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Marriott Or Marri-Not?

The increasing amount of concerns from students over Marriott's quality and service of food may lead to a surprise boycott, says Residence Representative, Trevor O'Brien.

"It was brought up by numerous students that they should boycott Marriott in order for their concerns to be addressed," says O'Brien.

He reads a statement that he received during one floor talk. "Does Marriott think that we are in jail and do not have a choice as to what we eat? O'Brien feels that this "is a pretty stern quote."

However, he stresses that a boycott will all depend following his meeting with the Manager of Marriott, Dalton Mather. "After I talk to Dalton, then I will go and talk with the students. I am sure if there is little done after I talk to Dalton then we could see students actually doing something." He also says that the students wouldn't give any hints to when the boycott would take place. "It would just happen one night when a lot of food is cooked and then it will all go to waste," says O'Brien.

Following 15 floor talks that he's conducted in residence, O'Brien indicates that, "only one out of 20 were satisfied with the quality." "The rest of the students felt they didn't get what they're paying for, and for me that means a lot of people."

He also says that one of the big concerns is pricing. "\$1.40 to a \$1.60 for a bottle of juice. The average meal is 8.50 to 9.00, that's eating until you're full. Seven days a week for 36 weeks adds up to a lot of money," he says. "I will back the students' no matter what. I just want the problem resolved. If Dalton has a solution, I am sure everyone is willing to listen," he says

Theft Prompts Rewrite

Professors in Accounting 241 are baffled how thieves obtained a copy of the examination prior to the test date, leaving them with no choice but to have over 200 students rewrite the examination.

However, there is a mixed feeling among those in all

sections of the course. Some students enjoy having a second chance at a test which they may in fact have failed, while others indicate that an added test to all their current workload is a disastrous thought.

One student, Ben Harris, is irate over the situation. "I am very pissed off at the whole thing," he says. "I have been working really hard... it took

According to Crowell, one student slid a draft copy of the exam under professor Jeff Power's door. A note attached indicated that copies had already made their way to the

Corporations Anger Prof

Ronald Colman questions the role advertisers play on campus.

In the wake of the Campus Fest advertising fair on September 29, he's been raising serious questions about the advisability of large

corporations advertising on campus.

Colman, professor of Political Science at Saint Mary's, addressed his concerns over this matter in a letter to Saint Mary's Chairman of the Senate. The letter raises several questions, including "the effect of the annual Bookstore

advertising fair on the educational and academic purpose and atmosphere of the university." Colman feels that, "the purpose of this place, the university, is to encourage students to question, probe, analyze; come to reasoned conclusions based on evidence. That's what we do here, whatever our field or whatever class we teach, that's why university exists." He points out that, "the purpose of advertising is to sell products, and if those products happen to

cause harm, then advertisers frequently conceal that," and that these two concepts would seem to be mutually exclusive.

President of the Saint Mary's University Students Association, Boris Mirtchev, disagrees, saying that he feels the university should provide both a positive academic and non-academic environment, and that Campus Fest helps to do that. He says that, "with regards to Campus Fest on

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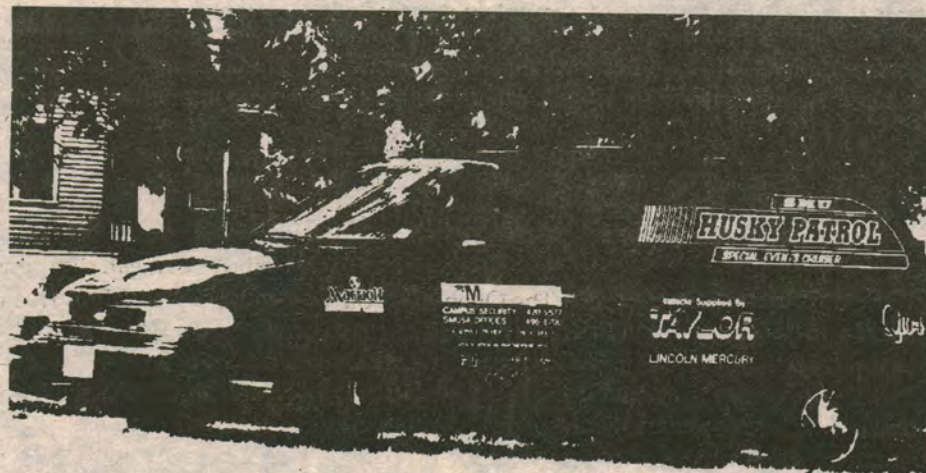
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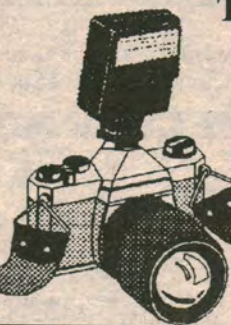

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Canada Survives

The separatists have ruffled the feathers of the federalists. A narrow margin of 50.6% for the No forces and 49.4% for the Yes had been a surprise for some, but for the most part, many had predicted a close call either way. However, the reason many predicted the No to squeak past the Yes was for a number of reasons. One being the fact that the undecided vote would eventually decide to vote No, and those who said they would vote Yes simply changed their minds at the last minute. Either way, Quebec is a province split down the middle on the issue of separation.

Only 15 years ago the same question was asked to Quebec. In that referendum it was 60% No and 40% Yes, a clear indication that the former Prime Minister, Pierre Elliot Trudeau, was a strong federalist stomping on the wings of separatists. Today, however, Prime Minister, Jean Chretien, jumped on the wagon a little too late, assuming a month earlier that there would undoubtedly be a sweeping No victory. Think again. It is clear in the minds of academics and

remembers how Canada voted against the Charlottetown Accord, which partly entailed Quebec's distinct society clause. Many Canadians woke up Tuesday morning with the feeling that no one had really won the referendum, it was just to close of a call, proving that the mood for separation in Quebec is split, and a mood that may continue to rise. Canada, for the time being, can only sit and wait to find out what will happen next. But what will happen? Some academics, interviewed on the CBC, indicated that by decentralizing the powers in Ottawa could ensure political and financial trouble for the nation. However, having Quebec separate would also spark controversy but with an even greater economic consequence for Canada, meaning that big businesses would leave Montreal, and the Natives, mainly the Cree Indians, would battle over land claims with the Quebecois.

The Response

Parti Quebecois Leader and Premier, Jacques Parizeau, blamed the loss to the "money and ethnic vote." He said, "We

send representatives from Halifax to Montreal for the No rally last Friday. Among them were five representatives from



advantage of the federalists' slim victory. As the Yes supporters waved their flags, he told them, "The Canadian problem remains whole.. there are those in Ottawa who think that they have an open field. They're wrong."

Chretien would tell the nation that Parizeau should put aside his political differences and help rebuild Canada. "The time has come to work together. The Quebec people want us to work together," said Chretien.

However, even though Chretien promised Quebec that Constitutional negotiations would be a better option than the province separating, he made no indication last Monday night to when that would take place.

Even Reform Party Leader, Preston Manning, said that in order for federalists to avoid a repeat of Monday nights close call or even a possible Yes defeat, talks should begin soon. "There is so much victory for the No as it is a reprieve - a reprieve that must be used wisely if Canada and Quebec are to avoid paralysis," said Manning.

SMUSA At The No Rally In Montreal

Liberal MP, Ron MacDonald, footed the bill to

the Saint Mary's University Students' Association (SMUA): Boris Mirtchev, Mike Cooze, Fraser Gould, Mark Chapman and Libby Biason. As many as 150,000 people from all across the country jammed the downtown core in a bid to convince Quebec that a united Canada is the only Canada, and that a vote for separation would mean dire consequences.

"This was a part of history that I was proud of," said Biason, who added that, "all those people in one spot was just amazing." However, Biason has some criticism towards the rally. "I went there like other Canadians and the whole thing was in French. I felt excluded from the speech. How can I belong to such a historical event when I can't even understand what the Prime Minister was saying? I don't speak French." She also said, "I left that rally thinking that it was a waste of money. I think they organized it in a wrong way. It was held in the wrong location and in the wrong city."

Biason however said that if

there was a Yes vote, it would have been an "excellent thing for Nova Scotia." She adds, "A Yes vote would be bad politically... but I am convinced that all of the head offices on the St. Lawrence Seaway will come to Nova Scotia and so will a least two military bases, a Yes could mean a boost in the economy." But for the most part, Biason has heard the enough about the issue of separation. "I

am tired of hearing that Quebec wants this and Quebec wants that, let them go, let them see what it's like on their own," she said.

Mirtchev felt that the rally in Montreal was a positive move for federalists to show their support for a united Canada. "It was great for the country as a whole. It did have an impact on the results. There was people there from all 10 provinces, and it provided for Canadian a sense of patriotism, that sent of nationalism that everyone is always looking for."

Cooze agreed with Mirtchev, and indicated that the rally was worthwhile. "When we got there I really felt the emotion and impact of the whole event that you wouldn't get while watching it on TV. The rally should have been held a lot earlier, it was just a last minute tactic by the government to keep Quebec as a part of Canada. No matter what, it was a worthwhile investment for the country regardless of the outcome," said Cooze.

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Peers: A Helping Hand

Saint Mary's University is a community, along with many others, with a movement of people giving a part of their time to help students. This is the motto the Student Peer Program follows.

A volunteer based group running with the main goal of "peer services being for

students to help other students to help themselves." They offer no absolute solutions, but help people to cope with any issue of possible concern students might have.

The group began as a bunch of Science students wanting to help their fellow first year students to adjust to life at university. It was originally called the Peer Counseling

Program. The Student Peer Program has since evolved to students "offering services and program to all students living both on and off campus.

Head of Promotions for the Student Peers, Chris Matheson, says that the peers deal with, "teaching students study skills and preparing them for a more successful career at Saint Mary's... the main goal is to

help the students to help themselves." He then says, "we will leave students with several options so that they can make their own decisions... we do a lot of referrals.

Matheson explains that the peers work with a choices program, which is a data base of 1500 job listings in Canada. Also, the program offers students a list of all the

universities and colleges in Canada.

The Peers offer workshops during Orientation Week to help first year students discover the realities of life in and outside of classes. They offer outreach programs, namely "Life at Saint Mary's." This group lasts 8-weeks and helps students in their adjustment to university.

In addition, Peer volunteers are involved in residence and through the group called "Student Peers Asking Real Questions About Sex (SPARQS)."

The group also offers a program for students with questions about their occupational future. Also offered are one-on-one Study Skills, Exam Preparation, a Student Peer Interview and Time Management workshops.

Presently, the Student Peers are busy setting up a student bursary fund. The money in this fund will come from a contest the Peers are currently hosting. The contest consists of who can design a logo for the society. According to Matheson, there will be prizes for the best suggested logo's.

The contest focuses on concept as opposed to artistic ability.

The Student Peer office is located on the 5th floor, Student Union Building.

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campus, I think the overall impression that I've had from students is that students enjoy Campus Fest when it comes to campus, that it provides for a positive non-academic environment."

The Campus Fest was sponsored by the Saint Mary's Bookstore, and Manager of the Bookstore, Don Harper, stresses that nothing is gained from providing this sponsorship. The sponsorship means that "we (the bookstore) are providing the opportunity for Campus Fest to come on campus and demonstrate these products," says Harper, who goes on to say that, "I am not personally promoting these things," but that the Bookstore is simply providing the opportunity for a service to be provided to the students.

Harper admits that the music was loud. "They were asked to turn it down, and they did. If we didn't want music, then they wouldn't play music. I guess I didn't realize how loud the music was, we didn't receive any complaints last year."

However, Colman argues that, "they [advertisers] can do whatever they want in a shopping mall or whatever, that's designed to sell products... I'm not against free speech, but for the university to sponsor it on this campus, I feel like I'm working here, this is my place of work, and it goes against the very purpose of what I'm doing."

Colman adds that, "hours of rock music blared through speakers directly outside the library interfered with students' study, with classes and with the work of teachers across campus." He feels that this is not the environment the university should be providing for students during class time.

Colman is also very concerned over General Motors (GM), one of the corporations advertising on campus: at the Fair, in the Student Union Building lobby, and in the Loyola Colonnade. He says that "GM makes nuclear missiles and exports arms to countries currently engaged in war and classified by Amnesty International as among the world's worst human rights

violators." He feels that this is the kind of information students should be made aware of so that they can make educated choices about what products to buy. "If you just have General Motors peddling its Visa card, with the university sponsoring General Motors to do that, I guarantee you that 99 percent of the students that sign up are unaware that General Motors is a major arms manufacturer."

Mirtchev takes the accusations brought against GM seriously, and feels that they should be looked into further. "Some of the accusations that are made here about GM were quite serious and maybe we should reconsider which advertisers come to campus in the future." He goes on to point out that although the accusation made against GM are serious, Saint Mary's has strong ties with GM and these might not be easy to break.

Harper feels that GM's weapons manufacturing has little to do with its visa card, saying that, "when I sponsored, when I said that yes, Market Fest can come on campus, I wasn't thinking in terms of GM being an arms producer. All I knew was that there would be a booth there for students to apply for a visa card."

"If a sponsor's going to come in and promote a visa card, a General Motors visa card, you can be sure that they're not going to say to the students that General Motors is a terrible company," he says, but adds that, "this is his [Dr. Colman's] opinion, his viewpoint as to just what role General Motors plays in the arms production of the world." He also says, "where do we draw the line, where do we say, 'no, you can't come on campus' or 'yes, you can come on campus?'" He continues to say that, "there's a difference between not liking a product and not allowing it to be advertised. There's freedom of speech, if a company wants to promote [it's product]," he feels that they should be allowed to do so.

This argument is not valid to Colman, who says that, "I don't have the money to hire someone like GM (does) for three days to sit there and give the alternative side of the story, so to try to use the free speech argument that way is balderdash."

A second promotion that Colman objects to is the distribution of perfume samples by Calvin Kline. He points out that the university has been attempting to educate students about the potential

harmful effects of perfumes to some students, and that passing out free samples of perfumes is counterproductive to this cause. "What message are we giving our students by promoting these products right outside the university health service?" he asks.

Mirtchev says that "he [Colman] does make a very good point with regards to perfumes and how some students could be sensitive to perfumes, and I think that could be a concern. I'm not too sure how many students could have a negative effect from perfumes," adding that this is an issue that should be looked into further.

Colman says that "most of the people I've talked to in positions of authority on campus don't really think it's an issue," and he is still waiting for any response to his concerns.

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Too Close To Call It A Victory

If anyone thinks that the referendum last Monday was a victory, then I suggest you think again. The 50.6 for the No side versus the 49.4 for the Yes, proves that the province of Quebec has come a long way in the past 15 years to have a split decision. In the 1980 referendum the No forces won with 60%, and the Yes side received only 40%. Look how much that has changed. Right now a province is divided right down the middle, meaning that solid ground can still be gained over the next year for another referendum, and that could lead to Quebec separation.

But not too many people were convinced at the beginning of October that the Yes forces would lead the race, or did anyone realize that the final vote would be a narrow margin of just under 1%. Think again. The people living in the province of Quebec are not satisfied with the powers of the federal government. The provincial party of Quebec, The Parti Quebecois, and the federal party, the Bloc Quebecois, are two elected parties that indicate the dissatisfaction of how the federalist operate. Former Prime Minister, Pierre Elliot Trudeau, in 1980, swayed Quebec to think otherwise, telling them that a revamped Patriated Canadian Constitution would have more to offer. Quebec believed Trudeau, and therefore followed his recommendation to keep Canada a country unified. However, not long after that, the province realized that Trudeau's right hand man, Jean Chretien, would negotiate the Constitution behind the back of the former Quebec Premier, Rene Levesque. Following the Patriation of Constitution against Quebec's will, Brian Mulroney promised more for the province, and in turn he was elected. Mulroney went through Meech Lake and the Charlottetown Accord, and found that Canadians wouldn't buy either deal. Meech Lake was done behind closed doors, and the Charlottetown Accord was left for the whole country to decide on vague and ambiguous clauses, which in a referendum in 1992 was defeated. Quebecers however remember why Bouchard resigned from politics in 1990. He has said time and time again that Mulroney went behind his back during the Meech Lake negotiations, the same thing Chretien was accused of, and the same thing federalists have been accused of time and time again. This is why the vote was so close. Chretien jumped on the train in the last minute, in a bid to save the country. Even the majority of Canada worried at the last minute. We take things for granted in this country, and for 150,000 people to pack the streets of Montreal three days before the vote is a sign that our country is apathetic. If we were all so patriotic and loved Quebec then why weren't we in Montreal a month ago, and why wasn't our Prime Minister there also? We're so united that some news reports that broadcasted from pubs across Canada following the event, had the football game on the television. That's patriotic isn't it.

Now we're in for a mess that's going to keep us busy for a while. Already, the politicians in Quebec have been working on the referendum for over a year, and little has been done in other areas on the political agenda. Also, there will be a new set of negotiations to change the constitution, and you can guarantee that if Quebec is asking for decentralized powers, then so will the other nine provinces. We had a hard enough time in making amendments in 1982 because of all the interest groups disagreeing what the changes should consist of. I can reassure you that the forecast for the next possible round will be similar. However, if there isn't a new round of negotiations then Quebec will be faced with another referendum. Bouchard indicated last Monday that another referendum will "come quicker than some think." So where does all this leave us? What will happen next? Will we become another extension of the United States? These are all the question that many are asking.

Even though the federalists will take the 50.6 as a victory while they repeatedly told the Yes forces that a similar figure wouldn't hold any weight, appears as a contradiction, only free bait for the Yes side to gain supporters. The more the No side sees the contradictions means more votes moving to the other side. Every vote is vital, and our government should have realized that earlier. For them to jump into the game at the last minute proves that something needs to be changed in Ottawa. Canada only became patriotic for a few days, and all the hype will die down until the next referendum. In saying this, I can only hope I am wrong. Instead, I hope our country learns a lesson to from all this, and that we have a very precious country to protect.

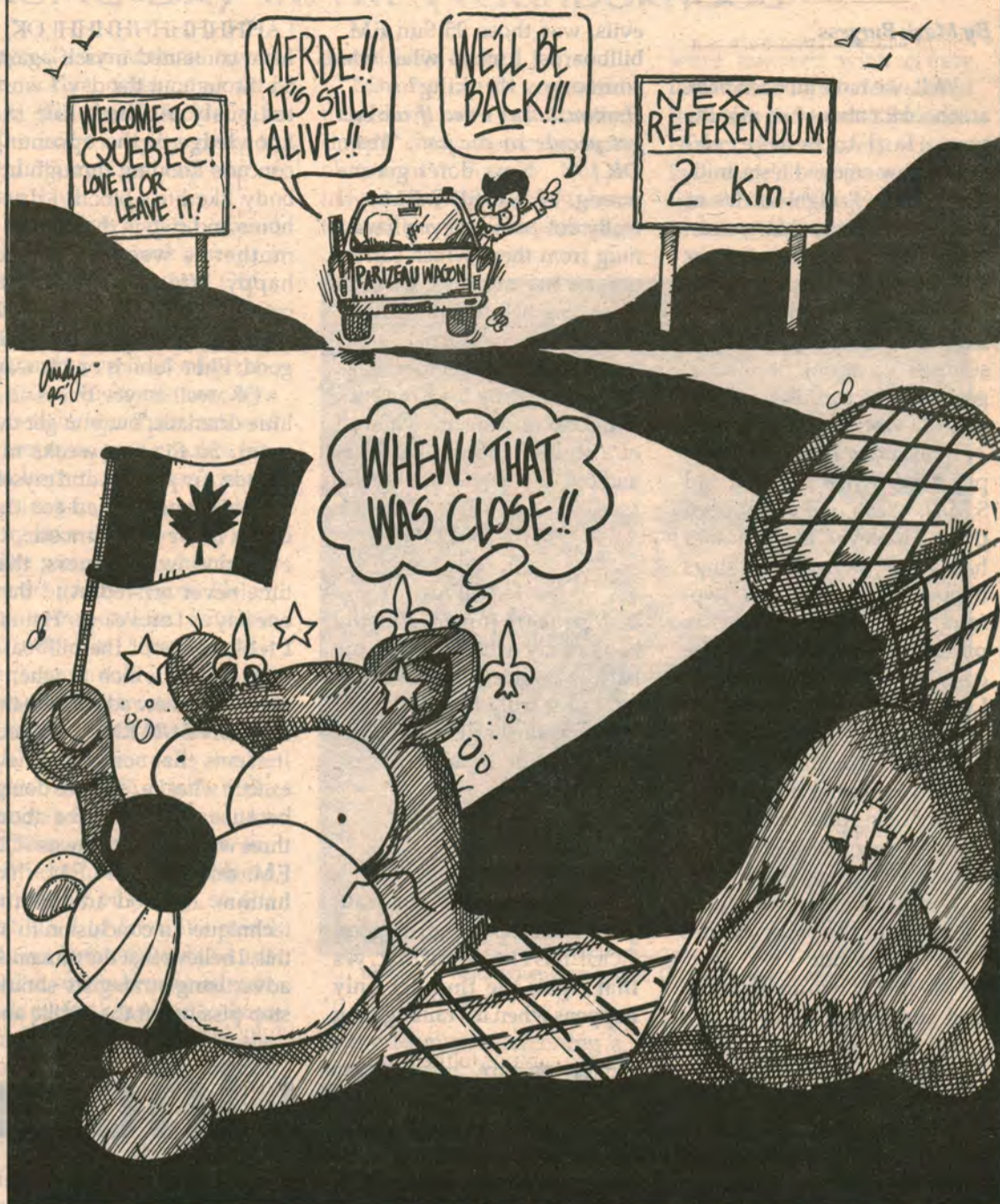

I must thank *The Journal* for addressing the current incident regarding the posters. However, much more needs to be done. Lesbian, gay, and bisexual young people face many stresses in their daily lives due to society's prejudice and lack of information including:

- * L/G/B young people are two to three times more likely to attempt suicide than are their heterosexual counterparts

- * L/G/B teenagers may comprise up to 30% of completed youth suicide annually

- * L/G/B young people face problems in accepting themselves due to the lack of accurate information about sexual orientation during adolescence

- * L/G/B young people face extreme physical and verbal abuse, rejection, and isolation from family and peers

- * L/G/B young people are more vulnerable than other young people to psychosocial problems including substance abuse chronic depression, school failure, early relationship conflict, being forced to leave their families, and having to survive on their own prematurely.

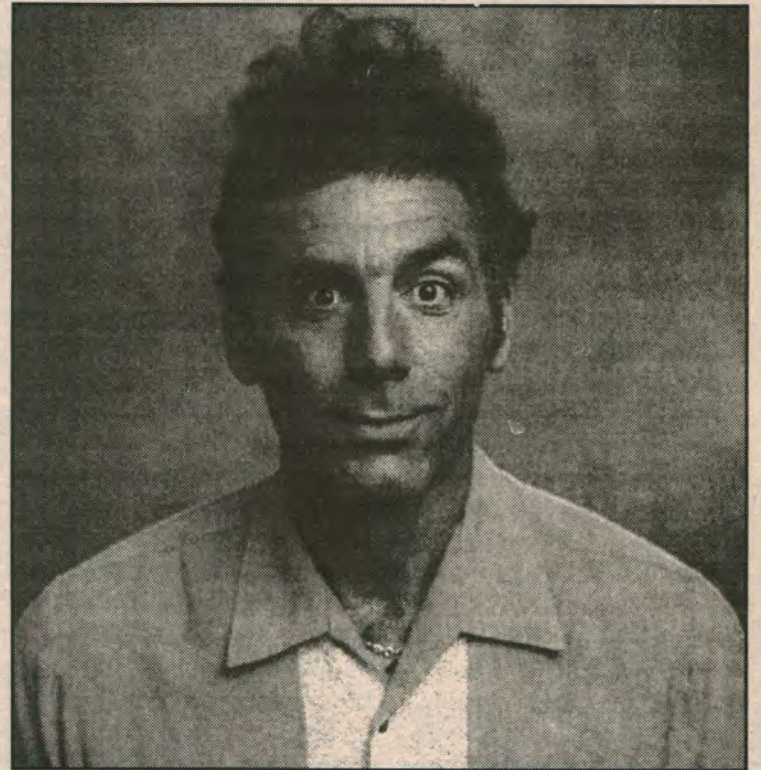
Jagger. I used to think, lay off the mother nature and acid guys, that chemical plant you call a body is really going to retaliate against you one of these days.

I'm forming a mental picture of what Cid's house looked like inside: dozens of dirty dishes in the kitchen, that

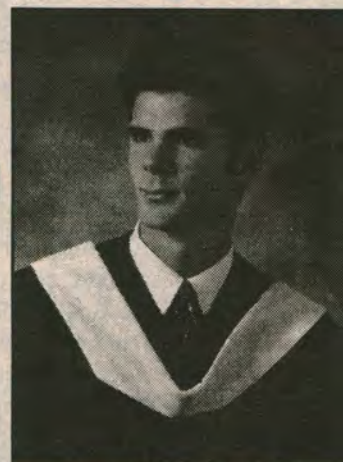

The Annual General Meeting of The Journal Publishing Society will be held November 8, 1995 1-3 p.m. in the Student Conference Centre, 3rd Floor, O'Donnell-Hennessey Student Centre.

The following resolutions will be put forward:

- (1) Amend 10. (a) to read:
The ordinary or annual general meeting of the Society shall be held within six months after the end of each fiscal year of the Society.
- (2) Amend 9. to read:
The fiscal year of the Society shall be the period from May 1 in any year to April 30 in the year next following.
- (3) Add 8.01:
An Executive Committee shall be created comprised of the following people:
An Editor, a News Editor, an Entertainment Editor (also known as Arts Editor or Arts and Entertainment Editor), a Graphics Editor, a Photo Editor, a Sports Editor, a Production Manager, a Business Manager, an Advertising Manager, and a General Manager.
- (4) Add 8.2:
Notwithstanding By-Law 32, the Executive Committee shall be responsible for determining the contents of The Journal publication.
- (5) Add 8.3:
The Executive Committee shall have the power to instruct and retain counsel on behalf of the Society and its Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may only override the Executive Committee's decision in this regard by Special Resolution approved by the membership at a special meeting called for that purpose.
- (6) Add 8.4:
Subject to By-Law 46, the General Manager and the Business Manager and the Editor jointly, or any two thereof, shall be authorized to open and operate the Society's bank accounts and sign all necessary documentation with the Society's bank(s) to give effect to this By-Law.
Notwithstanding the foregoing, no extraordinary payment or expenditure is authorized in excess of \$1000 without the approval of the Board of Directors.
- (7) Add 8.5:
The day to day or ordinary activities of the Society shall be vested in the Executive Committee, or their delegates, and shall be effected by a simple majority vote of the Executive Committee.
- (8) Amend By-Law 10 (b) by adding immediately after "members of the Society" in the last line thereof, the following wording:
An extraordinary general meeting shall be called by the directors if requisitioned in writing by the Executive Committee.
- (9) Delete By-Law 32 and replace it with the following:
The management of the activities of the Society shall be vested in the directors, except to the extent modified by these By-Laws and in particular By-Laws 8.1 to 8.5. In addition to the powers and authorities by these By-Laws or otherwise expressly conferred upon them, the Board may exercise all such powers and do all such acts and things as may be exercised or done by the Society in general meeting. In particular, the directors shall have the power to engage a co-ordinator and to determine his duties and responsibilities and his remuneration.
- (10) Add 32.1
No resolutions of an unusual or special nature, or considered to be disciplinary in intent, shall be passed without a 2/3 plus one majority vote of the membership of the Board of Directors.



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Dinner Is Best Served Hot

Last week I had the pleasure of conversing with East Coast Music Award winner, Bret Ryan, who has just released a mini CD (read E.P.), entitled *A Place At The Table*, an overture to a full length release scheduled for 1996. Our conversation, via the Alexander Graham Bell method, was inspiring and informative. He was pumped and proud about *A Place At The Table*, as well he should be, given that the album has been in the top 10 on C-100 for the past two weeks. Ryan asserted that "the beauty of the songs is they translate as well on acoustic guitar as they would with a full band." Of all the tracks Ryan seems to favor Michelangelo, Mona Lisa and Me, which Bret described as "a happy marriage between simplicity and witty lyrics." "It is the fictional account of what would happen if Michelangelo and Mona Lisa sat down and discussed the trials and tribulations of life and love." "Bret provided articulate and concise answers to my queries, foregoing any attempts to keep his rejoinders confined to the yes and no variety. Ryan jokingly stated that his musical philosophy is Keep It Simple Stupid, although he did add that such an approach must be accompanied by a certain degree of intelligence, the paradox of such a statement not lost on the erudite musician, whose intelligence is coupled with a sense of humor, and whose serious discussion of music is balanced with a hearty laugh when he is called upon to lighten the tone of the conversation. The 1991 East Coast Male Vocalist of the year says this effort finds him

returning to his roots, a departure from 1994's *The Babylon Mask*. "The thing I like about this album is it doesn't get caught up in itself and take it self too seriously." There's a lot of interesting things going on between the lines [in the songs], and you can read a number of different things [into them]." He describes the disc as Van Morrisonish, particularly the track *Through The Bottom Of A Glass*, which he deems interesting because "it's almost autobiographical." Given that Morrison is one of his principle influences, this is not a revelation, but rather serves as an insight into the direction the 33 year-old musician is taking with his music. He and collaborator Ron Foley have written lyrics which should be appreciated by those who prefer words of substance, not exclusively cerebral, but definitely having no semblance to the type of lyrics favored by many artists, whose radio friendly music is often devoid of lyrical originality. He tries to be original insofar as this is possible. The track *Michaelangelo, Mona Lisa and Me* is a reflection of this proclivity, the song not your standard offering by any means. Ryan possesses tremendous musical integrity, which he feels is an integral aspect of being a musician, otherwise he would not be content to continue. He is not interested in compromising such integrity for the sake of success, which he desires to achieve on his terms. The Halifax recording artist was adamant about his position on this issue. "I would never write a song for the sake of getting on the radio."



I managed to cull some extremely candid commentary from the prolific songwriter. Ryan wants to eventually broaden his appeal." Ideally I would like to get on a bill with someone and tour cross-country." The fifteen year veteran would love to tour with Jann Arden, Spirit of the West, and Crash Test Dummies. When I inquired as to whether he sought Stateside recognition, Bret revealed that "American

tourists [visiting Nova Scotia] said I would do well in the New England area. I've had some interest from record companies in L.A." When I commented on Canadian talent, he was quick to bestow accolades upon his peers. "I think per capita Canada has one of the most musically rich and diverse [collection of musicians], even in Atlantic Canada alone."

As of late he has been listening to the Waterboys,

although he conceded that World Party was getting its share of playing time at home. Ryan revealed that his grandfather had been a fiddler, but that he [Bret] had only recently come to appreciate traditional music. Although he enjoys the Celtic rock genre, he has no inclination to record a song of that ilk, convinced that it is best left in the hands of those who are presently performing such material, musicians who would "probably feel insulted" if he chose to pursue that musical avenue. However, he maintained that there was certain elements of traditional music present in his own sound, not to the extent of a Rollins Cross, but nonetheless existing in some form or another.

In regards to his live show, Bret Ryan has no intention of turning the gig into an excuse to "pontificate my views about life." He wants the atmosphere to be positive and not have any semblance to a lecture. Ryan feels that "the University crowd is my strongest market," and he hopes to eventually tour campus venues, although radio tours are taking precedence at present in terms of planning. I had a great time talking to Bret, and felt he had a lot to offer in terms of musical as well as personal philosophy.

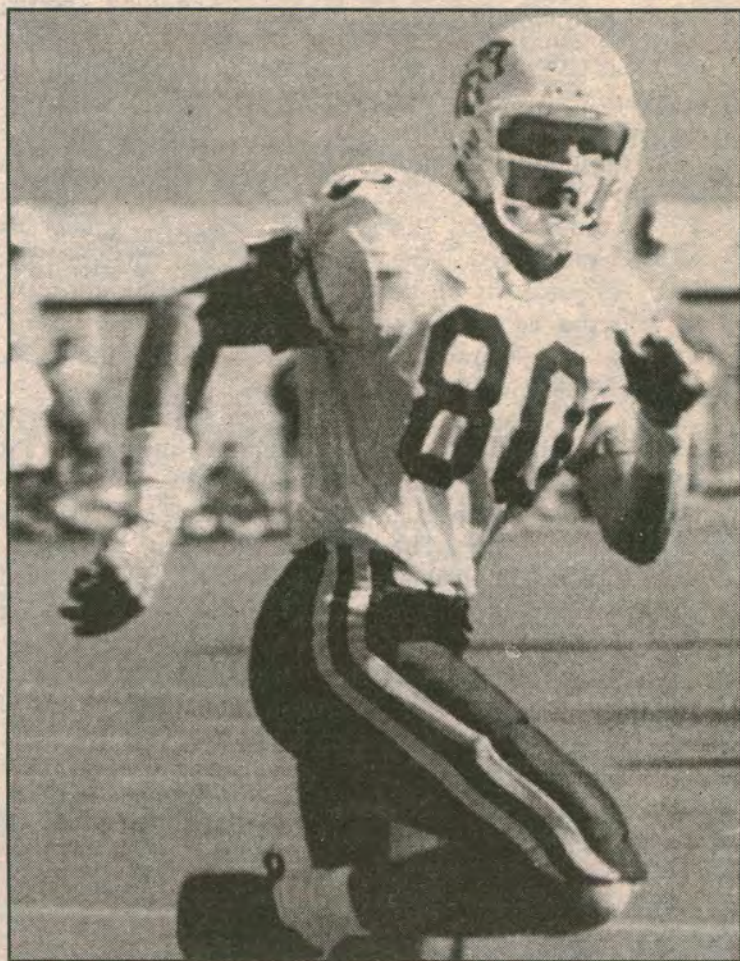
Slotback Mike Messam made some outstanding grabs in the dying seconds to keep the final Huskies drive going.
