How I Spent My 9/11

A few days before the anniversary of 9/11, the United States' number one most wanted Terrorist released another video of himself, the first since 2004. He has dyed his hair to look healthy with a different spin on his usual "Death to America" speech. Instead, he tells America that their war in Iraq is failing, talks about the mortgage situation in the States and...the Democrats being elected? He utters no threats to any specific countries and US authorities expect no increase in terrorist activities according to CNN. However, the recent arrests in Frankfurt, Germany may have stopped a possible chemical attack at an airport that would have "celebrated" the 6th anniversary

I remember sitting in my Grade 11 math class when my English teacher burst through the door excitedly and told the whole class that someone was attacking the United States and then rus ing back into the hallway leaving us stunned. Later, a friend and I went to the Library and tried to log onto CNN.com to see what was happening, but the over-loaded server was down. It wasn't until I was standing in line at a nearby bank when I first saw the image of a fully-fuelled Boeing 767 slamming into the South Tower. A lady standing beside me watched my expression and softly explained, "You didn't see it yet? They both collapsed." I sat in silent shock for what must have been two whole minutes when the teller's voice in front of me asked again if she could help me. I quickly explained that I hadn't seen the images yet and she nodded her understanding as she took my card from my hand. My mouth was open as the first Tower fell silently, and then the screen cut to the South Tower's collapse.

Later that day at work, my coworkers had been catching parts of the news and quickly filled me in with all the information they had been getting. My mother even had left a message to call her when I got in to make sure I was safe.

When I got home from work, (I lived across from CFB Shearwater) the local Reservists had set up a road block at the main gate with two machine guns being manned with dead-serious soldiers dressed in full combat gear. Highway dividers were set as an "E" shape to keep a car from passing though in a hurry and the Military Police went over every car entering with the utmost scrutiny. I watched as they continued into the night with the same enthusiasm as several hours before when they had started. Sea Cadets for that night had been cancelled in fear of someone shooting anyone wearing a uniform and the Military was making its men and women go to work in civilian clothes for the next few months.

I sat up late that night watching the images on CNN being played over and over. It was taking hold of me and I couldn't turn away from the TV. Finally I must have fallen asleep because my alarm was ringing and it was a new day. Surprisingly, I had not dreamed of the attacks at all, but the local newspapers had made it their mission to make sure everyone who looked at the front pages would be reminded. That same day in any class I had, "It" was being discussed and debated. Some students were making the comments to "nuke the Middle East" and someone had sprayed an ignorant statement on a local, Lebanese-owned corner store. I think I learned more in that one day then I ever had in my life. The world's largest power had been struck a harsh blow and suddenly events overseas became more interesting to me. By the end of the week, teachers were managing to start class without the phrase

"Does anyone have anything to discuss about September 11th?"

Most people now can still remember where they were when they first heard of the attacks and can see the images in their own heads, of planes hitting the towers and the long search for survivors. Sunday September 9th, 2007 I smiled as I read on the eighth page of the newspaper about Osama Bin Laden's newest tape. I smiled because he wasn't the front page news that he may hope for and that I hadn't woken up thinking of what may get attacked in Halifax at any given time as I had for months after 9/11. Even CNN, didn't run the story of a new tape for several days as they had before with the others. Is it maybe because they're learning that the point of Terrorism is to terrorize people? By playing every scrap of information about terrorist attacks they can, they have been helping the terrorists themselves.

Terrorism had been the furthest thing from my mind until the German arrests of the three men planning a chemical attack in Frankfurt, Germany, and even then it only occupied my mind for about twenty minutes. When the men were arrested in Toronto, it never bothered me at all. Maybe I'm becoming callused to the Terrorist attacks/arrests still taking place in the world and it will not hit home until another attack happens in North America. to talk, to listen and to organize in order to improve the quality of women's university experience.



His Excellency Visits Saint Mary's

The start of another academic year also marked twenty-five years of co-operation between Saint Mary's University and China. This occasion was celebrated with a visit from the Ambassador of the Peoples Republic of China to Canada, Lu Shumin. His Excellency spent three days in Nova Scotia meeting with the Premier and Nova Scotia Business Inc. to explore the economic opportunities Nova Scotia has to offer. In addition, he also met with the Presidents of both Saint Mary's and Dalhousie University to discuss the success of Chinese students coming to Nova Scotia and Canadian students studying in China.

On a diplomatic front, 2007 marks thirty-seven years of cooperation between Canada and the Peoples Republic of China. The academic ties between China and Nova Scotia are very strong as China is a large source of foreign students to the province. Conversely, each year many Nova Scotians are traveling to China for their university degrees.

When programs bringing Chinese students to Canada began in the 1970s, only nine

students came to the country, one of them being the Ambassador himself. Currently there are almost four hundred Chinese students working towards their undergraduate and graduate degrees at Saint Mary's alone. In addition, there are over two hundred students enrolled at Saint Mary's in English language programs.

The Ambassador and Saint Mary's University President Dr. J Colin Dodds met at Saint Mary's Thursday afternoon. They talked privately about his Excellency's first official visit to the province. He and his wife visited the Halifax Public Gardens, and took a harbour cruise in the morning. The Ambassador and President Dodds also discussed the technological transformation China has seen, leaping from having little or no phone service to high tech cell phones in a matter of years. The Ambassador had a chance to tour much of the campus, which he said was beautiful.

The relationship between Saint Mary's and China has been progressively more two-way with an increasing number of Saint Mary's students choosing to study in China. Currently SMU has exchange agreements with six top Chinese Universities and has

held discussions at many more. At the meeting, President Dodds expressed his gratitude to the Chinese Education Office which has been very helpful to Saint Mary's over the years. In addition to the increasing exchange of students between Saint Mary's and China, the University has a significant number of academic programs focusing on China and Chinese culture.

Following the meeting, the Ambassador also got the chance to meet with Saint Mary's students and faculty of Chinese descent. Everyone enjoyed this meeting and learned a little something from it. The Ambassador and his wife had many questions for the students and faculty present, asking about where they were originally from and what they were studying. After posing for a few pictures with the students, the Ambassador was presented with a commemorative plaque in recognition of the twenty-five years of co-operation between Saint Mary's and China. There is hope this co-operation continues to improve and the program continues expanding.

Should You Keep Your Health Plan???

As tempting as it may be to opt out of the SMUSA Student Wise Health Plan for the sake of getting a little money back, it may actually be in your best interest to keep it. Even if you already have coverage under your parents or spouses benefits the plan can work in co-ordination with your original plan to offer you complete coverage on most if not all of the medical fees you may incur over the year.

The coverage offered by the plan is well worth the \$134 it costs to cover a single Canadian student. Your coverage is valid for one calendar year. The price goes up to \$289 for Canadian families, and to \$900.50 for single international students and \$1801 for international families. Still the benefits are worth their price. The plan will help finance most all your medical bills, covering hospital stays, ambulance fees, 80% of prescription drug costs, practitioner visits among other services. New this year, the plan will also cover many dental expenses which can weigh pretty heavily on the pocket book as well.


How is coverage so affordable?? The idea is pretty simple, many students pay a minimal fee and then there is usually enough combined money to cover the expenses of the fee claims that are made.

One downside to the plan is that it does not cover Gardasil, the Human Papillomavirus vaccine, which not only offers protection against HPV but also may help prevent Cervical Cancer in women. There was speculation that the vaccine was going to be included in the coverage this year. The shots are quite expensive to get so it is not surprising that the plan cannot cover them.

As the Sept 21st Opt out deadline draws near keep in mind that it is always better to be safe rather than sorry when it comes to your health. Also it is good to keep in mind that if you are twenty-one years of age or older your previous coverage may have expired.

If you would like to opt out or would like more information be sure to check out the student health plan website which can be accessed through www.smusa. ca or visit the Student Health and Dental Plan office located on the fifth floor of the Student Centre. If you choose to opt out you will need to provide proof of coverage under your current plan. Fees will then be credited back to your student account.

Your health is something to take seriously so be sure to give some thought to the situation before you make your decision. Make sure you have some form of comprehensive health care coverage before you sign the waiver.



You may have noticed the

posters around campus urging you to get your Mumps vaccination, or received the email from the University explaining why this vaccination is so important. Sure needles are no fun, and the email was a pretty long read for summer vacation but neither of those are good reasons to pass this vaccination up. Mumps is highly contagious and could easily spread throughout the entire campus quickly if something is not done to stop it, so when you finish reading this go get you needle.

Since early spring, Nova Scotia has been suffering from its third major outbreak of the Mumps in two years. The illness has hit University students the hardest. In an effort to prevent the illness from spreading any further the Provincial

Department of Health Promotion and Protection is offering free vaccinations for all University students studying in Nova Scotia. The vaccinations protect against the Measles, Mumps and Rubella. Everyone born in Canada post 1970 until 1997 received one vaccination and only those born after 1997 received a second dose of the vaccine.

Although in many cases the Mumps is not serious it does

lead to nine days of isolation

for all infected and can become much more severe. In the most serious cases Mumps can lead to arthritis, encephalitis (swelling of



the brain), deafness, or meningitis (swelling of the spinal cord and brain lining), as well as painful swelling of the testicles in males.

Symptoms of the Mumps include headaches, high fever, muscle aches and pains, an overall tired feeling, and loss of appetite. Once symptoms appear the salivary glands may also swell.

It is very contagious and is spread through saliva. Even the tiniest drops of saliva in the air may spread the illness. The virus can be spread during the seven days prior to the onset of symptoms and up to nine days

after they have appeared. For this reason following a diagnosis of Mumps those affected are put into isolation to prevent the illness from spreading. That means nine days sitting in your room alone, feeling miserable and falling behind in your classes. It also means nine days with

no socializing as your friends do not want to trade places with you. There is no treatment for the mumps as it is caused by a virus, not bacteria, so there are no

antibiotics to treat it. This is the reason the Province encouraged students to get vaccinated before returning to school as the close living quarters and shared facilities make for easy transmission of the virus.

You can get the vaccine free from your family doctor or at clinics

to be held at SMU sometime in the near future. For the record, if you do get the Mumps please abide by the advised nine day isolation request as to not spread the illness across campus.

Harry Potter and the Death of 10 Million Child-hoods

I'm meeting a few old friends. Three young people I've known and grown up with for many years; Harry, Ron and Hermione. It's a sad, anxious feeling, waiting for and reading the final book. It's like graduation, knowing you'll grow apart and a few of these people you'll never see again.

Just as the book reflected their theoretical final year at Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, it marked the end of many things. Harry finally severs ties with his only living blood relatives; the Dursleys, presumably to never see them again. Ron and Hermione also bid farewell to their families and the safety of the school routine to help Harry in the search and destroy mission for Voldemort's Horcruxes. The Death Eaters too, are taking their fair share of casualties. That evil Bellatrix LeStrange finally gets owned by sweet Mrs. Weasley when she comes after Ginny.

And we finally learn what team Snape played for. As it turns out, that big meanie Severus Snape was a big softie. All of his life he's been haunted by the woman he loved but couldn't have, Lily Evans, who would go on to marry James Potter and have a son named Harry. Yes, Snape was a Death Eater but decided to risk his life as a double agent when he found out Voldemort was after the Potters. He managed to go on serving the good guys and while being one of Voldemort's most trusted followers for 17 years, which is no small task. He must've been very conflicted seeing as the love of his life went on to marry a man who had bullied him to no end in school. 
are most of the characters in the Potterverse. It's a mark of a good writer when you don't know whether to love or hate a character or both.

Harry and Voldemort are tied together and neither can live while the other survives. Harry accepts that he must die to save the rest of Wizard kind and goes to his death knowingly. With the help of the Deathly Hallows (The Elder wand, the Resurrection stone and the Invisibility cloak) he is able to master death and come back to achieve his destiny. Voldemort, on the other hand, fears nothing but death and in the end, he is killed by Harry.

And after battle, stability is restored to the wizarding world. Harry grows up to marry Ginny and they have three children; James, Lily and Albus Severus (No Sirius?). Ron and Hermione marry and have little

Rose and Hugo. Harry and Ron are Aurors (Dark Wizard Hunters) for the Ministry. Ginny plays pro Quidditch for a while before starting a family and then becomes Quidditch writer for the Daily Prophet. Hermione, of course, works for the Ministry a few years improving the welfare of House Elves before becoming a Wizarding Lawyer.

And with those boring, adult futures Rowling ends the series. She blends action with tedium, magic with all too familiar Muggle issues of growing up, power with sacrifice, and hate with love. She's crafted a saga that will stand the test of time along with the classics of literature enjoyed by adults and children and read and dissected for years to come. She's gotten 12-year-olds to read a 607 page book in a day, and that is magic.



Haruki Murakami, a surrealist writer who is quickly replacing Kurt Vonnegut Jr. as my favorite writer still alive, (those pall malls really were a classy way to commit suicide, weren't they Kurt?) obviously faces no such hardships in his work. Not only does he seem to remember what it was like to be young and uncertain quite vividly, he also remembers that there's a reason most college/high school kid stories are exaggerated for a good reason: We are boring. Murakami lived through the spirit of rebellion of the 60's, followed by the collective melancholy of the 70's, and as a result, knows a thing or two about needing to find a reason to keep getting up in the morning for 50 or 60 more years. So what is it about us that is so hard to market, but seems so important to us now? Our brainmeats! Introspection is something every arts student can relate to, and the brainchild of some of the greatest works of art

Book Review: Kafka on the Shore

Originally released in Japan in 2002, Murakami's "Kafka on the Shore" provides youthful

introspection without ever becoming pretentiously self-centered, and manages to tell a story that is both relatable and bizarre. The chapters take turns between the first person narration of young runaway Kafka Tumara and third person narration concerning a seemingly slow, but surreally talented, senior citizen Satoru Nakata. Caught up in a story of oedipal prophecies, conversations with housecats and a nigh endless supply of existential riddles, these two characters slowly begin to cross over into the worlds forming in their minds. These worlds gradually branch out with the help of an assorted cast of characters, including an inter-sexual librarian, a cat killer who takes on the name and visage of Johnny Walker, and a symbolic pimp who also happens to be Colonel Sanders.

If it all sounds a bit inconsistent, you're beginning to get the idea. "Kafka on the Shore" is rife with symbolism, a lot of which isn't easily deduced with the aid of a few psychology textbooks. The story has an inkblot effect, meaning as much to the reader as they

allow it to, and thus becoming very easy to relate to, even if your pimp isn't based on any famous fast food icons.

Murakami is known for presenting melodious stories that interlink the workings of the inside and outside worlds, and "Kafka on the Shore" provides another captivating example. On a side note, you may be wondering whether or not there's a reason to the main character being named after famous writer Franz Kafka. At the risk of giving away too much information, I can answer that consideration with a very definite "maybe."

Big Ticket Concert: Joel Plaskett Rocks His Hometown

I remember my first Joel Plaskett concert. I saw him at the Bridgewater Exhibition (affectionately called 'The Ex' by locals) over a year ago. Joel's opening act was an Ox pull, and the venue for watching him play was the same funky smelling mud bowl that the oxen had used to haul bales of hay and other impossibly heavy things. It cost us \$10 for admission to 'the Ex' and that included seeing Plaskett, and sticking around to get an autograph and a cameraphone picture. The crowd at the concert was cautious about Joel because no one really knew him. For Joel, playing SMU's Frosh week was just another night at the office. Halifax's 'Bruce Springsteen'- a lofty pseudonym to which The Coast can be credited-'took Saint Mary's and Dalhousie students from a nervous pre-concert chatter to a raucous encore-chanting, fever-pitched, sing along. Special guest Peter Elkas stepped up to the keyboard while the usual suspects Dave Marsh (drums) and Chris Pennell (bass) could also be found on-stage. For those people who have somehow managed to become Haligonians and not learn who the Joel Plaskett is, here is a brief timeline:

Joel first made a splash with the band Thrush Hermit in 1992, which spanned seven years until their breakup in 1999. Plaskett ventured into a solo career, but did not see any measurable success until his new backing band- The Emergency- helped him release 'Down at the Khyber' and later 'Truthfully, Truthfully'. He has since released another solo album, 'La De Da', a DVD titled 'Make a Little Noise' and The Emergency's most recent work, 'Ashtray Rock'. Almost always featured in a live performance is the substituted name Becky, which would be his wife. She provided spoken word vocals for Joel's latest album and could be caught in narrative at the side of the stage during his performance on Alderney Landing this past July as well.

Beyond all of the albums and DVDs, what you need to know about Joel is that he's a son of Halifax. Ashtray Rock is not about cigarettes and rock and roll, rather it's about growing up, love, hate, and having nothing more to say. Indeed, Ashtray Rock is not a genre of music, but a place near Clayton Park now made famous by the album title. The album, a window into his past, reads quite openly about the breakup of Thrush Hermit.

So why do people find it fashionable to love Joel Plaskett and The Emergency? Because every show he gets up there on stage and opens his soul for you. He looks you in the eye and separates you from the crowd, and sings to you-even if it's in a muddy ox pull pit on the South Shore. This past Wednesday at Dal, S-M-U chants broke out in the quad, where Joel proceeded to pluck along to the throngs of students until he finally bridged into his next song. Joel is a live performer of epic proportions, and the more shows he plays, the more people seem to appreciate having him around.


Two years ago K-OS came to SMU and performed in the Tower Parking Lot, and the year



As they finished the encore set, which included a rendition of 'Come on Teacher' where a feverish student body chanted 'nine-teen-eight-tee!'-The quad erupted into decibels that Matt Mays has only heard in his dreams.

And maybe that's the reason why there's so much to love about Joel Plaskett. He's never been on Late Night with Conan, but he doesn't need to. We like Joel just the way he is. He has proven his worth to Halifax a thousand times over and he's given us too many amazing shows to be overrated or forgettable. When I pay to see him, I leave the concert feeling like I still owe him something in return. I sincerely hope that for all the students who got to see Joel for the first time last week, you remember Wednesday night and can tell your first 'Plaskett concert' story someday too. And I think I speak for everyone when I say I hope that Joel goes nowhere with us for a very long time.

Juno Nominee Metric Plays Halifax

After a sold out show in Halifax last September, Canadian indie-rockers Metric will return to perform songs in support of their 2006 JUNO nominated album Live It Out at the Cunard Centre on Friday, Sept. 14 at 9 p.m.

Comprised of Emily Haines (vocals/synths), Jimmy Shaw (guitar), Joshua Winstead (bass) and Joules Scott-Key (drums), Metric has opened for rock legends The Rolling Stones at Madison Square Gardens and performed at both the SXSW and Coachella music festivals. The band also took home the award for Best Independent Video at the 2006 MuchMusic Video Awards, where they also performed.

Their singles "Empty," "Monster Hospital" and "Poster of a Girl" have propelled their acclaimed release, Live it Out, to gold status in Canada. This success can partly be attributed to the band spending the majority of the time since the release of their 2003 debut, Old World Underground, Where Are You Know?, relentlessly touring throughout North America, Europe and Japan. Bonds is one of many baseball superstars to achieve career milestones this season, but history shows us that no matter what happens from now until the end of the October, the 2007 Major League Baseball season will be remembered for one reason- Barry Bonds and his pursuit of 756.

The 2007 baseball season has brought as much excitement to fans as the sport has seen since Mark McGwire and Sammy Sosa chased Roger Maris' single season home run record of 61 back in 1999. Frank Thomas of the Blue Jays and Alex Rodriguez of the Yankees both hit home run #500 of their respective careers this summer. At just 32 years of age, A-Rod became the youngest player in Major League Baseball history to hit 500 home runs. Sammy Sosa of the Rangers hit the 600th home run of his career. Trevor Hoffman, closer for the San Diego Padres,

became the first member of the 500 save club. Hoffman set the career record for saves with his 479th save on Sept. 28 of last year against Pittsburgh, breaking Lee Smith's old mark of 478. Hoffman finished the 2006 season with 482. Tom Glavine, pitcher for the New York Mets, became the first lefty since Steve Carlton in 1983 to notch his 300th career victory. Craig Biggio, second baseman for the Houston Astros, got his 3000th hit on June 28th and became just the ninth player in history to record 3000 hits with the same club. Biggio has played for the Astros since 1988, and he reached the milestone as he went 3-5 in front of the home crowd. Most recently, after being on the disabled list the entire season, Pedro Martinez became the 15th pitcher in history to record 3000 strikeouts with his 2nd punch-out of the season on September 3rd.

There were also three no-hitters thrown this past summer, the most in one season since 2001. Chicago White Sox ace Mark Buehrle threw the first no-hitter of the season on April 18th. The only runner he allowed to reach base, Sammy Sosa, was picked off at first base after reaching on a walk. On June 12th,


Justin Verlander of the Detroit Tigers threw the first no-hitter of his career. Clay Buchholz, in just his second career major league appearance, threw a no-hitter against the Baltimore Orioles at Fenway Park. Buchholz was recalled from Triple-A Pawtucket to start the game after Tim Wakefield was scratched from the start due to an injury. It was the 17th no-hitter in Red Sox history. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Buchholz is the third pitcher since 1900 to throw a no-hitter in his first or second Major League start. Bobo Hollomon threw a no-hitter in his debut on May 6, 1953, for the St. Louis Browns at home against the Philadelphia A's, and Wilson Alvarez did it in his second start on Aug. 11, 1991, for the White Sox at Baltimore.

Before the regular season is over on September 30th, there may be a few more milestones reached. Future Hall-of-Famer Ken Griffey Jr. is just 7 homers shy of the 600th of his career. Chicago's Jim Thome is sitting at 498 home runs and Boston's Manny Ramirez is sitting at 490. Manny is also just 4 grand slams shy of breaking Lou Gehrig's all-time record of 22.

While there were many person-

al milestones, some organizations also witnessed some impressive (or not so impressive) team milestones reached. On August 22nd, the Texas Rangers destroyed the Baltimore Orioles 30-3 in the first game of a double-header. The Rangers set the modern (post-1900) Major League record for runs scored in a game, and became the first team since the Chicago Colts scored 36 against the Louisville Colonels in 1897 to score 30 runs in a game. To top it off, the Rangers beat the O's 9-7 in the second game, setting the record for most runs scored in a double-header. On July 15th, the Philadelphia Phillies lost the 10,000th game of the club's history. Philadelphia became the first team in the four major sports (MLB, NBA, NFL, and NHL) to accomplish this feat. It must be noted however, that the MLB season is nearly twice as long as the NBA and NHL seasons and is also ten times longer than the

In thirty years, when we have the chance to look back on the 2007 Major League Baseball season, very few will remember Rodriguez's 500th home run, or Verlander's no-hitter. The moment that will live on forever in the minds of baseball fans everywhere is when Bonds went deep for the 756th time in his illustrious 22-year-



that in 1974 when Aaron broke Babe Ruth's all-time home run mark of 714, there were several personal milestones reached by future Hall-of-Famers. Al Kaline, one of the greatest Detroit Tigers to ever play, got the 3000th hit of his career. Former St. Louis Cardinals pitcher Bob Gibson recorded the 3000th strikeout of his career, and while playing for the California Angels, Nølan Ryan threw his 3rd of 7 career no-hitters. But if you ask baseball enthusiasts how they remember the 1974 baseball season, their answer will undoubtedly be, Hammerin' Hank Aaron and his pursuit of 715.

Huskies Narrowly Hold Off X-Men


