Annual Dinner Dec. 8th

Dr. Patricia Connelly, Chairperson of the Annual Dinner Committee, has announced plans for the dinner.

The dinner will be held on the traditional feast day of the university, December 8, in the Multi-Purpose Room of the Loyola Building.

The speaker will be an alumnus, Mr. Hal Lawrence, author of the book, "A Bloody War", which has been on the best selling list in Canada for some time and was the most popular piece of non-fiction in the Atlantic area for four consecutive weeks.

Older alumni will recall Mr. Lawrence being awarded the 'Distinguished Service Cross' for his part in the capture of a German U-Boat in 1942.

The dinner will honour the Class of 1954. Mr. Robert Carleton, B.A.'54, L.L.B., of Ottawa will propose the toast to the university. Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, newly installed President of the University, will respond.

Associate members Dr. Charles MacDonald and Richard Lowery will receive certificates of membership at the pre-dinner reception.

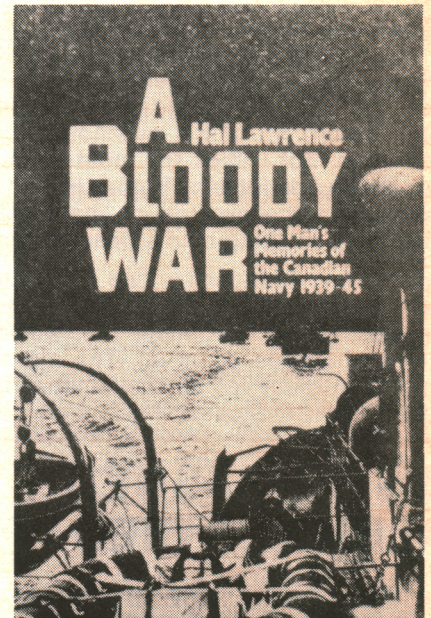

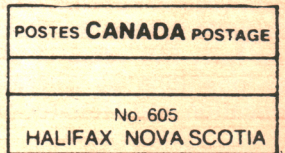
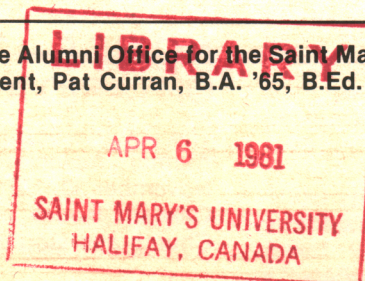


Class of 1954

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Just after I wrote my last report, I took a trip to Alberta. I was in Calgary for three days so I called Reg MacDougall, B.A.'62, the President of the Calgary Alumni Branch. Reg told me he had just had a call from Linda Paddon, B.Comm.'79, formerly of Dartmouth and now in the accounting division of Dome Petroleum in Calgary. Linda was putting on a party that evening for any interested St. Mary's alumni in Calgary. I already had tickets for the CFL game that night, but because Linda's apartment was directly across the street from McMahon Stadium, I went to the party right after the game. Before I got there, a number of people had come and gone. They included Grant and Colleen Thompson, both B.Comm.'79. Grant is with Thorne, Riddell, in Calgary. Another person who had been there earlier was Ernie MacCarthy, B.Comm.'79, who worked in Calgary for the summer and then was returned to Halifax to enter Dal law school. The Toronto Alumni are holding a dinner at Ryerson on November 30. Dr. Ozmon will be there and I hope to get there myself.

The Annual Alumni Dinner will take place at St. Mary's on December 8. Our chairman, Pat Connelly, and her committee have done the best job I can remember in preparing for the Dinner and it looks as if there will be a big crowd. Get your tickets early.

The New England Alumni are planning a dinner in late December or early January. I hope to get to that one as well if I have not been overcome on the rubber chicken circuit.

We have several hard working committees this year. In fact, I have never seen so many enthusiastic people on the Alumni Executive. I think the results of their efforts will become obvious. In addition, I find I can't turn around without running into Laurie Smith, the Alumni Co-ordinator, or Anne Uteck, Laurie's assistant, who seem to spend seven days and nights a week on Alumni business.

As alumni in these days of declining enrolment, the best way we can thank St. Mary's for what it has given us is to encourage as many young people as possible to enroll. The best selling point for the University is the vast group of personally and professionally successful graduates. Let's spread the word.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS DIES

Dr. Alain Frecker, D.E.'29, B.A.'34, passed away on Sunday, September 31, 1979 in St. John's.

Dr. Frecker had recently retired as Chancellor of Memorial University of Newfoundland.

From 1959 to 1971 Dr. Frecker represented the District of Placentia East in the House of Assembly. He served for over forty-five years in the public service. He held such key positions as Secretary of Education, Minister of Education and Minister of Provincial Affairs.

He holds honorary degrees from Laval, the University of Montreal, Saint Francis Xavier, and his own alma mater.

In 1972 Dr. Frecker was awarded the Order of Canada

medal of service for "excellence in all fields of endeavour in Canadian life."

Dr. Frecker maintained an active interest in Saint Mary's. Last summer he wrote regretting that he was unable to attend the presentation of the plaque by the Irish Christian Brothers. In his letter he paid tribute to his devoted teachers and spoke of his warm memories of Saint Mary's.

O'DONNELL-HENNESSEY STUDENT CENTRE

The Canadian Martyrs Church was filled to overflowing on Sunday, October 14 for the initial phase of the dedication ceremonies associated with the renaming of the existing student centre.

The ceremonies continued in the student centre before a large crowd of alumni and students.

The ceremonies honouring the two beloved priests were moving, formal and joyous.

The alumni office has been receiving notes and calls and expressions of congratulations in unprecedented numbers.

The plaque, unveiled by Monsignor Campbell, reads: "This building is named to honour two dedicated Jesuit Fathers: Father M.J. O'Donnell who since 1941 served as teacher, counsellor, Director of Athletics, Dean of Men, and Director of Alumni; and Father J.J. Hennessey, who since 1961 served as counsellor, Dean of Men, athletic advisor. Above all, both have been friends to all who needed kindness, compassion, friendship and assistance. This building's name recognizes gratefully their wise counsel and wholehearted devotion to Saint Mary's University."
