
I hope the best for next's years orientation crew and pass on to you the hard task of welcoming new students to our small but spirited campus.

### THE NEW FRANK H. SOBEY FACULTY OF COMMERCE BUILDING


The construction of the Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce building marks a new era for Saint Mary's University. With the tender calls already made for architecture and construction management firms, the process is well underway to have the building open by September 1998.

The sod turning ceremony, held on October 16, 1996 was just the beginning of that process. With the amount of people that turned out for the event, the success of the new commerce building will not go unnoticed. Faculty, administrators, staff, students, alumni, neighbours, business leaders and politicians were on hand.

"I remember being with you a little earlier this year, when I first announced that we would invest six million dollars in funding for the capital construction of this new facility ... I understand that the province's investment may have been inspirational in persuading people to reach deeply into their pockets. With some solid leadership from David Sobey, your corporate fundraising is now approaching the twelve million dollar mark. That is a proud reflection of the way Nova Scotians pull together to make important things happen. Congratulations," says the Honourable John Savage, Premier, Nova Scotia.

"How sweet it is, sums up exactly how Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, President, Saint Mary's University feels about the construction of the new building. "Partnerships with the government, business and professional associations have been the backbone of the Saint Mary's Commerce Faculty for decades. We have offered specially designed programs for a variety of groups, and with the support of federal, provincial and municipal government agencies, small business and entrepreneurs in Nova Scotia have benefitted from access to the brightest business students and the best business professors in Atlantic Canada."



### TEAM CANADA TRIP PAYS OFF BIG FOR SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY

"When five hundred Canadians get off a plane, you tend to be noticed," is how the Prime Minister of Canada, John Chretien, described the impact of the January, 1997 Team Canada Trade Mission to Korea, the Philippines and Thailand.

The Nova Scotia contingent lead by Premier, John Savage, included Dr. Kenneth Ozmon, President of Saint Mary's University and Denis Leclaire, Director International Activities. The province generated twenty million dollars through a number of signing agreements, including one which is credited to an earlier Saint Mary's initiative.

The initiative produced a memorandum of understanding between Atlantic Combustion Products of Amherst and the Electricity Generating Authority of Thailand. Once the test period is completed, the company plans to sell eleven and one half million dollars worth of products to Thailand every year. Blake Daley, a partner in Atlantic Combustion, credits Saint Mary's Master of Business students with providing the key to opening the door for at least eight million dollars in business for his firm in Thailand.

The students analyzed the license plate market in Thailand for the company two years ago. While that project did not flourish, a more lucrative contract was signed and it was one of the largest contracts initiated during the Team Canada visit.

"The visits generate a great deal of press, which in turn raises awareness, and, in my university's case, leads to very worthwhile contacts...as well as recruiting students. Being able to say that is part of the Prime Minister's delegation opens a lot of doors...," says dr. Ozmon, about the importance and benefits of "Team Huskies" participation in Team Canada.

The second part to the Saint Mary's contingent included Maureen Woodhouse, International Activities who participated in a number of education fairs hosted by the regional Canadian Education Centres in Singapore, Jakarta, Bangkok and Kuala Lumpur. There is an incredible demand for tertiary education in a number of countries throughout Asia. Canada and Nova Scotia are particularly attractive because of the calibre of universities, the safety of our cities and a friendlier, inclusive culture. "Once prospective students realize that the winter does not last six months, they are impressed with the location, reputation and breadth of programs available at Saint Mary's," says Leclaire.

In addition to a highly successful alumni function in Singapore hosted by Dr. T. C. Cheung (Honourary Doctor of Commerce, May 1993) and attended by nearly one hundred people, University representatives met with government, high school and university officials in Bangkok, Singapore and several other countries which have expressed interest in sending students for undergraduate degrees and others for specialized training.

Already several requests for costs and course outlines are being handled by International Activities and the Admissions Department.

### COMMERCE PROFESSOR OF THE YEAR

This award is high praise for a teacher as it is selected by students. Students of The Frank H. Sobey Faculty of Commerce chose Dr. Harold Ogden, Marketing Department, as their professor of the year. Dr. Ogden has been instrumental in the development of the real-world situations for our students, including: co-operating with the US Consulate General, Commercial Services Division, on a work program which offers one student per term the opportunity to gain job experience and publish research projects that go into the US national trade database; he also co-ordinates a work-term project for students at the Canadian Embassy through the World Trade and Convention Centre.





# SAINT MARY'S UNIVERSITY CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

October 1992 marked the official launch of the University's major fundraising appeal, Building on Strength Campaign. The goal of this five-year appeal was to raise \$24 million for a number of exciting campus improvements, the cornerstone of which was a new Business School.

The goal had two components:

\$12 million private sector

\$12 million government

Many campaign highlights have been achieved since 1992. As a result of the generosity of a wide group of donors, the private sector goal has been realized.

Within this appeal, donations and pledges were made by:

Students \$600,000 Board, Faculty, and Staff \$240,000 \$2,000,000 Alumni \$2,300,000 National Corporations Regional Companies \$1,300,000 Foundations \$2,500,000 Special Names \$2,900,000 **U96** Lottery \$200,000

On the government front, \$8 million of the \$12 million goal has been raised.

Therefore, with the campaign's official canvassing phase scheduled to end in the Fall of 1997, 83% of the overall \$24 million goal has been acheived.

Highlighting the tangible campaign benefits already in evidence on campus, we have among other things:

Improvements to the Gorsebrook Lounge

Resurfacing of the astroturf field

Sod-turning of the new Business School

Establishment of a number of new scholarships

Support for the library acquistions budget

Equipment purchases for the Atlantic Center of support for Disabled Students

Support for the Business Development Centre

Support for a variety of academic programs

These elements will have a major positive impact on improving campus life for Saint Mary's students.

The most exciting development will occur when the Business School construction is completed and the ribbon is cut to mark the opening of this long-awaited facility in the Fall of 1998.


#### Huskies




### INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS ASSOCIATION

The Criminology Society, in its third year of existence, had a successful year. Membership for the year consisted of about 50 students.








#### CRIMINOLOGY SOCIETY

All things said and done, the Commerce Society had a great year, thanks to all the active members. We hope to keep in touch and look forward to bigger and better things next year.








#### SMU OFF-CAMPUS SOCIETY


