Mat Dunlap and Dave Ewenson are two Halifax locals that host a weekly radio show on CKDU. This is not your average radio show format though; it's quite the opposite. The basis for the show, baking with rock stars, started out as almost a joke, says co-host Mat Dunlap. But what may have once been a fleeting idea has now turned into what many agree to be a groundbreaking radio show that's setting precedence. The radio show is called Let's Get Baked, a funny play on words that is characteristic of the hosts' laid-back and lighthearted nature.

The premise of the show is the two interviewing a different musical guest every week while they collectively bake a vegan dish, live

on the air. The radio show is taped in a unique kitchen that doubles as a studio, in a flat where Mat, Dave and two others have lived for a number of years. Let's Get Baked got started three years ago, with Mat asking Dave to partake and then eventually having Tom Westoll join in as a quasi-commentator.

When listening to the show, you notice it runs surprisingly smooth; allowing the guests to unwind as they bake whilst being interviewed. Despite the fact that only Mat is vegan, the focus is on baking unique and often improvised vegan recipes with healthy local ingredients. But instead of mainly seeking out vegan or health-conscious guests for the show, the trio focuses more on finding interesting guests.

"The potential for bombing is there, ya gotta' make it interesting for the listener to stay tuned for an hour," says Mat, adding that the group mainly aims to get musical acts into their kitchen that they enjoy themselves or whom they think would be fun.

"We're big music fans, we're very involved in music," says Dave, who plays in a few local

Tom says the show's format lends itself to a bonding experience with guests, as they get to know one another in the kitchen.

"It's a way for the guest to open up, in an unconventional interview setting; talking about things like food and cooking. They let their guard down in a way", says Tom Westoll of the show's dynamic.

Ironically enough, when

"celebs," such as Tim Nordwind, Damian Kulash of the Grammywinning indie rock group OK Go, and Halifax favourite Richard Terfry (Buck 65), come through the studio the three guys get a bit anxious themselves.

"I think we were equally giddy when [Alicia]

Silverstone was on the way over [to the studio]," says Dave.

Many indie bands come on to the show during tours that happen to pass through Halifax, which is often seen as a welcomed change of

pace from being on the road. It is also a chance for band members to get a healthy snack while touring, instead of eating pre-packed gas station sandwiches and the like.



#### SMU Refuses to Allow Controversial Debate of Jared Taylor vs. Peter March

Saint Mary's has decided to cancel the debate between Dr. Peter March and 'race realist' Jared Taylor. The two had been scheduled to debate on March 6th in the Burke auditorium. Taylor is the editor of a monthly magazine that considers itself "America's premiere publication of racial-realist thought. It purports, "Of all the fault lines that divide society-language, religion, class, ideology - [race] is the most prominent and divisive." Taylor was to argue against multiculturalism.

In January 2007, Taylor's scheduled debate with Dr. David Devine, the chair of Black Canadian

Studies at Dalhousie University, was cancelled, because of Taylor's questionable past. After Dr. Peter March arranged another debate at Saint Mary's, the university initially responded by stating "[it] is NOT sponsoring the debate nor does it support or sanction Mr. Taylor's presence or his views." March also agreed to pay for all expenses, including insurance, security and cleanup.

However, upon further reflection, Saint Mary's changed its

In a press release dated March 5th, two days before the scheduled debate, the university issued a statement explaining, "Following a review over the weekend by Saint Mary's University and its Security

Department, the University has withdrawn the use of campus facilities for the proposed debate between Dr. Peter March and Mr. Jared Taylor. The review, conducted in preparation for the event, included consideration of new information. The conclusion was that there is a higher level of personal risk and need for increased security than the University has the capacity to provide."

The press release also explains that the university supports free speech and academic freedom, but that it has an obligation to provide a safe environment on campus.

It is unfortunate that Saint Mary's first indicated it would allow the debate to occur on campus, and changed its policy two days before the event.

Many members of the community would have liked to have the opportunity to hear what Jared Taylor had to say. It is true that many racists champion his views; one quick look at the comments on Taylor's website will support this. However, it would have been very unlikely that Taylor would have delivered a hate speech if he had been allowed to talk. Taylor has debated against multiculturalism many times before, without serious altercation. Still, in the event that those hooded protesters were to show up again, SMU had required that March pay for the service of four armed guards.

Taylor should not be feared, he should be confronted, just as Peter

March attempted to do. Censoring Taylor has done little to undermine him. I'm sure he's checked this second Halifax trip as another victory, a masking of racial skeletons in the closet. We could have used this opportunity to show Taylor and his band of racist followers that Halifax champions its multiculturalism and its benefits.

Taylor can now sit back without having said a word, and add another notch to his belt.

Perhaps Saint Mary's is privy to information we have no access to concerning a serious security issue. However, if this is not the case, the debate should not have been kicked off campus.

Then, and under the guise of a women's rights defense, draw conclusions about this candidate's character that seem wholly and ignorantly unsupported.

I was always taught, as a child and as an adult, that it is wrong to cast judgment upon another without first walking a mile in their shoes. I find it very difficult to conclude that someone "has so little respect for women" based entirely upon a photograph, which has been taken out of context.

I am not defending the poster in question, but rather questioning the hypocrisy of the previously mentioned letter. #### **JOE'S POSTERS NOT PORN**

In response to Holly Taylor's letter in last week's Journal, I would like to point out several areas in which the argument she presents is not only fundamentally flawed but also blatantly biased and unfair. In her letter, she states that the image presented in Joe Doherty's poster is "pornographic." This, however, is not the case. The photograph that appeared in the poster is NOT pornography; however, it is her individual perception of it that is pornographic in nature. This does not justify a personal attack on Joe or his campaign.

I question the writer's comment about how "dehumanizing" the image that appeared in the poster was. Why (again if we were to assume that the image was sexual in nature) is being a willing participant in a sex act (which it is NOT) "dehumanizing"? In fact, being a willing participant in a sexual encounter is extremely human, as it is one of the most natural activities that humans participate in.

Holly has also failed to present any actual evidence that pornography (if we can, in fact, assume that the image is pornographic, which I contend that it is not) is "dangerous" and "creates false perceptions of women." Again, these points are not based upon any evidence,

but are one individual's opinion.

Apart from the logical fallacies in her argument, the issue remains that this is not a pornographic image. In fact, the last thing that came to mind when I saw the image (original with beer, as well as the photoshopped image portraying a carton of milk) was something sexual. I took the words written above the photo: "Let me do the work for you" as a comical campaign slogan. In the picture, Joe is doing the work for me - holding a pitcher while I get a drink. I don't need a glass, or to even use my hands. Describing the photo as a "classic cumshot" not only makes the assumption that everyone knows what a "classic cumshot" looks like, but that this photo was intended to be one - which it absolutely was not.

In closing, I reiterate that I personally feel that this poster was in no way intended to be pornographic, or "dehumanizing" in any way. I also believe that it was not designed to "appeal to the male chauvinistic population at SMU." If I had, at any time, felt that this poster belittled or "dehumanized" myself, or women in general, I would be the first person to say so. While we are all entitled to our opinion, one individual's interpretation of something as "pornography" does not justify a personal attack on Joe Doherty.

# Young Soccer Player Ousted From Game for Wearing Hijab

MI Remark to Allow Commission and Defface of Jan

Eleven year old Asmahan Mansour was removed from a soccer tournament in Quebec last weekend for wearing a hijab, a traditional Muslim headscarf. The young girl who plays for a team in the Ottawa-area was in Laval, Quebec for a tournament. A Muslim referee pulled Mansour from the game claiming the headscarf was in violation with safety regulations.

Following the decision by the referee Mansour's team, the Nepean Hotspurs under-12, forfeited the game and pulled out of the tournament as a sign of protest. Another five Ottawa-area teams also pulled out of the tournament in a show of support for Mansour. Headscarves are not considered a safety hazard in Ontario, provided they are tucked in and properly secured.

Jean Charest, the province's Premier and leader of the Quebec Liberals, has spoken out in favour of the headscarf ban saying "One of the practices of soccer is not only the sport itself on the field, but also the behaviour of the players, and how they are expected to behave towards each other, and the rules around how they are dressed." The comments come just weeks after Charest ordered a one-year provincial commision to look at the accomodations being made for minorities in Quebec. The commission comes after several Quebec communities adopted controversial codes of conduct in relation to the treatment of immigrants.

Mansour calls the ruling "pathetic" as her hijab is always tucked into her shirt and has never been an issue before, nor does she think it puts her in any immediate danger. The ejection has been humiliating for Asmahan says her mother Maria; she had hoped that the IFAB

(International Football Association Board) would be sensitive to the issue and consider over-ruling the decision made in Quebec. The FIFA (Fédération Internationale de Football Association), which sets the rules for soccer around the world, Law number four refers to players' equipment and states that "A player must not use equipment or wear anything that is dangerous to himself or another player..." Mansour was removed from the game for violating Law number four, as her scarf could get caught on another player and potentially strangle her. The IFAB is a division of the FIFA.

According to Soccer Canada's director of referees, certain types of headwear, such as beanies, would be allowed as an alterna-

tive to headscarves and turbans as they pose less of a safety risk. The problem is that Mansour's headscarf wraps around her neck. Roy Shetler, a spokesperson for the Montreal Athletic Association has spoken out in Mansour's defence saying "I don't see how a hijab would create a safety issue for a young lady."

Since leaving the tournament, Mansour and her team have returned to Ontario. Mansour has since returned to the field, wearing her hijab, and scored two goals in a game over the weekend. There are currently no plans in Quebec to resolve this issue; officials are standing by their decision. Mansour's coach, Louis Maneiro, says as a team they will never return to the tournament.

#### The Amazing Race Debate May Be Cancelled

The debate between SMU Professor Dr. Peter March and self titled 'race realist' Jared Taylor suffered a major blow midday Monday when SMU released the following statement:

"Following a review over the weekend by Saint Mary's University and its Security Department, the University has withdrawn the use of campus facilities for the proposed debate between Dr. Peter March and Mr. Jared Taylor. The review, conducted in preparation for the event, included consideration of new information. The conclusion was that there is a higher level of personal risk and need for increased security than the University has the capacity to provide."

That 'new information' is most likely the news that this debate was fast becoming an international event. Protest groups, and protest-protest groups were planning on converging on St. Mary's University from all across the continent.

The university went on to state that the physical safety of "...members of our campus community and those who visit our campus," is the most important thing to consider. They are also going out of their way to point out that it's not the topic of the debate that is the cause of their withdrawal.

At no point did the university say they were 'cancelling' the debate. They don't have the right to do that because they were never the ones officially hosting it. All they've done is refuse to let it happen on their campus. A member of the university staff has informed the paper that they believe Jared Taylor and Dr. March are trying to reschedule the event at a different venue.

SMUSA is supportive of the university's decision to refuse the event. In an interview with Zach Churchill, he said SMUSA fully agrees that this event was quickly becoming something beyond the scope of the available security forces. He stated that the university "...acted in the best interest of the community," and that "...their decision was not intended to limit free speech or academic freedom"

Mr. Churchill went on to explain that while he believes that that it is a good idea to confront those with potentially harmful messages and ideologies in a formal setting, the general safety of all those involved trumps the right to academic freedom.

The University is planning to reimburse Dr. March for any related expenses incurred in planning this debate.

# First Lunar Eclipse in Two and A Half Years



Approximately fifty people gathered at the Burke-Gaffney Observatory on the Saint Mary's campus Saturday night to see the first lunar eclipse in over two years. Many people also found spots on Citadel Hill to set up their own telescopes and cameras and take in the sight. It was a perfect night for viewing the moon; there were few clouds in the sky above Halifax, not to mention the temperature was above zero, a perfect combination for those who chose to take in the view. Unfortunately the view was not as wonderful in other parts of Atlantic Canada, such as Newfoundland, which was still dealing with a snow storm.

Looking directly at a Lunar Eclipse is not harmful to the naked eye, unlike

a Solar Eclipse in which special protective eye wear is required for safe viewing.

When a full moon falls into the shadow of the Earth, a small amount of light from the sun bends around the earth causing a Lunar Eclipse to occur. The moon



tends to appear in a brown, red, or orange colour. The eclipse lasted almost four hours, with the moon totally hidden for about seventyfour minutes.

This eclipse was best visible by people in Eastern Canada and the United States and also those in Europe, Africa, and a large part of Asia. It was partially visible on all seven continents of the world, a rare occurrence.

For those who missed it, there will be another Lunar Eclipse in August of this year, with the best view over the Pacific Ocean and in Western Canada.



Finance Minister Jim Flaherty is cracking down hard on Canadian big banks. Flaherty sat



# The 'T' Word

Tuition has become a bit of a dirty word among students, often said with varying degrees of disgust. The infamous costs are a frequent source of student stress and its resolution made up much of the recent SMUSA election's campaigning strategies. The word itself seems to never be uttered without at least some depression, and at most outright anger.

To find out why this is such a touchy subject with our student population, I went straight to the head of our student union and spoke with SMUSA president Zach Churchill (apparently no relation to the late British prime minister, who knew?). The following is a summary of what I learned.

What's going on?

Simple answer: We have a problem. While this is hardly a startling revelation to any member of the student body, it is something that is beginning to be realized by the general public. Even more important is the government's acknowledgement that affordable education for its citizens is a real social issue that this country is going to have to deal with. They say that admitting you have a problem is the first step.

The price of tuition in Canada has been steadily going up for many years now. The full force of the increases has been felt particularly in Nova Scotia. A recent study found the Nova Scotia was the least affordable place to get an education in North America.


Whose fault is it?

When you ask who is responsible for tuition problems you'll always get the same response whether it's a government official or the Journal business editor (I just checked): Not me.

If you were to ask the provincial government they tell you we don't receive enough money from the federal government. If you ask the federal government what's up, they say that they send all kinds of money our way. The federal government claims that the province spends our education on other projects.

Both arguments stem from the Canada Social Transfer program. Essentially the federal government collects taxes from all across the country. Then it distributes that money back out to the provincial governments to fund projects like education, child care, and healthcare. The money comes to the provinces with a list of things that it is supposed to be used for, but no specifics on how much to allocate to specifics projects. This is where the line of communication breaks down and allows this inter-governmental blame-fest to

Of course, there are even people that blame us students for this predicament. They claim that



tuition is not too high and that the problem is just that we students are bad at dealing with our money... I'll just let you make your own opinions on that one.

During my interview with Mr. Churchill, he said that this isn't the fault of any one organization. He believes that this is a problem that everyone across spectrum should be concerned about because it's "...an issue that transcends everything."

What can be done?

A major part of the job of any student union is student advocacy. As Mr. Churchill stated "We're here to give a voice to students who don't have a voice." Sometimes schools directly lobby the government, but more often they are aligned with some kind of association of many schools working together. As a group, the associations are better able to lobby the higher levels of government, and their opinions hold more sway because they represent so many students. St. Mary's University is a member of both a national and provincial lobby group. They are named the Canadian Alliance of Student Associations (CASA) and the Alliance of Nova Scotia Student Associations (ANSSA). Both groups lobby the government for help at different levels.

One recent project taken up on behalf of students was the creation of a dedicated education social transfer. This would set the education money apart from the rest of the transfer money. Hopefully this would prevent inappropriate spending of the money, or at least stop the intergovernmental bickering. It's not officially law yet, but it looks like it will happen in the near future.

SMUSA is actually going aboveand-beyond to help students deal with the rising cost of tuition. They are setting up a bursary fund to help students who normally would not be able to afford the school. The \$300 000 principle would be invested, and every year a portion of the interest earned would be taken out. The program would pick one student each year and pay \$15 000/year for that students 4 year degree.

The program has not begun yet because the initial \$300 000 needed for investment has not been fully fundraised yet. The current balance is \$180 000, and SMUSA is confident that the final \$120 000 will be raised by the end of next year. SMUSA recently received a \$30 000 donation from Aramark to help St. Mary's students.

SMUSA will be the only university student union in the country to offer this kind of program.

So to sum it up: It's bad, but it could be getting better soon. In the end the decision is really going to rest with you, with me, with the whole student body. If we sit up and take action people will take notice. If every student got together and decided that we were simply not going to take it anymore, we could make history.

Remember, as the great scholar Red Green would say, "I'm pullin' for you. We're all in this together."

# What Kind of Business Could I Possibly Start?

During my first year at Saint Mary's, I made a pact with myself that I would start my own business by the time I graduated. I've always had a severe affinity for entrepreneurship, and although working in my family business was satisfying my business cravings to an extent, it could never substitute the passion I had of owning and operating a business of my very own. From a very early age (six, I think), I've been constantly possessed with an insatiable drive to start and grow a company. Despite this yearning, a crucial component of making this dream a reality kept me from reaching my goal: what kind of business could I possibly

Even up until just a year ago, I had so many ideas and aspirations that I actually made into fullfledged business plans, but that never came to fruitation due to the realization of what was actually involved in starting a business in an unfamiliar industry. It humbled my eagerness, to say the least. It's not that my business ideas were completely unattainable, but realistically speaking, with six courses on the go and two part-time jobs, dropping everything and throwing my entire life into something completely new just didn't seem like the best course of action to take. Sure, we hear about business moguls who risked it all only to come out on top of the world, but for most of us, risking everything just isn't possible. My frustrations continued to grow as my final year of University was closing in, and I still had no realistic and viable business ideas that I felt enough passion for to pursue.

Last summer I had a miniepiphany. I realized that the "smartest" way to start a business would be to take a hobby (or something I was already doing) and to see if there was a market for it, as opposed to starting a business in something I was interested in but was completely unfamiliar with. Starting a business in such

a "small" and manageable way completely bypassed me all these years, after hearing Donald Trump say "Think Big!". I'm not discouraging the idea of "thinking big", but sometimes thinking too big can leave you with an abundance of aggression, pipe dreams, and a skewed image of reality. Coincidentally, it was during this summer that I finally started my own business, and have actually stuck with its development. I account this to the fact that the business is already in my realm of knowledge, ability, study, and interest. It's also a business that I can control - it grows with the amount of work I

to touch on this subject for a few reasons. First, I've personally seen others go through the same frustrations as I have - the motivation is there but with little direction. Second, starting a business at all can be overwhelming, but starting a business while attending University can be nearly impossible. Taking something that you are already familiar with, or you already do for others, might be the perfect way to get your foot in the door.

"You'd much rather start a business based on a hobby than something else, right out of the box, because you're connected with it, you understand the vernacular, the concepts, the commu-

demographics of the market," says Lawler Chang, author of the new book Passion at Work and a management consultant. "It gives you an unfair competitive advantage' (www.startupnation.com). This is why many professionals start their own business - they already know how everything works and they have enough loyal clients to stick by them through the transitional

Deciding on an actual business to develop may take some consideration. Not every hobby can be transformed into a business, let alone a lucrative one. It should be something that you already do for other people, and With that said, I've decided nity, and the psychographics and something that others can't easily

do for themselves - something you "specialize" in or have access to. Also remember that you might not want to turn a particular hobby into a business - hobbies are generally for relaxation and pleasure - a business involves responsibility and could strip that fun away for you. Remember that this business will take some time to develop, but should not take up all your time; this business will probably not be your only source of income as you first start it and you'll most likely be working elsewhere as you establish yourself. It should be something that is fun for you, but can be done on a small scale at first, with the capability of growing based on the amount of work you

If you've considered these crucial rudiments, the next phase is to hypothetically see if you could make money from your business. Putting together a feasibility plan will determine your revenues, costs, and other expenses, along with the breadth and depth of your potential market. Don't make this plan too daunting. It should only serve as a general indicator of the plausibility of your business. A detailed marketing and operations plan can be worked out later on. An important element to consider when transforming your hobby into a business is to figure out how you will differentiate yourself from other people who may be doing the same thing you are. Your established knowledge in the field is a major advantage, but you will need an effective way to separate yourself marketing-wise.

If you've identified a personal strength, a hobby, or an area of intense knowledge - take comfort in knowing that you already have a leg-up on the competition - you do this for fun primarily, not because you have to. That type of mentality will drive your business through the rough patches, and will most likely see your business flourish amongst the rest.

# Junior Achievement: **Sharpen Your Business Skills**

Junior Achievement is "an international not-for-profit organization established and owned by the business community." The mission of this organization is to teach students about business and to help them to develop entrepreneurial, interpersonal and leadership skills. This is done through various programs; in Nova Scotia, Junior Achievement offers four programs: Our Business World (OBW), The Economics of Staying in School (ESIS), Company Program, and JA Titan.

The Economics of Staying in School is a program delivered to

ninth grade classes by two volunteers who encourage students to continue their education beyond high school. The students learn the importance by participating in activities which include the comparison of pay checks of people who have completed different levels of education. This school year, JA hopes to reach 100% of Nova Scotia's ninth grade classes. In order to accomplish this goal, JA will need over 300 volunteers to deliver the program.

Our Business World (OBW) is designed for sixth grade classes. This program teaches the students the basic of business and is usually delivered in four one-hour sessions: organization, management,

production, and marketing. It is an interactive program and each session has a fun, yet educational, activity for the students (in groups) to participate in. JA would like to increase the class coverage in Nova Scotia by 50%

The Company Program is geared towards students in grades 10 through 12. These students form groups which become separate companies. They work together to choose a company name, product and/or service, and market and sell their selections. This 18 week program runs from October to the beginning of March and ends with an awards ceremony. This year, there were 27 participating groups with different products and

marketing strategies.

There were 25 teams for this year's Titan program in which high school students are the CEOs of virtual, online companies. They "make business decisions in a competitive virtual market." In February, five of these teams competed against teams around the world at the HP Global Business Challenge.


Last year, Junior Achievement attracted 18,000 students and 1,000 volunteers. In order to meet their goals, Junior Achievement needs more volunteers. No matter what your time commitment may be, there is a JA program perfect for you. The ESIS program is on one morning of the year, OBW is a

four hour commitment, and Titan and the Company Program both span over several weeks. Junior Achievement holds very informative and beneficial training sessions for the volunteers of all of its programs, and provides guidebooks and other material making program deliver extremely easy. It is a very enjoyable experience, and a wonderful opportunity to share one's knowledge with young people.

### THE BILLION DOLLAR BUSKER

I was once asked to describe what a Cirque Du Soleil show was. I was stumped. Though I've seen six shows live, and another four on tape, it's really hard for me to come up with a definition that fully conveys everything Cirque is.

Cirque Du Soleil translates directly as Circus of the Sun. But this isn't your standard circus. For one, there are no animals. All the acts are performed by humans. They take the traditional circus and street performer acts and completely reinvent them. The shows themselves are based on a theme or have a storyline. For example Alegria is about the clash between the old and new orders. Varekai is about the story of Icarus after his fall from the sky. All the touring shows are held in completely modern versions of traditional circus tents, complete with a massive state of the art audio/visual system.

Seeing a live show by Cirque du Soleil is not just another night on the town. It's life-changing. The atmosphere of expectant wonder, the thrilling and passionate performances by the artists, and the deep wide-reaching themes and storylines that hold it together

are all experiences not to be had anywhere else. I was lucky enough to see the touring show Dralion several years ago. The way I saw the world changed that night. The entire performance had such a profound effect on me that I've spent the last 5 years traveling all across this continent to see more shows. Cirque has become a major part of who I am as a person. Every time I see a new show I expect to experience the same mix of wonder and amazement I felt that first time, and I've yet to be disappointed.

It must have been this same feeling that was driving Guy Laliberte when he created Cirque Du Soleil just 23 years ago.

Guy was your average teenager growing up in a small town in Quebec. He was getting tired of the same day-in day-out routine and decided that it was time for him to move out in the world. At the age of 20, Guy packed his backpack and left for Europe. He can still remember that first night in London, sleeping on a bench in Hyde Park with only 1000 in his pocket and some instruments in his backpack. It was here that Guy was first introduced to the world of the busker. He traveled throughout Europe learning from the street

performers he met along the way. It's here he learned the skills of juggling, fire-eating, and stilt walking. The trip was originally intended as an adventure, with him returning to his old life when he returned. But something happened to Guy somewhere along the journey - the circus spirit became a part of him.

When Guy returned to Canada in 1982, he moved to Baie-Saint-Paul and almost immediately began planning La Fete Foraine, the equivalent to our annual Buskerfest. Street performers from all over the region come to show their skills. Guy himself is part of "Le Club des Talons Hauts" (the high heels club). It features a group of men on stilts, fire eaters, and other common busker acts.

Only two years after that, the government of Quebec agreed to help fund the creation of Guy's dream project: Cirque Du Soleil. It featured artists from Quebec, Belgium, Switzerland and Argentina. They had their make-or-break performance at the 450th year anniversary of Jacque Cartier's exploration. The audience loved it and the program took off. It was with that success that Cirque brought in world traveler Guy Caron as the new artistic director and Franco Dragone as a head trainer. It was with these two creative geniuses that Cirque completely through out the old ideas of what a circus or street performer was 'supposed to be' and adopted a new vision in which "rules exist only to be broken." Guy Caron in particular had spent much of his life traveling across the world and was well versed in a wide variety of entertainment styles. He began Cirque's trademark style of taking acts to the next level. For example: instead of juggling, let's do juggling on stilts; instead of a tumbling routine, how about a tumbling act on a 20m long trampoline built into the stage.

With the company's success and growth in this country, Guy Laliberte turned his sights on the rest of the world. Guy signed the show up to perform in Los Angeles at a major arts festival. He nearly went broke just financing the trip. "I bet everything on that one night," he recalled. If we failed, there was no cash for gas to come home." The entire company depended on

success in LA. And once again the audience loved it. They loved it so much that the show "We Reinvent the Circus" became Cirque's first real touring production and performed in L.A., San Diego, and Santa Monica to sell-out crowds.

After a number of small shows, Cirque released its next major show in 1992. Entitled Saltimbanco, it featured performers from no less then 20 countries. This was the first time Cirque used their now famous 'Grand Chapiteau.' The large touring tent seats 2532 people in a 270 degree spread around the stage. It's fully air conditioned and has a built in audio visual system that rivals most theatres. The tent is designed to withstand winds of 150km/h and can be fully set up and taken down in 3 days. It was designed and built in-house by members of Cirque Du Soleil.

Saltimbanco just finished touring recently. Current touring shows include:

- Alegria: The longest currently running Cirque production. Focuses on the clash between the Old and New orders in the world.
- Quidam: A darker, more dramatic show. Cirque defines Quidam as "a nameless passer-by, a solitary figure lingering on a street corner, a person rushing past. One who cries out, sings and dreams within us all."
- Dralion: Its setting is more Eastern in nature. Its theme is the clash between the east and west. The name combines two popular characters in the Eastern world: the dragon representing the east, and the lion, representing the west.
- Varekai: It means 'where-ever' in the Romany language. The plot is the story of young Icarus after he falls from the sky. My personal
- Corteo: The tale of a clown present at his own funeral. He meets all his old friends and relives the good and bad times of his life. The show is both happy and sweet, but tragic at the same time.
- Cirque 2007: The only touring show I haven't seen. This show will be released this summer in Montreal. All the details including the name are a closely guarded secret. The artistic director has stated "Cirque 2007 will present human performance in all its scope

and in all its fragility." And yes, I have tickets.

Cirque shows are either touring, or resident shows. The first resident show was set up in Las Vegas. Mystere is still showing in its own theatre at the Treasure Island hotel

Since Mystere proved so successful, numerous other shows have opened up in the city:


- '0': named for the French word for water, eau. The entire show is done above and in a massive pool (1.5 million gallons) built for the show. Has a large influence from the Hawaii, Samoa, New Zealand and Australia area.
- The Beatles 'Love': George Harrison and Guy Laliberte were actually good friends. The show uses the Beatles music and Cirque performances to pay tribute to on of the most beloved rock groups of all time.
- · KA: One of the most recent resident shows. A story of twins in an ancient empire, separated during the war they must find their way back to each other in the aftermath of the battle. At the time of construction it was the single most expensive show in Las Vegas.
- · Zumanity: Explores 'the sensual side of humanity.' A provocative, cabaret-style production with a Cirque du Soleil twist. The adultthemed, 90-minute production features many sexually charged acts. Must be 19+ to attend.
- La Nouba: This show is actually in Orlando Florida. After 10 years of negotiating with Disney Corp., Cirque finally was granted full artistic control over the show. That's right, a staring competition with Disney - and Disney blinked first.

With all those shows touring all over the world, it's estimated that 50 million people have seen Cirque Du Soleil at one time or another. All have born witness to what a little talent and a lot of passion can create. Guy Laliberte is still the major creative controller of the company as well as its president. He own 95% of the company and is worth \$1.9 billion. He was the fastest created billionaire in Canada's history. All because he was passionate about what he believed in.

He truly is the Billion Dollar Busker.

# Are You Smarter Than a 5th Grader

Finally we have a show that understands what we viewers really want: the humiliation of adults by young children. That seems to be the premise behind Fox's new game show 'Are You Smarter Than a 5th Grader.' We like it so much that it racked up one of the biggest series debut ratings in television history.

The basic set-up for the show consists of contestants coming on and answering a series of questions. The questions are also answered by 'the class,' which consists of 5 children who are apparently at the 5th grade level. The show is produced by TV god Mark Burnett. He has also produced such shows as: Survivor, Rock Star: INXS, The Contender, The Apprentice, Gold Rush, and according to IMDB 'Commando Nanny.'

Smarter Than a 5th Grader has proved to be a resounding success. When it was unveiled Tuesday after "Idol," it scored the biggest opening audience of any series on any network in more than eight years - nearly 27 million viewers. That's also the biggest series debut audience on Fox... ever. The following night, a second half-hour of "5th Grader" held on to nearly all of that audience, with more than 23 million viewers.

So what kinds of questions are worth the grand prize of \$1 million? After extensive research, here's a list of the first 20 questions from the first 3 pilot episodes (keep in mind, I've yet to see any of the students get one of these wrong):

1. First Grade Social Studies: In what month do we observe Columbus Day?

2. 4th grade math: If a triangle has a base of eight inches, and an area of 16 square inches, what is the height of the triangle?

3. 4th grade U.S. History: Who was the first US President to be impeached?

4. 2nd Grade History: Name the ship the pilgrims sailed from Plymouth, England to the Plymouth colony in America in 1620.

"It's a nice change; it's a different experience for a band that's doing a lot of promotion [on the road]," says Dave. "It's a relief, you know? Sit down, hangout, make some food, we'll eat and get to know each other."

The unique format in which guests offer their cooking skills, for better or for worse, can produce amusing results. Last week's show, for instance, had guests Most Serene Republic requesting to make "bean sprout tarts" and savoury "dinner waffles'" as improvised recipes; you can imagine how that would taste! Another episode in the kitchen had a casserole dish exploding on the counter to everyone's astonishment.

If you visit the kitchen on Allan Street, be prepared for anything. There was a painting of Jesus next to a picture of a Panther of equal size, and thousands of small knickknacks the guys had collected over the years.

You can also catch a taste of the radio show online on their MySpace page, where I noticed a random fan from Chicago had left a comment about how great the show was, and thanked the guys for introducing her to "the bizarre-vet-enticing concept of donair sauce." The Let's Get Baked crew says MySpace has been a very useful tool in promoting their show and to network.

"The majority of contacting our guests is done through MySpace," says Dave. "It's not just for picking up chicks," he jokes.

The show has been gaining popularity, with a condensed version of the regular hour-long show airing on CBC Radio 3, which in turn is aired on Sirius Satellite Radio. You can also hear the guys baking with your favorite bands on 14 other radio stations in Canada, as well as the requisite Podcast. So turn off that top 40 junk, and get baked with the boys instead.



### A TV Geek Special report: LGBT characters on TV

Much like my report on African-American representation last week, on television LGBT (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender) characters aren't always portrayed in a fair, accurate or representative light. They can be cliché's, stereotypes, the butt of jokes or simply non-existent on network TV.

Gay men have come quite a long way from being shown as fey, effeminate hairdressers or interior designers but they are still few and far between in three-dimensional portrayals. On comedies gay men can be punch lines or the straight lead's friend (like Carrie's friend Stanford on Sex and the City). On dramas, gay men can pop up as guest stars, but they are usually one-note characters that are defined by the fact they are gay. They can be the body or murderer of the week on a CSI or Law and Order or any of that genre, but are rarely witnesses or family members. If a gay man is murdered it's either a hate-crime or a jealous lover, he's never one of those victims that were just in the wrong place at the wrong time. Besides Queer as Folk, gay men are rarely starring characters with as much screen time as other leads. The drama Six Feet Under was an exception, with brother David Fisher (Michael C. Hall) a an active member of the family and a partner in the funeral home business. David also had an enduring love affair with African-American police officer Keith Charles (Mathew St. Patrick) and the pair ended up marrying and adopting two children. It was probably the truest, most loving relationship in the series full of messed-up relationships. Oh, and they even got to kiss passionately which is often denied to gay characters on mainstream television in comparison to their heterosexual counterparts. (Think Will and Grace and how many men she could kiss compared to him).

And today, positive gay men on TV are very much still few and far between. On The Wire, Omar Little (Michael K. Williams) isn't exactly a role model, but all the characters are complex, neither good nor evil. Omar is a stick-up artist who only robs drug dealers, never an honest citizen. He has a strict moral code, never swears and takes his grandmother to church. Even though he's out to everyone, even his enemies, there are very few who would dare to mess with him. He may not be exactly positive, but he's unique and complex, which I think are the best traits in any tv character.

A more accessible gay man is Kevin Walker (Matthew Rhys) of ABC's hit new series Brothers and Sisters. Kevin is a main character in a large family, struggling after the death of their patriarch. Kevin is also out to his family and dates as frequently as any of his siblings and also gets to kiss on an almost weekly basis (his most recent boyfriend is Sex and The City's absolute hunk Jason Lewis), bravo, ABC!

While gay men are few on TV, gay women are even more scarce. With the exception of The L Word, they are almost non-existent. Gay female characters are few but there are plenty of girls-kissing-girls on the air. For example, on The OC

two female characters who had previously been in heterosexual relationships all of a sudden began dating, kissed for sweeps week, then broke up for no good reason and disappeared or went back to men. A show with no gay recurring characters, but a titillating girl-kiss once or twice is endemic of representation of lesbians on TV (did I mention the kiss was during sweeps?).

I long for the days of Willow (Alyson Hannigan) and Tara (Amber Benson) on Buffy the Vampire Slayer, two girls that genuinely fell in love before they had an un-hyped, natural kiss. Now we have the L Word with a variety of complex characters, some likable, some not so much, who are realistic and flawed. Other than L Word, there's pretty much just The Wire's African-American detective Kima Greggs (Sonja Sohn) who's skilled at police work but has difficulty adjusting to life when she and her partner have a child.

Bisexuals have it even worse. Watching television might lead you to believe that a person can only be completely heterosexual or homosexual. When bisexuals appear, they are usually only guest characters. And as guests they are usually victims or killers, are promiscuous, unstable, drug-addicted and criminal. If they are not criminals, their bisexuality is seen as a phase, confusion or experimentation. Rarely is it seen as a real lifestyle as legitimate as gay or straight. The perfect example of this is Prison Break. I'll admit I like PB but there is only one non-straight character, Theodore "T-Bag" Bagwell (Robert Knepper) who is a serial-killer/rapist who kills indiscriminately and for pleasure or gain other than ideology like the other characters. So in the Prison Break universe (like many other mainstream dramas) gay men and women are non-existent and bisexuality is linked with murder and predatory sexuality. It's a shame because he's one of the most visual non-straight characters on an immensely popular show on a mainstream network.

There have been a few exceptions, but lesser-watched, superior shows. On Homicide: Life on the Street the bisexual wasn't a victim or criminal, Tim Bayliss (Kyle Secor) was a detective; a competent, monogamous, sensitive police officer that was the heart and soul of the show. Written and produced by most of the same crew as Homicide, HBO's prison drama Oz didn't just sink into the prison rape clichés of "don't drop the soap" for fear of predatory gay/bisexual inmates. There were inmates that resorted to bisexuality in prison when deprived of opposite-sex contact, there were inmates that remained celibate and completely heterosexual even when inside and inmates that identified as homosexual both inside and outside of prison. Tobias Beecher (Lee Tergesen) was completely straight-laced on the outside, a successful lawyer with a wife and kids, until he was sent to the Oswald Maximum Security Penitentiary for driving drunk and fatally hitting a young girl. On the inside he developed an attraction to his cell-mate Chris Keller (Christopher Meloni from Law and Order SVU). The two had an

intense love/hate relationship that was more twisted yet heartfelt than any other love story on TV. It was true love, true tainted love. Screw Romeo and Juliet, there never was a story of more woe than this of Beecher and his Keller.

Last and least (only in terms of visibility) are transgendered individuals. There are very, very few transgendered people on television and those who are, are typically portrayed as a comedic punchline. Transgenders are seen as "cross dressers" and something to be laughed at or ridiculed. It's uncommon for a transgendered individual to be portrayed as sympathetic, stable or three-dimensional. The few notable exceptions are Ugly Betty's male-to-female, the gorgeous Alexis (Rebecca Romijn) and The L Word's Max (Daniela Sea), who is more annoying than anything but important in terms of female-to-male transgenders who are almost completely ignored.

LGBT characters only account for about 1.3% of characters on scripted TV. And many of these are on shows that are critically acclaimed but not ratings hits (how many of you watch The Wire versus CSI?). Hit shows, like Lost or Grey's Anatomy or all of the Law and Orders and CSIs (which have racially diverse casts) regulate such characters to guest roles when they appear at all, or worse, they could be negative stereotypes like Prison Break. C'mon TV! Some of us are tired of the same boy-meets-girl, let's mix it up a little! With different characters come different stories and hopefully different attitudes both on-screen and off.

A great venue in Brantford, Ontario called the Ford Plant recently suffered a minor tragedy. For a small venue like the Ford Plant, this loss would have been crippling. # GET CULTURED: How to choose a student-friendly wine

Beginning to appreciate wine can be an intimidating and confusing endeavor. The wine industry is routed in centuries of tradition and revolves around perceived snobbery and pretensions. However, there is nothing snobby about enjoying a good bottle of wine for a great value; which is what I am hoping to help you accomplish. A good bottle of wine can warm you up on a cold winter's night, carry the conversation between friends and family over a casual dinner, or highlight an intimate evening between couples. Wine is, above all, meant to be enjoyed, appreciated, and shared.

For first time wine drinkers there are a few basics that will help you feel more confident when choosing a wine. Besides the basic distinction between a red wine (made with red grapes) and a white wine (usually made with white grapes) there are hundreds of different types of grape varietals. Some of the classic red grape varietals include Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot, Shiraz/Sirah, and Pinot Noir; while some examples of classic white grape varietals are Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc, Pinot Gris/Grigio, and Riesling. Categories of grape each have their own specific characteristics which make them unique from other grapes, but the effect a grape has on the wine can change dramatically from wine to wine depending on other factors in the wine making process. Two or more grape varietals can also be blended together to create very different wine experiences. Unsurprisingly, Wikipedia.com has an extensive list of the different grape varietals and their characteristics if you

would like more information.

There are also two broad categories into which most wines will fit; they are Old World and New World style wines. Old World applies to most of the wines produced in Europe where mass wine production first originated. Some key countries cultivating Old World style wines are France, Spain, and Italy. These wines are classic, earthier, and less fruit forward than their new world counterparts and are, more often than not, designed specifically to be enjoyed with the cuisine of that particular country. On the other hand, New World wines are those originating from new wine producing countries like Australia and The Americas which have seen a recent boom in production and demand for their products. These wines are typically more fruit forward, bold, and able to function on their own without an accompanying meal.

The last bit of introductory information I will offer is how to effectively experience a wine. A general rule is that white wine is served chilled while red is served at room temperature. Now, without getting into the snobbery and rituals of a proper wine tasting, there is one aspect of assessing a wine that is important, this is the aroma, or the "nose" of a wine. Since most of what you taste is actually what you smell it is important to casually inhale the scent of the wine before you taste it. Without making a production out of it, be aware of the complexity of the experience starting with the aroma ("nose") of the wine then the taste (or "palate") and the after taste (or "finish").

There are many great valued wines on the market in Nova Scotia at present and I will give you some

suggestions for the next time you are in a liquor store. Because of the large quantity of wines available I thought I would narrow down my selections to South American wines because of their exceptional value and quality. The two main wine producing countries in South America are Chile and Argentina and they are making great strides in the industry.

As I am a student I understand the budget constraints placed on students so I have kept all the prices under \$16. I have this theory when it comes to purchasing wine: anyone can go out and buy a great wine for \$50, but to buy a wine that is \$15 that drinks like it's \$50 is the challenge.

My first pick comes from Argentina and is incidentally made by Argentina's wine producer of the year. Trapiche Pinot Noir (\$9.99) is a great wine for someone just being introduced to wine and it doesn't hurt the wallet either. It seems that since the release of the Oscar-winning movie Sideways, in which two men embark on a comedic adventure while drinking a lot of pinot noir, the grape has seen a huge increase in popularity. This addition to the pinot noir collection by Trapiche is a lightbodied pinot offering cherry and clove on the nose and has smooth, jam-like, berry fruit characteristics on the palate. Unlike other pinot noirs this wine does not have the unappealing candied flavor that is all too prevalent in inexpensive pinots. This wine is excellent on its own because it is light bodied and easily overshadowed by food.

Also from Trapiche is the Pinot Noir's big brother, the Broquel Malbec (\$14.97). This wine is currently at the top of my list for value and quality, but not taking the value into consideration this is just a damn good wine. The Malbec grape originated in France and is therefore an old world styled wine which has the characteristics of a classic French wine but, in my opinion, is much better. The Argentineans have done things with the Malbec grape that the French have never attempted. This is the grape varietal that they are known for and this wine will demonstrate why. This is a full-bodied and inyour-face wine with a deep almost black-purple coloring. The nose is filled with berry fruit, leather, and classic oak from being aged in oak casks. The palate has berry fruit, some spice, a hint of chocolate, and warm oak characteristics. The tannins are soft but noticeable and it has moderately crisp acidity and a smooth and lingering finish. (If I have lost you - just try it, it's fantastic!). It's great with anything done on the BBQ, red meats, any grilled meats or veggies, and hard

From Chile, Argentina's smaller neighbor to the South, comes one of my favorite wine producers: Concho Y Toro. A central vein of that company is their selection of wines called Casillero Del Diablo. This is one of the best selling wine brands in the world and it is an example of mass wine producing done right. This wine comes in twelve different grape varietals which I would recommend but I am going to focus on the Casillero Del Diablo Merlot (\$13.36). This wine is a deep-purple color and boasts chocolate, spice, plum, and berry fruit aromas. The palate is medium bodied with red fruit characteristics and a hint of smoke and vanilla with a substantial finish. Try this wine on its own or with any moderately spiced red

meat or tomato based pasta sauce dishes. (For the advanced wine drinker, Concho Y Toro offers the next step up called the Marques de Casa Concha Merlot (\$23.72) which is amazing and only available at the Port of Wines on the corner of Queen and Doyle).

For white wine drinkers South America has a good selection available for you. The first one to try would be the JF Lurton Pinot Gris (\$12.30) from Argentina. This wine is an exceptional value and is medium to light bodied with melon and apricot fruit and mineral qualities. It has crisp acidity and is very palate cleansing with a dry finish. This is a great party wine to drink on its own or with a simple meal that will not over-power the wine. Try it with a classic Italian sandwich, a lightly sauced pasta dish, or a meal of delicately seasoned poached or steamed fish.

Finally, a great white from Chile is the Santa Rita Reserva Sauvignon Blanc (\$15.99). This wine is very aromatic and has juicy fruit on the nose like grapefruit, star fruit, citrus, and apricots. The palate has crisp acidity which refreshes the palate and a dry mouth feel that incorporates luscious fruit leading to a lingering finish. This wine is great with any kind of seafood, shell fish, and even some poultry. Try it at the Economy Shoe Shop with a plate of fresh muscles and you will be very impressed... I was.

All of the wines featured can be found at most of the NSLC outlets in the downtown area and at the Port of Wines on the corner of Queen and Doyle.

### Running the Marathon: An interview with Joel Miller


"My brain is like mush today." We have all felt like that at one time or another, but during an interview with Joel Miller- an English major here at Saint Mary's- it sounded like it had a lot more meaning. Joel is also heavily involved with SMUSA as the resident photographer and he volunteers in the community by going to high schools to talk to students about succeeding with a learning disability.

Joel didn't find out that he had dyslexia until he was in grade 9 and his parents went in to plead with his English teacher. Instead of having the problem identified early, he was dismissed as being lazy or simply unwilling to read. When asked what the learning disability was like, Joel said "it's like running a marathon; maybe you could run for fifteen or twenty minutes. After that you still want to run but you just can't anymore".

It's not really a moot point with Joel now and he enjoys looking back at some moments when dyslexia got the better of him. "I remember going to Taco Bell" he says laughing, "I looked- well sometimes I see a word and I just don't know what it is. I looked at the menu and asked for a Cheesy

In 1999, Joel started getting involved by working with Bachelor of Education students at MSVU to simulate learning disabilities. Since then he has been going to high schools all over the province to talk about making the high school to university transition. He is a huge advocate of the Atlantic Centre for Students with Disabilities (located on the 3rd floor of the Student Centre) which, in Joel's words, "bends over backwards to help in any way they can".

The Joel Miller resume is quite impressive. He has won national recognition for his work with learning disabled students, and since being at Saint Mary's, he has

been the Disabilities Rep on the SRC as well as the go-to guy for SMUSA photography. Joel also works for a text-to-speech software company as a promoter. The program, WYNN (What You Need

Now), helps people with dyslexia

to convert books into audio clips when the reading becomes overwhelming.

Having a supportive family definitely helped. Joel remembers his parents going to see his elementary school principal regularly, trying to understand why he was struggling. His teachers all said the same thing- it will come. Reading will come in time. By grade 9 and fifteen years with a learning disability, the family finally got through to his English teacher. For comparison, most children find out that they have dyslexia between grades 3 and 6, and never as late as grade 9. "There was obviously a lot of closure when I found out" said Joel, "it explained a lot."

Joel cites everything he's gone through as inspiration for why he now reaches out to younger students. At his most recent school visit, students not only clung to his

#### Miller Offers Support to **High School Students With Learning Disabilities**

Do professors understand what a learning disability is? High school students at Bridgeway Academy, a school serving students with learning disabilities, were eager to ask questions of Joel Miller, a Saint Mary's University student. Joel is an English major in his senior year who hopes to work in the field of special education. As a student with a learning disability, Joel shared valuable insights on topics such as university workload, note taking, proofreading support, how students with learning disabilities access accommodations, and how The Atlantic Centre can assist students in this process. The March 1st presentation, which focused on the transition to post secondary education for students with learning disabilities, had students in grades 10 through 12 actively engaged in exchanging personal anecdotes related to academic achievement, with Joel sharing many useful suggestions on how to manage at university.

Joel talked about the importance of being a self-advocate to help overcome obstacles to learning. Joel shared his personal story about how, in high school, he thought he would never attend university but having supportive

people in his life along the way and a good dose of self-determination helped him decide to try. Joel indicated that through his talks he hopes to encourage other students with learning disabilities to consider post secondary education.

One Bridgeway student asked Joel how he manages all the reading, as some students with learning disabilities read at a slower rate. To overcome this, Joel uses a reading program that reads to him. The combination of seeing the text at the same time as hearing it enables him to read at a faster rate. He can also listen to his texts on his mp3 player. Students who showed interest in this technology stayed after the talk to learn more from Joel about the program and receive demos of the software to try at home.

If audience engagement is a sign of a successful talk, then Joel gets an A+. Joel's personable, easy going style and use of humour is a recipe for success in helping open the doors to students with disabilities.

"Being in a place with that kind of audience, a place like Toronto, and just being there for like, a month straight and having steady gigs at the same venue, it's just something that's kind of unheard of for us.

"And we're not playing covers," adds Panos, bringing up the point that Their Majesties have an ever expanding list of songs from which to draw every night, even though there are a couple new cover tunes in the works, such as a little something by The Clash.

Another opportunity the gents are being given is a CBC Radio 3 session being taped live off the floor from the CBC 3 studios, which is going down on March 6th. This gives the band an opportunity to play some fresh material. "The emphasis there is on songs that maybe people wouldn't have a chance to hear otherwise, so if we wanna do a cover or something like that, or songs that we haven't played for anyone before, like rarer material... we'll just have fun with it," says Daniel.

The royal quintet took their fresh album on the road to Ontario in December of 2006 for promotion but as fate would have it, the band's tour van passed away. It

wasn't the first obstacle that Their Majesties had to overcome and by gol' it wouldn't be the last. A history of "roadblocks" has coincided with the history of the band. A couple of vans later and more harrowing instances like Panos undergoing knee surgery and Daniel severely cutting his finger during an accident at his day job have presented obstacles for the band. Needless to say, Dan quit his day job. Another touchy issue with the band that has popped up now and then is the importance of having a dedicated and permanent drummer, something that was thought to be solved with the addition of Niall Skinner last year. After this Ontario tour though, Niall and the band are splitting ways, although it's under amicable terms stress Dan and Panos. The main thing important to them is that the issue doesn't become a central theme to the tour; it's not about a conflict within the band. We're going on tour, the five of us, for all intents and purposes there's nothing wrong with the band and we're going to carry on," chuckles Daniel. "Unless one of us dies, there's not gonna be a way, really, that it [adversity] will get us down. It will take something like that I swear, because pretty much everything else has happened in

It was around the summer or fall of 2004 (nobody is completely sure) when Emergency Band Meeting came out that the band hooked up with Just Friends Records, a self-sufficient label running out of central Halifax that was just building up steam. The addition of Their Majesties was a blessed union for the small indie collective, giving the label a very marketable and hard working band.

"A lot of thankless labour on their part, so I don't know, I guess we're very grateful....it's not like they're making money or getting a lot of recognition up front or anything, it's just sort of a lot that goes on behind the scenes" says Daniel in acknowledgement of all that the label has done for the band.

In the works was the big Halifax release of 2006, Lands Where Tales are Tall, an album that was released to rave reviews and a big CD release party. The album is perhaps one of the most complete to come out of the city for some time featuring ace production from Charles Austin. The sonic blend of Lands Where Tales are Tall mixes catchy guitar riffage and sing along melodies which are accompanied by tastefully placed horns and other unique (to rock) instrumentation, such as the piano and the ba-

roque sounding harpsichord. The album has stirred up a nostalgia for the Halifax rock sound, but as Panos points out, "I don't want to be the next Sloan, I want to be the next us!" in reference to a review in Chart magazine. They are quick to point out that while they do like that classic Halifax rock scene, it was way before their time and not a direct influence on their musical stylings. Their Majesties have a wealth of influences but try to fuse them into a unique sound they can call their own instead of wearing them on their sleeve. With Daniel, Brian and Andrew all being classically trained pianists, a whole other realm opens up.


"That's the main difference say, between us and like, early 90's Halifax bands, the fact that we use a lot of piano....that definitely comes out on some of the songs, we do play piano a bit differently than people might think within the context of the music.... so when you list all our influences and put them all together, it seems like a bit of a bizarre combination, its kind of a melting pot." Daniel speaks of how the songwriting process is a culmination of everyones influences as he picks away at the few remaining french fries on the plate in front of him. "Generally they [the influences] vary and on any given song we can try to do a million and one different things. I think it's more interesting to do that than to try and slate yourself into one category."

"I've been really into metal lately. I don't think you can hear that in Their Majesties..." says Panos as he sips a glass of midafternoon ale. He notes that "if they don't like something about my part, or like, they want me to do something else I'll do it, or like, I'll argue or I'll try something different. That's basically how it

"We would never play anything like Panos would play, and that's a really, really good thing to have someone who can do things that you're either not capable of thinking of or capable of doing, just the combination of different styles and influences that come together and creates an interesting whole..." adds Daniel, commenting on the individuality that comes through in the fabric of each song.

# Dump and Run: Taking a Bite **Out Of Community Waste**

The Dump and Run community sale has a strong history of success in the City of Halifax. Organized by the student-run Society for Corporate Environmental and Social Responsibility (CESR), the events dual focus, to divert waste from local landfills and donate proceeds to charitable organizations, has garnered tremendous support from the local community. This year the lead coordinator for the event is a Saint Mary's University Student from then Environmental Studies program, Heather Boudreau and is being facilitated by the Saint Mary's Environmental Society.

While the event rose over \$9,000 in 2005 and \$14,000 in 2006, the goal of this year's event is to raise \$17,000 through the sale of re-usable goods - furniture, appliances, clothes, kitchen items and other items - to benefit local charities and non-profit groups.

The growth of the Dump and Run in recent years signifies the value the local community places on waste prevention efforts. Last year alone nearly 12 metric tons of goods were diverted from the landfill and sold through the event.



Items that can be resold are donated by students, community members and business owners. In recent years the donation support has grown exponentially, causing the Dump & Run Committee to come up with a new way to accept the large volume of donations. This year the Committee will be donating a portion of the items received to the Metropolitan Immigrant Settlement Association (MISA), a

move that will provide items to refugees that have recently settled in the Halifax area. This support will assist new members of the community by providing them with furnishings and clothing that they would not otherwise of been able to afford.

While the event is organized by CESR, it is the involvement of community members, including both Saint Mary's and Dalhousie

### History Made at AUS Women's Hockey Championship

**HUSKIES EFFORTS COME UP SHORT; AWARDS HANDED OUT**

History was made last weekend at the AUS Women's Hockey Championship Tournament. Since women's hockey was made a varsity sport almost a decade ago, only two teams, St. Mary's and St. FX, have ever brought a championship home to their respective school. It was for this reason, after the combatants for the final were decided upon last weekend, a newand progressive step had been taken for AUS women's hockey in its entirety - Moncton and St. Thomas, not St. FX and St. Mary's - were to face off for supremacy at the top of a one-time two-teamed hockey conference.

It was the Moncton Aigles Bleues that broke through for their first Atlantic university women's hockey title last Saturday in Fredericton, as three second-period goals helped Moncton to a 4-0 win in the final against the host, St. Thomas Tommies.

Shots were 41-9 for Moncton, but goalie Emily Hobbs had another strong game for STU. In fact, Hobbs may have been the only reason STU was in the final in the first place, as the night before she and her team ousted the nationally number 5 ranked X-Women by a score of 3-2, in front of 200 screaming hometown fans. In that contest, St. F.X. outshot St. Thomas 31-7 through the first two periods, and 45-15 overall. Point being, parity reigned supreme this season, as the Tommies finished 15 points behind St. FX in the standings upon seasons commence, 14 behind Moncton.

In the other semi-final, The St. Mary's Huskies ran into a foe that simply had their number this season, falling by a score of 4-1 to Moncton that provided an untimely ending to another terrific season. To reach the semi-final, the Huskies defeated UNB with a convincing 4-2 win in which Kori Cheverie netted a hat trick. Captain and 2006 conference MVP,

Courtney Schriver added a shorthanded insurance marker with 4:36 remaining in the third period to seal the victory. SMU outshot the Varsity Reds 35-22.

In the semi-finals though, Moncton proved too much for the Huskies, as 2007 Atlantic conference MVP, Marieve Provost, factored in on every Moncton goal throughout the 4-1 loss, scoring twice and setting up two others by Valerie Boisclair, who also had a four-point night. Amy Dawson scored for Saint Mary's, which trailed 1-0 and 3-1 at the intermissions. Saint Mary's starter Danielle

#### SMU VOLLEYBALL TEAM **FINISHES 7TH AT CIS** CHAMPIONSHIPS

The St. Mary's Huskies Volleyball team was in tough during their first match at the 2007 Canadian Interuniversity Sport women's volleyball championships, drawing the No. 1-seeded University of Alberta Pandas in game one. The Pandas easily handled the No. 8 seeded Saint Mary's in their quarter-final match-up dominating the AUS champions in three quick sets of 25-14, 25-15 and 25-16 to advance to Friday's semi-finals. Alberta dominated the opening set, leading by as much as 15-3 at one stage. SMU was much better to start the second stanza staying in the set early on and leading 8-7 at the first break, after trailing 5-1 early. The Huskies led 11-8 before Alberta regrouped with an 8-2 run for a 16-13 advantage at the technical break. The Pandas closed out the set winning 25-15. The 3rd set was also close at first,

but finished off relatively easily against Cape Breton last weekend per cent from the floor against the Baltimore with 11 sacks last year MacRae had game-MVP honours for the Huskies after digging up a match-high 15 balls.

Delegated to the relegation round after the loss, the Huskies took on the fourth-seeded Montreal Carabins and were easily defeated once again 3-0 (25-20, 25-15, 25-18). The Dallas Mavericks dealt Anthony Johnson, a backup point guard, to Atlanta for a second-round pick. Philadelphia sent veteran Alan Henderson to Utah in another deal where picks were involved. Not since 1995, when Dallas sent Marlon Wiley to Houston for Scott Brooks in the day's only deal, has a deadline passed with so little action.


