THEY BEAT THE MACHINE

Modern accounting techniques, including complex electronic computers, would make it more difficult, one would think, for employees to steal from their employers. Not so, reports William Jeffery in The Financial Post. More efficient accounting methods have produced more efficient crooks. Embezzlers are stealing more money, more often and more quickly. One of the country's largest bonding firms last year paid out 92.7 per cent of its premium income because of dishonest employees. This same company estimates that Canadian workers will steal as much as \$100 million this year. While most big companies are increasing their vigilance, wily white-collar workers are finding new ways to steal bigger amounts. This was the consensus at the recent meeting of the Institute of Internal Auditors.

No Autumn Weekend would ever be complete without a football game. This is true again this year as the Saint Mary's University Huskies tackle the Shearwater Flyers in this year's Autumn Weekend Classic.

As an added attraction the Saint Mary's soccer team will be on hand twice during the weekend. Sean Dennehy and his crew will tackle King's College Monday afternoon and on Saturday they will clash with the defending Maritime champions, the Saint Francis Xavier X-men.

The football team will go into the Shearwater game with a 5 win and 2 loss record. If they defeat the Flyers they will have clinched second place in the league. The Huskies are favored to win although the Flyers played an excellent game for one half against the X-men last week, losing 33-6 after holding the X-men to a 6-6 tie in the first half.

GRIDDERS RIDING HIGH

The Huskies have been riding a five game winning streak after their opening losses to St. F. X. and Stadacona. They have defeated St. Dunstan's 66-0, UNB 43-0, Dalhousie 60-0, Mount Allison 17-0, and last week they beat Acadia 55-0. Thus they will be going into Shearwater to win their sixth straight game as well as their sixth straight shutout.

The Huskies were up for the contest with Acadia last week and the result was the 55-0 score. The team had hoped to pass against the Axemen but rain and a strong wind prevented this strategy from being used. Still the Huskies completed 8 to 14 pass attempts and rolled up over 400 yards overall in the game.

One of the big surprises was the powerful running of Frank Arment as he picked up a fumble and ran 48 yards for the first touchdown of his career at Saint Mary's. Only one player had a chance at Arment and big Frank walked right over him. Perhaps Frank missed his calling.

Al Keith put on a tremendous show as he intercepted a pass and reversed his field twice, running 60 yards for paydirt. He also intercepted another pass. Another sterling defensive effort was turned in by Stu O'Brien who intercepted a pass and ran 34 yards for a touchdown. Chuck Liebrock was outstanding on the punt he blocked to set up Arment's touchdown.

Leo Raftrey was the big man for the Huskies backed by Paul Puma. Raftrey scored two touchdowns including a fifty-seven yard jaunt. Puma added one while Charlie White was good for another. John Schneider again proved to be the finest all around player as he caught three passes including one for a touchdown. He also converted five of his seven attempts and topped it off with a single.

CHANGE OF PACE

While the football team rolled to a victory, the soccer team was less fortunate. The booters were defeated by Dal 2-0. In previous contests this season the team has beat UNB 3-2 and has lost to Mount Allison 3-1. The team will be aiming to finish in the black as they tackle St. F. X. and King's this weekend.

STILL ANOTHER CHANGE OF PACE

For those less athletic the A.A.A. has planned several strenuous events at the clambake including an egg catching contest and a beer drinking contest. These should prove who the real "athletes" are.

Since then the Huskies have successively set back Saint Dunstan's, UNB, Dalhousie, Mount Allison, and Acadia. All these games were shutouts for the Huskies.

The Saint Mary's team is small in numbers but their is a strong fighting spirit evident here. Once again they have been asked to double up on positions and work twice as hard to keep the team up near the top in the Conference standings. It now seems sure that the Huskies are headed for a second place finish in the A.F.C.

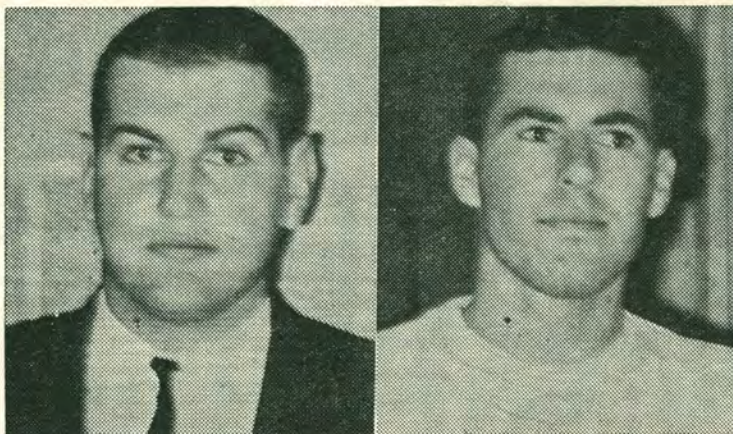
CO-CAPTAINS LEAVING

Among the three players graduating this spring are the team's Co-captains, Frank Arment and Jim Crane. The other senior is Leo Raftrey who has become one of the most effective runners on the squad.

Arment is an Arts student from Lee, Massachusetts. He has played on the Saint Mary's team for the past three years and has been voted the Block and Tackle Trophy as the outstanding lineman on the team for the past two years. He plays tackle on offense and end on defense. Frank has also distinguished himself as one of the fiercest runners in the Conference after his 48 yard touchdown sprint in Wolfville.

The other Co-captain, Jim Crane, is also an Arts student and he hails from Halifax, Nova Scotia. A veteran of service football, Jim has long been one of the most respected linemen in the Conference. He is competing for the fourth year on the Saint Mary's squad. In his off campus life, Jim works for the City of Halifax as a probation officer.

The third graduating student is Leo Raftrey, a Arts political science major from Dedham, Massachusetts. Leo came to Saint Mary's last year but injuries prevented him from reaching his full potential. He has progressed with the team however, this season and has led the squad in rushing for the past three games.
