Students Pay For Vandals

Students living in the Hilton Hotel are irate over the fact that they will be billed for damage done by vandals in two of the elevators.

According to Director of Public Affairs, Chuck Bridges, the vulgarity carved on the brass doors and inside padding in the elevators has left Saint Mary's with no choice but to make students pay. He stated, "Students were told before they moved in that there will be zero-tolerance for actions such as this." Bridges added, "Those doors are very expensive and the damage done was obviously not an accident...Somebody caused a lot of damage and it's not fair for the university to pay for another bill." Bridges then said, "this is a university and we are adults and we should act like adults."

According to Hilton Manager, Marilyn Soper the cost to have the brass refinished and to pay for the labor will be a, "very, very, very expensive cost." Soper would not give the amount of what the actual damage would cost. She did say however, "that SMU will not be billed for damage done to the padding inside the elevator but the students will have to pay for the other damage that was done to the brass."

Residence Coordinator Shaughney Aston who issued the March 21 memo to students living at the Hilton said that she was unable to give an estimation of how much the damage would cost. She said, "No one has said any numbers to me...As an employee of the residence I just pass information from the residence office to the students and it's not my position to do any decision making or create any policies." She added that, "My position is to pass information on and it is not to make any decisions...Clay Fowler would be the best person to speak with at this time, as this situation is out of my hands."

Residence Security officer, Brent Wynn said that he's heard a number of estimates on what students may have to pay. He stated, "I've heard fifty-dollars, and then I've heard quotes that it is going to cost ten to twenty thousand dollars to repair the doors." Wynn added, "Everyone seems really upset that they have to pay for something someone else did...It's the end of the

semester and I don't feel like putting out anymore extra money for something I didn't do."

Bob Pearson, VP Administration, for SMUSA said, "I don't think it's right for all of us to have to pay for something we didn't do...Everyone is upset."

Student Boris Mirtchev said, "I'm very mad to know that I've got to pay for

damage done by vandals, and I just hope they find out who did it because I don't have extra money to just hand out."

Student Jason Wallas said, "I've heard a number of prices and I'm not sure of any are true of what students will have to pay...I've heard seven dollars and then I've heard seventy dollars...I hope they catch them."

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Ozmon Reflects On Rollercoaster Year

After a tumultuous year Dr. Ozmon was invited by The Journal to comment on some of the major events.

Q. From your perspective how has the year gone?

A. Well it's had its ups and downs as you know. The big thing in the second half of course were the residence problems which consumed a lot of time, and energy of a lot of people, and was very disruptive; over a period of several weeks. I guess on the one hand we can be thankful nobody got seriously hurt, because that's always your concern when you have a fire or structural difficulties. But having said that it caused a lot of problems for a lot of people, and a big financial problem for us now to try and find the money to take care of the additional expenses.

Q. Will the students see the cost of the fire and Rice relocation, in their tuition next year?

A. I don't think we'll see an extraordinary increase based upon those problems undoubtedly we'll have an increase of sorts, but I don't think we can expect to make up these sort of difficulties in that way.

Q. So where will the money come from?

A. We've been trying several angles. We've been trying to get some money from the government to make up for the shortfall and to assist us with the cost of the repairs, that's been our main preoccupation so far, as far as trying to find the money to deal with it.

Q. What did the Administration learn from the fire and relocation.

A. In human terms I think we learned that a lot of the

problems, the secondary problems result in lack of communication, and that the more you communicate with everybody involved, the people obviously the students who have a personal interest, but the other people on campus about what's happening the more you ovate any rumours that might be circulating. We learned too that the old Saint Mary's spirit could come through, because when we called upon people to assist with moving, people turned out in great numbers to do that.

Q. What were some of the difficulties in dealing with the fire?

A. The immediate difficulty with the fire was were to put people we didn't know how extensive it was to begin with and just to suddenly be confronted with knowing that you have to put people up overnight

and probably longer for some people creates a big difficulty but the Lord Nelson was very responsive. When we decided we had to move the Rice people we had a meeting right away to inform them, that's not to say that everybody was happy with what we did because there were some people who were dissatisfied, but they were fairly few I think.

When we started we adopted certain principles, one was that we were going to deal with people as individuals, and that we were going to communicate with people frequently, that we're going to be as generous with people as we felt we could be, and we're going to try to make life in the alternate accommodation as comfortable as we could.

Q. What will some of the is-

sues SMU will be facing next year?

A. The big issue for us as a university is always funding these days it seems, the effect of rationalization we'll have to see how this education review thing plays out, because that would have an impact on a number of students in the faculty of education. In the others areas I think it's a matter of trying to do the best we can with what resources we have, we've never been an institution to sit back and moan we've always tried to break some new ground and we need to look at our programs carefully and

make them better.

I think we're doing a good job in graduating students who have good background and are capable of functioning whether they go directly in to the workforce or to graduate school. But it takes a lot of effort on the part of a lot of people including the students themselves, faculty and staff have to be commended for taking on a greater workload in the sense that we seem to have more students every year both full and part-time. But we're not going to rest on our laurels we will continue to develop our programs and keep them relevant.

Town, New Jersey, Seeing Eye Dog Institute.

The eight years Abbot has spent with Atari are years he calls, "a wonderful memory." He says "having a dog like this make things so much easier for me to accomplish. If I go to conferences it's very easy for me to get around." He adds, "some mornings I'd wake up in a bad mood and sure enough Atari would be there licking my face which would usually cheer me up."

Abbot said that everyone over the years at SMU knows Atari just as they know him. At the Atlantic Center, Abbot said that, "on the who's in and who's out board to book appointments, Atari's name is up there with the rest of the staff."

He then said that Atari's duties at SMU have "been challenging and sometime even tricky." The dog has assisted Abbot in walking to different locations on campus during times of the day when large groups of people are traveling

across campus to and from classes. Abbot said, "Atari is not shy. When he wants to move he will just do it."

Abbot says that during the winter's bad snow storms, Atari was more of a help to him than using a cane. He says "if I go off the sidewalk I don't have to worry about how to get back on it. Atari will help me lead the way... This dog all around has made my life so much easier."

He also mentioned that the only thing that causes a problem with having a Seeing Eye Dog on campus is people petting him without permission.

"You just can't walk up to a police dog and pet it without permission. I wish people would ask before petting. I don't think it's right for him to be petted while working."

In just weeks Abbot will be with a new Seeing Eye Dog. He explains that the institute which trains the dogs never release the breed of dog an individual will be receiving.

As he moved his head in the general direction of where Atari was sitting in his office Abbot said, "I'm really going to miss him. I call him a fool sometimes but he's full of love and care."

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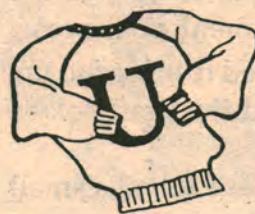
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The Year-End Report Card

However, the end of the year seemed to bring out the worst in SMUSA, as they promoted the yearbook as the best thing since sliced bread.

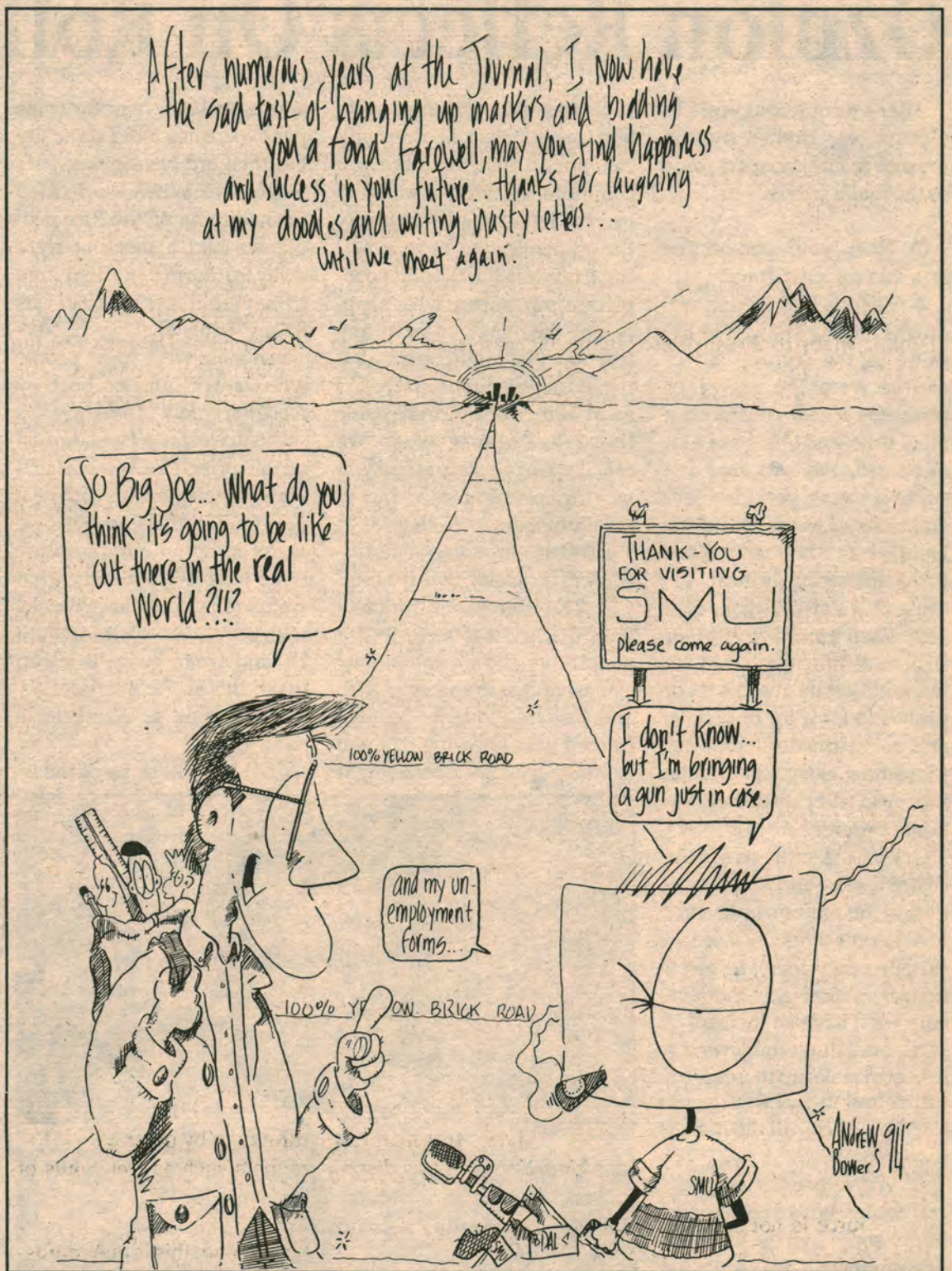

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**Lost Dakotas
Sun Machine
Independent**

Lost Dakotas represent either the best or worst thing about Canadian music. An optimist would say they are a perfect example of the vibrant independent scene in this country while a pessimist would simply wonder how a band this talented could go unsigned. Whatever your position, there is no doubting the fact this band produces an extremely distinctive and appealing sound. *Sun Machine* is a follow-up to their debut disc *Last Train To Kipling*.

The former Toronto buskers produce a sound which makes you feel like you're sitting at a campfire jam session.

Lost Dakotas are as acoustic as you can get, like their heavy bass as much as anyone in the business, and throw in a bit of harmonica and violin for texture. They have a sense of humour and have captured the essence of the boyhood crush and stick to that theme on almost half of the 15 tracks. Lyrically solid with sound musicianship- this disc kicks.

Archer's sophomore release is a disappointment in that it offers only four new songs. The remainder of the disc is filled with live and acoustic versions of songs from her debut *Great Expectations*.

Fortunately all the new songs are top notch. The British per-



former dishes out pure pop music with its trademark melodies and catchy lyrics. Two of the tracks feature extensive use of the piano (a la Tori Amos) which allows Archer's richly textured vocals to dominate the way they should.

Archer's new material is great but one has to wonder why she didn't put off releasing her second disc until she had more material. With only 35 minutes of music and half of it old material, the quantity isn't there but thank God for quality.

**Great Big Sea
Debut
Independent**

Some have compared Great Big Sea to Spirit of the West and this comparison makes sense. Their work has many of the

same elements as early work done by Spirit of the West. The St. John's band is as traditional and Celtic as you can get, sounds of the fiddle, mandolin, tin whistle and accordion dominate their songs. However, they are probably too traditional when it comes to choosing their songs. Only four of the 11 songs on the disc are original, which is unfortunate because

these are the songs which shine. *The Fisherman's Lament*, a song about the plight of the Newfoundland fishermen is easily the best song on the disc.

**Reality Bites
Original Motion
Picture Soundtrack

When I first listened to this album, I thought "Reality Bites... and so does this soundtrack."

However, just to be fair, I spun the album a few more times in the CD player. It turned out to be a waste of time - my initial thoughts were fairly accurate. The major problem with this album is that the songs, although generally well written

tracks about the social and moral desolation that pervades the urban wastelands, are rather bland and forgettable. Nothing really stands out - and I'm not referring to commercial sounding potential singles - not one song has enough presence to be considered a really great track. In fact, by including the song "My Sharona" on the album, the only thing I can credit this soundtrack with is restoring some popularity to that long forgotten band, the Knack. The album also proves that Ethan Hawke, one of the stars of the film, should not give up his acting career just yet - his vocal performance on the track "I'm Nuthin'" can be favourably compared to the sounds made by a barfing dog. The one bright spot in this otherwise dismal collection is a remake by Big Mountain of the classic

that would fit into his movie without overshadowing the acting, plot, characters, action, etc., and that is exactly what he got - a bunch of forgettable tunes, all perfectly capable of fading into the background.

**Fifty-Four Forty
Smilin' Buddha Cabaret
Columbia/Sony Music**

Neil Osborne, the psycho poet and meta-musician, is back with his band mates for another depressing look at the sick world we live in. A companion album for those who didn't get enough bad news with the Reality Bites soundtrack. It is said that there is a fine line between insanity and genius and I think it's safe to assume that Neil Osborne, the band's lyricist, is a professional wire walker. This is not to say this his messages are incomprehensible; no, actually,

his observations are quite astute - if one is into seeing the world through the chaotic clouds of a nightmare. Musically, the album is vintage Fifty-Four Forty - distorted guitars mixed with a quasi-thunderous backbeat into a rock & roll, retro-Gothic, neo-grunge, post-industrial, wall of confused sound. Songs to discover the despairing insanity lurking beneath the calm exterior of every technologi-



cally connected urbanite. Great stuff!

**Sass Jordan
Rats
Aquarius/EMI**

I don't know what kind of life Sass Jordan has lead, but it could not have been very pleasant. In her third solo effort, Sass waxes poetic about abusive partners, unfaithful partners, ugly partners, and uncaring partners, as well as depression, heroin addiction, insanity, hot sex, and the general chaos of the great cruel world. Essentially, the title of the album, Rats, applies equally to her view of the world as well as to the people who inhabit her world (actually, the original title of the album was Ratsass, which, I think, is directly linked to her general attitude, as in "I don't give a rat's ass.."). In terms of sound, the songs on Rats fit nicely in the hard-edged rock & roll genre, although she does manage to include some acoustic pieces; she also borrows a bit from the Seattle grunge movement. Two notable points: one, Sass plays bass on the last track "Give", and two, the insert photography is fantastic - stark, wild, and very beautiful. Overall, not a bad album.

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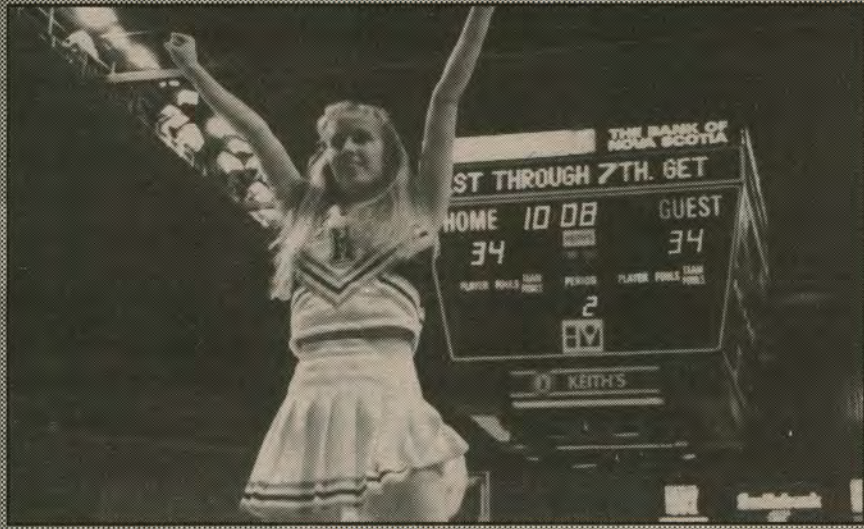

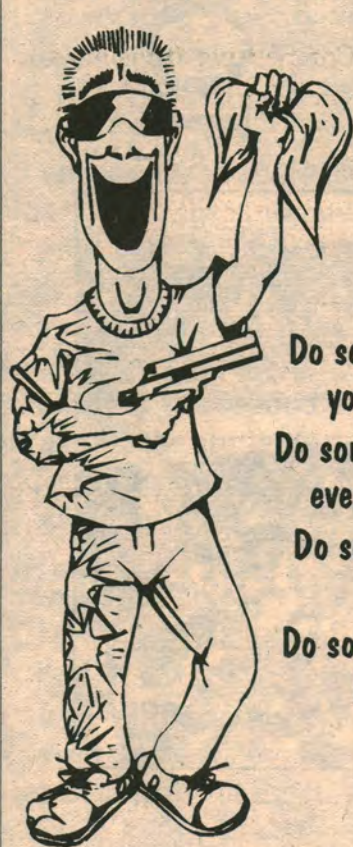
