SMU - Leaders of Tomorrow

"Ultimately, the Maclean's survey is a testament to the universities themselves. By opening their own books for scrutiny - answering questions on faculty, libraries, average entering grade - they are setting a brave example in public accountability...For the undergraduate, choosing a university need no longer be an educated guess. Let the rankings begin." - Ann Dowsett Johnston

The third annual Maclean's rankings have hit the stands, placing Saint Mary's at number one in its division as Leaders of Tomorrow and fourth in the Best Overall Undergraduate category as a reputational winner.

This year Maclean's has included a guide to their distinct ranking system explaining the post-secondary national scores. "Because of their distinct mandates, the universities in the three categories are treated as separate but equal; they were not combined into a comprehensive list. Maclean's ranks the schools in each category on a range of factors..."

Those factors divide the student body, classes, faculty, finances, library and reputation, each carrying a weight of 20 percent except the classes, finances and library categories

which take 18, 10 and 12 percent respectively. Each of those categories are again broken down into subdivisions weighing factors such as the average entering grade, the proportion who graduate and faculty holding PhD's. With those 21 categories tallied, Saint Mary's finished ninth, dropping down three places from last year's sixth place ranking. SMU followed three other local institutions - Acadia which placed third overall, St. Francis Xavier placed seventh and Mount Saint Vincent maintained their eight place standing from last year.

SMU President, Dr. Ken Ozmon, commented on the university's present national standing.

"The top ranking is very satisfying to Saint Mary's faculty, staff and students. We believe we have one of the finest universities in Canada and the response of those who answered the reputational survey, shows we are headed in the direction expected of Saint Mary's and other similar universities. One of the great strengths is our willingness to provide courses which are relevant and offer those courses at times and in places convenient to traditional and non-traditional students."

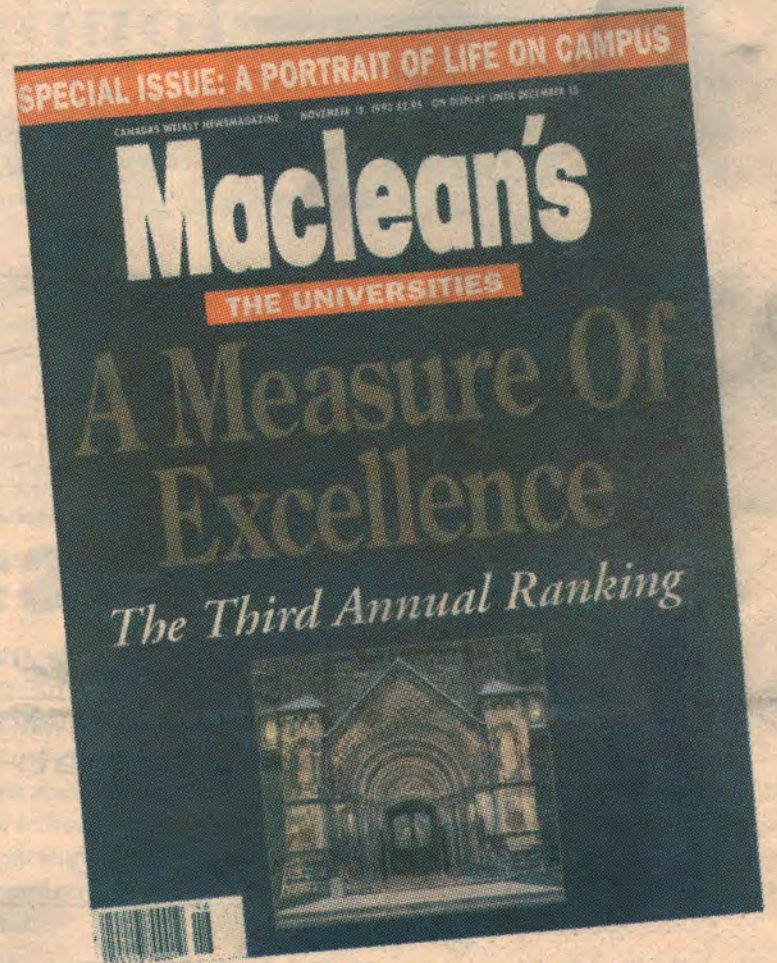
Drug and Alcohol Awareness Week is on its way.

Stern Lobbies For New Sexual Assault Policy

A new sexual assault policy is in the works at Saint Mary's. In a meeting held November 3, a working group consisting of Sexual Harassment Officer Jo Stern, Director of Residences Clay Fowler, Security and Assistant Director of Residence Joe Varner met with Vice-President of Academic and Research Dr. Colin Dodds, Vice President of Administration Guy Noel and Head of Student Services, Keith Hotchkiss. The working group asked that there be a mandate for the university community to develop a policy on sexual assault.

"What we got out of the meeting is a mandate to develop a policy. We now have to form a working group by nominating people from different areas of the university," said Stern. She pointed out that all across North American campuses sexual assault is an issue of concern and that "Saint Mary's is certainly no different in that respect." Stern added, "There are incidents that occur every year. Things happen not only in residence but also on campus." She said that the group feels that it is necessary to have a sexual assault policy in place so that "when incidents arrive you

have an appropriate mechanism for dealing with them."

Varner thinks that the policy is, "a great idea," and felt that the meeting was a "great start to get things off the ground." Varner stated, "I think people realize that there is a need for a policy and they think it's long overdue." He added that there was an attempt last year to have the same policy, but it did not reach completion. The policy now in place is a 24 to 48 hour emergency response for sexual assault victims and Varner added that the new policy should bring more cases to the committee's attention. When asked what the new policy will consist of Varner said, "We're probably looking at a policy that will include the university's feelings about sexual assault, and ways to resolve the problem, including counselling and housing needs."

Jennifer Harris, Vice President of Administration for SMUSA, and Chair for the Sexual Safety Committee at Saint Mary's feels that the new policy will "deal with a lot of issues of sensitivity to the victim." Harris also agrees that the university is in need of change concerning sexual assault policy. "By one-hundred Please see "Policy Proposal" on page 3

When Students Speak, SMUSA Will Listen

Council Opens Doors to Students

Students are the focus of SMUSA's new "town hall" approach to student issues. The Student Union is currently in the process of devising ways of hearing all students concerns on campus. Throughout this month councillors and executive members from SMUSA will be holding floor meetings in residence to talk with students; and on November 28, SMUSA will hold one of their open council meetings in the residence cafeteria.

SMUSA President, Kyle Langille, says the upcoming meetings are an attempt to make the student voice heard. Langille describes his vision of how the student political system should work: "...[what we need is] a bottom-to-the-top perspective, instead of SMUSA being at the top and students below." He goes on to say that another reason the meetings are

taking place is to restore faith in SMUSA. He says, "When students talk about SMUSA they usually don't know we exist."

He hopes that some primary issues will be raised at the talks. "I have a strong feeling communication (between SMUSA and students) will be raised as a problem," he says. Another concern expected to be raised is student's frustration with the registration system. In addition

Langille feels that problems regarding residence will be addressed as well.

Langille indicates that SMUSA will not centre on those students living in residence. He feels that the floor meetings and the council meeting "will be the best vehicle to talk to students." He hopes to see the Students' Association get permission from professors to do classroom talks, possibly starting in 1994.

Residence Representative, Seamus Mannion, spoke of concerns he has heard directly from residence students, and feels these will be brought out during the meetings.

The first concern Mannion hopes to raise is the power failure that happened in residence during a storm last week. "There was no back-up power system so there was no lighting anywhere. If someone pulled the alarm or if there was even a fire, and the building had to be

evacuated, the stairwells were completely black." Says Mannion. "I've had people come up to me and they've been bitching about everything from

security to registration."

Residence Assistant, Michael Banks, thinks that having open meetings is an "excellent idea."

"There have been some housekeeping problems. Some rooms were not ready for students to move into at the beginning of the year, and there is a

leak in the roof." Says Banks.

Another Residence Assistant, Sharon Power, indicates concerns that have been brought to her attention, and wonders if these meetings will do anything to solve them.

"There are all these problems and it seems as though nothing ever gets done." Powers says. She points out the problem of cockroaches in Family Housing. "They send in a person to spray one room to get rid of the cockroaches and the next day, they're in another room."

Commerce student, John Dowers, supports the open council meeting and plans to address union executives about general student concerns. "I just want to let them (SMUSA) know... sometimes it just seems frustrating and something needs to be changed."

The SRC meeting is November 28, at 2:00pm, in the Residence Cafeteria. All are welcome.

Ozmon also explained SMU's standing in the overall ranking after dropping from sixth to ninth place over last year.

"The difference between being ranked at number five and number 10 has been very small in the past. Also funding tends to play too large a role in

Maclean's rankings. Consequently, we tend not to be too worried about the overall ranking."

"Again, in those categories affected by funding, such as class size and library acquisitions, we are hindered by our low level of funding - one of the

lowest in Canada," says Ozmon. "We wonder how much higher Saint Mary's would rank if our funding were at least equal to other universities in the region and across the country."

Within the individual categories, Maclean's highlights some of Saint Mary's strong features regarding faculty and academics. SMU took first for the number of faculty members holding PhD's and also placed high for Medical/Science grants, and Student Services. The university ranked seventh out of 23 universities for graduating students

Students May Pass Job Deadlines

The time to look for a job is now, whether you plan to graduate in the spring or return to classes in the fall.

The Student Employment Centre has already received a variety of notices about the summer jobs and most have deadlines for November or December. Information and applications have been received from Canada Employment and Immigration about the Canada Employment Centre for Students. The deadline for applications for positions in New Brunswick is November 19 and in PEI the deadline is November 26. The centre will receive similar applications soon about the positions available throughout Nova Scotia. Information about the Native Internship Program and from Veterans' Affairs for its Vimy, France positions have also arrived.

have already met varied deadlines and many have had first interviews. Companies who use universities as a source for recruiting, advertise in the late summer and throughout the fall for candidates to meet staffing requirements for the next year. They are looking for students from a variety of academic backgrounds including, but not limited to, Computer Science, Bachelor of Commerce and Master's students from both Science and Business studies.

Students who require advice of information about resumes, cover letters, etc., can also get help from the employment centre. The centre is on the fourth floor of the Student Centre.

and ten percent I think it (a new policy) is needed."

Harris explained that the present system used by the university has defendants of sexual assault in residence pleading guilty and facing punishments decided by Clay Fowler, Director of Residences. Those pleading innocent would face a board of university administration, faculty and students.

Harassment Officer Ready for Interesting Job

"Interesting, overwhelming, frustrating and certainly challenging," is how Jo Stern, Saint Mary's Sexual Harassment Advisor, describes her new job. However, Stern took the job in part because she "loves challenges."

The duties of the Sexual Harassment Advisor is, in a "formal sense," to ensure that the university procedure for dealing with sexual harassment is carried out. This includes talking to people at Saint Mary's who have complaints or issues they would like to discuss, and who want advice on how to deal with these problems.

Stern is "hopeful" that she can provide more than her formal role dictates. She wants to educate students, faculty, and staff about sexual harassment, including education on harassment prevention, as well as teaching faculty to understand why it is important to be "sensitive to sexism" and why this sexism can be damaging. The Sexual Harassment officer also wants to have a "role in looking at sexual exploitation" against women on campus, such as date rape. The emphasis on education is to be proactive in preventing harassment, in addition to dealing with current harassment cases.

On top of education, Stern wants to examine the disciplinary policy at Saint Mary's

which currently does not include action for sexual offenses. She feels that it is important for the university to look at their own response to sexual harassment and to "determine how universities in the 90's will deal with it." She says this must be done everywhere, not just at SMU.

Stern stressed interaction with students, because she feels that students must "get involved" in order to change things. She is "delighted" with the student response she has received so far, explaining that a number of students have already talked to her. She is also pleased with university policies that are currently in place, such as the Peer Office and the additional training that Residence Assistants are given on sexual harassment.

Although this is her first time working at a University, Stern feels that her experience in the area of violence against women is useful. She did not plan to be involved with students but says that she is looking forward to working with young women because it is a "formative time in their lives."

The position is now a part-time one but could possibly be expanded to a full-time office. Stern's office hours are Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., or any other time by appointment. Stern's office number is 420-5113

Computer Aided Career Directions

Peer Counsellors Plug In New Choices

The counseling services on the fourth floor of the Student Centre, has a new look. A new computer assisted career exploration program called Choices CT which will determine, out of almost two thousand choices, the type of occupations that are best suited to you.

Doug Thomas, a student Peer Counselor, can help students determine the types of career options that are best suited to their interests. This is done by entering information on students' preference of work, income, hours, and if they enjoy working with people, or enjoy leadership skills, etc. These are all important factors in narrowing down the fields of work to

the choices that are best suited to the individual.

Lisa Andrewes, a Career/Personal Counselor, pointed out that the computer is not the only way to determine a possible future career. The Strong Interest Inventory test, and the Myers-Briggs test are used to measure personality dispositions and preferences, or individual interests in a variety of occupations. These tests are taken to give the individual a better understanding of their goals and avenues.

Thomas feels that the Choices CT program is an excellent opportunity for students to see new options in their future. "Graduating students can see possible career alternatives, while undergraduates can see

choices in education at Saint Mary's as well as other Universities such as graduate programs." Thomas also said that he would like to see more people coming in and trying out the new program because "Choices is worth while for everyone"

The Career Planning is available for any Saint Mary's student and can help them pick their major, decide the next best step, identify the appropriate and compatible careers and help them find resource material. 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“Let the Ranking Begin”

Maclean's annual ranking for Canadian universities have come full circle since their birth three years ago. The ranking system has gone from a reputational response survey from the president of each institution and data based on the science and arts faculties to a respectable statistical analysis of each institution. The resulting differences are overwhelming.

In 1991, Saint Mary's placed 40th of 46 secondary institutions. 1992 put us up to sixth and 1993 pushed us down to ninth. Figures like those show that either universities have drastically changed, or the ranking system has been ratified. By the magazine's own admission, the system has been changed significantly to place more onus on the vast differences in the nature of those 46 institutions.

SMU's leap up the scale last year can be attributed to several of its strong characteristics and its status as an undergraduate school. This year's ranking system divided all of the universities into three separate categories to include primarily undergraduate universities, comprehensive universities and medical/doctoral universities. Therefore three different universities placed top in their field. Saint Mary's has been categorized as an undergraduate school due to the limited amount of graduate programs offered here. SMU's selling point seems to be the amount of faculty members with PhD's, the graduation to drop out ratio, awards for full time faculty members, medical and science grants and our reputation. Therefore, although SMU's overall ranking is lower than in previous years, reputation wise, we are up there in fourth and first place as the best overall undergraduate school and leaders of tomorrow.

University officials also stress the fact that SMU functions on limited funding - out of 23 universities, Saint Mary's placed 22nd for funding. That proves that this institution is successful and respected while supporting itself through venues such as the Capital Campaign. Which is more than you can say for some Canadian universities that have operating deficits in the millions.

Aside from SMU's ranking, universities throughout the region show strength in academics and reputation with Nova Scotian universities alone taking four of the top ten spots for undergraduate studies. In a separate division of the survey, *Maclean's* asked national graduates to rate their university. For graduate satisfaction, Nova Scotia finished first - 88.6% satisfied with the quality of teaching; 77.3% stated that their institution adequately prepared them for the job market and 81.9% would attend the same institution again.

But aside from all the stats and opinions how much faith do Canadians place in the annual ranking? For a university to jump from 40th to sixth place over the span of a year makes for a lot of confusion among the masses. The change of format for the *Maclean's* survey obviously has a lot to do with that jump and provides a more accurate analysis. But an analysis for who? *Maclean's* states within the feature that "the first ranking proved popular with the readers - and contentious within the ivory towers. From the media attention given to the initial survey and commentary on the subject it seems that the public placed about as much faith in the *Maclean's* "Measure of Excellence" as they do in daytime television. How much respect can be given to a survey that judged 46 Canadian institutions on a reputational and statistical survey based on the science and arts faculty of each school? The format may have changed, but has the reputation? The damage may already have been done.

While the ratings and statistics show that the *Maclean's* system has improved over the past two years, their initial reputation as a controversial feature may prevent students from using it as "a critical tool to use in making one of the most important decisions of their lives," and more for entertainment

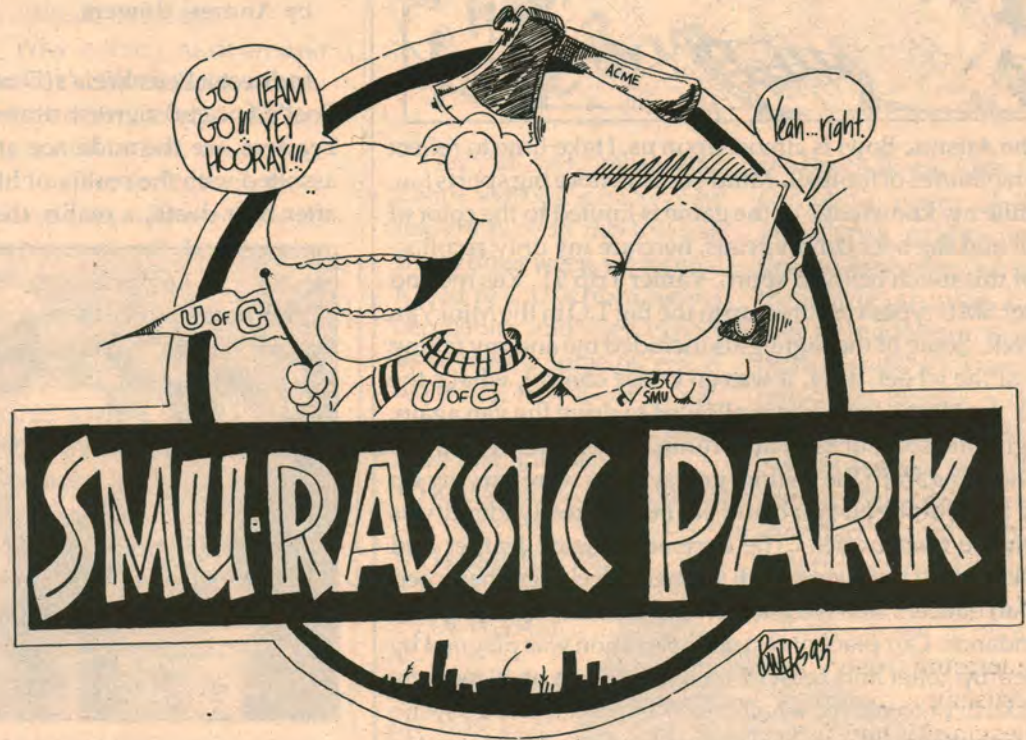

First of all, we the victims and or supporters do not appreciate being referred to as "Lynch Mobs". We are trying to fight for our personal rights and criticism that refers to us as such are hardly fair to us.

The public outcry mentioned is probably due to the idea that these incidents occurred over a month ago and are still waiting for something to be done. People living in residence who have committed such offences as

pulling fire alarms and such have been expelled from residence almost immediately following the incident. The offences of pulling a fire alarms and that of rape are hardly of the same degree of seriousness and maybe the processes for dealing with them are a little backward? We believe in innocent until proven guilty but for a moment put yourselves in our place where you KNOW what really happened to you. See how wonderful it is to, upon finding the courage to come forward with such a painful experience, have to wait weeks and weeks for something to happen. How can anyone think that we would do anything like this to ourselves and to our lives if it wasn't the truth? Only if they were really uninformed and uneducated of the facts of sexual assault. Our advice? Get educated before you pass judgement.

Sexuality: a continuum

A post secondary education is not simply what you learn from the lecture hall. An important part of what it will give you is an understanding and appreciation of the widely different lives and experiences of others. One of the areas of experience that often influence perceptions of people to an unreasonable degree is sexuality. Sexuality is a complicated issue. Sexuality is a continuum, including everybody's sexual behaviour and feelings, and just because someone does not fit neatly into a definition does not mean they should feel uncomfortable with their sexuality.

Although the gay and lesbian community comprises ten percent of the population, it has always been part of society, but it has often been an unacknowledged and persecuted part. A disproportionate number of teen suicides are gay or lesbian (up to 70%). Same sex relationships are not legally recognized in the same way that opposite sex ones are. And only very recently have gays and lesbians been provided with any legal protection against discrimination.

Homophobia and abuse are still a reality for gays, lesbians and bisexuals everywhere. We

hope that an understanding of sexuality will help change this. It is believed that many forms of homophobia and homophobic abuse stem from fear; a fear that is different from the norm; or fear of gay/lesbian feelings on the part of the abuser, which he or she is afraid to acknowledge or examine. If sexuality can be openly discussed, it should fight the fear of something that is mysteriously 'different', and gay/lesbian/bisexual feelings will no longer be something that people are reluctant to acknowledge.

After surviving an airplane crash, and leading numerous survivors to safety, Max discovers that at the few moments before impact he found a new person within himself, one that accepts death with open arms, and spiritually transforms into a man that soon lives life for the moment. Trapped within his own mind and reasoning, he baffles psychologists, and lives in a state of denial, that the plane crash was a bad thing. Until he crosses paths with fellow survivor Carla (Rosie Perez), his life of self absorption would have continued. While Max lost his best friend and business partner in the crash, Carla had her young son taken from her in the incident. Through Carla, Max finds a purpose and direction for his misguided intentions. Carla, withdrawn from her family and her world, blames herself solely for her child's death. Max sees himself as a prophet, one who can direct her through the grieving process and make her realize that the fault does not lie from within herself.

Sounds heavy, I know. *Fearless* marks a return to a film style I haven't witnessed since Adrien Lynes *Jacob's Ladder*. The matter of a man escaping death, but being plagued by its

These two films are no more an extension of the 60's thriller *Carnival of Souls*, a film that delved into the notion that escaping death can be ten times worse than actually dying.

Bridges, looking like he just left the *Vanishing set*, is a star that is much more believable as an every day commoner, much more than say Mel Gibson or Robin Williams, for the simple fact that his status as a Hollywood heavy weight has never climbed. That makes his work in films of this proportion more enjoyable, and credible. His work in this

both lend familiar faces to the movie. My only problem lies within the casting of Rosie Perez as Carla, the distraught mother. Perez is fine in light hearted comedies and dramas (*White Men Can't Jump*, *Untamed Heart*), but perhaps in an attempt to broaden her horizons, she has found one wall she can't scale.

Fearless, is a heavy film, marred by an ending, I'm not quite sure was appropriate, there's no denying a lot of questions will arise when you watch it. But that's the significant importance of a film like this. It actually makes you think. It might even change your perspective of life, when the curtain falls. 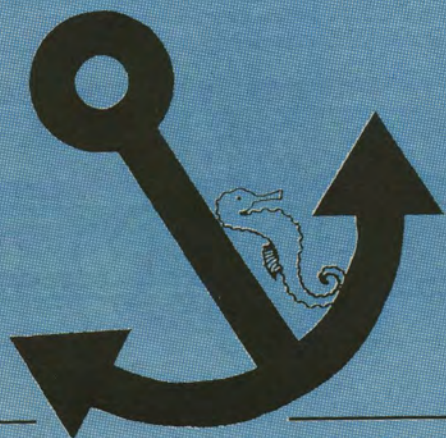

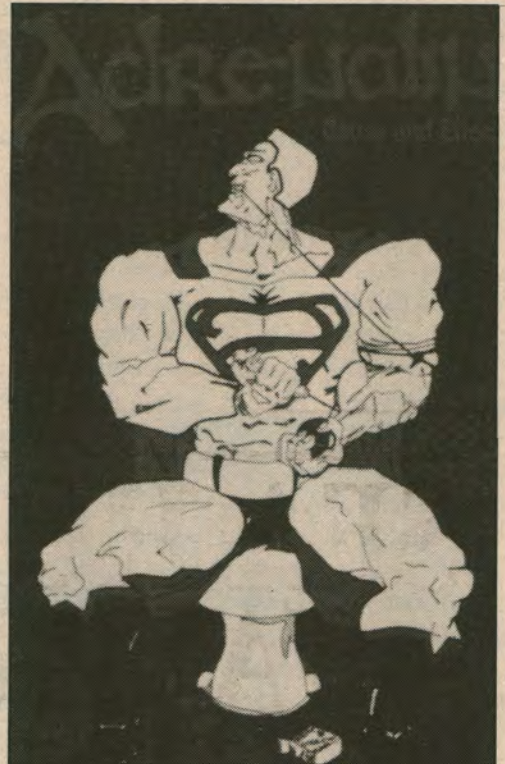

What's hot in Canadian music?

Discs from north of the 49th

The past month has been a busy one in the Canadian music industry. New bands and established acts have released discs during the past five weeks. Here is look at four popular Canadian acts.

Crash Test Dummies God Shuffled His Feet BMG

It is one of those love it or hate it voices. Fortunately for Crash Test Dummies lead singer Brad Roberts more people seem to fall in the first category. The release of *The Ghosts That Haunt Me* in 1991 exposed people to Roberts' deep and distinctive baritone voice. The Winnipeg band's second CD *God Shuffled His Feet* proves that Roberts is much more than a great voice. Roberts is clearly the brains behind this band as he handles the song writing and music arrangements.

God Shuffled His Feet is far less folk and Celtic than the band's debut CD but should not alienate fans. This time around grinding guitar sounds are more common than the mandolin and accordion which were prominent on *The Ghosts That Haunt Me*. Also more prominent on the second CD are the backup vocals of Ellen Reid.

The first song Roberts ever wrote, *Superman's Song*, was a smash hit and gave the rookie band invaluable exposure. Once again Roberts employs his interesting and sometimes peculiar take on life for material. *God Shuffled His Feet* is every bit as good as *The Ghosts That Haunt Me* which won the acclaim of critics everywhere.

Sarah McLachlan

fumbling towards ecstasy Nettwerk

There are some who contend that all Sarah McLachlan songs sound essentially the same. This can be either a good or bad thing depending on how much one enjoys the Halifax native's emotion drenched vocals.

fumbling towards ecstasy is similar to *Solace* (1991) and *Touch* (1989) with McLachlan's beautiful voice and deeply intimate song writing dominating all three CDs. The first single from the CD, *Possession*, is easily the best of the twelve songs. It is as close as McLachlan comes to mainstream pop.

By sticking to the same formula McLachlan may please her fans but it is unlikely this disc will gain her many new fans. For McLachlan the praise of critics has always been far greater than her commercial success. She is often mentioned in the same breathe as Kate Bush and Sinead O'Connor but has not yet gained mass appeal.

Lawrence Gowan ... but you can call me Larry Anthem

While the guy now uses his first name his music remains the same. Catchy guitar driven boy meets girl songs continue to be a staple for Gowan. The first single, *When There's Time (For Love)*, has become a quick hit— something Gowan needed badly after the lack of attention paid to his 1990 disc *Lost Brotherhood*.

... but you can call me Larry is a quality disc full of potential hits which should make Gowan the comeback artist of the year. Several tracks feature little more than acoustic guitar, drums and Gowan's richly tex-

ured voice. This simplicity gives many of the songs their appeal. The songs range from the quick and upbeat *Dancing On My Own Ground* to the slow love ballad *Cry On My Shoulder*.

Spirit of the West faithlift Warner Music

faithlift is a continuation of Spirit of the West's transition away from Celtic and folk influences into a more mainstream pop-rock band. This could be the breakthrough disc for the Vancouver band which has been toiling in near obscurity for ten years. *Airplay for the first single, and if venice is sinking*, has been strong with the exception of CHUM FM in Toronto. The station has banned the song because of complaints concerning the use of the word erection.

faithlift is an eclectic mix of songs which range from the heavy metal sounds of *6th floor* and *bone of contention* to the soft folk and Celtic sounds of *sadness grows* and *death on the beach*. Lyrically faithlift gets the message across in a more subtle fashion than previous Spirit of the West material. The song writing team of lead singer John Mann and Geoffrey Kelly tackle issues such as the 1992 Giant Mine explosion in Yellowknife (mum's the word), sexual abuse in the Catholic Church (god's apprentice), a married man discovering that he is a homosexual (sincerely yours) and the arrest of Pee-Wee Herman (bone of contention).

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SMU Basketball heads to N. B. for season openers

Rookie Shines for SMU

A 21 point performance from rookie Jadranka Crnogorac was not enough to power the women's basketball Huskies to a win over UNB in their season opener this past weekend. The Huskies travelled to New Brunswick on Saturday to take on the Varsity Reds, but were denied a win as the home team downed SMU by a score of 76-66.

Among other Huskies, first year player Shawna Wright tallied twelve points, while Sammie Eaton and Angie Brooks both pitched in ten points each. Laura Swift had 22 points for the Reds. "On a whole, I'm pretty pleased with our performance, we went down by about eighteen points in the second half and came within six towards the end" commented SMU coach Jill Healy, going into her seventh year.

The Huskies have to be relatively pleased as their last meeting with UNB ended in a 103-57 route in favor of the reds in

the 1992 season. Though not to draw comparisons of this year's team with last year's. The new look Huskies feature a crop of eight rookies to choose from. The experience aspect should be covered by fourth year players Angie Brooks and Randi Lang and also a strong performance from third year player Mary MasDonald.

Last season's Rookie of the Year, Lori Messar, should also assume a more important role with the Huskies this year and will experience a lot more playing time, as other leaders are missing. Three fifth year players, Christina Chadwick, Suzanne Muir, and Tina Creelman were all lost to graduation last year. This is the second year in a row, the huskies have lost three valuable players to graduation.

After last year's not so great numbers in the win column, Healy's team definitely has the cast and potential to improve, "Things will certainly turn around. We are getting a lot of scoring from different people and I think we are a bit stronger

this year."

Coach Healy is also impressed by the highly recruited rookie from Prince Andrew High school, Jadranka Crnogorac, whose current team leading performance makes her an obvious candidate for AUAA Rookie of the year honours. "She has been shooting over fifty percent from the field this year (exhibition and regular season) whose offensive potential is unlimited. She is probably one of the best offensive shooting guards in the conference", added Healy. Crnogorac also had a trio of treys to highlight her 21 point performance on Saturday.

The Huskies will travel to Montreal this weekend to take part in the Concordia Classic, which will feature Saint Mary's going up against nationally ranked top ten teams such as Laurentian.

The SMU squad plays the Acadia Axettes on November 23rd and will host crosstown rivals, Dalhousie, in their season home opener on the 28th. Both games are 6pm starts.

Huskies tie Panthers 4-4

The Saint Mary's hockey Huskies' trip to Prince Edward Island ended the same way it did last season, as the Huskies skated to a 4-4 overtime tie with the University of Prince Edward Island Panthers in Atlantic Universities Hockey Conference action Saturday in Charlottetown. SMU managed to come away with just one point against UPEI last year, playing to a 7-7 draw.

The tie leaves Saint Mary's in second place in the AUHC's Kelly Division with a 4-2-1 record for nine points, three back of the 6-0 Saint Francis Xavier X-Men who are ranked

#1 in the nation. The Panthers are 0-4-2 in the MacAdam Division for fourth place, one point ahead of Mount Allison.

Jerrett DeFazio notched his fifth and sixth goals of the season to pace the Huskies attack, including the game-tying effort on the power play at 5:35 of the third period. Aaron MacQuarrie and Alex Herbison added singles and Steve Kluczkowski meshed a pair of assists for Saint Mary's, who led 3-1 after two periods.

Kevin White found the back of the net twice for the home side, numbers six and seven for him this season, and Paul Crabbe and Cory Power supplied the other UPEI goals.

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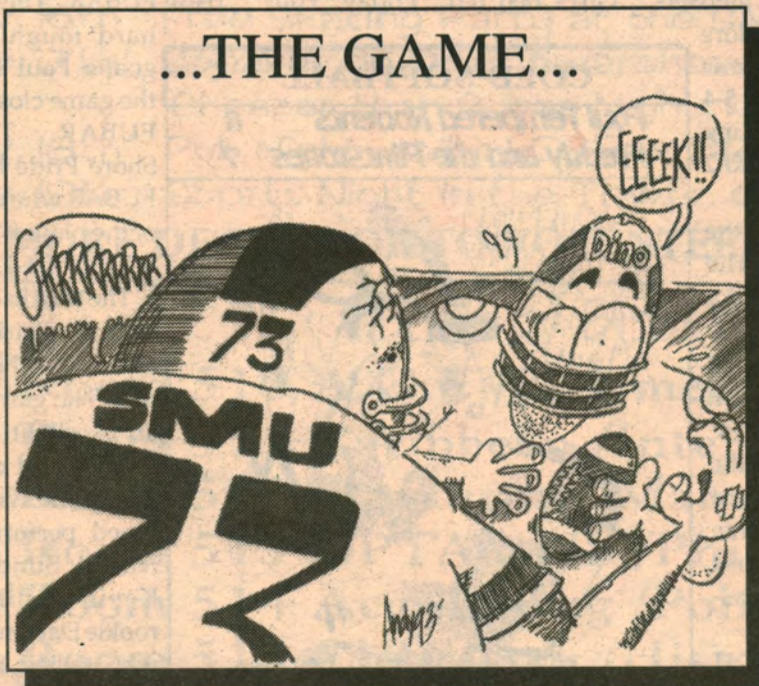
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
