ARCHIVES Student - Prof Romances?

The issue of student and faculty romantic relationships, and how it affects academic credibility is now being questioned at Saint Mary's.

In the January 4th issue of Frank Magazine, former Commerce Professor Bill Greer who died in November was named as being accused of sexually harassing a student, and having a relationship with her. The student claimed that this relationship resulted in the changing of her grade.

After the *Journal* did a feature story on victims of sexual harassment at local universities this past October, Frank also interviewed one of these students. Since no charges of harassment were laid, Greer's name was never released. It wasn't until his death that the magazine released his name. However, Frank's main point in their article challenged the question of whether or not, "SMU can tackle the question

of faculty-student fraternization."

Vice President Academic, Dr. Colin Dodds indicated that the university has no policy which opposes fraternization. Dodds

did say that "fraternization does stray into sexual harassment because you can get a situation where a professor seeks a relationship where the other party does not wish." He then

added that this issue can easily destroy the learning environment at any university and it will be a topic which "will be

Don't Worry, Be Healthy

Students at Saint Mary's can breath easy about food, now that an eating support group has been set up at Student Services. Lisa Andrewes of Student Services, and Shaughney Astin, Rice Residence Coordinator have started an eating support group for self identified students who feel they have a problem with food.

"The focus of the group is support and education around factors impacting the development and maintenance of eating disorders," explained Andrewes. She also wanted students to know that confidentiality is an important factor that will not be overlooked. "There's not going to be a big sign on the door saying *Eating Disorders*.. All the services here are completely confidential....Confidentiality will be stressed in the group as well," Andrewes said.

The eating support group has not yet started. However students who have problems with Anorexia or Bulimia are urged to phone or register in person at Student Services for the

group. Andrewes stressed that they're "not going to hope that the outcome will be that everyone will be cured."

For those students who feel they need more intensive counseling complete with nutritionist sessions, a new clinic called EDSA has just opened that deals exclusively with eating disorders. The main philosophy of the EDSA is "if one perceives food, eating and body image to be causing them distress, one deserves an immediate opportunity to examine those feelings and receive assistance in becoming comfortable with food, eating and body image." Laura Cutler-Matheson, Executive Director and Founder of EDSA is looking forward to beginning her six month sessions with victims of eating disorders. EDSA "is based on client demand. We can rise to client demand," she said. Doctor referrals are not necessary. EDSA is a privately funded organization, which means the client pays. The cost of the counselling is \$610.00 for a six month period, but it can be broken down to monthly and weekly fees. It's worth it,

though, Cutler-Matheson said. "Here your guaranteed that everyone knows what they're talking about. Your concerns will be taken seriously." The emphasis of EDSA is "to let go of that thin ideal. That thin person inside of you." Cutler-Matheson hopes that everyone who can will take advantage of

her eating disorder clinic. "...as a fellow eating disorder victim, I support you with my heart and soul."

EDSA is located at 6156 Quinpool Medical Centre Suite 201. Call 423-8085. Student Services is located on the fourth floor of the Student Centre

Society Parties Subsidized

Money for societies, was the main issue covered in the January 9th Student Representative Council (SRC) meeting.

Last semester many societies complained that they had to hold their events off-campus due to the high cost of Marriott catering; especially wine and cheese. The SRC passed a motion to provide a \$1000 dollar pool to help societies in the cost of campus events. Each society must apply for the subsidy, acceptance will be decided by SMUSA executive on a weekly basis. The societies need will be based on the financial situation of the society at that time,

and the budget for the year.

Kyle Langille, SMUSA President, proposed the motion because SMUSA "did not want to feel unresponsive to the problem." Langille thinks that the societies on campus "should have all the help in the world."

Langille has also been discussing a change in prices with Marriott, but has not had anything finalized as of the issue.

Saint Mary's Gets SHARP

SHARP (Sexual Harassment Assault Rape Prevention) is a women's self defense program new to Atlantic Canada and will be offered at the Tower starting Thursday January 20th. The program was developed in the United States two years ago by Pressure Point and Control Tactics Management Systems Incorporated. Instructor Dave Hunt is a 4th degree black belt in Uechi-Ryu Karate and former Sheriff's Officer and Correctional Officer with the Nova Scotia Department of Justice. Hunt is a certified defensive Tactics Instructor / trainer of PPCT management Systems Incorporated

and the only certified SHARP instructor east of Quebec. Hunt is also qualified to instruct de-

fensive tactics, impact weapon and spontaneous knife defense.

When asked how this program differed from other wom-

en's self defense programs Hunt responded: "The program differs from other women's self defense courses by using a number of nerve areas that (PPCT Inc.) have established in their research as specialized areas for striking with minimum power or technique and get effective results..."

Hunt also says that the program emphasizes safety and prevention as opposed to a heavy martial arts oriented program. The program is broken down into three units: prevention psychology, managing flirtatious contact, and sexual assault counter measures which offer a fresh perspective on the safety needs of today's woman. "this program

is not based on post rape statistics much like law enforcement programs (and is) not based on martial arts programs but on safety and awareness."

The program will run on January 20, 27 and February 3 from 6:30-9:30pm. The cost is \$50 for SMU students and \$60 for non-SMU Students which includes a student manual. For more information contact The Tower at 420-5555.

debated." Dodds spoke of one area where fraternization is more probable, the graduate programs. He stated, "At the graduate level there is more contact. While working on the thesis in a graduate program it is more one on one."

Dodds then went on to say that fraternization comes in two definitions. He said one is where a student communicates with a professor on a social basis whether it be coffee or just talking. The other deals

with students dating professors. On the same note Dodds included the fact that it may not only be a professor "infatuated with younger students...students could also hold an infatuation for the professor."

Whether or not the university should have a code of conduct regarding fraternization was also addressed by Dodds. He stated, "What some people might say is that we should have a code of conduct for faculty, and a code of conduct for students."

Sexual Harassment Officer, Jo Stern indicated that legislating any kind of policy which opposes fraternization would be difficult, she described the issue as, "something hard to control." She then went on to say that, "people will be human and act in different ways." Stern also said that the present sexual harassment policy in place is intended to guard against any behaviors becoming an inappropriate use of power.

Stern commented on whether academic credibility lies at stake in a student-faculty relationship by saying, "It is a problem if the student is in that professors class." She then added that fraternization is, "a recipe for danger, and in most instances one could be looking for trouble."

Head of Faculty Union, and Political Science Professor Dr.

Guy Chauvin indicated that the Canadian Association of University Teachers presently has a policy in place which opposes faculty from being involved in dating relationships with students.

When Chauvin was asked the question of what a faculty member should do when in a position of being romantically involved with a student he stated, "The union's position on this is that it goes against any such thing, but it is recommended that the faculty member remove him or herself from the position of power and authority."

"We have had faculty member who have married former students, both male and female." Chauvin went on to say that as far as he is aware none of the faculty dated the students while they were teaching. One particular member of faculty he spoke of actually asked a

student out the day the marks were released.

Students were also asked to comment. One student said "It's wrong for a student to date a professor while being in their class. Besides if any professor asked me out I would just laugh because they are twice my age."

Another student commented, "I've never heard of anyone falling in love with a teacher but if you're in a situation of where you actually have strong feelings for a professor and the professor feels the same way then the student should find a way to change classes...I feel it's a hard issue to keep control of, but what can you do when people are in love?"

After contacting well over ten universities across Canada and asking the Canadian Federation of Students if any schools have a policy opposing fraternization it was found that only two have started to move on pressing this issue.

Brock University's Dean of Student Affairs, Davis Jordan reported that they have a policy which indicates that if a professor undergoes a relationship with a student then they must declare to their chairperson or dean that there is a conflict of interest. Jordan also said that the professor must have the student's paper marked by someone else and still have the student remain in the class for lectures.

In addition, Ryerson is now in the process of looking into ways of solving problems regarding consensual relationships.

Currently in the United States the issue of fraternization is a growing debate since at least half a dozen universities over the last three years have implemented a policy which would cost a faculty member his or her job if caught in a relationship with a student.

Dating 101

It took the criticism of Frank Magazine, to bring the issue of fraternization at Saint Mary's to the forefront. In its January 4th edition, Frank published the name of Professor Bill Greer, who was accused of sexually harassing a female student. Although no charges were laid, a female student claimed that after having sexual relations with Greer he changed her marks. Frank challenged the university to "take a serious look at a subject that threatens its academic credibility," i.e., student-professor fraternization.

Fraternization, for those of you who don't own a dictionary, is a romantic relationship between a professor and his/her student. Believe it or not, student-professor relationships happen right here at SMU. You wouldn't know it, looking at our university policy, or should I say lack of policy on fraternization.

Currently fraternization is covered under the sexual harassment rule, this automatically assumes that the relationship is one of sex for grades. Not one of mutual consent.

Without written guidelines Saint Mary's is sending out the message that it doesn't see fraternization as being a problem. But they are wrong.

Students dating professors creates a dangerous situation. It can damage the university's reputation, the students academic career, and other students who may feel unfairly treated.

We all struggle to make decent grades. No one writes 20 page essays on Shakespeare's dog for the fun of it. How can a relationship that gives one student an advantage over all others be justified? The emotions involved in a romantic relationship are intense, and it is impossible for a professor to grade a student who they are dating fairly.

Class attention is also a factor. With large classes students are feeling more and more like a mere number. How would you feel if your professor could not even remember your name, when they constantly refer to the student sitting next to you as poopsie?

To be respected as a university Saint Mary's must create a policy that tells both its students and its peers that academic achievement on merit is taken seriously.

Colin Dodds, Vice-President of Academic Research has said that he is against student teacher dating. Since no policy has even been discussed until now, I have to wonder how long Dodds has felt this way. Dodds did not mention the punishment of professors and students dating either. Are these people currently punished? If a case ever comes up will the professor be slapped on the wrist, and the student considered to be innocent? Will Saint Mary's introduce a policy which will be clear and separate, not hiding under the vagueness of sexual harassment? Or is that too much to hope for at a university that is just starting to develop a sexual assault policy. Is Saint Mary's a leader of the future, or are we still in the dark ages?

material. Numerous reoccurring themes are the severe beatings of High school staff and the buffoon character.

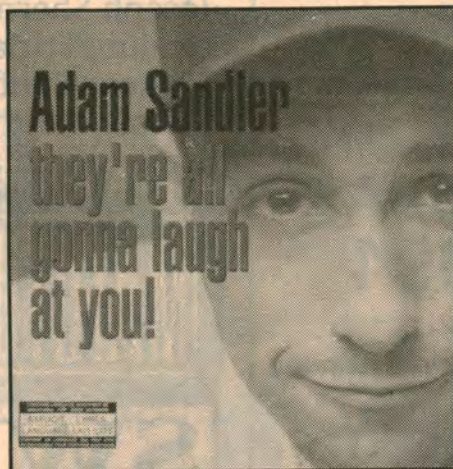
However in all fairness Sandler has tacked on disclaimer for the extreme beating segments... "Anyone disturbed by the severe beat-

Sykes Finds Rhodes To Success

David Sykes is beginning to make a name for himself, and it's not only on the football field. The fifth year Saint Mary's student, who is completing a combined Commerce and Arts degree, capped a stellar university career when he was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship last month. The scholarship, which is named after its benefactor, Cecil F. Rhodes, is awarded to only two Atlantic Canadian students each year.

Sykes, who will leave for England in the middle of this September, will study two years for a masters degree in Philosophy of Politics, with an option to stay for a third year to pursue a PhD in that same field of study — an option he plans on exercising.

When presented with the question of how this situation came to be, Sykes casually cites a conversation he had with a professor two years ago.

"One of my professors in the Political Science Department, who knew that I had pretty good marks and that I'd played football, suggested that I con-

sider applying," recalled Sykes. "I thought it was a long shot but decided to submit my application package this past year and, to my surprise I was accepted."

While he and his family were obviously elated, Sykes viewed this scholarship as being somewhat of a problem solver as well as being a wonderful opportunity.

"Before all of this happened I was considering law school or perhaps an MBA program some place," said Sykes. "At least now I know in my mind what I'm doing and don't have a big decision facing me."

In addition to having a perfect 4.0 grade point average, Sykes balances his studies with part time work for MacKenzie Foods and A.S.A.P. courier. Add to that an extensive volunteer resume, including work for Big Brothers of Halifax, the Alzheimer's Society, the Salvation Army, Nova Scotia Heart Fund, Nova Scotia Youth Football and of course quarterbacking the Saint Mary's football team, one would think that such a schedule could prove to be at times

rather taxing, but not so according to Sykes.

"It's really not as bad as many people think," noted Sykes. "If you learn how

to budget your time properly and accept the fact that you can't have fun all the time it makes it a lot easier to handle."

While Sykes is adamant that Saint Mary's reputation for being a school with poor academic standards is now a thing of the past, he does not refute the suggestion that his accomplishment will help to further erase this sentiment.

"I feel the reputation that was tagged on the school has long since begun to break down," said Sykes. "However, if my winning this scholarship helps to further dispel that notion then that's okay with me. When I think of the column that Jay Greenberg of the Toronto Sun wrote about the students here at Saint Mary's last year I do take a bit of satisfaction in the fact that it helps prove his statements false."

In fact, when reached at his desk at the Toronto Sun, Greenberg declined to comment on David Sykes winning a Rhodes Scholarship.

Sykes, who plans to return to Halifax upon his graduation from Oxford, does not dismiss the idea of entering politics at a later stage in his life.

"To narrow down what sort of political involvement I would be interested in would be premature at this stage of my life," commented Sykes. "When people hear the word 'politics' they automatically assume that you will run for of-

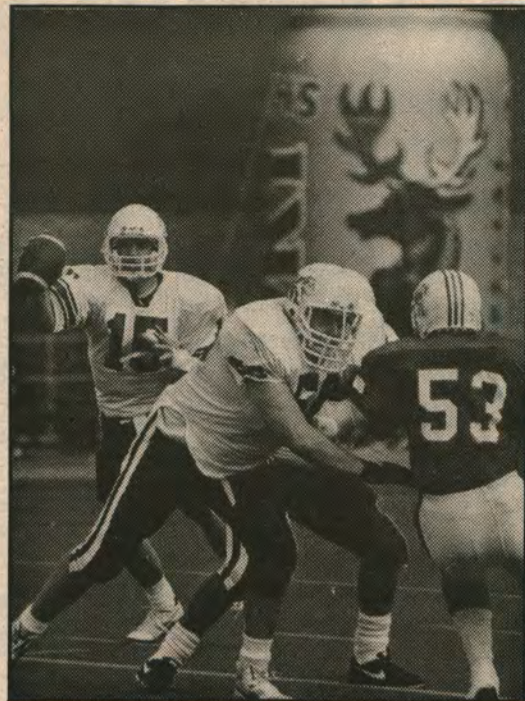
fice. With the program that I will be in at Oxford I'll be prepared for government administrative work within the civil service itself."

When one considers the hard work that this man has put into his schoolwork and other activities, it would seem safe to assume that the pressure is now behind him, but Sykes apparently sees it differently.

"I've been provided with a great opportunity and the ball is definitely in my court," said Sykes. "When you look at the people who have won Rhodes Scholarships in the past, Bill Clinton, Bob Rae and John Turner, it can be a little overwhelming and it makes me realize that I have to succeed more so now than ever."

Although Sykes' accolades have not earned him public recognition until recently, his family noted some impressive qualities emerging at a very young age.

"David always worked hard but it wasn't until grades five and six that he began to display leadership qualities both in



school and sports," recalled his father, James Sykes. "From that point on he became very active and responsible, especially during his junior high years."

That sentiment is underscored by Steve Sumarah, who, along with Sykes, works as an assistant coach for the Nova Scotia Under 19 Provincial Football Team. He attributes Sykes' success to his tireless work ethic.

"David's a hard working go-getter who puts 100% into everything," said Sumarah. "He just won't sit around waiting for something to happen, instead he's constantly preparing, trying to better his situation."

As Sykes looks back on his football career at Saint Mary's, he does so with the fondest of memories. From a kicker and second string receiver to an All-Canadian quarterback in only three years, this meteoric rise would appear to be satisfying but according to Sykes their still is a piece of the puzzle missing.

"When I look back at my first year I never would have predicted that things would go my way like this," stated the two time Russ Jackson award winner for combined excellence in athletics and academics. "However, for us to come so close to winning each year only to walk away empty handed, there is a feeling of frustration that goes with those memories."

Whether the memories are fond or frustrating, David Sykes certainly has left his mark on Saint Mary's. One only needs to consider the million dollar egos of today's professional athletes to fully appreciate the make-up of this man, and the work ethic that fuels his focused ambition. Throw in the fact that he is one of the nicer people one could ever hope to meet and the conclusion becomes rather simple. His future is limitless.

SMU tries for fourth consecutive tournament title...

SMU and Dal Battle At The Shoveller

The Huskies had a chance to make it four in a row. For three consecutive years, the Saint Mary's men's basketball team has earned the right to call themselves the champions of the Pepsi Rod Shoveller Memorial basketball tournament. Despite a slow start to the regular season sporting a 1-2 record, the injury plagued Huskies have arguably put together the best team in recent years.

As Dalhousie's men's basketball coach Bev Greenlaw describes, "Saint Mary's basketball team is extremely talented. They have depth, speed, athleticism and not many universities can produce two national program players as SMU has" (referring to Will Njoku and Richard Sullivan's stints with the national team this past year).

Neither the Dal or SMU squad would make an appearance in the finals of the tournament this year as they were both knocked off in the semi's. The two teams therefore met in the consolation game to decide third and fourth place though the fans didn't seem to mind. A big crowd showed up to see another chapter unfold in the never ending story of the Dal-SMU rivalry.

Saint Mary's reached the semi's by handing the McGill

Redmen their first loss of the tournament, whipping them by a score of 85-65. The Huskies were led by Will Njoku who tallied an impressive 25 points while hauling down 15 rebounds. Richard Sullivan went 3-5 from the three point line on the way to 13 pts. while Jeff Baltzer tallied eleven for SMU.

The Huskies hopes for another tournament title vanished though when the Ottawa Gee Gees skimmed by them in overtime by a score of 78-77. Their fate was sealed by a 12-foot jumper by Ottawa guard Bobby Brown with just eight seconds left in the extra frame. Njoku again led the Huskies with 24 points while Bill ("Will") Seaward added 17 points including two foul shots with 20 seconds left to send the game into overtime. Clarence Porter has 19 pts for the G's while David Reid added 17.

The Tigers beat the Toronto Varsity Blues 78-56, but lost to the Nova Scotia All-Stars 78-73. The All-Stars were paced by Charles Ikejani with a trio of threes and Steve Benton down the stretch. Their experience would give them the advantage over the younger squads as the All-Stars would go on to capture the title with a 95-79 win over the Gee Gees in the finals.

Before the championship game though, the Tigers and

Huskies would take to the court Sunday afternoon at the Dalplex. In their only regular season meeting this year, the Huskies thrashed the Tigers 89-62 with a 25 pt. performance from Center Will Njoku. But this game would be close. The Huskies were paced by Njoku with 13 points in the first half and led by seven points at the half (43-36). The game would remain close all through the second with about a dozen lead changes. However, with a two point Dalhousie lead and :51 seconds left on the clock, SMU turned the ball over and went on to lose by a score of 79-75.

The crucial turnover late in the game along with only two points from Will Njoku in the second half were significant in Dal's win. The women's basketball Huskies hosted their first Annual Cantel Huskies Invitational tournament from the 1st to the 3rd at the Tower to start off the new year. The invitational avoided the usual tournament style or elimination format and used the round robin play instead.

SMU coach Jill Healy was in charge of the tournament format and explained that "Ottawa doesn't want to play John Abbott or Carleton and we didn't want to play teams from our conference because we already meet in inner conference play". The round robin style allowed SMU to play three outer conference opponents which gives the young SMU squad the opportunity to test waters in other conferences.

Coming into the new year, the Huskies are fifth in AUA women's standings with two wins and two losses. Having played the least amount of

games in the conference the team is looking good. The two wins came over Axettes in a 51-42 win at Acadia and over the Dalhousie Tigers at home (68-56).
