## Letter From The Editor: Response to Concerned Students

I was hoping talk in regards to the second issue of the paper would have ceased by now, but since it has not I feel obligated to say something about it. The editors were just as upset about the issue as students were. It really disheartened the staff that the content was going to be overshadowed, and perhaps taken less seriously, because of the layout errors.

On Tuesday it was brought to my attention that the page sizing was too small, and the quick fix used turned out to be an error in judgment on behalf of one of my staff members. We apologize for this again, and although we are not "practicing" our jobs, the layout of a newspaper takes practice to perfect and it will only get better with each week.

As for our "animosity" with SMUSA, there is none. The Journal is simply concerned that the current executive is making arbitrary decisions regarding student run organizations, and as a result we, as students, feel alienated. They are making important decisions without taking all of

the affected parties' concerns or needs into consideration. The decisions are not open for discussion, and we, as well as others, feel bullied because we had no opportunity to voice our concerns during the decisions making process.

Our current space has individual offices for each editor to perform interviews, take/make phone calls without disturbance, and edit and write articles in quiet. There is a large common space where we hold staff meetings and prepare the paper on Mondays. This area is also essential for staff members who have to share an office, and for volunteers, proof-readers, and writers on laptops.

The proposed space has a common area that is about as large as the one we currently have, yet it is expected to house all of our editor's desks/computers, as well as our large meeting table, and any other essential office furniture. There is merely one small, single office that will house the EIC, the ad manager, and the business manager. I really feel that the new space will not allow us the room or necessary

features to work efficiently and productively. Our office furniture was purchased specifically for this space; thereby it would be less likely to fit comfortably in an open concept environment. SMUSA is committed to making the move "as comfortable as possible" for us, but not committed to providing remedies should the furniture we have not fit into the space.

The Journal offered compromises, such as sharing our space with the yearbook staff or the marketing department. We felt either of those two bodies could benefit, as could we, from working side by side with The Journal, as well creating a union between The Journal and SMUSA rather than a divide. We do not want to see the SMUSA departments crammed into office space, but we don't want that for ourselves either.

In terms of concerns that The Journal staff sleep in the offices and work a mere ten hours a week, thereby making some students feel we do not deserve the space or their \$2 fees; that is a misconception. Editors did use the office couch to take naps during the summer when the paper is not even in production, and when they are not getting paid. As for hours worked per week... editors are in the office from 9am until as late as midnight, myself and the art director there until 5am, on Mondays. On top of that we spend a minimum of ten hours per week for office hours, not to mention the time spent writing during our own time at home.

As far as advertising concerns go, we have an ad manager who builds successful working relations with advertisers, and the Palace Nightclub is one of them. They pay their bills and have been a consistent client for The Journal since last year. I feel this does not overshadow the Gorsebrook or its events in any way; after all it gets its own full page ad in prime advertising space for free. We are no way trying to take business away from it.

If anyone felt the "SMUSA Logo" article was questionable or biased in any way, I assure you it was objective reporting. Kim Dares simply put what she was told in her inter-

views with SMUSA execs and the dissenting SRC voter. Both sides were presented, and then she asked students on campus what they thought about the logo and the money spent, and I will put a correction here- it was supposed to say "80% of students asked". Our "AA Asks" question was chosen to complement the article and we feel students should know what their money is going towards, and should think critically about these sorts of issues. The logo is just a great example that should allow for opinions free of bias or loyalties. And besides, who is supposed to keep the politicians on their toes if not the media?

I really regret that I had to touch on these issues again, especially for those of you completely uninterested or bored with it. But those people who are interested, and concerned, whether it be for The Journal or for SMUSA, I felt some misconceptions needed clarification. We always welcome feedback and constructive criticisms, and hopefully now informed judgments can be made.

Protesters held signs outside of the forum building with pictures of the President of Iran with quotes of "Go to Hell" and "Hitler Lives"


as the President inside made a familiar speech of having "no homosexuals in Iran". He left after the speech without addressing questions from the audience and the verbal assault that would have been sure to follow.

## Crisis Averted: Metro Transit and HRM Reach Agreement

Employers, employees and students spent this past weekend preparing alternate travel plans for a transit strike that didn't happen.

Mayor Peter Kelly, the Union and a conciliator met Friday evening Sept. 28th to try and reach an agreement that worked for everyone, but failed. They began talking again Saturday night and after pulling an all-nighter to find the perfect agreement they signed the papers Sunday afternoon. Both sides are saying they got what the were aiming for out of the negotiations. The details of the new agreement are not being released to the public until they have been ratified.

Negotiations between the Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM) and the Union that represents Metro Transit's approximately 570 bus drivers and ferry workers had been going on almost since the workers last contract expired last year. Following the unsuccessful meeting on Sept. 26th the Union filed 48-hour striking notice, giving workers the right to strike starting at 2:30pm Friday Sept. 28th. The Union gave The HRM the weekend to come up with a solution or else Monday

Oct. 1st they would have officially gone on strike.

A Metro Transit strike has the potential to virtually shut down the HRM. Over 100,000 people rely on the service daily to get them to and from work or school. Over 6,700 SMU students use their U-Passes to get them to and from class everyday. For many people driving everyday is not a convenient or affordable option. The last strike by Metro Transit employees occurred in 1998 and lasted for a month.

Employers were urged by the HRM to offer flexibility to workers if the strike did go ahead. This flexibility was to ensure that everything ran as smoothly as possible in the case of a strike. It was suggested that employers allow a more relaxed dress code to accommodate employees who may choose to walk or cycle to work. The HRM also encouraged more relaxed hours to allow more leeway in case of traffic hold-ups.

transportation to connect with students who may be able to offer a drive. In addition SMUSA, along with the student unions of Dalhousie, Mount Saint Vincent and Nova Scotia Community College joined together to urge the Transit Union and the HRM to come to an agreement without causing a disruption to student commuters.

Metro Transit employees had been without a contract since August 2006. The Union was fighting to help drivers get more rest time between shifts as well as a pay increase. Before the new deal drivers could work as many as 22 consecutive hours before getting a break. The Union was looking to substantially decrease that number to 16 to allow for an 8 hour rest period in any 24 hour period. Also the Union requested the hiring of 40 new drivers by Christmas to help support the growing demand for additional routes



In response to the potential strike Saint Mary's University encouraged both faculty and students who utilize Metro Transit to make arrangements for alternate transportation. SMUSA set up a Ride Board in the Student Centre to help students find rides. The board was to allow students who needed help finding

and services. Residents of the HRM can once again breathe easy knowing the bus will be there for them in the morning. It really is phenomenal how many people in the area rely on public transportation, a day without the option of catching the bus would have resulted in chaos, traffic backups and delays in services.

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# TerraTalk: Hurricanes, 200 dead at halftime.

Earth doesn't like us.
That isn't to say it dislikes
us, just that it isn't going to
go out of its way to protect
humans. We, just like all the
other living beings of this
planet, will survive here only
as long as our environment
will allow.

Over the next several weeks TerraTalk will explore some of the most fantastic and terrifying aspects of that environment, and what happens when we go head-to-head with it. Our first topic: Hurricanes.

From deep in the tropical regions of Earth, a wave of catastrophic storms are making their way Northward. They can grow up to hundreds of kilometres in diameter and the central part of the hurricane can extend tens of kilometres straight up into the sky. Wind speeds are strong enough to completely destroy small structures and natural forests, even turning small debris into deadly projectiles. As these behemoths move through human-populated areas they leave naught but death and destruction in their

alone there have been at least 200 deaths, thousands of injuries, and over 3 billion dollars in damage; and the hurricane season is only now reaching its mid point.

The first truly terrifying storm of 2007 was born on August 14th when hurricane Dean came into existence. It was the fourth named storm of this year's hurricane season. Just one week after its conception it had grown to become a massive category 5 hurricane. Scientists in the hurricane field ominously label category 5 hurricanes as "Catastrophic." With sustained wind speeds of at least 270km/h, it made landfall in the Yucatan peninsula. Within 24 hours forty-two people had been killed from

collapsing houses, flying debris, mudslides, flooding, and a host of other related problems. It is estimated that the area sustained over two billion dollars in damages. Historically only one category 5 hurricane makes landfall every season. But this year, viving building being McNally, everything else completely razed. Damage estimates in Nicaragua, Honduras and Guatemala are still being tallied. Luckily, a brave team of Cuban doctors had arrived in advance of the hurricane to administer emergency care.

on September 1st, Tropical Depression Six was upgraded to Hurricane Felix. As it grew in strength it started its march towards the coast of Nicaragua. On September 4th it struck the north-eastern coast as a deadly category 5 hurricane. It moved inland, losing strength quickly without warm water to draw power from. In the end over sixty-five people had died. In some regions over 90% of the infrastructure was completely destroyed. To put that in perspective, imagine a storm hitting SMU and the only sur-

This week represents the "climological peak of Hurricane season and everyone needs to be ready" according to Peter Bowyer from the Canadian Hurricane Center. Canadians need only look back to Hurricane Juan in late September of 2003 to appreciate the effect it can have on our country. Though only a 'mere' Category 2 hurricane, it struck Halifax dead on. The result was seven dead, and over two hundred million dollars in damage.

Obviously these cyclones are things of deva-

massive pillars of warm, most air that shoots its way upward. As the warm air rises, it creates an area of low pressure behind it. More air from the surrounding area rushes towards the center to fill the gap. When the warm moist air hits the upper layer of the storm, the water condenses and the heat is released. The cooling air is pushed outward to the edge of the depression and sinks again, only to be pulled back into the center to be warmed again. A massive feedback loop has developed and a Tropical Depression is

born. At this time the storm might have sustained winds speeds of around 35 km/h and contain some pretty impressive thunderstorms. It would make for a pretty bad day, but nothing too dangerous.

The problem comes in the feedback loop. As the storm sits over warm water it draws more and more energy up into its system. When wind speeds reach 120 km/h it becomes a 'Category One Hurricane' on the Saffir-Simpson scale. A hurricane of this strength can do structural damage to poorly constructed buildings and mobile homes, and may cause flooding in coastal and low lying areas.

The Saffir-Simpson Scale's maximum designation is "Category Five" or "Catastrophic" hurricane. This monstrosity has wind speeds of more than 250km/h. The list of potential damage includes: Complete roof failure on many residences and industrial buildings, some complete building failures with small utility buildings blown over or away, all shrubs, trees, and signs blown down, complete destruction of mobile homes, severe and extensive window and door damage.

All that destruction takes a massive amount of energy. Scientists at the National Center for Atmospheric Research released an estimate that states a hurricane can release heat energy at the rate of fifty to two hundred trillion joules per day. How much is that? This rate of energy release is equivalent to two hundred times the worldwide electrical generating capacity, or to exploding a 10-megaton nuclear bomb... every twenty minutes.

All that power, from a little wind, heat, and water. This planet really can be terrifyingly amazing.

## Pirates Of The Corporate World

With all the hypocritical flair of American Senate ethics watchdog Larry Craig soliciting sex in an airport bathroom, some of the largest media companies in the world have been caught with their digital pants down. These companies, well known for their vocal opposition to illegal internet activities, have been caught doing what appears to be a little illegal activity of their own.

According to one of the

world's largest havens for online downloading, thepiratebay.org, companies from Twentieth Century Fox, to Sony and Universal Pictures have all been hiring a company out of L.A. named Media-Defenders. For what job? To hack and digitally sabotage various peer-to-peer sites around the internet. And while the people at The Pirate Bay have suspected such attacks for a while, they haven't had any real evidence. Before now.

Evidently one of the em-

ployees at Media-Defenders didn't have a very secure password, enabling an antianti-piracy group to waltz in to the Media-Defenders network and copy a few thousand emails. Amongst the content was confirmation that several big media companies have been paying Media-Defenders to attack file downloading sites.

In some countries (such as the U.S.) these actions may have been fine since piracy sites are illegal there and such attacks could have been commercial content. However The Pirate Bay is based in Sweden, which doesn't have the same stringent anti-piracy laws of the U.S. This makes the hacking of commercially registered websites, such as The Pirate Bay, very illegal, and the site owners are now attempting to take legal action against every company with a Swedish subsidiary involved in the attacks. These are: Twentieth Century Fox, Sweden AB, Emi Music Sweden AB, Universal Music Group

#### Science building nears completion as students head back to class

If you haven't noticed, the Science Building at Saint Mary's is currently under renovation. This 25.5 million dollar project started back in March

2005 and should be completed sometime this spring, 2008. Currently, the students and faculty are sharing the building with construction crews. The new building boasts brand new teaching labs and

research labs, a data cave (for 3D visualization of computer simulations), and many other cool aspects that come with the modernization of over 70, 000 square feet of space.

There is still some

hassle that comes with working, researching and studying in a building currently under construction. Over the past couple of years, many classes and labs have been relocated to other buildings. Those who are fortunate enough to have a class in a new space sometimes have to deal with loud construction noise. This summer I worked in the Environmental Studies department doing research on green roofs, but we were relocated to the Engineering department in McNally, and are now back in a tempo-

rary space until our regular lab is completed.

It will all be worth it in the end, though. As the project nears completion, students can expect only a few minor disruptions over the next two semesters. Stairwells, hallways, and some remaining classrooms should be nearing completion sometime before the new year. Access to the building should remain unchanged, as the best ways are through the pedway from McNally, or either main door on the ground level. One door is just outside the library, and the other can be found on the East side of the building under a temporarily covered walkway.

As the SRC Science Representative, I have been sitting on two of the committees regarding the Science Building all summer. ### Impending \$350 Million Crisis in Student Financial Aid

With Nova Scotia already holding the dubious distinction of being the least affordable place to obtain a post-secondary education in North America, it is no wonder that enrolment figures are down and students hoping to further their studies are faced with the burden of taking on mortgage sized debt. With tuition \$2,000 above the national average many students studying in Nova Scotia rely on scholarships and grants to fund their post-secondary education. One of the biggest sources of scholarships and grants in Canada is the Millennium Scholarship Foundation, which provides 100,000 students \$350 million in student financial aid annually. This foundation is unfortunately set to expire in 2009, which would represent a loss in Canada.

The Canadian Millennium Scholarship Foundation was founded in 1998 by Jean Chrétien's Liberal Government when they invested \$3.5° billion into an endowment that was designed to improve access to post-secondary education. It is crucial for students in Nova Scotia that this foundation be renewed by the Federal Government next budget. While there has been some past criticism about the foundation I would like to inform the student body about what the foundation is and how it helps those in need.

The CMSF provided a significant portion of non-repayable assistance to most provinces. If the CMSF

expires in 2009 provinces will be forced to replace those scholarships and grants with loans; a huge detriment to Nova Scotia students since the average debt burden is already \$22,000. An increase in the debt burden is particularly concerning since students from low-income backgrounds and those from under-represented groups like aboriginals and visible minorities are already less likely to pursue and complete a post-secondary education.

If Millennium expires there are a variety of provincial programs that will be negatively affected. These include: Millennium - Alberta Rural Incentive Bursary (provides assistance to students living in rural areas), Millennium - Saskatchewan Aboriginal Access Bursary (provides assistance to First Nations, Inuit, and Métis students), Millennium - Manitoba Opportunities Grant (provides assistance for dependant students from low-income families, and for First Nations, Inuit, and Métis students), Ontario Student Opportunity Grant and Millennium-Ontario Access Grant (increases retention rates by capping debt loads for high-need students, and provides tuition waivers for low and modest income students in their first year of studies), and Millennium - BC, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, PEI and Newfoundland and Labrador Access Bursaries (provides non-repayable assistance to low-income students).

There have, however, been past criticisms

about Millennium. When the program began some provinces displaced their grant funding, particularly in Nova Scotia, where the province completely eliminated its contribution to grants, leaving students with a net gain of zero. Since then, however, the CMSF was able to sign agreements with each province detailing that they not displace their own funding in

student financial aid. Millennium has also since received glowing reports from the Auditor General stating that the Foundation is both accountable and efficient in how it distributes aid to students.

It will be a major goal of our federal lobby group, the Canadian Alliance of Student Associations (CASA), to have Millennium renewed to ensure there is no net loss in student financial aid. As a member of CASA, SMUSA has and will continue to make efforts to lobby on the local level to make the renewal of Millennium a matter of urgency as we near the 2008 federal budget.

The CMSF has played a particularly important role in Nova Scotia since 1998 in terms of the number and value of awards given out.

#### Checking my Hard Drive

Unknown to many people who have lost data as a result of their hard drive crashing, this could all have been prevented if they ran three programs built into the OS (Windows), on a regular basis. These three programs are Disk Cleanup, Check Disk (Error Check) and Disk Defragmenter.

**Performing Disk Cleanup** 

1.Go to Start > All Programs > Accessories > System Tools > Disk Cleanup. If you don't find the short-cut there, another way to start the program is to go My Computer then right click on Local Disk(C:) (make sure to click on the local disk icon first then right click), click properties and then click on Disk Cleanup. In Vista, you will be asked whether you want to clean up My Files only or Files from all users on this computer. Click all users then click continue-if the Windows need your permission message box appears. In Windows XP, it goes straight into the program.

2. When the program starts it does a scan for all the junk files on the machine. Afterwards it gives you the option of selecting what type of files you want to get rid of and shows you how much disk space is being taken up by the junk files. Since you have the option of selecting what type of files to get rid of, you should go though the list and make sure all the right things are selected. I normally get rid of everything except the Microsoft Office files, if they are present. Afterwards click ok, and then click delete files if a message box comes up.

3. The program then cleans up your hard drive. This may take a while if there are a lot of junk files on the machine.

Performing Disk Check/Error Check

1.Go to My Computer, then right click on Local Disk(C:)(make sure to click on the local disk icon first then right click), click properties then click the Tools tab. Under Error-Checking click Check Now.

If the Windows needs permission message box comes up click continue.

2. Make sure the Automatically fix file system errors and Scan for and attempt recovery of bad sectors are selected then click start. Windows will then say it cannot perform the check while the disk is in use and asks if you want to perform the check the next time Windows starts; click the Schedule disk check button. In Windows XP you'll be asked a yes or no question, click yes to schedule the check after the next reboot.

3. The program then closes, restart your computer and the check will begin when Windows starts up. The larger the hard disk the longer the test will take to complete. In general the check is a time consuming process and you cannot use the computer while it's being performed. So it's best to do it while you are sleeping or away for the day.


Performing Disk Defragmenter

The Disk Defragmenter program in Windows XP and Vista are different, so the same procedure will not work for both.

#### Windows XP

1.Go to Start > All Programs > Accessories > System Tools > Disk Defragmenter. If you don't find the shortcut there, another way to start the program is to go My Computer then right click on Local Disk(C:) (make sure to click on the local disk icon first then right click), click properties, then on the Tools tab then click on Defragment Now.

2. When the program starts select C: then click Analyze. After the Analyze test is done click close in the message box. Red is not good, blue is good, white represents free space on the hard drive and green represents data that cannot be moved on your hard drive.



3.Click Defragment to begin the defragment of your hard drive.

#### Windows Vista

1.Step one from above also applies here.

2.If the need permission message box pops up click continue.

3.Click Defragment now to begin defragmenting of the hard drive.

4. You can continue working while it's running, but its best to run the program when you don't have to use your computer.

Running these programs, at least once a month, will help keep your hard drive in shape. Even if you run these programs, your hard drive can still fail, but the chances are significantly lowered.

Tip of the Week

Pressing the Windows key and 'm' together will minimize all open windows. The key combination Alt-F4 closes any open program in Windows.

In last weeks edition I wrote about the surging Canadian dollar. This week I am writing about the already apparent effects of our soaring dollar.

The last two weekends have seen huge pile ups at Canadian-American borders. Canadians are taking advantage of the exchange rates and have been rushing stateside to shop till they drop! In the US, Canadians can get the same goods for cheaper due to the lack of duties and other exchange costs that are piled on as goods cross the border. Now that the dollars are about equal these added costs are just too high to ignore for most consumers.

Some of the greatest cross-border action has occurred at the Woodstock NB and Houlton ME border. Retailers at the local Houlton Wal-Mart have seen a steady increase in Canadian shoppers over the past weeks. This Wal-Mart has always been a hot spot for Canadian shoppers buying groceries, however lately canucks have moved into the electronics, furniture and clothing sections of the store as well. Milk for instance has always been a hot commodity for Canadians crossing over but with the high dollar, it's over 30% cheaper for a gallon of milk. Even when you factor in gas, Canadians are saving plenty.

Those name brand jeans you were eyeing at Mex, probably \$100 cheaper across the boarder. Shoes, clothing and jewelry have seen the biggest impact with the falling

American dollar, costing up to 50\$ less in the south. Retailers stateside are also slashing prices due to their economic hardships. Suddenly they are paying WAY more to bring in new stock from overseas, and they have to make that profit up on the items that were cheaper; so for the remainder of this season you'll see huge savings.

Still, for this season Canadian retailers are finding it hard to keep up. For the north, it's not as simple as slashing prices. Typically fashion items are bought 2-4 seasons or 12-24 months in advance. This means they were purchased up to two years ago, and the profit retailers are making is based on what the economy was like when the items were purchased. Seeing as two years ago our dollar was abysmal by comparison to the American and European currency, slashing prices will essentially mean selling product for less than retailers bought it for in the first place.

This does however bring about some great news, if you're willing to wait it out. We here in Canada should see lower prices in upcoming seasons when merchandise bought by retailers now end up hitting the shelves. When we're all done at university and are looking to land that great paying job, our business suits and accessories should be cheap enough that we won't need to take out a loan to buy one!

For now, take advantage of the Thanksgiving weekend and go stateside for all your splurging needs.

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## Taxed: How to get back a few bucks

It's just like those Atlantic Lotto 649 commercials say, "Where a million dollars goes as far as a million should". Sure you can buy more than a condo for a million here in Nova Scotia... but you can't get much more than a condo and an education!

Before you start to think that slogan should read more like "Where a million dollars goes into student loan debt"; I'm here to help Canadian students learn the tax system a little better. There are quite a few tricks that will help take the burden off in the end, or at least keep the sting to a minimum.

Both full and part time students can claim tax breaks in several categories when it comes to a university education; some I bet you never thought of. Did you know there are tax breaks for tuition credits, education tax credits, textbook credits, student loan interest credits and now transit credits?

Deductions depend on how much money you are making, but tax credits are the same for everyone. All tax credits depend on is the amount you receive for student loans and how much tuition you pay. Let's take a look at each type of credit and see how they work for you.

they work for you.

Tuition credits: These

are dependant on how much your tuition is for a year. The amount creditable varies with minimum taxable amounts but last year this was 15.5%. If a student were to pay \$6,000 in tuition for a full year, the amount of produced credit would be \$930. Not bad to get almost a grand of credit. Look on the bright side, you pay more than anyone else on the continent for an education, but you can claim more too!

Note: You can only claim tuition and mandatory fees (such as student fees) under this type of credit, the meal plan, parking passes and a new school wardrobe aren't claimable.

Education Tax Credit: In addition to the previously mentioned 15.5% credit, students in college or university can claim an education tax credit. If you are a full-time student you can claim an education credit of \$400 for every month you are registered as a full-time student. Part-time students can claim a \$120 education amount every month.

Textbook Credit: This type of credit benefits some students much more than others. The textbook credit has nothing to do with what you actually spend (don't worry about saving those pesky receipts). That does however mean the students who pay a total of \$500 a year on textbooks make off just as well as those who pay \$2000. If you are eligible to claim the education tax credit you are eligible for this one too! Fulltime students can claim \$65 a month during the school year and part-timers can clam \$20.

Transit Tax Credit:
Hope you saved your trusty
old UPass! Now Canadians
are eligible to claim their
transit passes for all weekly,
monthly or annual passes.
This means any monthly
passes you bought over the
summer, and your UPass are
both creditable.

Student Loan Interest Credit: If you have a loan through a federal or provincial student aid source, you can claim the interest you are charged on the loan. You can't claim the amount if you have consolidated your loan or if it has been refinanced in any other way.

All of these above credits are non-refundable, meaning you don't actually see cold hard cash for them. Tuition credits (for the most part) are what prevent students from having to pay the government come tax time, but what about all the rest? Well, there are two ways to use those extra credits. First you can transfer them to a family member. Second (and since we students are typically the poorest members of the family) the more beneficial solution; you can save the above credits for other years. Most students have a build up of credits they don't even know about! That first year when you are in a real job and have to start paying back loans and taxes, you may have thousands saved up in credits you don't know about! That's when it counts.

There are also a few refundable credits to keep in mind. Students who work can claim up to \$250 for summer or study period employment. There are also other tax measures for low income students and parent students. Learn more online at the Canada Revenue Agency website; http://www.cra-arc.gc.ca/E/pub/tg/p105/.

#### Revered Indie-Songwriter Jon McKiel Unleashes his Second CD

Voted Best New Artist of 2005, McKiel releases The Nature of Things

Critically acclaimed performer Jon McKiel returns to the live stage on October 5, releasing his anticipated second album, The Nature of Things, at the Marquee Club with Calgary group The Cape May and Montreal singersongwriter Jason Bajada. McKiel and his four-piece band recorded the 10-track album at Fort Apache Studios in Boston where such acts as Radiohead (The Bends), Dinosaur Jr. (Green Mind), and the Pixies (Come On Pilgrim) laid down material. The Halifax-based musician signed a two-album record deal with Wednesday Records in California after the success of his self-titled debut.

Where McKiel's first album introduced an indie-rock talent who possessed rare lyrical sensibilities and ability to craft subtle melodies, The Nature of Things expands on those musical characteristics, layering guitars, incorporating horns and keyboards, and driving percussion as the backdrop to the descriptive and introspective lyrics, adding a haunting atmosphere reminiscent of Broken Social Scene and east coast rock group Wintersleep. The record was mastered at Lacquer Channel Studios by Noah Mintz (The Dears, Stars, and BSS).

Songs such as album-opener "War On You," "Walking With The Dead," and "Land of Sand" build slowly and deliberately, with heavy guitars that never overwhelm, instead adding weight to the insightful wordplay. Melodies abound on tracks such as "123 My Friends" and "Somebody's Listening" that update the classic mid-90s Halifax sound for a younger generation. "Poor Heart," "Get Caught," and "Sleep Cities" are example of singer-songwriter vulnerability done with alarming and breathtaking poignancy.

It's not surprising. McKiel's first release was greeted with wide critical acclaim, quickly garnering him respect as one of the strongest new singer-songwriters in the Maritimes, as evidenced by his win as Best New

Artist in *The Coast's* annual Best of Music poll. Music blog Earvolution.com said, "This guy is the 'real deal' singer-songwriter who will be among the next wave of great Canadian imports to charm the U.S. music community." Tara Thorne, Arts Editor for Halifax alt-weekly *The Coast* said about McKiel's previous album:

"McKiel...would rather let the music speak for itself. It's a well-informed decision — not because he can't speak proudly and eloquently of it, he can — but because his nine-song,

untitled record is the best thing to be released in Halifax since In-Flight Safety's latest."

Following the release of that album, McKiel earned three nominations at Music Nova Scotia Week for Male Recording, New Artist, and Alternative Recording of the Year. *Jon McKiel* charted at No. 12 at CKDU for three weeks and he and his band went on to tour with the likes of Joel Plaskett, the aforementioned Wintersleep, Brian Borcherdt, and Cuff the Duke as well as showcasing at the Halifax Pop Explosion.

Who was I to disagree with him? The last time he saw Hanks and Ryan together under director Nora Ephron it was in their double Oscar-nominated film 'Sleepless in Seattle'. I popped the film in anyway (swearing to him that he'd stay awake), handed him a beer and told him that he could (gasp!) pick the Flashback for next week.

You've Got Mail (an update of the 1940's 'Shop Around the Corner') is a flick based on the notion of creating a formidable relationship with someone through e-mail, and then falling madly in cyber-love with that same person you've never really met. Kathleen Kelly, performed sensationally by Meg Ryan, and Joe Fox, played by California-born Tom Hanks, live and work mere blocks from each other on the Upper West Side of the Big Apple. They both shop at the same grocery store, they grab coffee from the same Starbucks and they both have a single infatuation with checking their e-mail. However, they have never crossed direct paths -- until they meet in a 30's chat room under the handles 'NY152' and 'Shopgirl'... and until a Fox Books superstore parks itself across the street from Kathleen's tiny children's bookshop.

You've Got Mail boasts a fantastic cast of actors besides just our main heroes. Parker Posey (from 'Josie and the Pussycats') plays Fox's hyperactive ladyfriend; Steve Zahn ('Daddy Day Care' and 'Bandidas') asserts a lovable presentation of bookstore clerk George, and Greg Kinnear ('We Were Soldiers') co-stars with a compelling performance as a passionate newspaper columnist Frank Navasky, Kelly's assumed boyfriend. Although these characters are meant to bring life to the relationship between NY152 and Shopgirl, they also emulate very clearly the kinds of people we would encounter in the Shop Around The Corner, bringing the movie to have a down home, down-to-earth nature with a feel-good finale.

In the end, my guy friend actually liked the movie. He laughed when I laughed, awwed when I aww-ed and generally interacted with what was going on on-screen even after the flick had ended. This movie has also fallen victim to the pit of time, but could even be updated AGAIN, exploring the implications of complete online dating, dating websites and virtual relationships. Even though the film gathers a nine-year fissure between it's creation and today, the best (and truest!) appearance of all spans the technological gap. Jean Stapleton, who steals the show as accountant Birdie Conrad, fashions the most memorable laugh of the internet in the late 1990's: "I tried to have cybersex once," she states "but I kept getting a busy signal."



## Oktoberfest, what does it really mean?

Images of Oktoberfest usually consist of beer swilling revelers and sausage scarfing drinks (possibly wearing lederhosen?), but does anyone actually know what Oktoberfest is really about? Is it really just about beer and sausage?

Turns out it's not. At least, not historically. When it was first held in Munich, Germany, it was to celebrate the marriage of Crown Prince Ludwig and Therese of Bavaria back in 1810. Ludwig wanted to throw a big party and so a few days after their marriage, a horse race was held with everyone invited. In 1819, Munich's "town fathers" took over the event and decided that it should be held annually with no exceptions.

Well, there have been exceptions such as the Napoleonic war, the World Wars (Nazis didn't like to party, who knew?) as well as an outbreak of cholera that have managed to shut down the celebrations. Over a 197 year span, Oktoberfest has only been cancelled 24 times and will be celebrating 200 years in 2010.

Munich has become world famous for its festival, in 2006 there were an estimated 6.5 million visitors to the Oktoberfest which runs for 16 to 18 days leading up to the first Sunday in October. This year's Oktoberfest runs until October 7 and started on September 22. The mayor of Munich taps the first keg at 12:00 on the first day and the festival begins, where only beer from Bavaria is served and many places offer special Oktoberfest brews which are often have a little stronger alcohol content.

Munich is not the only place to have an Oktoberfest celebration anymore though. Since about 1950 when the festival became an internationally known event, and in 1960 when the horse races ended, the "modern era" of Oktoberfest began. The idea of the festival has spread to cities worldwide. Tatamagouche, on the north shore of Nova Scotia has an annual Oktoberfest with about 3,000 party goers attending over the last weekend of September taking in all kinds of beer and Bavarian style food and meats from the local meat shops on the north shore. Of course, Canada's most famous and largest Oktoberfest takes place in a city formerly known as Berlin. Kitchener, Ontario has been officially holding an Oktoberfest since 1969. Any

fans of the great Canadian 1983 film *Strange Brew: The adventures of Bob and Doug MacKenzie* will remember the scene where they have to save Oktoberfest from being tainted by mind controlling beer and should know that Oktoberfest portrayed in the film is the one that occurs in Kitchener-Waterloo.

Of course some restraint should be shown if you ever find yourself at a true Oktoberfest, where the servings of beer come strictly in the one litre format. A recent story in the news reported that a 27 year old man who was partaking in some Oktoberfest beverages in Munich became stuck in a chimney after deciding that was the best way to break in to his friends house who had the door locked and was either passed out or not home. Somehow a janitor in the building heard his cries for help some time later and the rescue squadron pulled in and did their thing. But wait, there's a twist! He was naked! ## Halifax Pizza Patrol: Nick-N-Willy's Pizza

Nick-N-Willy's Pizza is tucked into the Quinpool centre, with the entrance up a couple stairs and leading onto Quinpool road. On the outside, they have a few chairs and tables with umbrella's set up to accommodate customers on sunny days, and the typical inside setup for those

wetter and colder days.

Nick-N-Willy's is a different type of pizza joint, being part of a larger chain across North America, with locations in Canada and the US. Nick-N-Willy's makes premade pizzas that you can take home and bake, or you can order

and they'll cook it up for you.

We ordered a pepperoni pizza on a Friday afternoon, and in no time at all we were sitting down enjoying our pizza. It was served to us on a thin metal pizza pan, with smaller individual sized pizza pans used as plates. The pizza looked good, and was a thinner crust than most places offer.

The dough is one of the first things to stand out.

Nick-N-Willy's uses a gas-fired brick oven, and you can tell with its fired baked flavor. The crust is nice and crispy, and very delicious.

Another stand out ingredient of the pizza is the cheese. Nick-N-Willy's uses a fresh feta and fontina cheese mixture, and tops the pizza with the perfect amount. The quality of the cheese was easy to discern. It was full of flavor, was nice and stringy, and didn't have any pools of grease.

The sauce on the pizza was also of high quality. It was spread evenly over the dough - not too thick or too thin. The mixture of tomatoes and spices used in the sauce could all be tasted, added to an already thoroughly enjoyable experience.

#### Blueberry Zinger Muffins:

4 cups flour

2 tablespoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 egg equivalent

11/2 cup soy milk

1/2 cup margarine

1/2 cup sugar

2/3 cup maple syrup 1-2 cups blueberries

1 tsp grated lemon rind

1 tsp cinnamon

1 tsp nutmeg crushed almonds for the top

Drizzle: juice of 1 lemon 1/4 cup of sugar 1/2 cup of water

#### **Directions:**

Mix the dry ingredients, and mix the wet ingredients separately then stir them together (but don't over stir!). Spoon it into greased muffin tins and bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. ### The Chancellor of Saint Mary's University

The chancellor of Saint Mary's University is opposed to same-sex marriage. The chancellor of our university doesn't just happen to be the Archbishop of Nova Scotia; he is, rather, the chancellor of our university because he is Archbishop. Were his beliefs to changeBor, in any case, were he no longer to represent himself as believing in accordance with Church doctrineBour chancellor would cease to be Archbishop and, thereby, cease to be our Chancellor.

There are many reasons, each individually sufficient, why the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Nova Scotia ought not automatically be designated the chancellor of Saint Mary's University. For one, it should be possible in principle for us to have a chancellor who is a woman married to one woman and divorced from another, who is a tireless fighter for abortion rights, and who believes that wine is always wine. For another, it should be possible in principle for the university community to reject a candidate for the office of chancellor. Indeed, the person eventually named as chancellor should first of all have been a candidate for the position.

The north end of Halifax is never what it seems. Just when you think you have it figured out, it transforms itself into something new, something you have yet to experience.

Living in the north end for the past 5 years, I have been constantly surprised at the sense of community shared by its residents. From the impressive and constant pot luck gatherings to the free outdoor concerts and movies, to the intimate backyard jamborees; from hockey night at the Forum to baseball on the commons to dirt jumping mountain bikes at Seaview Memorial park; from the small cafes to the mom and pop fish and chip joints to the best beer (Propeller and Oland's); there is scarcely anything the north end doesn't have.

Sometimes though, it's not always about what you have, but what you don't have. The north end doesn't have the feel of a large urban centre (if you count Halifax as a large urban centre). I have had the best of both worlds by living in the north end and by attending Saint Mary's in the south end. I like the south end, it

has some amazing architecture featured on some of its older houses and it has the hustle and bustle because of its connectivity to downtown. I like to watch people hurrying about to various engagements as I ride the bus from the north end into the south end. Now, don't get me wrong, the north end features all kinds of hustle and bustle. There are several major transportation links and gateways located in the north end. The only difference is that the hustle bustle only happens during rush hours and on certain streets. In the south end, I find that both pedestrian and motor traffic is non-stop.

There is all kinds of bad press about the north end, usually it is depicted as a crime ridden area. I am not here to say that crime does not exist in the north end, nor am I here to say that violence is corrupting the south end; I just want to address the issue and say that I believe crime happens in all parts of the city. The third option you can consider is an electronic trimmer. You know those ones your hairdresser uses to clip your




## Saint Mary's Chops Down Axemen

The Huskies are poised for AUS supremacy this season as they chopped down the Acadia Axemen in Wolfville this past weekend, giving notice to the rest of the league that all should be "aware of the dogs." The Axemen fans were admitted to and witnessed the "run and gun

show" of Jacques Lumbala and Erik Glavic. Revenge is sweet, especially when it occurs in a place where your last loss occurred, which happened to be in the AUS Championship. 33 second half points and 678 yards in offence= a 4-0 start. The mighty Huskies coasted their sleigh through the Axemen by

a score of 40-12, to remain the top dogs in the AUS.

Despite the onslaught of offensive yardage, the Huskies failed to capitalize at key times in the first half. An errant interception by Glavic was returned by Najja Coley 54 yards for a score. 50 yd dart by Glavic to Shawn White and a Justin Palardy field goal gave SMU 24-12 edge.

Our offensive juggernaut made a joke of the Acadia defense, as Erik and Co. continued to conduct the movement of the chains all day long. Erik was 22-29 for 340 yards in the air and ran for 101 yards on ground. Glavic is the second leading rusher in the conference next to teammate Jacques Lumbala. Lumbala ran 15 times for 180 yards complemented by two trips to the endzone. Shawn White led all receivers with 125 yards on five receptions. SMU was led on defense by Tim St. Pierre who accounted for 7 tackles and Matt Lemay who had two sacks.

SMU, ranked #6 in the country, will host St. Francis Friday at 7pm. The Huskies should roll over the X-Men, setting up a battle against the #1 ranked Laval Rouge-et-Ore on October

13th. The national rankings don't mean much, as they are an indicator of who is believed to be among the elite in the country. But the game against Laval will indicate exactly how strong SMU is. SMU is averaging 513 yards on offence in a game, 2nd to Laval. SMU sports the #1 rushing attack in the country netting 300 yards per game. The "dogs of the D" are ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> in the country allowing 234 yards per game. The numbers don't lie.

Make sure to come out to the game and support your Huskies. There's nothing better than watching a game under the Friday night lights, especially when you can watch "Easy E" (Why the nickname? Because Erik makes the game look so easy) and the offence flex their power against inferior divisional opponents. Let's go Huskies!

Huskies are ranked #7 in the country and they're #2 in the AUS. SMU hosts Acadia Oct, 10<sup>th</sup> at 5pm.


