

A Comment on the Formal Proceedings Against Peter March

Philosophy professor Peter March caused much outrage and hurt among Muslims and others at Saint Mary's University last February when he posted on his office door the notorious twelve cartoons originally published in the Danish journal Jyllands-Posten. These cartoons had sparked protests and, in some Muslim nations, even riots. Many people contend that one or another of them insults Islam or Muslims or Muhammad

In late March, upset students at Saint Mary's filed a formal complaint against Dr March. A Harassment and Discrimination Hearing Committee was struck to determine whether Dr March had harassed the complainants, either by posting the cartoons or in things he said or did in the days following. The matter has not yet been settled. If the Committee determines that he did harass the students, Dr March might, in the end, be reprimanded by the university.

No doubt the students were hurt and upset. But should they have brought this complaint? No, they should not have done so. No one should have sought to have Dr March officially sanctioned for his gesture or for anything he said or did following it, no matter how hurt or upset they were. Bringing a formal complaint against Dr March is entirely contrary to the life and ideals of a university.

I say this without proposing that the cartoons are less bad than the complainants think they are. Let us suppose that the cartoons are indeed deeply offensive and that Muslims at Saint Mary's were right to feel insulted either by Dr March's gesture or by what he said in defending his posting of them. Still, no one should have filed a formal complaint against him.

A liberal arts university, the sort of university Saint Mary's aspires to be, is a place devoted to the life of the mind. Our passion here is to understand and appreciate the world and to seek to reform the world in light of that understanding and appreciation.

As intellectuals, we desire to be free to think and to say whatever we want to whomever we want, and to listen to whatever or to whomever we want. We want to be able to see for ourselves what is true and what is right. Crucially, we want to live in light of the true or the right because it is the true or the right, and not because an authority requires that we do. That is one of our core characteristics. Now some ideas or manners of presenting them are disturbing or offensive, of course, but in living the life of the mind we want them discredited and abandoned, not suppressed. To bring suit against a person for expressing ideas, or even for advocating them, is, though, to ask an authority to rule those ideas out of bounds and, thereby, to suppress them. And that is to seek to deny us our ability to judge things for ourselves and to reject what is rotten on our own grounds.

No one who cares for the life or ideals of a liberal arts university, then, could properly seek to have Dr March silenced or punished for posting offensive cartoons or making offensive remarks.

Those offended by Dr March's gesture, and those who sympathize with those offended, are entirely right to express their feelings however they see fit so long as they seek neither to silence nor to punish others. They can and should march or speak out or post cartoons of their own. Of course, to the degree to which they live the life of the mind, they will be concerned to explain in what the offensiveness of the cartoons consists and to justify their contention that Dr March ought not have posted the cartoons or said what he did. To criticise, with arguments, and with concern for objections to one's arguments, is just what it is to live the life of the university.

The students who initiated proceedings against Dr March, since they have chosen to be university students, aspire to live the life of the mind. But they are novices in that life, and they do not fully understand its nature or rigours. They are pookies, and we expect them to

make rookie mistakes. Students need to be guided into the life of the mind by those already well acquainted with it. One sad fact of the Peter March affair at Saint Mary's University is that students seeking to become intellectuals received very little sound guidance from their professors or the university's administrators. Professors and administrators should have shown them how to respond properly, as competent and committed intellectuals, to insults and to offensive ideas. When the students first conceived the project to proceed formally against Dr March, professors close to these students, or the Dean of Arts, or the Vice President Academic, or, after the others had failed, the President himself, should have sat down with them and calmly explained how what they were contemplating was entirely inconsistent with their own aspirations to be intellectuals and to live the life of the mind. But no university veterans sat down with them. They were terribly ill served by our institution's

Is nothing more important to you than the life of the mind? I hear my critic asking. Is a person not to be silenced or sanctioned no matter how much harm their actions cause?

I can imagine cases, even at a university, in which it's better, all things considered, to silence or to sanction than not to, though I have to strain to do so. Such cases must clearly and directly put life or limb or property at risk, and silencing or sanctioning must be the only effective counter-measure available. Certainly posting cartoons on a door is no such case. Nor would disparaging a religion, its practitioners, or its founder, no matter how savagely, count as such a case.

I've assumed, for the sake of argument, that Dr March's gesture was in fact offensive and insulting and that people were right to be hurt by it and angry over it. I've shown, I believe, that even if Dr March's gesture was an abuse of free speech, still, no one should have sought to punish him for it. But was his gesture actually offensive or insulting? No, it wasn't, not least so far as I can see None of the cartoons counts as other than fair editorial comment on world events or culture or politics, no matter how wrong-

Perhaps to begin to repair the damage to their development as intellectuals, and to begin to repair the damage to Saint Mary's, the students who filed the com-

plaint of harassment against Dr March could explain fully, with argument, and with concern for objections just how Dr March's behaviour was obnoxious, abusive, or otherwise vile. How did posting the cartoons, or speaking against Islam or Muslims or Muhammad, if that is what Dr March did, harass anyone? To attempt to explain these things publicly would be to return to living the life of the mind.

HIGHWAY ROBBERY ON PHOTOCOPIED TEXTBOOKS?

Students registered in a fourth year class were surprised to hear that they wouldn't need to wait in those long bookstore lines to purchase their required textbooks.

Instead, their professor would be conveniently selling photocopied versions of the required books directly from his office for the price of \$105.

At first glance that seemed to be a fair price for two textbooks. After some investigating, new evidence came to light.

The two books this professor was selling from his office retail for \$50 and \$16.95 respectively, and with the standard bookstore markup of 20 percent, that would come to a cost of about \$80 per student.

However, the professor was selling copies of the books for \$105.

This professor decided to bypass the bookstore entirely and sell his books independently.

He used the Document Source, our on campus copy centre used by most departments, for all his photocopying needs. To ensure he didn't get caught photocopying entire textbooks, he copied them

chapter by chapter at different

It cost this professor approximately \$27.00 to photocopy both textbooks which in a class of about 41 students totals \$1090.

At the price this professor is charging each student he is potentially pocketing \$3215 in profit at the expense of hard working students.

There is no resale value to students for these books and he neglected to issue receipts.

Although this professor owns the rights to both textbooks and it's not illegal to price his own work as he sees fit, some would consider his markup to be gauging students.

Fortunately, university administration recently intervened, and the professor is to refund students money and order a textbook from the bookstore.

While students in this class may be inconvenienced by the switching of textbooks after two weeks hopefully they appreciate that regulations must be followed and that there was a serious possibility this professor was ripping students off.


EDUCATION MATTERS

Hundreds of students attended the Education Day barbecue last Wednesday, organized by the Saint Mary's University Students' Association (SMUSA).

SMU President Dr. J. Colin Dodds, SMU political science professor and MLA for Halifax-Citadel Dr. Leonard Preyra, who is also a political science professor at SMU, and SMUSA President Zach Churchill spoke at the event.

The event was held in universities across the Maritimes, in order to raise awareness about the rising costs of post secondary education.

SMU Students Urge Province to Build a 'Made in Nova Scotia' Solution

In response to the NDP's call to the Province to allocate federal funding toward student financial aid and lowering tuition fees, students at Saint Mary's University are urging the Provincial Government to create a 'made in Nova Scotia' plan to address the issue of accessibility to post-secondary education in the province.

"I agree that our provincial government must address the issue of accessibility in this province," said Zach Churchill, President of the Saint Mary's University Students' Association (SMUSA) and Vice Chair of the Alliance of Nova Scotia Student Associations (ANSSA). "But, students in this province can't afford to wait for aid while the Province and the Federal Government continue to hash out their differences. We've seen this 'wait and see' approach for far too long; waiting around for the Feds to do something. It's time for our Provincial Government to step up and re-invest in our own postsecondary education system."

SMUSA is urging the Provincial Government to create a provincially funded bursary program for students in financial need.

"Post-secondary education in Nova Scotia is the least affordable in North America, and we are the only province in Canada that doesn't have a provincially funded bursary program for students in financial need. It's time for our government to create a made in Nova Scotia plan for Nova Scotians," concluded Churchill.

DAWSON COLLEGE MONTREAL SHOOTING

On September 13, 2006, 25 year old Kimveer Gill, dressed in black, invaded the campus of Dawson College in Montreal, carrying three firearms. Gill did not attend Dawson College, and his reason for selecting this particular institution is unknown.

He is believed to have shot at least one person outside before entering the school's southwest entrance. Once inside the building, the shooter randomly fired shots in the building's atrium.

An 18 year old female was killed, and nineteen others (aged 17 to 48 years old) were injured in the shooting rampage. Gill was then killed during a shootout with police who arrived at the college just minutes after the shooting began in response to a call on a different issue.

Gill's blog and the websites he visited became a major part of the police (and media) investigation. His blog contained statements such as, "Metal and Goth kick ass. Life is like a video game, you gotta die sometime," and "You will come to know him as the Angel of Death".

Four victims remain in critical condition (with one in a coma), and four others in stable condition at Montreal General Hospital (as at September 15, 2006).

ASSESSMENT OF SECURITY AT SAINT MARY'S

University campuses are open and accessible to everyone, yet at Saint Mary's, campus security guards are rarely seen.

Upon questionning students in campus hot spots such as the Loyola Colonnade, Loyola 2nd floor computer labs, and the Student Centre over a period of two days, none of the students were able to recall having ever seen a campus security guard (residence security guards were spotted more frequently.)

Some called for more campus security – not just (hu)man power, but the introdction of new technology (e.g. metal detectors at the entrances).

The debate that arises is whether or not we really want our university to look and function like a prison, or feel like we are entering an airport every time we enter a university building."

NO SATISFACTION FOR TRAFFIC

THIS CONCERT WEEKEND

If you happen to see the Halifax Common five days before the Rolling Stones concert you'll notice the area already looks like a cross between a circus and an industrial site, littered with tents and trucks. The communal outdoor location might look bad now but as the day of the concert draws closer things are only going to get worse.

The city of Halifax's website has laid out much of the need to know facts about changes to the streets around the Common. Here are some important things to keep in mind:

- North Park Street is already closed southbound in order to allow crews to begin set up for the big day.
- Beginning 12 am Saturday morning all streets surrounding the Common will be closed. These closures will remain in effect until 6 am Sunday. Rainnie Drive and Gottingen Street will also be closed to accommodate the crowd. Sidewalks in this area will remain open.
- On Saturday there will be no parking on the majority of area on the following streets; North, Barrington, Hollis, Spring Garden, Oxford, Robie, Quinpool, Cogswell, Ahern, Rainnie,

Trollope, and Sackville.

- Four bus shuttles will be put into service Saturday to get concertgoers close to, but not directly to, the Common. Each shuttle will drop off passengers within a ten to fifteen minute walk to the show. The Blue shuttle will run from the South Centre Mall, the Orange shuttle from the Portland Hills terminal, the Green shuttle from Lacewood terminal, and the Red shuttle Sackville terminal.
- An extra ferry will be running to deal with foot traffic from Dartmouth.
- Expect bus routes to be altered to deal with street closures and the influx of traffic. As of now Metro Transit has little information available as to what may be going on in respect to normal routes. In order to avoid confusion on Saturday keep your eyes peeled on the Metro Transit website or call their service line 490-4000.

Right now the HRM is making no promises as to when the Common will be restored to full working order but they do state that they have "several plans in place to address the rehabilitation of turf and structures."

EAST COAST PUB CRAWLS: WORKS HARD SO YOU CAN PARTY HARD

Do you like socializing, partying, or drinking? If you answered, "yes!" to any one of these, then chances are that you have been (or will be) on a pub-crawl. Now, imagine enjoying pub-crawls so much that you decide to start a business dedicated to organizing them and other social events. For Brad Steeves, a fellow Marketing major here at SMU, he did exactly that. I had the opportunity to sit down with Mr. Steeves, the founder of East Coast Pub Crawls, and discuss his unique business idea, the unexpected demand for his services, and the excitement of being an entrepreneur.

"I worked for Molson for 2 years as a campus rep, but because I couldn't advertise on campus, I organized pub crawls to promote them. After a while students came to me to organize their own pub-crawls and other events, so I started this business last January and from there, it just took off". East Coast Pub Crawls operates in both Moncton and Halifax, but is expanding to the Fredericton market within the next few months.

It may seem intimidating for a University student to get involved with (what seems like) such a competitive market, but when I asked what differentiates East Coast Pub Crawls from other businesses Mr. Steeves responds, "You know, I don't have that much competition". As a result of this, his business has gained a word-of-mouth buzz, and he has organized events for students as SMU, Acadia, Dalhousie, and for innumerable businesses, not-for-profit organizations, and individuals who want to celebrate a special day with their friends. He's even organized events for Sobeys, Superstore, and Law firms.

A common thread found in most entrepreneurial stories is that the entrepreneur knew from a very young age that they did not want to work for anyone else. When asked why he decided to become an entrepreneur, Mr. Steeves responds, "It's in my blood. When I was little, probably

around 6 years old, I took some pots from my garage and I dug up my mothers plants and sold them to our neighbors".

Like any successful entrepreneur, Mr. Steeves prepared thoroughly before officially launching his business. "I had the name registered, and put together a marketing plan with cash flows to see what my costs were". Now that he is actively implementing his marketing plan, he describes the key tactics that are working for him, "On every pub-crawl shirt I put the URL address of the company - anyone who goes on the pub crawl will see it and the participants keep the shirts [so it serves as both a souvenir and advertising]". EAST COAST PUB CRAWLS The Best Night You'll Never Remember!

OF PRIVACY, PETITIONERS PLEAD

Facebook, a popular social networking website among university students, has announced that anyone with a valid email address will be able to create an account. Over 500 regional networks will be made available world-wide

When the site went online in 2004, users were required to have a valid university email address to register. Facebook has since allowed high school students and selected work networks to join.

For many, Facebook's exclusivity was part of the appeal, which distinguished it from other networking sites such as Myspace and Hi5, where virtually anyone can join. "[Students'] private information will now be accessible to private companies, marketing firms, parents, etc.," said Saint Mary's student Laura Simms.

Facebook first gained popularity among university students in the US. Founder Mark

Zuckerberg, a former Harvard student, initially launched the program on his campus in February 2004. Students North of the border quickly embraced the website when Canadian universities were included

The program has continued to increase the breadth of personal information users can share. American members can even choose which political candidates they plan on supporting in the 2006 US congressional and gubernatorial elections.

PRIVACY IN PUBLIC

Facebook had originally planned to add the new regional networks last week. The California-based company reneged on the launch because of the unexpected backlash it received from users over other site changes made two weeks ago.

Over 500,000 members in the 9.3-million-user network protested the addition of the 'News Feed' and 'Mini Feed' features by signing an online petition. The new features inform all users in a network of the recent updates to others' sites. Users no longer have to click on individual profiles to find out what groups the members of their network have joined, who they've been talking to, who they've recently befriended, what they had for breakfast, etc.

Facebook apologized to users and added some privacy features to give them some control over the information others can see. Zuckerberg posted a letter of explanation on the site.

Disgruntled users posted rants on various Facebook communities, which included the "Students Against Facebook News Feed" group. Many expressed concern over the intrusive nature of the new features. Senior environmental studies student Kelley Farrar believes that "people should put the onus on themselves to be responsible for what they put on the Internet. People should be more cautious."

No new date has been given for the proposed Facebook expansion.

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
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SPOILED AND BOOK-SMART VS. THE REAL-WORLD AND EXPERIENCE



You can't handle the truth," soberly spits out Lieutenant Colonal Jessep at his examiner, as if it were a matter of fact. Hrm, did I just begin a review of A Few Good Men with "you can't handle the truth?" Please allow me to explain. It is worth mentioning, because actor Nigel Bennett (Legends of the Fall, The Skulls) nailed that line, nailed his part, nailed every person in the room to the seats.

In a perfect world, the Neptune Theatre would be putting Famous Players out of business.

Broadway actor Adam Brazer stars opposite Bennett as a young lawyer given the order to defend two Marines accused of murdering a colleague in Guantanamo Bay. Based on a true story, playwright Aaron Sorkin's A Few Good Men has appeared on Broadway and was made into a feature length film in 1992.

His play explores the moral struggles of soldiers, lawyers, of those who must sometimes carry out orders they do not wish to follow, or fight for causes they do not endorse. As the story unfolds, those

who break the law, and those who break the chains of command to uphold it, face their respective fates.

Director Ted Dykstra's careful attention to detail does not go unnoticed. The minimal use of stage props permitted seamless scene changes, adding to the actors' sense of urgency. Dykstra also directed Neptune Theatre's To Kill A Mockingbird and The Diary of Anne Frank.

The talented supporting cast played an eclectic bunch of military types; the loyal Marines, the hardnosed, the neurotic, and the bumbling idiots help to paint a believable picture of the military hierarchy and bureaucracy. The roster included Kristin Bell, Lee J. Campbell, Réjean J. Cournoyer, André Haines, and Geoff McBride.

The crew included award winning lighting and costume designers who added volumes to the play's poignant imagery and authenticity. Standing ovation well deserved.

Performances will continue until October 8th, 2006 at the Neptune Theatre, on the corner of Argyle and Sackville.

Clocking in at roughly 11 minutes per episode, Robot Chicken is probably one of the most entertaining, non-chemical ways to decimate your attention span.





Ask second year SMU anthropology student Siddhartha Fraser why his film production company is named Lucky Dragon Pictures, and he will no doubt begin to speak of the importance of Japanese film and its strong influence on Hollywood motion pictures.

The Annapolis Valley native cites a few examples, concluding with the fact that George Lucas' Star Wars borrowed heavily from the late Japanese director Akira Kurosawa's Hidden Fortress (1958).

While Fraser is adept at spitting out film trivia, he is also a talented writer/director.

Fraser's film Butterflies, which he co-directed with David Middleton, is an entry in this year's Atlantic Film Festival.

"Last year I entered a short film called Kona. We shot on 35mm. It was an homage to Kuwosaka."

This year's entry cost Fraser \$100 to produce. Most of the budget was spent on cab fares to move equipment and food.

"We had about three weeks of preparation for a one-day shoot. It's a story that's been done a thousand times. It's nothing new. Every time it's done, it's written to death.

We wanted to put a bit more depth to it. We set up the story for the actors, told them the plot, and they filled in the rest. We went through a dozen rehearsals and they improv'd. We shot it all in one day," said Fraser.

The film began as an experiment, "trying to put a new spin on something that had been done to death," said Fraser. "We tried to bring a dead horse back to life."

Fraser began writing short and feature length scripts five years ago, and has shot many short films in and around Halifax.

Fraser has also used his skills in the classroom. For one class, he created a documentary on Mongolia, in which he interviews a Mongolian student and a Canadian geologist that had worked in Mongolia. "I showed two sides of what's been happening in Mongolia since the collapse of the communist system, and the introduction of the free market economy," said Fraser.





The Saint Mary's Huskies soccer teams were on the road this week, taking a trip to Cape Breton to visit the Capers in a doubleheader on Saturday afternoon.

The girls were up first, and although UCCB got on the scoresheet first, the Huskies were still playing well and were eventually due to get a goal. That score came from Katie Little, tallying her first goal of the season from a scramble in the penalty area to knot the score at one. The first half was played evenly. and deserved the 1-1 draw. The second half was a different story, with SMU looking flat and fatigued, and the Capers took full advantage, scoring four goals in the second period to put the game out of reach for SMU. The Huskies suffered another knock within the first 15 minutes of the contest when they lost Jamie MacInnis to a knee injury. SMU also lost central midfielder Jimmy Kennedy to two yellow cards. resulting in his sending-off. Despite this, despite all this, the Huskies still managed to grab a 2-2 draw on the road against the pesky Capers, thanks to excellent goalkeeping by Steve Paiano and goals from John Johansson and Hugh Mosher, who notched his third of the season from a long-distance effort. While keeping their record clear of losses, the Huskies need to start stringing together some wins soon, to build momentum for the playoffs.




The next game saw the newly formed SMU Divison 2 try to join the first team at 2-0 for the



The Acadia Axmen defeated the Huskies by a score of 30-28 in front of 3,522 fans at Husky Stadium this past week. The Huskies are off to their worst start since 1995, and things are not going to get any easier when they face the nationally 3rd ranked Montreal Carabins this Saturday (September 23rd).

The game started off as a classic shootout, with both teams scoring within the first five minutes of game time. However, after Acadia scored their first touchdown, they were immediately given the ball back after Aaron Racioppa fumbled a kickoff return.

Chris Judd, Acadia quarterback, hooked up with his main man Ivan Burungi for a 26 yard score. With the touchdown Burungi tied the record for most touchdowns (25) in a AUS career, a mark previously held by former SMU receiver Matt Nealon.

Both teams then exchanged field goals to make the score 17-10 for Acadia. SMU QB Billy Robinson was picked off by Jesse Ingalls towards the end of the second half, which led to Judd throwing his second TD pass to Anthony Hayes. Before the quarter closed, Acadia hit another field goal to make the score 27-10.

The game, at this point, had the makings of a blow out. Chris Judd picked on the Saint Mary's defensive backs and it seemed that the trend would continue into the second half. This was not the case, however, and after a quick field goal by SMU and a subsequent turnover by Acadia, Saint Mary's running back Jacques-Olivier Lumbala rumbled into the endzone to make it 27-20 for Acadia. The Huskies were able to hold the Acadia offense in check and

when SMU got the ball back again, Robinson threw a 52 yard bomb to David Swasey, tying the game at 27-27 hading into the final quarter of action.

Then, as the fourth quarter just got underway, the unthinkable happened. With SMU beginning a drive on their own 16yd line, A botched snap by SMU's center caused the ball to sail into the St. Mary's endzone, leading to a safety and making the score 29-27 Acadia

This seemed to put a damper on the momentum from SMU's flurry of offense from the 3rd quarter and as they tried their best to orchestrate a rally, Billy could not get the boys back in the endzone. He kept going for the deep ball, but Acadia was there to contest every pass. SMU did manage to get within field goal range within a minute of the final buzzer, but the last ditch effort of 40 yards was wide left of the upright, allowing Acadia to steal the show.

As bad as the first half was for SMU, holding their opponent to 2 points in the second half was a victory in itself as their defense was stingy at the end of the game when it counted the most. Their defensive backs shut down Burungi in the second half, and the linebackers completely stopped the run.

If SMU can beat Montreal this Saturday it will show that they can compete with the best in the country. If they lose, it could be a long season for Summarah and the gang. It's too bad that the Huskies can't play Mount Allison this week and take their aggression out on them. The game against Montreal goes at Saturday at Husky stadium and kicks off at 1pm



The next meet will be held at Acadia on September 30th. The men ran an 8K race, and will run a full 10K at Acadia.






