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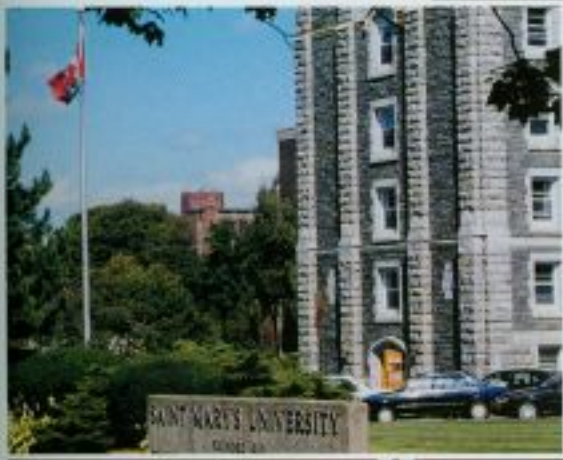

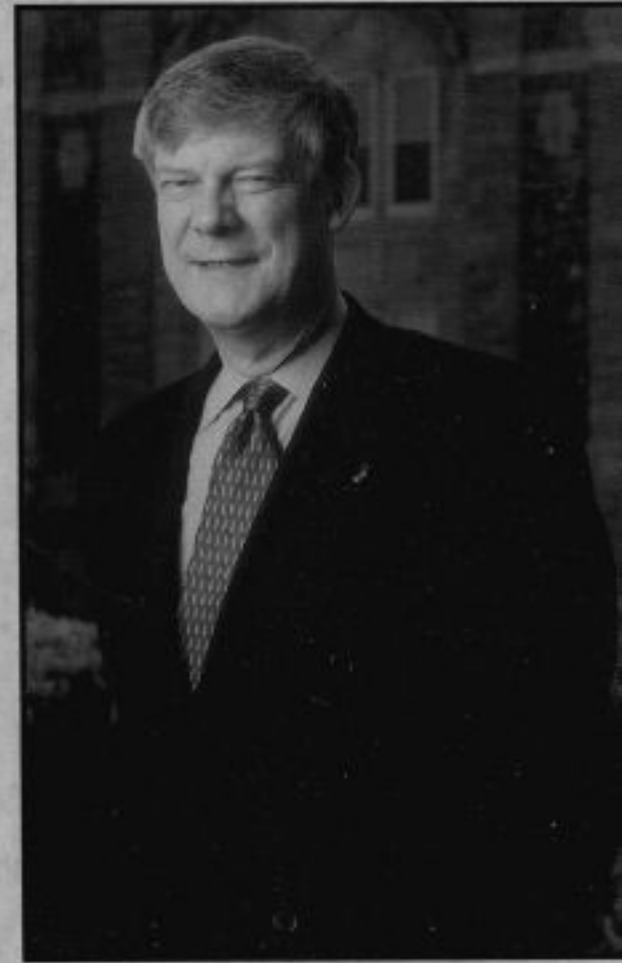

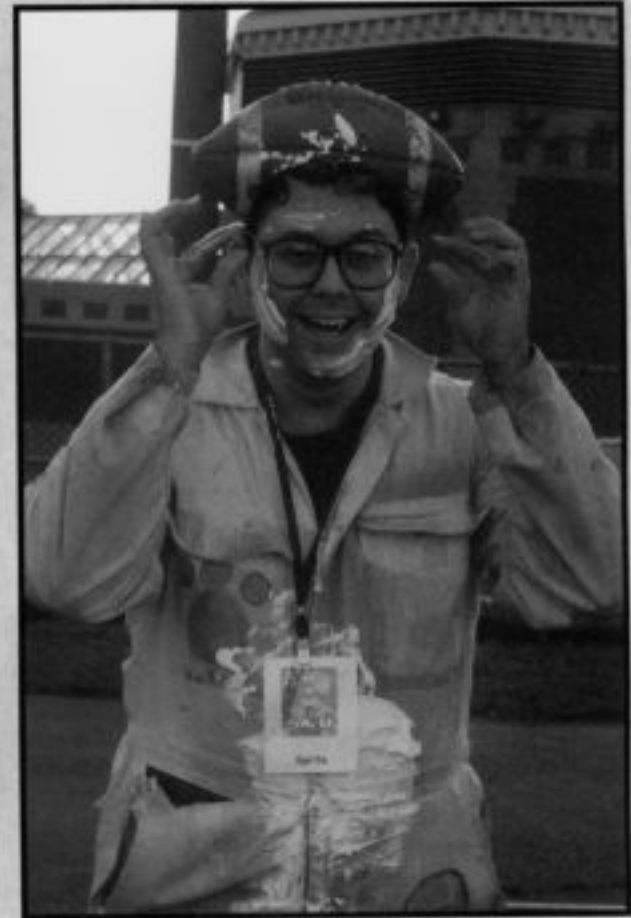
Becoming a frosh leader is a way to bond with other students, make many new friends and at the same time show new students the ropes. Two leaders are shown here having some heavy duty fun.

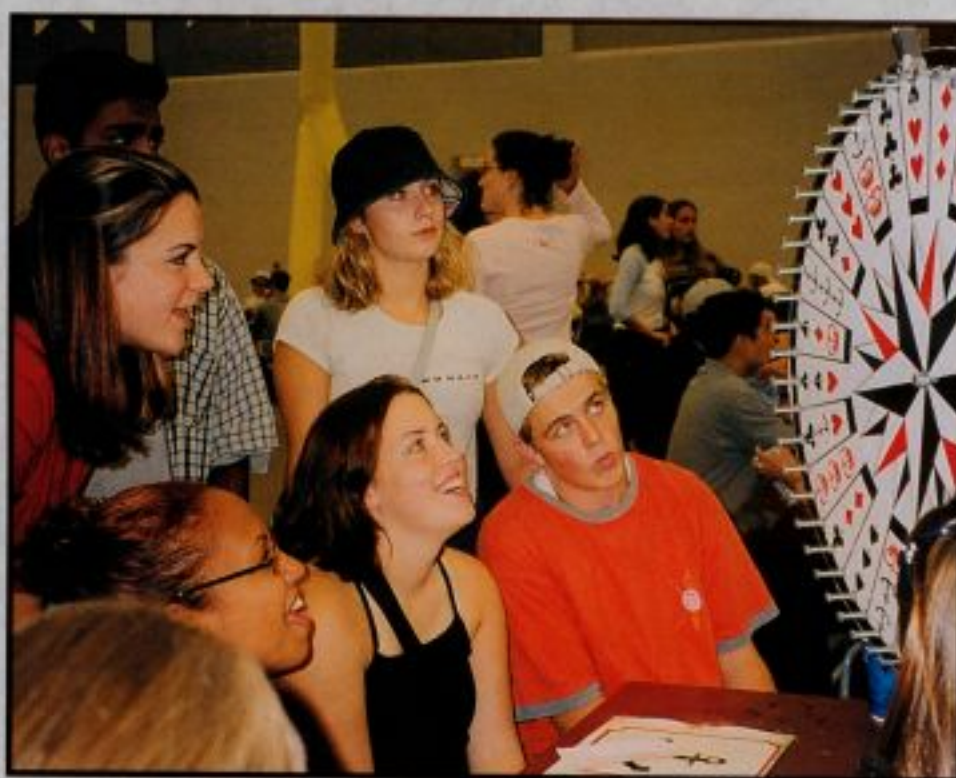

Sporting their matching t-shirts, these frosh leaders smiled big for the camera.

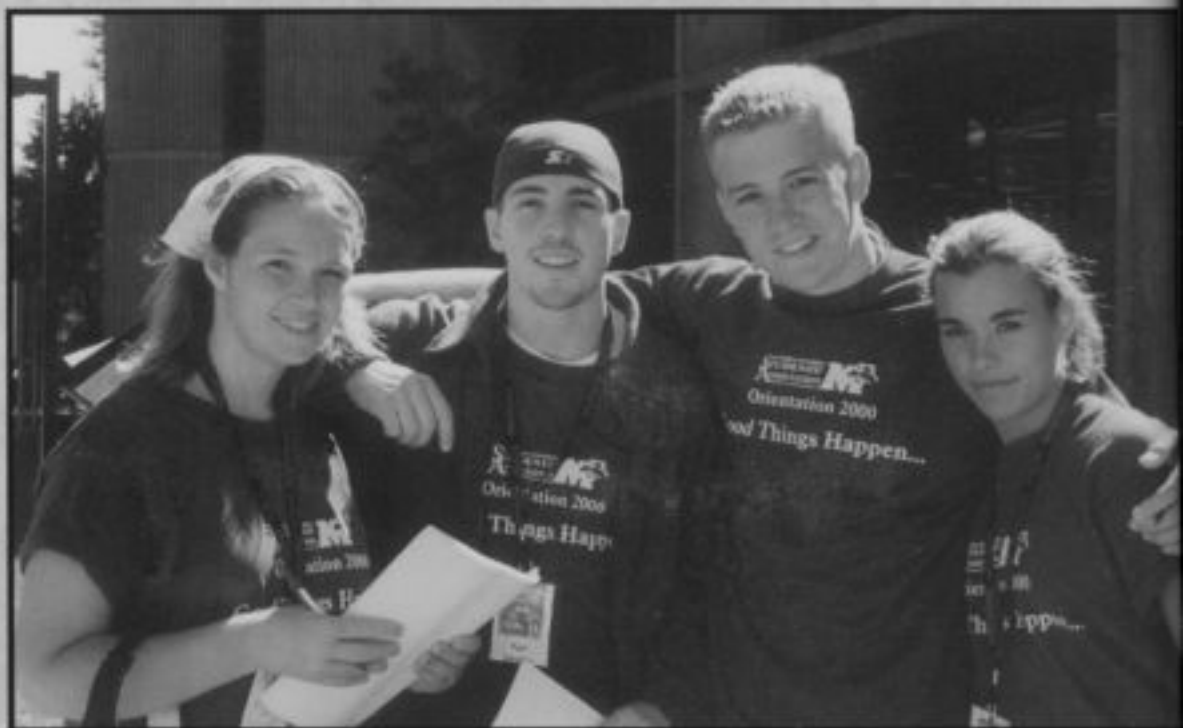
Frosh did not learn any budgeting skills as they gambled away all their fake money on Casino night.

Many people put hours into their homemade costumes. In terms of creativity, this shower costume scores a touchdown.

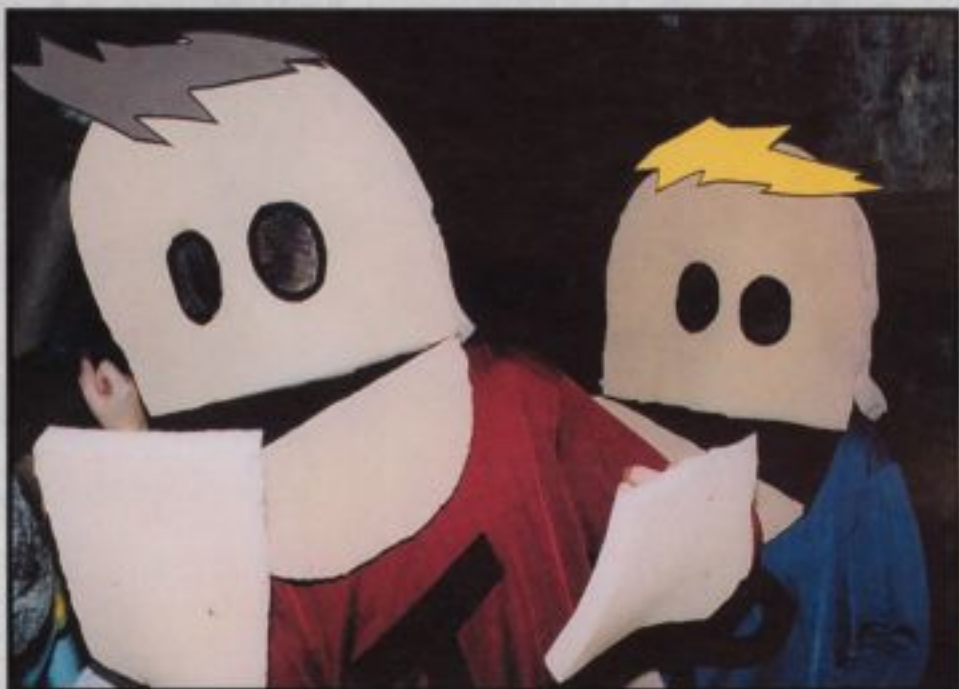
If it's a battle of the scariest, this frightening blond trio wins hands down over this cute monkey from the Bloodhound Gang.

Out to have a good time and heckle the other team, these three are painted up and raring to go.

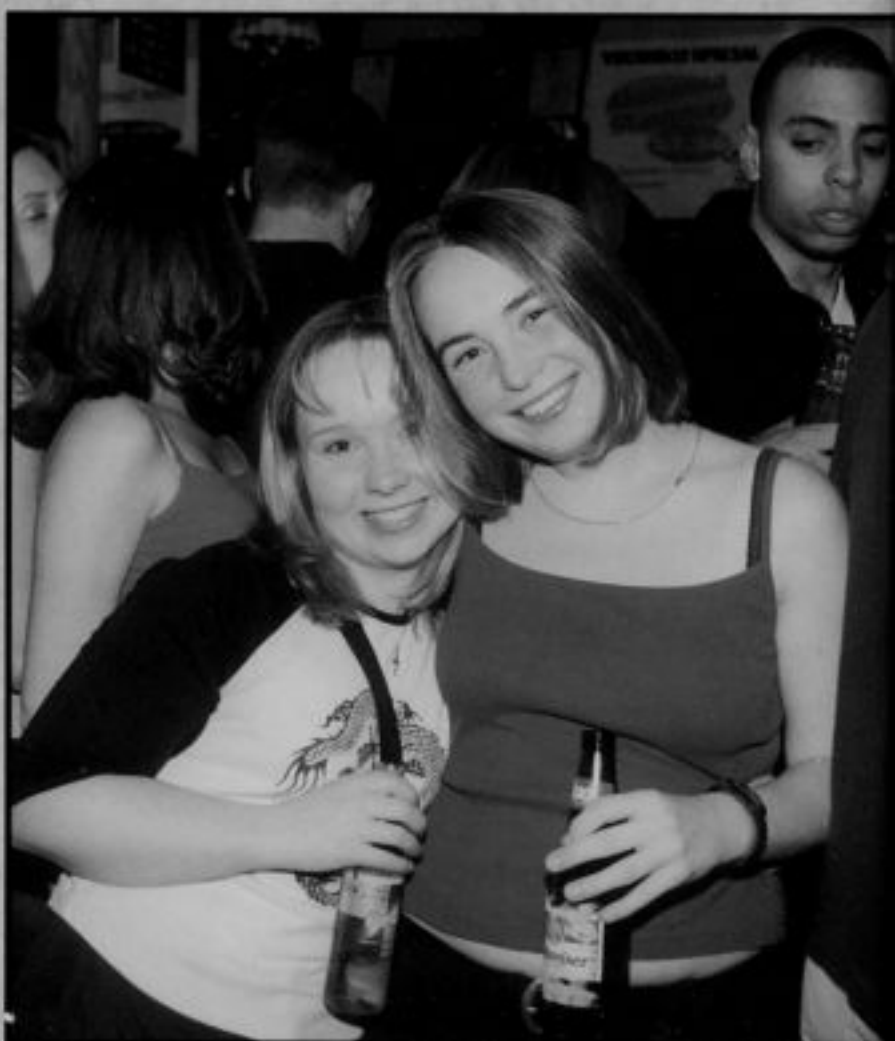
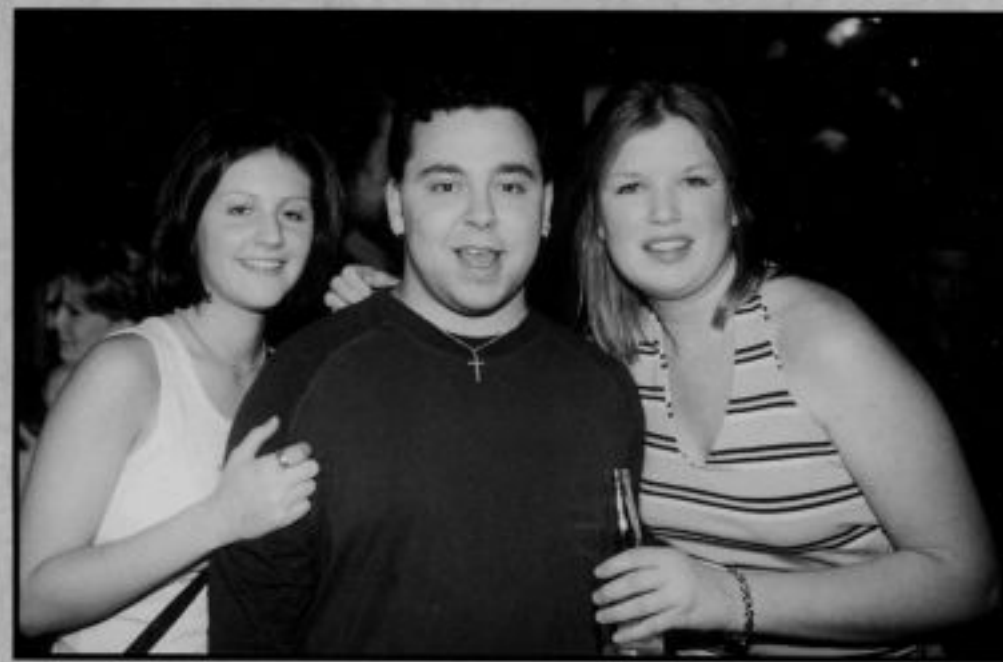

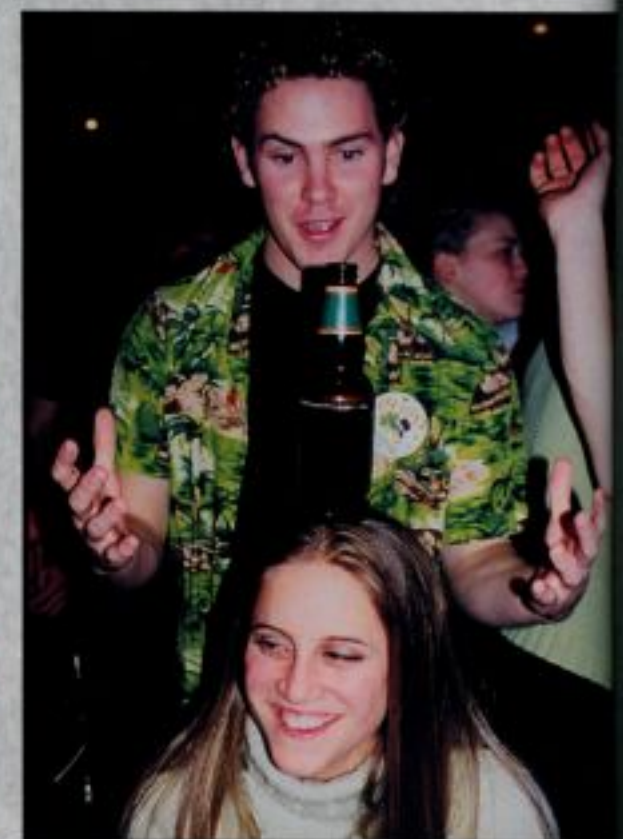

It was quite an honour but I feel that after the tremendous year we did have, the staff deserved the recognition. Because we are now a separate entity from SMUSA, we will no longer be eligible to receive this award again, so I guess we were lucky to get it when we did.

It will be sad to see the majority of the

editorial staff leave here this year. Many have been with the newspaper for years and will be either graduating or just moving on this summer. The 2001-2002 staff will be the largest group of new editors to take over in many years, but with the dynamic training they have received, they will be able to take over with no problems.

The Journal is the oldest society on campus, and the only one to continuously have successful years. We print ten thousand issues every week and this gives us the ability to give the students at Saint Mary's the voice they need to get their ideas heard.

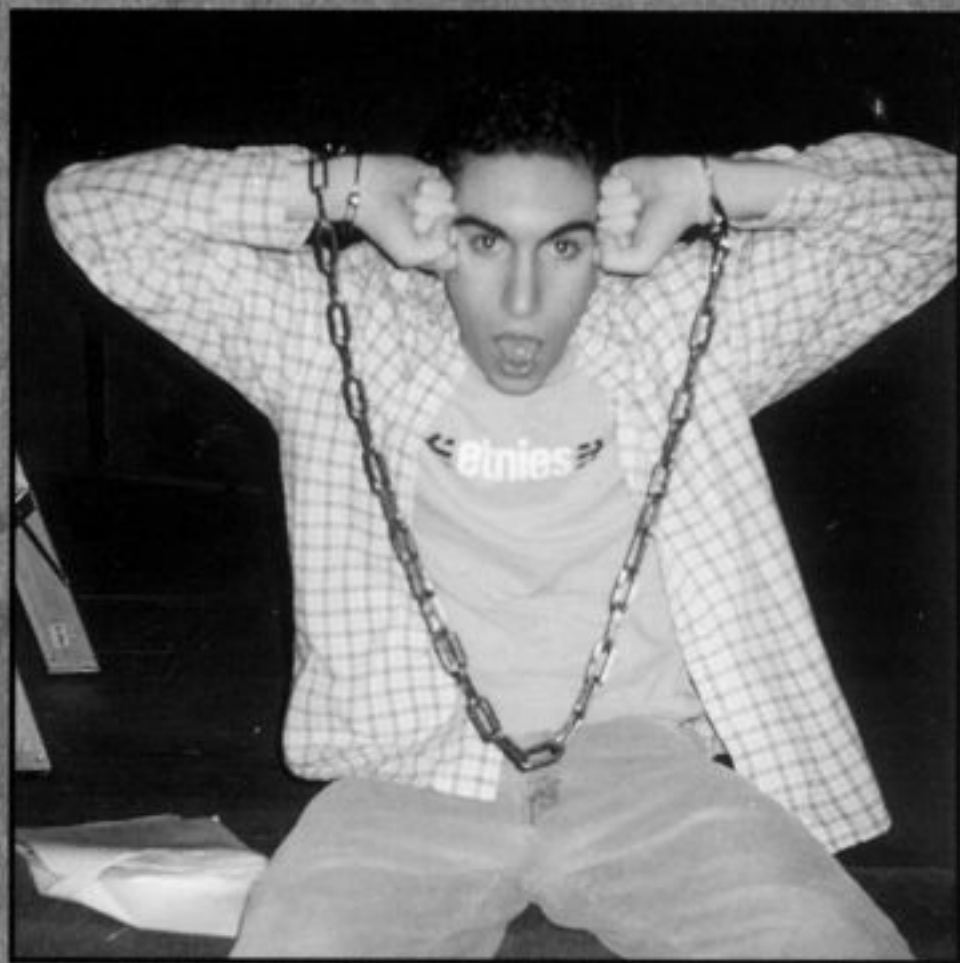
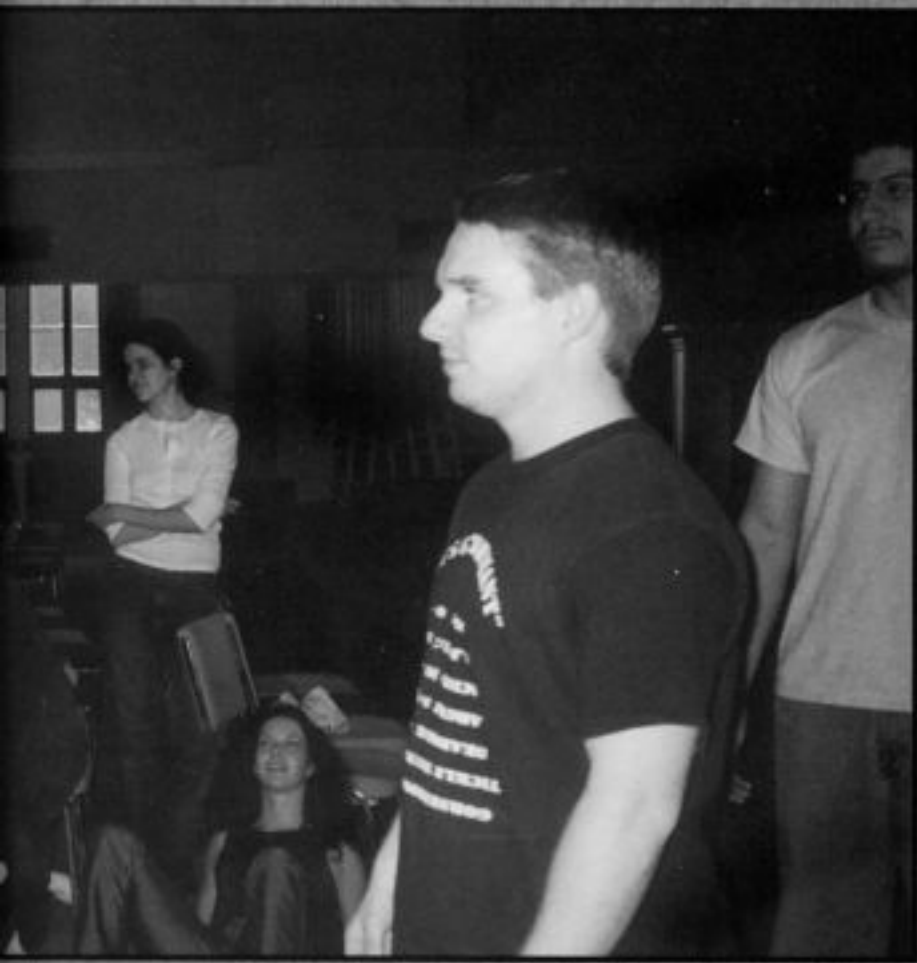
Drama Society

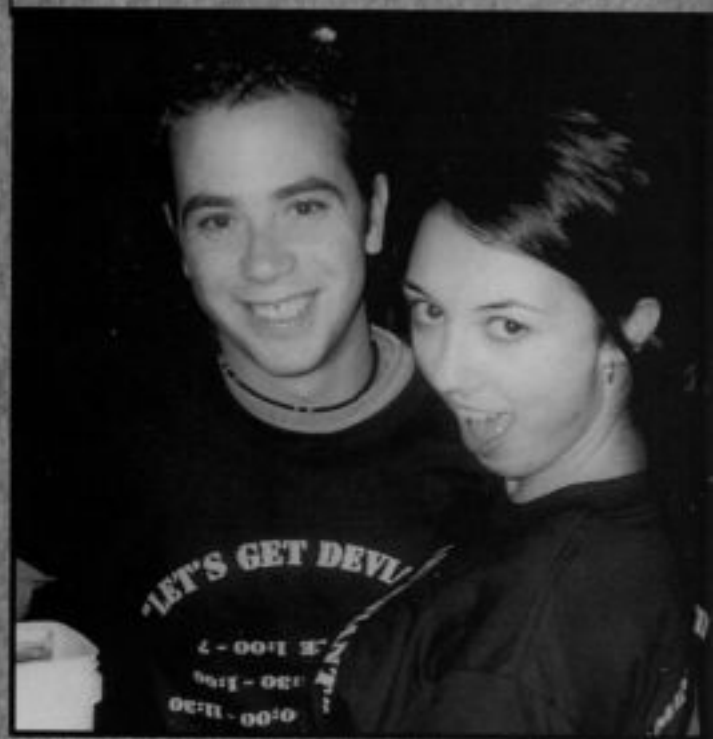


Criminology Society

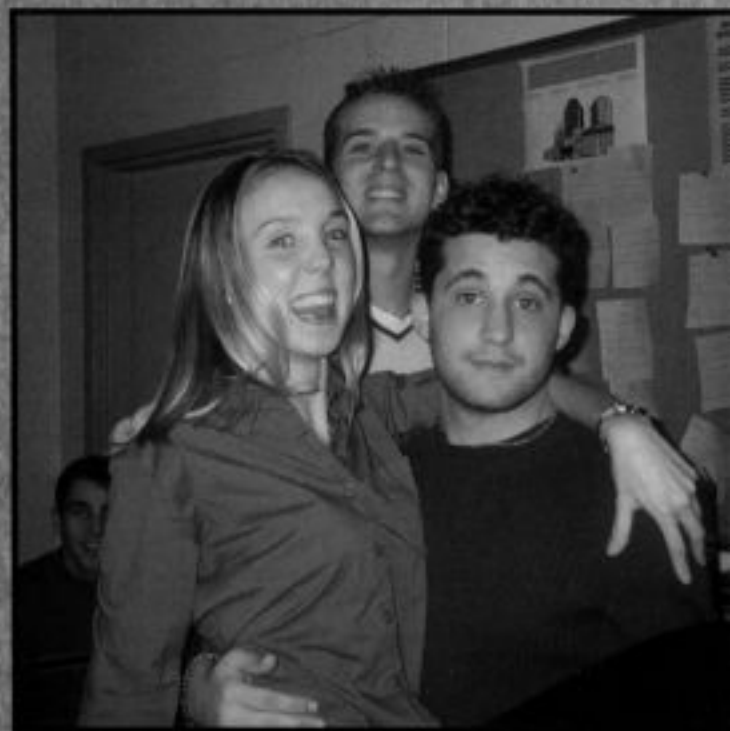

Caribbean Society

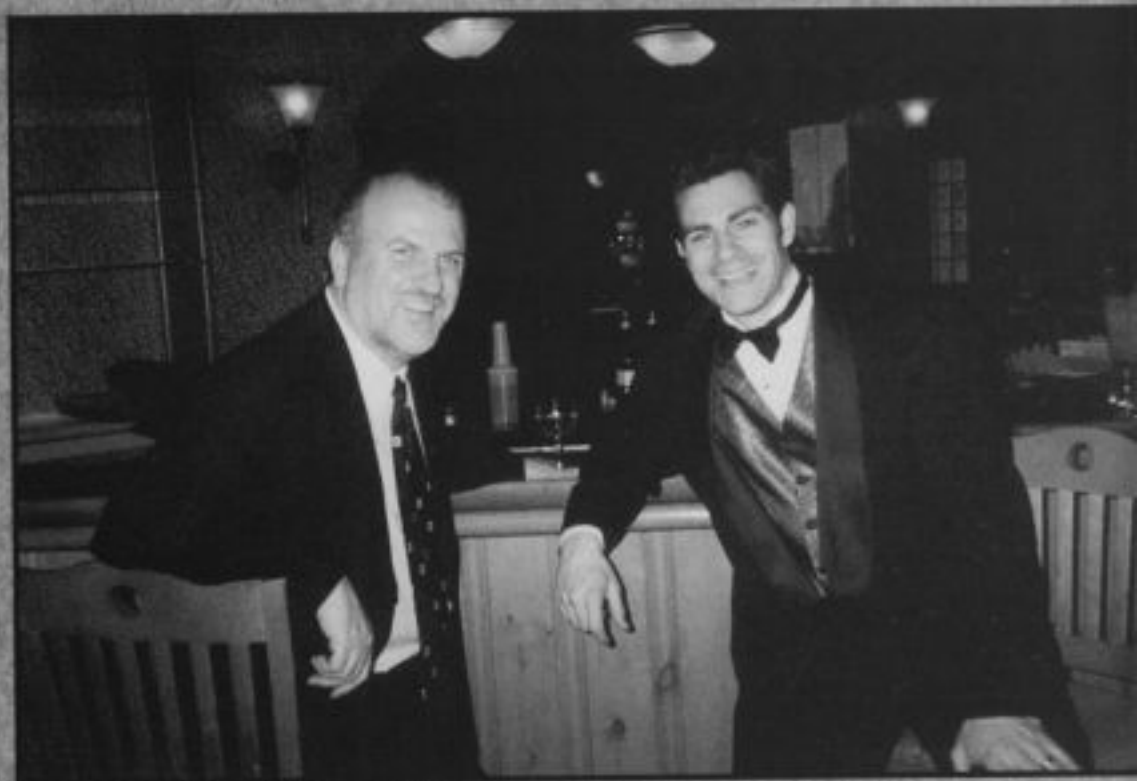

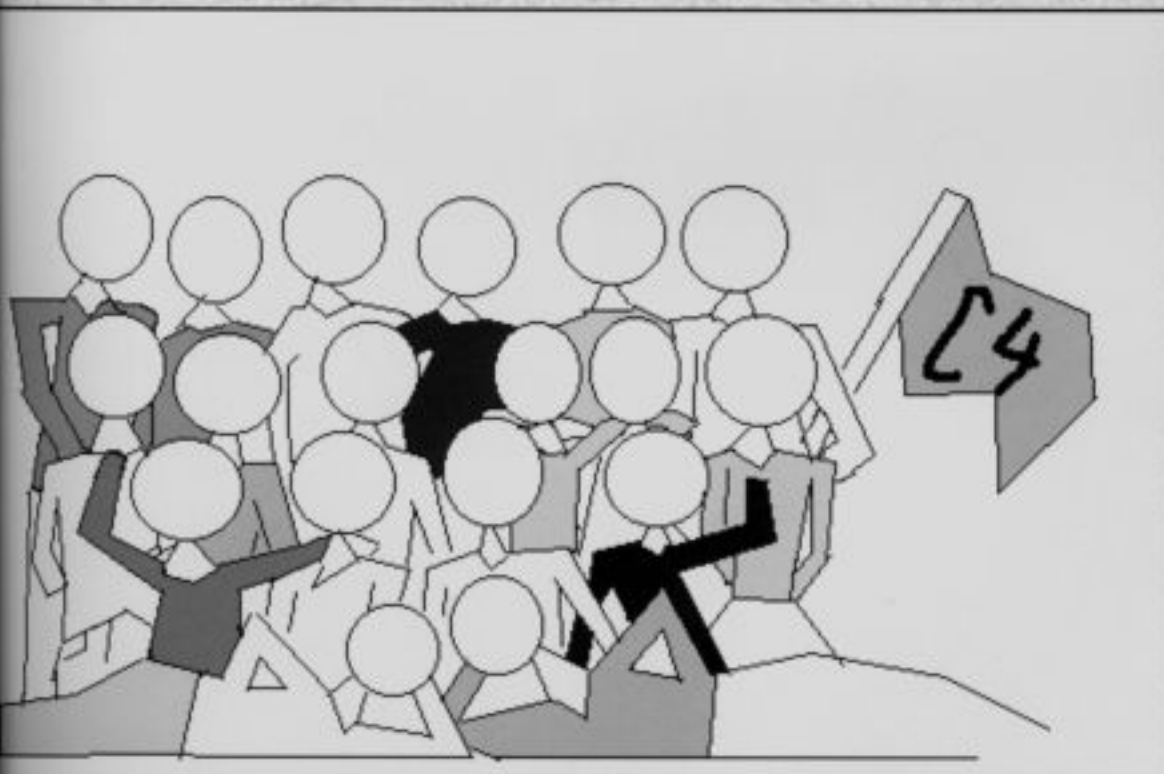

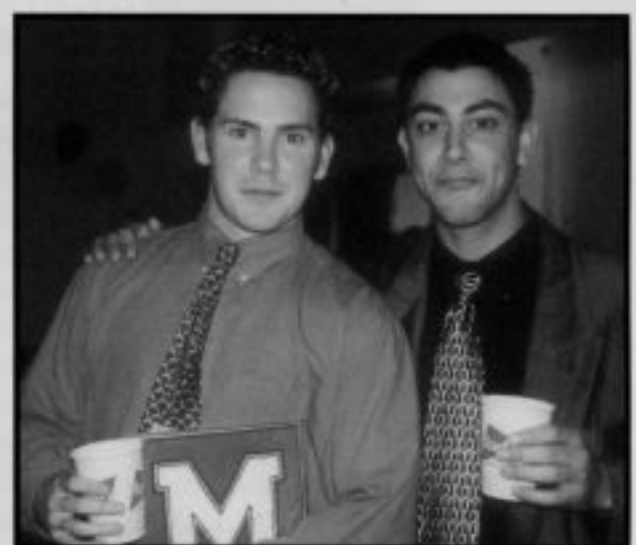

The Huskies Began thier Season Ranked as #1

Awesome Offence Outscored Opponents by nearly 33 Points per Game

The football Huskies began the 2000 season ranked as the number one football program in the CIAU. With this status came a lot of expectations and consequently many Huskies chose this season to enjoy career years. The result came in the form of an undefeated regular season and a second consecutive AUS championship.

Obvious to most who attended was the continued development of the offensive unit. Fourth year quarterback Ryan Jones led a group which scored an incredible 324 points during the regular season. This mark was second to only the 325 points put up by McMaster University. Throughout the year, Jones and his receivers where able to pitch and catch with consistency. Add in the dominant running of record setter Luis Perez (1070 yards in a single season) and his counterpart Dean Jones and you see why the Huskies offense outscored opponents by nearly 33 points per game. Defensively the Huskies where equally as dominate allowing slightly more the 8 points per game. The total points allowed by the Huskies this year (66) established a new AUS mark for fewest points allowed in an eight game season.

Perhaps, the biggest surprise on a talented group came in the play of freshman Bruce Nelson, a Truro native. Nelson's consistent play drew raves from opponents eventually leading him to be named AUS Rookie of the Year.

The 2000 edition of the Huskies certainly had its share of individual claim. In all, a total of 16 players were selected All-Conference, 7 where named first or second team all Canadian, and four where nominated for the CIAU Major Awards.

As always, the end of the season brought together a group of athletes who have seen their football careers at Saint Mary's come to a close. This year the Huskies must pay tribute to Charlie Toth, Mark Irwin, Michael Crooks, Robert Argente, Mike McCauley, John Fleming, and Bill Morrison. They have all represented their school to the fullest and have been great ambassadors for Saint Mary's.

Finally, the Huskies also had to say goodbye to one of their coaches. Special Teams Coordinator Paul Frlan will be missed by everyone who knows him. His dedication to the program over the past three years was a huge factor in the team's rise to nation prominence.

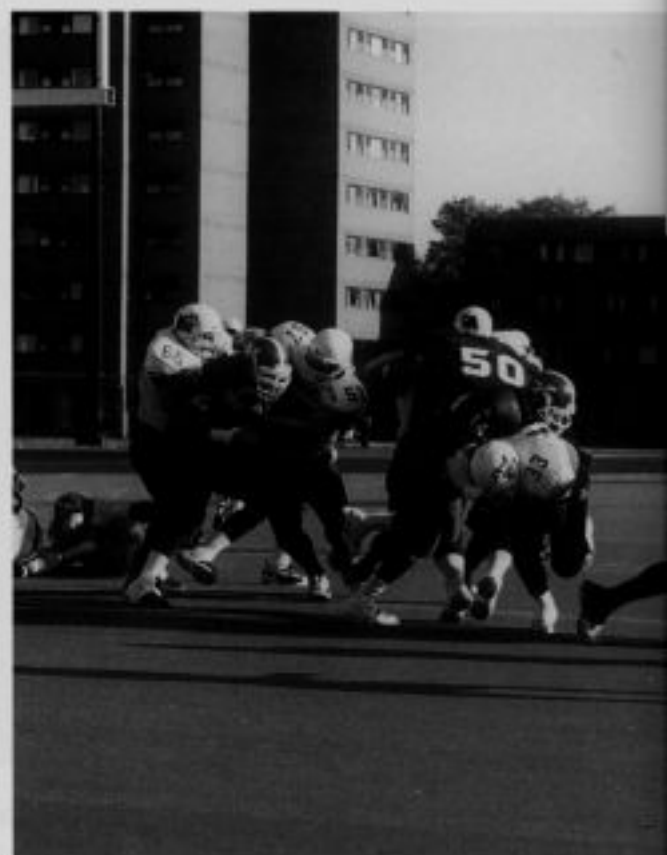

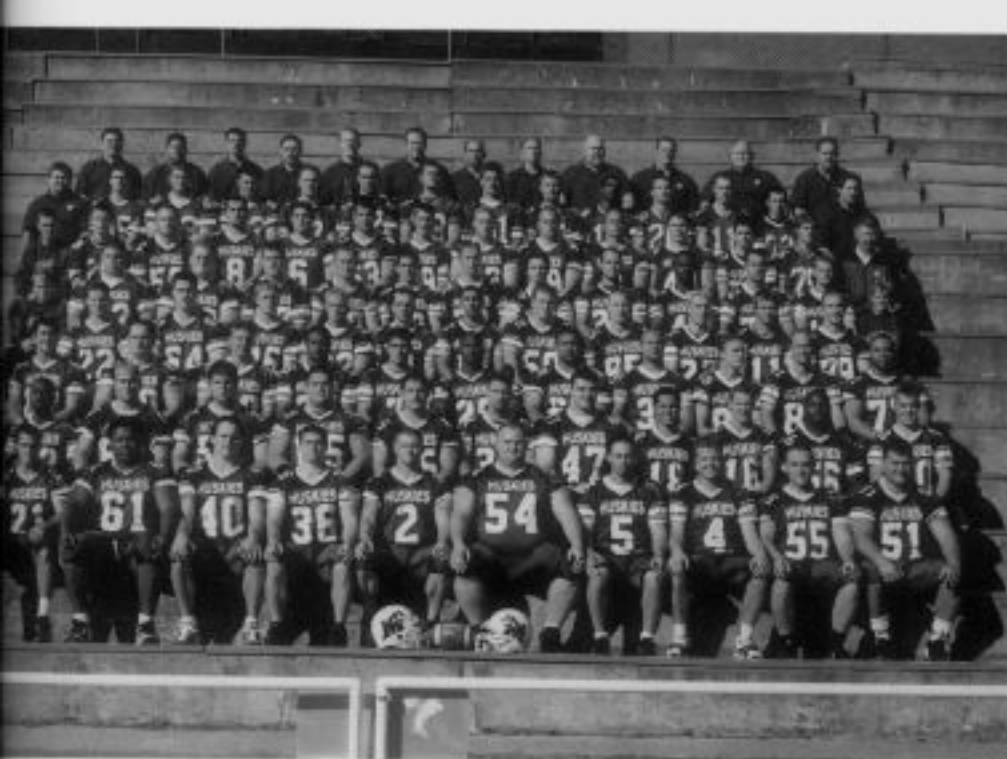

A Silver Medal for Mens Soccer

Three SMU players named to CIAU All-Canadian team.

The Huskies will be hosting the 2001 CIAU National Championship at Huskies Stadium in November.

The Saint Mary's Huskies won the Men's Atlantic University Soccer Conference Sunday, November 5th at the University of Prince Edward Island. The 1st place Huskies (11 - 1 - 1, 44 goals for and 9 against), defeated the University College of Cape Breton 1-0 in the semi-finals to advance to Sunday's final vs the hometown UPEI Panthers. The Huskies defeated the Panthers 4 - 1 in front of an estimated 700 hostile fans. This win is the first Men's Soccer title for SMU since 1990 for the Huskies and their 7th in the team's history. Huskies Midfielder Matt Boulton had a hattrick for SMU, with Defender Danny Worthington adding the other goal in the 87th minute of the match. Saint Mary's Mesut Mert, Tim Mullen and Jay Robinson received 1st team

conference All-Stars, while Andre Atkins, Matt Boulton, and Danny Worthington received 2nd team conference honors. Atkins, a native of Nowick, England, finished the regular season with 10 goals (2nd place in the league). The Huskies also added Boulton - 9, and Mert - 7 in the top regular season goal scoring.

At the CIAU National Championship in Hamilton, the Huskies named three players to the CIAU All-Canadian Team. Jay Robinson 1st team, Tim Mullen and Mesut Mert 2nd team. The Huskies captured a silver medal in the championship game, losing 6-5 to Laurier on penalty kicks.

The Huskies will be hosting the 2001 CIAU National Championship at Huskies Stadium in November.

Huskies Improved Greatly Throughout the Season

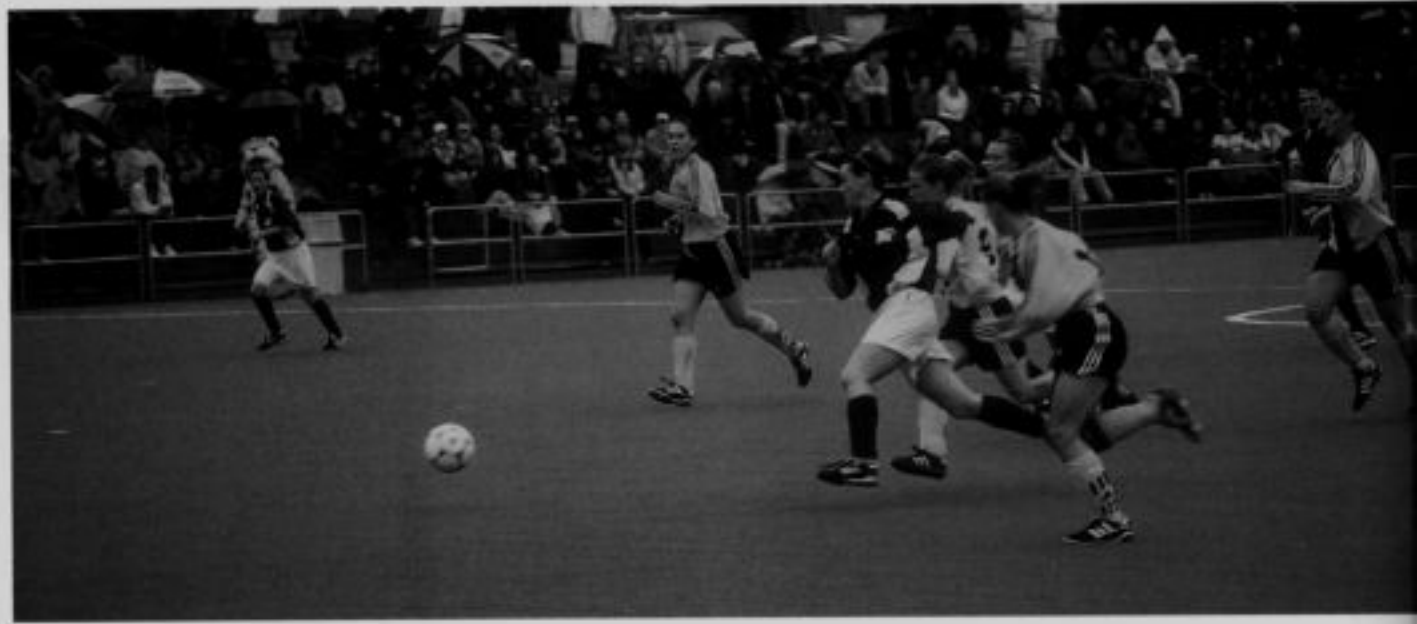

The Volleyball Huskies returned 4 players from last year's roster, but added 2 key experienced players and a supporting group of rookies who together provided Husky's fans with the best team performance in the last 4 years. The team was led by captains Gillian Dobbin, Kathleen Bendelier, and Caroline MacFarlane. Gillian is in her fourth year and is consistently one of the best blockers in the league. Kathleen, who is in her fourth year of school, returned to

the program after a year of varsity soccer. She is one of the fittest athletes around, and her speed and intelligence brought an incredibly effective dimension to the right side. She is also the team's best defensive player. Caroline was a valuable addition to the lineup who got on the

court after a year as an assistant coach. She was by far the league's most effective player, leading the league in scoring, placing second in kills and blocks, and fourth in aces, and is a threat to score from anywhere. Through the experience and guidance of these three key players, younger players behind them had the opportunity to develop. Catherine has extensive experience at elite level volleyball and has an amazing game sense. Andrea is a gifted athlete (an accomplished tennis and squash player) with the academic performance to back it up.

Tara Sullivan and Shawn Crice both recovered from serious injuries to make significant contributions to the team's success by the end of the season, and will no doubt have a major impact next year. Tara is a graduate of Kensington Intermediate Senior High in PEI and has excelled in several sports including hockey and rugby. Shawn is a graduate

of Calallen High School in Corp Christi, Texas, a highly competitive area for volleyball, and possesses an infectious tenacity and competitive drive. The Huskies finished the year at 12 and in 4th place in the league standing. They defeated the UNB Varsity Reds in the first round of the playoffs before losing a hard fought match to the first place Memorial Seahawks in the semi final. The team was well represented through individual awards, within the AUVIC, the CIAU, and the Saint Mary's communities. Rebecca Campbell was named to the Second All-Star team in the conference and Caroline MacFarlane was named a playoff All-Star, the league MVP, and a Second Team All-Canadian. Kathleen Bendelier was the female recipient of the President's Award at the year-end Athletic Awards Night. Also, Tara Sullivan and Andrea Shakespeare will be wearing SMU colours under their provincial team jerseys (PEI and NS respectively) at the Canada Games in Kingston this summer.

Wild Card gets Huskies into Final Eight

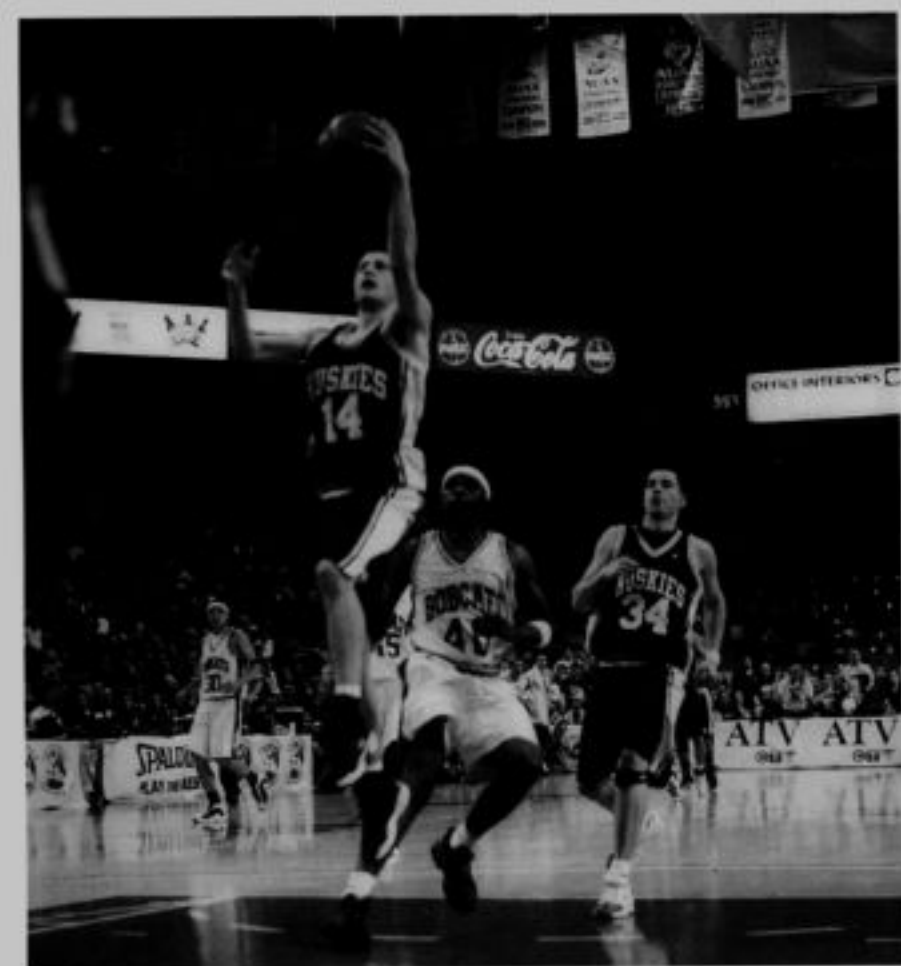

The 2000-2001 edition of the Varsity Women's Basketball capped off a very successful season with a 12 win and 8 loss record in the Atlantic University Sport Basketball League and an overall record of 17 wins and 14 losses. The Huskies bowed out of the AUS playoffs in March with a heart breaking three-point loss to rivals UNB on the buzzer. The Huskies had a great exhibition season with several non-conference games - including wins over Bishops, McGill, Laurentian, and Queen's. As well, the Huskies hosted their very popular Christmas tournament which included the West Coast team of UBC, the eventual tournament winners.

The 2000-2001 season saw the return of all starters, including the 2000 CIAU Rookie of the Year Julie Galipeau, a second year Science student from Halifax. Julie topped off another successful year with the Huskies capturing honors as the AUS League MVP. Julie led the conference in scoring and rebounding. Julie then went on to be named to the 2nd team All Canadian team.

Captain and fifth year veteran Kristi Jo Robinson completed her career at Saint Mary's with a Bachelor of Commerce degree and was named to the AUS All Star team. Graduating players Kari Scott, Joslin Cheverie, and Katie Gammon all finished their Bachelor of Science degrees and each have plans to continue their academic goals. Kari plans on pursuing a Master in Physiotherapy; Katie Gammon is headed to a Pharmacy degree and Joslin Cheverie plans on attending Medical school. Transfer student, Shira Hassanali from British Columbia, will return to the west coast to become a teacher.

CIAU Academic All Canadian and second year guard Carolyn De Amicis, made a very impressive recovery from

her ACL surgery in the previous June and was a key part of the Huskies' success when the team began league play. Carolyn's determination and tremendous drive allowed her to return to the season without missing a league game.

A very successful recruiting year strengthened the Huskies with the return of shooter Jody Euloth to Atlantic University Sport. Jodi was the former 1993 AUAA Rookie of the Year at Dalhousie and brought tremendous experience and a strong competitive drive to the team this past season. Jody will fill a big scoring role with the squad next season as she returns for her final year. Freshmen guards Natalie Ryan from Moncton and Lindsay Welsford from Bridgewater were also great additions to the roster and will continue to be key players for the Huskies to build the team around. The other players rounding out the Huskies roster in 2000-2001 included 5'10" guard Kathi Hack from Austria and 6'1" post Melanie Thomas of Campbellford, Ontario both in their second season in the league. Red shirt Wendy Mills also made significant improvements in her game as a practice player. Also new to the team in the coaching positions were assistants Nadia Murphy, a former player at Concordia and Christina Chadwick, and a former member of the Huskies from 1989-'91. The season was a very positive one for the team and with only seven players returning, the core of graduates will be greatly missed. The Huskies continued their successful Camp of Champions Basketball camps with all time high of over 200 girls in our regular and elite camps. 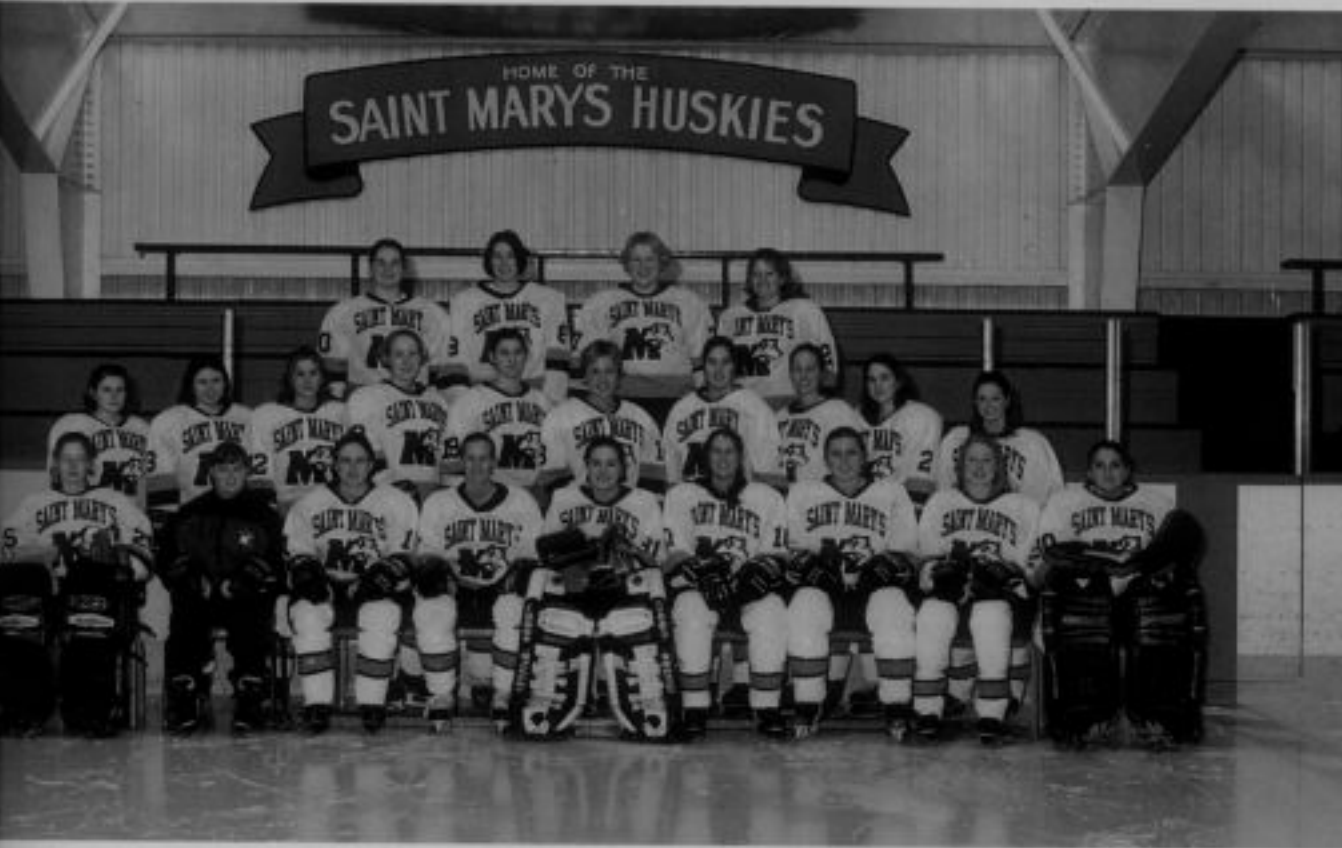

This crew was disappointed to find the bar closed right after they arrived on the first night but satisfied themselves with a little exploration.

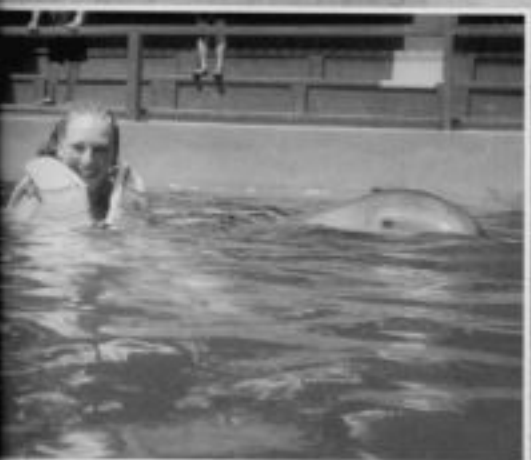
The tour guide, Mama Michelle, introduced the group to Sammy the Snake during the jeep safari.

In Memory of Friends Lost



Thomas Whitty

Despite the countless positive events that took place at Saint Mary's during the 2001 school year, the Saint Mary's community was twice reminded of the fragility and uncertainty of life with the loss of two exceptional young men. Thomas Whitty and Rhian Mood were both students at Saint Mary's, and their deaths left empty spaces for everyone who knew them. I was personally fortunate enough to call both of these remarkable individuals my friends before they were taken from us well before their primes.

On November 1st 2000 Thomas Whitty lost his life in a single car accident near Cape Smokey Ski Hill in Ingonish. Thomas was a second year Saint Mary's student whose shy disposition allowed him to usually go unnoticed by many people who didn't know him. These people will now never have the chance to find out exactly what he missed. Beneath Thomas's shyness was one of the kindest, most genuine people I have ever met. He quietly went about his life doing whatever he could to make the people he cared about as happy as possible. Thomas was an avid golfer and skier.

He loved to watch hockey, football and a wide variety of other sports. He had an ability to make others smile whenever he was around. The happiness he brought to everyone will be greatly missed by all of his family and friends.

Students at Saint Mary's were devastated on March 8th, 2001 when they learned of the death of Rhian Mood. Rhian started attending Saint Mary's in 1997 and managed to touch many of our lives with his carefree spirit. Rhian was outgoing and put his heart and soul into everything he did. Whether it was his schoolwork, or one of the many sports he loved to play, Rhian attacked every situation with the same zealous enthusiasm that made him the unique person he was. Rhian was a member of the Student's Representative Council in 1999 and was also very involved in intramurals. He was never too busy to help out a friend if they needed it as he was always willing to put his own interests aside to lend a hand. Rhian's energetic take on life was contagious. He challenged everyone he knew to enjoy life as much as he did. Now that he's gone we can only hope to go through life with as much passion as Rhian would have wanted us to.

It wasn't until I wrote this that I realized how different Thomas and Rhian were. Despite their external differences, they were both incredible people and there are no words that can begin to describe the impact that their deaths have had on their friends and families. Personally, I try to be grateful for the time I did get to spend with Thomas and Rhian in my life. Their memories will be with me forever. For everyone else that knew Thomas and Rhian, I will pass on something that was said to me: "True friendship, and love, are not contained by time or space." Thomas and Rhian will always be with us in our hearts.
