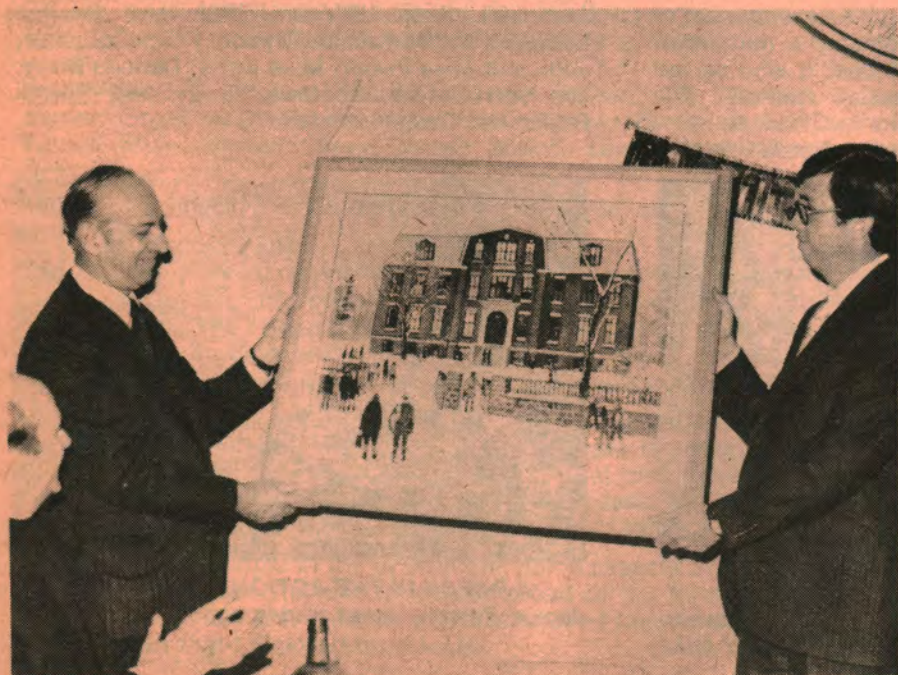




## ALUMNI BANQUET—DECEMBER 8, 1977

The Alumni Banquet was a success again this year. It was held in the Multi-Purpose Room of the University with Clint Havey, Q.C., the Public Trustee of the Province, the Guest Speaker. As in other years the Banquet honors the Patroness of the University, the Blessed Virgin under the title of The Immaculate Conception.

This year the Class of 1952 was honored. It is 25 years since that class graduated from Saint Mary's. Eleven members of the Class gathered for the Reunion from as far away as Pennsylvania and Toronto. Monsignor Colin Campbell, the Vice-Chancellor of the University who is a member of that Class, proposed the toast to the University.

Nick Walsh, a member of the class of 1952, introduced the Guest Speaker. Dr. Owen Carrigan responded to the toast to the University. He outlined some of the recent and exciting developments at Saint Mary's. Referring to the fact that there were 12 graduates in Commerce in 1952, he said that this important side of the academic program at Saint Mary's had continued in prominence. Now there are over 100 students in the M.B.A. program.

The Silver Jubilee Class presented the University with a Painting of the original St. Mary's College that was founded in 1802 by Bishop Burke. Since this is the 175th Anniversary of the University, this presentation has special significance. In fact, the Alumni Banquet was the final official act of the Anniversary Year. Bill MacNeill, the President of the Class of 1952, presented the Anthony Law painting to the President.

The Chairman and toastmaster for the evening was Frank Gervais who received his diploma in Engineering in 1958. There were over 200 Alumni present. Dr. Michael Larsen, B.A., 1966 who is an Assistant Professor of English at the University, welcomed the guests. The Guest Speaker was thanked by Alderman Nicholas Meagher of the City of Halifax. He represented the City at the Dinner. The Hon. Fraser Mooney, Minister of Highways, brought greetings from the Premier of the Province, the Hon. Gerald A. Regan, Q.C. and the Province. The Chancellor, Archbishop James M. Hayes, congratulated the University for building on its roots and for moving from strength to strength.

Pat Shaw, the retired Principal of Saint Francis School, paid special tribute to the University. He said that he was the first graduate of the extension division of the University in 1952. He noted that at a time when all the other Universities would do nothing about it, Saint Mary's held late afternoon and evening classes to enable teachers to upgrade their educational qualifications. He was warmly applauded for bringing this to the attention of the group.

One 50 year graduate was present, Father James P. Hayes, who received his B.A. in 1927. Monsignor W.V. McCarthy presented his degree of 1918 to the University and presented a gold headed cane of Archbishop Edward McCarthy, who had been Chancellor of the University when Monsignor McCarthy received his degree. Monsignor McCarthy paid particular tribute to the Irish Christian Brothers.

The class of 1952 consisted of 12 Commerce graduates, the largest number ever at that time; 8 graduates in Arts and five with an engineering diploma. It was the first graduating Class from the Robie Street campus. Present from the Class were: B.A.—Colin Campbell, James I. Casey, Robert Napier, Pat V. Shaw and Eric Theriault.

B. Comm.—Bill MacNeill, The Class President; Ed McGrath, Jim Radford, Nick Walsh and Joe Walsh. Don Burke, who received an Engineering diploma in 1952, was the sole member of that group of 5.

As in other years, Frank Arab supplied piano stylings during the evening. A delicious buffet dinner and wine were provided by the University Caterers.

### What were the activities of the Class of 1952?

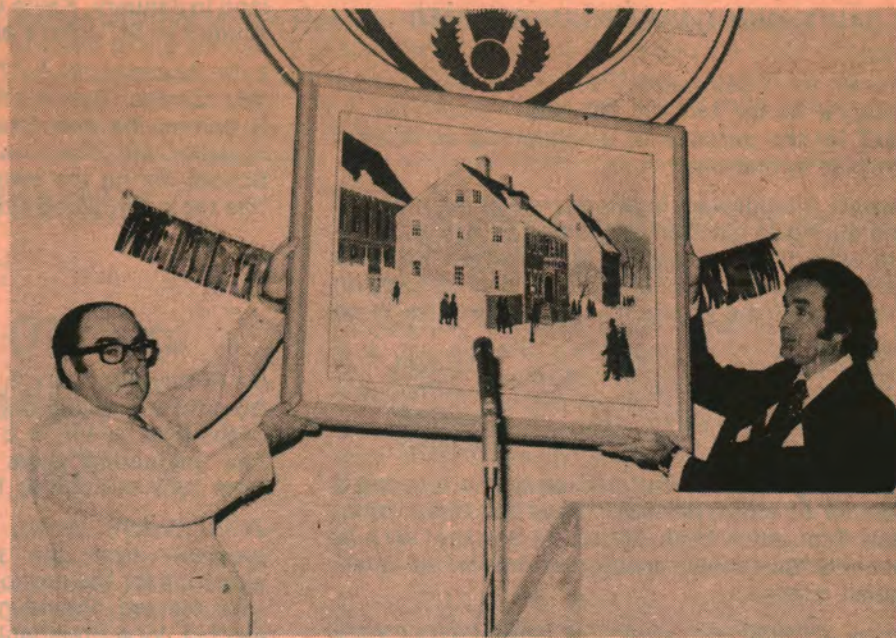
Under the leadership of the Class President, Bill MacNeill, a real attempt was made to have every member of the Class present for the Banquet. Colin Campbell, the Secretary of the Class, sent a letter to all. This was followed by a personal note and appeal from Bill. Several days before the Banquet, Bill and Colin phoned all the members who could be located.

One of the members of the Class, Jerry Blackburn, has already met the Lord in death. Several other members of the class were not on alumni lists and could not be located. Don Burke came from Mountaintop, Penn., where he is with the Electronics Section of R.C.A. He had a tour of the campus in the afternoon and was much impressed with the layout of the campus and the growth of Saint Mary's.

Jim Radford, who is with the Bank of Nova Scotia in Toronto with the International Division, came for the Banquet en route from New York. He had been more in touch with the University than others. Six of the class members had luncheon together at noon and swapped tales of the past.

Someone asked how could anyone have gotten 35 in "Hank" McCarthy's History Class. The revelation was made. The person had written his name only on the exam. Hector Daly, S.J. who had suffered a very painful death, was remembered for his mannerisms. The Engineers remembered the hard time that they gave Father Art Wilson in Religion class and the artsmen remembered that he offered to teach Greek! Father Mike O'Donnell, the Professor of everything, was recalled for his excellent English IV classes.

Most of all, it was a wonderful group of men who realized how much they owed the University for a good start in life. They found it hard to think that 25 years had slipped by and for some the fifth decade had been passed. "Ad majorem Dei Gloriam."

## TOAST TO SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY

Colin Campbell, representing the Class of 1952  
 Alumni Dinner, Feast of the Immaculate Conception.  
 December 8, 1977

It is my privilege and honor to toast the University for the Class of 1952 on this feast of the Patroness of the University, Mary, the Mother of Jesus under her title, The Immaculate Conception. I would ask you to remember in your prayers, the one member of our class who has met the Lord in death—Jerry Blackburn.

As I propose this toast to Saint Mary's University, I am aware that the University that we attended and the present Institution are two different institutions. In fact, we were the transition people. The Class of 1952 was the first graduating class from the Robie Street Campus.

We arrived in September of 1951 to a very incomplete building. But what posh and roomy surroundings after Windsor Street! With the new building came a new list of Jesuits on whom we could cut our teeth. Most of all, there was hope. There were real expectations that the new Saint Mary's was going to do much that the old could not do.

In large measure, this has proven true. We must surely admit that much of our academic formation left something to be desired. As I review the faculty of our present University, I am impressed with its quality and with the

O. Paul Cormier, B. potential to deliver solid foundation in a wide spectrum of academic disciplines.

The strength of the old Saint Mary's was not in its academic programs. It was rather the formation of a small group of people with a shared background and value system. The system was committed to the beliefs and lifestyle of the Catholic Church. Saint Mary's really was a sort of mini or Minor Seminary. It reflected a theology of Church and society that was current and correct.

If the approach to Church was somewhat ultra-montanist and fortress, it was devout and committed. The finest tribute I could pay is that the people in the system were faithful and exemplary in living what they believed. They truly realized that the first teaching is in the lives of the teachers. In that, they need have no regrets and all of our class is indebted to them.

Although some people in the system and some aspects of the system were less appealing than others, I have been proud of the formation that I was given at Saint Mary's. It blended well with a solid foundation in faith with a critical spirit that I received from home.

What of the present for Saint Mary's? Since 1969, because of my Role as Vicar General, I have been Vice Chancellor of Saint Mary's, member of the Board and the Executive Committee of the University. As a tribute to my ethnic roots and my natural bend, I have also been on the Finance Committee of the Board for that same length of time.

In other words, I have had the opportunity that many have not had to monitor the ups and downs of our University over the last decade. What do I think of the present and the future?

From my seat, I see a great many people gripped in fear. Perhaps the University grew too quickly. We were not able to integrate the traditions and solidity of the past with the needed change. Just when the Jesuit presence was most needed, the renewal in the Church dried up this source of

manpower. When the University became a public institution in 1970, its nature was bound to change no matter what was in an Act of Incorporation.

Someone has said to me that the bench mark was when compulsory courses were abandoned. It is not that many years ago that all Arts and commerce students took four philosophies, four theologies and four English courses. I'm not so sure that this was not very wise. Perhaps it had to change, but when it did, so did the University.

Many young men and women have come from this University with a much better academic formation than was available to the Class of 1952. I am not sure that they had a better spiritual formation or a better preparation for life in the broadest sense of that term.

Is there a future for Saint Mary's? I think that there is and that this future is an important part of the future of the Province of Nova Scotia.

"Small" is in. This is not just a reaction to the writing of the Small economist, E.F. Schumacher. There is a widespread reaction to the unfortunate sides of bigness; I believe the sociologists would call them latent disfunctions.

If you go into one of the large High Schools where students are jumping hoops and classes to the melody of a computer, you are bound to wonder. Where is the personal relationship of a small group of people interacting with gifted leaders?

Saint Mary's has the ideal chance to become a top flight University that is small. With judicious planning, the faculty can be further improved. With each department rivaling the other, we can have a standard of excellence that has been obtained in some departments. Commitment to excellence should bring us students who want to be challenged.

A Christian heritage is important if the society is to be renewed. No one would expect that Saint Mary's should or will return to a fortress kind of Catholicism that would revive the Syllabus of Errors of the Oath Against Modernism. Its future should rest on a Christian heritage that must be witnessed in the mature manner of today. Youth are challenging their parents and leaders to stand for something. We have the heritage to make this challenge for values come alive, if we but wish it.

Saint Mary's is more visibly identified with the love for the beautiful than before. Not just a thomistic transcendental, but the living expression of all that is of beauty in society must be the call of the University. The success of the Art Gallery and programs like "Ars Sacra" and some of the performing arts show the interest.

And then there are sports. Since I have been accused of being anti-sport, I would like to say a word. I am against a University having its main clout through its sports teams. That already speaks of priorities despite disclaimers to the contrary. We have too often had this tradition at Saint Mary's. I am for a sports program that involves as many students as possible in as wide a variety of activities as possible as part of their formation.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I ask you to stand and to charge your classes to drink a Toast to our University, Saint Mary's. May the University go from strength to strength with the willing cooperative endeavors of all members of the University Community. May it become what she was meant to be—the finest Undergraduate University in Canada.

JEFF HARVIE, B.COMM. '74 is a Sales Representative with Xerox of Canada Limited. He is living in Riverview, New Brunswick.

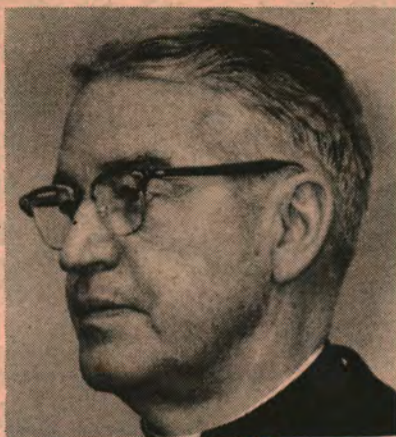
