

HOW TO VOTE

The Liberal party is corrupt. The Conservatives say they're not corrupt, but their track record shows differently. The NDP sounds nice, but they haven't had a chance to govern federally and if they get one they may prove to be just as corrupt as the other two big parties. The Greens have lots of fabulous ideas, but even their supporters are upset with the party. The Marxist-Leninists are communists (not that there's anything wrong

On Monday, January 23, those are your choices in the federal election. They don't sound like great choices, but each of you reading this likely has a preference for one of these parties. If you don't have a preference and you don't care to make an informed choice, you should still go to the polls, even if it's just to spoil a ballot. Political parties which achieve 4% or more of the popular vote get \$1.75 for every vote they receive so, if nothing else, you should view the election as a chance to decide where your tax dollars are going to be spent.

People living on campus can vote at the Inglis Street Elementary School which is located right across the road from the St. Mary's campus. Polls are open on the 23rd from 8:30 am until 8:30 pm. If you can't make it on the 23rd, there are advance polls on the 13th, 14th, and 16th of this month. The advance polls are open from 12 noon to 8 pm.

Anybody not living on campus curious about where their poll is located can go to www.elections.ca and type in their postal code to find out what riding they are living in. Then by clicking on the "Where do I vote?" link they will be given the information on where the rest polling station is located

For you people who aren't from the area and are wondering if you can vote here, you can. According to Elections Canada, you have the option of voting for a candidate in either the riding where you are voting or in the riding where you are from (provided you know who the candidates are in the riding).

If you're not from the area you're likely not registered to vote here, but that's ok. You can register at the polls. In order to register you'll need to bring at least three pieces of identification. Something that has your name and signature on it (like a credit card), something with your name and address on it (like a driver's licence), and Elections Canada recommends you bring your student identification card to show that you do in fact have ties to the area.

For more info on who to vote for visit their websites. Call and/or write the candidates. Be a pest, if they can't handle questions they probably shouldn't be going to Ottawa.

I will like to use this opportunity to say happy new year to all student, this is another busy semester and the external Affairs office will bring every information necessary to your door step as regard the up coming election. The federal election campaign provides an important opportunity for all Canadians to discuss the ideas and priorities that will shape the country over the next several years. In this campaign, a number of important issues will be discussed, but one that I would like to call your attention to is the state of Canada's system of post-secondary education. One of the MPs I was talking to in Ottawa basically told me that student don't vote, that's why some MPs don't think about education, but this time the president and I has been working tirelessly and taken up the responsibility to bring to the students every information they need as regard to the federal election and to prove that particular MP wrong that students actually make a difference in election. Below is what the political parties think

CONSERVATIVE PARTY

The Conservatives have several proposals for reforming our post-secondary education system, but they do not list education as one of their top priorities. They have not released a full platform but they announced their proposals early in the campaign and also responded to our survey.

The Conservatives acknowledge that high tuition fees are one of the main issues facing students in Ca nada. They, unlike the Liberals, commit to creating a dedicated Canada **Education and Training Transfer with** targeted, sustainable funding. The Conservatives want a "long-term, comprehensive agreement" with the provinces on the fiscal imbalance, but do not specifically commit to an Accord on post-secondary education. The Conservatives do not propose an amount for a dedicated transfer or state whether they would undo the Liberals' cuts to transfer payments, but if they succeed in improving the funding arrangement for colleges and universities than the root cause of tuition increases can be addressed.

Student Debt

The Conservatives acknowledge that student debt is a serious problem, and hopefully they could address tuition rates through a dedicated transfer. Other than the transfer, however, they propose nothing to directly address student debt.

One of the keystones of the Conservative post-secondary platform is a tax credit for students of up to \$500 per year to cover the cost of textbooks. While the ever-increasing cost of books and supplies is a serious issue for students, a tax credit is not an effective solution to this problem. Tax credits do not improve affordability or accessibility. Tax credits do not offer a financial benefit until you are actually paying taxes, so students generally not claim them until they are graduated and earning significant income. Many tax credits are simply transferred to a parent - regardless of whether the parent actually incurred the costs. If the Conservatives wish to help students pay for the costs of books and supplies they should do so through a grant which will provide students with the money when they

The Conservative commitment to amend the expected parental contribution requirements for student loans will significantly improve accessibility. however. It will ensure that student have access to \$20 million more per year in needs-based funding.

The Conservatives have unfortunately not made any commitment to extending the Canada Access Grant or any other assistance targeted at improving

Student Financial Assistance

As mentioned, it is unfortunate the Conservatives focus on their book tax credit, as tax credits are not effective at improving accessibility. The tax exemption for scholarships and bursaries is a welcome proposal, however as it prevents students from losing a portion of their awards to the tax system

The Conservatives unfortunately do not call for a holistic review of the student financial assistance system, but they do address what isthe one of the most serious problems with the Canada Student Loan Program, the issue of expected parental contribution. Many students from middle-income families do not receive enough financialassistance because the Student Loans Program expects their parents to pay an unrealistic portion of their education. If the Conservatives improve this assessment it will mean many students will receive funding to cover a more realistic portion of their educational expenses

The Conservatives wish to review the Millennium Scholarship Foundation but do not provide any details other than ensuring the Foundation "assists as many students as possible"

GREEN PARTY

The Green Party did the best in our Report Card last year. They have released their full platform and have responded to our questionnaire.

The Green Party supports the creation of a dedicated transfer for post-secondary education. They go further, however, and propose to work with the provinces to freeze and reduce tuition across the country. This is exactly what is needed, but will be a very difficult task as tuition is regulated by the provinces. The Greens are committed to working with the provinces in this regard, but they do not make a suggestion as to the amount of funding that would be

Student Debt

The Green Party wishes to transform our financial assistance system into a needs-based grant system which would reduce - and eliminate at least the federal portion of - student debt. Accessibility

The Green Party wish to harmonize all student assistance into a needs-based grant system, which would significantly improve access to post-secondary education. They would also remove the GST from educational supplies. Furthermore, the Green Party would draft a "Contract with Youth" guaranteeing accessibility

Student Financial Assistance

A needs-based granting system would improve accessibility and simplify the financial assistance system. The Green Party unfortunately does not go into detail regarding how this system would work and what it would

LIBERAL PARTY

The Liberals' fiscal update at the end of the last parliament contained several post-secondary commitments. They have not yet released their platform, but they did respond to our survey and recently announced several new post-secondary proposals. Tuition

The Liberals' "50/50 Plan" to cover 50% of tuition for the first and last year of all undergraduate students' education will bring much-needed relief to post-secondary students.

This plan will save students up to \$6000 in tuition over the course of their degree or diploma. Providing students with a grant to cover tuition is a much more effective way to help students deal with high tuition fees than tax credits. That being said, students should still be allowed to claim 50% of the Tuition Tax Credit and 100% of the Education Tax Credit (this credit applies to non-tuition expenses), which the 50/50 Plan does not seem to permit. While targeting assistance at the first and final years may promote accessibility and retention, it will still leave students struggling to pay their tuition in the intermediate years. It is unknown whether or not the tuition grant willbe subtracted from Student Loans or other grants that a student will be receiving, but hopefully it is not.

The most disappointing aspect of the Liberals' post-secondary education platform is the absence of a commitment to address funding. During the last campaign Paul Martin committed tocreating a dedicated transfer payment for PSE eventually reaching \$7-8 billion. The Liberals then reneged on the promise and are not agreeing to it in this campaign Without increasing funding to our colleges. and universities, tuition can continue to increase and this will erode the effectiveness of the Liberals' tuition grant. Furthermore, universities and colleges could simply increase tuition in the first and final years so that they, rather than students, profit from the grant.

While the Liberals will not commit

to a dedicated transfer for PSE, their proposal for \$1 billion in infrastructure renewal funding and \$1.2 billion to fund indirect costs of research will provide financial relief for our postsecondary institutions.

Student Debt

The Liberals' 50/50 tuition grant will decrease the debt burden for many students. The Liberals are agreeing to expand the Canada Access Grant to cover up to four years of study. This will provide significant tuition relief to students from low-income families while decreasing their student debt burden. Students borrow to cover many costs, however, not simply tuition. It is disappointing that the Liberal's proposals do not address educational expenses such as living costs. Many students will still have to borrow just as much money in loans even if they use the 50/50 plan, especially college students with low tuition but high living expenses. Accessibility

The Liberals' 50/50 proposal will significantly improve access to colleges and universities in Canada. Their plan to expand the Canada Access Grant to cover four years of study is also very much welcomed by students. This makes the grant a much more significant tool for improving access to post-secondary education for students from low-income families, ensuring that 50% of their tuition is paid. In order to make the grants more effective however, they should cover all costs of education, not simply tuition.

Student Financial Assistance

The Liberals have agreed to review Canada's student financial assistance system to "ensure students from all backgrounds have access to higher education." Thankfully they realize such a review must encompass not just student loans, but all forms of assistance. They have budgeted \$2.2 billion over 5 years to improves the financial aid system, but this includes cost \$600 million per year at maturity. It is unfortunate that they would make such a significant spending proposal before a review has even begun. The expansion of the Canada Access Grant is an excellent step towards targeted financial assistance

The Liberals did not commit to renewing the Millennium Scholarship Foundation or replacing the Foundation's grants should it not be renewed. This is concerning, as the \$2.2 billion pledged for financial assistance is far less significant if students lose the 90,000 grants the Foundation provides annually.

NEW DEMOCRATIC PARTY

The NDP worked during the last parliament to add \$1.5 billion to the federal budget to, among other things, improve access to post-secondary education. The NDP is the only party that has neither released their full platform nor made any education announcements thus far in the campaign. They did respond to our

The lovely ladies in black who take your orders do NOT work for SMUSA. They are employed by the infamous company known simply as Aramark, so in future would you please complain about the right company

Students remain on-campus until the 18th of December. As part of the Saint Mary's Community - by virtue of their tuition paid, and the very fact they are the reason for the existence of the institution itself - student should be able to expect a little more in the way of food services on campus.



survey, however, and this is what we based our evaluation on. Tuition

The New Democrats acknowledge the problem of high tuition fees and the role that cutbacks to federal transfers played in tuition increasing. They, unlike the Liberals, commit to creating a dedicated transfer payment with stable, predictable funding and restoring "as finances permit" \$4 billion dollars back to this transfer. Such an injection of funding would significantly benefit colleges and universities and reduce their reliance on tuition as a source of funding.

The NDP traditionally call for a Canada Education Act, however thus far in this election they have not. In response to our call for a Pan-Canadian Accord on Post-Secondary Education they merely stated they were "committed to working with the provinces."

Student Debt

The NDP commitment to create a dedicated transfer and inject \$4 billion into post-secondary funding could lead to decreased tuition which would also decrease student debt. The NDP wish to review the Canada Student Loans Program to reduce debt, though they did not provide specifics. They also propose creating new needs-based grants.

The NDP was the only party to address Canada's bankruptcy legislation. Student loan debt cannot be discharged by bankruptcy until 10 years after graduation. This is the only exception to bankruptcy with the exception of criminals, and the NDP promise to remove this discriminatory practice to help those who are in dire circumstances because of their debt.

Accessibility

The NDP committed to expanding the Canada Access Grant to cover all years of study and to cover both tuition and educational expenses. This is a very welcome promise that significantly improve opportunities for student from low-income families to attend a post-secondary education institution.

Student Financial Assistance

The NDP has committed to "reexamine the Canada Student Loans Program to create a comprehensive program designed to improve access and reduce the burden of student debt." A review is desperately needed, and hopefully they intend to review the entire financial aid system, and not just the CSLP.

The NDP was the only partly to firmly address the issue of the Canada Millennium Scholarship Foundation, and they do not support renewing the Foundation. They would, however, replace it with a system of needs-based grants. As the vast majority of the Foundation's spending is on needs-based grants, it is not clear how this would be different for students.



"It's a weird time in hip hop."

OLIVIER JARDA TAKES ON KARDINAL OFFISHALL

Somewhere between the first blankets of winter last month I sat down with Canadian hip hop artist/ producer Kardinal Offishall. He's currently on a cross-country tour, and I spoke with him a few hours before he opened for 50 Cent at the Metro Centre. Kardinal has been crooning Canadian airwaves for almost ten years, and has received significant international attention. He's been on BET and MTV, and has worked with the Neptunes' Pharell Williams, Timbaland, and Busta Rhymes.

In 2003, his official debut album was shelved because his record label MCA folded. He came back from the underground with the mixtape Kill Bloodclot Bill, which was named the number one album on the 2004 Toronto Top Discs chart, beating out Death From Above 1979 and Broken Social Scene. In the fall of 2005, Kardinall bounced back with a new label and a vivacious new record destined to burn it up: Fire and Glory.

Q You went to York and studied Mass Communications. Has that helped you get your music out?

A NO. I only did three out of the four years, and really the first couple of years are really BS, nothing you can apply. There are just things you have to do to get on to the next course, prerequisite stuff. With my music, I think that it's definitely been life skills that have helped. I've been able to communicate far before I went to York, not to say that it was totally useless. I think it was useful in the way that it helped me learn to deal with people.

Q In 2003, your album debut wasn't released because MCA folded. You responded by releasing your critically acclaimed mix-tape Kill Bloodclot Bill Vol.1, where you bashed big labels. How do you feel about big labels now that you're back on with EMI?

A|Well it's one of those things where I just approach everything differently now. Even the deal we have now is not a direct signing. For me it's cool because it's kind of an independent situation with big label backing. When we signed with MCA, everything seemed cool but I was kind of green. I was excited being with a major, and especially being a kid from Canada, signing with a label from LA was a big deal. It basically made me a lot smarter, taking care of the business aspect first and foremost.

Q Fellow Canadian rapper Saukrates has said that "Americans don't want you to win". However, you've said they labels can't deny Canadian Content because it's so good. Have you felt any hate from US hip hop artists?

A|Nah. Not from the artists. If anything the artists want you to win. It is true what he's saying when he says that Americans don't want you to win. America is



for America at the end of the day. Even if they embrace you for a while, the bean counters, the execs, people in higher positions, would rather spend money on people from the States.

Q If you look at some of the big names to come out of Canada in hip hop, longevity has been an elusive quality. Maestro shot to the top but couldn't hit it again. How do you address the fact that breakout Canadian hip hop artists usually become extinct very quickly?

A [That problem lies with] hip hop artists in general. The nature of hip hop music is a very 'here today, gone tomorrow' type of thing. It's a weird time in hip hop. People that were the greatest, and it seemed that they would never go anywhere, where are they now? Red and Meth, they came out and had these big successes, and they went away. As far as Canada, and it's quite similar in England, we have to work ten times harder to even get to the same plateau. It takes a lot.

Unfortunately the market for hip hop in Canada is like a walnut with a steel shell. If you don't have the tools to crack it, you gotta say 'is it worth it for me?' I'm talking about hip hop artists, not people that mix different genres in their stuff. It's hard as hell in this country.

Q In order to crack that shell here, it seems that Canadians will only like certain brands of Canadian hip hop, the one that

includes guitars, for example. In August at Toronto's Getting Up hip-hop festival, you smashed a guitar. What made you do it?

In order for you to acquire a certain status in this country, you can't just do straight ahead hip hop. It's like you gotta dip into other genres to bring those fans along. I feel that you should be able to do that hard, hard, hard, shit, and have people still buy your shit. Big acts from the States like 50 Cent will do it and a lot of it doesn't play on the radio, fans are just into the shit. For Canadian artists to do the same thing, you can't just do that straightaway hip hop.

~Fire & Glory~

Q So your new record Fire & Glory dropped last month. Of the tracks that weren't released because MCA folded, you only put three of them on Fire & Glory. How do you feel about the tracks you left off?

KO| It wasn't a quality dispute. I always want to give the fans the latest and the greatest. I wanted to keep up with the times and what was going on with me. Sometimes you need a fresh start. You know when sometimes if you have a beard and you're going through something and you want to shave it off but you might want to just keep the moustache? Same kind of deal

Q Speaking of moustaches, what's with your facial hair in Melanie Durrant's homage to Nancy Sinatra 'Bang Bang'?

A (Laughs) When you do stuff with Melanie she's a fun person and she's willing to take chances. I thought, let me do this thing and give the kids out there a good laugh.

Q You produced 9.5 out of 14 tracks on this new record. Is it important for you to produce your own stuff? Do you think you get better results?

A Not better just different. I knew the type of album that I wanted to deliver. I knew that the glue that was going to keep everything together was to have me produce most of it.

Q There are some heavy Jamaican roots on this album, with some wonderful horns. They sound very authentic, reminiscent of the Wailers' sound

A Honestly that was the sound I was looking for. It's ironic that it was actually an Italian that played the horns, Ivana Santilli. She's dope and she knew what I was trying to accomplish.

Q The track 'Everybody Gone Gangsta' addresses some issues about today's rap game. What do you think about the 'rise of the gangsta'? KO| What I was trying to get across was that it's funny sometimes I'll be driving in random cities and everybody looks the same. Everybody's got this ice grill on, everybody's got the hat pulled low, and the pants that are twenty sizes too big. It's not that there's anything wrong with that, but when everybody's on the same thing, it's hilarious to me. Ten years ago, Nas looked different from Jay-Z, who looked different form Biggie, who looked different from Tribe Called Quest. Now it's like you have these fans that think everybody has to look and act the same. Because right now it's the gangsta shit that's winning, everybody feels like they gotta be that. That's what 'Everybody Gone Gangsta' is about. With hip hop right now we're in a state of redundancy. Everybody's just doing the same thing over and over; everybody sounds the same. The hip hop community's on hold.

Q The song 'Sunday' is one that any mother would be proud of. Did you have any reservations about putting this song on the album?

A Nah! That's one of my favourite joints. I grew up going to church and I'm still a spiritual person. For anybody that's been to church or has had good influences in their life, whether or not you're in church, or whether or not that person that gave you that good piece of advice is there with you, it's just something that you carry with you. It's like a hip hop Sunday sermon that you can play anytime a day and feel a good vibe from it.

Q How do you feel about sampling, and where do you draw the line?

A I draw the line at the ones that cost too much money! As long as it's creative or done tastefully – sometimes people sample stuff and you can tell that it's just an attempt to get some sales. For me it's all about musical integrity.

Q What's in your tape deck?

A I have an iPod with 8,000 songs. We were listening to everything from Coldplay to Bob Marley.

Q What's your stance on illegally downloading music?

A I actually pay for everything. 95% of the time I don't even take promo CDs. I usually go out every Tuesday and buy new stuff. I just believe in Karma. If I download other people's stuff they can do that to me, so I'd rather go out and buy it anyway.

1. I am starting a business in the U.S.A. and I am finding some differences in the Canadian business etiquette, and the American business etiquette. I am from Switzerland and I need some help on how I should be acting in an American business setting. Any tips?

My biggest tip is more in regards to pace then anything; in Canada we tend to allow negotiations to occur at a more moderate pace in comparison to our US counterparts who tend to prefer a face paced setting. This also extends to meals where in Canada you should wait till the other party starts business conversation while eating as it may be deemed inappropriate, unlike the US where a working meal is common. Outside of these tips you may want to brush up on your Spanish and basic knowledge of such sports as American Football/Baseball/NASCAR as they may be used for small talk unlike in Canada where French and Hockey tend to be more appropriate. My last tip I can give you is more a European/North American difference reminder whereby in North America unlike Europe giving a fine wine/spirit is not deemed offensive as it is in many western European countries. Outside of these I would recommend to check out: www.executiveplanet.com (which also happens to be a good source for other countries as well) which can provide you with a few more minor differences.

2. Speaking about the election; what it better – a GST tax cut or income tax? What is each party promising in terms of taxes anyway?

To answer the first question, there is no right answer for everyone. While the GST cut will make a larger day-to-day impact, an income tax cut will become important further down the road. The reason behind this is that GST cuts tends to encourage people to spend more, while an income tax cut tends to encourage people to save more. In terms of exact dollar amounts, as a student you may find GST cuts to be a tad more attractive, but once you graduate you will find the income tax cuts will have the upper hand. To answer the second question: The Liberals are looking to give primarily income tax cuts; the Conservatives are focused on a GST cut and tax credits on things such as bus passes and day care; the NDP is giving no major tax breaks (if anything, they may increase taxes) but they are providing some small benefits for child care and low income families; last but not least the Greens are providing some tax breaks for small businesses and mid to low income families (unlike the Liberals to which it is across the board). In any case I would recommend going to the parties' websites for exact details or go to http://www.ctv.ca/mini/election2006/static/issues/taxes.html where the taxes breaks (or increases) have been summarized.

I have been reading several articles lately on the differences in business practices from country to country. One of my jobs requires me to communicate on a daily basis with business people in China, and it occurred to me how important it is to know what is acceptable and what is not when doing business in foreign countries. It is obvious that the way business is conducted in China is different from the way it is conducted in North America. However, there is an actual term that describes Chinese networking: Guanxi. On businessweek.com, the article The Art of Chinese Relationships explains that it is essential to familiarize yourself with Chinese customs in order to foster lasting mutual relationships. North Americans are notorious for being pushy and straight to the point when it comes to business, and it's even considered a "virtue" to behave this way, as the article explains. In China, Guanxi, which literally translated means "relationships", is a slow process because it requires people to form more personal relationships first and then business oriented relationships second. Chinese business people want to know that they can trust whom they do business with. With Guanxi, business is basically built on friendship (reciprocity), not just exploitation. There are a whole slew of traditions and gestures that we North Americans should be aware of in order to give proper respect to our Chinese counterparts. I highly recommend researching into the values, customs, and traditions in whatever country you may conduct business in because something that may be respectful in one country can be a major obscenity or insult in another.

I thought that idea is what constituted a blog? Reportedly, in recent months, China has been cracking down on the press. Shockingly, according to another online article, Microsoft Shuts Blog Site After Complaints From Beijing, Microsoft has filtered the words "democracy" and "human rights" in one of its Chinese blogging programs (http://www.nytimes. com/2006/01/06/technology/06blog.html). 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SMU hockey takes home Pete Kelly Cup

Most of you were at home with your families on December 29th, eating turkey dinner after turkey dinner, and probably were still doing the same on December 31st. Enjoying this break from books, teachers and grades is an essential part of any university students life, but during the time period mentioned above, the St. Mary's Husky hockey team was spending their break doing the very same thing they do almost all year, playing hockey. From the 29th to the 31st of December, the St. Mary's Huskies were in New Brunswick challenging for the annual Pete Kelly Cup, a Christmas tournament played at the University of New Brunswick.

The Pete Kelly Cup National Men's Hockey Classic featured teams from UNB (naturally), Dalhousie, Manitoba, Saint Mary's, STU and UQTR, and the competition was fierce. When the dust settled, it was the Saint Mary's Huskies in the final facing off against the host team, the UNB Varsity Reds. In a game that saw the Huskies go up by 3 in the second period, ended with UNB making a resilient final frame comeback to tie the gold medal game 3-3 by the final buzzer. With a shootout then needed to decide a victor, the Huskies came out firing during the deciding Saturday finale to leave, as tournament champions.

Ryan Lauzon and Marc Rancourt had the shootout goals in the victory, while Brad Self, Jordan Chomack and Gordon Bell scored for the Huskies during regulation. SMU goalie Cory Roberts made 30 saves for the win, shining during the shootout to ensure his team the victory and himself a spot on the tournament all-star team, along with teammate Brad Self. Corey LeClair of Dal also made the team of all-stars, as he was influential in the Tigers 4-3 victory over the Manitoba Bisons in the bronze medal game.

In league action this past weekend, the Huskies skated to a 3-3 draw with the St. Thomas Tommies. Ryan Lauzon scored 3 goals in a game that the Huskies by all means should have won, but were lucky in the end not to lose. Following up the Friday night action the next night was a match-up against the hottest team in the league, the Moncton Aigles Bleus. With the Huskies down 2-0 early in the contest, Ryan Lauzon led a charged comeback that he capped off by scoring a beautiful go ahead goal late in the second period to put the Huskies up 4-3. Although Moncton came in with a 7 game winning streak, the pack made sure it stopped it there after netting 2 third period goals, the last of which Lauzon sailed into the empty net with just over a minute left to play. SMU Defencemen Tyler Noye and Scott Hotham had huge offensive nights, Noye scoring once accompanied by 3 helpers and Hotham adding a goal and an assist. The Huskies now sport a 10-5-2 record and travel to STU this weekend, hoping to achieve more than a tie against the Tommies this time around.

BASKETBALL DIARIES

In women's Basketball action this past weekend, the Huskies attained victory in a wild one against the Acadia Axewomen. After an entire game of trading shots, turnovers and fouls, the difference proved to be one final missed shot by Acadia forward Becky Mutch. During the final seconds of overtime, Mutch's shot fell just short of going through the netting, with a teasing circular roll around the rim before falling out and giving Saint Mary's a final 68-67 victory.

Although the missed shot was the nail in the coffin for the Axewomen, the reason the Huskies squeaked by with the victory was the stellar play of Alise Brown, who scored 21 points including 5 of the Huskies final 6 points, 3 of which were earned by the game-tying beyond the arc shot with just under five seconds to go in regulation. After taking a quick 10-2 lead early in the opening frame. SMU allowed Acadia to charge back. With the Axewomen up 50-42 with eight minutes left to play, the Women huddled up, stuck to there game plan and slowly dissipated the Acadian lead until Brown was able to tie it up and send it to overtime.

During overtime, Jennifer Bishop sank a free-throw to give Acadia a 63-62 lead, the teams then traded one-point advantages the rest of the way. First-year guard Kelsey Daley made a couple of free throws with just over a minute left to put Saint Mary's on top 68-67, eventually proving to be the game winning score. Forward Laura MacPherson

added 21 points and 7 rebounds for the Huskies who with the win, improve to 3-3, while Acadia drops to 1-6.

In Men's action, Saint Mary's earned an impressive and well earned win over Acadia. Neither team looked overly impressive during the first frame, both putting up horrendous shooting percentages from the floor, with the Huskies going (8-for-32) and the Axemen fairing unmentionably better at 26.5 per cent (9-for-34).

With the Axemen defence playing a tight nit game, SMU could only mange 21 points heading into the break, still mildly better than Acadia's 20. During the second half however, SMU's post man Jerome Goodman scored 12 of his 14 points, helping the Huskies throw up 42 points while managing a vastly improved 41 per cent from the court. Goodman added 13 rebounds and five blocks for Saint Mary's (4-2), while newcomer Aaron Duncan logged a double-double in his first regular-season game.

Duncan, a native of Toronto, became eligible to play ball in the second semester, starting for the Huskies and putting up12 points and 12 rebounds in just 32 minutes of action. Up by 3 with just 11 seconds left, the Huskies charged down the court to seal the victory and come away from the contest with a 63-56 win. Both the men and women play their next games on the 12th as they both head into St.FX trying to improve on their records.

The World Junior Championship was wrapped up in B.C this past week with none other than Canada coming out on top once again. 
Fourth, it doesn't matter how old our players are you idiots, we could have sent our under 18 team to this championship and we still would have pressed for gold.
