of, being selected conference all-star on three separate occasions. At the conclusion of his playing career, Larry began his 20-year relationship with Saint Mary's in 1982, just a year later being given the head coaching position of the Huskies football team. During his fifteen-year tenure, Uteck racked up the honours, winning the AUAA coach of the year five times, the CIAU coach of the year twice and coaching teams to five Atlantic Bowls and three Vanier Cups. In 1995 he was named interim Athletics Director, and two years later he was formally given the job. In the same year, Larry was diagnosed with ALS, and felt that it was time to hand the reins over to a new football coach while he focused on his new position of Athletics Director. At the time Larry said, "Looking ahead I feel as though I can best serve Saint Mary's and the Huskies programs as Director of Athletics and Recreation." Larry continued to serve as the Director right up to his untimely death two weeks ago. Larry Uteck was great man whose influence on everyone at Saint Mary's as well as all of the Huskies teams, will be sorely missed.

October 1952: Born in Thornhill, Ont.

1970-72: Attended University of Colorado on a football scholarship.

1973: Attended Wilfrid Laurier University.

1974-1980: Played in the CFL with Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa and B.C. A three-time conference all-star,

1982: Moved to Halifax and joined Saint Mary's as assistant coach.

1983: Named head coach at Saint Mary's.

1983-1997: Guided Huskies to seven Atlantic Bowls and three Vanier Cup appearances. Won five Atlantic conference and two Canadian university coach-of-the-

year awards.

1989: Married Sue Maloney. Son Luke was born in 1990, followed by daughter Cain three years later.

1994-1999: Served as Halifax alderman and deputy mayor.

1995: Named SMU's interim athletic director. Formally appointed to the position two years later.

1998: Diagnosed with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis.
1998: Appointed Blake Nill as head coach of SMU's football program.

2002: Named as a member of the Order of Canada.

Dec. 25, 2002: Died in Halifax.

The coaches, staff and teams have honoured Larry's memory by sewing butterflies on their home uniforms. To understand the significance of the butterfly, please take a few moments to read the following letter Larry wrote to his daugher Cain on her 9th birthday.

*Dear Cain.

Every day when I see you I am amazed at how much you have grown. You are not my little baby any more. Every day you get prettier and prettier. You are also a very gifted girl. You are very smart, even though you don't realize it yet. You can run like a deer, you are tough as you rarely get hurt or complain and you also have an artist's vision which you are not afraid to express. Those gifts bring with them a cost. You have to work hard to develop your talents.

Never say you are bored because that is when you should practice. Nothing brings happiness like accomplishments, except helping others accomplish. So run, jump, play, draw, read, dream, think, work and write whenever you can. It will bring you so much in the end.

As always I really miss being able to talk and play with you, but I really enjoy it when you come and talk to me, telling me a story or what happened

with your day. My being sick is very hard on everyone especially Mom because she gets stuck with all the work at the responsibility for being the bad guy who has to say no and dish out the punishment when you or Luke misbehave. I know that you won't be good all the time but it's important to try your best and to help Mom whenever you can.

I am doing fine. I look at my illness this way. I had a long, active and productive life as a caterpillar. Now I am more quiet and restful, kind of like living in a cocoon. 



REMEMBERING... A Legend


Christmas is a time for friends and family, but tragically Saint Mary's lost a key member of its family in the early morning hours of Christmas day. Larry Uteck, who among other things coached the football Huskies for fifte years, and reigned as Athletic Director for five more, passed away peacefully on December 25th at the age of fifty,

as a result of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis, a disease he was diagnosed with in 1997.

University President Dr. Colin Dodds said on Uteck's passing that he was an integral figure for Saint Mary athletics, and one that can never be replaced fully. "Larry helped the program immensely, in terms of his knowled of the rules and regulations and his vision for the future of Saint Mary's athletics. Few people know that all throughout Larry's illness, and in particular near the end, he was key to strategizing for the future of all of the athletics programs here at Saint Mary's. Just the fact that Larry was able to endure such a terrible disease and ye continue to come to work, and do everything else he possibly could, is such a tribute to the man as a whole and h character. He was a role model for us all - a role model for student athletes and one for us as individuals. He was terrific man, and his loss will be felt throughout Saint Mary's University."

"I had the good fortune to know Larry for about fifteen years," reflects Chris Larson, Director of Developme with the hockey Huskies. Larson, who was also a key member of the host organizing committee for the World Juniors, was busy with preparation for the tournament when he heard the news. "We were very busy getting read and making final preparations, but when we heard it stopped us dead in our tracks. Out of everybody that knew Larry, I don't think anyone expected him to pass so quickly. To know Larry Uteck is to know a man of commitmen a man of passion and a man that truly loved Saint Mary's. Larry's personality before he became ill was one that created an aura everywhere that he went, and during his five-year fight with the illness, his character shone through day after day after day." Larson helped orchestrate a moment of silence for Uteck before the Canada vs. Sweder opening game on Boxing Day. In a moving moment, over 10,000 fans who were hotly anticipating an event two years in the making, all stood silently for the legendary Husky.

"I think what must be said about Larry is that he was an individual, who genuinely cared about people," sa football coach Blake Nill, who took over the reins from Uteck in 1998. "Here's a guy who cared about everyone, from his family obviously, to his players, his coaches and everyone that he was in contact with. He truly made Sa Mary's a better place while he was here. To me Larry was a confidant that I went to when I needed help. I enjoye



going to him and running things by him, having him tell me he felt they were good made me feel better. That's what I miss about Larry the most, just the everyday things." Basketball coach Ross Quackenbush was another person who had a relationship with Uteck for a number of years. "Larry was a unique individual, who was very intelligent, v compassionate, and a person who had a real sense of rig and wrong and how to apply it judiciously. These qualities helped to make him an excellent Athletic Director. He's going to be sorely missed."

"I know that I'll make better decisions for the rest of my life, simply because of my admiration for Larry Uteck, says hockey Huskies Coach Trevor Stienberg confidently "For the five and a half years that I knew him, his ability to be a leader stands out most of all. The thing that I most admire about him was his integrity and his desire for fairness. He was a man who stood up for what he believe in, and he was never afraid to stand up for right. I can on hope to have a little Larry Uteck in me."

Uteck attended the University of Colorado in the ea 1970s, before transferring to Wilfred Laurier University in Ontario, in 1973. After a successful university career, Lar was given a shot in the CFL, a shot that he made the mo










This was the first thought that sprung to my head when found out that the Dalhousie Gazette did not get their referendum question passed recently, which would have ncreased the current levy of 54 per student to \$7.50 per student. Why such an unsympathetic and meanspirited reaction to a fellow school newspaper's misfortune? The reasons are many, but mostly I'm just owering myself to their level; for those that don't keep up with the Gazette (and I'm sure you all number in the thousands), things have gotten a little personal in their last few issues, with some undue hits below the belt where SMU is concerned. It tarted with their incredibly biased and unprofessional survey of Santamarians, platantly stealing Rick "Talking Mercer's Americans" format from This Hour Has 22 Minutes, in very much the same manner they copied our ever-popular G-Spot with a substandard sex column of their own. Seriously, who knows, or more importantly, even temptely cares about, the Queen mom's age? And when 45% of Santamarians did get a question right, the Gazette pted to print the skewed view of *5.5% of Santamarians get this question wrong" instead, just to make themselves look more clever. and us dimmer. We had some reactions, mostly from people asking us not to lower ourselves to their level. We abstained (mostly), and let it go. But that wasn't enough for the Gazette, so when they distributed leaflets advocating a levy increase, they used their oh-so-cooltand originalt"What's Hot and What's Not" column format. The second HOT thing was voting YES for our levy' and the second NOT that went with it was 'the SMU Journal'. It was the third direct dig in as many weeks, and we at the oumal did not appreciate it.

However, looking more closely at their leaflet, we found more untruths and inconsistencies in the information presented to the students of Dalhousie. The most glaring is their claim that their current levy of \$4 per student doesn't even cover their print bill. Hmm...let's do a little quick math here. The Journal also gets \$4 per student. Both the Gazette and the Journal use the same printer for our newspapers. The costs for producing each paper would be very similar, and though their paper is often longer than ours, they also have more advertisers to offset that cost. So, we get \$4 for each full-time student, which SMU has 5,500 of, and \$2 for each part-time student, which we have 3,000 of. This brings in a total of approximately \$28,000 in student levies for the year, and admittedly, money is tight, but obviously, newspaper can be successfully run on this budget. Dalhousie, on the other hand, has 11,500 fulltime undergraduate students, up to 5,000 graduate students. and up to 14,000 more parttimers. Assuming that graduate students also pay the \$4 fee, and that part-time students pay \$2, the Gazette's total levy comes to \$76,000. But even if we calculated their levy based only on their fulltime undergraduate students, it still comes out almost twice as high as our entire levy, at \$46,000. What conclusion can be reached from these numbers? The staff at the Gazette is comprised of incompetent boobs who are grossly mis-spending their budget, or whiny moneygrubbers who just want to line their pockets a little more thickly. The second theory becomes more viable with another inconsistency in the leaflet: the leaflet claims that the levy raise would be \$3.50, yet the referendum question read \$3.50 - \$4. On the one hand, you can't blame the Gazette for trying to slip that one past the voters. On the other hand, I know I would

have noticed that, and it would have definitely turned me off voting in favour of the levy increase. That kind of inconsistency could only get past the dumbest of the dumb, which, I suppose, is why they tried it at Dal, but it turns out their students are actually smarter than that. Yet another point of intrigue on the leaflet was the claim that the \$3.50 increase is "less than half the cost of lunch in the Grawood." That means that the Gazette staff are paying over \$7.00 for lunch in their pub; no wonder they can't budget the newspaper's money, they can't even go to a pub and find something to eat at lunch for \$5. So maybe they are just having massive budgeting problems after all, but chances are it's a mix of idiocy and greed.

Whatever the Gazette's reasons for wanting really badly to get a levy increase, they didn't get it, and personally, I'd like to think it's a karmic kick in the ass. Up until recently, we had a professional working relationship with the Gazette; it's no secret the papers have been rivals in the past, just like anything that involves Dal and SMU, but things had been calm and respectful. I can speak from experience that running a student newspaper isn't the easiest job in the world, and the last thing any paper wants to deal with is their peers slagging them in their own publication. But the Gazette felt the need to start something with all that garbage, and then tried to get more money by denouncing us on their leaflet. I'd say those guys got exactly what they deserve: a steaming pile of squat. On a final note, I would like to point out that when the Journal ran a referendum question to receive \$4 per student in order to be autonomous from our student government, it passed with approximately 70% of voters in favour. The facts don't lie; looks like the Journal is definitely hot, and the Gazette obviously not.






Saint Mary's University Drama Society








Caribanza

Saint Mary's H look back in time University

Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada

A major theme running through the history of Saint Mary's from when it was a mere seedling in 1802 through to the present day is struggle and triumph against adversity. Getting the seedling going was arduous and must have been a great frustration to the person who planted it, Father Edmund Burke.

When he arrived in Halifax in the summer of 1801 as Vicar-General of Nova Scotia under the Roman Catholic Diocese of Quebec, he assessed the needs of his rather scattered flock and determined that an educational institution of higher learning was one of the most pressing needs of his people. A man of vision and great persistence, he saw clearly that the situation of his mostly Irish flock in Halifax could be ameliorated through education. This would provide them a major tool in fighting the prejudice, bigotry and suspicion under which two centuries of legal proscription had forced them to labour.

Edmund Burke was a graduate of the Irish College in Paris, the most

expeditiously. It is a house of two stories with kitchen and dining hall in the basement, a cellar and storeroom, 60 feet by 40 feet within the walls."

Burke, like many Catholic ecclesiastics in Ireland throughout the period of penal restriction, resorted to giving the rudiments of an education privately in his house. Writing to the Bishop of Quebec in 1802 about a native of Philadelphia named Thomas McGuire who later became a priest in Quebec, Burke says "perhaps he has not extensive knowledge yet, but he can acquire that at my house." It must have seemed to him that he was back to his boyhood days when the "Hedge Schools" operated throughout the Catholic community in Ireland -a master, returned from one of the continental Colleges, would conduct an illegal school, frequently out of door in the gripe of a ditch, hence "Hedge School." Although the Penal Code in Ireland no longer made Catholic schools and colleges illegal, the pallor of their illegality in Nova Scotia was to continue until 1806 when an Irish Regiment headed by another Burke, Colonel John Burke of Marble Hill, County Galway arrived in Halifax.

John Burke was only twenty years of age when he took over a regiment raised by his father in Ireland to become part of the military build up against Napoleon. The Burkes of Marble Hill were devout Roman Catholics who despite the legal restrictions against their owning land had managed to retain their property, most likely through the agency of their Protestant cousins, the Earls of Clanricard

prominent of several such colleges for the educati of Irish Catholics which were scattered from Lisb to Prague. This college system had been establish by various crowned heads on the European confit to allow young Irishmen to pursue an education denied them at home under the notorious Penal Laws. These laws were described by another Edmund Burke, the 18th century political thinker, "a machine of wise and elaborate contrivance, and well fitted for the oppression, impoverishment, at degradation of a people and the debasement, in the of human nature itself, as ever proceeded from the perverted ingenuity of man."

That same system of penal legislation was

confront Reverend Burke when he petitioned Governor Wentworth for permission to build a College in Halifax. That was in the spring of 1802. Alluding to the Penal Laws prohibiting Roman Catholics, derogatorily referred to as Papists, from operating schools or colleges, Wentworth denied Burke permission to build his school. This was despite the 1786 repeal of legislation forbidding Catholics to run schools. However, Burke persiste

and in the fall of 1802 he wrote to Bishop Denault Quebec "Our College is advancing quite

he had erected the College building in 1802. Following Bishop Burke's death in 1820, the idea of the College was kept alive by two of Burke's former students: John Ryan(1811-1837) a Halifax native studying in Rome to become a priest had left property and a valuable library of books to the Halifax college, and Lawrence O'Connor Doyle who convinced the trustees of Saint Mary's Parish to petition Bishop Fraser who had replaced Burke to have the College re-established. That was in 1838. Bishop Fraser replied positively the request of the Saint Mary's trustees and as a result the Archbishop of Dublin sent out two priests to re-establish the college. The to priests were Father Lawrence Dease and Father Richard Baptist O'Brien. O'Brien had been somewhat reluctant to come out but apparently was convinced to do so by Mother Catherine McAuley, the founder of the Mercy Order of nuns. Both priests arrived in September of 1939.

On 1 January, 1840, Saint Mary's College opened in its new premises on the east side of Grafton Street near Spring Garden. According to the College prospectus, which was published in the Boston Globe on 1 February following, Saint Mary's offered a wide range of language courses including Greek and Hebrew. There was an array of courses in mathematics and the natural sciences as we as philosophy. A strong emphasis was placed on the students' abilities to express

themselves in English.

Father Richard Baptist O'Brien was obviously a man of action. Within a year of his taking over Saint Mary's he had the trustees apply to the Nova Scotia legislature for a charter enabling the College to offer degrees. He and his colleague Father Dease were extremely popular with the Halifax Irish population. O'Brien had begun what today we would call extension courses wherein he taught English to a population which would have included a large number of Irish(Gaelic) speakers. He and Father Dease fell afoul of the oligarchy running the church in Halifax. There was a complex protracted dispute within the Catholic community about matters of jurisdiction and control of Church property and O'Brien and Dease were drawn into it. Bishop Fraser, a highland Scot, was the centre around which the controversy swirled in Irish dominated Halifax. Fraser as Bishop of Nova Scotia had moved his domicile out of Halifax to Arichat. O'Brien who was not reluctant to make his attitudes known, attracted Fraser's ire and as a consequence Saint Mary's bore the brunt of the Bishop's opprobrium. A number of clerical students left the college complaining of their treatment at the hands of students and faculty and Fraser bad-mouthed the education meted out at the College. It was not until after the appointment of Reverend William Walsh, an Irishman, as Apostolic Administrator of Halifax in 1844 and ultimately Bishop that matters became more settled.

The conflict between O'Brien and Fraser had more to do with style than substance. Fraser complained of the rather dashing word or Brien dressed and the figure he cut in Halifax society. The portrait of O'Brien painted by William Valentine shows a man more securing his dress than ecclesiastic, though it must be said that Catholic priests in a mixed community such as Halifax tended to dress in a fashion which would not draw attention to their priestly status.

Moreover, O'Brien while president of Saint Mary's was a man deeply involved in Irish politics - he was a personal friend of

Daniel O'Connell - and consequently oriented to secular life and affairs. His friends included Lawrence O'Connor Doyle, Joseph Howe, Michael Tobin and most likely Richard John Uniacke. He also on very friendly terms with D'Arcy McGee who, while editor the Boston Pilot, made mention of his having visited O'Brien at \$ Mary's College, referring to O'Brien as "that gifted Divine." After return to Ireland in 1845, O'Brien became more seriously involved the politics of post-O'Connell Ireland. He became a professor at A Hallows College in Dublin; spent a period in Rome where he became a Doctor of Divinity and ultimately Vicar General of the Dioceses Limerick. He founded the Catholic Young Men's society, which boasted 100,000 members. His period in Nova Scotia was one of most important formative influences in his life. A recent biograph claims that O'Brien's experience of political life in Canada with compromise as its pragmatic base had a significant impact on O'Brien and through him on the Protestant nationalist, Isaac Butt who was a friend of O'Brien. O'Brien's contacts with D'Arcy McG were maintained after he left Nova Scotia and despite Joe Howe's rows with the Irish in Halifax in the 1860s, when Howe was in London in 1867 he took a by-pass to Limerick for a visit with his a friend Dean O'Brien.

Saint Mary's College was placed in the capable hands of Reverend Thomas Connolly after R.B. O'Brien's return to Ireland Connolly presided over the affairs of the College from 1847 to 185 when he was named Bishop of Saint John, New Brunswick. Six yo later Connolly was back in Halifax succeeding Rt. Reverend Willia Walsh as Archbishop. Like R.B. O'Brien whom he had replaced as President of Saint Mary's, Archbishop Connolly was a practical m

of sound intelligence. He was one of a minority of prelates to oppose the doctrine of Papal Infallibility at the Ecumenical Council in 1869-70 on pragmatic rather than theological grounds. He also felt as a citizen he had a right to express his political opinions publicly on the greatest question of the day, Confederation, of which he was a firm supporter. He attended the London Conference in 1866-67 as a proponent of a system of state supported confessional schools.

Archbishop Connolly brought the De La Salle Brothers to Halifax in 1865 to teach at Saint Mary's and they took over the operation of the College in 1867 which moved to a site on Belle-Aire Terrace. The De La Salle order gave over the direction of the College to the Archdiocese in 1876 when the Belle-Aire campus which moved again back to the Grafton Street site. This was the period when the University of Halifax was legislated into being; all the Nova Scotian Colleges and Mount Allison as well become part of a non-sectarian administration. Father Edward F. Murphy served as President of Saint Mary's in 1876;

systems later he was succeeded by Reverend Richard Kearns. When the amalgamated University of Halifax failed in 1879, the symment refused the grant by which Saint Mary's had been able to operate and in 1881 the Trustees were forced to close the college, but the former President of Saint Dunstan's College in Charlottetown, Reverend Cornelius O'Brien succeeded to the Archdiocese of lifax in 1883, he immediately set about attempting to re-open Saint Mary's. He made valiant efforts all during his episcopate to get the case, the Eudists, the Benedictine and the Irish Christian Brothers to take over the running of the institution. Like Bishop Burke before the refused to give up his ideal of a Catholic College in Halifax and ultimately he succeeded. To Archbishop O'Brien must go the dos for Saint Mary's survival into the modern era. He acquired the fifteen acre site at Windsor Street in 1902 and in 1903, three years see his death, laid the cornerstone of the new Saint Mary's which reopened in that year under the presidency of Rev. Edmund madely. Archbishop O'Brien threw himself into reviving Saint Mary's almost literally, supervising the construction because he was able to pay a contractor. Between 1903 and 1913 Saint Mary's attracted some extremely talented teachers who held degrees from such summed universities as Oxford, Cambridge, Cork and London. Reverend Charles McManus became President in 1905 and held the stion until 1912. In that year the financial precariousness of the College again called for some drastic action and negotiations began to the College's affairs taken over by one of the religious orders. This time the Archdiocese was able to work out an arrangement with drish Christian Brothers and in 1913 a contract was signed between the

phdiocese and the Brothers for them to take over the affairs of Saint Mary's. Classes on a September, 1913 under the direction of the Brothers who continued raing Saint Mary's until 1940. The old College illdings on Windsor Street were to be replaced by the campus on Robie Street on the

grounds of the Gorsebrook Estate. Archbishop McNally purchased the property in 1943 and the work of erecting what is called after him the McNally Building was put off until after the war. The raising of the

money for the project from an impôt on the Archdiocese was fraught with difficulty and some deal of personal sacrifice. Suggestive of its origins in a penal era for Catholics in 1802, part of the stone for the new Saint Mary's building came from the Provincial Penitentiary on the shores of the North West Arm which was razed in April 1948. Construction started in the fall of 1949 and the building, at the time, the largest academic structure in Eastern Canada was ready of use in 1951. The modern era of Saint Mary's had begun and would reach another of its watersheds of development in 1970 when the Jesuits passed over their stewardship to a new and more secular constitution.

It is unlikely that Reverend Edmund Burke was in any way closely related to Colonel John Burke; however, Colonel Burke took up the cause of his co-religionist in Halifax and intervened with the Governor. Father Burke wrote in a letter to Bishop Denault in 1806 "in spite of the efforts of the Bishop [Inglis] and his followers, Providence has given me a means of obtaining the governor's permission. A young man of the Catholic branch of the family of Burkes & brother-in-law of the Count of Clanricard of the Protestant branch, came here with his regiment. I spoke to him, he spoke to the governor and the business was done in an instant."

With the legal status of the seminary clarified, Reverend Burke began his campaign to have his college in Halifax fully established. It seems clear that his aim was to have a college which would meet the standards set out by Cardinal Antonelli, head of Propaganda Fidei in Rome, one of which was that such seminaries should be under the direction of

of the religious orders. By historic irony the first order which Reverend Burke negotiated with and which came within a hair of ling to Halifax at that time was that of the Jesuits who finally came to conduct affairs at Burke's college in 1941 when it had evolved Saint Mary's University.

wa Scotia in 1781, Uniacke was not well regarded by the place holders in Halifax. His being a Protestant gave him legal enablement this being as one described him "a great lubberly insolent Irish rebel" placed him outside the favored circle. Coming from a landed in family which had only recently conformed to the Established Church to save its lands, and having himself Catholic leaning and

sympathies, Uniacke recognized implicitly the injustice of Roman Catholics being deprived of what today we would call civil rights. In 1786 he drafted and saw through the Nova Scotia Assembly an Act enabling Catholics to conduct schools. It was in his office where the petition to the colonial government in favor of full civil enablement for Roman Catholics was written. It was under Uniacke's tutelage also that the young Lawrence O'Connor Doyle read law to become the first Roman Catholic legal practitioner in Nova Scotia. And it was Uniacke's son, R.J. Uniacke, Jr., who successfully furthered the admission of Lawrence Kavanagh a kinsman of O'Connor Doyle - as a member of the Nova Scotia Assembly to which Kavanagh's Roman Catholicism denied him entry.

Two years before his death Father Edmund Burke who had only recently been raised to the Episcopate was able to see a further stage of development of his College when a number of young men including his nephew John Carroll took up their studies in 1818. The ideal Burke had in mind was still someway down the road but much closer than it had been since

Saint Mary's University A CELEBBATION 1802-2002

Tradition met the future in May 2002, when the year long celebration of Saint Mary's founding officially began. Anticipation was noticable around campus for what has proved to be a memorable year of events during the 200th Anniversary Celebration. Upwards of 100 volunteers representing faculty, staff, students, and the community have formed the 200th Anniversary Steering Committee and its eight sub-committees. They were responsible for planning a broad spectrum of events designed to include everyone affiliated with Saint Mary's University. Keith Hotchkiss, Chair of the Special Events Committee, was especially excited to see the Celebration coming together. He said, "It's nice to work with students, colleagues, and alumni to put something of this magnitude together. It's going to be an exciting year for everyone connected to Saint Mary's University."





A 200th anniversary logo was highly visible, appearing on letterhead, brochus print advertising, the web site, and varsity uniforms during the year long celebration. The logo is simple and provided a focus for the Anniversary. In December 2001, a fifty foot banner was hung over the field of the SkyDome in Toronto during the Vanier Cup. The national champion football Huskies also wore a special crest on the uniforms symbolizing Saint Mary's 200 years of history.

May 21, 2002 marked the first of three plaques unveiled at the past and present Saint Mary's campus locations. The first was unveiled at the Glebe House on the corner of Spring Garden Road and Barrington Street. This is the location where Fath (later Bishop) Edmund Burke constructed a college for young men in Halifax in 181. The Windsor Street campus, constructed at the beginning of the 20th century, had a plaque unveiling during the 2002 Homecoming Weekend. The third plaque was unveiled at Saint Mary's University during the Spring Convocation Ceremony of 2003.

Canada Post issued a commemorative stamp to mark Saint Mary's 200th Anniversary. This is a significant honour as few anniversaries and celebrations are granted the opportunity to share their milestone with the rest of the country. The 48-cent stamp featuring the university will be sought after by collectors. Eight years ago, Ron Lewis, recently retired University Librarian and Chair of Senate had the idea to pursue a stamp for the upcoming anniversary. His idea became a reality with the assistance of Senator Wilfred Moore, a Saint Mary's alumnus.

Dr. Colin Dodds spoke with enthusiasm about the anniversary. "It will celebrate our rich history of service students, commitment to accessibility and community outreach. It will also permit us to welcome our future as a mamic and innovative leader in post-secondary education."

MIDNIGHT MADNESS BROOMBALL


