee which she helped establish. With Saint Mary's University's alumnus, Mr. Bernard Riordon, the Art Gallery Director, she lobbied the Premier and Cabinet to acquire urgently-needed additional exhibition space and in 1996, was successful in securing the first two floors of the adjacent building to house the Maud Lewis and other collections.

Mrs. Jodrey is also involved in her local community - Windsor, Nova Scotia. She was Secretary of the Windsor Nursery School Association for a number of years while her children were young; and was voted Chair of the Windsor Rate-Payers Association (1992 to 1993). She is a member of St. John's Church, Windsor, and St. Augustine's in Chester. She is also a member of the Chester Golf Club as well as the Chester Yacht Club; the Halifax Club; and the Empire Club.

She is married to Bruce John Jodrey, Chairman of CKF Inc., Hantsport, Nova Scotia, and Vice Chairman of Scotia Investments Ltd. They have two sons, Joel, currently enrolled in the Faculty of Arts at Saint Mary's University and Jay, a graduate of Saint Mary's University with a Bachelor of Arts degree, who is currently pursuing a Certificate in Human Resource Management at the Frank H. Sobey School of Business, Saint Mary's University.

#### Retirements

The following five faculty members/administrators are retiring from Saint Mary's University after a combined service of 176 years.

#### Dr. D. Owen Carrigan

Dr. Owen Carrigan, a native of New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, came to Saint Mary's University in 1971 as its first lay President from the University of Western Ontario where he was Head of King's College. Previously, he taught at Wilfred Laurier University and Xavier College, the Sydney campus of Saint Francis Xavier University. Dr. Carrigan holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Saint Francis Xavier University; a Master of Arts degree from Boston University; and a Doctor of Philosophy from the University of Maine. Following his terms as President, he joined the Department of History as a full professor in 1979. Over the course of his career, Dr. Carrigan has maintained a balance among teaching, research and publication, and university and community service. His student teaching evaluations have been consistently among the highest in the University. He has published three books, Canadian Party Platforms; Crime and Punishment in Canada: A History; and the most recent one, in 1998, titled Juvenile Delinquency in Canada: A History. He has also authored a number of reports, journal articles, and presented papers to a variety of audiences, including the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in Paris. He is a member of the scholastic honor society of Phi Kappa Phi and is listed in the American Who's Who, the Canadian Who's Who, the Dictionary of International Biography, Contemporary Authors, Leaders in Education, Directory of American Scholars, Who's Who in Education, and Men of Achievement.

Dr. Carrigan has maintained an active role in University affairs. He has served as a member of the Board of Governors; a member of the Senate; Chair of the Faculty Union's Pension Committee; a member of the Graduate Awards Committee; the Faculty Library Committee; Chair of the Faculty of Arts Growth and Development Committee; and a member of the Selection Committee for Saint Mary's Sport Hall of Fame. It was during his presidency that the first Director of Alumni was appointed at Saint Mary's University.

He has also been active in national and community affairs. He has served six years on the Canada Council; on the Boards of the Institute for Research on Public Policy; the Canadian Association for the Treatment and Study of Families; and the Technical University of Nova Scotia. Dr. Carrigan was Chairman of the Commission on Foreign Student Policy in Canada and a Member of the Nova Scotia Tourist Advisory Council. He has also served on policy committees for government; on the executive of a number of citizen organizations; as Chairman of the Halifax Home Owners Association; as media consultant; and has been a frequent guest on national and regional television and radio programs. Dr. Carrigan also pursues a variety of personal interests which include sports, painting, carpentry work, a classic 1967 Jaguar, and antique collecting.

Dr. Carrigan is married to the former Florence Nicholson from Sydney. They have six children - Nancy is a graduate of Dalhousie University; Janet, David, and Glen are all alumni of Saint Mary's University; Sharon holds degrees from both Saint Francis Xavier University and Saint Mary's University; while Douglas is a graduate of Dalhousie University and the American Academy of Dramatic Arts.

The status of Professor Emeritus will also be bestowed on Dr. Carrigan at the evening Convocation.

### Kevin J. Cleary

When Kevin arrived at Saint Mary's, he never dreamed he would remain a fixture here for almost five decades. Indeed, it "is my life", he remarked recently.

Kevin J. Cleary holds three degrees from Saint Mary's University - a Bachelor of Arts, a Bachelor of Education, and a Master of Arts. He was in the first Bachelor of Education Graduating Class from Saint Mary's University (13 May 1958), in which there were four graduates in total: Reginald Andrews, Kevin Cleary, Joseph McDonald, and Edgar Malay. As a student, he enjoyed the international flavour of the campus, saying that this in itself was an educational experience. "I had men on my floor and professors from abroad. The more I spoke with them and got to know them, the more I became aware of the world around me".

He joined the staff of the University on 1 July 1961 as Assistant to the Dean of Studies and became Registrar in 1963 and served until 1973. In addition, he has served as Secretary to Senate from its inaugural meeting on 3 May 1963 until his retirement on 30 June of this year - 36 years of service and 38 volumes of bound minutes.

He has served, at one time or another, as Secretary of all of the Committees of Senate. Those on which he has served most continuously are: the Curriculum Committee, the Executive Committee, the By-Laws Committee, the Research Committee, the Academic Appeals Committee, and the Graduate Awards Committee.

He has also held other positions on campus, namely, Executive Assistant to the Administration; the first full-time Coordinator of Alumni Affairs; Student Counsellor; Moderator of the Drama Society (for the last 10 years); and had a "one-year stint" as Director of Personnel.

On a lighter note, many years ago, the then Athletic Director, Bob Hayes, attempted to organize a Junior Varsity Hockey Team for which Kevin served as coach. During this venture, Saint Mary's University actually won a few games!

All five of Kevin's children have attended Saint Mary's University and three have graduated -Stephanie (Bachelor of Science degree); Cynthia (Bachelor of Science degree); and Carolyn (Bachelor of Arts degree).

"My best memory of Saint Mary's University is that there are no bad memories".

## Dr. Robert L. Kruse

An American by birth, now a permanent resident of Canada, Dr. Kruse earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Mathematics (summa cum laude) from Pomona College and from the California Institute of Technology, a Master of Science (Mathematics) degree and a Doctor of Philosophy (Mathematics). From 1960 to 1961, he was a Woodrow Wilson Fellow and a National Science Foundation Fellow for the next three years.

Prior to his arrival at Saint Mary's University in 1976, he was a member of the Research Staff, Computer Science Division, Sandia National Laboratories, Albuquerque, New Mexico (1964 to 1970); Visiting Reader in Mathematics and Fulbright-Hays Fellow, University of Canterbury, Christchurch, New Zealand (1970 to 1972); and Associate Professor of Mathematics at Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia (1973 to 1976).

He served as Chairperson of the Department of Mathematics at Saint Mary's University from 1976 to 1978 followed by two decades of teaching at the University as a Professor

of Mathematics and Computing Science. During that 20 year period, he spent the 1982-83 academic year as a Visiting Professor of Computing Science at the University of Alberta, Edmonton, Alberta, and also as a Visiting Erskine Fellow, Computer Science and Mathematics, University of Canterbury, Christchurch, New Zealand (February to April 1990).

He has published a total of 22 books, including instructors manuals for some of these as well as in excess of 15 research papers. This year, in conjunction with Alexander Ryba, he is publishing a book entitled *Data Structures and Program Design in C++* and in the year 2001, anticipates publishing a book on *Java Version*.

He took early retirement at Saint Mary's University in 1998.

## **Guy Noel**

Born in Cornerbrook, Newfoundland, Guy Noel graduated in 1957 from St. Francis Xavier University with a Diploma in Engineering and two years later from the then Nova Scotia Technical College (later TUNS and now Dal Tech) with a Bachelor of Engineering. He then proceeded to work in the corporate world for the next 10 years, primarily with the Canadian International Paper Company and both Federal and Provincial Governments. In 1969, he joined Saint Mary's University as a lecturer in the Department of Chemistry, following which, for the next 14 years, he held a number of different positions, including that of Assistant to the Vice President (Academic); Director of Planning and Information Services; and Director of University Services. In 1983, he assumed the position which he held for the next 15 years, namely, that of Vice President (Administration). During his last year of service at the University (1998-99), he was Special Assistant to the President with particular reference to the new Sobey Building and the negotiation of contracts with the several unions on campus.

He has been active in associations directly connected with his positions at the University, including the Association of Physical Plant Administrators (APPA); National Association of College Auxiliary Services (NACAS); and the Association of Professional Engineers of Nova Scotia (APENS). He also held positions of Secretary, Treasurer, Vice President, and President of the Canadian Association of University Business Officers (CAUBO).

Married to the former Joan Lownds, they have four children, namely, Catherine (who graduated from Dalhousie University) and three sons, all of whom graduated from Saint Mary's University, namely, Stephen and Peter (Bachelor of Arts degrees) and Gregory (Bachelor of Commerce degree).

In his own words, Guy intends to "retire peacefully to the golf course".

## Ken Snyder

Professor Ken Snyder was educated at The Hotchkiss School and at Brown University, from which he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degree. Prior to his coming to Saint Mary's University in 1968, he taught at the Rhode Island School of Design, Wayne State University, and the University of Michigan. In 1984-85, he served as Professor of English at Shandong Teachers' University in Jinan, Peoples Republic of China, in the Exchange Program Saint Mary's University had established with that institution. In the summer of 1986, he was a member and participant in the School of Theory and Criticism, then at Dartmouth College, now at Cornell University.

During his career at Saint Mary's University, he has been, at different times, a member of Senate, Secretary of the Saint Mary's University Faculty Union, Chair of the English

Department, member of the University Review Committee, Faculty Library Committee, and Library Representative for the English Department.

Accepting, perhaps with a force never intended by that master, Matthew Arnold's dictum that poetry is, at bottom, a criticism of life, Professor Snyder devoted his teaching to its instruction, both in its theory and in its practice. As a member of the University's Visiting Speakers Committee, he was instrumental in bringing the Irish poet and subsequent Nobel Prize winner, Seamus Heaney, to read from his work in a memorable evening at the Saint Mary's University Art Gallery. Some of Professor Snyder's own poetry and commentary on poetry has been published in various journals, more recently in *The Antigonish Review* and *The Dalhousie Review*. Professor Snyder's principal diversions are long walks in various parts of Nova Scotia.

Professor Snyder is married to Mary Y. Snyder, Director of the Non-Print Collection at the Nova Scotia School of Art and Design. They have two daughters: Ursula, B.Sc.(Honours Physics), Dalhousie University; Ph.D., Brown University; and Alisa, BFA, Nova Scotia School of Art and Design; MFA, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale.

#### **Chancellor Emeritus**

At the discretion of the Executives of the Academic Senate and Board of Governors, the designation of Chancellor Emeritus is bestowed on deserving individuals once they have officially retired from office. In the history of Saint Mary's University, the designation of Chancellor Emeritus has been bestowed only once before, namely, on Most Reverend James M. Hayes, Chancellor for twenty-five years (1966 to 1991). This year, the status of Chancellor Emeritus is being bestowed on **Austin E. Burke**, whose biography follows.

#### Austin E. Burke

On 9 December 1991, Archbishop Austin Emile Burke was sworn in as Chancellor of Saint Mary's University. He has served as our Chancellor for almost every Convocation from 1992 to the Special Convocation which the University held on 9 October 1998. From the outset he indicated that he was "very much interested in talking and getting to know the student body; after all, young people are our hope for tomorrow. They have tremendous gifts to offer and I believe the Church has something to offer them in return".

One of ten children born to Arthur and Louise Burke of Sluice Point, Yarmouth County, his father fished on the Grand Banks all of his life from the age of twelve and survived four shipwrecks. Life in a large family, with the ever-present danger of death at sea, instilled in Austin Burke a strong faith and deep trust in God's abiding presence. Many of the maxims that have guided his life stem from those early days.

After completing his early education, he was considering either teaching or banking when the Knights of Columbus intervened with a four-year scholarship to St. Anne's College, now Universite Sainte Anne, at Church Point, Nova Scotia. His alma mater was later to confer an honorary degree on him.

During his university years, he excelled in athletics, particularly baseball and hockey. He was a member of the Yarmouth Getaways Senior Ball Team. He bypassed a promising hockey career to enter the priesthood although he has always retained his youthful enthusiasm for athletics - in recent years, especially for our Huskies.

After his ordination in 1950, and during his service as a priest in Halifax, he served as one of the Diocesan Consultors. One of his great accomplishments was to mobilize volunteers to build the parish hall, rectory, and mission church in the parish of Saint Anselm's, West Chezzetcook.

In his twenty-three years as Bishop of Yarmouth, he guided the church into the renewal called for by the Second Vatican Council, and developed pastoral responses to the decrease in priests available for parish service.

His appointment as Archbishop of Halifax in 1991 marked the first time an Acadian had held that post. He is fluent in both French and English although he explains that he is not a "purebred", noting that his great-great grandfather was Irish.

He has a very strong relationship with the Knights of Columbus, serving as their chaplain for many years. He was instrumental in encouraging the development of the Catholic Organization for Life and Family, a joint project of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops and the Knights of Columbus. This national organization promotes respect for human life and human dignity and the essential role of the family. He has consistently supported the pro-life movement, stressing the importance of human life at all stages and also advocating support for single parents.

During his term on the Social Affairs Commission of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, he participated in the development of statements on a variety of social and economic issues, including material on the welfare of native people in Canada's North.

He represented the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishop's as an International Observer during the elections in South Africa where, for the first time, all people could exercise their right to vote. On his return to Canada, he spoke often of the simple faith of the people, their great poverty, and the enormous divide between black and white which was so painfully obvious throughout the country.

He officially retired as Archbishop on 13 January 1998.

He endeared himself to the young people of the Archdiocese of Halifax, (and many not so young people as well) as the "hockey card" bishop, for whenever he went to parishes for confirmation or to make a pastoral visit, he gave out signed copies of his own hockey card which heralds his accomplishments as a player, sufficiently talented to be considered for a professional career. Through the hockey card, many young people began to appreciate the link between church and daily life.

In his days of retirement, at West Porter's Lake, Halifax County, Archbishop Burke has developed his green thumb, filling the grounds of his new home with flowers and vegetables. This past winter his learning curve went up again as he studied the care and feeding of houseplants.

### **Professors Emeriti**

The honorary rank of Professor Emeritus is awarded, upon or after retirement from fulltime active academic duties, to faculty members who have served the University with distinction. Distinguished service shall consist of a combination of some or all of the following: extensive research and publication of unusually high quality, teaching performance recognized by colleagues and students to be of exceptional merit, contribution to the administration and development of the University of a creative kind.

The rank of Professor Emeritus carries no salary or honorarium; only the following entitlements:

- full use of the University library facilities;
- where possible, working space on request;
- the right to use faculty secretarial facilities as available; and
- the right to apply and be considered for University research funds.

The status of Professor Emeritus is being conferred on **Dr. D. Owen Carrigan**, whose biography appears earlier in this Program and on **Dr. Frank Dougherty**, whose biography follows.

### Dr. Frank Dougherty

At the age of 17, Dr. Dougherty started work as a clerk with Sherwin-Williams Co. of Canada and had 21 years of experience in private industry before becoming an academic. He had already reached the rank of accountant with Conant Paints Ltd. before he received his first degree, a Bachelor of Commerce [Sir George Williams University (now Concordia)] to which he subsequently added his C.A. designation; a Master of Science degree (Clarkson College of Technology); and a Doctor of Philosophy degree (Pennsylvania State University). His academic honours included a Samuel Bronfman Foundation Fellowship and a Quebec Department of Education Graduate Scholarship.

He worked for Monsanto Chemicals; Touche Ross; and Leviton Manufacturing of Canada Limited and was controller and secretary-treasurer of the Sperry group of companies when he became Associate Professor of Accounting at Concordia University in 1966. He was promoted to the rank of Associate Professor and acquired the same rank when he went to the University of Waterloo. He joined Saint Mary's as an Associate Professor in 1978 and was promoted to Full Professor in 1983. He served as chairperson of the Department of Accounting from 1985 to 1988.

Dr. Dougherty is a member of the Nova Scotia Institute of Chartered Accountants and a general member of the Society of Management Accountants. He was a past member of the CAAA (Canadian Academic Accounting Association) and the AAA (the American Accounting Association).

He officially retired in 1993, but thereafter continued to teach both graduate and undergraduate courses for several additional years. Since retirement, he has been upgrading his computer skills and has been aiding small businesses on a voluntary basis.

Both Dr. Dougherty's son, Michael, and daughter, Karyn, attended Saint Mary's University with the latter receiving her Bachelor of Arts degree in 1984. His son, Don, is a part-time lecturer in accounting at Saint Mary's. He and his wife, Joyce, have five grandchildren and are enjoying the retirement life.

#### Afternoon Convocation

### **VALEDICTORIAN:**

### Karen Turner-Lienaux

Born in Halifax, Ms. Turner-Lienaux was educated at Tower Road and Queen Elizabeth High Schools in Halifax.

By 1971, she had become a Registered Medical Laboratory Technologist and worked for the next 10 years at the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, in the Hematology Department of the Pathology Laboratory. In 1981, she became a supervisor in the Blood Bank Section of that same Laboratory and after the merger of the Victoria General Hospital, the Halifax Infirmary/ Camp Hill Hospital, was successful in obtaining the position of supervisor for the Blood Transfusion Service and STAT Laboratory.

Initially, she registered at Saint Mary's University in 1970 but due to financial restraints, did not pursue her studies seriously until 1990, when she re-registered as a part-time mature student in the Faculty of Commerce. She indicates that "I have always felt that it is important to keep the mind stimulated, be open to challenges, and take advantage of available opportunities. My ability to go back to school has provided me with a great sense of personal achievement. One is never too old to pursue knowledge". While pursuing that degree, in 1995 she completed the requirements for a Certificate in Management from the Canadian Institute of Management in affiliation with Saint Mary's University. Ms. Turner-Lienaux indicated that "being a part of Saint Mary's University has been a wonderful and stimulating experience; not only do I have the privilege of being part of the 1999 graduating class, but I have the added privilege of seeing young people such as my son (who graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce degree in 1990; an MBA in 1995; and a CMA in 1997) and many of his friends go through this graduating process as I am doing now".

Twenty-nine years after initially registering at Saint Mary's University, Ms. Turner-Lienaux will graduate later in this Convocation with a Bachelor of Commerce degree with a major in General Business Studies.

In addition to her studies at the University and her work commitments, she has always tried to remain active in her professional associations, such as the Nova Scotia Society of Medical Laboratory Technologists (Director of Public Relations '97-'98; '99-'00); Canadian Society of Medical Laboratory Science (Nova Scotia Representative of Marketing and Communications Committee '97-'98; '99-'00); and has served as the Chairperson and Committee member of Provincial and National Conferences from 1983 to 1993.

She credits her husband, Charles, a lawyer, with being her greatest supporter while pursuing her formal education. She also acknowledges that the ongoing support and help which she has received from her step-son, Charles, Jr., is also an extremely important element enabling her to pursue her educational goals.

Her hobbies include gourmet cooking, photography, walking, and more recently, skiing.

Ms. Turner-Lienaux is typical of the many mature students who have experienced great success at Saint Mary's University. She indicated that she hoped "I am a tribute and example to show that nothing can ever stand in your way as long as you have the desire

and willingness to achieve the goals that you set for yourself and which provide you with a true sense of accomplishment and are continually open to the opportunities available to you. Whatever you want to do can be done".

#### HOODING CANDIDATE:

#### Gordon G. MacDonald

A graduate of Dartmouth Senior High School, Mr. MacDonald entered Saint Mary's University in September 1994 and will graduate later in this Convocation with a Bachelor of Commerce degree with a double major in Management and Marketing.

Together with Paul Isenor, Mr. MacDonald was the founder of the first Marketing Society in four years at Saint Mary's University in 1998-99. These two individuals worked closely with faculty members and the Saint Mary's University Students' Association to engender life into this Society and the results have been very successful. School spirit was promoted through a number of "fun" events and students and by and large, became more involved in marketing than ever before. Internal competition among the Society members in study groups allowed students to sharpen their skills in more than just a classroom setting.

He was one of the members of the Saint Mary's University entry into the 16th Annual Manitoba International Marketing Competition in 1997-98. This team placed first in the world in their division and third in the world overall. The competition lasted from September 1997 through January 1998 and had, as its objective, the running of a company and competition with other similar companies. This stimulation was only part of the competition in that the other components were the management portion and final presentations.

Mr. MacDonald also served as the Business Editor for the Saint Mary's University student newspaper, *The Journal*.

Mr. MacDonald indicated that, like so many Saint Mary's University graduates, he was the first member of his family to go to University and since he is named after both of his grandfathers, Gordon MacDonald and Garfield Gosse, he indicated that he had dedicated this year of his life to the memory of his late grandfathers.

## Derek D. Stone

Mr. Stone arrived at Saint Mary's University in September 1994 after a very successful high school career at St. Peter's District High School, St. Peter's, Cape Breton. He will graduate later today with a Bachelor of Commerce degree with a triple major in Management, Marketing, and Computing Science/Business Administration, Co-operative Education Program. Throughout his career at Saint Mary's University, he has been involved with in-depth research in the marketing area, particularly dealing with customer loyalty, database marketing, direct marketing, and relationship marketing. He acquired hands-on experience by working with clients of the Saint Mary's University's Business Development Centre, Barrington Gate, Halifax.

He was extremely involved in extracurricular activities while at Saint Mary's University. During Charter Day, held on 20 March 1999, Derek was presented with the Silver "M" - the second highest award granted by the Saint Mary's University Student Association (SMUSA) to those who have excelled in extracurricular activities in the area of student affairs during their stay at Saint Mary's University. In addition, he was also named "Senior of the Year".

As a volunteer, he has contributed his time to the Children's Wish Foundation; Softworld '96; he is a Certified Laubach Literacy Tutor (Each One Teach One); has served as a Business Basics Consultant to grade five and six students; and volunteered in his home community at the Nicholas Deny Museum.

His involvement in a whole host of activities, as well as his strong academic performance, has resulted in him being recognized for the Achievement Scholarship from Saint Mary's University; the Hugh H. MacKay - James A. MacMurray Foundation Inc. Scholarship valued at \$12,000.00 over a four year period which is awarded to a student in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick pursuing a career in Business; and prior to entering Saint Mary's University, was awarded the Lieutenant-Governor's Medal in June 1993 and the Queen Elizabeth II Medal, a year later, for outstanding academic achievement.

He was one of a very few students selected to attend Manitoba's International Marketing Competition in January 1999 and two years earlier, attended the International Drama Festival in Japan.

While at Saint Mary's University, he was involved with, and interested in, athletics, being a member of the Saint Mary's University baseball team for four years (1995-1999). He also worked as the Intramural Sports Coordinator in 1997-98 and that same year, wrote the sports column for the Saint Mary's University student newspaper, *The Journal*. This past year, he assisted the Grad Class.

Brian is the second member of his family to graduate from Saint Mary's University in that his sister, Kathy, graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in Sociology in May 1992. One of the proudest members of his family is his grandmother, Muriel, whom he describes as "92 years young".

## An Explanation for our Guests

Thursday, 13 May 1999, marks a special event in the history of the University, namely the graduation of one of the largest class in its 197-year history.

In the early years of Saint Mary's, major events such as Convocation were always held off campus. Once the University moved to its present campus in 1951, it was possible to hold Convocation on campus until 1986, when the number of potential graduates required a larger facility than was available; hence the choice of the Metro Centre, which provided a very suitable and comfortable setting for this major event. In 1996, for the first time since the move downtown, it became necessary to hold two ceremonies to accommodate the number of graduates. The Convocation Committee continues to strive to bring as much Santamarian flavour as possible to this event, thus ensuring that Graduation is truly in the Saint Mary's tradition.

## **History of Saint Mary's University**

Saint Mary's University was founded in 1802 to provide opportunities for higher learning to young Catholic men. Its founder, the Reverend Edmund Burke, had meagre resources to work with, but on later being named Bishop with responsibility for Nova Scotia, he continued to support the college as essential to the development of the Catholic community. In 1841, the Nova Scotia House of Assembly gave formal recognition of its academic role. Its legal status was confirmed in perpetuity by enactment in 1852.

In 1913, the Christian Brothers of Ireland, a teaching order, were invited by the Archdiocese of Halifax to direct the college and its academic program. During the ensuing years, Saint Mary's University became more widely known for the quality of its undergraduate teaching and continued to develop new instructional programs, most notably within its Faculty of Commerce. In 1940 the Upper Canada Province of The Society of Jesus was invited to succeed the Christian Brothers as administrators and teachers in the University, and for thirty years until the enactment in 1970 of the new act of incorporation, the college remained under Jesuit supervision. The longstanding emphasis on liberal arts and commerce was extended to include new programs in science, engineering, and teacher education. Extension courses became an important part of the University's commitment to an active educational role in the community.

Currently, there are in excess of 8,200 students enrolled at Saint Mary's, approximately 5,100 of whom are full-time. The remainder are studying on a part-time basis both on campus and at such extension centres as Downtown Halifax, Truro, Bridgewater, Sydney, Dartmouth, The Gambia (West Africa), the Canadian Arctic, and Lower Sackville.

## **Convocation Ceremony**

## The Procession

The ceremony starts with the procession — the entering of the members of Convocation, beginning with the Marshall of Convocation and the students who will be presented with degrees, diplomas, and certificates during the service. As the students fill up the chairs on the main body of the Metro Centre floor, they will give the impression that today's ceremony really is, as convocations traditionally were, a meeting of the whole University. (The word "convocation" means "calling-together".) Indeed, this Centre could not hold all the individuals who are part of Saint Mary's - the students, the professors, the administration, the staff, and a large number of alumni around the world - not to mention their families and friends.

Next in the procession are special guests, the Members of Faculty, the Board of Governors, and the Deans of the Faculties.

Next are honorary degree recipients. In addition to "earned" degrees awarded to students who have studied and met the usual requirements, annually the University confers several "honorary" degrees on individuals who have been designated by the University's Board of Governors and Senate as deserving special honour. To symbolize the degrees, they will receive hoods trimmed with specially designated colours. The people receiving this honour are introduced during the Convocation ceremony and a brief text is read to explain why they merit the award.

The final members of the academic procession are the Vice-President (Academic and Research), the President, and the Chancellor of the University.

Many members of the academic procession will have colourful gowns and hoods of institutions from across Canada, the United States, and many other nations of the world.

## The Ceremonial Mace

The ceremonial mace, which is carried by the Marshal of Convocation at the head of the academic procession, was presented to Saint Mary's in April 1980 and used for the first time at the 1980 Spring Convocation. It symbolizes the University's authority to grant degrees. It was made and presented to the University by Maritime Command in recognition of Saint Mary's alumni killed in both world wars and also serving members of the Canadian Armed Forces who have been students at the University.

The mace is made of oak with a cast brass crown and brass plates carrying traditional ceremonial engravings. The plates represent the contribution to Saint Mary's by the Jesuit Fathers, the Christian Brothers of Ireland, the Archdiocese of Halifax, the LaSalle Christian Brothers, the Lay Teachers, and the Armed Forces.

#### Degrees and Diplomas Awarded with Distinctions

At Saint Mary's University in the general undergraduate degree and diploma programs, academic distinctions are awarded to successful candidates on the basis of the following cumulative quality point averages based on all courses taken at Saint Mary's. Basically, students must have taken a minimum of 75% of their courses at Saint Mary's to qualify for a distinction. There are no distinctions awarded in graduate and certificate programs.

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Traditions form a very important component of a University. A number of these are associated with Convocation, including the four described in the following paragraphs.

## **University Crest**

Hanging above the centre of the stage is a copy of the University crest, designed in the 1940s by the late Reverend Daniel Fogarty, S.J., then Dean of Education. Each symbol in the crest has a significance relevant to the various phases and history of the University.

On the outer portion of the crest, the name and location of the University are inscribed in Latin and, in Roman numerals (1841), the date the University received its charter authorizing it to grant degrees.

The book shown above the shield represents learning and knowledge. The inscription on the page of the book is in Latin — "Age Quod Agis". This is the motto of the University which exhorts all those connected with the University to strive to do their best in everything that they do. This quotation is from the Irish Christian Brothers and symbolizes their contribution to the development of the institution.

The upper part of the shield has the official seal of the Jesuits with I.H.S. being the Greek initials for Christ's name. Below these initials are the three nails which represent the Crucifixion, and surrounding these is the Crown of Thorns.

The two crowns represent a dual loyalty — to the then Dominion of Canada and to the British Commonwealth. Below these crowns is the thistle, which stands for Nova Scotia's Scottish heritage.

#### The Hooding Ceremony

As you will observe, all the graduates and members of the academic procession are attired in the basic elements of formal academic dress, which at Saint Mary's follows the general guidelines established at Oxford and Cambridge Universities in England. Formal attire consists of academic robe, hood and mortar board, although at Saint Mary's the latter is limited to Master's graduates only. The academic dress worn by each participant depends upon the academic level attained. There is a special attire for the Bachelor level candidates, for the Master's, and the Doctorate. While tradition has dictated the style or cut of the academic attire, each university, for the most part, will amend certain details of the attire to suit its own particular tastes and traditions.

The academic hood which each graduate is wearing symbolizes the degree into which the student will be or has been admitted. The hood itself traces its tradition back to the Middle Ages, when its prototype, with a cowl-like appendage and tail, was used to cover the shoulders in the cold and draughty medieval buildings or in inclement weather.

Gradually this garment was modified and the hood assumed an academic rather than functional significance. The hood has two basic elements: the trim on the outer edge and an inner satin lining. Each hood has its outer edge trimmed with a colour to indicate a particular faculty and degree: white symbolizes Arts; gold, Science; grey, Commerce; and white with pale blue, Education. The hood for the Master's candidates is essentially the same as the Bachelor's hood except that the trim is usually an inch or two wider. All the Bachelor level hoods are lined with satin in the colours of the university granting the degree. Hence at Saint Mary's the hood is lined with maroon satin with a white chevron. The Master's hood at Saint Mary's is lined with maroon satin only to give it added distinction from the Bachelor's.

A symbolic hooding ceremony has become a traditional feature of all Convocations at Saint Mary's.

#### **Graduation Alumni Pins**

The Alumni Association of Saint Mary's University has generously provided an Alumni Pin to each member of the Spring Class of 1999. Beginning with the 1992 Spring Convocation, it has become a traditional feature at all Convocations at Saint Mary's University. The President of the Alumni Association will present these pins symbolically to the hooding candidates during the Convocation ceremonies. Graduates are encouraged to wear theirs with pride and to consider becoming an active member of the Association.

#### Flags on the Stage

Each year Saint Mary's has a number of international students enrolled in various programmes. The flags which you see displayed on the stage for Convocation are from some of the countries from which these students come, not necessarily graduating students, but those in any year of study. This international aspect of the Saint Mary's University community is a feature of justifiable pride which contributes markedly to the growth and understanding of both Canadian and nonCanadian students. Included in the University's permanent collection of flags is one from the International Year of the Disabled signifying the University's permanent commitment to people with disabilities. Also part of this collection is that of the Mi'kmaqs' in recognition of their First Nation's status.

## **Special Gifts**

The University Bookstore has set up a small display and are selling some crested items. If you are still looking for a gift for your favourite graduate, you might find something available. It is located in front of the concession stands on the Brunswick Street side of the Metro Centre, concourse level.

Present it at the kiosk in the Time Out Sports Lounge on the concourse level, Brunswick Street entrance. In seconds it will be professionally mounted in a high quality, Canadian-made frame, complete with a mat emblazoned with the official logo of Saint Mary's University. The cost, including taxes, is \$70.00.

The University's symbols and traditions reflect its roots and look to its future. The ritual of Convocation looks to the roots of the University and constitute a beginning for the students who now enter a new stage in their lives. Indeed, both the symbols and the Convocation look back far beyond the beginning of this University to the centuries of academic life in western civilization. Today the University dresses in clothes which are symbolic, not functional, and goes through the 600-year-old ritual of a convocation for the conferment of degrees, diplomas, and certificates.
