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SMU professor co-author of e-business book

SMU Astronomy and Physics student wins research position

Sean McGee is the only university student from Atlantic Canada who will have the honour of conducting intense summer work at one of the most well known and respected research facilities in the country. McGee, who is a third year honours student in the Astronomy and Physics program at Saint Mary's, has been awarded almost \$10000.00 to conduct research at the Tri-University Meson Facility in Vancouver, British Columbia. As well, the organization is also providing him with a \$2000.00 scholarship for his studies in astronomy and physics at Saint Mary's. Only a handful of students from across Canada are fortunate enough to win such a

summer research position as well as receive funds for the 2001/02

academic year.

"This is a rare, and truly wonderful opportunity", smiles McGee. "I definitely want to take advantage of this experience."

He will be working in the Isotope Separator and Accelerator (ISAC) complex, the organizations newest state-of-the-art-facility. He has been assigned to work on the DRAGON Project where he will use a spectrometer to measure the reaction rates of nuclear reactions responsible for the synthesis of elements in explosive nucleosynthesis. This spectrometer is presently being assembled, and it is expected to be ready for the first measurements with acceler-

ated radioactive beams upon his arrival in early May.

"This summer research will help me as I plan to attend graduate school and study particle physics or a related field," says McGee. "This will be my first exposure in conducting research at a major facility. I am sure this will be a great experience."

While his hard work in studies and research earned him the top-notch research job and scholarship, he is quick to credit the Saint Mary's Faculty in the Astronomy and Physics Department for their role in the application process.

"Dr. Malcolm Butler and Dr. George Mitchell are two professors who took the time to lend a helping hand," he

The Baccalaureate Service has been a traditional part of the graduation week activities for many years, and this year will be no exception. Saint Mary's began as a Catholic, all male school, and at this time everything was housed within McNally, including the church, which was what is now known as McNally East. Since the school was all Catholic the graduation ceremonies included a mass, and this is the origin of the modern Baccalaureate service.

Today's student population includes many religious beliefs in addition to Catholicism, and the baccalaureate service tries to accommodate as many as possible; it is approximately 45 minutes long,

and is an inter-faith service with contributions from as many religions as possible. For instance, last year's service included readings from the Baha'i, Buddhist, Christian, Jewish, Hindu, and Mi'kmaq traditions. This isn't to say that these will be the only traditions represented this year, but simply an example of the diversity that was recognized at the baccalaureate service last year. The purpose of the service is to give thanks to all those who have helped us through our university career, and think of hopes for the future in all of our endeavours.

Music is also an important part of the service. The students are often piped into the service wearing full academic regalia (gowns), and then music is provided through the

service by singers, a string quartet or the likes.

Saint Mary's has many traditions, and this is one that recognizes the Catholic history of the school while incorporating all of the diverse influences of today's students to keep the tradition current. This year the baccalaureate service is being planned for Sunday, May 13, which is Mother's Day. To recognize this, a family luncheon will be planned for around noon, and the baccalaureate service will follow this. Saint Mary's commerce students place third overall in national competition

Two Saint Mary's students were in Kingston Ontario last week to take part in the national final of the Inter-collegiate Business Competition. The competition was held at Queens University. Garon Meikle and Sandra Howe have been preparing since last summer for the intense competition that took place last weekend. Their hard work and dedication earned them a top national spot in one of Canada's most talked about case competitions.

Saint Mary's placed just behind Queens University and the University of Calgary. Placing after Garon and Sandra were McGill, Concordia and the University of British Columbia.

Dr. Barry Gorman, an accounting professor at Saint Mary's and coach of the team said that the teams placing was "Outstanding".

"Listening to the team's comments during and after the event, I am certain that the personal experience and sense of achievement will stand them in good stead (for) years to come." Said Gorman.

Historical controversy surrounding Pope Pius XII and the Vatican

Last Thursday night Fr. Gerald Fogarty, SJ, member of the International Vatican-Jewish Historical Commission and Professor of Religious Studies and History at the University of Virginia, gave a lecture based around the historical controversy surrounding Pope Pius XII during the holocaust. Fr. Fogarty was well received by the audience of about one hundred and thirty people. There was time for a question and answer period at the end of the lecture, at which point some questions about this quite controversial subject were answered by the well-spoken guest. Fr. Fogarty handled the questions with precision, demonstrating his vast knowledge of the subject material.

Although no definite conclusions can be drawn about such a sensitive and subjective issue, it was stated that the level of involvement in the Holocaust by the Pope was limited by certain factors. At the time of the war, the horrors of the Holocaust were not fully realized. Add to this the fact that interference by any Bishop or holy man was frowned upon by the church, as the politics of war are and were very complicated.

Fr. Con Mulvihill, SJ, of Saint Mary's University said that "The lecture went very well, and the speaker was a very knowledgeable scholar."

In order to promote better relations with the world Jewish community, the Vatican and an international group of Jewish leaders appointed an international Catholic-Jewish Commission - made up of three Catholic and three Jewish Scholars - to study the published documents and determine whether any major gaps in the historic record exists.

While the Jewish scholarly community - among others - is pressing for full access to Vatican archives, Fogarty believes that much published material, especially that contained in the 11 volumes published between 1965 and 1981, has not been fully exploited, particularly by Jewish scholars. The Vatican archives have been opened to researchers through 1921, which includes the papacy of Pope Benedict XV, but remain closed after 1922, with the exception of the 11 volumes from world war II.

Fogarty, a scholar of church history, is a specialist in Vatican-American diplo-

matic relations and has written numerous books, articles and academic papers on the subject. The Saint Mary's University Chaplaincy and the Dalhousie Roman Catholic Chaplaincy sponsored Thursday's lecture.

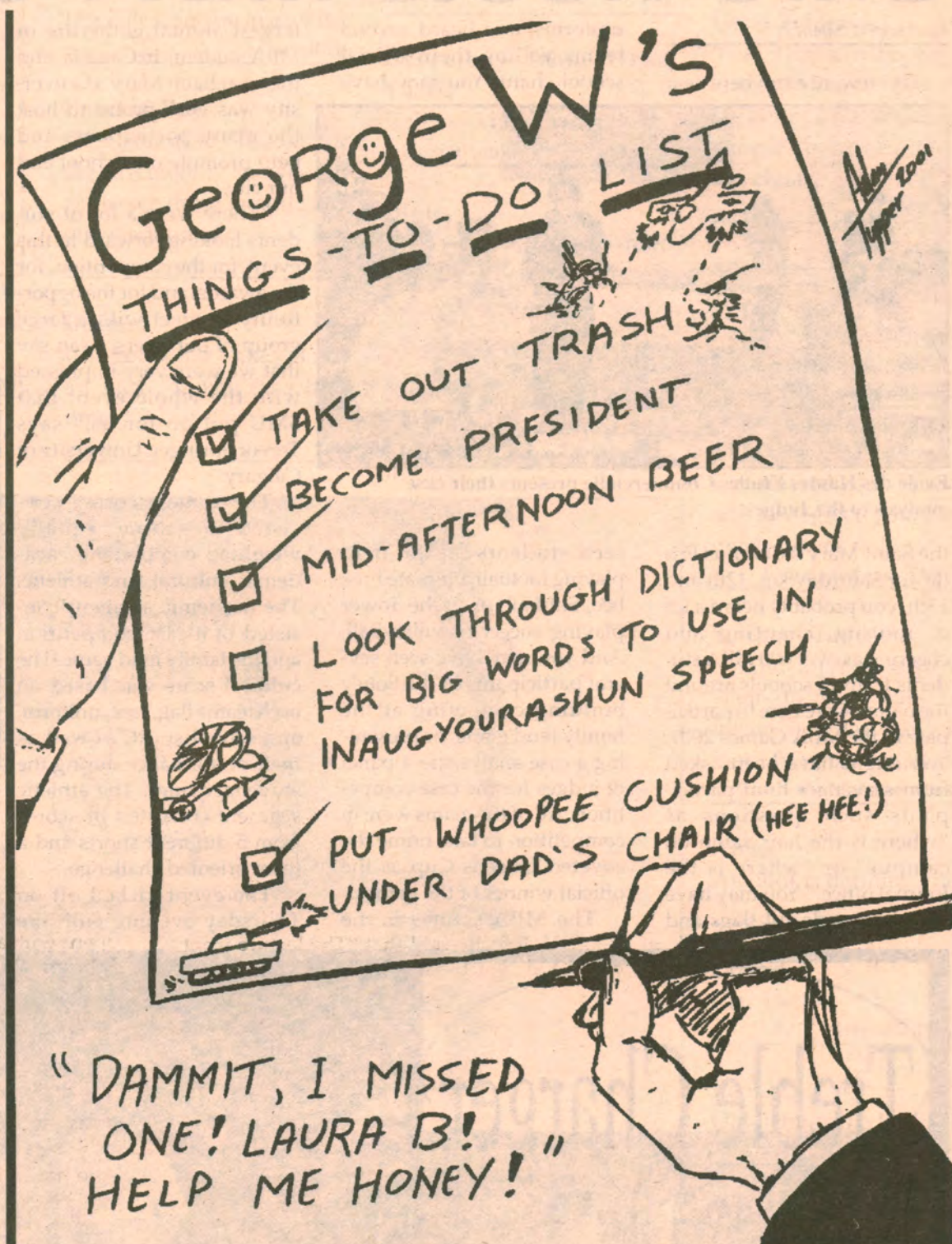

largest annual gathering of MBA students in Canada, and this year Saint Mary's University was very proud to host the many participants and help promote our school and our city.

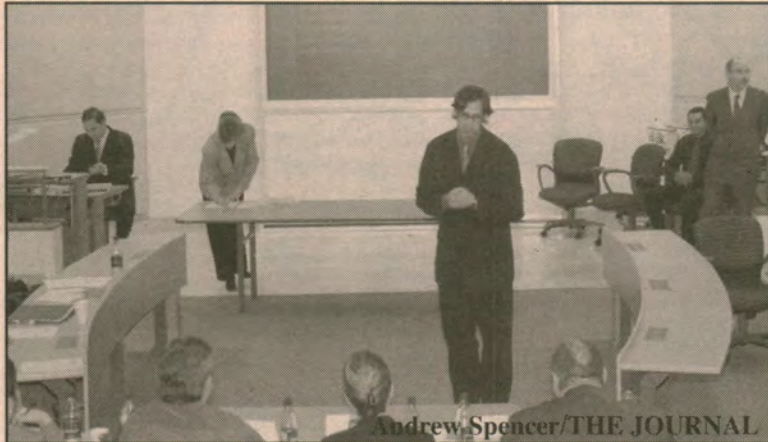

Antitrust no one

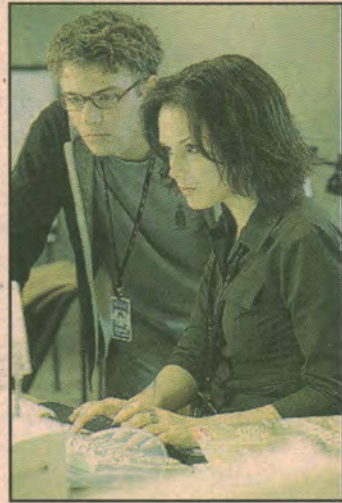

Huskies test Tigers

The Dalhousie Tigers women's team may be 10-0,

Some bad court decisions and shots not falling, allowed the Huskies to claw their way back. The Tigers had sloppy

as Kristi-Jo Robinson made a clutch shot, that was a two pointer, rather than a three that could have tied the game.

The game ended with the Tigers coming away with a win, but a very close win at 61-60. Saint Mary's coach, Jill Jeffery commented that foul trouble early on in the game, caused some problems for the Huskies, as Julie Galipeau played a limited game.

"We didn't play our best defense in the first half. We had a lot of starters in foul trouble. Our key starters have to do a better job starting the game and staying in the game," Jeffery said after the game.

With this loss, Saint Mary's falls to 5-5, while the ninth ranked Tigers move to 10-0. Kristi-Jo Robinson led all scorers, finishing with 15 points while Julie Galipeau, leading scorer and rebounder in the league, had 13 for the Huskies. Angelia Crealock led the way for Dal to get the tight win with 13 points, while Janice King had 11.

In men's action, the Huskies held off the Tigers 73-62. The No. 7 Huskies came out in the first half looking for a win against the young Dalhousie Tigers, holding them to only 23 points. But an early twelve point lead at the half, began to fall in the second. The Huskies came out strong in the first half, but in the second, they lacked emotion. Defensively, the Huskies allowed the Tigers to gain 40 points in the second half.

Huskies coach Ross Quakenbush was happy with the win, but not happy or satisfied with the way his team played against the Tigers.

"In all honesty I would have liked to play better. I don't think we played as well as we might have. We were just flat," Quakenbush

commented, "I guess sometimes that's the way things go."

The Tigers picked their way back into the game,

slowly but surely, but a young team makes young mistakes, like 18 turnovers.

"We came out poor in the first half, and we had to step up but we didn't," Dal guard Oreine Davis said. "We started out better in the second half, but didn't finish the job."

A career threatening injury to second year player Craig Slaunwhite may also be putting a damper on the Tigers this season.

Fourth year sprinter Jayson Hilchie, last years CIAU silver medallist in the sixty metre sprint, proved to the nation that he is the man to beat once again this year. In his heat, Hilchie blazed a CIAU number one time of 6.86 seconds. Two hours later he was again in the blocks facing Dalhousie rookie Patrick Benjeman, the provincial

record holder in the 100 meter sprint. Hilchie had a powerful start and took control of the race at the 40 meter mark, clearing the field and improving on his heat time with a 6.85 clocking.

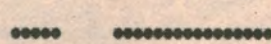

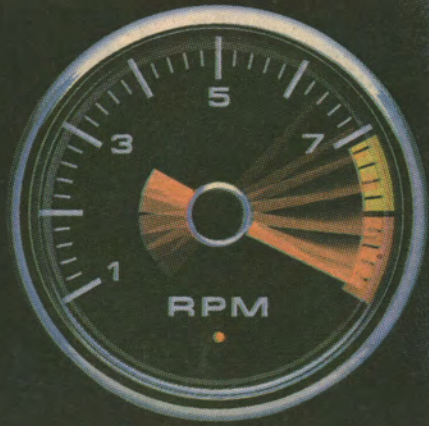
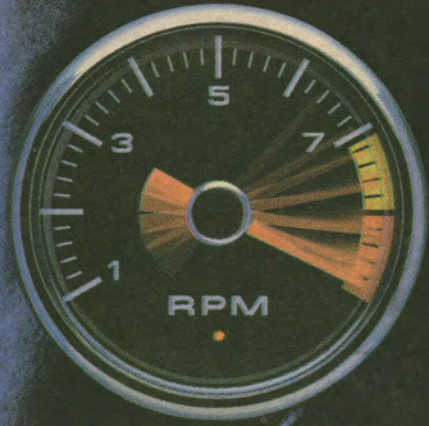
