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SMUSA VPSA Impeached

After several weeks of discussion regarding the internal problems Saint Mary's University Students' Association has been facing, action was taken at Sunday's Student Representative Council meeting. At the meeting, Vanessa Tynes was officially removed from the position of Vice President of Student Affairs. Tynes was not available for comment at the time of publication.

Recent allegations that Tynes was not fulfilling her obligations as VPSA at SMUSA propelled the executive to issue a letter of warning to inform her of the feelings of her co-workers. The letter expressed that while the executive of SMUSA felt that on a personal level Tynes was a good person, they felt unable to continue working with her as she was not fulfilling her duties, including active leadership in activities like Winter Carnival and Frosh Week. It was also expressed by members of the association that she was missing her required office hours on a regular basis.

Tynes rejected the letter, expressing that it made false accusations and was inaccurate.

At the beginning of this semester, Tynes was relieved of her duties connected with last week's Winter Carnival activities. Normally, the VPSA would have complete authority over the activities surrounding Winter Carnival. This year, members of SMUSA decided that because of the unsatisfactory work displayed, including the fact that Tynes was a week late returning to the office after Christmas vacation, that she could not fulfill that aspect of her job. Rose Tchwenko, Director of External Affairs, and Jean-Guy Chaisson, Vice President of Administration at SMUSA, were appointed as her replacements for the week's activities.

According to SMUSA spokesperson, John Francis, "Tynes was removed from her position due to her inability to maintain the duties outlined in her portfolio. We feel it is in the best interest of the student body

stances, in-class tests may be permitted by the Vice President of Academics and Research on the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty." This motion was suggested to provide semi-stress relief when it is most needed, which is generally the time before exams.

According to the Dean of Arts, Dr. Michael Larsen, the motion was much needed. "The intent of the motion, as I understand it, is to prevent peo-

Day Of Action Protest Successful

On January 27th, approximately 500 students gathered at the King's College parking lot for a march organized by the Canadian Federation of Students (CFS).

The march's main organizer, Jessica Squires, and other student leaders, passed out printed picket signs and various costumes. The picket signs read "Student debt shouldn't be a debt sentence," and "Stop student debt. Freeze fees now."

Accompanied by make shift drums and a couple trumpets and flutes, the entire party marched through Dalhousie campus, past the CBC buildings, through downtown to Province House on Hollis Street. The march made several stops at banks to decorate them with "Fair Loans Now!" in street chalk, and at the QEII hospital to wrap a giant Band-Aid around one of its signs.

In attendance were students from MSVU, King's, SMU, DAL, Acadia, NSCAD, NS Community College, NS Secondary Schools, as well as university faculty members and several unions including CUPE and CUPW.

At the steps of Province House, the rally demanded a tuition freeze, more national grants, and the rejuvenation of government funding to social programs. Speakers at the House included Squires and Barbara Moore, president of CUPE local 3912.

"We're really here to support the student, because they are really getting ripped off. If you take a look at what students are paying, \$700-\$800 per course, and know that a lot of the instructors are part-timers that only get paid \$5000 for 8 months work, it means that classes should be no bigger than 5 or 6 per course, or someone is making a lot of profit ex-

ploiting both groups," said Moore.

New Democrat MLA Eileen O'Connell was the only visible politician at the protest. "I'm here to support the students that took the time and energy to mount such a creative protest. [The NDP] have spoken out loudly and clearly against income contingent loan repayment schemes that just pour more money into the big bank".

After the speeches the picket signs were left out on the House's steps and fence, while Food Not Bombs served free bagels and curried stew. "I'm here because I think it's really [terrible] that the [government] makes people pay so much for education," said protester Pam MacInnes.

The CFS is based at NSCAD with chapters at MSVU and King's College.

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Oxfam Speaks Out On The MAI

Last week, Brian O'Neill of Oxfam Canada came to Saint Mary's and held a seminar on the Multilateral Agreement on Investment (MAI) and Oxfam's Basic Human Rights campaign.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the United Nations' Declaration of Human Rights. The campaign will pressure the governments of the world to start honoring their declarations, both politically and economically.

The Oxfam global charter of basic human rights consists of

the right to food, clean water, shelter, health care, education, livelihood, safe environment, protection from violence, and equality of opportunity. According to O'Neill, the charter "flies into the face of globalization."

O'Neill states that the MAI is just one more component in the process of globalization. He went on to site four major events which facilitated the entrenchment of the United States and led to Global capitalist ideologies.

In the 1970's, the G-7 began pushing for global monetarist policies which would allow

goods and capital to go from one place to another without restrictions. The debt crisis of the 1980's prompted the wealthy countries to pressure the International Monetary Fund to impose structural adjustment programs on heavily indebted nations. In effect, this bailed the wealthy out of financial ruin and impoverished the poor. The 1988 Free Trade agreement, followed by the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA), were among the first regional trade agreements enacted through-

out the world.

According to O'Neill, it was established that globalization has widened the gap between the rich and poor in both industrialized and developing countries at the last UN Conference on Trade and Development. A publication titled "Development and Social Change", says third world growth between 1950 and 1980 exceeded that of the first world; however, the additional wealth in the hands of local elite has done little to elevate third world poverty.

Figures obtained by O'Neill from Stats Canada illustrate this point. Since 1986, the income of the poorest third of the Canadian population declined by 3%, while the richest fifth of the population saw their wealth increase by 5%. During this time period Canada's economy experienced growth. "Trickle down economics is a myth," says O'Neill. The number of billionaires has ballooned to 500 and possess the same wealth as three billion of the poorest people in the world.

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Canadian Space Arm Named

In mid-December, after careful consideration of over 14,000 submissions from across the country, the space arm that is to be mounted aboard the upcoming International Space Station has been named. Canadapt, a title invented by John Connoly of Ottawa, will

represent Canada's main contribution to the station. In return, 46-year-old Connoly wins an all-expense-paid trip for four to Florida next summer to witness an upcoming shuttle launch.

Six other participants of the eight-week contest also came up with Canadapt, but the sole winner of the trip was selected

from a random draw. The victory was announced during @discovery.ca, a science newsmagazine show on the Discovery Channel. Connoly submitted his response only three days before the October 26th deadline. It is a name which many feel reflects Canada's exciting role in space as well as the new space arm's

ability to adapt and operate in a number of situations, including in the assembly and maintenance of the space station.

The contest sponsored by AT&T Canada in conjunction with the Discovery Channel and Spar Aerospace Ltd., invited Canadians to conjure a dynamic name for the sophisticated system of robotics. In order to be considered, suggestions had to be short, simple, and workable in both French and English.

Canadapt, short for the techno-name Space Station Remote Manipulator System (SSRMS), is scheduled to fly on a shuttle mission in 1999. Any comparison to the human arm, however, is misleading: the device is 17 metres long with 7 motorized joints and 4 video

cameras to allow finer control and manipulation of movements. The arm will also provide the ability to dock space shuttles as well as aid in the assembly of the station. Canadian Astronaut Chris Hadfield will be the first to use the arm. He is currently in training in simulators at the Canadian Space Agency.

Other popular submissions included Unity or the Unity Arm (of which 543 entries were received) Canadarm, Cando/Candeux, the CanuckArm, and Caspar. Over 6,000 submissions came from Ontario, while Nova Scotia presented a mere 570.

The costly International Space Station, if completed on schedule, will begin operation in 2002.

"Bird Flu" Transmission Still Unclear

As of December 28th, there have been no new cases of the deadly "bird flu" virus (influenza H5N1) in Hong Kong, which has left four people dead and sixteen others infected. Yet, officials remain in the dark as to whether the virus can be contracted via person-to-person.

The results of preliminary tests conducted by the Center for Disease Control cannot rule out that transmission between humans is occurring; however, the data does suggest that it's not occurring very efficiently. There exists at present two known groups of slightly different viruses found among human infection cases. Most episodes of the influenza virus have been linked to exposure to infected poultry or to direct ex-

posure to the virus in the lab. As well, there is no evidence of any genetic mutation which might lead to a form of the virus that could be passed along from human contact.

The first recorded case was a 3-year-old boy who quickly died last May from respiratory failure; later, two people who had come in contact with the boy (a child who attended the same day-care center, and a health-care worker who developed antibodies to the virus) became infected. If the virus is not transmittable, then the child at the day-care must have caught it from the same chickens.

A SMU student who returned to Hong Kong over the Christmas break reported that supermarkets had pulled their frozen poultry from their

shelves, and restaurants served pork in place of chicken in certain dishes. He said that the level of fear and concern amongst his family and many residences, understandably, was quite high.

In an effort that seems to mimic the response to "mad cow disease" in Great Britain, Hong Kong officials have recently slaughtered 1.4 million chickens and other poultry. Banned also is the importing of live poultry from mainland China (of which usually comprises much of the Hong Kong supply). Research around the world continues in hopes of confirming how transmission occurs, and if in the worst case scenario the virus is passed from human-to-human, how its deadly operation can be halted.

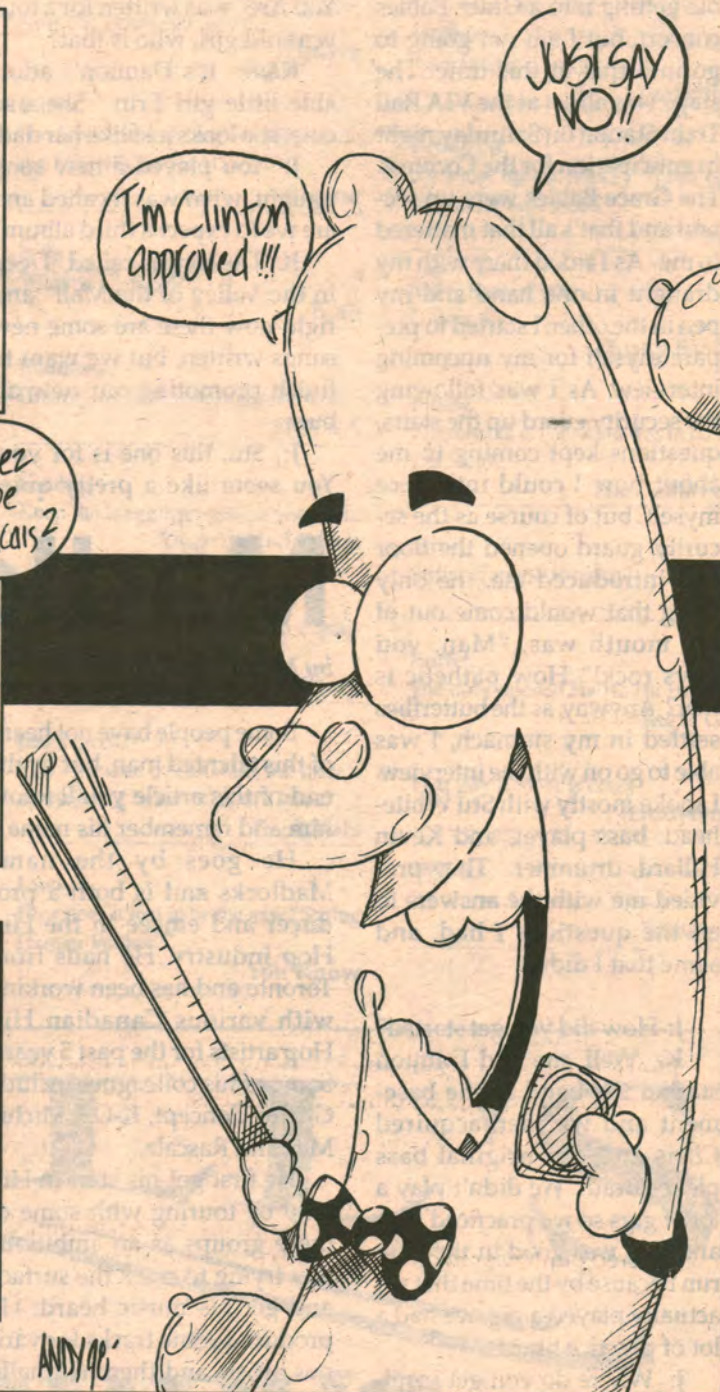

Not only did he produce the track, he also did the vocals, proving that he was a versatile man who had a clear knowledge of what he wanted to do as an artist. Beatfactory Records saw this and decided to sign Madlocks as their first artist to record a solo project under their

Madlocks told me that he's putting the finishing touches on the last tracks and *Fast Lane* should be in stores no later than mid-March. Artists such as Chocclair and Ghetto Concept are set to be featured on his album. There will be a tour associated with this project but no dates or venues have been confirmed at this point. He hopes that it will be nationwide so that he can show everyone from coast to coast what he and his music are all about.

It was refreshing to talk to a Hip Hop artist who has confidence, not cockiness, and was able to give a perspective of things from both the producer, emcee and entertainer's point of view. Canadian Hip Hop is definitely headed in the right direction and Madlocks intends to keep pushing it that way and beyond.

I think though that Ms. MacLachlan's worldwide record sales and various magazine cover stories centered on her talent will easily help her bear the losses.

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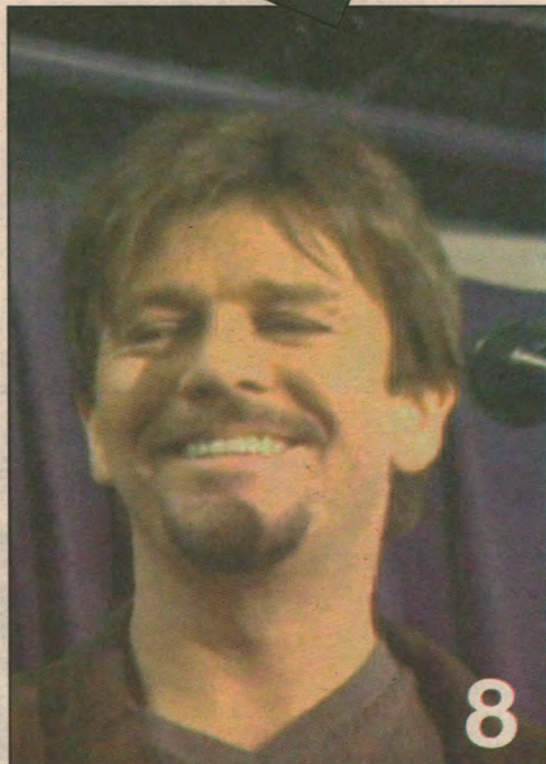
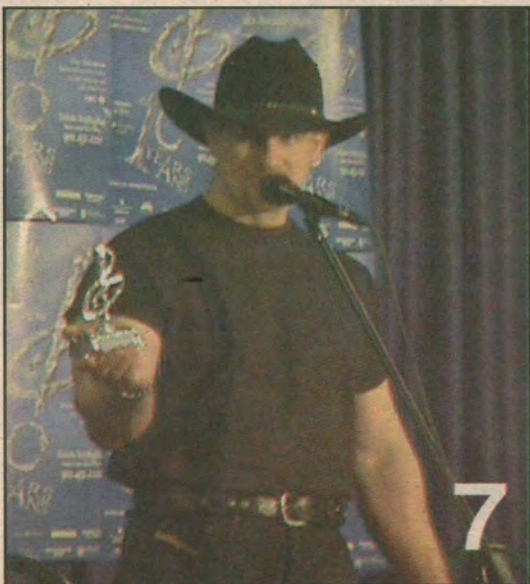

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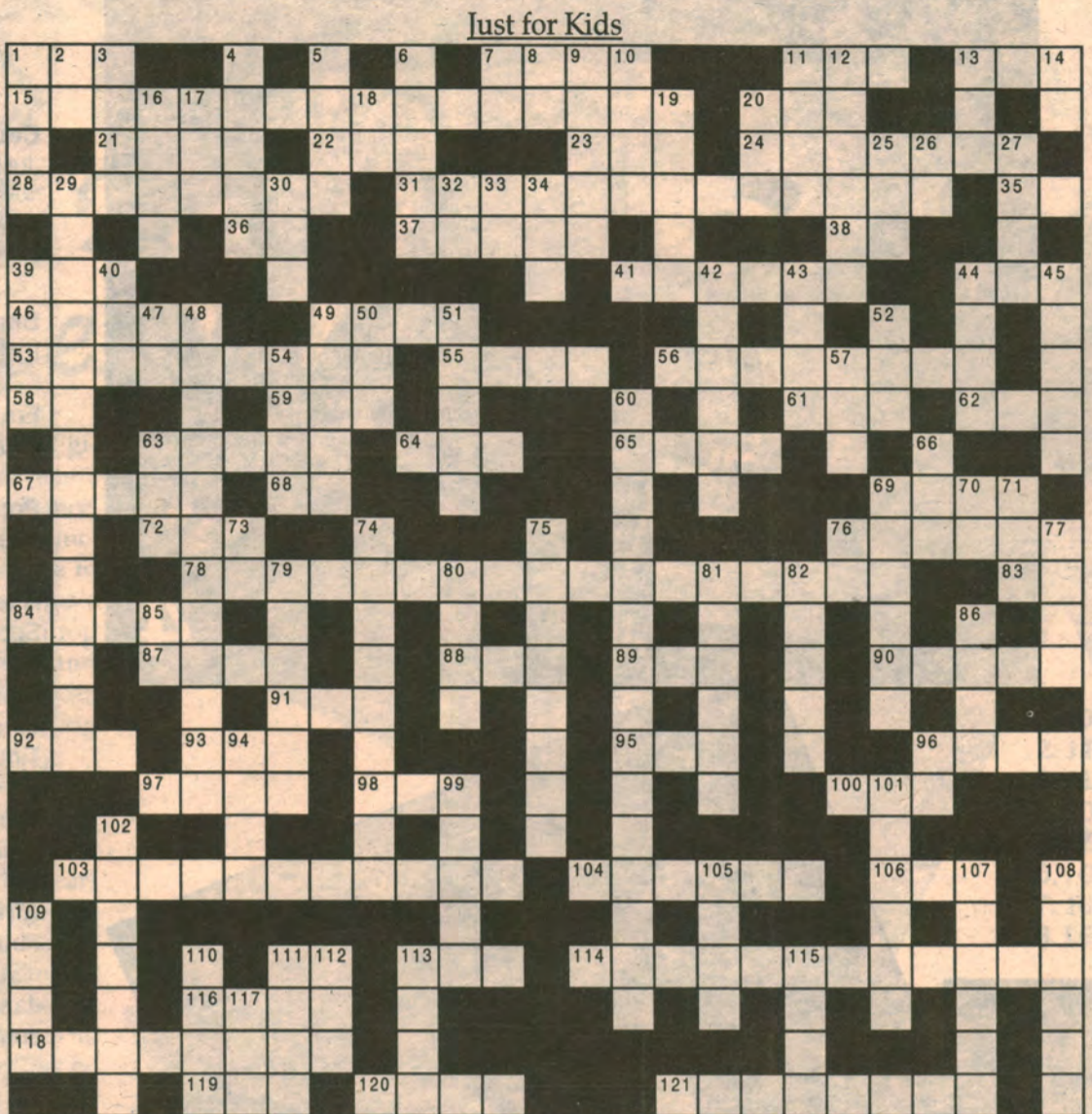

Puck Huskies Have a Hay-Day

St. Thomas Tommies goalie Scott Hay saved the day, and 50 shots in 4-4 tie

Saint Mary's hockey Huskies found themselves in New Brunswick on the weekend for a set of games against the Saint Thomas Tommies and the Universite de Moncton Bleu Aigles.

The Huskies would fail in a comeback attempt in their first game against Moncton, losing 4-3. Trailing 4-1 after Moncton's Remy Boudreau scored his second goal of the game early in the third period, Saint Mary's tried to mount the comeback.

Powered by David Oliver and James Sheehan's markers, both assisted by fourth year forward Shawn Redmond, the Huskies were gunning for the equalizer.

With two seconds left in the game, controversy occurred. Moncton goalie Claude Fernet covered the puck behind the net, which by rule, is a delay of game penalty. However, if the infraction should occur within two minutes of the end of a game, a different situation results. "To the best of my knowledge," noted Saint Mary's head coach, Trevor Steinburg, "in the last two minutes that infraction results in a penalty shot."

Saint Mary's would not be

awarded the shot, leaving coach Steinburg and the entire Huskies squad bewildered with the no-call. "After working so hard the whole game, it was disappointing to have an officials error decide the game when the call was obvious," commented SMU forward, Justin Steinbach.

Sunday would put the Huskies in another nailbiter, playing the St. Thomas Tommies to a 4-4 draw. As has been the case for the majority of the year, Saint Mary's outplayed their opponents and could not reap the benefits of their hard work.

St. Thomas would dominate the first period, on the scoreboard anyway, taking leads of 2-1 and 4-1 on goals by Matt Hogan, Darryl Tiveron and a pair from Dave Gilmore. Despite outshooting the Tommies 15-5 in the first frame, SMU could solve St. Thomas goaltender, Scott Hay, once on a goal by Alex Halat.

Coach Steinburg switched goaltenders, replacing Dan Stewart with Mike Weatherbie, and Saint Mary's fortunes seemed to turn around.

Before the end of the period the Huskies would get a powerplay goal by Marty Leblanc, Paul McCallion and
