Premier Regan Hopes For New Funding System

(Excerpts from the Premier's address to Saint Mary's University Alumni, December 8, 1973.)

I believe that in Canada in this age, when unfortunately, government funding plays an ever increasing role in the operation of a university, it is important not only that academic independence be retained — not only that he who pays the piper should not call the tune — but that universities do not become puppets of the government. I believe it is of tremendous importance that universities are national — not provincial institutions.

I think it is regrettable that the present system, under which federal grants for purposes of higher education are now made in this country, is based only on the population of a province. Surely the number of students enrolled at each academic institution should be an important factor in this matter. Nova Scotia has had, through our great universities, a leading role in educating people for the professions and for business; people who are natives not only of this province, but of all parts of Canada and beyond.

It is unfortunate that with our history and tradition of achievement, our Province should be hampered in its efforts to provide necessary assistance to the universities. It is an unfortunate formula that considers only the population of a Province in determining how many dollars per capita will be granted by the federal government towards the costs of higher education. The inevitable result is, of course, to tend to erect provincial barriers against the importation of too many students.

It is my belief that if anything in our country should be national in character, it should be our universities. Indeed, they should be international in character, for learning knows no political boundaries.

In a day when the mobility of the people of this nation is greater than at any time in our past, when indeed a substantial portion of our young people are educated in elementary and high schools in two or three different provinces, as the result of transfers of their parents, I think that any action that can restrict the natural growth of our universities by putting up provincial boundaries, is unwise.

I suggest that when federal restrictions on grants result in a financial bind for the provincial government of a province that has a net importation of students at its universities, the cause of higher education is not being well served.

From all reports it was one of the best attended dinners in our Association's history. Many thanks to Dinner Chairman Kevin Cleary and his Committee and to Earl Walsh who filled in for me as toastmaster.

As I'm sure everyone of our members is aware our Football Huskies won it all in Toronto in the College Bowl against McGill. To Al Keith and his fine coaching staff and of course to each member of the team we say 'well done and thank you for all the thrills.' It is efforts such as this which bring national prominence to Saint Mary's and result in an even better athletic program as well as increased student enrolment which is so essential to the future of our school.

Still in an athletic vein I would urge each and every one of you to support our Hockey and Basketball Huskies. Both of these teams have a very real chance to bring us national titles in their respective sports and vocal Alumni support will make their efforts perhaps a little bit easier. There is a schedule of upcoming hockey and basketball games, including national play-off dates appearing in this issue. Why not cut it out and make your plans to get out to support the Huskies.

Alumni affairs are now well under way on the West Coast and on the Prairies, thanks to Heather Harris. The Vancouverites held a very successful December 8th Dinner and have established a heretofore unknown Alumni camaraderie on the other side of the country. 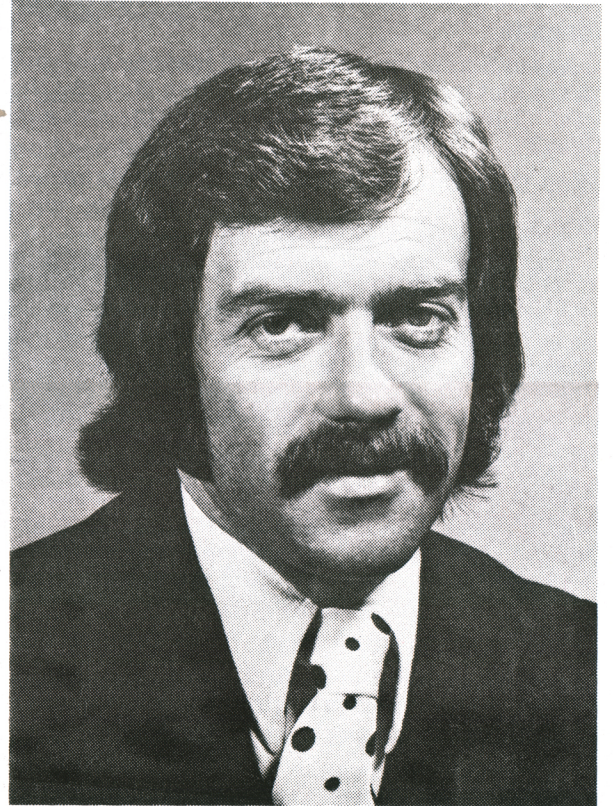

When we have to be concerned about how many students come from outside, in relation to the amount of support it is possible to give a university, I think that we, in the east, are in trouble.

Because we are in a province that remains, to a very large degree, rural, we will be subsidizing other parts of Canada for many years to come, by means of the export of graduates. That is a very substantial subsidy, but it is one I think we have to accept if we are to assist the other parts of the country in this regard. However, I do not believe that we should be punished for accepting people who are from other parts of the country. I hope the government will recognize the need for a change in this policy.

I think it is unfortunate too, that the narrow, economic nationalism of Ontario, about which we hear so much in relation to restrictive legislation on investments, has now found its way into

To those whose support we have had faithfully in the past we say thank you. To those whose interest and involvement has yet to be kindled we say simply that you are missing out on some great fun and fellowship and really not being very fair to the University, which has been such an important part of your life.

university athletics. With the recent ruling of the Canadian Universities Athletic Organization there is a restriction on the race or residence of people who can be eligible to play for basketball teams, in this case, for the universities.

When I consider the fact that we in the Maritimes, over so many years have sent our alumni to settle in New England and Upper Canada; when I recognize that the great number of American students who come into Saint Mary's and to Saint Francis Xavier and Acadia and Dalhousie, are people whose parents are Nova Scotians and who want to return here, I would think this restriction places a heavier penalty on Maritime universities than on institutions in other parts of Canada.

The principle of restricting anything in connection with the universities, on the basis of race or land origin is one to be deplored.

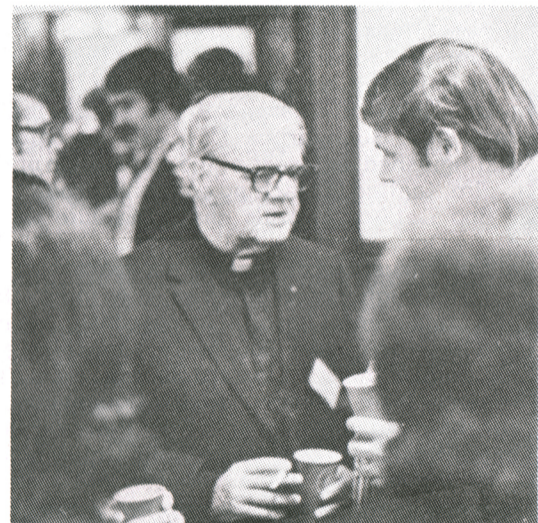
