Will name observatory after Jesuit

astronomical observatory will be named the Father Michael Burke-Gaffney astronomer, engineer and Saint Mary's to teach. educator.

The university's board of governors has agreed unanimously that the observatory, proposed to be built atop SMU's 23-storey academic/residence building now under construction, should be named for the diminutive and popular Jesuit.

Even before the honor was conferred, 1970 was a memorable year for the spry, white-bearded astronomy professor, a favorite with TV audiences and SMU students

The only member of the original group of Jesuits who came to SMU in 1940 still on the university's faculty, Father Burke-Gaffney has been professor emeritus since

Professor of astronomy at Saint Mary's from 1955 to 1965, the priest also served for eight years as dean of engineering and was for five years dean of science.

Father Burke-Gaffney, who taught at colleges in Toronto, Winnipeg and Regina before coming to Halifax, was first employed by the War Office in World War I London. He constructed aerodromes in Britain and, later, designed bridges in Manitoba.

A graduate of the National University of Ireland with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, he received a master of science in 1933 and a doctorate in astronomy in 1935, both from Georgetown University in Washington,

The Dublin-born Jesuit, who also studied theology in Ireland and France, received an honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering from Nova Scotia Technical College in 1955 "for his contribution to engineering education in Nova Scotia and for the inspiring example of high cultural attainments he presents."

The first Canadian to hold membership in the International Academy of the History of Science, he helped found the Nova Scotia Astronomical Society, an organization in which he was elected honorary president in


