



The tercentenary of the martyrdom of four of Canada's eight martyrs is being celebrated throughout Canada this year. Ceremonies in their honor were held by the College on March 16th. Most Reverend J. T. McNally, D.D., Archbishop of Halifax, celebrated Pontifical High Mass and Most Reverend A. B. Leverman, Auxiliary Bishop of Halifax, pronounced the panegyric. The martyrs were canonized in 1930 and were declared secondary patrons of Canada in 1940. The pictures on the opposite page, hitherto unpublished, were taken during the canonization ceremonies at St. Peter's in Rome In the first picture Archbishop McNally is shown exercising his prerogative as an Assistant at the Pontifical Throne by holding the candle for the Holy Father. 


