Answering the Tough Questions

Q: How come there are no more Student Handbooks (agendas), don't I pay for them with my student fees?

We completely understand your frustration and continually look for the right quantity to order. Our goal is to make a Student Handbook available to every SMU student that wants one, without having boxes of them sitting in storage. We are very proud of this year's Student Handbook and hope that everyone that has one is taking advantage of using it. And now to answer your question:

A: sort of. And now for the long answer: This year, SMUSA produced 4,750 Student Handbooks which is the largest order of Handbooks we've made in over ten years (possibly our largest order ever). How we budget for the production of the Handbook is based on several key factors: annual budget, demand, advertising revenue, and cost of production.

Each year, when the SMUSA executive and fulltime staff put together the budget for the year ahead, a budget is created for the Student Handbook. This budget must be approved by the Board of Directors. The way this is set up is different from something like the U-Pass, which is a separate levy that each fulltime student pays in return for a heavily discounted Metro Transit Pass. Since funding for the Student Handbook is not explicitly levied, the cost of production must compete against other services provided by the organization during the budgeting process. Balancing the budget between so many areas (a breakdown is shown in the SMUSA President's Report, available for download at www.smusa.ca) is a very complicated process and goes through the process of review and projections as mentioned

Last year's Student Handbook proved to be very popular, and we ran out sooner than expected, while the year before we had hundreds of Student Handbooks left in boxes. Such inconsistent historical data could not justify purchasing an additional 2,000 Handbooks. We did, however, increase our order size by 250 books. It was felt that this number would be enough to satisfy the increase in demand, as we had only a handful of complaints from students regarding a Handbook shortage last year.

In our budget preparations, we review the success of the previous years' Handbooks, which is not only

how many were given out, but also the success of advertising revenue. All of this information is important as we have revenue goals to meet in order to support the production of the books and ultimately balance the budget. For 2009-2010, we reviewed last year's Handbook sales and set similar advertising sales goals as last year (classic SWOT analysis for those of you in Commerce), with the expectation that we would order more Handbooks if sales reached certain targets above the initial goal. While we were able to reach our base advertising sales targets, we did not exceed them by near enough to increase the size of our order.

The cost to produce Handbooks this year has not changed drastically over last year. As mentioned above, we did not change our order size, but this does segue to another good question:

Q: Can't you just order more?

A: At this point we are not going to order additional books. While the production company has our final files, the cost for set-up and production for a smallrun of additional books is far too steep to be justified, and frankly, we don't' have the budget for it. There is also the factor of timing; the production facilities usually have delivery dates set two to three months ahead of time as they generally run 24/7 with orders always in queue. To give an example, in order to guarantee that we would receive the 2009-2010 Student Handbook by August 31 (the start of the Services Expo), we had to send our final files by the third week of June. That also explains why some of the information in the Handbook is incorrect or missing; many things (Orientation Week in particular) are still being planned at time of production. We do our best to provide the most up-to-date information that we can.

'Prevention' Not the Cure when it comes to Sexual Assault

The "peeping tom" incidents that have recently occurred in Halifax's South End should serve as a reminder that so-called preventative measures do little to prevent sexual assault and sexual violence.

The women who were 'watched' in these incidents were assaulted in their homes, precisely where they should have expected to feel safe. Not going out at night, carrying keys between fingers and avoiding shortcuts would not have protected these women from having their bodies violated.

While the perpetrator in these cases was a stranger to the women involved, such preventative measures also do little to stop the vast majority of sexual assault cases—cases in which the victim knows their attacker.

These techniques emphasize that women must take responsibility for preventing sexual assault, implying that women who are victimized are to blame for failing to take adequate prevention measures or for encouraging their attackers.

In addition to shifting responsibility from the perpetrator to the victim, such an approach limits an analysis of sexual assault to the individual level and does not question the broader cultures that support and encourage sexual violence and assault. It fails to recognize that we still live in a world where men are encouraged to have unlimited access to women's bodies; a world where women lack sexual and bodily autonomy.

Until these underlying issues are recognized and addressed by both men and women, we have little hope of combating a culture of sexual violence so pervasive that 20-25% of college-aged women report being victims of sexual assault.

Let the "peeping tom" incidents serve as a reminder of the limitations of individualistic defensive measures. While being aware of such measures may help women feel more safe or empowered, they cannot, by themselves, stop sexual violence.

gins. Attending can also lead to valuable connections, summer internships, Co-op placements or summer jobs in your preferred field.

The Halifax Career Fair is a joint event organized by Saint Mary's, Dalhousie and Mount Saint Vincent and has been proclaimed one of the best in the country by past exhibitors. Due to the recession organizers planned for a decrease in interested exhibitors but actually exceeded their target by attracting 143 exhibitors for Tuesday's event. Attendance in the past has exceeded 1,700 which is better than at the Job Fairs of many major universities in larger Canadian provinces like Ontario.

The Journal spoke with the Manager of the SMU Student Employment & Coop Centre, and Chair of the 2009 Halifax

Career Fair, Mary Ellen MacEachern. She encourages students to attend the Fair on Tuesday as the Student Employment Centre receives many inquiries from students later in the year asking if there will be a career fair and she has to tell them they missed it.

The presenting sponsor of the 2009 Career Fair is the Government of Canada. This is of huge benefit to students as it will provide students the opportunity to learn about potential employment opportunities with the Federal Government. Speakers will also be presenting throughout the day on topics that may help students succeed in applying for Government jobs, topics of these presentations include "How to apply to the Federal Public Service (this will be given twice throughout the day)," "En-

gineers in the Federal Government," "Scientists in the Federal Government," as well as "Business and Commerce in the Federal Government."

The Provincial Governments of both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will also be at the Fair. Other exhibitors include Nexen, The Greater Halifax Partnership, Freedom 55 Financial, Medavie Blue Cross, CGA Nova Scotia and Imperial Oil just to name a few. Pick up a Career Fair Program or visit the website for a complete list of companies, organized by disciplines and where each booth will be loca-

> Mary Ellen also notes that even if employers may not

seem to be targeting students from your particular discipline it is still worth stopping to talk with them as there may be positions that could make use of your skill set available within the company as well. Even if employers are not currently recruiting for your position be sure to demonstrate your interest and request the contact information of the Human Resource person or for the head of the department you are interested in.

It is also recommended students research the top twenty or so companies that are most appealing to them, so before meeting with employers students have an idea of what positions are being hired for, and what jobs you are interested in applying

At the Fair it is best not to hand out generic resumes, although having a cou-

ple for your own personal reference v make things easier for you when speak with potential employers said Mary Ell Many employers will encourage stude to apply on-line which may be discou ging, but rather than walk away frustra ask employers for tips on how to may your resume stand out from the rest.

While at the booth, demonstrate strcinterpersonal skills by treating other ir rested students with respect. Rememistrate impressions count and it is better be remembered as a very courteous prective employee, than as a cut-throus disrespectful student. When approach booths, demonstrate a sincere enthusia for the company and the positions of terest as employers will pick up on extement about the company and remem that. When researching the companies, and think of questions to ask when give the opportunity so you will appear we prepared, not to mention intelligent.

In the week following the Fair it is i portant to follow-up on connections ma Whether you have already applied for position, or if you are still waiting the application to become available in important to send a follow up email knowledging your meeting, and what y discussed. To simplify this for you, clect business cards and after leaving ear booth make a note on the back of the cregarding what you discussed so you ceasily reference it at a later date.

The End of Super Seven





To Vote Or Not To Vote



"Make Your Decision, Dreaming Saint." TRIGUN by Yasuhiro Nightow

If someone were to ask me what ver Vash goes. As the series progres-I love the most in a story... well, I would probably forget. But when I come into contact with stories like The Kite Runner and A Separate Peace, it all comes rushing back. What really wins me over every time is the curious love of a good friendship story. Years ago, I was finally able to watch the Trigun animated series. The tale follows the journey of Vash the Stampede - a man who has a \$\$60 billion (double dollar) bounty on his head - as he struggles to survive on the planet Gunsmoke, a human colony on a desert planet. He conquers these struggles with his friend, Nicholas D. Wolfwood at his side, but can Vash survive without killing his enemies? Can Vash convince Wolfwood of this?

The Trigun manga begins when Vash is officially declared a localized disaster - he is no longer responsible for the damages he causes due to his spectacularly bad luck. Of course this doesn't stop the unfortunate events from taking place whereses - through the anime as well as the manga - this loveable and upbeat character continues to suffer time after time as he pursues his renegade brother, Knives. To save human civilization Vash and Wolfwood, need to fight every step of the way.

Trigun is actually made of two separate manga series: "Trigun" is two very large volumes of manga, and then "Trigun: Maximum", fourteen volumes that become quite different from what was in the original animated series. The art of the series, done by the author (Nightow), starts out okay and becomes stunning as the story progresses. Nightow's characters start off as charming and conclude as the reader's best friends. Vash's upbeat demeanor wins over every reader, and hooks you on the series with his heart-wrenching struggle. His friendship with Wolfwood, the realist, seems his raison d'etre while his objective is the reconciliation of the conflict with his brother. The action is frequent and drama-

can be puzzling at times to interpret the exact actions - I imagine they are difficult to draw and choreograph but the core elements included are usually enough for any reader to follow. The characters are all strong and dynamic, and everyone will have a different favourite as they devour the series. It is the characters themselves, more than the plot, who most readers will fall in love with and provide the drive to read through to the end. The ending doesn't disappoint either; the final chapter is surprising and reassuring without being disappointing.

Trigun is a fantastic emotional roller-coaster ride for anyone like myself who loves strong characters before a good plot. Not that the plot in Trigun isn't good, but it's so character-oriented that it's hard to tell the different between the two. Both expertly drawn and written, I love Trigun dearly and I think everyone should read it. If you've

watched the anime, the manga offers a completely new experience. If

you haven't seen or read it, you should. It's a classic piece of Japanese manga without carrying any of the typical tropes of the genre. Trigun is actually a Science-fiction Western. Or, as the back of the books brag, "Deep space planet future gun action!!" I recommend it to everyone, even if you don't read Japanese comics, Trigun is different. It is a part of my list of "anime for people who don't like anime". There are no giant robots in this one, Canada! Pick it up.

According to Amazon.com's sales figures, Dan Brown's latest novel, The Lost Symbol, is selling better in its digital form, compatible with Amazon's Kindle e-book reader, than in its physical, hardcover form. Part of the reason could be the price difference. The hardcover version on Amazon.com is \$16.17, while the Kindle-supported version is a scant \$9.99 (prices in USD). Considering that e-books collectively come to only 1 to 2 percent of the overall market, this news is a significant breakthrough for the digital distribution transaction model. On a related note, American sales tracker NPD has announced that they want to introduce a monthly digital download chart for games sold on Xbox Live Arcade, Playstation Network, WiiWare, and Game Publisher Valve's Steam service, among other online distribution services.

New Halo Shooter Released, Doesn't Star Master Chief



Bungie's newest Halo title, Halo 3: ODST released this week. Originally designed to be a short, 3-4 hour expansion supplement to the Halo 3 story, ODST has since been expanded into a full-length game. This is the first Halo first-person shooter to NOT star the franchise's main character, Master Chief. Instead, this game focuses on a squad of Orbital Drop Shock Troopers, the most elite force (with the exception of the Spartan program) the Marines have to offer. As such, the game is more squad-based than previous Halo shooters. There are various minor gameplay changes, the switch to squad-based gameplay as opposed to a single commando and the overall film noir feel make the game a refreshing twist on the Halo universe. The game features voice actors Nathan Fillion, Adam Baldwin and Alan Tudyk from the Joss Whedon's cult-favourite space western Firefly TV series of 2002.



Know your Prof.!



This week the SMU Journal introduces a new section of the Features section of the Journal. This section is devoted to a weekly focus on a faculty mem-

ber of the University and allows the reader to get to know them and what they teach. This week our focus will be on Professor Sheldon Wein. Dr. Wein is an expert in philosophy and teaches Ethical Issues in International Development, International Justice, Critical Thinking, and the Philosophy of Law. He also has a B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. that he received from the University of Waterloo in Ontario. He is a proud to be an active member of several scholarly societies and organizations. Professor Wein has taught at Saint Mary's University for the past twenty years and is a full

time professor here at the university. He specializes in critical thinking and decision making but he is also a professor of international development studies. In the winter term Prof. Wein will be teaching the philosophy of law along with an honors philosophy seminar. His studies and teaching focuses on upper level international justice directed at graduate students. He does steady research in the philosophy of law by studying the legal system and how it affects people socially and economically. His courses focus on exploring reason and logic. In his words, his courses will be able to introduce you to what

it is rational to believe given the information available, what one is warranted in believing given one's other beliefs, and what is rational to choose given one's beliefs and desires. His courses usually have a large number of students, which is one of



the main reasons why he doesn't give final exams. He realizes that because so many students attend his lectures, timetables will clash during exam period. To avoid this obstacle he uses an in class test which is divided throughout the term. Due to the high volume of students in his class he also places all necessary readings for his courses on SMUport to lighten the burden of buying course text books. In addition to his work at SMU, Prof. Wein used to teach courses at Dalhousie University a few years ago, and he is a well traveled scholar. Prof. Wein has spoken at conferences and universities worldwide; his travels in-

he include lectures in the Bahamas, South
Africa, New Zealand, Hawaii, South
America and various parts of Europe.

Professor Wein has written a number of articles that can be accessed on his website, http://husky1.stmarys.ca/~swein/ which can be found in the Philosophy department section of the SMU website. Prof. Wein's goal in critical thinking is to give students tools to be able evaluate the arguments they hear, so they have can make reasoned decisions about whether to believe something or not. Example decisions include something as small as deciding the right food to something as large as choosing universities, while making sure to take every detail into consideration. This process is called the study of decision theory, the difference between religion and superstition vs. law and reality. Wein says

that one must not pay attention to the obvious benefits compared to the obvious cost, but must also take in the subtle effects of your actions. His classes are very lively and he does a great job interacting with each student, showing his years of experience. Even with a high volume class he can focus his attention on one student so that they understand a certain topic, while at the same time engaging the entire class in the discussion. He encourages free thinking, discussion, and if any students would like to speak with him further, they can reach him in his "temporary" office at Sobey 157 or via email at sheldon.wein@gmail.com.

The

nature and value of academic freedom

Professors at Saint Mary's and most other institutions of higher learning enjoy a wide degree of freedom in teaching and research. What we teach, how we teach it, what we research, how we research it, and what we conclude from our research is to a large extent up to us as individual professors. Professors also enjoy a wide degree of freedom to speak publicly about their own teaching and research and about the teaching and research of their colleagues. In addition, professors are free to make known their views on politics and society. And they are free to criticize their universities.

This bag of freedoms goes by the name "academic freedom." Professors who possess academic freedom may, within the contracts under which they hold their positions, teach, research, and say what they would like without fearing that their choices could get them fired, disciplined, or otherwise penalized by their university.

Academic freedom—what it is and why it is important—is not well understood, certainly not outside universities, but not always by members of university communities, either. That it is not well understood is troubling, for to fail to understand and appreciate academic freedom is to fail to understand and appreciate universities

generally. Moreover, though it is true that right now academic freedom is well protected by collective agreements and professional associations, failures to understand it threaten to erode that protection and, thereby, to put the mission of universities at risk.

Most people recognize that academic freedom is an aid to teaching, research, and the dissemination of research. New ideas and novel theories are sometimes disturbing or unwelcome; thus, if the universities' mission includes creating and disseminating ideas and theories, that mission is well served by protecting the researcher from forces that would prevent new ideas from coming to light or would suppress those that do. A parallel argument can be made concerning new ways of teaching.

These arguments are sound as far as they go, but they don't go terribly far. For one, soon enough, the new becomes old. If it hasn't in the process come to be accepted by the relevant specialists, the above argument gives no reason to continue to protect it, especially if it's obnoxious. (Think, for instance, of the theory that members of one race are innately more lascivious than members of another.) For another, it doesn't cover speaking publicly or criticizing the university.

We should note here that much novel science and social theory got produced and then managed to win acceptance without the help of academic freedom. Few academic scientists from the time of the scientific revolution to, say, fifty years ago, enjoyed the protections contemporary academic scientists enjoy, and yet science flourished in the academy. (That it would have blossomed brighter and sooner had things been

different is something else we should note, though.) Even today, more than a few institutions of higher learning restrict academic freedom in their communities. Some religious universities, for instance, prohibit professors from voicing doubts about the faith. These universities nonetheless manage to contribute to the growth of knowledge.

The deeper argument for academic freedom is that this freedom is necessary to a certain sort of life. A university community cannot be a community of intellectuals and scholars unless its members are free from institutional pressures to conform to given norms, even the norms current in their disciplines. This is because central to this life is the commitment to be moved only by argument and example, and to attempt to move others only by argument and example. Even social pressures, let alone the threat of losing one's livelihood, are inconsistent with this commitment and can undermine it. Academic freedom, then, both expresses the honesty, candour, and openness central to the life of the mind and serves the university community by relieving people of the need to have the courage to put one's job on the line to participate unreservedly in that life.

This, I think, is the real explanation why we should value academic freedom. Academic freedom enables us to live as intellectuals in respectful community with other intellectuals. (It's necessary for this. I hasten to add that it isn't sufficient.) Take it away, and ties of respect and collegiality are broken, and the prerogative of rules and authority is extended. Take it away, and one lives as an intellectual either at the pleasure of authority or else furtively. A university without academic freedom might have its own virtues, but it wouldn't be a community of intellectuals.

Dell is in the process of acquiring Perot systems for 3.9 billion. This will allow Dell to expand further than the market of technology. Dell is not competing with International Business Machines Corporation and Hewlett Packard Company in the computer service world. This acquisition will boost profits for Dell in the upcoming years. The Chief Executive Officer, Michael Dell, want to move more into computer services than laptops because its sales slumped 22% last quarter. The annual service business will have annual sales of about 8 billion. Perot systems will become the service sector. Dell paid twice as much for its EqualLogic, Inc. acquisition last year.


The Huskies are coming into the 2009 season on the heels of a very successful 2008 season and are playing extremely well, looking to tie or better their 2nd place finish from last season.






KIMBERLEY DARES Football Enthusiast


