
Open Mic Nights

Loyola - Rice Hockey Game



This year Loyola won the challenge for the 6th year in a row, with a score of 8-5.


The teams shake hands afterwards to show that despheated competition, it was just a game.

Teams from all over the Maritimes came together at SMU for a weekend of hockey fun.







For those who did not win prizes, the contest is a chance to have your music heard by your peers and get some feedback on your performance.
















Chad and Chris answered some questions from students at the open forum. Chris MacNeil, won the position of VP Admin by a very slim margin.



The annual SMUSA Christmas party is a tradition that won't soon be forgotten.










For those who didn't survive the night in one piece, you must not be Irish.









Commerce Society Business Dinner


The Commerce Society Business Dinner is an annual gathering of students and representatives from Halifax businesses.


















Commerce


















GradClass



























Off-Campus v



















StudentPeers


Residence Life




Residence Banquet

The Residence Banquet is a party for residence students, with a dinner, awards and a dance to finish the night with a bang.








Only one member per team had the privile participating in this game, so exactly who volunteer to look like this? A quiet game end the morning but after a quick lunch, the teams challenged with limbo.














After the Atlantic Bowl the team stayed on the turf and relished in their victory. They posed for photos, cheered with their teammates and had interviews with the press.






men's hockey

The first event of the week was the Harbor Cruise. Everyone, sat back with their friends, grabbed a drink from the bar on the lower level, and watched the shores float by.


The second event, and most formal, was the ball; a classy evening of dancing. Also during the week was a pub crawl around Halifax's most remembered venues.


Convocation
