Residence Student Evicted

Student Faces Criminal Charges

Last week Sanjay Bhatia was banned from Saint Mary's residence and cafeteria after a number of criminal charges were laid by Halifax Police following complaints by other residents of the student's floor. The man was also ordered to have no contact with his alleged victims, or consume alcohol or non-prescription drugs.

According to Joe Varner, Assistant Director of Evenings and Weekends, Bahtia has "committed a number of serious criminal offences." The charges laid include assault, uttering death threats, possession of knives for purpose of danger to the public peace, assault with a knife and sexual assault. Bhatia is also alleged to have held two people at knife point, and to have been involved in satanic activities. Both the court and residence have placed restrictions on Bahtia. Four students reported these incidents to Varner.

Varner said that the hostage situation and the assault "was reported to us that evening at 5:00 from the R A."

Varner claims the University responded rapidly and prudently. "Not only myself but the university chaplain, the director of residence who was on vacation at the time, the acting director of residence, one residence coordinator were all up on that floor that evening and

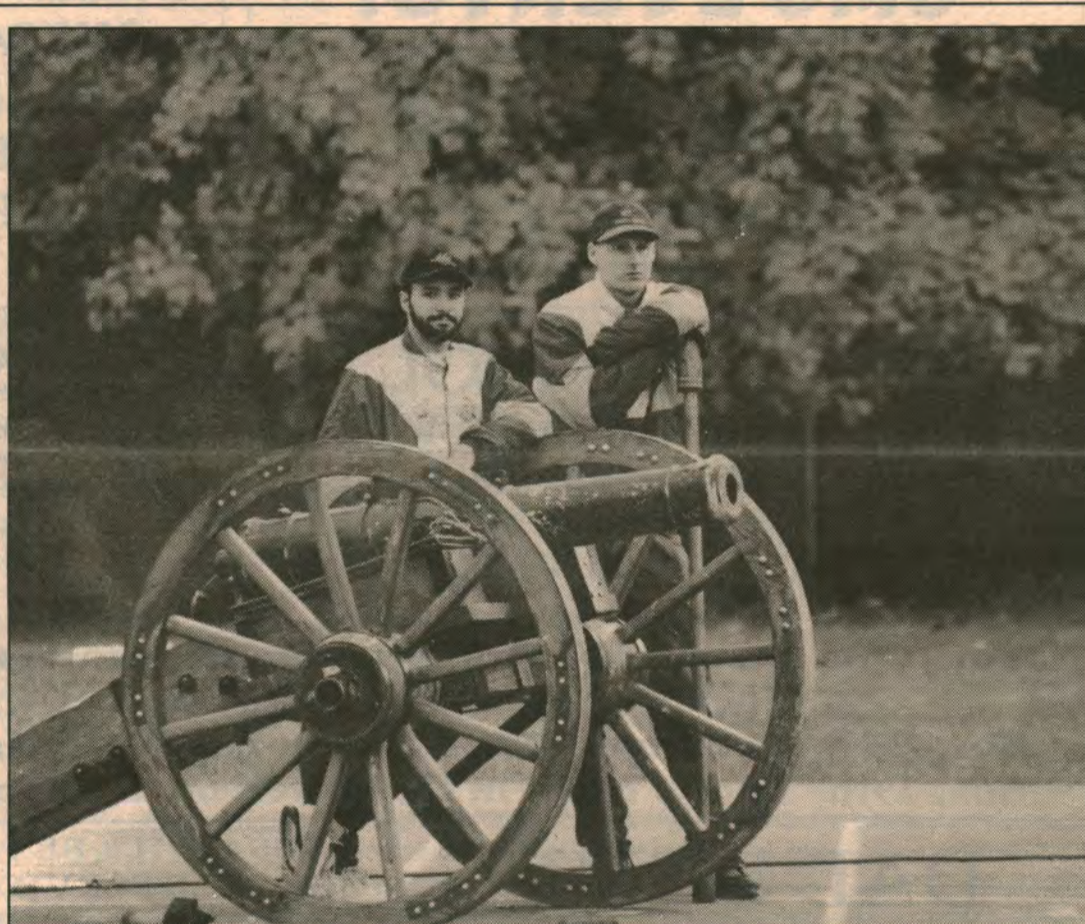
we were there throughout the situation." It was felt that it was best for both parties that student be removed from residence.

"Generally university campuses are like any other community and every so often in every community you have situations where people take

extreme actions—or are alleged to have taken extreme actions—and society tends to hold them responsible for that." Varner also added that, "the University campus are not so different from the outside community, and you are in the city, so I think a certain amount of this sort of thing can be expected

when it happens. No one is very happy with it and naturally it's extremely upsetting and traumatic for the people on the floor."

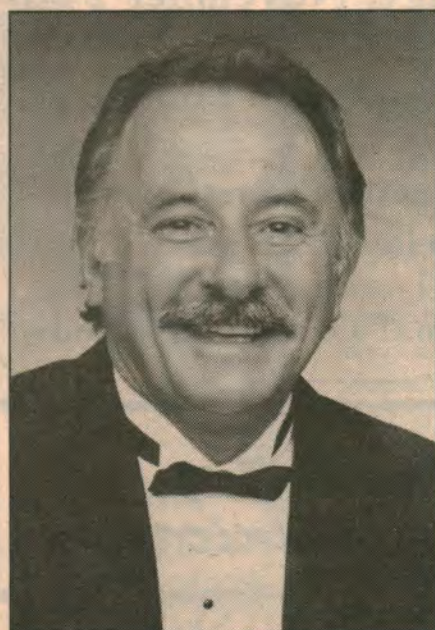
Bhatia was arraigned in Halifax Provincial Court Tuesday and will return to court on December 6th.

Professor's Death Shocks Community



Professor William Greer

Bill Greer a professor of Commerce at Saint Mary's died in hospital Monday night of encephalitis, a viral infection which causes swelling of the brain.

Greer began his teaching career in 1988, and taught at Saint Mary's since 1990. He received a Certificate of Distinction from the Commerce Society in 1993, and was named professor of the year by the Commerce Society in 1992. Greer was involved in many aspects of the Saint Mary's community. He sat on

the Quality of Teaching and the University Review Committees, a member of the executive MBA council and sat on the advisory board of A.I.E.S.E.C.

Before teaching, he had a professional singing career, as well as an international business career. He studied music in Toronto and Milan, and last year gave a concert in the Saint Mary's Art Gallery.

Greer moved on to a career in international business from international roots. He spoke French, Spanish and Italian and received his MBA from Boston University.

Professor Greer was also co-creator of a health game called *Lifelong Challenge*.

Greer was born March 7, 1938, in Toronto. He is survived by three sons, Michael of Halifax, Kenneth and David, both of Brussels, Belgium. One daughter, Elizabeth of Warton, Ontario, and a grandson.

The funeral will be held Friday, November 19th at 10:30am, at Canadian Martyrs' Church, burial following. A student and staff memorial service for Professor Greer will be held at 1:30 in the Theatre Auditorium. Professors Greer's students are encouraged to attend the funeral and the service.

Students Claim Food Poisoning from Residence Cafeteria

Is there food poisoning in the Residence Cafeteria? One student, who wishes to remain anonymous thinks so. The student said she ate around 4:30 on Monday, Nov. 8, and started feeling sick around 7:30. She knew something was wrong, stating that her symptoms were "nothing like the stomach flu." There was a pain in her stomach and she remembers vomiting around twelve times. That's when she realized she should

go to the hospital and find out what was wrong. "They gave me a shot of Gravalol in my leg, then I was better," she recalls.

She thinks that the salad dressing was what caused her illness.

When the student went to report the food poisoning she was told by the secretary to come back in a couple of hours. However, the student didn't feel that the secretary was very helpful. Later she was told that four other students had the same illness that night.

Dalton Mather, head of Marriott Food Services for Saint Mary's said that all students who did feel sick after eating on Monday, Nov. 8 should "contact the health unit" so they can distinguish whether it was actual food poisoning or just a viral infection. They should also contact him to fill out a standard questionnaire, so that they can "isolate the food and have it tested." This will enable Marriott to determine what the cause of the students illness was.

Mathers said that two years ago there was a suspected food poisoning in the residence cafeteria. "A number of people were told they had food poisoning and it ended up being a viral infection," he said. "That's

why the questioning is so important."

If this ever happens again, Mathers urges all students who feel the effects of food poisoning to contact him as soon as possible.

UNB Prof Offends Internationally

An opinion piece entitled "Rape" Past and Present that appeared Nov. 5 in the University of New Brunswick's student newspaper, *The Brunswickan*, has provoked strong reactions because of its assertion that rape is no longer as traumatic an experience as it once was.

The article was written by Matin Yaqzan, an assistant professor of mathematics and statistics at U.N.B. In the article rape is described as an "unwanted sexual experience" and not the violent act it is. Date rape is defined by Yaqzan as occurring when a woman "...does not like the sexual intercourse that (she is subjected to)." Yaqzan claims that with "...the decline of the traditional religious values of the sanctity of sex and virginity" in the last ten to thirty years the trauma of rape has decreased. The stigma of being raped, as opposed to the act itself, is seen as the cause of rape being devastating. Emphasis is placed by Yaqzan on the suffering and pain rape used to have on the victim's "...parents, relatives and even acquaintances and strangers."

According to Yaqzan, males are naturally sexually aggressive and without marriage as a "...life long commitment to the female to satisfy his sexual needs... (can) ...not be expected to be a master of his sexual impulses... For boys by the time they reach the age of 17 to 18 years, regular sexual intercourse must become a necessity. For those entering a university, the co-ed residences may be helpful, but they do not provide an opportunity for sexual gratification for all the male students, and therefore the reason and need of the so called date rape." Yaqzan con-

tinues by writing that although men's nature can't be changed, boys should be "...taught that the sexual needs of girls are very different from their own." Girls, writes Yaqzan, must be taught that when "...a boy invites a girl to his bedroom, ...she should consider it as an invitation for sexual intercourse," and "that while hugging and kissing might be pleasant and adequate experiences for them, they are simply a prelude to sexual intercourse for boys."

The article goes on to say that rape is less horrific for promiscuous women than for virgins, and that "...girls who use the word rape to describe their dislike of a particular encounter in their endless sexual experiences, do a disservice to those who abide by the old traditions." It is more reasonable for a promiscuous woman "to demand some monetary compensation for her inconvenience or discomfort, rather than express moral outrage."

Tom Traves, vice-president academic at U.N.B., denounced the article and said it may be a violation of a section of the university's sexual harassment policy that prohibits behavior or conduct that creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive working or academic environment. Yaqzan was suspended with pay indefinitely while the university investigates the situation. His suspension has raised concerns about the professor's civil rights. Karen Burgess, editor in chief of *The Brunswickan*, said that while the staff of the paper agonized about the decision to print the piece, she felt that students had a right to know the professor's views. "It would make a difference to me if I was a student in that faculty as to how I choose my courses," said Burgess.

Dal's Disabled Face Obstacles

Dalhousie's Disabled Students' Advisor's office is inaccessible to wheelchairs. This is the complaint made by Lynn Atwell, Advisor to Students with Disabilities at Dalhousie.

According to the Press Release dated Nov. 8, 1993 from the D.K.A.S.D (Dal/King's Association of Students with Disabilities), the location of the office was supposedly "temporary" when granted to the Association four years ago. However, this is not the case.

Atwell, who was given the function of Advisor to disabled students in 1990, has been looking for a new place to relocate ever since. "Lots of things have happened," she said, and there

were "an awful lot of negotiations."

Atwell stated that although the Disabled Students' Advisor's office is inaccessible, she isn't. When she has to meet someone in a wheelchair, she meets them in the cafeteria. "There hasn't been a student who needed to see me and hasn't seen me," she said. "I go and meet them wherever they want."

However, Atwell is not content to stay where she is. "I'm not saying that it's acceptable," she stated. She wants to see an improvement, and is expecting to relocate sometime this year. "Yes," she said, "We do need a place that's accessible. There's no doubt about that."

The Press Release states "The

concept of having an office intended to serve the needs of students with disabilities in an inaccessible building, is absurd. This situation demonstrates Dalhousie's disrespect and insensitivity towards the dignity of students with disabilities."

Eric Mckee, VP Student Services at Dalhousie, strongly disagrees with the second part of the quote. "We are committed to expanding the service by finding a location (for the disabled students' advisor's office)"

Mckee isn't prepared at this point to say exactly where the new location will be. Only that it will be a "central location," on campus, and that it should be in place sometime before April.

Employment in the Future?

Choose Degree Carefully

University grads hitting the job market in the spring of 1992 suffered a rude shock. In some graduating classes, only five to ten percent of them got a job. And as any chartered accountant will tell you: The recession lives, but there is room for optimism. Believe if or not there are still top jobs going begging.

Two recently released international reports point to a relatively rosy employment future for Canada. The Paris-based Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development calls Canada a "recovering" economy along with the United States and Australia, and predicts a 1.8 per-cent rise in employment for 1993.

Consensus Economics Inc. out of London calls for employment growth in Canada be significantly faster than in any other G7 country over the next five years, averaging 2 per cent between 1994 and 1998.

Unfortunately, this is a good news/bad news scenario. The good news is that there are going to be more jobs: the bad news is we are not sure where they are going to be. How do you pick the hot ones?

In a recent Maclean's article four areas were touted as the places to be in the future: health care, information technology, environment consulting and design technology. As these areas grow, plenty of talented people will be needed.

These are probably great places to be, based on today's economy. But if you really want a jump on the future try to imagine fields which do not even exist now.

Giant global alliances are taking place linking high technologies such as AT&T's fibre optics to the software capabilities of a Microsoft and the distribution network of an entertainment giant such as Time-Warner or Sony. This is a brand-new field defined by the delivery of information and entertainment.

The career variations in this field could be vast. Start with the customers. How will they get the information/entertainment package delivered-cable or phone lines? It is not clear at this point which technology will be the big winner. The point is: telecommunications will be hot.

Next is the software needed to deliver the product. All the way from switching to processing, somebody has got to be telling the computers what to do. This could be you.

There is the product itself, the preparation and the thinking behind it, the writers, artists, managers, agents. The market for your fine arts degree may open up in ways unimagined today.

And finally there is the business itself. It needs managers. These will be highly paid jobs, but the qualifications are steep. More and more you are being asked to marry your undergraduate degree in arts, library science, computer technology or engineering to an MBA, law or accounting degree.

In today's world interdisciplinary studies may just be the ticket. Don't paint your-

self into a corner with narrowly defined education which may be obsolete as soon as you graduate.

Although the next decade may not see the job growth and the labour shortages of the boom times, one constant will remain: the best and the brightest will be eagerly sought.

Whatever program you enter, strive to excel. Jobs have not disappeared-there are simply fewer of them. And in most cases they are better. Make the right choices and head for the top of the class.

A Voice From the Ice Age

Last week UNB professor, Matin Yaqzan, managed to insult and shock the university community and beyond with his misogynist views on date rape and women's sexuality. Yaqzan's derogatory comments can't even be considered an old school of thought, but simply the creation of a man lacking respect for the human race.

Among reams of off-the-wall comments Yaqzan claimed that a woman should not be morally outraged by date rape and should, if she deems necessary seek monetary compensation instead of charging her rapist and subjecting her family, peers and the accused to a trial. This method of thought may be fine in Mr. Yaqzan's world, but for the rest of society when a person commits a crime of this magnitude, they should be punished, not fined. Yaqzan also mentioned that women have taken to screaming "date rape" due to the social stigmas now placed on sexuality and that women should not create such a problem over their "discomfort" for they now have the option of obtaining an abortion. While Mr. Yaqzan dreams of a male dominated utopia, most men and women are still fighting over the legalization of abortion and its morality. Yes, that option is there, but that option is not one to be taken lightly and is not considered a part of a woman's every day life.

"True she may not be in the mood, or might find the act less than satisfying, but it would have to be far less traumatic than for a girl who was in the past a virgin. It is obvious that a girl who has had sexual intercourse with a large number of boys, would not suffer as a result of an unwanted sexual encounter to the same degree as a girl from whom it might be the first sexual experience."

I would invite Mr. Yaqzan to experience the degradation, humiliation and confusion experienced by any woman after being raped, by a stranger or peer, and the trauma felt by all parties involved in obtaining an abortion. Yaqzan seems to feel that women are pawns to be used by the men and should realize their role in society, and not attempt to maintain their status as equals in a modern world.

If Mr. Yaqzan were to pick up any current information regarding sexual assault in its varying forms, he would know that when a woman refuses sexual intercourse, she means it. It is not a game, it is a matter of basic human rights.

I think that university administrators nation wide would be shocked to know that the purpose for residences was merely to provide an outlet for the sexual frustrations of young male adults. With this statement, Yaqzan has managed to make a mockery of male sexuality as well.

I find it disturbing, to say the least, that after decades of fighting for women's rights, Mr Yaqzan has succeeded in approximately 700 words to bring me to the painful realization that mysogamy is alive and kicking - living and breathing in our classrooms, in the workplace and on the streets.

After a series of acclaimed hit records and ten Grammy nominations, producer Parsons has dropped the familiar "Project" identity and has assembled a brand new song writing and performing team. The result is a quality CD that sits on the cutting edge of pop-rock music. Four different vocalists appear on the disc which almost gives it the feel of a soundtrack. Try Anything Once includes vocal performances by

Chris Thompson (Manfred Mann), Eric Stewart (10 cc), David Pack (Ambrosia) and Jacqui Copland (Duran Duran). Parsons' strong production on all 15 tracks rewards repeated listens.

Lyricaly, Try Anything Once ranges far and wide, offering reflections on life, fate and the workings of the soul. Two of the more appealing songs are *I'm Talkin' To You* and *Oh Life (There Must Be More)*, both by David Pack.

Despite the quality vocalists, three of the most rewarding tracks on Try Anything Once are instrumental pieces which feature everything from fiddle



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and mandolin to electric synthesizer. Parsons' experimental approach gives these tracks a similar sound to Enya.

Titanic Days

While few people may recognize the name, most know the voice. MacColl is best known for her work with the Pogues on *Fairytale of New York*. She has also done projects with Talking Heads, Robert Plant and Morrissey. *Titanic Days* will likely garner as much critical acclaim as 1991's "Electric Landlady."

Titanic Days is extremely easy on the ears and provides the listener with some insightful lyrics. MacColl's tender voice is her best asset but her song writing ability doesn't fall far behind. MacColl has crafted a collection of songs with intriguing story lines and alluring melodies. The songs range from the lush sounding *Angel* to the humorous and upbeat *Bad*. *Titanic Days* is about as entertaining a CD as you will find.

The fact that he wrote the all ten tracks in only three weeks shows the lack of importance given to the lyrics.

The disc features the constant use of synthesizer as well as Mozz and Munroe conversing in song. The result is a sound with some appeal but seems empty without a solid message behind it.

So I go home and crash...hard. The next morning I make it to my 8:30 class for the first time

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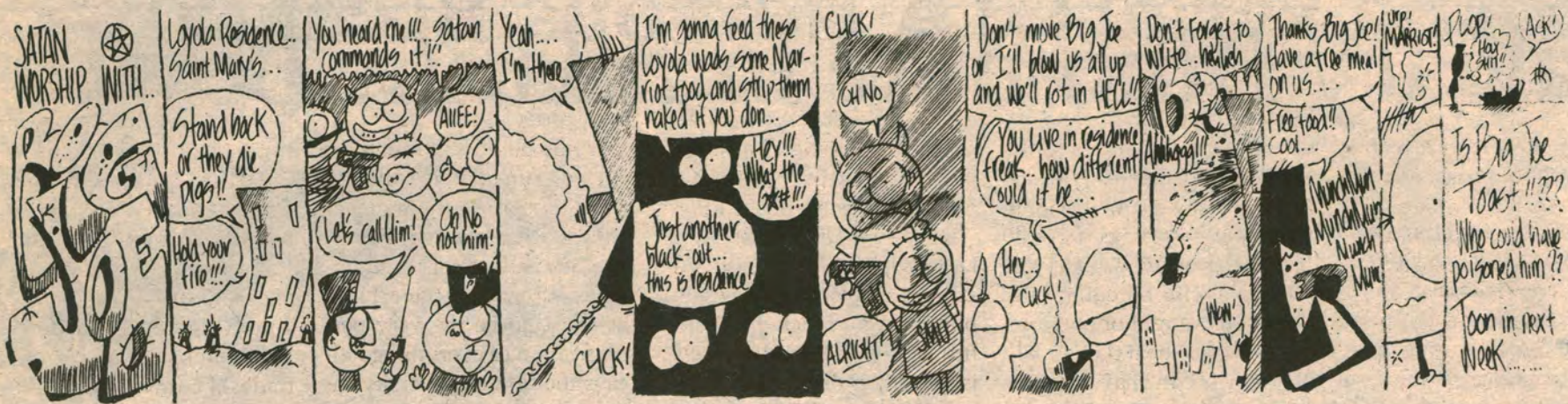

Calgary Dino-mite in Atlantic Bowl

The Calgary Dinosaurs stormed out to a 19-6 halftime lead and withstood a third-quarter charge by the Saint Mary's Huskies, scoring 18 unanswered points in the final eleven minutes to capture their first Atlantic Bowl since 1975.

The Dinos' 37-23 victory in front of 8,126 fans at Huskies Stadium avenges their loss last season to SMU, although player of the game James Buchanan did not see it that way.

"We still felt like we should've won the game last year," noted the fourth-year wide receiver, who caught seven passes for 125 yards and scored the go-ahead touchdown on a 75-yard punt return. "We came out this year (and) we knew what to expect from the crowd, from the city, from everything and we just prepared for it and we came out and played the best game that we could."

Calgary will meet the Toronto Varsity Blues Saturday in Toronto to compete for the Vanier Cup. The OUAA champion Blues ousted Concordia from the title hunt with a 26-16 win at Skydome.

A pair of singles off missed field goal attempts from Dino kicker Bruce Parsons accounted for all the scoring in the first quarter. Second-string halfback Chris Lewis, who replaced

starter Sean Letter when he went down with a knee injury last week against Alberta, meshed Calgary's first major on a seven-yard run 1:04 into the second.

Saint Mary's answered with a Mark Dalla Riva field goal from 39 yards two and a half minutes later before the Dinos found the end zone again. The key play of the drive was converting a second-and-37 situation when cornerback Dwayne Provo intercepted, then fumbled a John Kalin pass and Buchanan recovered on the SMU 37-yard line, helping set up a two-yard TD run by Lewis at 6:57.

Parsons and Dalla Riva exchanged field goals prior to the intermission, which seemed to be just what the home side needed as they rattled off the first 17 points of the second half. Tom Walton brought the crowd to life when he blocked a Parsons punt that was scooped up by Howard Benjamin in the Calgary end zone at 4:20.

Dalla Riva hit a 41-yard field goal two minutes later and on their next possession. Pivot David Sykes (17-of-33 passing, 246 yards) then hooked up with Charles Ashe (nine catches, 125 yards) on a 48-yard pass-and-run to give SMU a 23-19 lead.

Calgary pulled within one with 10:58 remaining, capitalizing on a Roger Reinson interception with a 16-yard field goal

by Parsons. After holding SMU to two plays, Buchanan put the Dinos ahead to stay, going virtually untouched up the middle to paydirt just over a minute later.

"I couldn't hear if (the punt) was for me or Mike (Freiter)," remarked Buchanan in reference to his game-breaking play. "I couldn't tell if they were kicking to me or not. I was getting really frustrated just wanting them to kick me one, and I got one kicked to me and I just wasn't going to waste the opportunity."

Dinosaurs quarterback John Kalin (20-of-38, 310 yards) netted the rest of the points for the victors, adding a two-point convert to Buchanan's TD and scoring on a one-yard keeper with 4:56 remaining. Appropriately enough Kalin, who started at safety as well, snuffed out a last-gasp effort by the Huskies by picking off a desperation pass in the end zone with 31 seconds left on the clock.

"We knew they wouldn't quit and to their credit they came out in the second half and played great football but we got a good break with the punt return and took it from there," remarked the fifth-year senior.

Veteran members of the Huskies whose careers came to an abrupt end on Saturday included Anthony Williams who has been a member of the maroon-and-white for six years,

having sat out the 1991 season with a knee injury, and saw his final chance at a Vanier Cup ring go by against the Dinos.

"When it comes down to these games you just can't make mistakes," offered Williams inside a quiet SMU dressing room. "We came out in the second half and gave it 100%, we just didn't get the breaks. In a championship game that's what it takes to win."

"What can I say, we had a great year, I had a great year myself and we just didn't win the big one," added Williams,

whose brother Andre also completes his five years of eligibility.

NOTEBOOK - Sykes, defensive back Trevor Burke, offensive lineman Chris Goddard, and wideout Joey Fitzgerald were among those who played their last games in a SMU jersey...Running back Sean Mongey, who did not use up his fifth year due to injury, will likely not return...Tailback James MacPherson was held to 65 yards rushing on 13 carries... The loss at Huskies Stadium was SMU's first since 1989.
