#### Federal Election is Called

Stephen Harper dissolved parliament on Sunday, triggering the third federal election in four years. The date Canadians will go to the polls is October 14, two days after thanksgiving. After announcing that the Governor General had accepted his request to have parliament dissolved, Harper immediately switched to campaign mode and turned the press conference into an opportunity to sway voters.

Speaking to a crowd of journalists, Harper claimed that the Liberal party would raise taxes on "everything," and that voting for them was too risky in these troubled economic times. He also heaped praise on his own party's accomplishments, noting that they had the longest minority in Canadian history (second longest according to others) and that they had reduced taxes and introduced a childcare benefit fund for children. Despite his confident attitude, Harper played down his chances at a majority, which some pundits interpreted as a sign that the public is wary of a conservative majority government. Throughout the speech Harper continued to try and show his 'softer side' to the Canadian public, ending his speech with the line "I won't say goodbye, I'll see you for five weeks."

After the Prime Minister ended his speech the opposition leaders were each given a chance to speak. Liberal Leader Stephane Dion attempted to paint Harper's government as a risky decision, claiming

that they had spent more money than

any other government, and that the economy has not been this bad since Brian Mulroney (a Conservative) was in power. In contrast he called his own plan a "stark" choice. Dion also accused Harper of breaking his own election law and engaging in "Republican style attack ads" which he said he would fight with "Canadian style courage." When asked about his Green Shift plan, Dion claimed that he had the backing of economists and Nobel Prize winners, and that his plan has never failed when implemented

in other countries. After both speeches, CTV's Lloyd Robertson called Dion's speech "his most impressive yet", and later in the day Mike Duffy claimed he had heard many people echo the sentiment.

Bloc Quebecois leader Gilles Duceppe spent most of his time comparing Stephen Harper to George Bush. Jack Layton injected humour into his speech, opening with "Stephen Harper announced he is quitting as prime minister, so today I'm announcing that I'm applying for his job." Green Party Leader Elizabeth May also spoke, and said "Don't watch CNN, I know McCain and Obama is exciting, but this is about our nation's future." Ms. May is the only party leader running in a Nova Scotia riding.

# Why your textbook prices have skyrocketed

Everyone knows the cost oftextbooks is high. The price for textbooks in Canada between 1998 and 2007 has increased at 2.8 times the CPI. The CPI is the consumer price index, the rate at which items should increase in price in the market over time.

Many publishing companies come out with frequent new editions of each textbook. In the past, there may have only been a new edition every seven or eight years. Now, we can expect a new edition every three years. If you are trying to buy a used edition for your class, make sure it is still okay to use with the professor first. There are also other components and features of the textbook which may make it obsolete to buy the used or previous edition. The phenomenon of bundling is becoming more common.

This is when publishers pack CDs or other online access codes with the textbook. These CDs or access codes may expire after a year. Also check with your professors to see if they will be using the extra components for their class. If not, you may not need to buy these costly features.

Many students and instructors

Many students and instructors are asking why new editions and price increases happen for books with little changes in curriculum, especially for example calculus and physics. This is a common problem, which the publishing industry tries to explain through a need for new end-of-chapter questions for and adapting the curriculum examples to current events and pop culture.

Another issue is who the textbooks are marketed to. The market is the professors, but students are the ones who have to pay. Each publisher rigorously tries to sell their books to professors via local sales reps. Often the professors are not told of the cost of the book, or continue to use a book year after year, even though there are recent and expensive new editions. The publishers make it difficult for the professors and bookstores to continue to use the old editions because of supply issues

All of these things are making used textbooks obsolete, driving up the costs for students, who are the end user of the book. The data showing the rising costs of textbooks is supported by many PIRGs (Public Interest Research Groups) in the US and a number of Canadian university bookstores. Get to know the issues and get involved. Write your local politicians and talk to your professors about the issues

### ...And Where to Get them Cheap

Text books and other academic material required for your classes can cost a lot of money, but they don't have to. For many students, the cost can be a significant portion of the total amount spent on post-secondary education. Textbooks can average \$700-1000 per year, and the costs

are continuing to rise. More and more students are finding ways to cut the costs of textbooks, but make sure you know all your options and all the facts first.

Many publishing companies offer digital textbooks, which is an online version of the hard copy book you would buy at the bookstore. These are available for most new editions. Digital textbooks are cheaper to buy, but there are some drawbacks. You can't sell these books back for some money at the end of the semester. Most digital textbooks have limited access, or the access expires after a certain length of time.

You can't print the whole book, or there is a limited amount of printing. It also depends if you like reading a screen or highlighting the pages.

Thrifty shoppers who make it to the bookstore early can usually find a used version of the textbook they need for their class. The used versions are a lot cheaper than a new book. Frequent new editions of many textbooks means there won't always be

a used edition available. Check with your professor to see if an old edition would still be sufficient for class. You can check with your friends who have taken that class before, or buy and sell your used text books on the SMUSA Book Exchange (www.smusa.ca/books. asp).

There are lots of other options to keep the cost of academic materials low. Try sharing your books with friends or roommates in

the same class. You could head to the library to see if the textbook is available there. A lot of students have started using the international editions of textbooks. These can be cheaper and come from another country. Be cautious though, international editions can have varying content, different page numbers, lower quality, and also copyright issues. the goals of the Canadian edition can be to provide the class content of the context of Canadian culture, which can be lost in international editions. If you are buying you textbooks online from other book store chains, make sure you check the ISBN number, and how long

it will take to ship it to you.

Many professors don't use a
textbook, and instead rely on other,
possibly cheaper, methods to teach

their class. Some professors will only use PowerPoint presentations or handouts and post them online after class, or require you to look up selected readings at the library or in online journals. Instead of textbooks, course-packs are commonly used. This is a prebound collection of articles and chapters. The cost covers photocopying and any copyright fees. Happy studying!

# Hollywood comes to Halifax - The 28th Annual Atlantic Film Festival

It is once again September, and as school begins and the streets fill with students, the fourth major film festival in Canada is back for it's 28th run through Halifax. The Atlantic Film Festival is one of Halifax's many annual events which spotlight our own incredible local talent alongside anticipated blockbusters. Halifax is the center of independent culture in the upcoming week.

This year, the festival brags a stunning 254 films over the next nine days of varied length, origin, and medium. There are short films, full-length features, and some fulllength features accompanied by short films. While the majority of them were made here in Halifax, their production locations spread from across Canada to Japan, Brazil, and Europe. The repertoire includes documentaries (Gonzo: The Life and Work of Hunter S. Thompson), animations (Don Hartzfeldt's i am so proud of you, from the maker of classics like Rejected), comedies (Summerhood, another Haligonian contribution about a tenyear-old finding love in summer camp), and more, all of which are off the beaten track. It will also air Halifax's favourite comedy group Picnicface's new three-minute video, Beard no Beard.

The That's So Gay feature returns again this year with movies like Bi The Way, a documentary about the people who don't fit into neat little boxes of "straight" or "gay". It kicks off with Were The World Mine a story about a performance of A Midsummer Night's Dream in an all-boys prep school. The festival does not exclude the horror/

Film Noir territory with the Late Shift, including films such as Midnight Meat Train, based on a story by horror legend Clive Barker, where a photographer mistakenly captures a shot of a murder. Haligonian Jason Eisner follows up classic Hobo




This is the poster to be displayed in Canada only after being banned for suggestive content in the U.S.

with a Shotgun with short-film/faux trailer Treevenge, which speaks for itself. Finally we have a live-action French-language film of Asterix at the Olympic Games bringing the series to the big screen for the first time. As you can see, there's something for everybody, and plenty for those looking for something different

The Festival will also be showing a few bigname international projects. For example, Kevin Smith's new project Zack and Miri Make a Porno starring Seth Rogen has one show on Saturday. This movie covers friends who are strapped for cash and decide to strike it rich by making an adult film. The movie has been swamped with controversy as it was almost given an NC-17 rating and has a poster that has been banned in the U.S. The film adaptation of Chuck Palahniuk's book Choke only has one showing on Friday. The second movie from Fight Club's author is about a man who makes a living letting people save him from choking in restaurants and spends his free time picking up girls from a nymphomaniac recovery group. The speculative Joe Saramago film, Blindness, starring Julianne Moore is also premièring at the festival, showing in several locations Thursday 11th. This one is a Canada/Brazil collaborative project where an epidemic of blindness breaks out all over the world. The people of Halifax are being offered seats to early viewings of these sure-to-be-blockbusters. Students, welcome back to the city!

### "The Cranky Professor"

Nothing Wrong with Abortion

Thoughtful and caring people today must find their way through many hard ethical problems, problems where there's something to say on both sides and for which no solution can adequately meet every concern. Abortion is not one of these problems.

Abortion involves knowingly—if not, indeed, wilfully—killing a human being. The fact that abortion involves knowingly killing a human being is not, though, any reason to oppose abortion.

To see this, consider the reasons we all have to refrain from killing any person currently reading this newspaper. A reader of this newspaper is a sentient being, aware of herself and her surround-

ings, capable of enjoying her life. That's one good reason. But an even better reason is that she has a settled and firm preference to continue living. To kill her would be to act decisively against her desire to live.

On the other hand, a human fetus, though just as human as you or me, is not capable of enjoying her life, as she is not aware of it. Even more, she has no preference to continue living, as she has no preferences or desires at all. She neither has the neural structures required for self-consciousness, and, thus, for having preferences, nor has she had the range of experiences needed to prefer one specific thing to another.

"That's all perfectly fine," one might object, "except that in

the fullness of time, the fetus will come to be conscious and self-consciousness, and to have a rich web of preferences and desires." True enough, but right now the fetus is not conscious or self-conscious and lacks preferences. Right now, the fetus's mental life is not even that of a canary. To hold that the fact that the fetus will develop into a person just like you or me is a reason not to kill it is simply to favour having another person like you or me around. But to favour having another person around is to oppose contraception. For, after all, contraception prevents human fetuses from coming into existence and, thereby, makes for fewer people. (One could, though, I guess, oppose all birth control, even abstinence, as denying existence to

people who otherwise would exist.)

"Nonetheless," another might object, "the fact is that each human fetus is human, and that is a reason not to kill a human fetus." It's hard to see, though, how the humanity of the fetus matters to anything. The reason one has not to treat a particular human being some way will inevitably have to do with some feature of that being, not with its humanity, which, after all, is just its membership in a particular species. (One could, again, care that members of some species are not killed just in virtue of their membership in that species, but I don't think many of us do.) Now we ought not to use abortion as a means of birth control in preference to condoms and foam or the pill. That's not, though, as

we have seen, because we have any reason to protect a fetus from being killed when a woman wants to end her pregnancy. We ought not to prefer abortion to condoms and foam because abortion is a surgical procedure that involves risk, time, energy, and money. Better, then, not to have become pregnant in the first place than to have an abortion. But if one is pregnant and one doesn't want to be, that abortion involves knowingly killing a human being is no reason not to have an abortion.

From an ethical point of view, abortion is entirely a matter of indifference.

#### AIESEC Canada: Nurturing Young Leaders for 50 Years

AIESEC Halifax is something of a hidden gem on the Saint Mary's campus. Yet for those who have participated in its programs, it has been the gateway to life-enhancing experiences both professionally and personally.

AIESEC was established after World War II to help foster cultural understanding between countries. Today, it is the world's largest student-run organization. It works in partnership with business and higher education to send students on internships around the globe and to give internationally aware young leaders valuable leadership and cultural experiences. Its programs are designed with the aim of giving its participants hands-on experience of running a small business long before they graduate from university.

At the time of its inception, AIESEC stood for "L'Association Internationale des Etudiants en Sciences Economiques et Commerciales." However, as fourthyear Science student and local alumni coordinator Adam Harris explains, the organization is now known solely as AIESEC. "The original name was appropriate when the organization was formed, but we are now inclusive of all Faculties – not just economic sciences and commerce. We continue to use the acronym AIESEC because of the well - established brand and history that it has."

This year, AIESEC Canada is celebrating its 50th anniversary with a National Congress in Montreal, which will bring together more than 300 alumni to talk about the organization's past and future, and to launch a new strategic plan. As part of its anniversary celebrations, AIESEC Canada is profiling 50 alumni, including Karyn (Mathieu) Power, an alumna of Saint Mary's University. Karyn studied for a BComm at Saint Mary's in the late 1980s. With her interests in business and working abroad, AIESEC was a perfect fit. Starting as a member,

Karyn then worked on the special projects committee and served as vice-president of marketing between 1987 and 1989. To be a part of AIESEC, she explains, was to be involved in "running a not-for-profit organization on campus. We had to sell the concept of AIESEC to businesses in Halifax, manage the money coming in, run special projects, and attend conferences. For me, it was a chance to take the theoretical knowledge I was learning in class and apply it."

Karyn's work has seen her travel widely, both in Canada and abroad, and over the years fellow AIESEC participants have continued to crop up in unexpected places. Karyn has also continued to lend her support to the AIESEC Halifax group in particular, explaining to local businesses why they should hire students from abroad. "I say to them that if they are looking to do business with another country, what better way to give their company a cultural awareness of their target market than to hire a student from that country."

Looking to the future, local alumni coordinator Adam Harris maintains that the cultural understanding and business skills that AIESEC promotes continue to be relevant for both the students and the companies for which they work. And for Saint Mary's alumni, hiring an AIESEC intern from another country is the perfect way to "give back" to an organization that means so much to so many.

Career Services consists of a team of professional Counsellors, administrative staff, trained student staff and student volunteers who work to provide students of Saint Mary's a comprehensive package of services related to career exploration and development.

# Canada Welcomes You! International Students

International students from near and afar are welcomed by a pleasing message that they are allowed to apply for permanent resident status within Canada when they have one-year Canadian work experience.

The Minister of Citizenship and Immigration, Diane Finley announced on August 12 the details of a new immigration approach, namely, the Canadian Experience Class. Unlike other existing programs, this policy considers the immigration applicant's Canadian work experience as a key factor in the immigration selection process. For international students with a two-year academic background and one-year work experience in Canada, they can apply to become permanent residents and then citizens.

This is an exhilarating message for Canada's foreign students who want to immigrate to Canada! As Johnny A., a Lebanese student with a master degree

from Dalhousie University, said, "It is good news for international students and especially for those who are seeking to stay in Canada. It's a great program, making the immigration easier..."


Johnny A. is right. Canada has been making it easier for international students to stay. Just four months ago, Canada relaxed its rules and made it easier for international students to stay in the country to work for up to THREE years after graduation. This Post-Graduation Work Permit Program means eligible foreign graduates may work anywhere in the country and no longer must have a job offer to get a work permit.

The shift removes some of the major flaws in the previous regulations, which often received complaints from both employers and foreign students. The main complaint, according to a study released last October, was that the previous regulations were rather confusing: while the potential future employers had limited ac-

cess to proper information, foreign students had only 90 days to land a job, a time period impossible for job-hunting... A friend of mine who switched from Toronto to New York to pursue his master once wrote to me, saying "The (Canadian) government gives a very generous welfare to a refugee (this is why Canada appeals to sleeper cells), but it hurts international students by making them feel as pariahs...I liked this country, and that was why I chose to study here; but I was too frustrated afterwards...'

And now, the complaints should be gone and superseded by acclaim!

Both changes are conveying a clearest sign that the Canadian government is recognizing the need to increase its pool of educated, talented and skilled professionals!





## Muslims throughout the SMU Community begin the Fasting month
