


Historically...

According to the archives of the early nineteenth century Saint Mary's University was founded in 1802 as Saint Mary's College by the Reverend Edmund Burke, later Bishop Burke. The early days of Saint Mary's College were difficult ones indeed. For some years the college was administered without financial assistance or official recognition from the colonial government of the day.

On March 29, 1841 a bill was passed in the house of assembly, which at that time was under the speakership of Sir Joseph Howe, "incorporating the trustees of Saint Mary's College at Halifax". These privileges were made perpetual on April 8, 1852.

Saint Mary's College was administered successfully by the Christian Brothers of the Congregation of Saint John and the Christian Brothers of Ireland. During this time the site of the college had been changed from Belle Aire Terrace to Barrington Street and then to a newly acquired property at Quinpool Road and Windsor Street.

It was in April of 1918 that Saint Mary's College was "... deemed and taken to be a university, with all the necessary and usual powers and privileges exercised by universities ..."

In 1940 on the invitation of the late Archbishop McNally the Jesuit Fathers assumed the direction of the university; and in 1951 the university was moved to its present site, the location of the former Collins Estate and Gorsebrook Golf Club. Ideally situated in the south end of the city Saint Mary's makes it home in one of the finest buildings in Eastern Canada. With a renewed sense of dedication, Saint Mary's plans to maintain the traditions of the past and provide for the increasing demands of the future.



On January 30th of this year the university held a special convocation to confer honorary degrees on Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, Harold Scanlon Foley, Director of the Powell River Company Limited, and Reverend Dr. William Thomas Ross Flemington, President of Mount Allison University.

In the words of Very Reverend P. G. Malone, President of the university, "the three men were chosen for recognition by Saint Mary's for their contribution to Canadian life and particularly to the development of international understanding and good will."

The Prime Minister who delivered the convocation address received the degree of Doctor of Laws (Honoris Causa) in recognition of his contribution to public life and to the improvement of commonwealth relations. The degree was conferred on Mr. Foley in recognition of his "outstanding assistance" to Hungarian students and for his contribution to Canadian economic development.

After the revolution in Hungary in the fall of 1956 almost the whole faculty and student body of the University of Sopron escaped. The University of British Columbia had no facilities for the Hungarians but Mr. Foley volunteered to house the entire school—285 students and 30 professors—in a construction camp north of Vancouver.


Dr. Flemington received his degree in recognition of his serivces to Canada in wartime, when he served as principle Protestant Chaplain overseas, and in peacetime, as President of Mount Allison University. The degree also honors the centenary year of his university which has contributed "so significantly" to education in the Maritimes.

Canadian Federation of Catholic College Students


Saint Mary's is one of the thirteen Catholic colleges in Canada registered as a member of the organization commonly known as "CFCCS" to hundreds of Canadian students.



University Reserve Training Plan


(URTP)

Contingent Officers' Training


Corps (COTC)




Curling continued to be one of the active sports at Saint Mary's this year.







Bowling returned on the list of inter-faculty sports this year under the able chairmanship of Don Mac-Kinnon. This sport held great interest during the school year.


The new gym allowed basketball players ample time for games and practices and as a result this sport has many new interested participants.








