Saint Mary's University was founded in 1802 by the Reverend Edmund Burke, as a school for young Catholic men. Saint Mary's was located on the corner of Barrington St. and Spring Garden Road, until 1943. At that time, the University purchased land then occupied by the Gorsebrook Golf Course, and moved to its present location on the south end of Robie Street. Saint Mary's has had steadily increasing enrollment over the years, having, in the 1987-88 academic year, a full time enrollment of 3660 students, in addition to 1805 part-time students. Saint Mary's is said to be the "Club Med" of Canadian Universities, and this is occasionally the reason for enrollment.

In keeping with the tradition and history of the present university location (the former Gorsebrook Golf Course), we present the *Golfing Guide to Saint Mary's University*.

Tee-Off: The course begins at the O'Donnell-Hennessey Student Centre, a cross-shaped building which was named after Father M.J. O'Donnell and Father J.J. Hennessey, two priests who had a lasting influence on both students and faculty. The Student Centre contains a cafeteria; games room; the Gorsebrook Lounge; the university bookstore; meeting rooms; a Canada Employment Centre; a Health Clinic.

ic; Personal, Career, and Financial Counselling Offices; the Atlantic Centre of Research, Access and Support for Disabled Students; Radio Saint Mary's; and offices for Campus Security; the Alumni Society; the Saint Mary's University Student's Association (SMUSA); the Yearbook; and the *Journal* (the student newspaper).

From the front doors of the Student Centre, shoot Northwest to the **Burke Education Building**, which was originally the Bishop Burke Library (1965 - 1976), named after the university's founder. This building contains the International Education Centre and Departments of Education and Geography, as well as two theatres used for films, lectures and some classes. This is a particularly easy shot, with a par of only two.

The second hole is nearly as easy: from the front doors of the Burke Building, face West and shoot at the **Science Building**, which was built in 1967 and which houses the Departments of Biology and Chemistry, as well as the Computer Centre for the university (with computer terminal rooms for science and engineering students). It also contains a greenhouse, a Biochemistry lab, and an X-ray florescent spectrometer. Once again, par two.

The next shot is somewhat more difficult, and requires some skill. Facing Southeast from the front of the Science Building, your target will be the Information Desk of the **Patrick Power Library**. The Library, which was opened in 1976, was named after a generous benefactor of the university. It contains a computerized card catalogue which links to four other Universities in Halifax, as well as a photocopy room, a reserved reading room, typewriters for student use, a reference room, group study rooms and, of course, books. Lots of books. At last count, the library contained over 250,000 volumes and 2000 periodical titles. This shot can be best completed by having an accomplice hold open the main doors to the library so that a clear shot of the Information Desk is possible. Par is four, and there is a two stroke penalty for loosing the ball amongst students often gathered outside the library doors.

From the library, the golfer can proceed *inside* the building, shooting west towards the North Wing of the **McNally Building**, which was the first building on the new campus. This building was named after Archbishop McNally, who was responsible for the purchase of the present property in 1943. The building is divided into three wings: North, South and Main. Classes are held on various levels of the building, and it contains a number of offices such as the Registrar's, Admission, Personnel

and Business, President and Vice President's, Physical Plant, the mailroom, and the Theatre Auditorium (used by the Drama Society, as well as for convocation, church services and special functions).

There is a one stroke penalty for getting your ball trapped in President Ozmon's office, and an additional two stroke penalty for hitting the President himself. The elevators are strictly out of bounds for this course, creating a further level of difficulty in shooting up staircases. A par of five



brings the golfer to the beginning of the catwalk (on the south side of the building) which leads to Loyola.

From the beginning of the catwalk, shoot towards the **Ignatius Loyola Academic Complex**, a two level building containing a number of classrooms, lounges, computer rooms (IBM and MacIntosh), and the Multipurpose room (which is said to be used for a multitude of purposes, including dances, concerts, etc.). The golfer will be aiming at the **Colonade**, a snack area where students purchase coffee, soft drinks and whatnot, and will have to shoot downstairs.

From the Colonade, the golfer must go to the top of the 23 story tall **St. Ignatius Loyola Residence Building**, where the Rev. Michael W. Burke-Gaffney Observatory is located. This trip takes approximately 8 hours, 37 minutes, and 16 seconds on average by elevator (make reservations early, bring munchies!). The observatory contains a 0.4 meter reflecting telescope, the most powerful in Eastern Canada. Do not shoot at this telescope, as the penalty for hitting it is four strokes. Next, drive the ball down the stairway of this building, which has Family Housing apartments on one side and single student dormitory housing (mainly male) on the other side. Aim towards the Residence Security/Information Desk on the first floor, and let it fly.

From the Security Information Desk, shoot straight ahead to the **Residence Cafeteria**, and then downstairs to the **Vanier Residence Corridor** (nicknamed Henn Alley after Father J.J. Hennessey). You must shoot around obstacles such as students entering and leaving the Mini-Mart, Beauty Salon, Barber Shop, or Laundry Room. There is no stroke-penalty for hitting any of these students, but that does not guarantee that they will not file a civil suit. Beware the water trap (the Swimming Pool)! Slice the ball down the hall to the Vanier Residence, which is made up of four units, each with three floors of dormitory style rooms, all of which are occupied solely by females... at least most of the time.

From Vanier Residence, a sharp hook will land the ball in the **Edmund Rice Residence** lobby. This building was built in 1968, and contains 17 floors of apartment-style accommodation for single students (six apartments on each floor, each housing four students). Penalty-strokes will be added for excess time spent in any of these **Co-Ed** floors. This shot can be completed with a par of only two.

Facing north from the Rice Residence lobby, it is an easy shot to **The Tower**, the fitness and recreational centre of the university. This building contains a gymnasium, as well as 4 squash and 2 raquetball courts, an exercise room, a lounge and a weight room. The weight room contains **hefty** (and **husky**) golf players who while away the time lifting weights rather than teeing-off with the rest of the students.

Facing northwest from the Tower, hook the ball to hit the side of the **Alumni Winter Arena**, the home of the Hockey Huskies. This facility can also be used for recreational skating, broomball, and hockey. Additionally, it will allow you

to experience sub-Arctic, neo-glacial, darn-cold temperatures.

The final hole, of course, will land you on the green, which in this case is the astro turf of the **Huskies Stadium** (the only astro turf east of Montreal... aren't we proud). Don't shoot too hard, as there is a sand trap beyond the green. A golfer can putt forever on this huge piece of artificial grass! However, this is irrelevant. Before you'll get the opportunity to find a hole, the football players would have carried you off of the green! *Happy golfing!* - T.T.

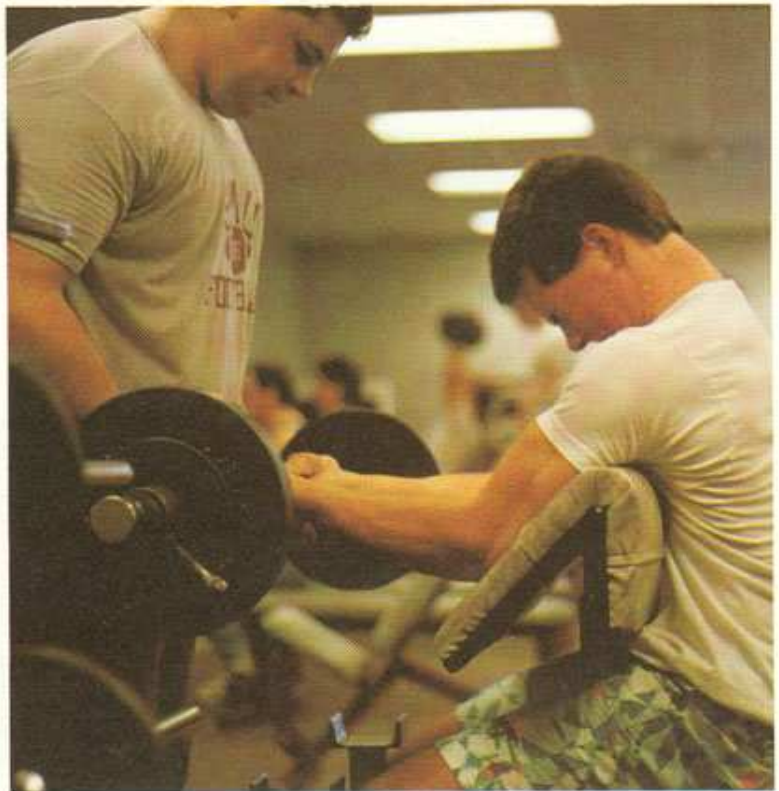
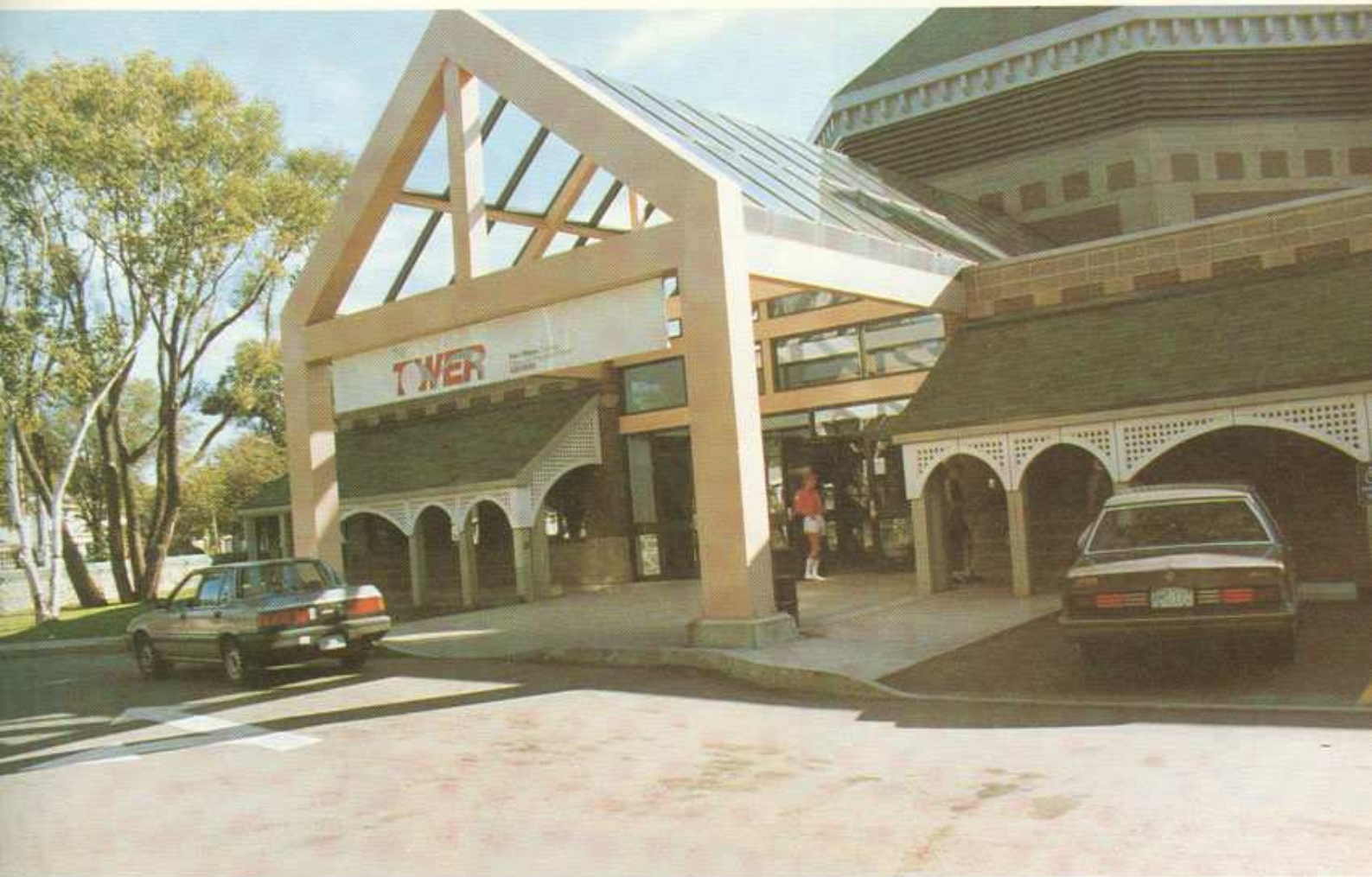

Saturday, Sept. 10

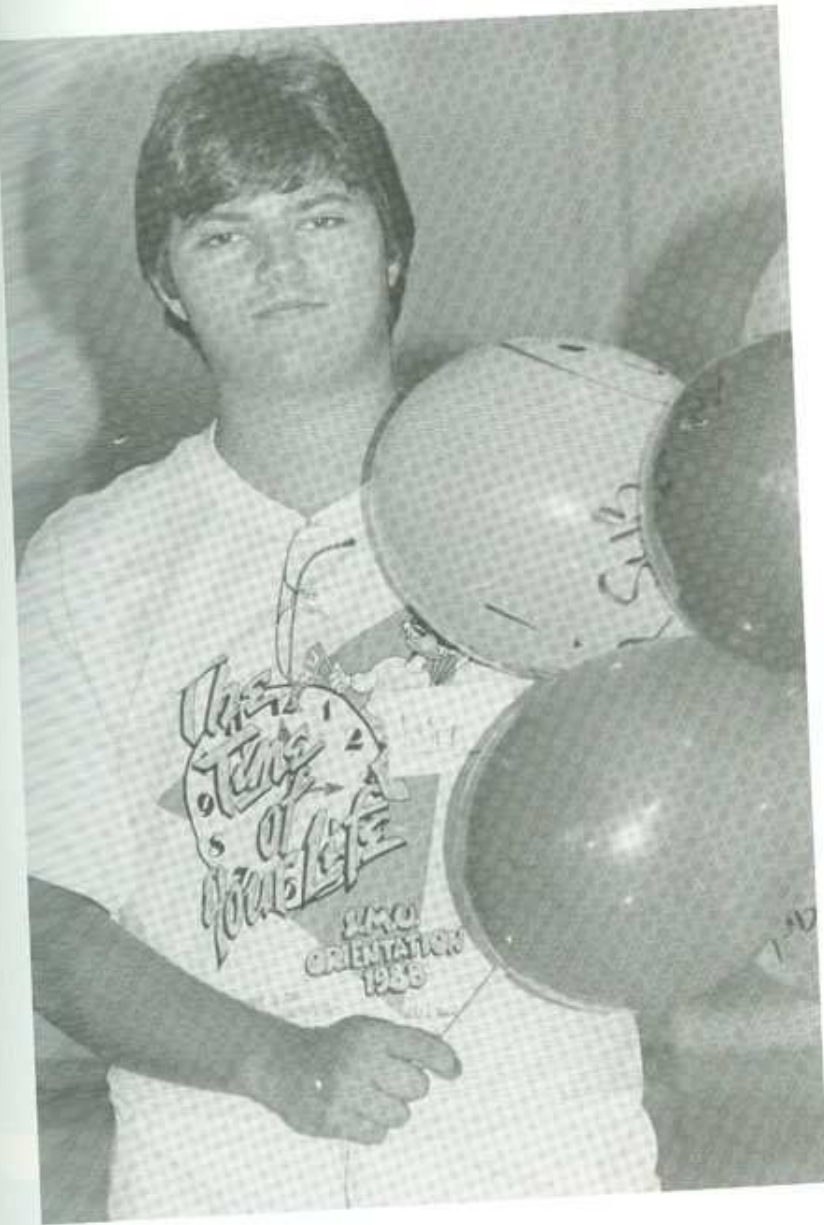
12 pm. - Barbecue. Although it rained on the cooks (administration members), the frosh still came out to enjoy the food and entertainment.

Sunday Sept. 11

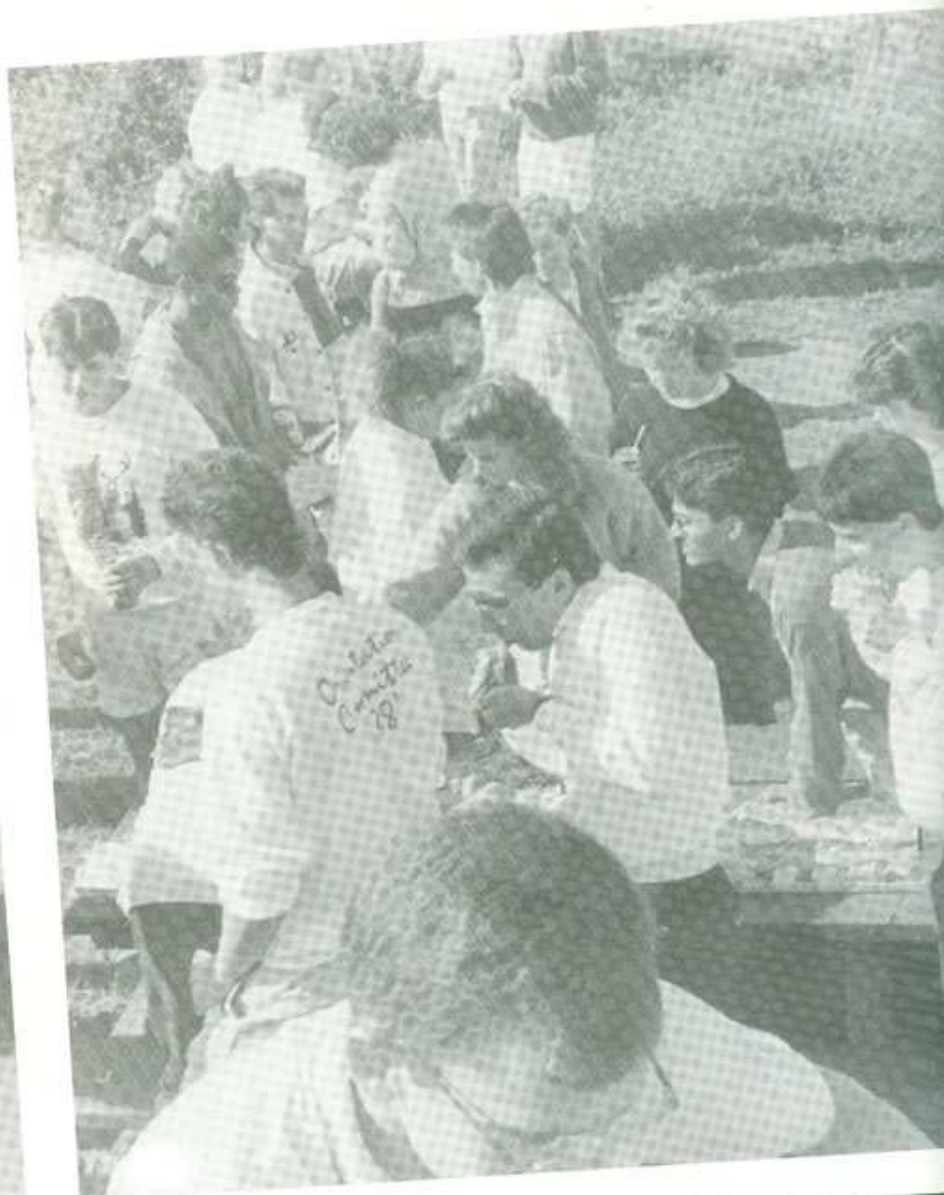

The Atlantic Bowl

After winning the AUFC championship with a slim 37-35 win over the Acadia Axemen to gain their second straight Atlantic Bowl berth, the Huskies made believers out of the more than 8,000 fans that were jammed into Huskie Stadium.

Driven by the bitter memory of a one point loss the previous year, the Huskies overwhelmed the Bishop's Gaiters in their one sided 44-10 win. The capacity crowd was given a scare on the final play of the first quarter when Flynn was put out of the game by a late hit. The all-Canadian signal caller missed seven\ minutes due to a swelled eye before returning to lead the Huskies to victory. -TPW





Football Review

After loosing by one point in the Atlantic Bowl the previous year, the Saint Mary's Huskies entered the 1988 season with their sights set on nothing less than the Vanier Cup.

The Huskies were in an unfamiliar position entering the season. They were heavy favourites to repeat as AUFC champions and were ranked number 2 in the nation. By week three of the season, the Huskies had dominated all AUFC opponents and emerged as the number one team in Canada.

The Huskies finished the regular season with a perfect 7-0 record, but did experience several close games. The Huskies overcame a 10-3 halftime deficit and defeated Acadia 11-10 in Wolfville on September 31. On October 22, the Huskies survived at Mount Allison, coming back to squeak out a 29-27 victory in Sackville.

It was a different story at Huskies Stadium, where SMU won all six games by an average of 25 points. SMU fans were treated to the most explosive offense in the nation led by all-Canadian quarterback Chris Flynn. Flynn, in only his second season, dazzled Husky fans with his seemingly endless supply of moves. Flynn was the top rated quarterback in the country, passing for 2,052 yards, and 21 TD tosses (tying a CIAU record). - T.P.W.

The Caribbean Students' Society has a reputation for being a very active society and this year was no exception.

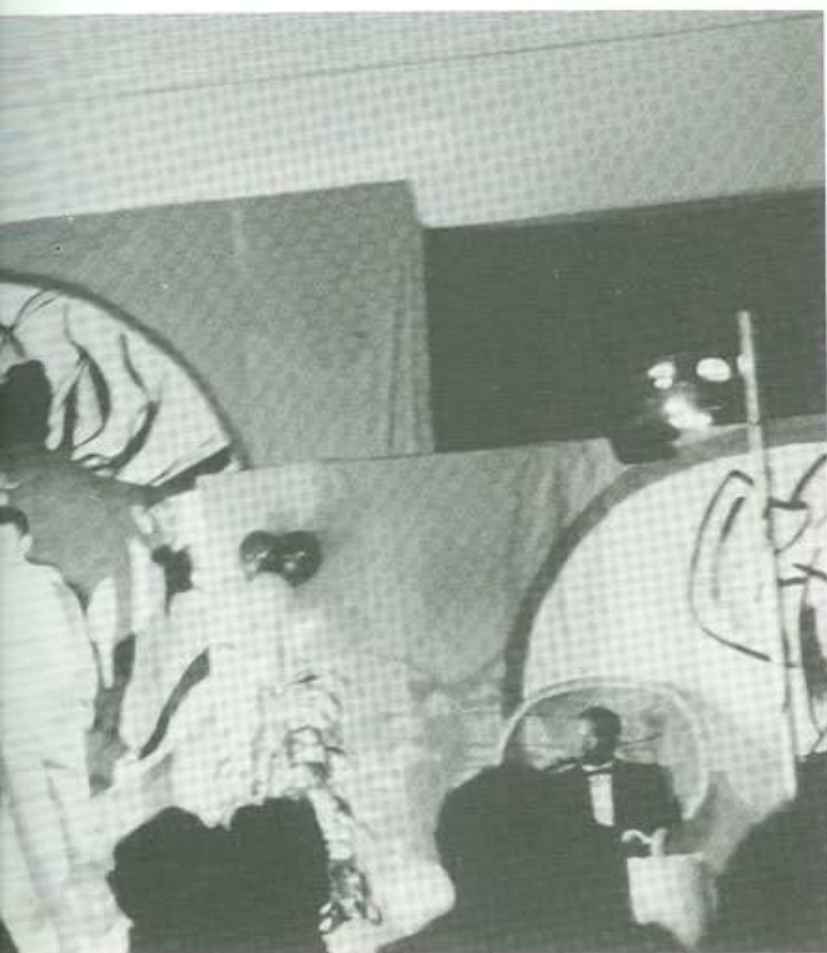

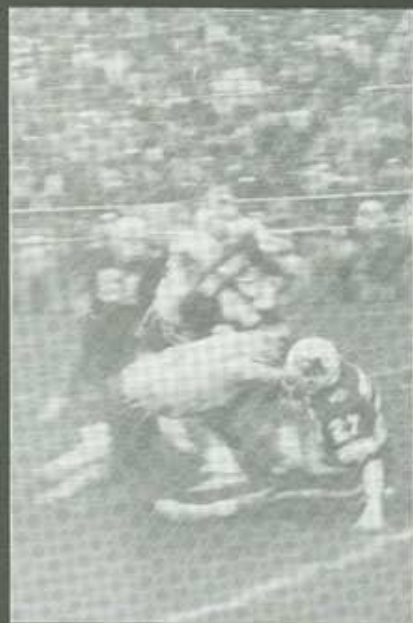
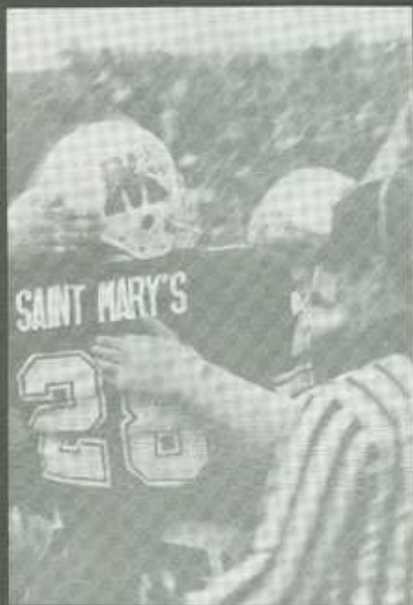

VANIER CUP

When they arrived in Toronto for the national championship, the Huskies were ranked number one and were favoured to defeat the Calgary Dinosaurs. This was before Chris Flynn dropped his bomb on the national media at the CIAU Awards banquet two days before the game. While receiving the Hec Crigh-ton award as the nation's outstanding player, Flynn revealed that he would not be playing in the Vanier Cup due to a hairline fracture above his right eye. Flynn sustained the injury against Bishop's the week before.

With Flynn out of action, all-Conference slotback/punter Bill Scollard was put in charge of the SMU offence. Scollard's quarterbacking experience was limited to one quarter of an exhibition game. This was, without a doubt, the biggest test of Scollard's football career.

Scollard not only passed the test, he made the honour roll. The fourth year Commerce student won the hearts of SMU fans everywhere with his gutsy performance. Scollard completed 27 of 47 pass attempts (both Vanier Cup records) for 296 yards and 2 touchdowns.

The injury plagued Huskies battled honourably with the powerful Dinosaurs and trailed by only eight points midway through the final quarter when the roof caved in. The Dinos took advantage of several SMU mistakes to score three touchdowns in the final six minutes.

For his admirable performance, Scollard was named offensive player of the game. "If Scollard isn't the best quarterback on their team, I'd hate to see Chris Flynn play," said Calgary quarterback Bob Torrence. - T.P.W.

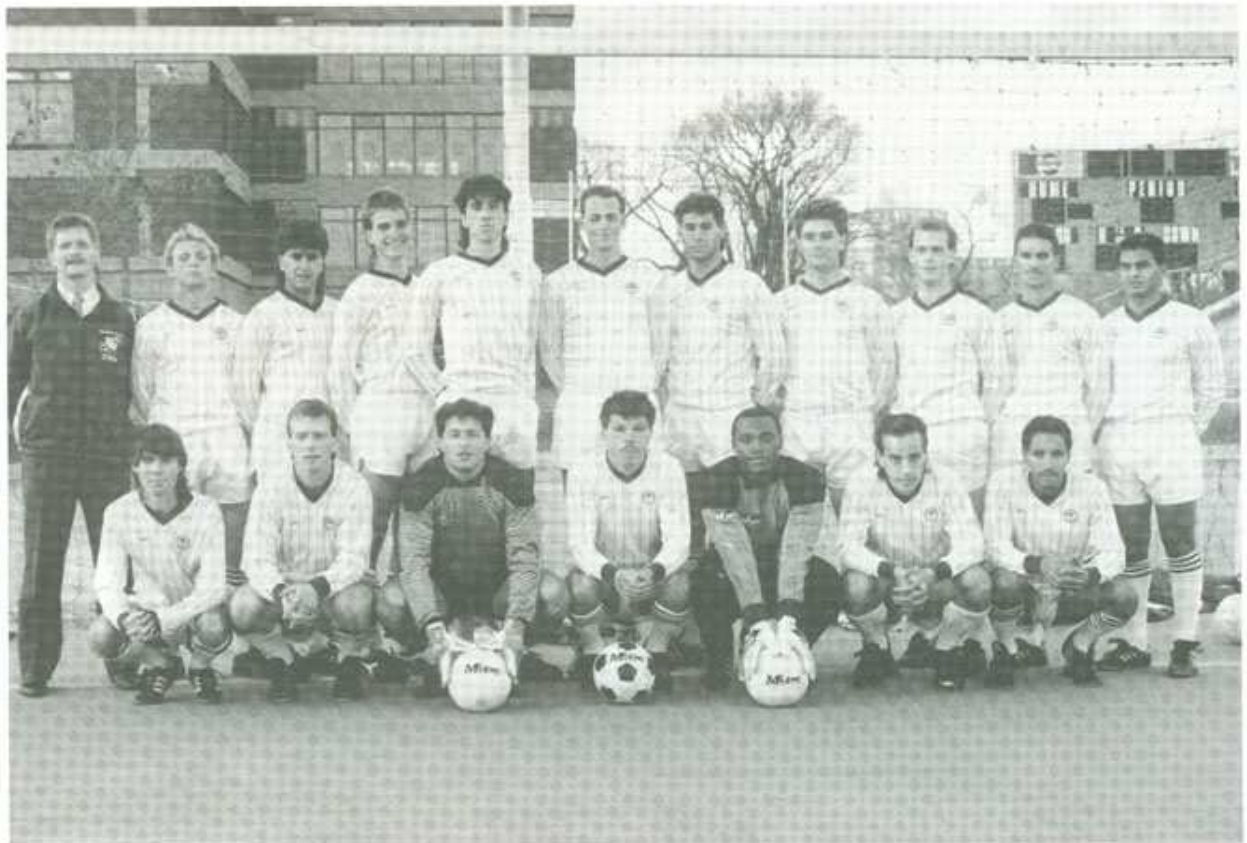
MEN'S SOCCER

The guest speaker Dorothy Grant was very interesting and told stories of consumer fraud which have occurred in Halifax. - R.V.H.



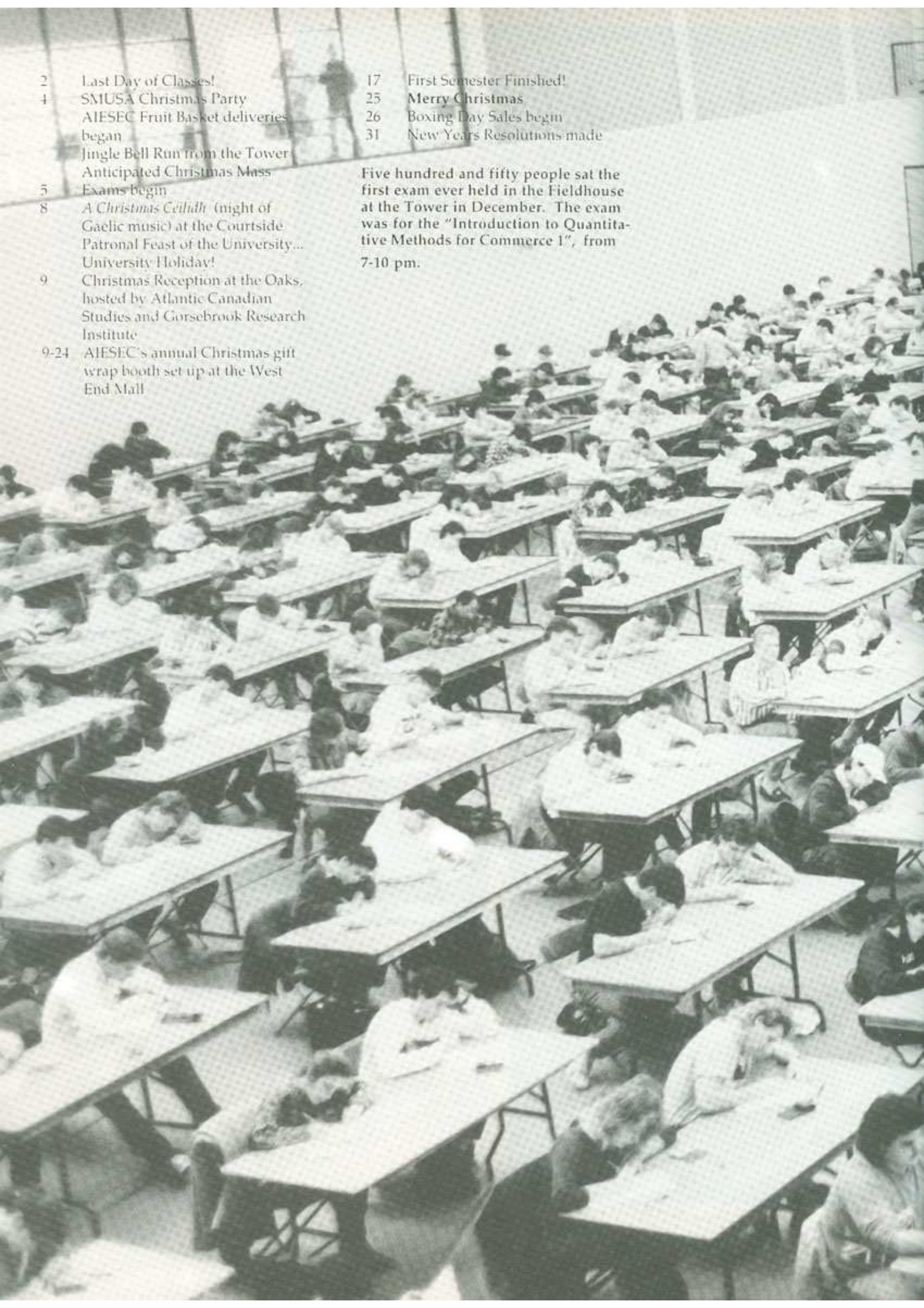

WINTER CARNIVAL



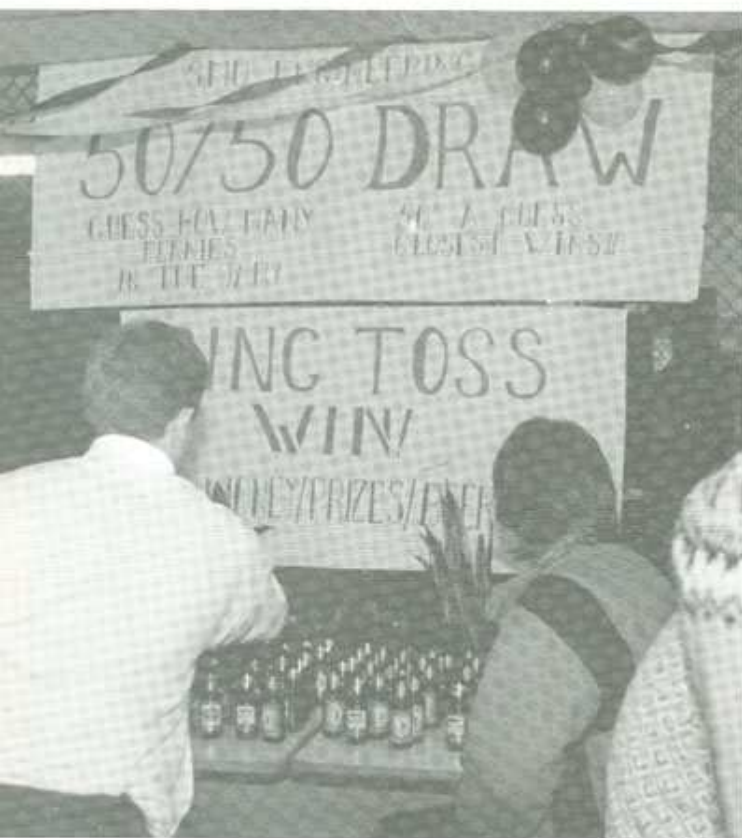
Winter Carnival took place in the last week of January and served as a well-needed break to help deal with the winter blues.

This writer's favorite event was the **Rocky Horror Picture Show**. Although I still have no idea what the film was about and





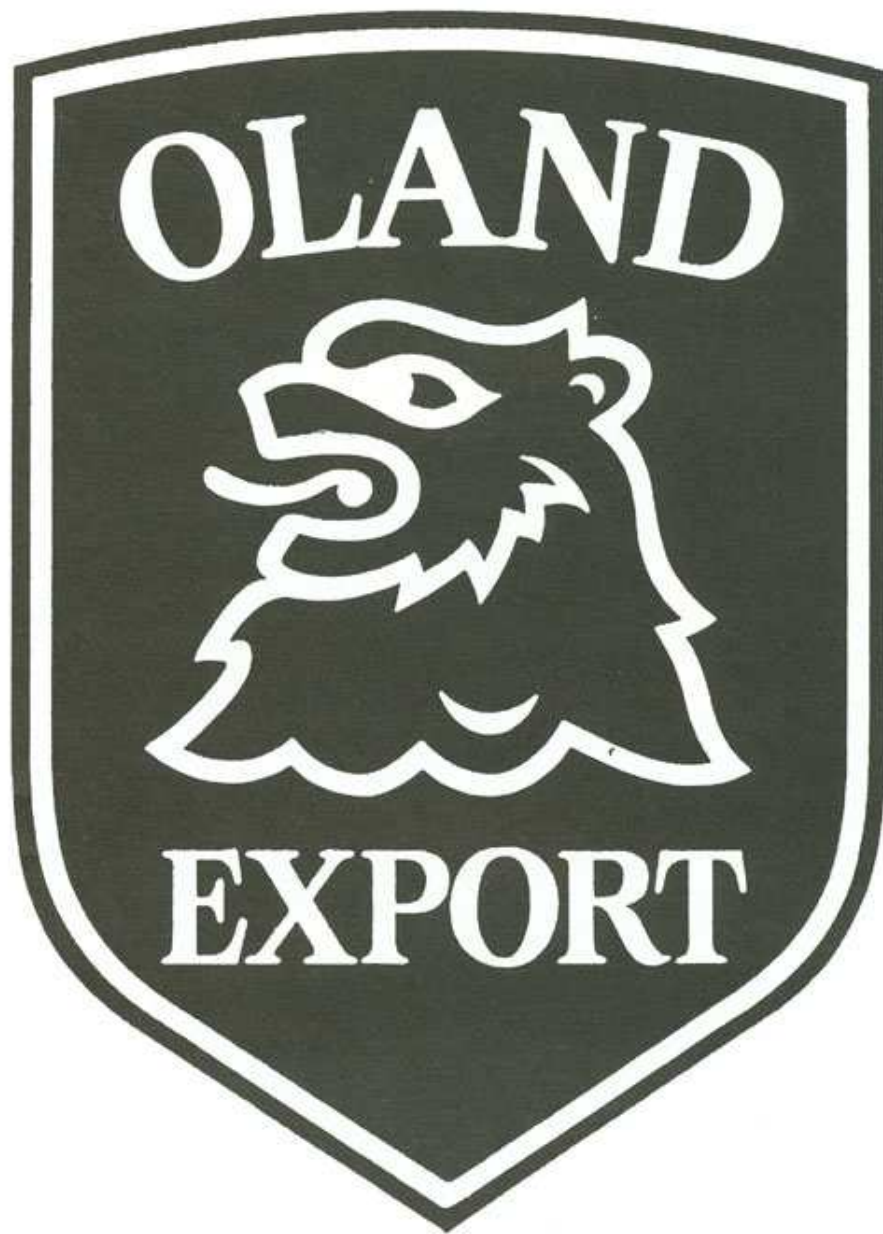

was ringed by brave and viligent Campus Security officers and later said he felt lucky to have survived.

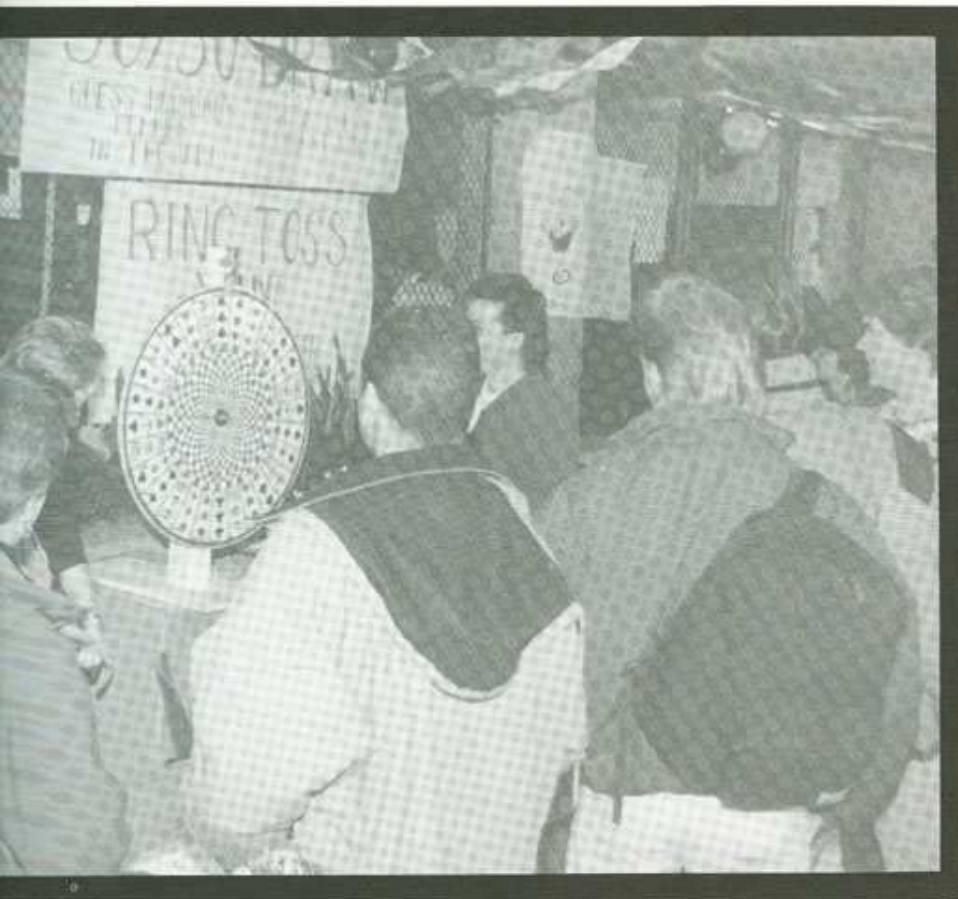
Comedy was highly popular, with **Yuk-Yuks Comedy Night** and **Schooner Campus Comedy** packing in

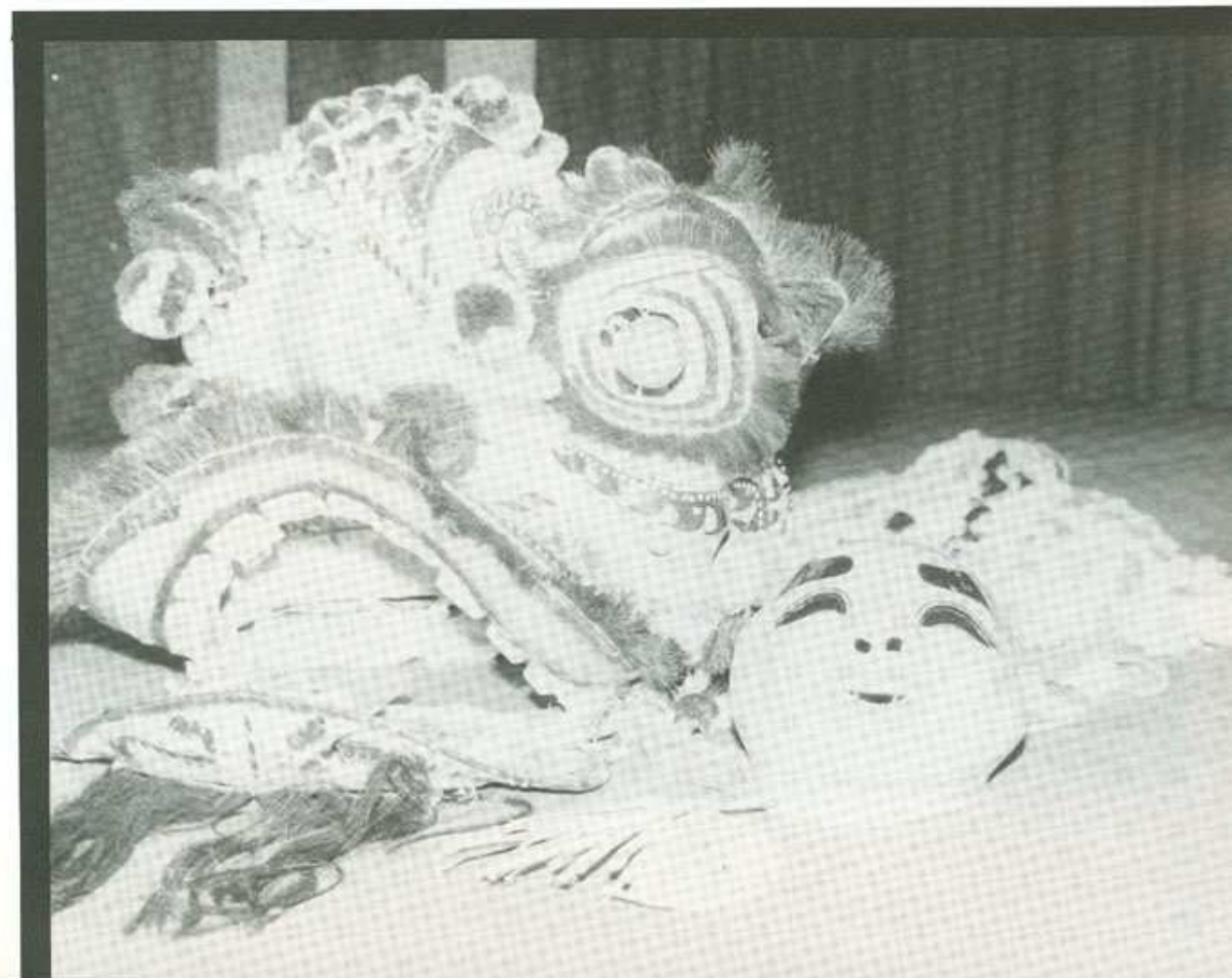
Chinese New Year is a very festive season for all Chinese around the world. It is a time to usher in the beginning of a new year and to pay respects to the elders.

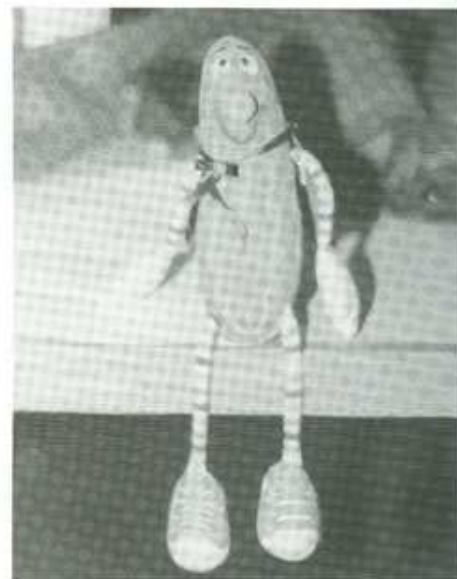

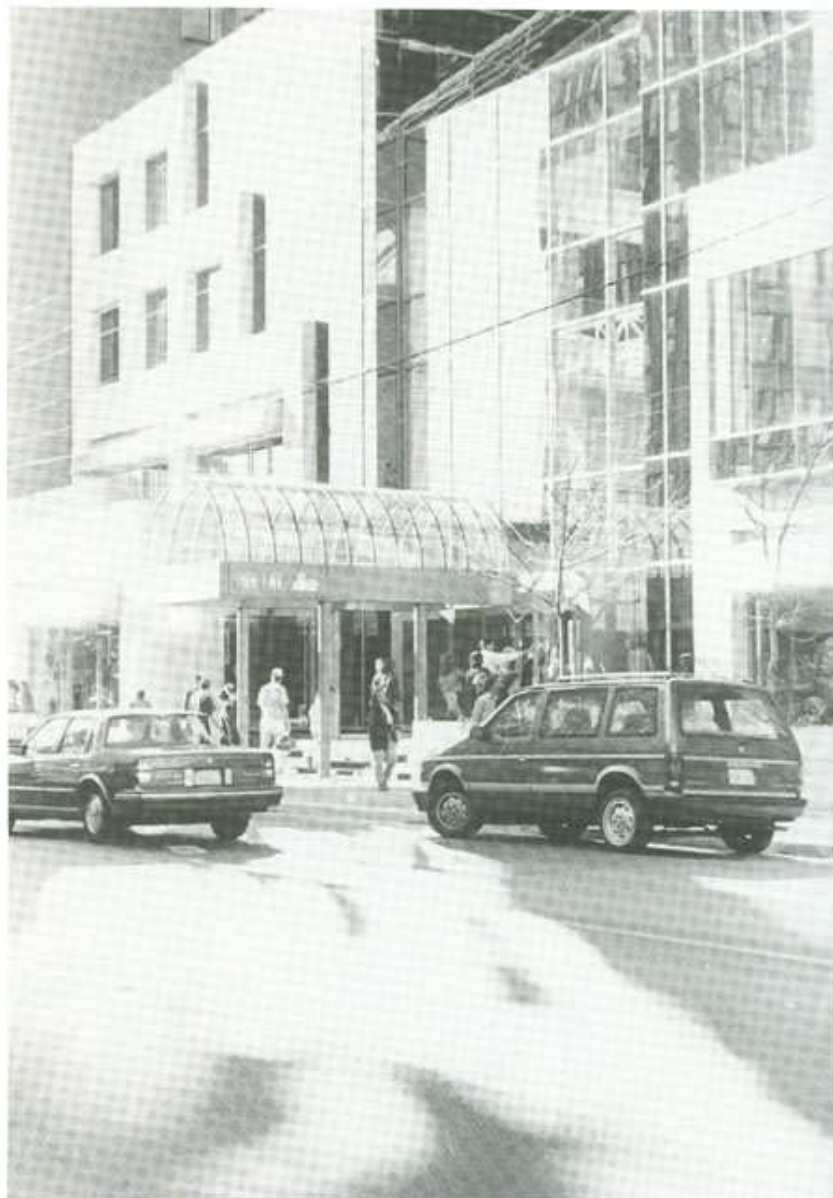


Effective September 1, 1988, smoking was prohibited throughout the university except in designated smoking areas identified by "Smoking Permitted" signs.

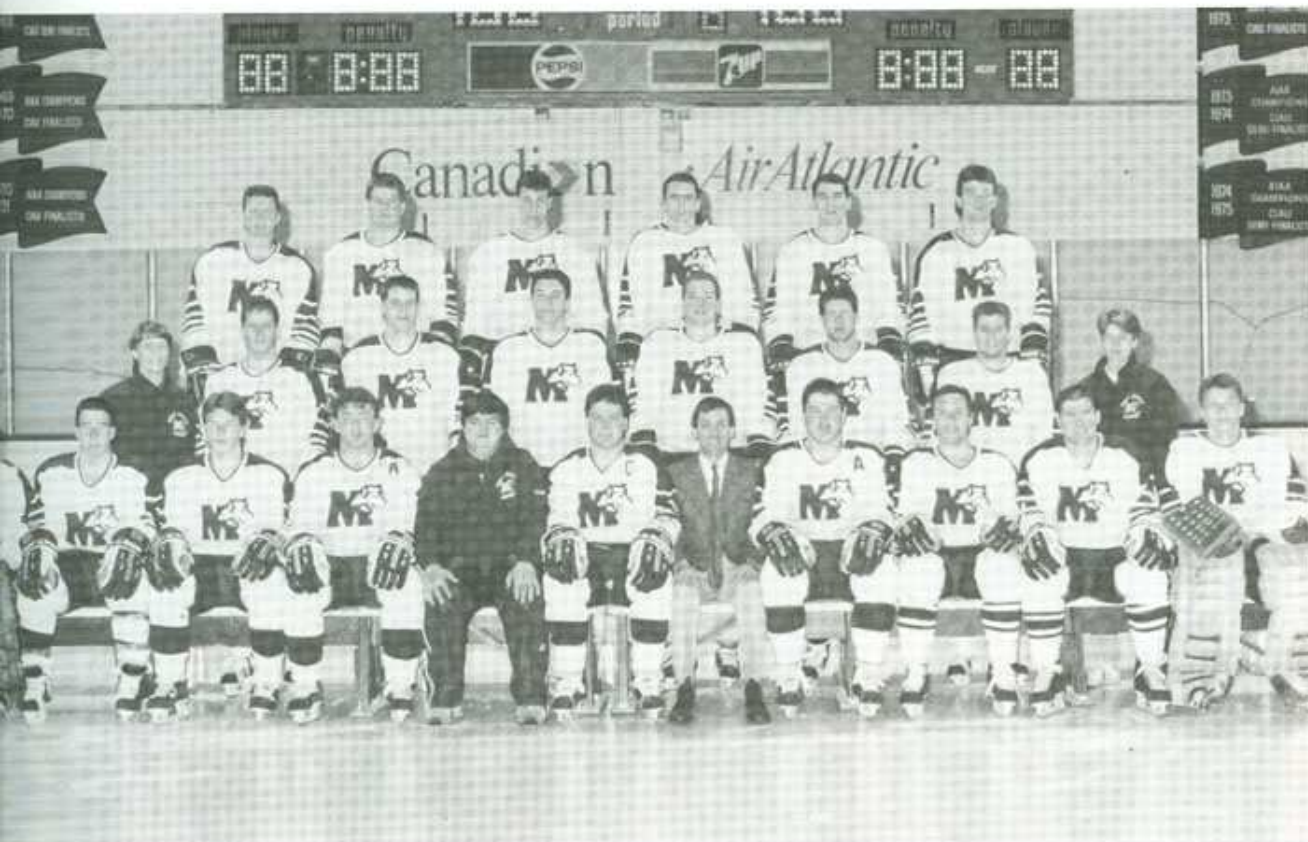


HOCKEY

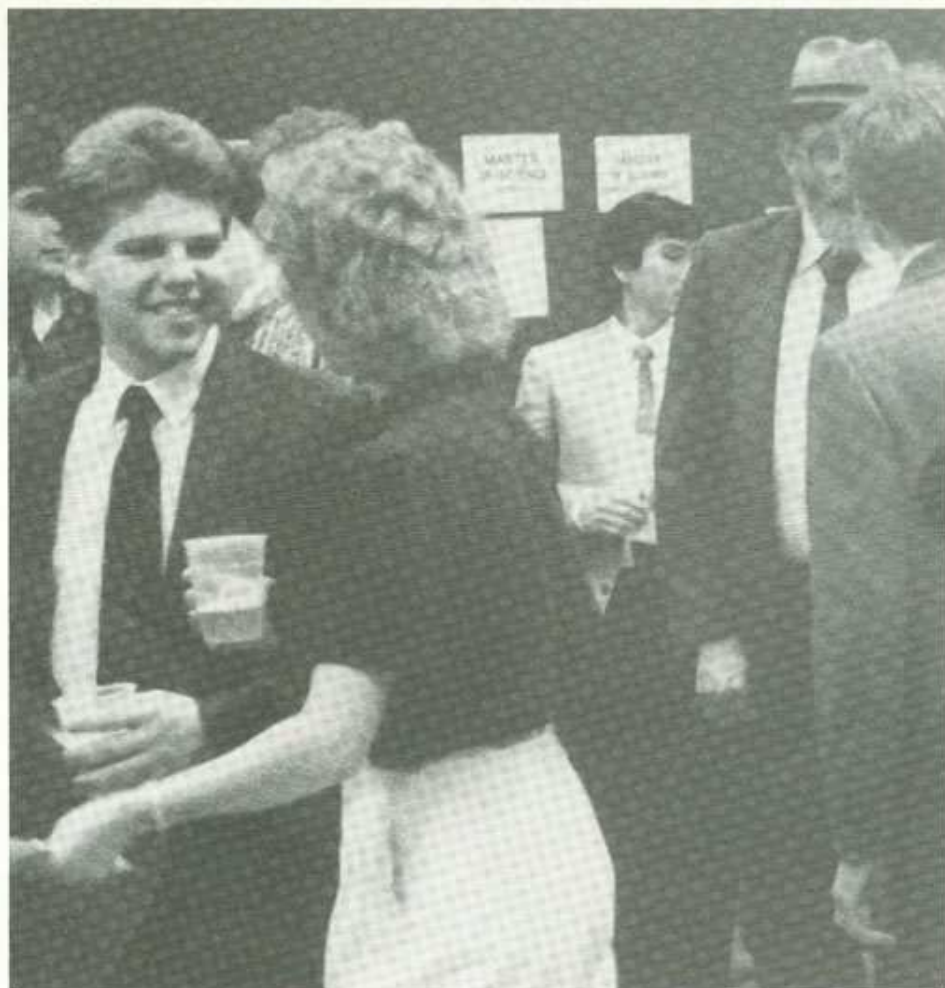
President's Reception.

The service began with the hymn, *Beatitudes*:

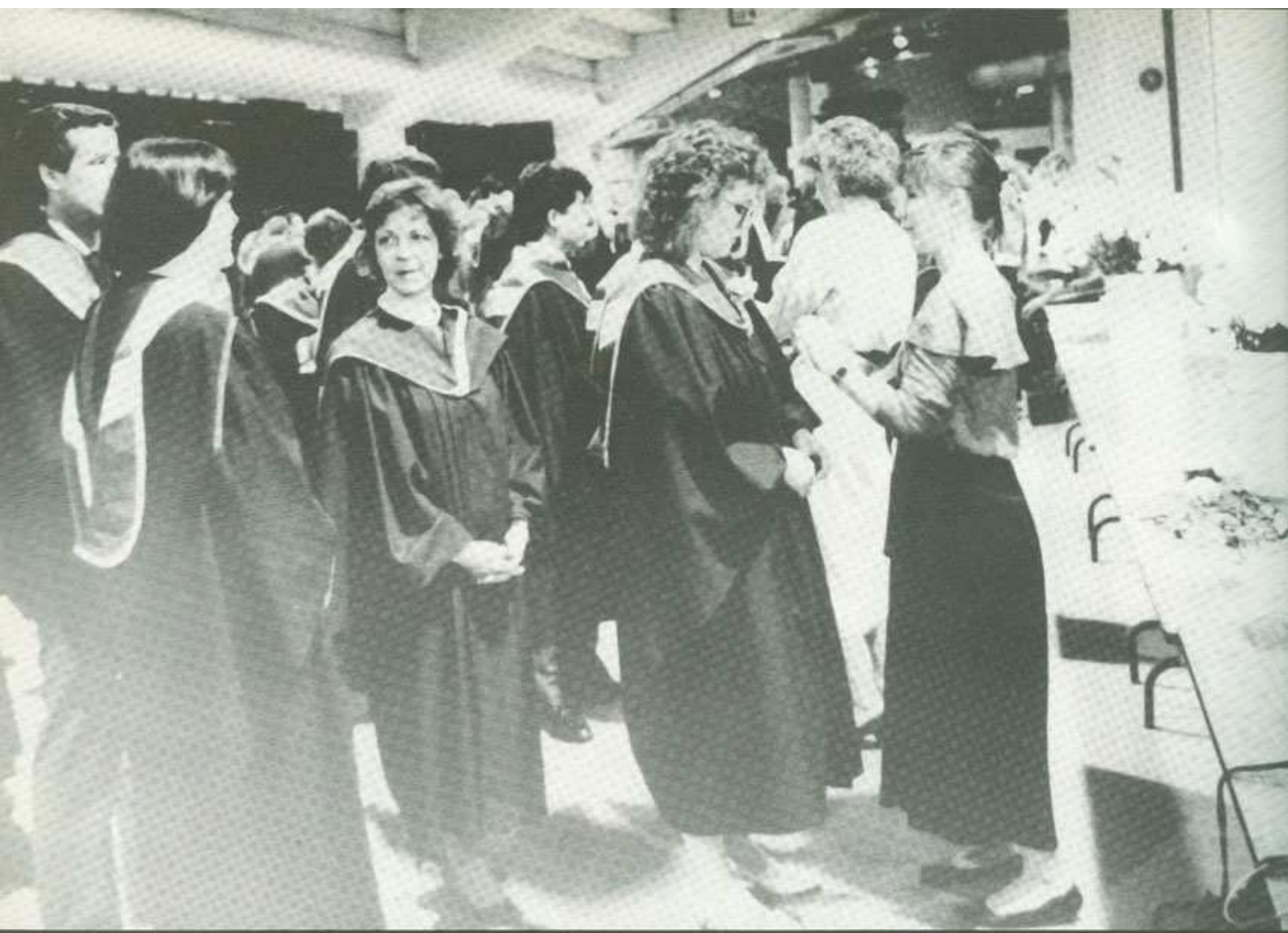
*Let your light shine

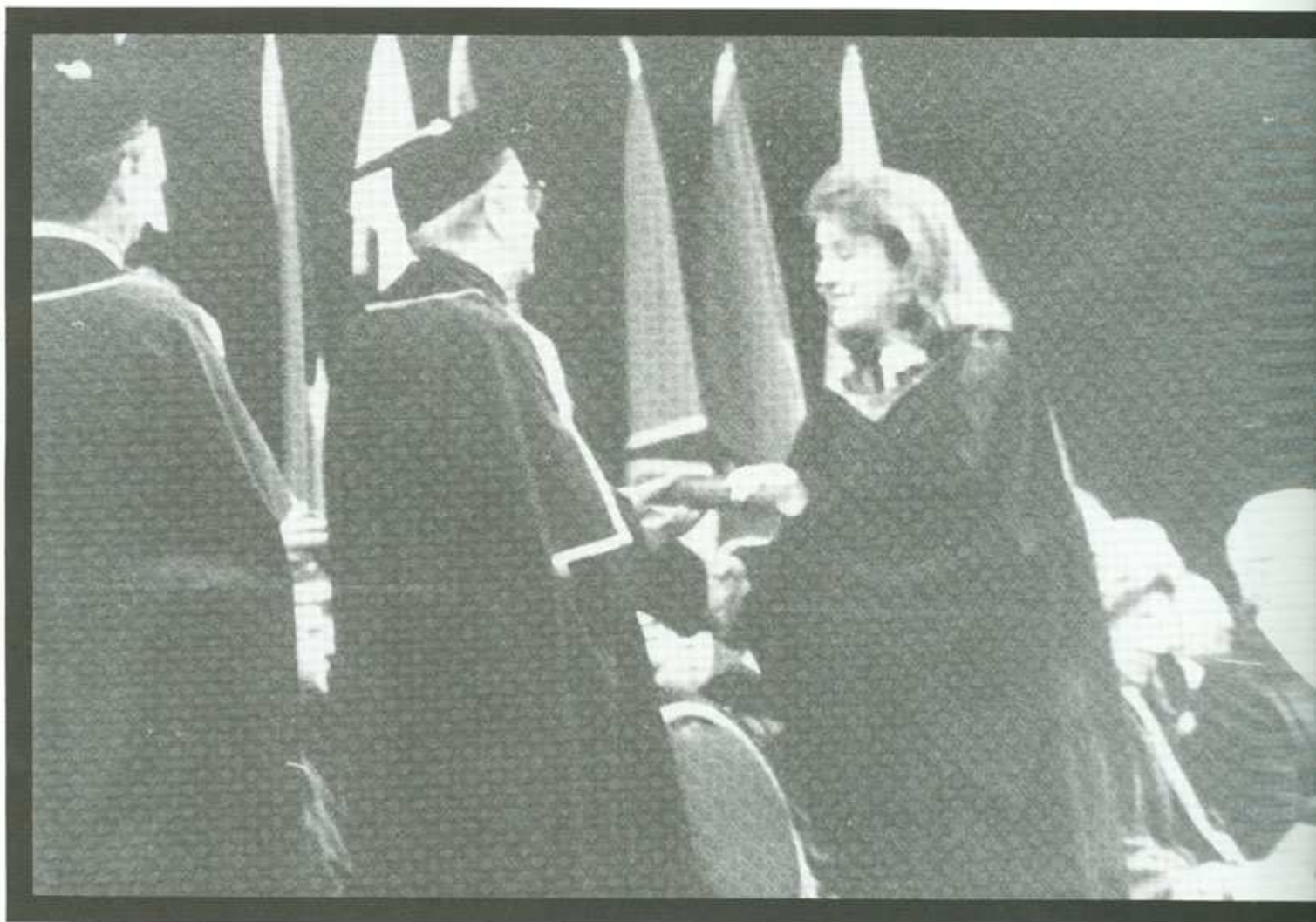
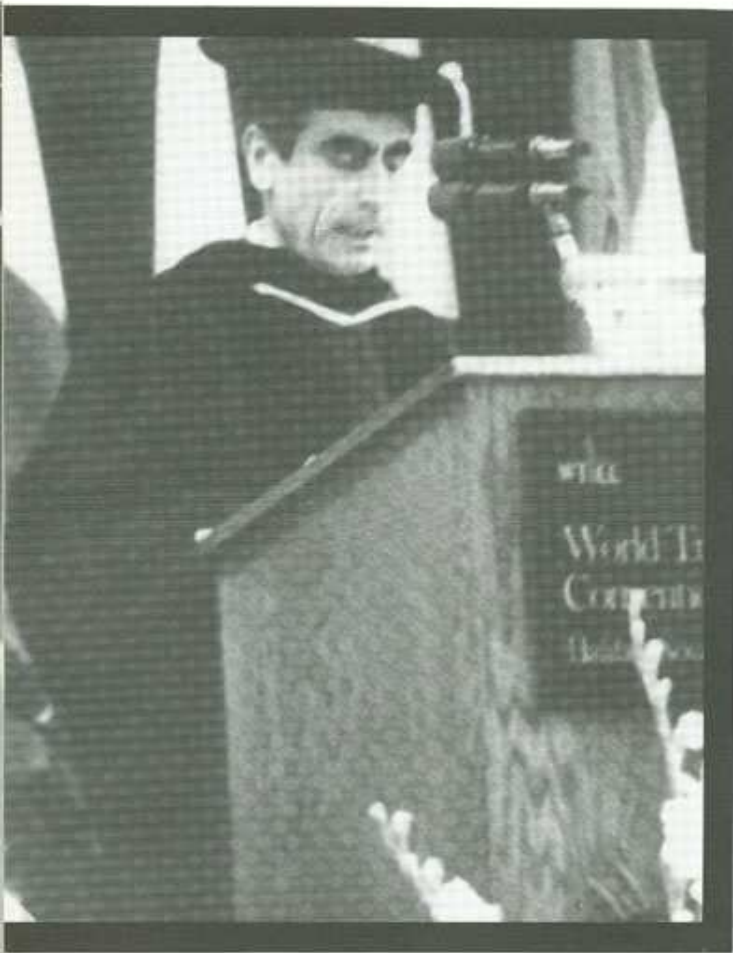
Monday, May 8.

However, the number of potential graduates for May 1986 required a larger facility than was available on campus; hence the choice of the Metro Centre which provided a very suitable setting for this major event.





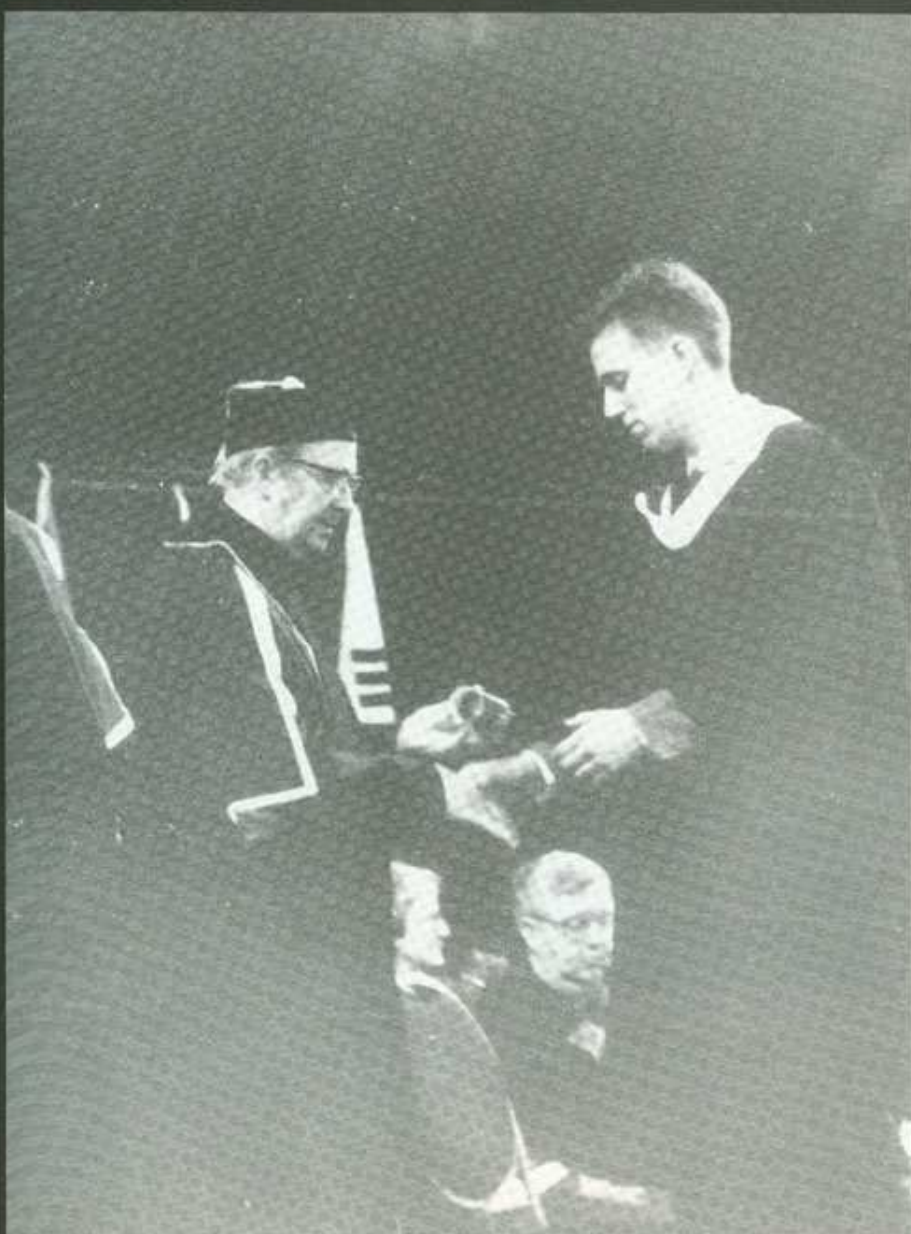
