



JOURNAL

THE JOURNAL assumed a dual personality this year when in October it suddenly became a fortnightly in an attempt—subsequently proved vain—to provide adequate coverage of the multiple activities at S.M.C. Two staffs, unimaginatively dubbed "A" and "B", split the labor of alternate issues under the suave editing of Seniors Bob Walsh and Laurie Smith.

The new situation gave an added filip of interest to the evercurrent discussion of "Who is the 'Campus Jotter'?" Now doubly difficult, it became "Who are the Campus Jotters'?' and speculation was never more rife. Actually it was only Ray Beck, who for two years managed to pretend he was the Circulation Manager and nothing more.

Besides producing a special Catholic Press issue (widely quoted) for the occasion, the *Journal* contributed its own display to the Sodality Press Exhibit. A goodly portion of the McCurdy plant was transported hither, set up in the library, and admiring throngs allowed to see the evolution of the paper from reporters' copy to finished product.

New features of abiding interest were Ed Boyd's and Joe Penny's "Quiz Quotes"—a deservedly popular canvass of student opinion—and Jim Hanrahan's "Journal Survey of Current Books"—a monthly report on book sales in ten key cities across Canada, which eventually had to be abandoned because of war time delays in the postal service.

However, the most notable improvement was probably in "Journal Jr." Under the smart handling of Bill Mingo and his assistants the section took on a gratifyingly professional tone.

Also, this year, the Journal became the first Canadian college paper admitted to the Catholic School Press Association.

Canadian Officers Training Corps

Commerce men engaged in widely disparate activities about the College throughout the year,






In the Finals, Coach Beazley's squad battled St. F. X. to a 3-3 draw at Halifax. The game was a dose-checking affair with the Irish holding on to

a one goal lead up until the closing minutes of play when a St. F. X. ganging attack batted in the equalizer.






BASEBALL




THE three High School hockey teams brought in three city titles this year, with the Juvenile team (which alone was allowed to go to further competition) reaching the provincial semi-finals.

S. M. C. entered Juvenile M. A. H. A. competion this season for the first time in its history in order to provide some hockey for Grades Ten and Eleven, since the City High League was practically moribund. Sparked by Ten B's "Dugger" McNeil, the Juveniles took the Blue Devils, the Canadians, and Spryfield handily for the city championship. Dartmouth was the next victim, followed by Windsor for the sectional title. However, a strong Antigonish squad blasted further thought of a provincial title with decisive 7-5 and 9-4 victories. Next year, with most of the same players eligible and very strong replacements coming up, the team will be aiming at the Maritime championship.

Senior High School play consisted of two games in March for the city championship, with S.M.C. downing Queen Elizabeth High 10-8 and 10-6. While not as strong defensively as former championship squads, this year's team was markedly smoother and more potent. Feature of the series was undoubtedly the precision play of the famed Kehoe-Frawley-McManus line, although the Boivin-McCoombs-Hyland trio were almost as potent in making the red light flicker. Father Carroll, coach of this as well as the Juvenile M. A. H. A. team, has brought three championships to S. M. C. in two years.

Despite a dearth of material and a very small Grade Nine to call upon, Mr. Ryan, S.J., coach of the Junior High pucksters, iced a team which by season's end compared favorably with any of the teams of past years. Characterized by dogged determination and a fine spirit of team play, the EY PS ree tles



Tobin's Teas Always Please!

THIS caption is as true today as it was Anno Domini 1825 when John Tobin, founder of this firm, opened his first consignment of tea from the Orient.

But Tobin's are not confined to a few grades of China Teas, as in that far off day over a century ago.
