PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear students:

It has been a very productive summer for the SMUSA Executive, and I am very happy to report that a lot has been accomplished. I wish to highlight some of the accomplishments in point form, as space restrictions limit me to such.

1. A new campus hot line has been established at 425-INFO (4636). Call this number to find out what's happening on campus, and where. The messages are updated daily.
2. All off-campus students will notice that the arena parking lot has been paved after all these years. We the students paid for this through our \$15.00 per year for five years donation to the SMU Capital Campaign.
3. A poster policy has been established. Any posters being placed on the walls at SMU must be stamped either at the SMUSA Info Desk, the Loyola Residence Desk, or at the Department of Public Affairs. This should help to reduce the clutter of posters on the walls, as outside groups (with the exception of non-profit ventures) are **not** permitted to place any posters on the walls.
4. An **exam library** has been established at the SMUSA Info Desk. Any student can sign out old midterms and exams by leaving their valid SMU I.D. card with the attendant at the Desk. The collection of exams is small, but hopefully will continue to grow. Check to see if your prof. has donated his/her exams for use in the exam library.
5. The Students' Handbook has been expanded to a 12 month calendar format. Freshmen get their book for free at the SMUSA Info Desk while returning students are charged only \$2.00. Get yours today while supplies last.
6. Orientation has been revitalized and revamped. All students received a schedule in the mail and are invited to participate. A reminder that the Honorary Chairman of the Orientation Committee is football star **Bill Scollard**. Also, \$1.00 of every ticket sold to the Spoons Bash will go to charity.
7. A new heavy duty photocopier is in place at the SMUSA Info Desk. Copies are still only .10¢
8. Plans are in the works for a **November Extravaganza**, where SMU, in conjunction with Dal, The Mount, NSCAD, King's, TUNS and AST will host a giant concert for the university students in the metro area. The joint university bash will take place on November 9, 1989 at the Dalplex. It promises to be the university social event of the year, so watch for notices about ticket sales.
9. During National Universities Week in October, Dr. Ozmon and myself will be raffling off our jobs in a "**President for a Day**" contest. Look for details in up-coming editions of The Journal.
10. For the first time, SMUSA is planning to publish a comprehensive **student directory** this year. This directory will contain the name and local phone number of all Saint Mary's students. Please ensure that your current local phone number is listed with the Registrar's Office before the end of the first week of October (take note Residence students). We need your support for this to be successful project.
11. The **Gorsebrook Lounge** renovations project is complete! A **new sound system** and DJ booth are in place to make the Gorsebrook the place to be in 89/90. Food service selection has also been revamped. Be sure to join us for the grand opening of the pub, as well as for those traditional rockin' Thursday nights.
12. The Graduate and Bogart's have always been predominantly SMU pubs. This year when you visit the Gorsebrook Lounge on a Thursday, Friday or Saturday night, you can get your hand stamped with a special Gorsebrook-Graduate-Bogart's stamp. Show your stamp to the bouncers at these bars and your cover charge will be half price.
13. Everyone who attends the first football game on Sunday, September 10, will notice that SMUSA has two **new Husky mascots** to help people cheer on the Huskies. These two costumes were professionally sewn this summer, and two SMU students will play the part. Be sure to say "hi" to the two new Huskies.
14. The SMUSA Info Desk has undergone improvements. Also a **Student Discount Program** has been initiated. Be sure to pick up your guide to the local businesses that offer discounts to SMU students and \$AVE.
15. The Electronic Display Boards in the Students Centre and Loyola lobbies are once again operational. Watch these boards for important updates and information from SMUSA and the university community.
16. The Gamesroom on the first floor of the Student Centre has been repainted and revamped. There are now three new pool tables and additional video games. I extend an open challenge to anyone at a game of video hockey. See you there!
17. A **SMUSA Scholarship** was established this year and was awarded in August. Criteria include academic performance, leadership qualities, and involvement in extra-curricular activities. Congratulations to Keltie Worrall and Nicole Phillips, two Commerce students who share this year's scholarship.
18. The Yearbook Office and Communications Office have been reorganized. Students should know what's going on and when, but we need your participation to make events work. Come out and support your school events.
19. Interviews were held for Yearbook Graduation Photographer over the summer. Congratulations to Jarvis of Halifax who was chosen, once again, to photograph SMU Grads. Grads, be sure to get your picture taken. We want to see you in the Yearbook.
20. SMUSA is lobbying Famous Players to get **reduced movie prices** for university students. Look for petitions against the Park Lane \$7.00 per movie weekends. In keeping with, watch for our free movie series every second Sunday, featuring some of the most current titles. Also look for petitions against VIA Rail cutbacks. Every signature counts, so please sign both petitions at the SMUSA Info Desk.
21. Minutes to all Student Representative Council meetings this year be on reserve at the Library for any interested student to read.
22. After years of lobbying, SMUSA has finally managed to secure a mailbox for the front of the Student Centre. Now, for your convenience, you can buy your stamps and mail your letters right at the SUB.
23. In keeping with our commitment to helping students and student groups, SMUSA this summer has pledged \$10,000.00 to Radio Saint Mary's to go towards their **FM Expansion Project**. Join us in congratulating the CFSM crew on their good work!
24. The annual athletics agreement will soon be finalized. Students will once again receive free admission to all athletic events, courtesy of the Students' Association. Be sure to take full advantage of this.
25. SMUSA has revamped the Speaker Series this year. We will be presenting three prominent speakers this year. If you have any suggestions please drop up to the offices at any time. We want to hear from you.
26. SMUSA has selected Blue Cross to carry the student health plan in 1989/90. This year, part-time and international students will be covered, as well as full-time students. Cards will be distributed from the SMUSA Information Desk in early November. In the meantime, we ask that all students save their receipts until their cards arrive, then mail them directly to Blue Cross for a reimbursement.

I could never have made it through the summer without the help and support of the SMUSA executive — Ian Morrison (who supervised the implementation of many of the above 26 accomplishments), Oktay Kesebi who, along with summer staff member Stephen Look Tong organized a great Orientation Week, and Dean Tozer, who kept my spending in line. Thanks Guys! Thanks also to summer staff member Andrea MacNair who supervised the Student Discount Program and the improvements at the Desk; and to Rod McLeod, Andrew Byers and Chris Cook, summer staff who made the going much easier. I still can't beat Rod at Video Hockey, but I'm improving. Finally a very special thanks to our full time staff members, Norm, Darcy, Rosemary and Ann — you guys are the greatest! Special thanks to Mrs. Chard (our Registrar), one of SMUSA's greatest supporters who was always ready to give Ian, Oktay, Dean or myself advice and guidance, and let us participate in the mail-out and early registration.

Good Luck in all your courses this semester and I'll see you at the football game on the 10th.

MEDICAL INSURANCE INFO

CANADIAN STUDENTS are covered by or have access to basic hospital and medical coverage in their home province. It is the responsibility of all students to see that they have adequate medical coverage and are in good standing with their provincial insurance plans. If the province requires monthly payments, students must make sure that they are properly enrolled and maintain payments.

STUDENTS with LANDED IMMIGRANT STATUS previous to registration, or with DUAL CITIZENSHIP are eligible for M.S.I. Students on STUDENT VISAS may be eligible for M.S.I. after a certain length of time in the province.

FULL-TIME FOREIGN STUDENTS who are not eligible for basic Canadian medical insurance or who are not enrolled in private medical plans MUST be insured by the comprehensive medical plan (Blue Cross) which has been arranged by the Student Representative Council. (Proof of eligibility in other plans must be shown at the time of registration). The premium is payable with the first installment of fees. Family coverage is available.

This insurance covers charges for hospitalization (standard ward bed) and doctor's hospital and office visits. It is necessary for students to pay their bills directly and then submit receipts to Blue Cross for reimbursement, initially, until personal cards arrive on campus.

A supplementary health benefits plan (Blue Cross), arranged by the Students' Representative Council, is available for FULL-TIME STUDENTS. The cost of the plan is included in the SRC fee that is paid with the tuition fees. Family coverage is available for an additional fee at the time of registration. Each student is issued a registration card from Blue Cross with a personal policy number on it. The number is needed for obtaining any benefits. The card may be picked up AFTER notices are posted that the cards are available, usually around the middle of November.

Supplementary health benefits include:
diagnostic and x-ray services
physiotherapist, chiropractor osteopath, chiropractist, podiatrist
wheelchair rental
ambulance charges (\$50.00)
crutches, splints, braces
out-patient services
prescription drugs (\$2.00 co-pay)
accidental dental (\$1000.00)

PART-TIME STUDENTS Are not eligible for the comprehensive nor the supplementary health plan.
