


Each group put on a skit at the campfire on the second night of camp. This group used two of the facilitators as props during their skit.


Before one supper, the leaders had to compeat for food. The winners of this impossible game (passing a bucket of water along a line with your feet) got to eat first, everyone else got soaked.







Frosh did not learn any budgeting skills as they gambled away all their fake money on Casino night.






Catching new students off guard is a frosh leader speciality. Gerard Hall frosh were given an early morning wake up call by these eager leaders.




Pit crew members may share the same vibrant university spirit, but each member proudly wears their own unique make-up style.

Joining the fans, this Crew member waves his arms and proudly chants this years touchdown song, "Who Let the Dogs Out?!"








Another SMU touchdown sends these Pit Crew members rocketing down the grassy slope at Husky Stadium.

Only on a rare occasion will a Pit Crew member venture on the cheerleaders territory. This rookie brought smiles and cheers from the crowd by being the first to mix things up.
















Pub Night


Ho Ho Holy, What a Great Time

Throughout the night, the barriers the work environment disappear, of workers become friends, as everyone is able to show a part their personality that their co-worke would not normally see.






These guys share thier love for the pub like they share their taste in clothes. Coincidentially, two other employees were also sporting the same snazzy blue shirt.

St. Patrick's Day


Let the Good Times Flow






Everyone hoped to capture the luck of the lrish by wearing as much green as possible.

Everyone tried their best to celebrate in true Irish fashion, and after a few pints, students from all over swore they were from Ireland.





In the only performance of its kind, Davida Morris did an amazing job reciting a poem by Shangrila Durham-Thompson that really touched the heart.








Gorgeous dresses, fancy jewelry, beautiful hair and stunning smiles were never hard to find at this event. These girls were a source of smiles all night long.






Fond Memories




Some students take on added responsibility by working as campus or residence security officers. These students help foster and maintain the positive environment at SMU.





















Criminology Society


















Caribbean Society

Residence



Battle of the Floors


Spirited Rivalry




individual team members were hored for their dedication to universports. Awards for Most Valuated Players from each sport were presented as were awards for Male Female Athletes of the Year.



With this status came a lot of expectations and consequently many Huskies chose this season to enjoy career years. The result came in the form of an undefeated regular season and a second consecutive AUS championship.

Wild Card gets Huskies into Final Eight



After an hour delay at the Halifax airport, the group was happy to arrive in Punta Cana.








The first event this year was the most formal, the Grad Ball. It was a classy night of dancing, held at the Conference Hall in Loyola.

On Friday night grads enjoyed a Harbour Cruise. For some, it was their first tour of the harbour.






