CFSM Delays FM Application

March's referendum that saw students vote yes for an increase to part-time student fees has not yet been approved by the university's Board of Governor's. The increase would have raised part-time student fees from the current \$11.50 to \$40.20, half of the full-time \$80.40 fee.

An increase in part-time fees would have created a significant boost in the funds that SMUSA would receive from the students. Subsequently, as promised by incoming President, John Francis, the societies would have benefitted in the process. Currently, there are approximately 40 active societies on campus and funding has been tight for several years.

CFSM Station Manager Kevin Smith says, "It is my understanding that they are questioning the results of the election because it was primarily full-time students that voted for the increase."

He adds, "that shouldn't matter. Everybody, full and part-time had an equal opportunity to vote. Those funds would have been greatly appreciated by all societies, especially CFSM; we are in the

process of applying for an FM licence and we really need funding."

One of the main criteria for CFSM's FM licence application is guaranteed funding. Without this, the CRTC would never approve an application.

"Almost everything is falling into place now," says Smith with enthusiasm," we have a strong, active Board of Directors, the MBA program is going to do a marketing study for us, and we have made many contacts that will help in our quest for an FM licence; the only thing that keeps holding us back is money. It all comes down to money."

Saint Mary's University has one of the lowest part-time fees at \$11.50 per student and many feel that they should be paying half of the part-time fees.

Smith finally adds," I can't believe that they are considering not approving this question. It passed, if they are worried that increased student fees will keep students away, they should lower tuition costs."

The Journal will carry details of the Referendum next week.

In a year end interview in April, John Francis, the incoming SMUSA President said that societies would have to justify themselves and what they receive. He's holding true to his word.

At a society summit on Monday the president of SMUSA told society executive that in order to receive funding each event would have to be approved by the Financial Advisory Committee. Because societies have squandered monies in the past on such things as executive lunches, an event by event funding formula has been introduced. Detailed event descriptions and budgets must be submitted two weeks in advance. After a FAC approval, a cheque can be picked up. A FAC meeting schedule

will be published and posted in the society offices area so that executive will know their deadline dates. By implementing this policy, Francis believes that the money will do the greatest good.

In the past societies received approximately \$300 for the year to organize their activities. Jamie Welsh, the SMUSA Treasurer, didn't think this years amount would exceed the old but could be increased if an event was considered to be extraordinary. The Geology Society is planning a national conference and will probably get some additional funding. Per capita limits were not suggested but early success will determine continued funding. Societies are encouraged to record the number and names of people that attend their events.

Office space has been reassigned as well and only those societies that were successful at attracting members in the past have received offices this year. If you're looking for your old society, you need to find out their new location. Some society executive have been disappointed by this decision but generally it is viewed as an improvement. Executive that were interviewed after the meeting seem to believe that this would lead to greater responsibility with funds. Even society executive that have lost their offices believe the new system is fair.

Also discussed at the Society Summit was the upcoming Society Expo to be held this Friday. All societies are going to host a fair type of event in the court yard in front of the Student Centre. It is opportunity to

ton of really cool people but, I was really tired.



Students returning for the first time since their last exam in April will notice a new structure on campus. The new Sobey Building will house the Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce and will open in August of 1998. This facility will add 77,500 square feet of new space to the campus. Included in the construction plans are renovations to the already existing Loyola building. After all work is complete, approximately 75 percent of all classes will be in the new space. The new building will also house the PhD in accounting program that Saint Mary's is developing. Students coming to campus for the first time this year have a state of the art facility to look forward to in their academic future.

The building, and the faculty of commerce are named after a famous member of Canadian industry. Frank H Sobey was a native of Pictou County, Nova Scotia. He founded Empire Industries, and though it grew to an enormous size, Frank Sobey never forgot his humble beginnings. The name 'Sobey' is most often associated with the grocery store chain that Frank Sobey's father started with one store in Stellaton, Nova Scotia. However, Empire Industries has many booming retail and other business operations in the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec, Ontario, and New England. Frank Sobey was an amazing businessperson.

His influence on other areas of industry in Nova Scotia sometimes go unnoticed. He was instrumental in bringing many new businesses to the area in the 1970's and early 80's. As a member of the "Industrial Estates Limited," (a provincial government committee) he negotiated deals with such multinationals as Michelin and convinced them Nova Scotia was a good place to do business. Although he had only a small amount of formal training in business he was honoured with several degrees before he passed away. It is quite fitting, considering his contribution to the economy of Nova Scotia, that thousands will earn Bachelors of Commerce in a faculty and facility named in his honour. His sons, who now run the daunting Empire Industries, and sit on many boards of directors of other large Canadian companies, are well-known supporters of the "Building on Strength" capital campaign. The family donated one million dollars to the project, and Dr. David Sobey, Frank's son, is credited with raising more than 10 million from other donors.



A Message From The Registrar

If you would like to reduce the level of frustration in your life, it is best to follow the advice of the registrar. It also reduces the level of frustration for the staff at the Registrar's Office. The following is a message from Elizabeth Chard, the Registrar at Saint Mary's.

Students should pay strict attention to the fact that with the automated registration system, all students were provided with a registration receipt which shows a detailed list of courses (with applicable section numbers) labs, and recitations for which they ar officially registered in the 1997-98 academic year . These are the courses for which grades and, if appropriate, withdrawals will show on their official University record and hence, on any transcripts or official documents produced by the University. Students who are attending a course or section of a course for which they are not officially registered will not receive a grade or hence, possible credit for the course. If students are not attending a course. or section of a course for which they are registered, an automatic grade of "F" will be assigned both at Christmas and at the end of the academic year. Further information on this matter is found in academic regulation 16b, 1997-98 Academic Calendar.

Apply now for Spring Convocation, 1998 which is scheduled for Monday, 11 May 1998. Deadline for receipt of the application for Graduation is Friday, 26 September 1997. Forms are available at the Registrar's/Records Office. The \$20.00 graduation fee can be paid directly at the Business Office

anytime before mid-April 1998. Over the next several months, the Deans, Associate Deans, and Chairpersons will check the academic records of all students who have applied. Hence, it is important if you are a potential graduate, you register for all the courses you expect to take in 1997-98, especially .2 courses.

Finally, the first meeting of the Senior class of 1998 will be held on Thursday 25 september 1997 at 5:00 pm in the theatre B, Burke Building. If you expect to graduate at either the spring 98 or Fall 98 Convocations, please attend so you can have a voice in your graduation & related events. Life officers will be elected and will become the official representatives for the Class of 98.





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CYBF:Supporting Young Entrepreneurs

News

The big banks are finally taking notice of Canada's youth and recognizing the importance of small business in strengthening our economy. By combining their resources, they are creating organizations which provide opportunities for young entrepreneurs to an extent that has not been seen before. If there is one organization that should not be overlooked by any Commerce student at Saint Mary's University, it is the Canadian Youth Business Foundation (CYBF).

The Canadian Youth Business Foundation is a non-profit, private sector initiative designed to provide young entrepreneurs with both funding and mentoring in order to create new business. Founding partners include CIBC, Royal Bank, and The Canadian Youth Foundation. A number of other private firms across the nation also provide financial and volFoundation hopes to enjoy the same success and after rolling out in London, Ontario has opened regional offices in Halifax and Calgary. One third of their resources will be devoted to Atlantic Canada. This means they hope to support 1700 new businesses in the region by 2001. Nation wide, the foundation's goal is to open 5000 businesses in 60 centres.

So, if you are between the ages of 18 and 29, you are eligible for a loan of up to \$15,000 with a low, variable interest rate and flexible terms. All you need is an idea and a business plan which includes financial projections. If the loan is approved, the entrepreneur, in conjunction with CYBF, chooses a mentor who will provide support and expertise as it is needed over the life of the loan. If you don't have a lot of experience putting together a business plan, don't worry. Ray look for those who demonstrate an entrepreneurial spirit, drive and enthusiasm. This is apparent in the fact that they take the time to interview every applicant.

Character based lending is one aspect of this program that makes it unique and acts as an advantage to university students who might otherwise be overlooked due to a lack of credit history or assets. The mentor component of program also presents a distinct advantage. After this was introduced into The Prince's Youth Business Trust in the UK, it actually increased the success rate of new startups from 30% to 70%

Also unique to CYBF, once your plan is presented, a committee of local volunteers from

> the community, will make the loan decision. The committee is made up of bankers, accountants, business consultants, and other young entrepreneurs. Here, they are encouraged to be more flexible and risky in their decisions than their professions might afford them. In fact, CYBF is often seen as the last resort for many small business start-ups. SMU students should note that the committee has a healthy representation of people associated with the university. It certainly reflects the

quality of our business program and its members commitment to business and community development.

within four days of her plan reaching CYBF. Prior to this, Donovan had no business experience, but had always dreamed of owning her own

"I knew because of the job situation in Cape Breton, I couldn't go back, so I set up a piece of Cape Breton here in Halifax," says Donovan, noting that she received tremendous planning support from Marian Hopkins at the Centre for Women in Business. Donovan turned to the Royal Bank and CYBF for funding and in less than a week was approved for both. Her account Manager from the Royal Bank, Earl Covin, is also a mentor for CYBF. Donovan liked the personal touch offered by CYBF, and that of all her sources of assistance, CYBF was the only one able to offer her the support of a mentor.

Not only has the foundation's support helped to create full-time employment for Donovan and her staff, but also a new spot in Halifax for all to enjoy and a place where hundreds of Cape Bretoners at SMU and other metro institutures The Harbour Folk Society, with piano playing, Gaelic singing, and fiddling.

Don't miss the official grand-opening on Saturday, September 13. This will be nothing short of a good ol' Cape Breton kitchen party with well known names from the other side of the causeway. Keep an eye out for Natalie McMaster's pianist, Tracy Dares, and McGinty's John Ferguson. The Cape Breton Store will also be offering dance and music lessons in the very near future.

"Everyone told me how hard it would be to open my own business, and all the problems I would have," says Donovan, "but my biggest fear was not doing it at all."



"We are not looking for professional plans, but rather, we must focus on character based lending." This seems to be the key to success for CYBF. Folkins goes on to say that they



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

The Foo Fighters are back with their newest release The Colour and the Shape. Former Nirvana members, Dave Grohl and Pat Smear, create a definitely different sound than their old band. The Foo Fighters have an aggressive rock sound with good rhythms and energy. Nirvana mostly made noise. Grohl makes the transition from drums, in Nirvana, to guitar and vocals for these guys. I believe that The Colour and the Shape was recorded during a drummer switch which put Grohl behind the kit once again for the majority of the album.

The first single "Monkey Wrench" did well on the charts. It also has an interesting video. It features Grohl trying to get into his apartment (after leaving the elevator which was playing a nice quaint version of "Big Me") only to find it chained from the inside. After peeking into the keyhole he sees The Foo Fighters, including himself, playing the song. Then...well, watch the video. The first single has the typical Foo Fighters energy found on the first album, but the songs are rather different. "Monkey Wrench" winds up with Grohl in a screaming session, but he does it well. Maybe he should have sung for Nirvana



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

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

lover was leafing through "The Girls of the Hub Meat Processing Plant Calendar".




thought that they were just a bad surf band".

Women's Soccer Has Hart

On Monday, when everyone was dealing with the pains
of moving, the Saint Mary's
women's soccer team began
training for a new season. This
day marked the beginning of a
new era for the women's program. There is an air of excitement within the team because
of the arrival of new coach
Stephen Hart. Stephen joins the
Husky program as the new
women's soccer coach, replacing departed Joanne Evans.

Stephen Hart returns to Saint Mary's after eleven years. He was both a player and an assistant coach with the men's program before leaving. He played with the Huskies between 1980-1985 and was an assistant coach with the team for two years beginning in 1986. Of his many soccer accomplishments one that stands out is being awarded the MVP at the

Canadian Senior Soccer Championships while playing for King of Donair. He came to SMU from Trinidad on the advice of a friend who was already living in Halifax.

Coach Hart brings an impressive amount of credentials. Since leaving SMU he has gone on to become the Technical Director of Soccer Nova Scotia as well as this years Director of Canada Games Program for Nova Scotia. During this past summer he was also the coach of the Nova Scotia women's team which participated in the Canada Summer Games.

This involvement within the Nova Scotia soccer community will be a great asset to recruiting. Coach Hart has a familiarity with the players coming up through the age groups that will give him an advantage as far as determining skill level for Nova Scotia

players. Coach Hart's involvement with other programs also brings an immediate respectability to the Saint Mary's program. These assets and an ability to communicate with players will help bring credibility and integrity to the program in the long run. Roy Clements, who was part of the selection committee is enthusiastic about Stephen Hart's future with the team. From the accounts of the returning players, they agree that Coach Hart is the man most suited for this job.

As the coach of a team it is important to set goals, both short and long term. Coach Hart sees the soccer program as a long term commitment that will take time. It is his belief that a long term future is more important than an immediate gain. There will be no short cuts taken for short term success if it means jeopardizing the future. In order to build a pro-

gram, the goal cannot be simply to win games but must also include an emphasis on academics, coaching accomplishments, and the growth of the athlete as an individual while at Saint Mary's.

The immediate task at hand for Coach Hart is to get familiar with the team he has. He had a very busy summer with the Canada Games program so was unable to begin his work at SMU as early as he would have liked. New players were recruited before he arrived and the team is still not sure which players will be returning for the new season. This will create a period of adjustment for both coach and player. It will take time before the entire team will be able to gel as a unit.

The short term goals of the team are to make the playoffs. Last year the team made the playoffs on the final day of the season and were able to make it to the semi-finals, losing to the eventual champions, Acadia. The playoffs are a sudden death format, so once in, anything can happen. Coach Hart sees the team progressing through the regular season and then to be evaluated at the end. With Stephen Hart as the coach the players believe the playoffs are a very realistic goal.

Coach Hart realizes that as a coach at Saint Mary's there are expectations placed upon him to win. He is however, realistic in his approach to these expectations. He points out that most achievements in sports occur in cycles and with patience and the proper guidance the women's program will begin a successful run. As for the pressure involved, especially as a returning star, it must be put in perspective. There are events occurring around the world that pale in comparison to a soccer game. Hart will stress to his players that they are here at SMU to get an education and winning soccer games will fall into place after that. With Stephen Hart leading the way, however, the team may become accustomed to winning. The future of the women's soccer program certainly seems to be in good hands.






