I read an opinion piece regarding the annual seal hunt by Julia Fitzgerald and Jason Ellworth in the March 8th issue of the Journal who claimed to be debunking seal hunt myths. In fact, several myths regarding the seal hunt have been propagated by this article.

The authors of this article are quite correct in the approximate number of seals taken (which represent around 6 % of the seal population), and in the lack of correlation between the seal population (not endangered) and the cod population (now endangered). It is also known that seals eat both cod and capelin, one of the primary food sources of cod, in addition to other species. One way that we know this is to examine the stomach contents of harvested seals. However, seals are probably not the major reason for cod stock decline.

The authors also present views for and against the use of images of "white coat" seals in animal rights propaganda. We must be careful not to anthropomorphise certain issues. In the case of humans, the children are dependent on their parents for the first 18 years (typically), approximately 1/5 of the average lifespan. For seals, the average lifespan is about 30 years. The pups nurse for the first two weeks, then they molt for another two. After this, the pups are no longer dependent on the mother, leave the nest, and fend for themselves. At this stage they eat mostly crustaceans. The age at which seals reach sexual maturity is between 4-7 years, so the ratio between age of sexual maturity and average lifespan is comparable to that of humans. Some animals (e.g. fish, insects) eat their young when times are tough.

It was not appropriate for the McCartney's to use whitecoats as photo mates. The Fisheries Act (Marine Mammal Regulation 7) reads: "No person shall disturb a marine mammal except when fishing for marine mammals under the authority of these Regulations". I regard the McCartney's just as guilty under the law as someone who skins a seal while still alive (Regulation 29).

It is also important not to anthropomorphise the effects of the hunt by statements such as "the level of suffering experienced by is slaughtered on the ice, often in plain view of their mothers and one another, is both heartbreaking and unacceptable" and "the mothers...suffer incredible trauma from the loss of their babies". It is true that many animals that produce a limited number of offspring will protect their young out of instinct. However, the statements above imply that seals have feelings similar to humans.

I support a humane seal hunt, and support the efforts of Fisheries and Oceans to enforce humane regulations. There will occasionally be unscrupulous hunters who disobey the regulations, just as there are people who commit heinous acts against children and profit from selling the filth on the internet. That does not mean that we have to ban the internet. It means we have to a better job to prevent the breaking of, and prosecute those who have broken, the laws.

Just because a new video depicting the hunt surfaces annually doesn't mean that this happens annually. I would wager that some animal rights groups have a collection of videos such as this that they release or re-release as part of their annual fundraising campaign. Let's face it. If the hunt were to become totally humane, none of those well-meaning but misinformed rich celebrities would have any reason to give money to them. The release of videos has become a moneymaking and politicking venture, just as hostage-taking and video-making in Iraq, Columbia, and elsewhere.

The reason that Canada is being faced with international boycotts is because of the misinformation about the seal hunt that is being propagated by some animal rights groups. Their aim is to shut down the seal hunt, regardless of whether it is humane or not, and use economics and the threat of boycotts to try to convince governments to agree with them. The history and economics presented in the article is mostly correct. Although sealing accounts for only a small portion of the economy and the landed value of the fishery, it is important for those who hunt. If 300,000 seals are harvested at an average pelt value of \$67 for a total of \$20 million, the 4000 hunters each earn around \$5000. This represents a sizeable portion in a province with historically the lowest per-capita income (c. \$20,000), the highest taxes, and the highest rate of use of food banks. I know personally of one hunter who paid for his daughter's education at Memorial from what he earned in the seal hunt, as the tuition rates are about half of what

they are here. I also support the efforts to utilize the entire seal. Anyone who has been in Newfoundland during the seal hunt will recognize the

side-of-the-road shops advertising the sale of seal carcass and flipper. Flipper pie is synonymous with Newfoundland, and is right up there with drinking Screech and kissing the cod (reserved for tourists). Here is my effort to utilize most of the animal. Seal meat is very rich and tasty, but should have all traces of fat removed before cooking as the blubber will leave an unpleasant oily taste. Fry some salted pork fat in a pot (or heat some oil), throw in the seal meat and sear for a minute or two, add some onions, potatoes, carrots, turnip (parsnips and bay leaf optional). Cook until the stew is done, then season and serve. The broth will be a dark brown. nearly black, in colour. Some parts of the male seal are considered aphrodisiacs in Asia.

Some of the arguments used against the seal hunt are also used against the veal and lamb industry. Anybody who has ever had mutton will appreciate the taste of lamb with mint sauce. The preparation of meat products will always be a bloody business that some will find distasteful. I respect the right of vegetarians and vegans not to eat meat, but I wish that those who are also animal rights activists would reciprocate.

THE FUTILITY OF **CARING FOR CANADA**

Futility of Caring For Canada Daycare, Afghanistan, Farms and Turncoat MPs. For a Leader Who Ran a Platform of Transparency, Harper has been Saying Very Little. By Bill Williams Canada is concerned for its troops. Family, friends and civic-minded community members, as well as several MPs would like Parliament to debate the reason and necessity of having Canadian troops in Afghanistan. Stephen Harper tells us there is nothing to talk about. Harper feels that debate on the subject weakens the resolve of our troops currently engaged in the NATO lead operation that has increased solider presence in Afghanistan since February. "It is not the intention of this government to start to question that mission when our troops are in danger," he said. Harper suggested Tuesday that a parliamentary vote on the mission isn't needed. And that's that. Harper doesn't want to talk about it, okay, so drop it. Moving on to day care in Canada, there seems to be a lot of talk going beyond the water cooler and out into the streets. Monday saw several proponents of the Moving Forward for Child Care Initiative going to Toronto to speak out about Harper's hundred dollar a week proposal. Canadians favour a national child-care system over direct cash payments to parents, a new study sponsored by the YWCA Canada suggested Monday. And all three Opposition parties want the Harper government to continue with the Provincial child care plan that was hammered out under the last Liberal government. So where is the Parliamentary debate on this? Don't know. Can't hear it. Canadian Farmers are seeking some solid comments from Harper on the issue of farming and their rights. But all they have received

are confused. Before the election Harper publicly denounced the current supply-management model, calling organizations like the Canadian Wheat Board "government sponsored price-fixing cartels." But now Harper is declaring "Canada needs efficient production planning, market-based revenue for suppliers, and reliable import forecasts." Seems like we should get together and talk about this. So Harper, when are you coming over to the farm for a chat? Oh, its not on your agenda. Well, I guess we should just shut up then. And then there was Emerson. David Emerson, the once-Liberal MP from Vancouver-Kingsway crossed the floor to the Harper's team just days after the election. Waiting for him on the other side was a Cabinet position. Opposition MPs felt something was afoul but Canada's Ethics Commissioner Bernard Shapiro found nothing to prove that there was any rule breaking or other unethical shenanigans on the part of either Harper or Emerson. A ruling that almost wasn't as that Prime Minister Stephen Harper was reportedly "loathe to co-operate" with an Ethics Commission hearing. Opposition MPs had discussed having the prime minister held in contempt of Parliament for apparently balking at co-operating with the independent investigation. At least Canadians know what Harper's thinking. He just doesn't want to talk about it.

A Tool to Ensure Academic Honesty or a "Shortcut to Teaching"? THE DEBATE OVER THE USE OF ONLINE PLAGIARISM DETECTION SERVICES

If you visit www.turnitin. com, you will be welcomed by the smiling faces of five twenty-somethings basking in the glory of academic honesty. Turnitin is a for-profit company which offers educators an online plagiarism prevention tool. It is used by thousands of schools, and allows instructors to compare students' essays with 15 million papers, 8 billion web pages, and other publications including newspapers, magazines, and journals.

Although the faces of the website's paid models are aglow, cracks have begun to show in Turnitin's armour. Mount Saint Vincent University recently became the first Canadian university to ban the use of turnitin.com. Students and academics have raised concerns that the private company's practices infringe on students' rights.

Saint Mary's University has no official policy on the use of Turnitin.com, but the program is currently being used by some professors in the faculty of commerce. In Saint Mary's 2005-2006 Faculty Handbook on Academic Integrity, under the section "Strategies for Preventing and Detecting Academic Dishonesty", using turnitin.com is one of the tips given when following up on suspicions of plagiarism.

One professor who has used turinitin.com in the past is Dr. Judy Haiven, Chairperson of Management. She has turned a sympathetic ear to concerned students at MSVU. "I'm very reluctant to use [Turnitin] again", said Dr. Haiven. Although she deems the software effective at detecting plagiarism, she is worried that by using the software, she is painting all students with the wide brush of dishonesty. At the same time, she admits she would not have caught a student who submitted a paper as her own work which her friend had previously written and submitted to Dalhousie.

She also mentioned that she was not keen that students' papers "put in a database could potentially be commandeered by the US government." Under the Patriot Act, the US government can request access to any papers stored in US-based databases such as Turnitin. Dr. Haiven stressed that plagiarism devalues the degrees granted by our institution, and that meaningful discussion on how to curb plagiarism must be had by the university community.

Turnitin.com claims that it detects plagiarism in one third of the papers submitted. Although this may be cause for celebration as universities attempt to curb academic dishonesty, it is important to note that the program fails to detect many of the basic techniques used by plagiarizers.

The Joint Information System Committee (JISC) is funded by British post secondary institutions to improve teaching and learning with the use of Information and Communications Technology (ICT). The JISC ran surveys concerning the software in British universities.

74 percent of respondents believed that plagiarizers were most likely to steal from textbooks and theses, not the internet. The JISC reports warned that tunitin.com could not detect "text converted to a foreign language and then converted back to English, [...] essays converted from a foreign language", and other common techniques of plagiarism.

In some classes, all students are required to submit their papers to www.turnitin.com themselves. In 2003, McGill student Jesse Rosenfeld refused to submit his paper to the site, arguing that the 'guilty until proven innocent' tactics of turnitin.com was not conducive to a positive learning environment.

He added that the use of turnitin.com "violates [students'] intellectual property rights by stealing their work and giving it to a company to make profit from." After a lengthy battle with the university, Rosenfeld received a grade for his paper without having to submit it to turnitin.com. He had originally received a grade of 0.

Some critics have called for Turnitin to dole out royalties to students, because of the profits the company makes as a result of its use of their papers. Turnitin has stated that it follows copyright laws and is not infringing on students' rights. The company's indexation of student work has been likened to Google's indexation of copyrighted work on the web. Google is another for-profit company that does not ask permission to before making public the individual work of others.

What's Going on up the Road

Dalhousie has subscribed to turnitin.com since 2003. The Dalhousie Student Union's policy on the subject notes the program's usefulness in detecting plagiarism, but opposes the mandatory use of the program. The union calls for the university to allow students to opt out of the program.

"This isn't about protecting those guilty of plagiarism, it's about preventing the university from cutting corners on the time students deserve from their instructors," said George Soule, National Chairperson of the Canadian Federation of Students in a press release commenting on the MSVU senate decision to ban the tool.

The CFS press release called the use of turnitin.com a "shortcut to teaching", and declared that "the best way to maintain academic integrity is to properly staff universities with full-time instructors."

The MSVU Student Union, a member of CFS, lobbied MSVU to ban the use of turnitin.com. Union president Chantal Brushett echoed CFS' concerns when asked what the major arguments were against the use of turnitin. com. She stated that MSVU's senate voted overwhelmingly in favour of the ban. She hopes that other Canadian post-secondary institutions will follow her university's lead.

Aboriginal Youth Walk the Line

Canadian Aboriginal youth are committing suicide at rate five times higher than the national average. A group of Aboriginal youth are walking across Canada to make us all more aware. The Aboriginal Youth Suicide Prevention Walk, comprised of Reno Trimble, Tyler Joseph, Ed Melerum, and Tom Watts, all in their early twenties, have set forth on a trans-national journey of awareness, stopping in reserves, schools and friendship centres along the way. Their walk began on Tuesday, March 14th in Sydney, NS and is planned to end when they arrive in Victoria, **B.C.** for National Aboriginal Day on June 21st.

Each member of the group has a personal story of how suicide has affected their lives. Be it their own struggle or that of a family member or loved one, these youth feel a passion to get the message out, to place a human face on the statistics. Statistics that Tom Watts feels show there is an epidemic in the Native communities. Watts speaks of how 126 out of 100,000 Native males between 15 and 24 commit suicide compared to 24 of 100,000 amongst other Canadian males of the same age.

At the beginning of this week they will be leaving Truro to travel up north and onward to New Brunswick. This is just the beginning of a three month trip that will see them stop at many communities to spread their message of awareness. As they walk they will be followed by their van and any supporter that wishes to join in the walking. Overall it is expected that this trip will be expensive and it that will stretch the boundaries of their \$2,100 budget. It is their hope to raise \$60,000 to help continue their cause and further fund their campaign of awareness.

But how much exposure will the walk receive? This will all depend on how much air time their story receives, and so far it seems to be mostly at the local level. CBC's local Cape Breton morning show did a piece on the walk, but nothing on their national broadcast. CTV has not reported on the young group's efforts. Only Global television has aired a national piece.

The group is persistent in its efforts to get the word out. This is the fourth year of Aboriginal Youth Suicide Prevention Walk. In 2003, 2004, and 2005 a group has walked from Ontario to BC. Campus Developments in Science and Computer Facilities

The Science Building Renewal Project is still causing lots of commotion towards that end of campus, but I am here to ensure you that construction plans are right on track! As you are able to see, the steel structure for the new addition to the original Science Building has been erected. This addition will be approximately one third the size of the current building and will be functional by September.

Some other recent accomplishments by the project team include the completion of the greenhouse and the expansion of the computer server room in the McNally Main building that will host the ACEnet (Atlantic Computational Excellence Network) computer system.

ACEnet will connect Atlantic Canadian universities and allow region-wide collaborations of research in areas such as computational chemistry, materials physics and computer science. Currently ACEnet is in partnership with seven universities including Saint Mary's, Memorial, University of New Brunswick, Mount Allison, Dalhousie, Saint Francis Xavier, & University of Prince Edward Island.

The ACEnet facilities will be interconnected by high-speed networks, allowing them to behave as a single, regionally distributed "computational power grid" of enormous capacity. ACEnet will also create and operate sophisticated video-teleconferencing facilities, help universities acquire common software, as well as provide funds and administrative services.

Summer classes and facilities will be shuffled around starting in April to accommodate the construction zones in the north end of the building. Hank III **Straight to Hell**

For a long time, I thought I hated country music. After really listening to some old Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash and other true country artists, I realized that I don't hate country music - I just hate what passes as country today.

Artists like Shania Twain, Billy Ray Cyrus and Toby Keith - while they may call themselves country - are nothing more than manufactured pop masquerading as country music. I started to think that to hear real country music now, one would have to go on a long and hard search of the various local scenes throughout the world, and that there would be no way that a major label would release a real country record, let alone something that the artist describes as "hellbilly" and is an obvious descendent of outlaw country.

When a copy of Hank Williams Ill's newest release, Straight to Hell, crossed my desk, I was sceptical, but I gave it a chance, and I was pleasantly surprised. This two-disc set features songs about trucks, fighting, drug use and abuse, murder, and serving jail time. These are the types of things country music was about before it went mainstream.


By the time I got to track number four, Country Heroes, I was already convinced that Hank III could make real country music, but this song about country legends such as his grandfather (Hank Williams Sr.), Cash, Way-Ion Jennings, and Merle Haggard showed that he understands what real country should be. Track 11, Dick in Dixie, serves to drive home the point for people who haven't got it yet. The song's chorus includes the lines, "So I'm here to put the "dick" in Dixie / and the "cunt" back in country / 'Cause the kind of country I hear nowadays / is a bunch of fuckin' shit to me."

The second disc has only one listed track. It also has a 42-minute long hidden track. The hidden track features short country ditties and alternate takes on songs from the first disc. These songs are interspersed with sounds such as a rainstorm, an oncoming train, evangelical preaching and various other atmospheric sounds.

Straight to Hell was originally titled Thrown out of the Bar and was ready for release in late 2004, but Curb Records decided to scrap the album. After a year of court battles, Hank III won his case and Curb was forced to release the album. Curb only released it after they started up a new imprint known as Bruc Records.

Straight to Hell is the first release on Bruc Records and is the first major label country record to bear an explicit content warning.

When not making country music, Hank III is in involved in two other musical projects. One, known as Assjack, is a metal/punk band in which he sings and plays guitar. The other, Superjoint Ritual, is a metal band led by former Pantera frontman Phil Anselmo. Hank III plays bass.



Lessons from the Maritime Business Elite

The Codfathers should be required reading for any Atlantic Canadian business student. It is a who's-who of the Maritime business elite, from the secretive Irvings to flashy former Tim Horton's owner, Ron Joyce. Author Gordon Pitts takes the reader beyond the boardroom, revealing the leaders' lives, from their upbringings to their current challenges.

Pitts, a Torontonian and senior writer for the Globe and Mail, set out to understand how Eastern Canada was producing such powerhouse business families as the Sobeys, McCains, and Irvings.

Dubbed the "Maritime Mafia" for their control on the local economy and their tight-knit social spheres, this group has managed to succeed while staying within Atlantic Canada

"It's not a huge group of people and they all know each other," Pitts explains. "You have to be a pretty smart, tough, and demanding businessperson to succeed with an international business based in the Maritimes."

After spending time with all the leaders, except the Irvings who refused the interviews, Pitts noticed an Atlantic Canadian style of business.

"The fact that these people can keep their roots in this area and still be phenomenally successful businesspeople means they are very tough, very good on costs, very hard-nosed businesspeople. They are operational geniuses. They aren't flashy, but they know how to run a business. They are straightforward, and very private."

Each chapter introduces the reader to a new business tycoon, detailing their business and personal backgrounds while showing how they tie into the Maritime Mafia. For example, John Bragg, the Oxford blueberry king and Eastlink owner, sits on the Sobeys board and serves as a chancellor at Mount Allison alongside Wallace McCain and Purdy Crawford. In the Maritimes, there is usually only one degree of separation between any two top business leaders.

For any student planning to stay and work in Atlantic Canada, this book is invaluable. For aspiring entrepreneurs, the book is a stimulating quide detailing how our region's most successful self-starters made it in the business world. For those who plan to work for someone else. there is a good chance you will be working for one of the people listed in the book. Either way, the Codfathers is a must-read.


American Inventor or **American Idiot?**

But the house you can afford today, not the one you hope to afford five years from now.

CHAMP CAR '06-'07 Preview

The Champ Car World Series is hitting the streets again this year, starting their season on April the 9th with the Grand Prix at Long Beach.

2006 should prove to be an interesting season, especially for Canadian fans. This looks like it will be the last season for "the thrill from west hill" Paul Tracy, who will be back behind the wheel of his Cosworth powered Indeck Forsythe car. Tracy is one of the most aggressive drivers in the world, known for holding nothing back, on, or off, the track. Paul currently has a five race deal in NASCAR's Busch league (already having raced at Daytona and in Mexico City), with the hope that Tracy will move into a full time NASCAR ride in 2007. His current drive in the Busch series does not affect his current full time Champ Car ride.

As the Champ Car series winner in 2003, this will be Tracy's last chance to get back on top of a series that has not been kind to him. Last year, Tracy found himself on the bad end of many collisions, and had countless mechanical problems that kept him well out of the running, and finished last season in a frustrating 5th place. If Tracy's luck improves this year, he'll easily be in contention for the series championship.

Tracy's biggest rival will surely be Sebastien Bourdais of Newman/Haas Racing, who has won the series in each of the last two years. The flying Frenchman will be going for his 3rd consecutive championship this year, but this year should prove to be much more competitive then the 2005 season.

Other then Tracy, the return of Bruno Junqueira will bring more competition to the series. Bruno's season was cut short last year, after he suffered a back injury while racing in the Indy 500. The

Brazilian placed 2nd in both the 2003 and 2004 seasons, and is expected to do well again this year. His replacement for 2005 was Spanish Driver Oriol Servia, who now has a full time ride with PKV Racing. Servia had an impressive run last year, winning his first Champ Car race in Montreal. Englishman Justin Wilson should also not be counted out this year, as he placed 3rd last season, in only his second year in Champ Car. Even with a competitive field, all eyes will likely be on Rookie Katherine Legge. With the success of fellow female driver Danica Patrick in the Indy Racing League, Legge will have high expectations as she is the first female driver in Champ Car to have a full ride for the 2006 season. Last year she raced in the Champ Car development

series, won three races (Danica Patrick has yet to win a professional race), and had a testing deal in F1 over the off season. Although some people question if she is ready for the big time, there

are a lot of people, especially other women drivers, who hope that she is.


Other Canadians in the Champ Car ranks are veteran Alex Tagliani, and Andrew Ranger. Tagliani has been in the series since 2000, and is usually one of the middle runners in the standings. His best result has been a 7th place standing at the end of both the 2004, and 2005 seasons. Ranger is just coming off a good rookie season, where he was the second best rookie of the season behind Timo Glock of Germany. Ranger is still unsigned for this year, but he should be able to find a ride by the season opener. His team from last year MI-Jack/Conquest has yet to sign anyone.

The 2006-2007 season starts on April 9th, when the cars hit the streets of Long Beach, California. Coverage starts at 5:00PM Atlantic time on NBC. The only concern this year is that there are not a lot of drivers confirmed yet with contracts. As of March 19th, there were only 11 drivers ready to go. Come April 9th there should be a good number of drivers, in the ballpark of around 18 cars ready for the season opener.

Expect either Bourdais or Tracy on top at the end of the year. As much as the drivers skill and car come into play, luck and reliability could take anyone either to the championship, or to an early exit.
