Library Completion Planned for Spring

Construction of the new Library building at Saint Mary's is in full progress. Completion is expected in the early spring.

Contract for the 150' x 105' brick and concrete structure, to face Inglis Street east of the residence wing of the present building, is in the hands of Standard Construction Co. Ltd. of Halifax. C. A. Fowler and Co. are the architects.

The new Library, costing approximately \$650,000., is the first project in the University's \$1,500,000. Development Programme, which will also include a Chemistry-Biology building and a Student Centre. The University will use its Canada Council capital grant of over \$200,000. for the Library. Contributions from all sources, including industry, commerce and alumni, have now brought the Development Programme to over \$1,000,000.00. Very Rev. C. J. Fischer, S. J., president, said.

The Library will provide an eventual book capacity of 180,000 volumes and seating for 300 students. It will include two lecture theatres, with full facilities for audio-visual instruction and combined seating for 400.

Provision will also be made in the new building for seminar rooms, student and faculty study rooms, typing booths, areas for book processing and binding and staff offices and lounge. There will also be a spacious lobby with an area for art exhibits and displays.

It is probably the first time in the world that a Roman Catholic priest has accepted an honorary Anglican theological degree.

Referring to the degree, Archbishop H. H. Clark, Anglican Primate of all Canada, said:

"The Christian forces are drawing together in growing understanding throughout the world and this doctorate is just one expression of this fact."

The degree was awarded to Father Kierans in recognition of what he had done to promote the development of a warm friendship between St. Paul's Roman Catholic College and the Anglican St. John's College, both affiliates of the University of Manitoba.

In 1961, Hon. Eric Kierans, currently Minister of Finance for Quebec and brother of Father Kierans, was the guest speaker at our Alumni Banquet.

That Saint Mary's — St. F. X. Game . . .

From the pen of "Ace" Foley, well-known Halifax sportswriter, comes the following account:

Saint Mary's University Huskies this season accomplished what all other Atlantic Conference teams failed to do for so long—defeat the powerful St. Francis X-men. The upset came at Antigonish early this season and stamped the Huskies as one of the most powerful college teams ever produced in the Atlantic area.

The victory was by a single point, but to the loyal supporters of the Huskies it atoned in full for the defeat a week earlier by the Xaverians in Halifax.

For the past three years the Huskies have given the Xaverians their greatest

battles and unless the experts are in error the teams will finish in a tie at the top when the schedule ends. This is in itself a moral victory for the Halifax based collegians, but it isn't good enough. They'd like an opportunity to break the tie, prove their victory at Antigonish was no fluke and go on to represent the Maritimes in the classic Atlantic Bowl.

Since Bob Hayes, perhaps the greatest player in Maritime football history, came on the scene as coach the Huskies have soared on the gridiron. And their biggest days could still lie ahead.
